NEW METHOD OF PREPARING POWDERS FOR USE IN MEDICINE.—A simple, and often probably, an excellent and available method is recommended by a German apothecary, Wittke of Erfurt, by which the bulk of the dose of a substance in powder may be exceedingly reduced. It is admitted that the active properties of very many medicinal substances are best extracted by alcohol, and that these properties, therefore, are to be found in tinctures; but the quantity of spirit in the dose of a tincture often renders that form of administration inadmissible. Wittke, therefore mixes tincture of hellebore, cinchona, &c., with an equal quantity of sugar, evaporates to dryness, and powders the residuum. In this manner, he succeeds in concentrating in a small bulk, the active portion of a very large quantity of the drug. He prescribes the preparation as *saccharized cinchona*, &c. These saccharine powders bear some analogy to conserves, from which, however, they differ in being free from mucilage, vegetable albumen, and other inert matters.

# CONTINENTAL MEDICAL DIRECTORY.

WITH A BRIEF ACCOUNT OF THE SPAS OF GERMANY, FROM THE PEN OF  
DR. SUTRO, PHYSICIAN TO THE GERMAN HOSPITAL.

THE difficulties of compiling a list of British qualified medical practitioners resident in the various cities and towns of the Continent, are greater than could have been imagined. It might, *à priori*, have been anticipated, that every individual so located would have been at once alive to the advantages which might accrue to himself by the publication of such a list, but such does not seem to have been the case in every instance, for we are told by one of our correspondents, that "two gentlemen resident at Pisa, and styling themselves doctors, declined giving any information to the English clergyman to whom Dr. — wrote. These have not been inserted in the list now forwarded."

The suggestion for this list came to us, in the first instance, from the highest authorities of the profession, and almost uniformly upon this ground—that when their patients left for the various places of the Continent, they desired to know to what medical practitioner they might safely confide their future treatment. The argument, with us, was conclusive; and we immediately set to work to complete the list, with what success may be gathered from the following pages. But incomplete as it is, we beg to assure our readers that neither pains nor expense were spared to render it otherwise. Most expensive advertisements in *Galignani's Messenger*, supported by paragraphs emanating from the editor of that journal, calling attention to the importance of such a list, were inserted. Agents were appointed to receive the communications—assistance was voluntarily rendered by members of the profession themselves—but withal, we are conscious of our short-comings in this our first attempt. But the whole history of the Directory, in the compilation of every new feature, shows the impossibility, without data to go on, of perfecting a list in the outset.

## NAMES OF THE PRINCIPAL SPA PHYSICIANS OF GERMANY.

WITH A SHORT ACCOUNT OF THE SPAS.

[We are indebted to *Dr. Sutro*, physician to the German hospital, for the following interesting communication.]

THE sanative influence of change of air is so frequently exemplified in the medical treatment of chronic diseases, that some advantage may be derived from a more extended circle of localities, open to the choice of the invalid.

The discomfort and expense formerly connected with a distant journey, have been removed by the all-powerful agency of steam; and now, even very moderate means allow the selection of any Spa most suited to the complaint of the respective patients.

The less, therefore, we have to hesitate at present in recommending those natural remedies, the more it becomes imperative to familiarize ourselves with their names and characteristics.

It will be needless to repeat here, what has so often been proved by experience, viz. that however useful travelling in itself may be, it is not indifferent, but, on the contrary, highly important, to which of the Spas the valetudinarian is recommended to resort.

Those who have had frequent opportunities of visiting the various watering places, and of conversing with the patients in their own tongue, will testify to the fact, that the most remarkable cures witnessed at the Spas often take place after a fruitless employment of several other Spas: thus showing the necessity of a careful discrimination in the first instance.

We shall commence with the small, but highly important class of springs which contain such an inconsiderable amount of solid ingredients, that they are often called "chemically indifferent," or "akratic" (from  $\alpha$ , negativum, and  $\kappa\rho\alpha\tau\omicron\varsigma$ , power—possessing, as it were, powerless ingredients). But I have shown, at another place, that the cures effected by them stand in direct relation to the respective contents, contrary to the usually received opinion, that their chemical contents are "indifferent." The importance of this point is obvious in the selection to be made amongst them.

*Gastein*, in Tyrol, the farthest amongst them, could formerly only be reached after a most difficult journey. At present, steam and diligence will carry us conveniently to the beautiful and picturesque mountainous Spa of *Gastein*. The diligence first passes through "*Hofgastein*," which is a filial establishment of the more elevated

"*Wildbad Gastein*."

The latter lies upwards of 3000 feet above the level of the sea. Nevertheless, the climate is less bleak than bracing, being protected by the semicircular guard of the surrounding mountains. Changes of temperature, from sudden discharges of tempests, are more frequent in summer than in spring.

An interesting waterfall is formed by the rapid *Aebe*. The springs arise at different heights, with a temperature of  $118\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$  F. to  $95^{\circ}$  F. respectively. Two and a half grains of solid constituents are contained in sixteen ounces—viz. besides sulphate of soda, the chief constituent, some chloride of sodium, carbonate of lime, of iron, and silica, and some *gluérine*. The gas contained in the water possesses less than 4 parts of carbonic acid in 100. Bath eruption, or fever of reaction, often follow the course, generally after about 21 baths.

The Spa has shown itself highly efficacious in chronic rheumatism, gout, writer's cramp, arthritic ankylosis, &c., and especially in those chronic diseases in which the nervous system has been peculiarly weakened or altered in its func-

tion—as paralysis, with general torpor, with deficient calefaction. Dr. Kicene is physician of Gastein, or Wildbadgastein, as it is called, in contradistinction from its less elevated filial establishment, Hofgastein, into which the water is conducted by pipes, and arrives with a temperature of about 100° F. Though the temperature of the baths taken is the same in both establishments, the filial Spa is generally considered less efficacious than the Wildbad.

Dr. Sleting is the physician of Hofgastein.

The next Spa of the same class is

*Pfäfers*, in Switzerland, one of the most remarkable places in existence, and frequently visited by tourists on account of its picturesque and curious position. It seems perched in a most romantic mountain fissure, into which patients were formerly let down by cords from the convent that overreaches the valley. The foot-path along the vehement river Tamina is exceedingly steep. But a particularly striking view is afforded by the walk to the springs, on the planks laid across the foaming river between the rocks. The temperature of the water is 99½° F. Here also pipes are constructed to supply the water of the chief source to the more convenient modern establishment of Hof-ragaz, which lies about 600 feet lower than Pfäfers, the altitude of the latter being 2100 feet above the level of the sea. The Spa likewise contains merely two and a half grains of solid ingredients in sixteen ounces—viz. besides the chief constituent, carbonate of magnesia, some carbonate of lime, sulphate of soda and of lime, chloride of sodium and of magnesium, with a very minute quantity of iron. It is recommended in the same diseases for which Gastein is indicated, but its chief reputation is in paralysis from wounds, contractions, &c., without any residue of apoplexy or congestion to the brain.

Dr. Kaiser, jun., practises at Pfäfers, and his father, Dr. Kaiser, senior, at Hof-ragaz.

Nearer to England we find the Black-Forest Spa of *Wildbad*, in Würtemberg. Its environs are extremely wild and picturesque. The river Enz intersects the valley, and rushes with vehemence through the Spa. The altitude of Wildbad is 1200 feet. To the east and west it is enclosed by high mountains, the course of the river being from north to south. Through the acclivity of the mountains the sun appears later, and vanishes sooner in Wildbad than in the neighbouring localities. The springs flow out of granite rocks, and have a temperature ranging between 88° and 99° F. Sand covers the bottom of the baths, and as neither heating nor cooling is required, the sensations induced by bathing and moving along the warm sand are extremely pleasurable. Three and a half grains of solid constituents are contained in sixteen ounces—viz. besides chloride of sodium, some carbonate of soda, of lime, magnesia, iron, sulphate of soda, and silica. The gas evolved from the water consists, in 100 parts, of 2 of carbonic acid, 91½ of nitrogen, and 6½ of oxygen. Formerly, the baths only were used, but since 1836 a drinking spring is employed, with four and a quarter grains of solid ingredients. In gout, rheumatism, paralysis, especially with articular swellings, in ankylosis, &c., Wildbad shows itself highly efficacious.

The Spa physicians are Geheimerath Dr. Fricker, Dr. Fallati, Dr Schweickle.

*Teplitz*, in Bohemia, is situated in a charming and fertile valley of the Erz mountain, at an elevation of upwards of 600 feet above the north sea, and connected northward with the village of Schönau. The town is surrounded on all sides by hills. Its climate is very mild, and the vegetation of the immediate neighbourhood extremely luxurious. The views from the heights round Teplitz are very pleasant and variegated. The battlefield of Kuhn lies at a short distance to the north of the Spa. The temperature of the chief spring is about 120° F. That of the others ranges between 118° and 77° F. The solid contents amount to nearly five grains in a pint of water—viz. besides carbonate of soda, some carbonate of lime, of magnesia, of iron, some chloride of sodium, &c. In 100 parts of gas, about 94 parts are composed of nitrogen, four of carbonic acid, and the rest of oxygen. Besides the springs, peat-baths are often resorted to.



Teplitz is recommended in anomalous gout with swellings and contractions, in chronic rheumatism, in paralysis, especially after typhus fever, &c. The baths of Schönau being cooler, they are generally used in the commencement of the course, and the heat gradually increased.

The class of Bitter Waters (Pikro-pegae, from *πικρος*, bitter, and *πηγη*, spring,) next claims our attention. Their chief constituent, sulphate of magnesia, or of soda, generally imparts a bitterish taste to them, modified, however, by the presence of free carbonic acid, or heat. They generally depress the organic vitality, and are therefore useful in cases of general irritability with obstructed portal circulation. The weakening effect is counteracted to a certain degree by the admixture of iron and other metals.

*Páltna*, *Saidschütz*, *Seidlitz*, and *Friedrichshall*, contain a considerable amount of sulphates. But as these waters are more used as medicinal beverages at a distance, than resorted to as Spas, I shall not further dwell here on their properties, but at once proceed to the celebrated

*Carlsbad*, in Bobemia, the so-called king of the German Spas. It is a small town, with about 3000 inhabitants, full of charming prospects and picturesque scenery. It is less protected on the north than on the other sides. The valley of Carlsbad is likewise deficient of mountainous protection in the west. The Spa is intersected by the river Tepl. The spring issues out of limestone formed by the calcareous deposit of the water itself.

The "sprudel," or bubbler, issues out of six apertures, with a temperature of  $165\frac{3}{4}$ ° F., five being near each other, and the sixth, more distant, is the "Hygiænsquelle." From the chief opening the water spontaneously jerks upwards, in a perpendicular tube, and sinks again, about nineteen times in a minute. Hence the name of "sprudel," or "springer," (jumper.) The phenomenon is due to the periodical accumulation and discharge of carbonic acid in the upper parts of the sprudel-basin. The jerks are not all of equal power. The other sprudel-openings are covered by boards and cannot be seen. The calcareous deposits accumulate to such an extent, that the holes must be bored out four times a year, to prevent their being closed. Sprudel-eruptions frequently ensued in former times, when less attention was paid to the safety-holes. One of the most violent occurred in September, 1809. One of the springs ceased then entirely (the Schlossbrunnen), and only reappeared fourteen years afterwards, but with a diminished temperature. All springs of Carlsbad are supposed to arise from the same origin, and their varying temperature is ascribed to their relative distance from the common source. The amount of carbonic acid generally stands in an opposite ratio to the heat of the springs, and ranges between eleven and fifteen cubic inches in a pint. From forty-one to thirty-six grains of solid ingredients are contained in sixteen ounces of water, chiefly consisting of sulphate and carbonate of soda, chloride of sodium, carbonate of lime and magnesia, &c., with some silica and iron. The renown of Carlsbad is almost universal, as a most powerful solvent in hepatic enlargements, abdominal infarcta, hypochondriasis, and obstructed portal circulation.

The exciting effect of heat is counteracted to some extent by the depressing action of sulphate of soda. The efficiency of Carlsbad in gout and lithiasis is principally attributed to its carbonate of soda. Carlsbad is contra-indicated in digestive atony, in general debility, dropsy, in lithiasis with great irritation, in apoplectic tendency, &c.

Physicians of Carlsbad are—Drs. de Carro, Hochberger, Hilawack, Fleckles, Forster, Preiss, Oesterreicher, Meissner, Berman, Wagner, Damm, Mannl, Sorger, Anger, Jahl, Gaus, Porges, &c.

*Marienbad* lies southward of Carlsbad, at an altitude of 1900 feet above the level of the north sea. It is only accessible from a ravine-like opening in the south. The other sides are enclosed by charming mountains. The Spa is of

modern origin. About half a century ago it was a wilderness, only provided with a wooden hut, in which two iron ealdrons were fixed for the preparation of Glauber's salt, out of the Kreuzbrunnen, besides a wooden enclosure of the spring. Now it is a most handsome and fashionable watering place. The contents of the different springs vary considerably. The Kreuzbrunnen containing sixty grains, the Ferdinandsbrunnen forty-five, the Caroliuenbrunnen only fourteen, in a pint of water. The chief constituents are sulphate and carbonate of soda, chloride of sodium, carbonate of lime, magnesia, iron, and some silicea. Carbonic acid from eight to fifteen cubic inches in the respective springs. The temperature of the springs ranges between  $47^{\circ}$  and  $52^{\circ}$  F. The action of the abdominal organs, and especially of the liver, is greatly promoted by Marienbad. Abdominal plethora, and obstruction of the portal system, form the principal indications. Those springs in which a smaller amount of sulphates is contained, and a greater quantity of iron, act more as tonics than as solvents, and are generally employed at the termination of the course. Baths of carbonic acid gas and of peat greatly assist the curative process in many instances.

Physicians: Hofrath Dr. Heidler, Drs. Danzer, Frankl, Herzig, Abel, Opitz, Schneider, Lucka, Kratzman, &c.

*Franzensbad* forms the third (north-western) corner of the celebrated Bohemian triangle. The remarkable town of Eger is only one league distant from the Spa, and connected with it by a shady walk. The spot appears rather lonely, though endowed with many natural charms. The chief spring, Franzensbrunnen, contains forty-two grains of solid ingredients in sixteen ounces, besides forty cubic inches of carbonic acid. It contains less sulphate and carbonate of soda, but more iron, than Kreuzbrunnen of Marienbad. In other respects great analogy exists between them. The action of Franzensbad is therefore less lowering and antiplastic, and more stimulating and tonic than that of the Kreuzbrunnen, and its effect is intermediate between the bitter waters and chalybeates. It is often used after Carlsbad, as an after cure. It counteracts acidity, biliary obstruction, and greatly improves the digestion.

Physicians: Drs. Koestler, Cartellieri, Palliardi, Boscann, Sommer, Komma, Mayert, Neidhart, Langer, Loiman.

*Sulphur Springs* are generally produced by the action of water on a sulphuret of sodium or potassium, or on sulphurous acid. A combination of sulphur is their chief ingredient, which constantly evolves a greater or smaller quantity of free sulphuretted hydrogen gas. They powerfully counteract those cutaneous derangements which are partially based on a disordered action of the sero-fibrous system. They heighten the normal function of the skin, and exert a curative action in rheumatic, arthritic, and cutaneous diseases.

*Aix-la-Chapelle* (Aachen), in Prussia, the nearest of the German Spas, lies in a pleasant valley between the Rhine and Maas rivers, about 450 feet above the level of the sea. The celebrated Charlemagne re-discovered the hot springs in the year 777, constructed the baths, chose the town for his residence, and declared it the capital of Germany and France. It numbered upwards of 100,000 inhabitants five centuries ago. Destruction by fire, and the emigration of persecuted wealthy and skilful protestants, caused such losses, that the town never recovered from them. It now belongs to Prussia, possesses about 46,000 inhabitants, and many beautiful buildings. The appearance of the whole town is pleasing and open, the streets being wide, and the houses only moderately high. The environs of Aix-la-Chapelle are mountainous, with cultivated declivities. Charming views are afforded from the Luisberg in the north. Numerous shady walks alternate in the environs, with picturesque country seats and farms. The thermal springs are divided into upper (warm) and lower (less warm). Kaiserquelle, the chief spring, has the highest temperature,  $135\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$  F.; and the greatest proportion of solid ingredients, thirty-one and three-quarters. The gaseous contents are distinguished by a very great proportion of nitrogen, besides some sulphuretted hydrogen. The amount of sulphuretted hydrogen decreases with the diminution of heat in the respective springs. Chloride of

sodium and carbonate of soda, with sulphate of soda, are the chief ingredients, besides some carbonate of lime, magnesia, sulphuret of sodium, fluoride of calcium, phosphate of soda, silica, &c.

Aix-la-Chapelle shows itself particularly useful in chronic diseases of the skin, in suddenly repressed itch or tetter, in chronic rheumatism and gout, hydrargyrosis, metastatic paralysis, &c.

Principal Physicians: Drs. Zitterland, Velten, Wetzlar, and Stretter.

*Burtscheid* (Borectte) is situated a short distance to the south of the town, on the declivity of a steep hill. The upper (warmer) springs contain no sulphuretted hydrogen, the lower (cooler) do. In other respects their contents are analogous to those of Aix-la-Chapelle. One of the upper springs, the *Mühlenbadquelle* is the hottest in Germany, having a temperature of  $171\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$  F. The waters are often used alternately, or conjointly with those of Aix-la-Chapelle.

*Baden, near Vienna*, was formerly known under the name of "Pannonian Baths." It lies on the Schwöchat, to the south east of Vienna, at the foot of the Wienerwald, upwards of six hundred feet above the level of the sea. The cethic mountains protect the Spa from the north and west; but to the south-east, an extensive plain stretches as far as the frontier of Hungary. Frequent changes of temperature therefore occur at the place. The environs are very fertile, and abound in wine, fruits, and agricultural products. Generally, the climate is dry. The walks are most beautiful and varied. The temperature of the springs is such, (from  $98^{\circ}$  to  $81^{\circ}$  F.) that neither heating nor cooling is required. They contain twelve and a-half grains of solid, and one and a-half cubic inches of gaseous constituents in sixteen ounces. Sulphate of lime, of soda, of magnesia, and carbonate of lime, and magnesia, with some chloride of sodium and of magnesium, form the principal ingredients. Nearly three-fourths of a cubic inch of sulphuretted hydrogen is evolved with some carbonic acid and nitrogen. Besides the numerous baths of various degrees of temperature, the Spa possesses newly erected sulphurous swimming baths, offering the temperature of  $73^{\circ}$  F. by the time they are used. This combination of muscular exercise with the inhalation of medicinal ingredients, has shown itself highly beneficial in many instances of rheumatic tendency, eutaneous acrimony, and of weakly developed thoracic organs, of articular contractions, &c. The Spa itself is recommended in convalescence from weakening diseases, chronic rheumatism, in certain paralytic affections, in chronic eruptions, catarrhal irritation of the lungs or intestines, hydrargyrosis, chronic emphysema, &c.

