A quarto Letter Book (one of a set of three) containing a portion of the replies returned to a circular sent out by the College in 1806, enquiring as to the efficacy and alleged dangers of Vaccination. The replies include letters from Matthew Baillie, John Sims, Sir Gilbert Blane, Joseph Adams, Henry Vaughan (Sir H. Halford), George Pearson, J. Addington, and many other physicians in various parts of the country; also communications from the College of Surgeons, the Colleges of Physicians of Edinburgh and Dublin, and other bodies.

There are three such books preserved in the College of Physicians, containing 157 replies to the Circular, with other written and printed documents. The report of the College on the subject was printed in 1807.

At the beginning is a list of the so-called African Surgeons, *i. e.* persons who had passed an examination in Medicine and Surgery at the Infirmary, and were considered competent to act as Surgeons on vessels engaged in the Slave Trade.

An Act of Parliament, passed about the year 1789, made it compulsory for every vessel engaged in the Slave Trade to carry at least one Surgeon who had received a certificate of his having passed at Surgeon's Hall, or at some Publick or County Hospital, or the Royal College of Physicians or Royal College of Surgeons in Edinburgh. Between

the years 1789 and the Abolition of the Slave Trade on May 1st, 1807 nearly 800 persons, mostly the captains of the ships, obtained a certificate from the Liverpool Infirmary.

From internal evidence it seems that the greater part of the list has been copied from a previous document. The actual entries appear to begin about 1805. Liverpool Royal Infirmary

RECEIPT BOOK.

A book of Medical Receipts which belonged to a Dr. Jenner who practised at Burbage, in Wiltshire, about a century ago. A note inside says that the first hundred pages contain receipts given to Mrs. Saville by Henry Jenkins, who died in 1670, aged 169 years. This cannot be true, as this part of the book contains references to "teaspoons," and cautions against giving tea to children, whereas it was a rare and costly luxury in the seventeenth century. There are also recommendations as to *electrical* treatment. The most notable feature is the constant recommendation of *cold bathing* for Fevers and other complaints, and of drinking large quantities of water; this might have been taken from Sir John Floyer. The second part of the book is more modern, being largely taken from printed books, such as Motherby's
