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PREFACE.

A FEW words will suffice to explain the origin and object of this little work. At page 30 of my pamphlet on Cottage Hospitals the following passage occurs: "The spiritual supervision of the hospital devolves naturally on the clergyman of the parish or his representative, and it must be left to him to make such provision for the spiritual wants of the patients as appears to him most suitable. At the risk of being thought presumptuous, however, I venture to offer one suggestion, viz., that in every hospital there should be regular morning and evening 'family prayers,' at which all the patients who are not confined to their beds should be expected to attend. The prayers, short and simple, should be read by the nurse or others who may be appointed by the manager. To those patients who in their own homes have been accustomed to them, it will be a welcome continuation of a time-honoured custom, the omission of which could not be otherwise than a source of regret; whilst it may be the means of arousing those who have hitherto neglocted the custom, to a sense of their duty in this respect when they return to their own domieilcs."

Being desirous of asecrtaining what books were the best suited for earrying out these views, I recently made inquiries at several publishers', and learnt, to my surprise, that there was no separato collection of Hospital Prayers; and having failed to meet with any other work which appeared

to me calculated to meet the requirements of the case, I resolved to compile a short series of prayers, which, however deficient they may be in literary merit and in originality of thought or expression, may, it is hoped, under God's blessing, supply a deficiency which there is reason to believe has been felt by others as well as by myself.

Although these prayers were in the first instance intended. for cottage hospitals, it is earnestly hoped that their use may be extended to other establishments of the same class, especially to the infirmaries attached to the hundreds of union workhouses scattered throughout the land, in many of which, especially in remote country districts, there is reason to fear that there exists as great an amount of spiritual destitution as there is of physical want and bodily suffering. I plead not, however, for this collection of prayers in particular, for they are confessedly poor and imperfect, -the work of a hand unpractised in compositions of this class; -but what I plead for is the regular practice of morning and evening prayers within the wards of every hospital throughout the land. the blessings which, on Scriptural grounds, we may confidently expect from the adoption of this practice, it is needless for me to enter in this place.

The duty of conducting these daily prayers in a ward seems to devolve naturally on the head nurse or "Sister," and there are very few, it is anticipated, who will not gladly undertake it; but, when from any cause, the services of the nurse are not available, this duty must be delegated to others, as may be decided upon by the chaplain, if there be one, or other hospital authorities. No difficulty, it is imagined, will be experienced in obtaining the services of many a Christian man or woman in the neighbourhood, who would cheerfully devote half-an-hour, morning and evening, to so good and hely a cause. When the latter course is pursued, it is generally advisable for two or three or more individuals to combine their efforts, one taking the morning, another the evening prayers, or taking both services on alternate

weeks, or each taking a separate ward, as best suits their convenience; so that in case of sickness, absence frem home, &c., there should be no break in the regular performance of the service. One of the Psalms of the day, or a short portion of Holy Writ, should, when time permits, precede the prayers.

With regard to the appended Short Form of Public Service for Lay Readers in Hospitals, a few words of explanation are necessary. On the vast importance of a regular Weekly Public Service, conducted within the wards of a hospital, it would be superfluous for me to enter at any length; the benefits to be derived from it must be patent to every reflecting mind; the only one which I shall mention hero is the opportunity it affords to patients and nurses alike, from which, otherwise, they would be debarred, of joining together at stated periods in the prayers and praises of the Church.

It is most desirable that this laudable practice should be more generally adopted in our hospitals than it hitherto has been. One of the obstacles which has apparently in some instances hindered its adoption, has been the want of a short Service adapted to meet the peculiar wants and feelings of those who naturally form the bulk of a hospital congregation, viz., the "afflicted and distressed in mind, body, or estate." In the apponded Service an attempt has been made to meet this want, by combining portions of the regular Daily Service of the Church, with others from that of the Visitation of the Siek. How far this attempt has been successfully accomplished it is for others to determine; but it may be mentioned that a very similar form has for some months been in use in one hospital, the Infirmary attached to St. Giles's Workhouse; and that, as far as can be judged, it has met the requirements of the case.

In the arrangement of the Form of Service, I have had the great advantage of the advice of the Rev. John Swayne, whose lengthened experience as Chaplain amongst the poor and sick of the St. Giles's and Bloomsbury Union gives peculiar weight and value to his views.

REMARKS ON CONDUCTING A PUBLIC SERVICE IN HOSPITALS.

For those laymen and others who contemplate engaging in the good work, the few following hints, derived from personal experience, may not be unacceptable.