Physicians: Drs. Habel, Rollet, Landesmann, Noe, Sevegnani.

*Neundorf*, in the principality of Lippe-Schaumburg, enjoyed formerly the greatest reputation among the sulphur-springs. Numerous walks are provided by a pleasant park. The pedestrians find temple-like enclosures, and benches interspersed for resting and viewing the scenery. The drinking spring contains twenty and three-quarter grains of solid, and five and a-half cubic inches of volatile ingredients. Sulphate of lime, of soda, and of magnesia, with carbonate of lime, and chloride of magnesium, are principally contained in them. The spring possesses upwards of a cubic inch of sulphuretted hydrogen. The Spa is highly recommended in chronic eruptions, especially in metastatic diseases, produced by neglected itch or tetter, in chronic rheumatism, in asthma psoriicum, in pulmonary catarrh, appearing during cessation of catamenia, especially if any hemorrhoidal tendency exists, &c. The mud-baths are employed in chronic rheumatism and gout, in torpid exanthemata, varicose ulcers with hardish borders, &c. Baths of sulphuretted hydrogen gas are likewise used to assist the cure in irritability of the respiratory organs. Besides these, brine-baths are frequently administered, the brine being brought to the Spa by subterranean pipes from the neighbouring Rodenberg.

Physicians: Drs. Granddier, Cordemann, Heimroth.

The neighbouring *Eilsen* offers so much analogy to Neundorf (with, however, more sulphate of lime, of magnesia and sulphuretted hydrogen) that it will be sufficient to give the names of the resident physicians, Drs. Von Möller, Weiss, and Meyer.

*Weilbach* is situated on a fertile declivity of an alluvial mountain, almost midway between Frankfort and Mentz. The mineral spring arises in a sloping field connected with the village by a footpath. The view is open towards the south, but to the east a steep hill rises, affording an extensive and charming prospect from its summit. The luxurious Mainz valley lies in a southerly direction, with its capacious plain reaching to the Melibokus.

According to the latest analysis, the spring contains about  $12\frac{1}{2}$  gr. of solid and 8 cub. inches of gaseous contents, (upwards of 2 cub. inch. consisting of sulphuretted hydrogen), carbonate of soda, lime, and magnesia, with chloride of sodium and magnesium, forming the principal ingredients. Most of the invalids resorting to the Spa suffer from pulmonary affections. Incipient tuberculosis connected with hemorrhoidal tendency is very often cured at Weilbach. Chronic poisoning by lead, hydrargyrosis, &c. also indicate the use of the water. No striking result has been obtained by the inhalation of the atmosphere surrounding the sulphur spring.

Dr. Heinrich Roth is the resident physician.

The *Chalybeate* springs contain an excess of carbonic acid, which keeps the carbonate of iron in solution, and assists in causing the metal to be more speedily absorbed and more generally diffused in the capillary system. Hence, a comparatively small proportion of iron is frequently observed to exert a more powerful action than the same amount of pharmacoutic iron.

*Pymont* is situated in the principality of Waldeck, on the left bank of the Weser. The springs arise in a fertile valley intersected by shady walks. The baths and habitations are very luxuriously and conveniently constructed. The environs are very picturesque. A short distance from Pymont curious earth-falls are perceived. In the vapour-cave, to the north-east of Pymont, a constant evolution of carbonic acid takes place.

The ferruginous drinking spring contains upwards of 20 grains of solid ingredients, and 44 cubic inches of carbonic acid in 16 ounces. Sulphate of lime, magnesia, and soda, with carbonate of lime, and of iron, form the principal ingredients. Pymont possesses also, besides the chalybeate, an acidulous, and saline springs. The waters display their effects chiefly in real debility, especially after debilitating hemorrhage; or, after severe acute diseases, in chlorosis, hysteria, tendency to abortion, sterility, &c.

Physicians of Pymont—Geheimer Hofrath Dr. Menke, Hofmedicus Dr. Lincker, Hofmedicus Dr. Giescken, Dr. Harnier.

*Driburg* lies at a short distance to the south of Pymont, in an angle formed by the "Pentoburger" forest and the river Lippe. Hills of moderate height surround the valley. The climate is rather bleak in winter. The mud-baths prepared there possess a great amount of sulphur, but no iron. A more social tone is observed there than in the fashionable Pymont. The drinking spring possesses 26 gr. of solid ingredients, and 41 cubic inches of carbonic acid in a pint. The carbonic acid is firmly attached to the water; so that even the greater amount of iron here is often more easily tolerated than the smaller proportion of Pymont. In other respects the contents and indications afford great analogy to Pymont.

Physicians: Medicinalrath Dr. Brück (from Osnabruck) Dr. Weber, Dr. Schlothian.

*Schwalbach*, in Nassau, is reached by a very picturesque road from Schlangenbad. The approach is marked by a steep declivity. The romantic valley of the Aar lies to the north-east; on the west an eminence slants downwards and divides the valley into two smaller valleys. The Weinbrunnen arises in the southern, the Stahlbrunnen in the northern. Umbrageous walks of beech and lime trees connect the two valleys. The bleakness of the climate is due to its situation on the northern declivity of the Taunus mountain, at an altitude of 900 feet above the level of the sea, whilst the neighbouring Wiesbaden owes its mild and almost southern climate to the protection of the same mountain, being located on its southern declivity. The various springs possess from 3 to 6

grains only of solid ingredients, and from 26 to 39 cub. inches of carbonic acid. Thus their amount of iron occupies a more prominent rank than in the former chalybeates, being less counterbalanced by other ingredients. Carbonate of lime, of magnesia, and of soda, with some chloride of sodium and sulphate of soda compose the ingredients, besides the iron. The Spa is recommended in all diseases produced by anæmia. Cases of paralysis are recorded as having been cured by the Spa, especially when the articular disability resulted more from atony than from any arthritic or rheumatic cause.

Physicians: Medicinalrath, Dr. Müller, Dr. Genth, &c.

*Spaa*, in Belgium, lies so near England, between Liege and Aix-la-Chapelle, that it deserves to be mentioned here. It lies at an altitude of 1000 feet above the level of the sea, in a pleasant valley of the Ardennes. Poulhon, the chief spring, arises in the town, the others in the romantic environs.

Only  $3\frac{1}{2}$  gr. of solid ingredients and 8 cub. inches of carbonic acid gas are contained in 16 ounces. Some weak and irritable digestive organs tolerate Spaa better than they would a more substantial chalybeate. The hilly walks in the environs are exceedingly advantageous to such constitutions as are affected with sluggishness of the liver.

The springs are particularly recommended in atony of the uropoietic organs, in acidity, dyspepsia, tendency to gravel, anæmia, &c. An English physician, (Dr. Cutler), practises there, besides several Belgian medical gentlemen.

The *Natropææ* contain carbonate of soda as chief ingredient. They are thus most ready to enter into combination with organic acids, and act beneficially on the urinary secretions; diminishing at the same time the acid principles of the blood, which would form a large proportion of uric acid. They thus counteract acidity and mucosity of the primæ viæ neutralizing the excess of acid, and preventing it from passing into the circulating channels. The chief rank is occupied by

*Ems*, or *Bad Ems*, situated on the right bank of the river Lahn, a few leagues to the east of Coblenz. It is enclosed by high mountains in a narrow valley. The opposite bank is considerably wider and covered with gardens and meadows. The river flows so slowly that scarcely any movement is perceptible in it. A curiously shaped group of rocks rises to the east of the Spa almost perpendicularly; to the west the Bäderberg contrasts with the opposite mountain by being cultivated to the very summit. On the other side of the river the mountain heights are intersected by valleys, and rise like colossal pyramids, covered with wood and verdure. The habitations of the Spa are built along the river. Walks and roads are laid out to supply means of exercise. But notwithstanding the many romantic spots and natural charms found along the serpentine course of the Lahn, the confined position and vicissitudes of temperature, especially in the mornings and evenings, make the Spa an undesirable residence for those who do not require its waters. The chief springs are Kesselbrunnen and Kränchen, with the respective temperature of  $117^{\circ}$  and  $91^{\circ}$  F. They contain 31 and 29 grs. of solid constituents in 16 ounces, and among these, chiefly carbonate of soda and chloride of sodium, with some carbonate of lime, of magnesia, &c. The amount of carbonic acid is inversely proportioned to the temperature of the springs. The chief reputation of Ems consists in laryngeal and pulmonary diseases. Incipient phthisis appearing as a reflex of abdominal mucosity, hepatic sluggishness, irritative dyspepsia, &c., is especially amenable to the action of Ems. The congestion of the pulmonary vessels is diminished by an improved abdominal metamorphosis.

Physicians: Obermedicinalrath Dr. Volu Franke, Obermedicinalrath Dr. Döring, Hofrath Dr. Vogler, Dr. V. Ibell, Dr. Söst (of Ehrenbreitstein) and Dr. Gatty (of London.)

The neighbouring *Schlungenbad* lies in a pleasant valley, surrounded by woody hills with many romantic spots. The temperature of the springs ranges between  $77^{\circ}$  and  $89^{\circ}$  F. About eight grains of solid constituents are contained in sixteen ounces and about two cubic inches of gas.

The baths exert a peculiarly sedative influence on the nervous and vascular systems, and they are especially reputed for the cosmetic power they exercise on the skin. The Spa shows itself useful in spasmodic tendency without structural changes, in slight cases of rheumatism or gout. The position of the Spa assists in strengthening the nervous system, and in diminishing the articular stiffness of old age. It also exercises a very favourable influence on the uterine nervous system. It is especially recommended as highly useful after a course of Ems.

Physician: Dr. Bertrand.

The *Saline* springs (Halopegæ from ἅλς, salt, and πηγή, spring) next occupy our attention. Their chief ingredient is, as their name implies, chloride of sodium, with magnesium and calcium. They chiefly stimulate the mucous membranes to greater activity. They particularly benefit persons of weakly or irritable constitutions, and strengthen the torpid nervous and muscular systems.

*Kissingen, on the Fränkische Saale*, lies in a fertile and charming valley, six hundred feet above the level of the sea, encircled by orchards and mountains. A pleasant walk of about a mile northward leads to the extensive salt and graduation works. The Ragozi, the most renowned of the springs, contains no less than eighty-five grains of solid ingredients in sixteen ounces. Besides chloride of sodium, magnesium, &c., it possesses more than half a grain of bromide of magnesium, and likewise of carbonate of iron, with twenty-six cubic inches of carbonic acid in sixteen ounces. The Pandur, Max-brunnen, Theresien-brunnen contain respectively seventy-six, thirty, and twenty-nine grains of solid ingredients in analogous proportions. A most remarkable phenomenon is shown by the so-called "Soolensprudel," or "Runde Brunnen." A regular ebb and flow of the water is observed. The water requires about an hour to rise to its ordinary height in the shaft. After about two hours it sinks rapidly with a distant rolling sound. It contains one hundred and eighty-seven grains of solid ingredients. Upwards of one hundred consist of chloride of sodium, the rest are sulphate of soda, chloride of magnesium, and some iron. The temperature also differs from the others, being 66° F. analogous to that of the sea. It is merely used for baths, with wave-like motion of the water, or simply for general and local gas-baths.

Kissingen rouses the nerves of the reproductive system, and counteracts abdominal scrophulosis, passive hepatic enlargements and congestion. The exhalations of the saltworks and the motherlye of the brine are also made use of for medicinal purposes.

Physicians: Drs. Maas, Balling, Welsch, Bexberger, Dirns, Ehrenburg, Pfrim; and for the English invalids, Drs. Granville and Travis.

*Bocklet* lies about five miles northward in a meadow valley on the left bank of the river Saale. There is a chalybeate and a sulphurous spring at the Spa. The tide of the Soolensprudel is feebly and irregularly repeated here. Bocklet enjoys a great reputation in atonic irritation of the alimentary mucous membrane, in diarrhœa based on a scrophulous affection of the mesenteric glands, in anæmic states of the uterus, both in hæmorrhage and passive metrorrhage, in sterility, &c. The springs contain sulphates of soda and magnesia, besides chlorides and carbonates of soda, magnesia, lime, and iron. Their solid ingredients range between five and forty-five grains in a pint of water; carbonic acid from twenty-one to thirty-nine cubic inches. Bocklet is also often resorted to after highly solvent springs as an after cure. The douche ascendante plays here an important part in the cure of many female diseases.

Dr. Kirchgessner is the resident physician.

*Brückenau* lies a few leagues westward of Bocklet, in a charming valley on the little river Sinn, between woody hillocks covered with oak and fir-trees. It possesses three springs. An umbrageous beech-grove borders both sides of the road between the town of Brückenau and the Spa. His majesty King Louis of

Bavaria erected a Curhaus there, which is considered one of the most splendid buildings of Europe. The walks and shady resting-places are numerous, and abound in natural charms. Brückenau is one of the purest chalybeates in existence, only two and a half grains of solid constituents being contained in a pint of water, with thirty-five cubic inches of carbonic acid. The iron is so finely divided, and so little counterbalanced by antiplastics, that a purely tonic action is produced without any secondary result. The abundance of carbonic acid assists in directly introducing the iron into the circulating fluids, and thus a more tonic action may be expected than that produced by the same amount of a pharmaceutic preparation of iron, which has first to be dissolved and prepared in the alimentary canal. The Spa is recommended in chlorosis, profuse perspiration from cutaneous weakness, tendency to abortion, &c. It is also frequently used as an after-cure after a course of Kissingen.

Physicians: Landgerichtsarzt, Dr. Schipper, and Dr. Lauk.

*Homburg vor der Höh* lies near Frankfurt on the Main, on a mountain-ridge a few miles distant from the south-eastern chain of the Taunus mountain. On the north and west the town is protected by woody hills, but no protection is afforded from the south and east. The air is bracing in June, July, and August. In spring the temperature is very changeable. The climate is therefore injurious to persons of very delicate thoracic organs. The springs originate in a meadow-valley to the north-east of the town. Elizabethquelle, the chief spring, contains 109 grains of solid ingredients, and 48 cubic inches of carbonic acid in 16 ounces. Principal ingredients are, chloride of sodium, magnesium, calcium, with carbonate of lime, of magnesia, and of iron. Without acting as a purgative, Homburg water loosens tough formed mucus, and thus prepares the alimentary contents for elimination. The alterative effects observed are ascribed to the chloride of calcium present. Homburg has been found very beneficial after weakening diseases, when the intestines are inactive, and a feeling of discomfort is perceived after alvine evacuations; also in general scrofulous diathesis without local derangement, especially in the torpid form of scrofula. The chief indication of the Spa is furnished by venous congestion of the abdominal organs, abnormal menstruation, &c.

Physicians: English, Dr. Prytherch; German, Geheimerath Dr. Trapp, Geheimerath Dr. Müller, Dr. Friedlib, Dr. Märeklin.;

*Soden* lies in a valley at the foot of the southern declivity of the Middle Taunus, and is connected with Frankfurt by the Taunus railroad. Orchards and vineyards adorn the hills to the east and west, whilst to the south arable land gradually rises. The whole appearance is that of a calm, peaceful village, with an extremely mild climate, being thoroughly protected by the surrounding hills, and still not too much narrowed, the sheltering Taunus keeping off violent north and east winds, whilst the cheering rays of the sun are allowed free entrance from the south. Vineyards cover the sunny declivities, whilst a great variety of fruits, corn, and vegetables, luxuriate in the valley. Out of the twenty-three springs originating at Soden, only four or five are in general use. Their constituents vary between 22 and 119 grains in 16 ounces. The temperature likewise differs in the respective springs, ranging between 56° and 74° F. The chief ingredients are chloride of sodium, of magnesium with carbonate of lime, of magnesia, and some iron; carbonic acid from 13 to 15 cubic inches. The water increases biliary secretion, and promotes the circulation of the portal system. It is recommended in abdominal plethora, dyspepsia, colic, and spasms of the stomach resulting from menstruation, &c. The Spa is frequently resorted to by persons with weak thoracic organs, for the mildness of its climate only.

Medicinalrath Dr. Thilcinius is the only physician there.

*Wiesbaden* lies on the southern declivity of the Taunus mountain, in a deep valley. It is a flourishing town, and the capital of the dukedom of Nassau. It is one of the oldest German Spas, and was well known to the Romans, who left many traces of their sojourn in the shape of coins and bath ruins. The environs

are exceedingly charming and picturesque. On the north, a romantic semi-circle of rising forests is perceived, in the south and west fertile plains are intersected by the serpentine courses of the Maine and Rhine rivers. The mildness of the climate cause it to be frequently chosen as a winter residence. Almonds, sweet chestnuts, and many other southern fruits, ripen there. From the beautiful Cursaal a road leads to the chateau of Sonnenberg, through a pleasant valley, and on the bank of a river. Thirty thousand visitors resort annually to this magnificent place. The springs possess a high temperature (160° to 116° F.), and a considerable amount of solid ingredients (59 grains in 16 ounces). The principal constituents are chloride of sodium, of calcium, magnesium, with carbonate of lime, sulphate of soda, and some organic matter. In small doses the water acts as a solvent and digestive remedy. In larger quantities it easily causes diarrhoea, especially with persons whose cutaneous perspiration has been suppressed. Wiesbaden is especially renowned for chronic rheumatism and gout, inveterate contractious, metastatic diseases resulting from repelled cutaneous eruptions, &c.

Physicians: Obermedicinalrath, Dr. von Franke (praetises at Ems in summer); Ober-med. Rath, Dr. Vogler; Med. Rath, Dr. Haas; Hofrath, Dr. Fritze; Med. Rath, Dr. Müller; Oberstabsarzt, Dr. Eblhardt, Dr. Sandberger; Regimentsarzt, Dr. Kirsch; Divisionssarzt, Dr. Stiff; Regimentsarzt, Dr. Mehr; Med. Rath, Dr. Reuter, Hofarzt, Dr. Weissenthal, Dr. Gergens, Dr. Menges, Dr. Huth, &c.

*Ischl* lies in a picturesque valley at the foot of the Noric Alps, in the centre of the Salzkammergut. Though its altitude be upwards of 1400 feet above the level of the sea, mountainous protection imparts a very mild climate to it. The charms of the little town invite many visitors for mere recreation, besides the numerous valetudinarians. The brine baths are the chief curative means employed, and are highly recommended in certain diseases of the lymphatic and sero-fibrous system, in swellings of the mamma, in uterine enlargements, &c.

Physicians:—Dr. Brenner, Knight of Felsach, Dr. Pollack, &c.

*Baden Baden*, in the Grand Duchy of Baden, lies on the river Oos, in one of the most charming valleys of the Black Forest. Part of the town is built at the foot of a hill; the other portion is situated on the hill itself, and overlooked by the chateau at its summit, which offers most delightful and distant prospects. The air is mild and pure, and allows the visitor to enjoy the enchanting spots which are so profusely spread over Baden and its environs. It is one of the most brilliant and fashionable Spas, as often visited for pleasure and amusement as for sanitary purposes. It is generally called the queen of the German spas. Numerous springs arise at the place. The principal one possesses a temperature of 161° F. It contains about twenty-two grains in sixteen ounces, chiefly chloride of sodium and potassium, with some sulphate of lime, &c.

The Spa is useful in instances of slight rheumatic and arthritic affections, in torpid mucosity of the intestinal canal, in atony of the nervous system, &c. This magnificent and pleasant Spa affords the best proof of the really powerful effects exercised by the different Spas, and of the little part played by imagination, in the cures observed and recorded. For nowhere the valetudinarian would feel more inclined to imbibe his draughts and immerse in the baths than here. Nowhere would he meet so willingly the helping efforts of the springs; nowhere would he allow so readily the record of any improvement; and nevertheless, though the temperature of the springs is high—though the constituents are not the least abundant—though physicians and patients would be too willing to believe in cures, it is generally admitted that Baden-Baden is one of the least efficacious Spas of Germany, owing its reputation more to its beautiful position, to its charming environs, and to its mild and cheerful climate, than to its medicinal efficacy.

The luxuriant villages, the sunny plains and hills, the dark shady walks, may refresh the citizen and restore a weakened constitution, but for serious ailments less favoured Spas have to be recommended.

The efforts of art are not wanting to heighten the natural medicinal efficacy.



Vapour baths, Russian baths, and various other contrivances, assist the treatment of disease. But then the cure must often be more attributed to these means than to the innate power of the Spa.

Physicians : Geheimer Hofrath, Dr. Gluggert, Dr. Brumm, Dr. Gaus, Dr. Rodrian, Dr. Rueff, Geheimer Rath Dr. Kramer, Medicinalrath Dr. Wenneis, Dr. Müller, Dr. Schrauder, Dr. Wilhelm.

*Iodine and Bromine Springs*—*Adelheidsquelle* of Heilbrunn is situated between the village of Tölz and the former convent of Benedictbeuern, at an altitude of upwards of two thousand feet above the level of the sea, not far from the left bank of the Isar. A beautiful valley is perceived in the north, with gently rising hills. To the north-east an immense plain reaches as far as Munich. To the south, alpine promontories offer extremely picturesque and romantic views. The spring lies between two hills, and is said to be the oldest in Bavaria. The scantiness of supply and want of accommodation cause the water to be more used at the distance for drinking than in the Spa itself for bathing. It contains forty-seven grains of solid ingredients in sixteen ounces, and four cubic inches of carburetted hydrogen in one hundred.

Chloride of sodium with carbonate of soda, of potash, lime and magnesia, form the principal ingredients, besides a considerable amount of iodide and bromide of sodium. The *Adelheidsquelle* promotes the functions of the mucous membranes of the lymphatic, glandular, utero-genital and uterine systems. The carburetted hydrogen is supposed to diminish the morbidly increased sensibility of these organs. The antiscrofulous effect is due to its iodine and bromine. The Spa is also highly recommended in gravel and lithiasis.

Dr. Schweiger of Benedictbeuern is the physician of the Spa.

*Kreuznach on the Nahe* is a town of about eight thousand inhabitants, situated in the grand duchy of Hesse. It is divided into two unequal parts by the river. That on the left bank is enclosed by hills, while the country of the right bank is of a more level character. Well cultivated vineyards and rich corn-fields show the fertile condition of the soil. The Nahe bridge, connecting the two parts, conducts by seven arches over the river and its islets. The chief spring rises on the southern extremity of the Nahe islet. It contains ninety-four grains of solid ingredients in sixteen ounces, chiefly chloride of sodium, of alum, magnesium, potassium, with some carbonate of lime, besides bromide and iodide of magnesium.

Scrofula is the principal indication of Kreuznach. The glandular and lymphatic systems are powerfully acted upon by the Spa. The mother-lye of the brine, and the vapours evolved during boiling, are also used for medicinal purposes. Kreuznach is also frequently employed with advantage at a distance.

Physicians : Geheimer Sanitätsrath Dr. Prieger, Sanitätsrath Dr. Engelmann, Drs. Hahn, Jung, Lossen, Wiesbaden, Oscar Prieger, Schweich, Theveny Trautwein.

*Oeynhansen* near Rehme, is contiguous to the salt-works, to which it owes its origin. It is the youngest of the German Spas. A hole was bored to increase the supply of salt, when unexpectedly a warm saline spring flowed out in abundance, and gave rise to the Spa. The valley in which it lies extends beyond the Werre, and joins the valley of the Weser. The surrounding mountains protect the place from violent extremes of temperature. The Porta Westphalica is seen at a short distance. A charming panorama of the environs is afforded by the tower built on the Margaret mountain, which is covered by groves of beech-trees. The depth of the bore-hole extends to upwards of 2000 feet. The salt water was first perceived at a depth of 574 feet, possessing one-fifth-eighths per cent. of salt, and supplying two-thirds cubic feet of water per minute. But in proportion as the boring was extended, the temperature, proportion of salt, and quantity of water gradually increased. Now the temperature has reached as far as 92° F., and the proportion of salt four and a half per cent. The spring contains upwards of 300 grains of solid constituents in sixteen ounces, chiefly consisting of chloride of sodium and magnesium, with sulphate

and carbonate of lime and magnesia, besides some iron and bromine. A considerable amount of free carbonic acid impregnates the water. By means of a perpendicular shaft, the baths are filled from below. A wave-like motion can be communicated to the water by the filling pipes at the sides of the baignoires. The carbonic acid can be evolved near the bottom, or at the surface of the baths, with different physical effects. These moving and foaming waves impart exceedingly pleasurable sensations to the bather. The natural vapour-chamber is another highly important feature of this Spa, and serves quite distinct purposes, being employed with great advantage in catarrhal affections of the air passages, emphysema of the lungs, incipient phthisis, &c. The baths greatly increase the tone and mobility of the muscular organs, diminish morbid perspirations, and great sensibility of the skin, and strengthen indirectly the central nervous system. They are especially recommended to persons of phthisical tendency, with beginning signs of tuberculosis; and particularly where the growth has been too rapid, and the muscular system imperfectly developed. The Spa is also resorted to for rheumatic and arthritic complaints, scrofula, &c.

Physicians: Dr. Von Möller, Dr. Sehofer, from Vlotho, &c.

*Nauheim*, near Friedberg, also owes its origin to boring trials made for the purpose of increasing the supply of salt. It lies at the south-eastern declivity of the Johannisberg, upwards of 600 feet above the level of the sea. The most remarkable phenomenon of the Spa is found in the *Soolensprudel*, or Artesian well, No. V, which was bored about fourteen years ago, near the shore of the little river Usa. A stream of white foam and water constantly bubbles up to the height of two or three feet above the surface, with an abundance of warm carbonic acid. Its temperature is 88° F. Another spring is used for drinking. From 75 to 233 grains of solid ingredients are contained in sixteen ounces, with a great quantity of free carbonic acid, which is also used separately for local and general gas baths. The composition offers great analogy to Oeynhansen. The Spa is highly recommended in diseases of the lymphatic and glandular system, in chronic swelling and induration of the generative organs, in arthritic and rheumatic affections, &c.

[In concluding this brief notice, I must apologise for its incompleteness. The small space allotted to the subject, and the short time allowed for its composition, did not admit of giving either exact descriptions of the Spas and their environs, or detailed indications of the roads leading to them, or *evidence* of their peculiar and general effects, or directions facilitating the *choice* between Spas of analogous properties. Those desirous of being informed upon these points, I beg leave to refer to my Lectures on "The German Mineral Waters, and their Rational Employment for the Cure of certain Chronic Diseases,"\* which will enable them both to select the appropriate Spas for their patients, and to point out the most advantageous mode of reaching them. Here, however, a very short sketch merely was demanded, and I trust, therefore, that the subject may not be unfavourably judged from the incompleteness and hastiness by which the above is characterized.]

## WHERE DEGREES IN MEDICINE AND LICENSES TO PRACTICE CAN BE OBTAINED.

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### UNIVERSITY OF DUBLIN (TRINITY COLLEGE).

The days of graduation are, Shrove Tuesday, and the first Tuesday in July. The degree of bachelor of medicine may be obtained in two modes:

1. Graduates in arts can obtain the degree at any of the half-yearly periods of graduation, provided the requisite medical education and examination shall have been accomplished. Fee for entrance, 16*l.*; fees for study in arts during four years, 7*l.* 10*s.* each half year; fees for graduation in arts, 8*l.* 17*s.* 6*d.*

The days of graduation are, Shrove Tuesday, and the first Tuesday in July. Candidates *who have graduated in arts* may obtain the degree of Bachelor of Medicine, at any of the ensuing half-yearly periods of graduation, provided the requisite medical education and examinations shall have been accomplished. The graduation fees for the degree of bachelor of medicine are 11*l.* 17*s.* 6*d.* The standing of the first undergraduate year may be obtained by attending the October examination of that year, if the student has entered not later than the first Monday of the July of the same year, and has completed the payments due since the ordinary period of entrance in the preceding November. The medical education of a bachelor of medicine comprises attendance on the following courses of lectures in the school of physic established by Act of Parliament, provided that *one*, and not more than *three*, of the courses which begin in November, be attended during each of four sessions. Three of these courses, at the discretion of the candidate, may be attended at the University of Edinburgh. The courses are on—*anatomy, surgery, chemistry, botany, materia medica and pharmacy, institutes of medicine, practice of medicine, midwifery, medical jurisprudence, practical anatomy and practical chemistry, clinical lectures at Sir Patrick Dun's Hospital during at least one session (six months), as delivered by the professors in the school of physic; the attendance on such clinical lectures by the professors to be extended to three additional months of a summer session, commencing in May.* The fees for attendance on the clinical lectures are 3*l.* 3*s.* to the professors for each three months' attendance, and (provided the student be of two years' standing in the university) 3*l.* 3*s.* to the treasurer of the hospital for the first year, with a proportionate sum for any longer period. The fee for each of the other courses is 3*l.* 3*s.* The examinations are conducted by the several professors. No further examination is requisite for the degree of

doctor of medicine, which may be taken at the expiration of three years from having taken the degree of M.B. The fees for the degree of doctor of medicine are 22*l*. The degrees are publicly conferred by the vice-chancellor, in the senate or congregation of the university.

QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY IN IRELAND.

Candidates for the degree of M.D. in the Queen's University in Ireland, shall have passed the matriculation examination prescribed for students in the faculty of medicine in the Queen's Colleges, and shall have pursued, four years, the following courses of study, the order of which, although strongly recommended, is, however, not absolutely prescribed:—

*In the first year.*—One modern language, anatomy and physiology, chemistry,—six months. General Physics, botany,—three months.

*In the second year.*—Anatomy and physiology, practical anatomy, materia medica,—six months. Practical chemistry, comparative anatomy,—three months.

*In the third year.*—Practice of surgery, midwifery, clinical surgery,—six months.

*In the fourth year.*—Practice of medicine, medical jurisprudence, clinical medicine,—six months.

Candidates for the degree of M.D. will be required further to give evidence of their having attended a general hospital recognised by the Senate, during twenty-four months, or such general hospital during eighteen months, and the out-practice of an hospital or dispensary for six months, and also a course of practical pharmacy during three months. Candidates shall have attended at least one-third of the above courses in the medical faculty of some one or other of the Queen's Colleges in Ireland, and for the remainder, authenticated certificates shall be received from the professors or lecturers in colleges or medical schools recognised by the Senate of the Queen's University in Ireland. Students in Arts of the Queen's Colleges shall be admitted to examination for the degree of M.D. after having obtained the degree of A.B., provided they shall have completed the curriculum prescribed above for the second, third, and fourth years of medical study. Every candidate, before being admitted to the degree of M.D., shall undergo an examination in all the subjects comprehended in the above course of education, and shall afford satisfactory evidence that he is twenty-one years of age.

OF THE QUALIFICATIONS, EXAMINATION, AND ADMISSION OF CANDIDATES  
FOR THE LICENSE OF THE COLLEGE.

No member or licentiate of any Company of Apothecaries shall be admissible to the license of the college; and should any such, after due examination, be approved of, he shall not be admitted as a licentiate until he shall have surrendered his license as an apothecary, and produced satisfactory evidence of his name having been removed from the list of the company.

No person engaged in any kind of trade shall be admitted to examination for the license.

Every candidate for the license of the college, except those who have entered as students in arts, shall be required to produce a certificate of matriculation in the University of Dublin, conformably to the statute, 40 Geo. III., c. 84, s. 34.

Candidates must produce evidence of having been engaged in the study of medicine for four years at least, and of having attended not less than two of the required courses in each year.

Candidates must produce evidence of having completed the following course of education—viz.: of having attended one or more courses of lectures on anatomy and physiology, chemistry, institutes of medicine, materia medica and pharmacy, midwifery and diseases of women and children, practice of medicine, and on surgery—each course to be of six months duration; on botany and on medical jurisprudence for at least three months each; of having performed a course of dissections, and attended the accompanying demonstrations during six months, and of having attended a course of practical chemistry for at least three months.

All the lectures are required to have been delivered by the respective professors of the School of Physic in Ireland, or by other lecturers recognised by the college.

Candidates must produce certificates of attendance for two years and six months on the practice of a recognised hospital, and the clinical lectures delivered therein during that period; also for six months on the practice of a lying-in hospital recognised by the college.

Candidates who, on having performed the full acts, have graduated in medicine in one of the universities of Great Britain or Ireland, or who have been admitted as licentiates of either of the Royal Colleges of Physicians of London or Edinburgh, shall be admissible to examination on such qualification.

Candidates who have been licentiates of a College of Surgeons in the United Kingdom for four years, or upwards, or who, in addition to their diploma as such, shall produce certificates of attendance on a course of lectures on botany and the institutes of medicine, and on the practice of a recognised lying-in hospital for six months, shall be admissible to examination on such qualifications.

The examination of candidates for the license of the college to practise medicine, shall be conducted on two separate days:—the subjects of examination for the first day shall be anatomy and physiology, botany, chemistry, and materia medica; for the second day, acute diseases, chronic diseases, the institutes of medicine, and midwifery.

Candidates who are graduates in medicine in one of the universities in Great Britain or Ireland, licentiates of either of the Royal Colleges of Physicians, London or Edinburgh, or members of a Royal College of Surgeons in the United Kingdom, being graduates in arts of the Universities of Dublin, Oxford, or Cambridge, shall be required to undergo the second day's examination alone, botany and materia medica, in the case of members of a College of Surgeons, being added thereto.

The examinations shall be conducted in the English language; but every candidate, except graduates in arts of Dublin, Oxford, or Cambridge, may be required, at the option of the president, to translate from a Latin or Greek

medical author, before he is admitted to examination as to his professional requirements.

Fee for the license, 30*l.*, in addition to the stamp duty.

Every candidate shall, previously to examination, sign the following declaration:—

I, *A. B.*, hereby authorize the President and Fellows of the King and Queen's College of Physicians in Ireland, to erase my name from the list of licentiates, and I consent to surrender my license, and to have my privileges as a licentiate withdrawn, if I shall, after having obtained the license from said college, either continue to be or become a licentiate of any Company of Apothecaries, or if I shall at any time hold or have any interest in an apothecary's shop, or engage in any trade in any part of the United Kingdom.

When the college shall not be satisfied with the answering of any candidate, it shall be in their power, if they think fit, to repeat the examination of either day, at an interval of not less than two months; and should he ultimately be rejected, the fees to the college, and the amount of stamp duty lodged with the treasurer, shall both be returned.

Every person who shall be admitted as a licentiate of this college, shall, upon such admission, and before he receives his license, subscribe and promise the due fulfilment of the following declaration:—

I, *A. B.*, do hereby solemnly and sincerely promise that I will observe the statutes and bye-laws of this college, and to my power endeavour that the honour of the college be preserved entire; and in all things that belong to the honour or profit thereof, I shall be ready to give my advice and assistance.

I engage not to practise any system or method (so called), for the cure or alleviation of disease, of which the college has disapproved; nor to endeavour to obtain practise, or to attract public notice by advertising, or by any other unworthy means: I also engage that I will neither permit nor sanction the use of my name by any other party for such purposes, nor in connexion with any secret or other remedy; and in case of any doubt relative to the true meaning or application of this engagement, I promise to submit to the judgment of the college.

I promise that in all things lawful and honest, I will be obedient to the president, vice-president, and censors of the college.

And I solemnly and sincerely declare, that should I violate any of the conditions enumerated in this declaration, so long as I shall be either a licentiate or fellow of the college, I thereby render myself liable, and shall submit to any reasonable punishment, whether censure of the college, pecuniary fine (not exceeding twenty pounds), or expulsion and surrendering of the license, whichever the president and fellows of the college, or the majority of them, shall think proper to inflict.

The following shall be the form of the license to be granted to every person examined and admitted to practise medicine by the college:—

*Omniſibus ad quos preſentes Litera pervenerint, et quorum intereſt, ſit notum, Nos Preſidem et Socios Collegii Medicorum Regis et Reginae in Hibernia, — poſtquam ſemel iterumque examinatione ſolemni, coram nobis pro more inſtituta, ſe doctorem et in arte medica adprime verſatum probaſſet, licentiam prædictæ artis exercendæ quamdiu ſe bene geſſerit, legibusque hujus Collegii obtemperaverit, plene quantum in nobis eſt permiſiſſe; et auctoritate Regiarum Chartarum, nobis in iſtum finem conſeſſarum confirmaviſſe; et hoc, Sigillo Collegii ſuffixo, et nominibus ſubſcriptis, teſtatum volumus. Datae Dublini,*

Every member of this college who shall desire to obtain the license to practise midwifery, shall produce a certificate of attendance for six months on the practice of a recognised lying-in hospital, when the college shall proceed to examine him as to his knowledge of midwifery, and if approved of, they shall grant him a special license as a practitioner in midwifery, and shall cause him to be designated as such in the authorized lists of the college.