- 1. The Service should be short. This is self-evident, when it is remembered that to the weak and sick generally, it is difficult and even painful to remain for any length of time in an upright or constrained position; but it is even more difficult to fix the attention for any lengthened period on spiritual things; for as is well known, the mind and body are so intimately connected, that where the latter is diseased the former is generally enfeebled, and the thoughts are apt, even more than in health, to be called off to things pertaining to the body. The whole Service should not exceed one hour at the furthest.
- 2. The Scrvice should not contain too numerous responses in which the congregation are to take part. Most important as it undoubtedly is that all should take an active part in the Scrvice, this can only be effected when the majority of the congregation are familiar with the words and routine of the forms in use. Now, in a hospital there is generally a large admixture of Roman Catholics, Nonconformists, and others, who are wholly unacquainted with the English Liturgy; and if you depend upon them for the responses, failure, in many instances, will be the result. For this reason, also, it is advisable that the usual plan followed in our Church, of the minister and congregation reading the Psalms in alternate verses, be departed from, and that they should be read throughout by the officiating minister or reader alone. Much delay and confusion will thus often be obviated. At the same time, whenever practicable, those of the patients who can read should be supplied with a copy of the Services in use, so that they

may follow it with the eye at least, if not with the tongue; but they are far more likely to do so with the latter when they have the words before them.*

- 3. The Singing often presents a difficulty. As far as my own experience goes, it is best left in the hands of the patients, not only to constitute the choir, but to select the hymns and the tunes with which they are most familiar. The selection of the hymns and the necessary practising during the week, furnish matter for thought and pleasant employment, which is of itself no slight recommendation. There is generally a nurse or one of the patients who is capable and willing to take the lead, and though a delicate ear may now and then, perhaps ofton, have to wince at a discordant note, the singing under this arrangement has generally a heartiness often wanting where higher musical talent is engaged. How far a small harmonium, or barrelorgan, might be introduced with advantage, is a question to be settled. There should be a hymn-book to every two or three of the congregation, and it is advisable to have the places found out and clearly marked before the Service begins; otherwise there is apt to be unseemly delay and some confusion when the singing commences, which, of course, it is desirable to avoid. It is a great assistance to those who cannot read, whether from blindness or otherwise, to have each verse read out before it is sung.
- 4. The selection of suitable Lessons and Psalms is sometimes a little difficult, as they should harmonize, as far as possible, with the other portions of the Service, both in length and sentiment. With the viow of aiding the selection I have appended two Lists, one of short Lessons from the New Testament, and another from the Psalms of David, which appear to me adapted for the purpose. To avoid


eonfusion during the Service, it is advisable, before commencing, to mark the places in the Bible and Prayer Books intended for the use of the patients.

- 5. In selecting a Sermon, two points should be attended to:-1st, It should be short, not exceeding fifteen minutes at the outside; and, 2ndly, It should be as plain as possible, so as to bring it to the comprehension of the poorest and most uneducated, who often form the bulk of hospital congregations. To such, a few earnest words in simple language are more likely to come home with force to the heart, than a long harangue delivered in the most florid style of oratory. Considering the mixed character of the congregation in matters of religious belief, it is advisable to avoid controversial points, and all attempts to proselytize. It should ever be borne in mind that, amongst a hospital congregation, there are some, many, perhaps, who are "sick unto death;" hence it is advisable that the great life-giving truths of the Gospel should form constant and prominent topics of discourse; -Bishop Oxenden's writings, especially his "Parables of our Lord," "Cottage Sermons," and "Great Truths in very Plain Language," will supply ample material to commence with.
- 6. It is advisable to avoid too frequent changes of posture, as this is often painful to the sick, if not impracticable in many cases. It is, of course, desirable that the kneeling position, as being the most reverential, should be maintained during the periods of prayer; but even here, when the necessary change of posture entails personal suffering, the individual should not only be allowed but directed to retain throughout the Service the sitting or other position which is most free from suffering; thus giving the mind an increased chance of fixing its powers on spiritual things. It is the posture of the heart before God, not the position of the body which is of paramount importance. At the same time, those who can kneel should do so, were it even only for the sake of example.

- 7. In most hospitals there are wards containing one or more bed-ridden patients, and as it is desirable that they, in common with others, should enjoy the comfort and benefit of an occasional Service of the Church, it is advisable, when there is only one reader, to take the wards in rotation; but when there is no special call in this way, the best plan is to select the most central and convenient ward which the patients generally can reach with the least degree of exertion.
- 8. In the choice of the hour at which the Service is to be likely, consideration should always be had to the wishes and views of the hospital authorities, whose good-will and sympathy it is most important to secure, even at the sacrifice of your own convenience. In a large hospital, you can, of course, never be secure from interruption by accidents, &c., being brought into the ward; but to avoid this as much as possible an hour should be selected after the doctors have paid their usual daily visits, the patients' wounds have been dressed, &c. Care should also be taken not to interfere with the regular meals of the patients.
- 9. In undertaking and conducting a Hospital Service, it is most important to secure the sanction and co-operation of the chaplain or authorized minister; this will give a degree of weight and authority to your work in the eyes of the patients, which it would otherwise lack.

With these few remarks on Hospital Services, I would, in conclusion, most earnestly commend the subject to the serious attention of every Christian who has at heart the promotion of the spiritual welfare of poor suffering humanity. It is one of those modes of "doing good" on which we may confidently ask, with the full assurance of receiving, the blessing of the Almighty.