All licentiates of this college shall have permission to attend the meetings during the examinations for licence.

OF THE PROFESSIONAL CONDUCT OF MEMBERS OF THE COLLEGE.

At all meetings of physicians of the college, where the president is present, precedence and all marks of honour shall be paid to him.

To preserve a good understanding among the members of the college, every member shall consult with every other member who is not under the censure of the college; and whosoever shall at any time refuse so to do, shall be liable to the censure of the college.

Any member of this college who is guilty of unprofessional conduct, either by advertising, or other practices unbecoming the honourable profession of physic, shall be placed under the censure of the college.

No member of this college shall consult with, or otherwise sanction any other member who is under censure; nor consult with, or sanction professionally any person who by advertisement, or other unworthy means, endeavours to obtain practice, or to attract public notice.

No member of the college shall consult with any person who, for the cure or alleviation of disease, uses any secret remedy, or adopts and practises any system or method of which the college has disapproved.

The Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland grants two different diplomas—one conferring the rank of Fellow, and the other that of Licentiate. The Fellow is a member of the corporation, and entitled to vote at all elections for president, vice-president, and councillors, and also to be elected president, vice-president, or member of council. The Letters Testimonial granted to the Licentiate enables him "to exercise and enjoy all rights of practice in the art or science of surgery, or otherwise, which are commonly enjoyed by the Fellows, and to have free access to the library and museum of the College, and makes him eligible to the rank of Fellow, subject to specified regulations." Both Fellows and Licentiates are obliged to make and subscribe a formal declaration legally binding.



them "to observe and be obedient to the statutes, bye-laws, and ordinances of the College, and to the utmost of their power to promote its honour, reputation, and dignity." Fellows, in addition, declare that they "do not practise the business or profession of an apothecary or druggist, or indirectly sell drugs or medicines, and that they will not, while Fellows, practise such business or profession." The charter also provides, "that if it shall at any time hereafter appear that any Licentiate or Fellow shall have obtained his diploma by any *fraud, false statement, or imposition*, or that *either before or after* obtaining such diploma, he has wilfully violated any bye-law, rule, or regulation of the College, the Council may censure him, or if expedient, recall and make void his diploma, and expel him.

A student who proposes to become a Fellow or Licentiate of the College must first become a registered pupil, for which he pays a fee of five guineas; but he is permitted to postpone such entry as registered pupil and such payment until the period of his final examination.

The fees for the diplomas are as follows:—For Fellowship, twenty-five guineas, in addition to the registration fee of five guineas; thirty guineas in all. But if the candidate has already passed as a Licentiate, and paid the registration fee of five guineas, and twenty guineas, the fee for Letters Testimonial—twenty-five in all; he is required to pay a Fellowship fee of ten guineas only, should he propose to become a Fellow. If a person becomes a Fellow at once, he pays thirty guineas; but if he commences as Licentiate, and afterwards passes as Fellow, he pays thirty-five guineas in all—viz., five guineas registration fee, twenty guineas for Letters Testimonial, and ten guineas for Fellowship. For the license or Letters Testimonial alone, the candidate pays five guineas registration fee, and twenty guineas for the final examination—twenty-five in all. The student who becomes a registered pupil as soon as he commences his studies in Dublin, is thereby matriculated in the College, and entitled to its protection, aid, and guidance. Fellows of the College who settle to practise in Dublin, are required to pay ten guineas in addition to their other fees.

*Fellowship.*—The candidate for the Fellowship must be twenty-five years of age, and if not a graduate in arts of some university, must be prepared to answer a classical examination, which is generally confined to the principal books read for entrance into Dublin University. He must have been six years engaged in professional study, three of which must have been in Dublin; and he must also have been a house surgeon or dresser in an hospital. He is required to attend lectures on anatomy and physiology, and on surgery with dissections during three seasons, chemistry during two, and practice of medicine, materia medica, midwifery, medical jurisprudence, comparative anatomy, natural philosophy, and botany, for one course each. His hospital attendance must be three years at least. Bachelors of Arts, after five years' study, are admitted to examination on compliance with the above regulations; and Licentiates of the College of ten years' standing are also admitted, although they may not have been educated in strict conformity with them.

*Letters Testimonial.*—The candidate for Letters Testimonial is required, as has been already stated, to become a registered pupil, and to pass a classical examination. He is also required to prove that he has studied for *three* years in the metropolitan schools (nine months in each year), and for a fourth year either there or anywhere else, where he might have obtained professional information. His hospital attendance is by the bye-law declared to be *three years* "where clinical instruction is given," and all the Dublin hospitals are recognised. Credit is given for attendance on provincial hospitals, but it is expected that while the pupil is in attendance on lectures in Dublin, he shall, at the same time, attend an hospital there. Candidates for Letters Testimonial are also required to prove that they have attended three courses of lectures on anatomy and physiology, surgery, and practical anatomy (being demonstrations with dissections), two courses on chemistry, and one course on the practice of medicine, materia medica, midwifery, and medical jurisprudence.

Candidates both for the Fellowship and Letters Testimonial are examined on the *practice of medicine and pharmacy* as well as on surgery. The diploma is a full

qualification as General Practitioner, entitling the holder of it to be appointed to county infirmaries, fever hospitals, dispensaries, poorhouses, and all other medical charities. They can also practise medicine as fully and freely as Doctors of Medicine, or Fellows or Licentiates of Colleges of Physicians; and *Licentiates* of the College can dispense medicines to their own patients; but they cannot keep open shops, or retail drugs, or compound the prescriptions of other practitioners without the licence of the Apothecaries' Company. Both Fellows and Licentiates are authorized by law, and permitted by the charter, to compound and dispense medicines for their patients in the hospitals, dispensaries, and poorhouses to which they are attached. None but Fellows and Licentiates of this College are eligible to be appointed Surgeons of County Infirmaries in Ireland.

The College of Surgeons of Ireland is empowered by charter to grant a diploma in midwifery to its own Fellows and Licentiates only; and does not recognise any of them as *midwifery practitioners*, or mark them as such in the printed lists of the College, unless they have had that diploma granted to them.

Certificates granted by professors in universities which do not receive the certificates granted by the professors in the College of Surgeons, are not recognised as qualification from candidates for either of the diplomas.

Certificates of attendance on *lectures* delivered in Ireland are not received as qualification for either of the diplomas of the College, unless the professors or lecturers who have granted them have been duly recognised as *professors or lecturers* in consequence of proof given that they "have acquired, either by education or practice, such ample information on professional subjects generally as is required from candidates for the fellowship," and that they "have enjoyed such opportunities of acquiring information on the particular subjects upon which they propose to lecture as the Council may consider necessary to qualify them to perform that duty."

Returns of the names of those who have entered to attend lectures are required to be forwarded to the College by professors and lecturers on the 25th of November, and at such other periods during the session as the Council may think fit; which returns must certify that the students named therein are then attending regularly; and no certificate is received from any candidate for either of the diplomas unless his name appears in the returns corresponding to the date of such certificate. Professors or lecturers neglecting or refusing to make such returns, or who grant certificates to any student whose name has not been inserted in such returns, are not recognised.

Students are admitted to the classical examination required by the bye-laws without being required to become registered pupils, or to pay the registration fee of five guineas; it being considered desirable that pupils on their first arrival in Dublin, and as soon as they can conveniently do so after leaving school, should pass this preliminary trial, and not postpone it until the period of their final examination for Letters Testimonial. They have only to present themselves at the College, and to pay a fee of five shillings to enable them to offer themselves; and if approved, the certificate required by the bye-laws to be produced by candidates for Letters Testimonial is granted to them. On payment of five guineas at any subsequent period, they are enrolled as registered pupils, and become entitled to study in the museum and library, and to attend the lectures on comparative anatomy. They are examined in the Gospel of St. John in the Greek Testament, and in the first five books of the *Æneid* of Virgil.

The following ordinance of Council was made April 9th, 1851:—

"To enable surgical students to devote more time to hospital attendance and dissection during the winter session, the lectures on *materia medica*, medical jurisprudence, practical chemistry, and botany, shall be delivered during the summer session, in the School of the College, and in the schools recognised by the College. To secure due attendance on hospital practice by the student for the full term required by the bye-laws, certificates of such attendance during the summer session shall be granted separately from those granted for the winter session. Certificates granted subsequent to the 30th of April, 1851, shall not be received as qualification for Letters Testimonial unless issued in conformity with these regulations."

This being a very important alteration, requires some explanation to make the student aware of its object and operation. Hitherto summer courses of lectures on a few subjects have been delivered to accommodate students required to remain in Dublin during the months of May, June, and July, to complete the hospital attendance of three years. These courses having, however, been found insufficient to secure the necessary means of instruction during this period, and the attendance of students on hospital practice at the same time having become irregular and imperfect, a more complete and efficient arrangement was called for, and has been adopted both in Dublin and London. Surgical education is, in fact, to be regularly conducted in future from the beginning of April to the end of July, so as to enable the student to divide the required attendances more equally over his four years of study; and certificates of attendance on summer courses delivered in winter, or on winter courses delivered in summer, are not recognised. The lectures on *materia medica* and medical jurisprudence, heretofore delivered in winter, are henceforward, therefore, to be delivered in summer; and no certificate of attendance on winter courses on these subjects will be received. Lecturers on these subjects who disobey the above ordinance, and deliver their lectures in winter to accommodate persons obliged to rest satisfied with an irregular and imperfect surgical education, do so under a mistaken notion that their certificates may pass in London; but as the London College directs that candidates for their diploma, who shall have studied in Ireland, must produce certificates of lectures as "delivered in Ireland;" and as the lectures in question are delivered in the College of Surgeons in summer, in obedience to the College ordinance, this view is evidently erroneous.

On the 4th of December, 1850, the Council of the College adopted the following resolution with reference to the bye-law which enjoins that "certificates shall not be received from teachers or professors in colleges or other institutions which refuse to receive the certificates of professors in the College of Surgeons":—

"The Council being anxious to encourage liberal education among candidates for Fellowships and Letters Testimonial, in future all *graduates in arts* of the University of Dublin, being registered pupils of the College of Surgeons, shall be admitted to the examinations for Fellowship and Letters Testimonial, provided they produce the certificates of surgical education required by the bye-laws, and of such course of education the several certificates of the School of Physic, *now* required by the 'regulations of the University to be produced by candidates for the degree of Bachelor of Medicine, shall be received as part.'"

The Board of Trinity College not having reciprocated to this resolution in accordance with the terms of the bye-law, notwithstanding its adoption at their suggestion, Bachelors of Arts, being Licentiates of the College of Surgeons, may be disabled from availing themselves of the advantages it offers.

The following are the educational bye-laws in detail:—

#### 1. REGISTRATION OF PUPILS.

Every person requiring to be registered as a pupil on the College books, shall, if the Council think fit, be so registered, if he shall have laid before the Council a receipt, showing that he has lodged, to the credit of the College, in the Bank of Ireland, a registry fee of *five guineas*. Registered pupils are admitted to the classical examination at the time of registry, or at any time previous to the final examination for Letters Testimonial. Students, not being registered pupils, are admitted to the same examination on payment of five shillings.

#### 2. QUALIFICATIONS OF CANDIDATES FOR LETTERS TESTIMONIAL.

Every registered pupil shall be admitted to an examination for Letters Testimonial, if he shall have laid before the Council the following documents:—*a.* A receipt showing that he has lodged a sum of *twenty guineas* in the Bank of Ireland, to the credit of the President, and for the use of the College. *b.* A certificate from the examiners of the College that he has passed an examination as to his acquaintance with the Greek and Latin languages. *c.* Certificates showing

that he has been engaged in the study of his profession for not less than *four years*; *three* of which shall have been passed in attendance on lectures or hospitals in Dublin, London, Edinburgh or Glasgow. *d.* Certificates of attendance on an hospital recognised by the Council, where clinical instruction is given, during three years. [An attendance of nine months in each year is accepted.] *e.* Certificates of attendance on *three* courses of lectures on anatomy and physiology, *three* courses of lectures on the theory and practice of surgery, and of the performance of *three* courses of dissections, accompanied by demonstrations; also certificates of attendance on *two* courses of lectures on chemistry; or one course of lectures on general, and one on practical chemistry; *one* course of lectures on materia medica; *one* course of lectures on the practice of medicine; *one* course of lectures on midwifery; and *one* course of lectures on medical jurisprudence.

### 3. EXAMINATION OF CANDIDATES FOR LETTERS TESTIMONIAL.

The examinations of candidates for Letters Testimonial shall be held from time to time, as the Council may direct. Five examiners at least shall be present at each examination. Each candidate shall be examined upon anatomy, physiology, the theory and practice of medicine and surgery, materia medica, and the form of prescription; and shall perform such surgical operations or dissections, or explain such anatomical and pathological preparations as the examiners may require. Candidates whose answering shall be found insufficient will not be allowed to present themselves a second time until after the expiration of six months from their first examination.

### 4. QUALIFICATIONS OF CANDIDATES FOR THE FELLOWSHIP.

Every registered pupil or Licentiate shall be admitted to examination for the Fellowship if he shall have laid before the Council the following documents:—*a.* A receipt showing that he has lodged in the Bank of Ireland, for the use of the College, the sum of *ten guineas*, in case he is a Licentiate, or of *twenty-five guineas*, in case he is a registered pupil; provided, in either case, he intends to reside beyond ten miles from Dublin. [Should the candidate intend to reside in Dublin, or within ten miles thereof, he shall lodge, if he is a Licentiate, twenty guineas; or if he is a registered pupil, thirty-five guineas. Fellows entering on the country list, who may subsequently settle as practitioners in Dublin, or within ten miles thereof, shall pay ten guineas to the College.] *b.* A certificate that he is twenty-five years of age. *c.* A certificate that he is a Bachelor of Arts of some university, or that he has been examined in such manner as the Council may, from time to time, direct, with a view to ascertain that he has obtained a liberal preliminary education. *d.* A certificate signed by two or more Fellows of the College, of good general conduct during his professional education. *e.* Certificates that he has been engaged in the acquisition of professional knowledge for a period of not less than *six years*; during three of which he must have studied in one or more of the schools and hospitals of Dublin recognised by the Council. He may have studied for the other three years in any school or schools of the united kingdom, which shall be approved by the Council, or in any foreign school of repute. It is also required that the candidate shall have had opportunities of practical instruction, as house-surgeon or dresser, in a recognised hospital. *f.* Certificates of attendance on the several courses of lectures required to be attended by candidates for Letters Testimonial, together with one course of lectures on comparative anatomy, one course of lectures on botany, and one on natural philosophy. *g.* A thesis on some medical subject; or clinical reports, with observations of six or more medical or surgical cases taken by himself. *h.* Candidates of the required age, who shall have taken the degree of Bachelor of Arts in a British or Irish university, and have complied with the foregoing regulations in other respects, will be admitted to examination at the end of five years of professional study; of which three years must have been passed in one or more of the recognised schools or hospitals of Dublin. *i.* Licentiates of the College, who may not be able to show that they have followed the course of study

specified in the preceding regulations, may, at the expiration of ten years from the date of their diploma, be admitted to the examination required for the Fellowship, provided they produce such evidence as shall be satisfactory to the Council that they have conducted themselves honourably in the practice of their profession.

#### 5. QUALIFICATIONS OF CANDIDATES FOR THE DIPLOMA IN MIDWIFERY.

Any Fellow or Licentiate of the College shall be admitted to an examination for the diploma in midwifery, upon laying before the Council the following documents:—*a.* A certificate showing that he has attended one course of lectures on midwifery and diseases of women and children, delivered by a professor or lecturer in some school of medicine or surgery recognised by the Council. *b.* A certificate showing that he has attended the practice of a lying-in hospital, recognised by the Council, for a period of six months; or the practice of a dispensary for lying-in women and children, recognised by the Council, and devoted to this branch of surgery alone. *c.* A certificate showing that he has conducted thirty labour cases at least. Candidates for the midwifery diploma shall be publicly examined on the organization of the female; the growth and peculiarities of the fœtus; the practice of midwifery; and the diseases of women and children; and if approved of, shall receive a licence or diploma certifying the same.

#### 6. REGULATION OF SCHOOLS.

Certificates shall not be received for attendance on lectures delivered in Ireland, unless from teachers in schools permitting the visitation of the Council, and receiving their sanction. Neither shall certificates be received from teachers or professors in colleges, or other institutions for medical or surgical education, in Great Britain or Ireland, which colleges or institutions refuse to receive, as qualifications for a degree or license, the certificates issued by professors in the College of Surgeons; nor shall certificates be received from teachers who deliver lectures upon more than one distinct subject, as hitherto allotted to professors in colleges and universities. This regulation shall not, however, exclude the certificates of two or more teachers, who may deliver conjointly, separate, perfect, and distinct courses on anatomy and physiology, and on the theory and practice of surgery.

Certificates shall not be received for attendance on lectures on anatomy and physiology, unless such lectures shall have been delivered upon at least five days of each week of the usual *winter* season, between October and May, nor on the theory and practice of surgery, unless delivered within the *same* period, on at least three days in each week.

The courses of lectures on the practice of medicine, chemistry, materia medica, midwifery, and medical jurisprudence, shall consist of sixty lectures at least,\* and the courses of dissections and demonstrations shall be of six months' duration.

Certificates shall not hereafter be received for attendance on lectures delivered in Ireland, unless from persons who shall have acquired, either by education or practice, such ample information, on professional subjects generally, as is required from candidates for the Fellowship of the College, and who shall have enjoyed such opportunities of acquiring information on the particular subjects upon which they propose to lecture, as the Council may consider necessary to qualify them to perform that duty.

*Returns of Students attending Lectures.*—Professors and lecturers are required to transmit to the College on or before the 25th day of November in each year, returns of the names of the pupils who shall have entered to attend, and are then actually attending their respective lectures or demonstrations. They are also required to ascertain, from time to time, whether the students so returned are in attendance or not, as similar returns are required in the course of the session.

\* The summer courses on these subjects are recognised.

## APOTHECARIES' HALL OF IRELAND.

(1791.)

**LAWS REGARDING THE EDUCATION OF APOTHECARIES.**—Every candidate must undergo two separate examinations—one for the certificate of apprentice, the other for the license to practise,

Every candidate for the certificate of apprentice will be examined in the following books:—in Latin: the *Catiline War* of Sallust, and the first three books of the *Æneid* of Virgil: in Greek: the Gospel of St. John, and the first twenty Dialogues of Lucian, or the first two books of Homer's *Iliad*: in French: *Telemaehus*, or the *History of Charles XII.*: in Science: the first two books of *Euclid*, and algebra, to the end of simple equations.

Every candidate for the license to practise as an apothecary must lay before the Court the following documents:—1. The certificate of apprentice. 2. The indenture of apprenticeship, enrolled according to the Act of Parliament, and bearing the certificate of the licentiate apothecary to whom he has been indentured, of a good moral character, and of having fulfilled the period of his apprenticeship. 3. Certificates, duly signed, that he has diligently attended at least one course of lectures on each of the following subjects, delivered at the school of Apothecaries' Hall, or at some other school of medicine recognised by the Court (the order of study here laid down is recommended for the guidance of students):—Chemistry, anatomy and physiology, six months; practical chemistry, which must be attended in a laboratory, where the pupils shall be required to make the several pharmacopœial preparations, three months; botany, three months; *materia mœdia*, demonstrations and dissections, theory and practice of phisic, surgery, midwifery and the diseases of women and children, six months; medical jurisprudence, three months.

A certificate of twelve months' attendance on the entire practice of a Medicochirurgical hospital recognised by the court, containing not less than fifty beds, and where clinical instruction is regularly given.

Also, a certificate of having assisted in at least thirty cases of midwifery practice, twenty of which must be attended in a recognised hospital.

The examination for the license to practise as an apothecary will be as follows:—In translating and explaining the processes of the British pharmacopœias and extemporaneous prescriptions; in chemistry and general phisics; in *materia mœdia* and therapeutics; in natural history and medical botany; in anatomy and physiology; in the theory and practice of medicine; in midwifery; in medical jurisprudence.

Gentlemen presenting letters testimonial from any of the royal colleges of surgeons in Great Britain or Ireland, will be admitted to examination for the license of the Hall, on producing proof of three years' legal apprenticeship to a qualified apothecary in Ireland, and of a preliminary and professional education equal to the curriculum prescribed by the council.

The examination for the license to act as assistant to an apothecary in compounding and dispensing medicine will be confined to practical pharmacy.

The candidate for the assistants' license may present himself for examination at the termination of three years' apprenticeship.

The court of examiners sits every Friday, at two o'clock, and proceeds with the examination of candidates in the order in which their names appear on the list.

A rejected candidate cannot be re-admitted to examination until the expiration of six months.

An examination of Apothecaries' Apprentices takes place at the Hall, on the first week in May, annually, upon some subject in Pharmaceutic or Pathological Analysis, which is publicly announced by the court at the commencement of the previous winter session, and a prize of five guineas awarded to the successful competitor.

According to the Act of Parliament, no person can be taken or employed as

an apprentice, assistant, or shopman, to any apothecary, and no person can open shop, or act in the art and mystery of an apothecary within the kingdom of Ireland, until such person shall have been examined and obtained the certificate of the court of examiners of the Apothecaries' Hall of Dublin. . . . . It is also provided, that if any one shall take or employ any person as an apprentice, assistant, or shopman, or shall open shop or ware-room for the retail of medicine, or practise the art and mystery of an apothecary within the kingdom of Ireland, without such person having obtained the proper certificate for the purpose, such person so offending shall for every such offence forfeit the sum of twenty pounds, to be recovered by the Apothecaries' Hall of Dublin. . . . . 31st George III., chap. 34, sect. 18, 22, and 26.

The council require that every indenture of apprenticeship be enrolled at the Hall within six months from the date of its execution, and that the date of the diploma of the master, to whom the apprentice is about being bound, be furnished at the same time, and that this rule be adhered to on every transfer of such indenture, on pain of the forfeiture of the time served.

## MEDICAL DEPARTMENT OF THE ARMY.

ARMY MEDICAL BOARD.—*Superintendent of the Medical Department*, Dr. Andrew Smith, Inspector General, 1851. *Professional Assistants*, 1st Class Staff Surgeon, Dr. Thomas Spence.—*Superintending Surgical Instruments and Medicines*, Henry Pilleau, Esq., 2nd Class Surgeon.—*Apothecary to the Forces*, Francis Matthias Bassano, Esq.—Sir James Pitcairn, M.D., Inspector-General of Hospitals in Ireland, 1827.

The Appointments of Assistant-Surgeons rest with the *Superintendent*, Dr. Andrew Smith. A Board of Medical Officers sits twice a week to examine all Candidates for Appointments in the Medical Department of the Army, as to their Professional Qualifications for the Service. In addition to the subjects mentioned in the subjoined Regulations which are imperative, they are expected to be particularly well acquainted with—1st, Tropical diseases, and diseases to which Soldiers are most liable; 2nd, Military Surgery; 3rd, Diseases of the Eye; 4th, Cutaneous Diseases; Willan's Classification of this branch of Medicine, and Cullen's Nosology of Diseases, are referred to, because the Army Medical Returns are made in conformity with their modes of nosological arrangement. They are required to translate *vivâ voce*, a passage from a Greek or Latin author, to have in their possession the most approved modern books on the various branches of Medicine and Surgery: those which are commonly met with in the Service are the Works of Hunter, Hennen, Guthrie, Cooper, Milligan, Ballingall, and Marshall on Examination of Recruits and Invalids; and those of Chisholm, Gregory, Bancroft, Blanc, Burnet, Johnstone, and Annesley; and Mason Good, on Medicine and Diseases peculiar to warm Climates. They are required to produce such works, with their names inscribed therein, in order the better to satisfy the Examiner that they are *bonâ fide* their own property. Blank forms to the following effect must be filled up at least to the extent of regulations, and sent in one clear week before the Candidate can be admitted for Examination.

FORM OF CERTIFICATE.—I, (Name, Christian name and Surname at full length,) Years of Age, a Candidate for employment in the Medical Department of the Army, do hereby attest my readiness to engage for general Service, whether at Home or Abroad, and to proceed on Duty immediately on being gazetted. I declare my age not to exceed Twenty-six Years; that I am unmarried, and that I labour under no mental nor constitutional disease, nor physical debility, that can interfere with the most efficient discharge of the duties of a Medical Officer. (Signature.)

I have pursued the undermentioned Course of Study, of which I am ready to produce the Vouchers for registry, and also a Certificate of my Age; namely, I possess Certificates of regular attendance of the undermentioned Hospitals and Course of Lectures for the number of months stated (specifying as to Hospitals after the following Form):—

And in reference to Certificates specifying the Lectures, Name of the Lecturer, Place where the Lectures were delivered, and period in months of attendance, of all the Courses required by Regulations, with any others in addition which he may possess. If in possession of a Degree, stating the College, University, &c., and date of graduation.

QUALIFICATIONS.—1. In selecting from among the Candidates for the Medi-

cal Department of the Army, a preference is given to those who can fill up all the blanks in a given Form, by having their acquirements there stated; but the name of no gentleman can be placed on the List who does not possess the Diploma of either of the Colleges of Surgeons of London, Edinburgh, or Dublin, and who cannot produce the following Testimonials: 18 Months' attendance at an Hospital of celebrity, where the average number of In-patients is not less than 100; 24 Months' Anatomy; 12 Months' Practical Anatomy, 12 Months' Surgery, or (what is preferred) 6 Months' Surgery and 6 Months' Military Surgery; 8 Months' Clinical Surgery, a complete Course of two or three Lectures during the Week; 12 Months' Practice of Physic, or 6 Months' practice of Physic, and 6 Months' of General Pathology; 8 Months' Clinical Lectures on Physic, the same as required in Surgery; 12 Months' Chemistry; 6 Months' Practical Chemistry; 4 Months' Botany; 4 Months' Materia Medica; 3 Months' Practical Pharmacy, or an Apprenticeship; 6 Months' Natural History; 6 Months' Midwifery; and 6 Months' Natural Philosophy; and all Candidates for Medical Appointments are required to be conversant with Cullen's Nosology.

2. The Candidates must be unmarried, not beyond Twenty-six Years of Age, nor under Twenty-one.

3. Candidates who have had a University education, and have the Degree of A.B. or M.A., as well as that of M.D., will be preferred; but a liberal education, and a competent knowledge of the Greek and Latin languages are indispensably necessary in every Candidate.

4. The greater the attainments of the Candidates in various branches of science, in addition to competent professional knowledge, the more eligible will they subsequently be deemed for professional Service; as selections for promotions will be guided more by reference to such acquirements than to mere seniority.

5. Although the British Schools are specified, it is to be understood that Candidates who have received a regular education in approved Foreign Universities or Schools, will be admitted to examination.

6. With the exception of Practice of Physic and Clinical Medicine by one teacher, Candidates must have attended separate Lectures for each branch of science.

7. Diplomas, tickets of attendance on lectures, and certificates of regular attendance by each professor or lecturer, must be lodged at the office for examination and registry at least one week before the Candidate appears for examination, and likewise certificates of moral conduct and character—one of them by a clergyman: that of the parochial minister being desirable. Baptismal certificates are required at the same time; if the parish register cannot be resorted to, an affidavit from one of the parents, or some person who can attest the fact, will be accepted.

8. The certificates of the teacher of Practical Anatomy must state the number of subjects or parts dissected by the pupil.

9. Certificates of Lectures and attendance must be from Physicians or Surgeons of the recognised Colleges of Physicians and Surgeons in the United Kingdom, or of foreign Universities.

10. A certificate of proficiency in the Art of Cupping, from Mr. Mapleson, whose fee is 1*l.* 1*s.*

All communications are to be forwarded prepaid. Before the selected Candidate can be gazetted, he is obliged to pass through a probationary period of service, at Chatham; where, notwithstanding he resides at his own expense, he has to undertake his full share of all the medical duties pertaining to the establishment. This arrangement was made by the late Director-General, to obviate unreasonable complaints, and to ensure that the Candidate be fit, by his capabilities and conduct, for the duties attached to the appointment.

No application, on any pretence whatever, for leave of absence will be received, every gentleman, after having passed his examination, being expected to hold himself in immediate readiness to proceed to any station to which he may be appointed. An obligation in the form of a letter is required of the Candidate to the above purport, before he is permitted to enter on his probationary service.

Assistant-Surgeons of the Army, previous to their promotion to any higher rank, must be prepared to undergo such other examination before a Board of Medical Officers as may be deemed expedient.

Promotion in the medical department of the army is regulated in the junior classes from assistant-surgeons to surgeons, according to seniority; but promotions in the higher grades of the service are selections from the whole body of medical officers.

The average number of years' service is from nine to ten, before an assistant obtains a full surgeoncy. No army medical officer can realize any sum of money on his commission, like the purely military officer, as he, in no instance, purchases his commission.

## MEDICAL DEPARTMENT OF THE NAVY.

Admiralty Office, Somerset House, London.

*Director-General of the Medical Department of the Navy.*

Sir W. Burnett, M.D., K.C.B., K.C.H., F.R.S., &c.

The appointments of the assistant-surgeon in the Royal Navy are made by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, upon the recommendation of the Director-General, Sir William Burnett, before whom the candidate has to pass an examination, "touching his qualification in all the necessary branches and points of medicine and surgery for each of the steps in the Navy medical service."

*Qualification of Candidates.*—No person will be admitted as an assistant surgeon in the Royal Navy, who shall not produce a *certificate or diploma*, from one of the Royal Colleges of Surgeons of London, Edinburgh, Dublin, or Glasgow, of his fitness for that office.

No person will be admitted as a surgeon, unless he shall produce a diploma or certificate from one of the royal colleges above mentioned, founded on an examination to be passed subsequently to his appointment as assistant-surgeon, as to his fitness to become surgeon in the Navy.

In every case, candidates who may have provided themselves with such certificate or diploma, have to undergo a further examination before Sir W. Burnett.

They will be required to produce *proof* of having received a classical education, and particularly that they possess a competent knowledge of Latin; also,

That they are of good moral character, the certificate of which must be signed by the clergyman of the parish, or by a magistrate of the district.

That they have served an apprenticeship, or have been engaged for not less than six months in practical pharmacy.

That their age be not less than twenty years, nor more than twenty-four years; and that they are unmarried.

That they have actually attended an hospital in London, Edinburgh, Dublin, Glasgow, Aberdeen, or Manchester, for two years subsequently to the age of eighteen, in which the average number of patients is not less than 150.

That they have been engaged in actual dissections of the human body twelve months; the certificate of which, from the teacher, must state the number of subjects or parts dissected by the candidate.

That they have attended lectures, &c. on the following subjects, at established schools of eminence, by physicians or surgeons of the recognised Colleges of Physicians and Surgeons in the United Kingdom, for periods not less than hereunder stated; observing, however, that such lectures will not be admitted if the teacher should lecture no more than one branch of science, or if the lectures on anatomy, surgery, and medicine, be not attended during three distinct winter sessions of six months each.

*Anatomy* (or general anatomy, 12 months, and comparative anatomy, 6 months,) 18 months.—*Surgery*, (or general surgery, 12 months, and military surgery, 6 months,) 18 months.—*Theory of Medicine. Practice of Medicine*—If the lectures on the theory and practice of medicine are given in conjunction, then the period required is 18 months; (6 months' lectures on pathology, if given at a university where there may be a professorship on that branch of science, will be admitted in lieu of 6 months' lectures on the practice of medicine.) *Clinical lectures* at an hospital as above, (or the practice of medicine 6 months, and the practice of surgery 6 months,) 12 months.—*Chemistry*, (or lectures on chemistry, 3 months, and practical chemistry, 3 months,) 6 months.—*Materia medica*, 6 months.—*Midwifery* accompanied by certificates stating the number of mid-

wifery cases personally attended, 6 months.—*Botany*, (or general botany, 3 months, and medical botany, 3 months,) 6 months.

In addition to the tickets for the lectures, certificates must be produced from the professors, &c., by whom the lectures were given, stating the periods (in months) *actually* attended to by the candidates. The time also of actual attendance at an hospital or infirmary must be certified; and the ticket, as well as certificates of attendance, age, moral character, &c., must be produced by the candidate immediately on his being desired to appear for examination.

Although the above are the only qualifications which are absolutely required in candidates for the appointment of assistant-surgeon, a favourable consideration will be given to the cases of those who have obtained the degree of M.D. at either of the Universities of Oxford, Cambridge, Edinburgh, Dublin, Glasgow, London, or Aberdeen; or who, by possessing a knowledge of diseases of the eye, and of any branch of science connected with the profession, such as medical jurisprudence, natural history, natural philosophy, &c., appear to be more peculiarly eligible for admission into the service, observing, however, that lectures on these or any other subjects cannot be admitted as compensating for any deficiency in those required by the regulations.

By the rules of the service, no assistant-surgeon can be promoted to the rank of surgeon until he shall have served three years in the former capacity, one year of which must be in a ship actually employed at sea; and it is resolved that not any diploma or certificate of examination from either of the aforesaid royal colleges shall be admitted toward the qualification for surgeon, unless the diploma or certificate shall be obtained on an examination passed after a period of not less than three years' actual service, observing that no one can be admitted to an examination for surgeon unless he be a member of one of the above-named royal colleges.

Whenever assistant-surgeons already in the service, whose professional education may not be in accordance with the above, obtain leave to study previously to their passing for surgeon, they will be required, on their examination, to produce testimonials of having availed themselves of the period of leave, to complete their education agreeably to these regulations.

It is also to be observed, that candidates who may be admitted into the naval medical service, must serve in whatever ships, &c., they may be appointed to; and that in the event of their being unable to do so from sea-sickness, their names cannot be continued on the naval medical list, nor can they, of course, be allowed half-pay.—1844.

The selected candidate for naval medical service is required, before he is gazetted, (as in the case of candidates of the like description in the army medical service,) to pass through a probationary period of one year's service, wherein they are occupied in the same manner as when fully appointed. But the candidate receives pay, and is rated as acting assistant-surgeon, still liable, however, to be removed, precisely as in the case with the army-assistant, during an analogous period, without the preliminaries of a court martial.

Medical Officers are rated—Inspectors, Deputy-Inspectors, Surgeons, Assistant-Surgeons, in lieu of the former titles which have become obsolete, excepting so far as regards those who are enjoying half-pay under the old grades. Their privileges as commission-officers commence only from the date of their appointment of assistant-surgeon, which is consequent on their becoming qualified for it. [The chances of promotion, as in the army department, are very precarious; many ameliorations in the duties attended with elevation in grade, and some increase of pay, have lately taken place in the service; but in this respect it still falls short of the same department in the army. *Vide* "Pay of Army Departments." The greatest drawback both to promotion, and thereby to increase of pay, is constituted by those contingencies which so frequently remove the naval officer from full-pay service, and, consequently, reduce him to half-pay, which is not rated.]

## Woolwich.

*Master-General, General The Most Noble The Marquis of Anglesey, K.G., G.C.B., and G.C.H.*—Inspector-General, James Stewart, Esq., 1850.—Deputy-Inspector-General, James Verling, M.D., 1850.

The appointment of candidates for the ordnance medical department, like that of gentlemen cadets for the military service, is entirely in the patronage of the Master-General of the Ordnance, and not in that of the superior medical officers.

*Candidates.*—No applicant is to be received on the list of candidates before he is twenty-one, nor retained on it after he is twenty-five years of age. The age of every individual must be verified by a certificate of his baptism, if it can be procured; but if not, by a solemn declaration of one of his parents, or of some other person who can attest the date of his birth.

*Qualifications.*—Every candidate must bring proof of having diligently gone through the following branches of professional education:—

1. Of having served five years to a surgeon and apothecary, if educated in England; but if not, qualification in the practice of medicine and pharmacy equivalent thereto.

2. Of having attended the practice of surgery in a recognised hospital or hospitals, where clinical instruction is constantly given, for three years, three months being allowed for a vacation in each year.

3. Of having attended the undermentioned lectures:—

Anatomical lectures, demonstrations, dissections; three anatomical seasons or sessions. Morbid anatomy and pathology: one course. Lectures on the principles and practice of surgery, delivered in two distinct periods or sessions, two courses, each comprising 70 lectures, or one course of surgery, and one of military surgery. Natural history or comparative anatomy; one course. Chemistry, one course of 100 lectures. Botany; one course. Materia medica and therapeutics; one course of 100 lectures. Lectures on the principles and practice of medicine; two courses, each 100 lectures, second and third winters. Medical practice, with clinical lectures, 18 months, commencing the second session; viz., 12 months in a recognised hospital, and the remaining six months either in a recognised hospital or a dispensary. Medical jurisprudence, with toxicology; one course of 50 lectures. Midwifery; two courses, each of 60 lectures, second and third sessions. Practical midwifery (not less than thirty cases); after the conclusion of the first course on midwifery lectures, a certificate of having passed the usual examination is to be produced. Diseases of the eye (with attendance on patients of that class); one course.

4. He must produce a diploma from either of the colleges of London, Edinburgh, or Dublin; and if not a graduated M.D. of Scotland or Ireland, after having actually passed an examination in the university where he has obtained his degree, a certificate, also, of qualification from the Society of Apothecaries in London.

It is likewise expected that candidates shall have attended establishments for the cure of diseases of the ear and skin, and for the treatment of patients affected with mental derangement.

The moral conduct and character of each individual must be certified by the gentlemen to whose care his education was confided, and also by a clergyman, who, if practicable, should be the incumbent or officiating minister of the parish in which the applicant usually resides.

The candidate is required to sign, before the Board that is appointed to examine him and report upon his professional qualifications, a *Declaration* to the effect that he has no complaint whatever which can interfere with the effective performance of his duty; that he is unmarried; that he enters upon his duties with a full conviction of their importance; that he will endeavour to improve his judgment by habitual study and attention; that he is perfectly ready to perform every part of his duty in pharmacy and surgery, including the daily preparation of medicines, and the dressing of ulcers, and to undertake any duties that justly belong to his department of the service, without regard to distance or climate; that he will conciliate his brother officers, and cautiously avoid every engagement, especially of a pecuniary nature, beyond his power to fulfil.

The ordnance department, which is but a section of the army service, is of course proportionably limited in the numbers of its medical staff. Upon an average, one vacancy only occurs once in three years; it is therefore far from improbable that a candidate's name may remain on the provisional list until he becomes too old for the appointment according to the regulations.

The pay is regulated according to that of the army service in general.

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### THE EAST INDIA COMPANY'S MEDICAL SERVICE.

DEPÔT AT WARLEY, ESSEX.—*Commander*, Colonel Edward Hay.—*Surgeons*, A. R. Jackson, M.D., and Mr. Westall. LONDON—*Examining Medical Officer*, Dr. Scott.

The appointment of assistant-surgeons of the East India Service is in the patronage of the directors, exactly as all the appointments to their civil, military, and clerical services are. When a nomination is obtained from a director, a

form of certificate printed expressly for the purpose of the blanks being properly filled and signed previously to the assistant-surgeon being nominated, can be obtained by application at the Cadet-office, East India House. Mr. Clarke, of the cadet department, East India House, registers both the military cadets and assistant-surgeons; the medical being considered a branch of the military department. All assistant-surgeons going out are under military law, and are lent to the civil departments of government when required. Assistant-surgeons, with these certificates, duly signed by the person who obtained their nomination from the director, are desired to present themselves to Mr. T. R. Clarke, by ten o'clock in the morning, in order that they may have their nominations prepared against either the meeting of the committee, or the arrival of the nominating director.

REGULATIONS FOR THE ADMISSION OF MEDICAL GENTLEMEN INTO THE  
EAST INDIA COMPANY'S SERVICE AS ASSISTANT-SURGEONS FOR INDIA.

*Age.*—The assistant-surgeon must not be under twenty-two years, in proof of which he must produce an extract from the register of the parish in which he was born, or his own declaration, and other certificates, agreeable to forms to be obtained in the office for cadets and assistant-surgeons, East India House.

*Qualification in Surgery.*—The assistant-surgeon, upon receiving a nomination, will be furnished with a letter to the court of examiners of the Royal College of Surgeons, to be examined in Surgery, and their certificate will be deemed a satisfactory testimonial of his qualification: but should the assistant-surgeon be previously in possession of a diploma from the Royal College of Surgeons of London, or of the Colleges of Surgeons of Dublin or Edinburgh, or of the College and University of Glasgow, or of the Faculty of Physicians and Surgeons of Glasgow, either of them will be deemed satisfactory as to his knowledge of Surgery, without any further examination. He is also required to produce a certificate from the cupper of a public hospital in London, of having acquired, and being capable of practising with proper dexterity, the art of cupping.

*Qualification in Physic.*—The assistant-surgeon will also be required to pass an examination by the company's examining physician in the practice of physic, in which examination will be included as much anatomy and physiology as is necessary for understanding the causes and treatment of internal diseases, as well as the art of prescribing and compounding medicines: and Dr. Scott will then require him to produce satisfactory proof of his having attended at least two courses of lectures on the practice of physic; and, above all, that he should produce a certificate of having attended diligently the practice and clinical instructions of the physicians at some general hospital in London for six months; or at some general hospital in the country (within the United Kingdom) for six months, provided such provincial hospital contains at least, on an average, 100 in-patients, and have attached to it a regular establishment of physicians as well as surgeons. No attendance on the practice of a physician at any dispensary will be admitted.

The assistant-surgeon is also required, as a condition to his appointment, to subscribe to the military or medical and medical retiring fund at his respective presidency, and also to the military orphan society, if appointed to Bengal.

The assistant-surgeon is required, by resolution of Court of the 21st of May, 1828, to apply at the office for cadets and assistant-surgeons for his orders for embarkation, and actually proceed under such orders within three months from the date of being passed and sworn before the committee for passing military appointments; he will then be furnished with an order to obtain the certificate of his appointment, signed by the secretary, for which he will pay a fee of £5 in the secretary's office.

*General Caution.*—Notice is hereby given, that should it be discovered at the time the assistant-surgeon is appointed, or at any subsequent period, that his appointment has been obtained by purchase, or agreement to pay any pecuniary or valuable consideration whatsoever, either directly or indirectly, when the appointment is completed, the assistant-surgeon will not only be dismissed, and rendered ineligible to hold any situation in the East India Company's Service,

under the Court's Resolution of the 9th August, 1809, but all the parties concerned in procuring the appointment surreptitiously, or in disposing of, or receiving the same under such circumstances, will subject themselves individually and collectively to a criminal prosecution for a misdemeanour, under the Act of the 49th of George the Third, cap. 126; and the Court of Directors of the East India Company do hereby declare, that they will prosecute any person or persons who shall hereafter be detected in such illieit traffic.

The assistant-surgeon will receive no pay until his arrival in India—in fact, it is only then that he receives his appointment. He must pay his own passage out, which will cost him about 90*l.* During the first six months after his arrival, he is attached to the presidency garrison hospital, where he has an opportunity of obtaining some insight into the diseases peculiar to tropical climates, and of providing himself with regimental and canteen equipments, surgical instruments, &c. His pay and rank are then equal to those of a lieutenant.

**PAY**, per month of 30 days.—*Assistant to Cavalry* in garrison, 28*l.* 4*s.* 2*d.*, in the field, 30*l.* 5*s.* 10*d.*; *Infantry*, in garrison, 18*l.* 13*s.* 4*d.*, in the field, 21*l.* 3*s.* 4*d.* *Surgeon*, rank and pay of captain. *Cavalry* in garrison, 31*l.* 18*s.* 4*d.*, in the field, 46*l.* 12*s.* 11*d.*; *Infantry* in garrison, 31*l.* 18*s.* 4*d.*, in the field, 34*l.* 5*s.*

In addition to this pay, both ranks of surgeons receive some additional consideration in proportion to the number of companies of troops placed under their charge.

*Superintending-Surgeon* (rank of lieutenant-colonel), 121*l.* 5*s.* per month; when promoted to the medical board (rank of colonel), 204*l.* 3*s.* 4*d.* Besides these ordinary appointments, there is in all the establishments a certain number of garrison-surgeons and assistant-surgeons on staff-pay.

*Furlough*.—Unless in cases of sickness, officers are not entitled to their rotation of leave of absence under ten years of service. Assistant-surgeons on furlough receive per annum 118*l.* 2*s.* 6*d.*; surgeons, 196*l.* 12*s.* Pay ceases after two years and a half of absence from India. Officers under ten years of service may have a furlough for one year, on the plea of urgent private affairs, without pay.

*Retirement*.—After twenty-five years' service (including three years' furlough), the officer is allowed the pay of his rank. Members of the Board, of two years' standing (not less than twenty years in India), are allowed 500*l.* per annum; of three years' standing, 700*l.* *Superintending surgeons*, under like restrictions, 300*l.* and 365*l.* per annum. All other surgeons, and assistant-surgeons, after twenty years' service (including three for furlough), are allowed the pay of their rank.\*

For the benefit of officers who have served less than three years, and are obliged to retire on account of ill health, an allowance is granted from Lord Clive's fund, provided they possess less than a specified amount of private property.

Appointments take place by rotation. The average time required to ascend the list of assistant-surgeons to the rank of full surgeon is fifteen years.

\* The regulations, by which superintending surgeons are entitled, as such, to retiring pensions of £300 and £365 a year, and members of the medical board to pensions of £500 and 700 a year, according to their period of service in those ranks respectively, ceased to be the rule of the service for medical officers after the 16th July, 1842; but individuals then in the service, and who have been appointed to the offices of superintending surgeon, and member of the board, within ten years from that date, are allowed the option of retiring upon pensions on the old scale of length of service in those ranks, instead of the new scale of length of service in India.

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## MEMOIRS.

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### ROBERT THORPE, ESQ., OF MANCHESTER.

THIS eminent Surgeon, who died at his residence in Piccadilly, Manchester, on the 21st of Jan., was known, not only in that city but throughout the country, as a clever Anatomist and operating Surgeon. Having passed through the usual course of instruction in London, and the ordeal of examinations, he returned to Manchester, and commenced the practice of his profession. He became connected with the Manchester Royal Infirmary in 1812, and resigned in 1819, but was immediately elected one of the Consulting Surgeons to the institution, and held that honourable position at his death. Mr. Thorpe was distinguished alike for professional skill and for private worth. Intimately acquainted with the minutest details which his own researches, or those of other investigators, had revealed in anatomy, possessed of a ready and most accurate perception of the condition of a diseased part, he had, further, that indispensable requisite for an operating surgeon, an iron nerve and a steadiness of manipulation never exceeded. Ever careful not to inflict unnecessary pain, once assured that nothing but an operation remained, its magnitude never appalled him, nor did its momentousness cause him to falter. This decision and strength of nerve, combined with certainty of eye and hand, rendered him most successful. On so solid a basis was his fame established, that among his professional brethren in Manchester his word had almost the authority of law, and his decision was looked for with deference. The following fact illustrates this in a striking manner:—At the Manchester Royal Infirmary, when an operation appears to be necessary, it becomes a matter for consultation among the medical staff before it is undertaken, and the decision depends upon the majority of votes recorded, commencing with the youngest and ending with the senior member. Mr. Thorpe could not always attend these consultations, and it has happened that a patient, about whose case he had not been in consultation, when arranged on the operating table, has been removed because he (Mr. Thorpe), after examination, expressed his opinion that it would be better to wait a short time. Of

course, so distinguished a man could scarcely fail, during a long professional career, to be the instructor of others, and it would be easy to point out surgeons in Manchester who remember their pupilage under him with feelings of great pleasure, and who acquired in that position the talent which now elevates them. Clever and enthusiastic as he was in the pursuit of his profession, it does not appear that he published anything upon any department of medical or surgical science; and though he was possessed of literary tastes, his public appearances as a man of letters were very few indeed. In private life Mr. Thorpe was distinguished by the benevolence of his character, and by the unostentatious manner in which he distributed his ample means among those whom he believed to be requiring and deserving of aid.

### RALPH FLETCHER, ESQ., OF GLOUCESTER.

MR. FLETCHER was born in the town in which he afterwards practised with extraordinary success for fifty years. At an early age he became the pupil of the celebrated Trye, Surgeon to the County Hospital. He repaired, subsequently, to London, and before he had reached the age of twenty he might have been seen wending his way to the dissecting-rooms of St. Bartholomew's Hospital, with lantern in hand, *at two o'clock in the morning*. He knew his circumstances to be too straitened to admit of his remaining the usual time allotted to study in London; and being, moreover, imbued with a deep love of his profession, he toiled incessantly to acquire a knowledge of it in as short a time as possible.

At that period, more than fifty years ago, it was not deemed a *sine quâ non* to pass the ordeal of the College of Surgeons, or, indeed, to secure any other test of professional acquirement; consequently, the subject of our memoir returned to his native town, satisfied with having attained that for which he visited the metropolis—sound anatomical knowledge. His *surgical* knowledge had been gained in as good a school as the metropolitan hospitals could present—namely, the Gloucester County Hospital. Immediately on his return, at the early age of twenty, he was elected to the office of surgeon to that institution, vacant by the death of his preceptor, Trye. And then commenced one of the most splendid careers of a provincial surgeon of the pure school, that can be called to mind. Rapidly rising in public estimation, and distinguished for his indomitable nerve and skill as an operator, Mr. Fletcher could soon boast of one of the finest consulting practices in the kingdom. Not only was he the consulting surgeon of his own county, but the range of his consultations extended to the whole of South Wales, and, on the other side, even to Bristol. Rarely was an operation required in that district of the kingdom but he was selected as the operator. It is generally understood that the income from his practice, purely surgical,—for he never dispensed medicines,—exceeded £4000 for many years, and as he died worth more than £80,000, this statement may easily be believed.

Mr. Fletcher had many peculiarities—eccentric to a degree, of retiring disposition, but when drawn out, a most witty and delightful companion; remarkably handsome, and with fascinating manners, he was a universal favourite of the ladies. He was by no means remarkable for his charity; but to the dumb creation he was a never-failing friend. Of the Society for the Suppression of Cruelty to Animals he was a warm supporter, and remembered it in his will. Many anecdotes of his devotion to the cause might be mentioned. In walking along the streets of London, he would stop occasionally to look at the poor-jaded cab-horses; to the cabman on the stand who appeared to be most attentive to, and careful of, his horse, he would walk up, and put a shilling in his hand by way of encouragement. A rare customer! doubtless thought the cabman. Among his bequests was one of £15 per annua to support the cats which had so long fed from his hand whilst alive.

Mr. Fletcher was both an admirer and a patron of the fine arts, and a connoisseur in paintings, of which he possessed a valuable collection; they formed, indeed, one of the "*Lions*" of the city of Gloucester. He was the author of several works, and appears in the MEDICAL DIRECTORY for 1851 as follows:—

DR. MACKNESS was distinguished by that kindness of disposition that accompanies a religious and well-regulated mind. He enjoyed a considerable reputation, and was the author of a work on the "Climate of Hastings, and its Adaptation to the Necessities of Invalids." He also edited "The Moral Aspects of Medical Life," of Professor Marx; a publication highly praised by the medical press. Dr. Mackness had the honour of being selected by the Council of the Provincial Association to read, at the annual meeting at Brighton, a Report on the Sanitary Aspects and Topography of the Southern Coast of England, a labour in which he had made great progress. Although prevented from fulfilling this important engagement, in consequence of his premature death, his valuable paper was, we believe, made available for the interests of the association.

### DR. JAMES INGLIS, OF HALIFAX.

DR. JAMES INGLIS was born at Glasgow, in September, 1813. In consequence of the removal of his family to Musselburgh, his education was begun and completed at the grammar school of that town. At the age of fifteen he commenced his attendance at the University of Edinburgh; and having chosen the profession of medicine, he was apprenticed to Sir George Ballingall, the Professor of Military Surgery. He soon manifested a preference for chemical pursuits, and became very intimate with the late Mr. Kemp, so well known for his brilliant experiments in chemical science. Dr. Hope, who was then Professor of Chemistry, offered a prize for the best essay on Bromine and its Compounds, accompanied by preparations. The subject of this sketch at once entered the lists as a competitor, and had the satisfaction of being awarded the gold medal which constituted the prize in question. The essay was subsequently printed in the "New Philosophical Journal." The enthusiasm of the young student attracted the notice of Dr. Hope, who wished to secure him for his own class-room. This liberal offer was declined; for although he had devoted a large portion of his time to a collateral branch of medical science, he still assiduously studied each department, having been one of the dressers in the surgical, and a clinical clerk in the medical wards of the Edinburgh Royal Infirmary. On the appearance of cholera in 1831, prior to its reaching Edinburgh, anxious to investigate this mysterious disease, he went to a neighbouring town, and there visited the sick and dying sufferers from this terrible calamity. Dr. Inglis at this period of his life was a regular attendant at the meetings of the Edinburgh Medical Society, and took a lively interest in the proceedings. Like most enthusiastic men of genius, he evinced a great partiality for studies of a metaphysical character.

After graduating in 1834, and obtaining also the diploma of the Royal College of Surgeons, he joined in practice the late Mr. Samuel McKenn, at Castle-Douglas. During the two years of his residence in that town, he gained the esteem of all classes; but it was neither a situation suited to his tastes, nor adapted to his constitution. In 1837 he removed to Ripon, in Yorkshire, and

was appointed Physician to the Public Dispensary; but, finding his sphere of action too circumscribed, he took advantage of the sudden death of a physician in Halifax, and removed thither. He rapidly acquired and retained the confidence and esteem of his medical brethren in that town, and, had his health permitted, would doubtless have enjoyed a most extensive and lucrative consulting practice, but his onward career was checked for several years prior to his decease. Absence from home, and relaxation from professional occupations, were frequently necessary; and when at home, indisposition often prevented his responding to the calls made upon him. His exertions in behalf of the Halifax Literary and Philosophical Society will be remembered with pleasure. Of its Geological Department (in which he took a lively interest), he was appointed Curator; and, notwithstanding his failing health, was frequently engaged either in the preparation of, or delivering lectures upon this, one of his favourite subjects of study.

Dr. Inglis united to an ardent love of science those genial social qualities that endeared him to a wide circle of friends. The friendships which he formed at an early age are an evidence of the versatility of his studies, which led him into close alliance with men who are eminent, not only in the practice of Medicine, but in Botany, Geology, Mineralogy, &c.

Dr. Inglis's illness was protracted and painful, but it was borne with exemplary submission and Christian patience. Previous to leaving Edinburgh in 1837, he had suffered from severe attacks of acute rheumatism, during the progress of which the heart became implicated; and this affection progressed, until it terminated in his dissolution, at the early age of thirty-seven.

From the commencement of his medical career, Dr. Inglis was in the habit of communicating to the medical journals cases and observations of interest to the profession. Whilst in Ripon, he investigated the causes of *Goutte*, which disease he found prevailing in that district. These investigations he published in the form of a pamphlet, and it has been often referred to as an excellent monograph upon the subject. He made several interesting geological communications to the West-Riding Geological and Polytechnic Society, as well as to the British Association. He was a Fellow of the Geological Society. The last subject upon which he was engaged was the invention of a Life-Boat; and there is reason for believing that his anxiety to complete it in a stated time may have hastened his death.

### DR. JOHN JAMES BOWIE, LONDON.

THE deceased was the son of Capt. Bowie, R.N. He took his Degree in Medicine at Edinburgh, in the year 1841, and afterwards passed some considerable time on the Continent. Some years since, he was elected one of the Assistant-Physicians of the Hospital for Consumption, which office he resigned about a year ago, on account of being seized with the disease which eventually terminated his existence. This disease proved to be phthisis pulmonalis, though it assumed a different character in its commencement. Dr. Bowie was a well-informed physician, and a most amiable man. He had much taste in

the fine arts, and displayed both in drawing and oil painting no mean capacity. In his medical career, so prematurely terminated, he gave great promise of success, being universally respected and esteemed, never deviating, even in the smallest things, from the standard of professional honour.

### JONAH WILSON, ESQ., LATE OF HUNTINGDON.

MR. WILSON was born at Oswaldkirk, Yorkshire; was apprenticed to his maternal uncle, Mr. Wass, of Thirsk, in the same county, who appears to have been a person of great energy of character, and a very respectable practitioner of medicine; Mr. Wilson always spoke of him with emotions of pleasure and grateful satisfaction. For a short time he studied at the Borough Hospitals, and for three months at Edinburgh, and soon began practice at St. Neot's, Huntingdonshire, but he found his deficiencies so great, and his confidence in himself so slight, that in the course of a few months he resolved to return to hospital practice. He became an Assistant-Apothecary under the late Mr. Stocker, of Gny's, and prosecutor to the late Sir Astley Cooper. For five years he studied and laboured with the most unwearied diligence and perseverance, at the expiration of which period he commenced practice at Huntingdon, entering into partnership with Mr. Desborough, whose health had so much declined as to induce him to relinquish the profession. Mr. Wilson rapidly rose in public estimation; his accurate acquaintance with anatomy and surgery, acquired in that celebrated school under Sir Astley Cooper, when in the full vigour of his splendid career; his thorough knowledge of pharmacy, as evinced in his work "Pharmacopœia Chirurgica," which he committed to the press soon after his arrival at Huntingdon; and his keen powers of observation, retentive memory, and masculine understanding, render it no marvel that, in the then low state of medical and surgical knowledge, particularly the latter in the provinces, he should the first year have trebled the amount of returns, and in the course of a few years attained the highest eminence, and for many years commanded the most lucrative practice in the neighbourhood, both in general practice and in consultations with all his medical friends around. About twenty years since, the premature death of his eldest son, intended for the profession, gave so powerful a shock to his system, that it was with difficulty he could command his attention, hitherto unremitting, to his professional duties. Attacks partaking of the gouty diathesis frequently disabled him altogether, and in a few years he gradually withdrew from the arduous engagements of his profession. Three years ago he left Huntingdon to reside with his affectionate son, and ended his days in peace, on the 13th of June, 1851, in the 73rd year of his age.

Mr. Wilson's intimate knowledge of the *materia medica*, combined with his ardent attachment to classical, medical, and general literature, gave him great facility in prescribing. For elegance of diction, exact, and dignified design of each element, together with a comprehensive grasp of the combined and main action of the whole, his prescriptions were considered *models* well worthy of notice and imitation, being as free from the multitudinous complexity of the ancient school, as from the raw simplicity of the modern. Amongst our medical classics, Mr. Wilson was particularly partial to "Gregory's *Conspectus Medicinæ Theoreticæ*," generally reading it through once in the course of the year; "Heberden's Commentaries" was scarcely ever out of his sight; Von Swieten and Sydenham also were much admired by him. Of English authors, his great favourite was "Fordyce on Fevers," a work he was ever lavish in praising. He thought the more modern authors far below them in the closeness of their observations, always excepting "Copland's Dictionary," a work he, alas! lived not to see completed—which is a lot, apparently, likely to befall many of us.

Mr. Wilson, ever ready to perform an operation when absolutely necessary, even more fondly admired and relied upon nature's great powers; he was remarkably successful in the medical treatment of surgical cases; his knowledge

of midwifery, in all its mechanical forms and vital powers, was complete; few men of his day were his equal. The first edition of his "Pharmacopœia Chirurgica" was dedicated to Sir Astley Cooper, and was published November 2, 1809; the second edition, March 2, 1811. It soon passed through the third, and now, for many years, has been out of print: it was highly esteemed at the time of publication, and for a long time was a text-book for the practitioner of surgery. We have had the testimony of the most eminent men of our profession, that the "Pharmacopœia Chirurgica" was always on their study table—a book of constant reference. Mr. Wilson was no diplomatist. It is true the degree of M.D. at Aberdeen was offered to him, but he perseveringly refused to accept it. He was not a member of the Royal College of Surgeons; in his early days that honour was not much sought after, and, writhing under the pangs of "*res augusta domi*," and with the advice of his warm-hearted friend, Sir Astley Cooper, he launched forth on his career of success and usefulness *without* that now imperatively necessary and valuable qualification.—*Prov. Med. and Surg. Journ.*

### DR. HENRY JENNER, OF STONE, GLOUCESTERSHIRE.

THE subject of this notice was born at Burbidge, in Wiltshire, of which place his father, the Rev. Henry Jenner, was vicar, as well as chaplain to the Marquis of Aylesbury. The Rev. H. Jenner was also the elder brother of the celebrated Dr. Jenner, the discoverer of Vaccination.

Dr. Henry Jenner was educated at the Grammar School at Marlborough, and was subsequently entered at the University of Oxford, where he remained for a short time, and then became apprentice to his uncle, who resided at Berkeley, in Gloucestershire; whom he assisted in his researches in natural philosophy, and was with him during his experiments on the cow-pox. He afterwards proceeded to London, and entered himself as a pupil at St. George's Hospital. He was taken by John Hunter into his house, where he remained for two years, and assisted him, not only in his private practice, but also in making preparations for his museum.

Dr. Jenner afterwards graduated at Aberdeen, and commenced practice at Berkeley, where he continued till within a few years of his death. He wrote several pamphlets and papers on Vaccination, on Poisons, and on Cholera, and one entitled "*Advice to Mothers and Nurses on the Management of Children*," which was considered a very useful work. He was a good naturalist, and devoted much time to the study of this science. He prepared a considerable collection of the birds and butterflies of the country, and he left unfinished a work on Natural History; having formerly been seized with typhus fever, from the effects of which he suffered a long time, he did not, consequently, feel able to complete the work in question. He was a proficient in botany, and a Fellow of the Linnean Society, to which he was a contributor.

As a physician, Dr. Jenner possessed much skill. He was agreeable in his manners, respected by his patients and beloved by all who knew him. He lived to the advanced age of eighty-five. His death resulted from a series of attacks of serous apoplexy.

### WILLIAM RALFS, ESQ., OF BRENTFORD.

THIS gentleman was born at Fareham, in Hampshire, and after completing his education was apprenticed to a practitioner at Gosport. At an early period he had much experience of naval practice, as a supernumerary on board the sick-ships in Portsmouth Harbour, and in the wards of Haslar Hospital. He entered the Westminster Militia as Assistant-Surgeon in 1806, and served with his regiment in Scotland and Ireland from 1810 to 1814, that corps having volunteered to act as part of the regular army, and relieve the troops of the line.



Mr. Ralfs, in 1817, settled in private practice at Brentford, the head quarters of the Westminster Militia, as being the residence of Colonel Clitherow, then commanding it. There he continued in the active and able exercise of his profession until the commencement of his last illness, and, indeed, for some days after all exertion had become distressing and dangerous to him. For more than a year previously, there had been signs of constitutional decay, as debility, emaciation, dulness of sight and hearing, and, latterly, gradual symptoms of hemiplegia. He was confined to his bed for nearly six weeks with low fever and steady increase of the hemiplegic affection, and expired on the 15th July.

Mr. Ralfs' practice was extensive, and he had held many local appointments. To great abilities and indefatigable industry, he added a kind and liberal spirit, which greatly endeared him to his patients and friends, by all of whom, and especially by the poor, he will long be remembered in the neighbourhood with affectionate respect.

### DR. STANFORD, OF WINDSOR.

DR. STANFORD died at his residence, in Park-street, Windsor, on Wednesday, July 30. The deceased was much and deservedly respected in professional and private life, and had very successfully practised as a physician in that town for the last thirty years.

Dr. Stanford had served with the expedition to Hanover in 1805, at the capture of Madeira in 1807, subsequently in the Peninsula with the Buffs and the 29th. He was present in Sir John Moore's retreat from Corunna, in the battles of Talavera, Busaco, and Albuera, in the retreat to and defence of the lines of Torres Vedras, the pursuit of Massena, the actions of Pombal Redina, and Campo Mayor, and first siege of Badajoz. In 1814, he accompanied the expedition to America, and was present at the attack and capture of the forts Castine and Murcheu; he served also in the campaign of 1815, including the capture of Paris.

Dr. Stanford was professionally employed at Cooling during the epidemic fever of 1812. He received a medal and clasp for the battles of Talavera and Albuera, in Spain. An instance of his uncompromising spirit in the discharge of his duties was displayed during the retreat from Talavera. The wounded of the division were sent to the rear, and the doctor had charge of the men of the brigade to which he belonged. A Spaniard complained that the wounded men were troublesome, and the commandant ordered them to be encamped as a punishment. The doctor represented the danger of such an arrangement, declaring that the men were so badly wounded as to render it likely that exposure to the cold night-air after the hot days would prove fatal to them. The men were kept in quarters, and not one of them died, whilst in the brigades that were encamped several men perished.

Dr. Stanford had attained his sixty-ninth year. He has left no family.

### THOMAS ROBERTSON, ESQ., SURGEON, R.N., LONDON.

MR. ROBERTSON was born at Innerwick, in the East Lothians of Scotland, in September, 1773, his father being a large farmer in that famed agricultural district. He died at No. 12, Cross-street, Islington, from cholera of two days' and a half duration, on the 8th of August, 1851, aged seventy-seven years, being the senior surgeon but one on the Retired List of the Navy.

He entered the service, as assistant-surgeon, on the 4th of December, 1793, after an apprenticeship of four years to Mr. Cunningham, his cousin, a naval surgeon practising at Tranent, near Edinburgh, during all which time he attended the classes of the University of Edinburgh, and then passed his examination at Surgeons' Hall, London. He also held a *Bursary*—a small sum which is given in Scotland to certain students, and something similar to the scholarship of the English colleges.

In less than twelve months from entering the navy, he received the appoint-

ment of surgeon, owing to the excessive mortality that prevailed among the troops and the fleet at the capture of Port-au-Prince, and the occupation of the Island of St. Domingo, and which forced the abandonment of that enterprise. On the West India station he served three years, in the following ships: *Success*, *Europa*, *Flying Fish*, and *Iphigenia*.

The following is a brief summary of his after-services in the navy:—

When attached to the *Dædalus*, on the west coast of Africa, he was present at an unsuccessful attack on Goree, where the British were beaten off with loss; two killed and twenty wounded in Mr. Robertson's ship. He served in the *Intrepid* in China and the East Indies; in the *Leopard*, in the Red Sea. He was flag-surgeon to Admiral Blanket, at Mocha, where he established the hospital on shore, capable of accommodating 150 sick from the squadron. He had here some cases of plague, from which the French, previous to their evacuation, had been great sufferers. He was present in the *Sirius*, belonging to the Channel squadron, in Sir R. Calder's action, at the battle of Trafalgar, in a gallant fight with a French flotilla off the Tiber, and capture of Bergère. He received the following certificate from the captain:—

“These are to certify to the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that Mr. Thomas Robertson served as Surgeon of H.M. ship *Sirius* under my command, from the 7th of December, 1803, to the 19th of May, 1808, above four years and five months.

“The *Sirius* during the above period, was employed in the blockades of Brest, Toulon, and Cadiz, &c. &c.; participated in the battles of Cape Finisterre and Trafalgar; many minor engagements; and particularly in a severe action with a French squadron off the Tiber.

“Mr. Robertson's regular good conduct, professional skill, and assiduous attention to the many sick, wounded, and hurt, during so long a period of constant sea-service, I had ample opportunities of observing.

“I feel it due to Mr. Robertson, and have much satisfaction in granting this certificate, in the hope it may prove a recommendation to him for promotion.

‘W. PROWSE, Captain.’

He was in the *Norge* at the siege of Cadiz, and off Corunna during the battle, which he witnessed from his ship. Some of the wounded from the army were afterwards embarked, and received under his care.

On his return home he was appointed to the *Batavier* Hospital Ship, at Woolwich, there being then no hospital on shore for seamen and marines. This vessel was also the hospital ship for Russians and Spaniards; from the ships of those countries, stationed in the Thames, their seamen and marines were received for medical treatment. He served four years and seven months in this ship, and was again appointed to it when it was made by the Admiralty an hospital ship for foreign distressed seamen. He here caught the fever that prevailed, and nearly lost his life.

He was ordered by the Admiralty to join without a moment's delay, and instructed to proceed on board the *Helder* off the Tower, without even waiting for his warrant from the Transport Board.

On arriving at the *Helder* receiving-ship, he found a number of foreign seamen, collected from the streets of London, and sent on board by the civil power, without the slightest precaution, and who were in a state of the greatest destitution, disease and filth, and among whom a malignant fever was then extensively raging, from their having been over-crowded in their neglected condition.

Removed to *Batarier* hospital ship during that time—Sick, 282, most of them labouring under fever. Mortality ten per cent. The surgeon, assistant surgeon, and three officers of the ship, were attacked by the fever.

A subscription was now raised by a committee of the merchants of London for the relief of our own distressed seamen, when, through Mr. Robertson's recommendation and representation, an application was made to the Admiralty for the use of an hospital ship. He also at that time addressed the committee by letter, and pointed out the deplorable consequences that had resulted among the foreign distressed seamen, and the mode of preventing it in future. The *Dromedary* was selected for the purpose of an hospital ship, and removed up to Greenwich, being the first seamen's hospital ship in the river Thames supported by voluntary contributions, and which at last led to the establishment of the *Dreadnought*. The different results that followed when a medical superintendent was appointed, and proper precaution taken in receiving the distressed objects, were very striking. Between Jan. 24, 1817, and March 30, 1818, though upwards of 5000 seamen were taken on board the five receiving ships, the number admitted into hospital was only 372; whereas among foreign distressed seamen, where no precautions were taken in the first instance, and no medical superintendent, in little more than four months, out of 603, 282 were admitted into hospital, and the mortality was ten per cent.

These fifteen months' services to our own distressed seamen were not allowed to count for naval retirement by the Admiralty. At the conclusion of these services, he received the thanks of the committee, and was rewarded with a pecuniary gratuity, an unusual thing, by Lord Viscount Sidmouth, the then Secretary of State for the Home Department. During these services and after, for short periods, Mr. Robertson was surgeon to the *Nassau* prison ship at Chatham, and the ordinary at Sheerness.

The following letter from Commissioner Cunningham has reference to his services to the foreign distressed seamen:—

“ Woolwich Dockyard, 26th July, 1817.

“ MY LORD,—Having received the enclosed letter from Mr. Robertson, late surgeon of the *Helder* and *Batarier*, setting forth the circumstances attending his services amongst the foreign seamen on board those ships, I take the liberty of forwarding the same for your lordship's persusal; and, in justice to Mr. Robertson, I must bear testimony to his persevering attention to this duty; the many distressing cases of disease were perhaps never before witnessed in one ship, and unequalled for malignity and extent; to his indefatigable zeal and professional skill, with the means your lordship was pleased to put into my power for the accommodation of the sick, may be attributed the suppression of a disease which, at the time I first visited the *Helder*, threatened the most serious consequences to the country. The attack of the fever which Mr. Robertson experienced in the execution of this duty appeared to me at one time to threaten his dissolution, the effects of which, as he states, must still be felt by him. The whole of Mr. Robertson's conduct during the time he has acted under my notice, entitles him to my warmest commendation, and I beg to recommend him to your lordship's notice.

Between 1818 and 1829 he served in the *Bulwark*, 74 guns; *Gloucester*, 74, and *Prince Regent*, 120 guns, as flag surgeon to Admirals Sir Benjamin Hallowell and Sir Robert Moorsom, the Commanders-in-Chief at Chatham; and also in the *Undaunted*, Sir Augustus Clifford, and *Gloucester*, Captain Stuart.

In 1829, after more than thirty-one years' almost continuous service in ships, he retired on the pay of fifteen shillings per diem. By so doing he lost the advantages in rank and emoluments which were soon after bestowed, by the creation of inspectors and deputy-inspectors of hospitals and fleets, and, latterly, the Order of the Bath, which has been so justly bestowed upon naval medical

officers, and which has fallen to the good fortune of officers with much less war service. After his retirement he acted as a director and auditor of the Naval Medical Supplemental Fund, in which he took a warm interest, and endeavoured to bring about a better system of management, by the publication of some letters in the *United Service Gazette*, &c., in which his views were ably supported by the editor of that journal, and which were calculated to lead to a more careful system for the future.

He was married to Elizabeth, the daughter of the Rev. John Harvie, minister of the parish "Innerwick," in which he was born; and has left three sons and two daughters: one, Lieutenant Robertson, R.N., of the Steam Department, Woolwich Dockyard, of twenty-three years' constant service in the navy—seven years a mate, and eleven years a lieutenant; a second son, a clerk in the Seamen's Registration Office, Custom House, London, under the Board of Privy Council for Trade; third son, a settler and farmer in Upper Canada; and two daughters unmarried.—*Lancet*.

### DR. EDWARD JOHNSTONE, OF BIRMINGHAM.

THE death of Dr. Edward Johnstone, which took place recently at Edgbaston Hall, after an honourable and useful life, calls for more than a passing notice. Commencing his professional career in Birmingham, at a period when comparatively few of the most aged members of the community now living had entered upon their existence, he may be regarded as a connecting link between the present generation and one long since passed away. It was the good fortune of Dr. Johnstone to belong to a family which had added several names to the muster-roll of men who, by their high character, attainments, and natural gifts, have adorned the practice as well as extended the boundaries of medical science. On settling here at the early age of twenty-three years, he accordingly enjoyed the advantages which might be expected to result from the possession of a name, already associated with distinction in the path of life which he had himself selected, and he had also the additional benefit of the friendly countenance of the late Dr. Ash; but the young physician, it would appear, soon gave evidence that he possessed talents and industry which rendered him altogether independent of such adventitious aids. In a comparatively few years his reputation was placed on a solid and lasting basis; and that increasing years but added to its lustre is conclusively attested by the fact, that the completion of the fiftieth year of his practice was celebrated by a public dinner, which was attended by upwards of one hundred gentlemen, a large proportion of the assembly consisting of his medical brethren in Birmingham and the vicinity.

Dr. Edward Johnstone pursued his studies at Edinburgh, where, on the 14th of June, 1779, he obtained the degree of M.D., selecting "*De Febre Puerperali*" as the subject of his inaugural treatise, which, on being published, elicited the discriminating praise of the eminent French surgeon, M. de Ponteau. In the autumn of the same year, on the opening of the Birmingham General Hospital, he was elected, with Dr. Ash, Dr. Withering, and Dr. Smith, one of its first physicians,—an early recognition of his professional abilities; and he is probably the only survivor of all those who had anything to do with the establishment of that institution. In the appointment, which he held for a number of years with honour to himself and benefit to the charity, he was succeeded by his brother, the late highly esteemed Dr. John Johnstone. But the record of his services would be very incomplete, did we not mention that Dr. Johnstone was also a zealous promoter of the Dispensary for supplying medical and surgical attendance to the sick poor at their own homes. He was an active and munificent patron of every useful and charitable institution; and his able advice was at all times accessible at his own residence to the less affluent. The one in which, for more than twenty years of his latter life, he took the greatest interest, was the Medical School, now Queen's College. In the year 1824, when Mr. Sands Cox, the founder of the College, submitted to him the plan of the original institution, the doctor entered warmly into the scheme. He afterwards presided at the

opening lecture, and was a constant attendant during its entire course. On the plans for the school being matured, he accepted the office of president, and for a period of eighteen years was never absent from the Council Board. When, in 1836, the doctor entered his eightieth year, the Council deviated from its usual course, by fixing its anniversary meeting on his birthday, namely, the 26th of September. On the same occasion, a large body of the students presented Dr. Johnstone with an address. In the year 1840, he presided at the first meeting to found the Queen's Hospital, and although devotedly attached to the General Hospital, as the scene of his early labours, he not only gave the project his unanimous support, on the public ground "that an additional hospital was called for, from the fact that in this great central metropolitan district, intersected in all directions with railway communications, embracing within its range upwards of half a million of people, employed among the deleterious effluvia incident to many of the manufactures, hourly exposed to accident and disease from powerful machinery assisting the labour of man, and from mining operations, there existed only one such charity, opened in the year 1779, when the population of Birmingham did not exceed 50,000;" and he generously contributed £100 towards the building fund, at the same time accepting the office of Honorary Physician, which he continued to hold until the time of his death. On the incorporation of Queen's College, the doctor was appointed the first Principal.

To a highly-cultivated mind, and, as we have stated, eminent professional qualifications, Dr. Johnstone united a benevolence of heart, and a peculiar kindness and urbanity of manner, which endeared him to his patients and professional brethren, and won for him the esteem and respect of all classes.—*Medical Gazette.*

### HUGH STOTT, ESQ., OF BOROUGHBIDGE.

THIS gentleman died at Boroughbridge, in Yorkshire, where he had practised as a surgeon and general practitioner ever since the year 1810. He was apprenticed to his uncle, who practised there before him, and he received his diploma from the Royal College of Surgeons about the year 1805.

Mr. Stott was contemporary as a student in London with the late Sir Wm. Clark, surgeon, who died a short time ago at York. He was throughout his life devotedly attached to his profession, and continued in the active discharge of its duties to within a period of three weeks prior to his death. He was seldom known to be absent from his practice, for the purpose of relaxation or pleasure, even for a single day, and was frequently in the habit of riding thirty or forty miles on horseback, the only means of conveyance to his patients he ever used.

Mr. Stott did not die from any specific disease, but from gradual decay and continued fever. He was beloved by his friends, and esteemed and respected by all who knew him.

### DR. J. KIDD, OF OXFORD.

DR. KIDD was educated at Westminster School, whence he was in due course elected student of Christ Church, Oxford, at which college he graduated, taking his first degree in Arts in the year 1797, and his last in Medicine in 1804. Having obtained an extensive private practice, and become known in the University as Aldrichian Professor of Chemistry, and in the literary world as the author of several works on Geology and Mineralogy, he was raised in the year 1822 to the chair of Regius Professor of Medicine, an office which called forth the exercise of his professional powers in the preparation of courses of

lectures for the medical students of the University. He was also selected, under the Earl of Bridgewater's will, to write one of the treatises in that famed series. The title was "On the Adaptation of External Nature to the Physical Condition of Man"—a work which has enjoyed more popularity, and passed through more editions, than almost any of its fellows. Besides his well-known writings, he was an occasional contributor to the "Philosophical Transactions," and other leading periodicals of a kindred character. His pen, indeed, was seldom unemployed: at one time the able advocate of medical reform, at another the firm defender of whatever was excellent in the government or discipline of our time-honoured universities. He thus became the author of many keen and clever papers, which, being published anonymously, are now, perhaps, well-nigh forgotten, although they excited no little interest and attention while each particular scheme or project was under discussion. To the Regius Professorship is annexed the Mastership of Ewelme Hospital. A wish has been lately expressed to separate the two appointments; but, whatever opinions men may entertain upon this point, there can be but one as to the zeal and scrupulous fidelity with which the late master fulfilled his duties. The noble restoration of the hospital, and such part of the parish church as belongs to it, effected out of the funds some few years since, as well as the wise regulations made for the comfort and welfare of the bedesmen, are speaking witnesses. Dr. Kidd also held the office of Radcliff Librarian, for which he was well qualified both by erudition and taste.

Dr. Kidd was ill but a very few hours, and died of an affection of the heart. In private life, he was eminent for a purity and singleness of heart and simplicity of manners, which made him universally esteemed and respected. By his death, the poor have lost a benefactor who was ever ready to listen to their distresses, and no less prompt in affording them relief.

#### DR. WM. BRIGGS, OF CHELTENHAM.

DR. BRIGGS was born at Poulton-le-Fylde, in Lancashire, and received his first medical instruction from his father, who was the principal surgeon in that locality. In 1788, Dr. Briggs proceeded to Edinburgh, where he remained three years, and took his degree, having had the advantage of attending the lectures of Gregory, and of other medical celebrities of that period. In 1793, he settled at Kendal, but in 1805 removed to Liverpool, in consequence of the death of the elder Dr. Brandreth. In Liverpool Dr. Briggs rose to great eminence in his profession, and he remained there until the year 1833, when he retired from active practice. He returned to Westmoreland in 1834, and resided for fifteen years at Ambleside. Finally he removed to Cheltenham in 1841.

For the last ten years of his life Dr. Briggs was unable to use his left leg in consequence of a severe fall, and of a tendency to paralysis, and latterly he suffered very severely from spasmodic pains, chiefly in the injured limb. His death resulted from gradual exhaustion and decay of the vital powers.

During his residence in Kendal, Dr. Briggs took an active part in reforming the state of the gaol, of the workhouse, and more especially of the schools of that town. In 1797 he published his views upon the improvement of school teaching, and at various times during his life he employed his pen in publicly advocating the sanitary reform of towns, and other social improvements.

His eldest son was Dr. THOMAS BRIGGS, whose career and untimely death are recorded in the accounts of the ill-fated *Niger expedition* of 1832.

#### DR. R. D. PYPER, OF BRIGHTON.

DR. ROBERT DEVERELL PYPER was the eldest son of Robert Pyper, Esq., M.D., for many years Surgeon to the 4th (Royal Irish) Dragoon Guards; and was born at Tullamore, in the King's County, Ireland. He commenced his professional education at Nottingham, where he was a pupil of Henry Oldknow, Esq., the eminent surgeon of that town. Subsequently (in 1836) he was the first pupil entered in the books of the new medical school, then just established at

the Middlesex Hospital. He was there a successful competitor for various prizes, and for a considerable time the clinical clerk of Dr. Watson.

As soon as he had passed his examinations Dr. Pyper proceeded to Paris, and afterwards to Berlin, remaining on the Continent nearly two years. On his return to England he commenced practice in the West End of London, where he enjoyed the friendship and esteem of his medical brethren, more especially of the members of the Marylebone Medical Book Club, of which he was for some years secretary. During the intervals he could spare from his practice, he applied himself intensely to the study of his profession, and in 1848 he took the degrees of M.B. and M.D. at the London University, passing all the required examinations in the same year. The anxieties of medical practice, and the intense mental application which he underwent during this period of his life, originated, it is believed, organic disease of the heart. Finding his health failing, he, at the advice of his medical friends, retired from practice, and after spending a few months at Ventnor, in the Isle of Wight, proceeded to Brighton, where he resided for the last year and a half of his life. Whilst there, he had the misfortune to lose, by death, his only child, after which the cardiac symptoms became gradually worse, dropsical effusion ensued, and after long and intense suffering, borne with Christian patience, he died on the 26th of September, deeply regretted by all who enjoyed the pleasure of his acquaintance.

### DR. JOHN BARON, F.R.S., OF CHELTENHAM.

DR. BARON was born at St. Andrew's, on the 26th of May, 1786. His father was Professor of Rhetoric and Logic in that University, and was much distinguished for his learning and ability. After having commenced his education at a school in St. Andrew's, where he displayed much quickness and assiduity, the subject of this notice entered the University when only thirteen years of age. His studies embraced the classics, logic, mathematics, &c., as well as some branches of natural history, preparatory to his education as a physician, for which he was ultimately destined. In furtherance of this plan he was removed to the University of Edinburgh in 1801, being then in his fifteenth year. In December, 1803, he had the misfortune to lose his father. This occurrence was most disastrous in every way, and imposed upon him a great weight of responsibilities and duties, which much interrupted his professional studies, and materially injured his health, always delicate. He contrived, however, to prepare for the press and to edit his father's lectures, which were published in 1805. He likewise so applied himself to his own pursuits that he was enabled to pass the necessary examinations, preparatory to taking his degree, which he received in July, 1805, having scarcely completed his nineteenth year. The subject of his thesis was "De Nutritione Fœtus."

Dr. Baron remained at Edinburgh during the winter of 1806. A portion of the year following he spent in Lisbon, and after returning to Scotland, it was resolved, in 1808, that he should endeavour to settle himself in practice. With this view he went to London, where he had the good fortune to be introduced to the celebrated Dr. Jenner, by whom he was well received. He was also in constant intercourse with Dr. Baillie, who took much interest in his welfare, and selected Cheltenham as the place at which he should commence practice. He established himself there accordingly, and in 1809, being then only in his twenty-third year, he was elected (in great measure through the influence of Dr. Baillie) to the office of Physician of the Gloucester Infirmary, which had become vacant by the death of Dr. Roberts. He laboured very hard in his public duties, and availed himself of every opportunity for adding to the extent of his medical knowledge, particularly on the subject of pathological anatomy. He rose in public estimation, and was enabled to occupy an important station, as well as to acquire the friendship and regard of many of the most influential families of the district.

Dr. Baron continued in the closest intimacy with Drs. Jenner and Baillie up to the period of their deaths, and is well known as the author of the valuable

biography of the former. In 1819, he published his "Inquiry illustrating the nature of Tuberculated Accretions of Serous Membranes, and the Origin of Tubercles and Tumours in the different Textures of the Body;" and, in 1822, the "Illustration of the Inquiry" followed. Both works were translated into French by the celebrated Madame Ve Boivin. He was also a contributor of many valuable papers on Pathology and other subjects in the "Transactions" of various learned Societies, and in the Medical Journals.

We cannot say what particuilar disease Dr. Baron's death resulted from, but he had been in infirm health for a very considerable period. He was much respected by all classes in Cheltenham. His name, &c., appear in the *MEDICAL DIRECTORY* for 1851 as follows:—

### DR. H. H. FOX, OF NORTHWOODS.

HENRY HAWES FOX, M.D., was the second but eldest surviving son of Dr. Edward Long Fox, of Brislington House. He was born at Bristol January 5th, 1788, and commenced his medical education in 1804, at Glasgow, whence in the following year he removed to St. John's College, Cambridge, where he took the degree of Bachelor of Physic in 1811, after having studied for two years at the University of Edinburgh, in which place he filled the office of President of the Royal Medical Society. In the same year (1811) he established himself in Bristol, and speedily acquired such extensive practice, that after having been elected Physician to St. Peter's Hospital, he was in 1816, in company with the late Dr. Prichard, elected to the office of Physician to the Bristol Infirmary, by a larger number of votes than any candidate had before or has since received. He continued to follow his profession with assiduity and success until the year 1832, when he purchased the estate of Northwoods, in the county of Gloucester, on which he subsequently built an extensive Asylum for the Insane. In this establishment he is succeeded by his son, W. C. Fox, M.D., who had been for some years associated with him in its management.

### DR. R. L. HOOPER, LONDON.

It is with much regret that we have to record the death of Dr. Robert Little Hooper, who died on Friday the 7th instant, from concussion of the brain, consequent upon being thrown from his carriage, the horses having taken fright. Mr. Hooper commenced general practice about twenty-seven years ago, in the London-road, and for many years had one of the most lucrative and extensive practices on the Surrey side of the water. He was for a long period Assistant-Surgeon and Surgeon to the Queen's Prison; Surgeon to the parish of St. George the Martyr, Southwark, to the National Guardian Institution, Bedford-row, and to the Yorkshire School. Mr. Hooper, some time last year, took his degree of M.D. at Aberdeen, and, we believe, had retired from the more laborious duties of his profession, having lately taken an active partner. Dr. Hooper was well known to the Fellows of the Medical Society of London, at which he was a frequent attendant, and had filled several posts of honour in connexion with it. Dr. Hooper, for many years past, had been an active medical reformer, was one of the Council of the British Medical Associa-



tion, and belonged to the Committee of Poor-law Officers. He was an unflinching advocate of the rights of the profession, and indefatigable in his efforts to redress its wrongs. He will be deeply lamented by his bereaved family, and by a numerous circle of professional friends and patients, to whom he was endeared by kindness, urbanity, and integrity.—*Lancet*.

### JOHN DURANCÉ GEORGE, ESQ.

WE are extremely sorry to record the death of Mr. Durancé George, Lecturer on Dental Surgery in University College. Mr. George died after a few days' illness. His friends had for some time been alarmed by symptoms of threatened phthisis; lately, however, he seemed to have recovered his former health; and few of those who met him in society, or in his consulting-room, would have fancied that the germs of an approaching death were already rapidly maturing in a frame apparently so vigorous and strong. Mr. George received his medical education at University College, and was one of the most able students of his time. His fellow-students, often the keenest judges of each other's powers, were unanimous in expecting from him a professional career unusually brilliant. Nor did this expectation appear unfounded. Mr. George's abilities were not only of a very high order, but were of that kind which are most easily displayed by the possessor, and most readily acknowledged by the public. He possessed extraordinary quickness and readiness, considerable wit and fancy, and a natural eloquence which training and cultivation might have developed into oratory of a high order. Whether he possessed the more sterling qualities of judgment and depth, could only be known by the experience of his future career, and, unfortunately, perhaps, his path was not destined to lie in the direction his brother students anticipated and hoped. Immediately after the completion of his studies in 1839, Mr. George became a candidate for the office of Assistant-Surgeon to University College Hospital, but the late Mr. Morton was the successful applicant. Soon afterwards, Mr. George received an offer from his uncle, Mr. Cartwright, to join him in the management of his extensive practice. After some hesitation, he decided on accepting this offer, which, if it diverted him from the path of regular surgery, yet tempted him with the prospect of a brilliant and rapidly-acquired fortune. From 1840 to the time of his death, Mr. George became absorbed in an overwhelming practice as a dentist, and virtually disappeared from the professional arena. In 1843 he was appointed Lecturer on Dental Surgery at University College, and continued to hold this appointment till the period of his last illness. He had acquired a perfect knowledge of his art, and lectured upon it with great ability. The only literary production of Mr. George's known to us, is a short but admirable paper on the views of Prochaska, which was originally read before the Medical Society of University College, and was published in the *Medical Gazette* for 1838 or 1839. Mr. George died at the early age of 36. With the sorrow which his early professional friends feel for the loss of this man, so capable and so intelligent, is mingled a feeling that his real talents and powers were never displayed. In spite of his success in the path he had chosen, those who knew him as a student cannot but regret that he did not continue in the career he originally commenced. Useful and capable of scientific cultivation as his occupation was, it yet scarcely afforded him sufficient scope. He seemed so formed by nature and by education to occupy a commanding position in his profession, that any other appeared unsuited to him. But it does not become us to question the decrees which assign

to each man his appointed path. We wish only to do justice to the memory of one who was undoubtedly capable of greater things than it was his destiny to perform.—*Medical Times*.

### PATRICK WALSH, ESQ., OF NAAS, CO. KILDARE, SURGEON, R.N.

THE late Mr. Walsh, of Naas, in the county Kildare, was early in life educated and trained for the medical profession by his uncle Dr. Walsh, then a Physician of some note, resident at Kilbeggan, in the county Westmeath. He remained with this gentleman until about the year 1811, when he removed to Dublin, and completed his professional education at the Royal College of Surgeons there, then in the zenith of its fame. He subsequently qualified for an Assistant-Surgeon in the Navy, and after serving in that capacity for some years he was promoted to the rank of Surgeon. He continued in active service during the height of the war (for which in later years he received the medal and clasps that are designed as the honourable testimony of such service); but the baneful influence of a West Indian climate obliged him to return to his native air, invalided, and finally to retire altogether on half-pay.

When his health was somewhat restored Mr. Walsh settled at Naas, and speedily obtained a very respectable private practice, and in due time the public appointments of Surgeon to the Fever Hospital, Gaol, and Dispensary, to which was subsequently added the Workhouse. He was also during the whole period of his residence in Naas—upwards of thirty years—the medical attendant at the Clongowes Wood Roman Catholic College. The mental and bodily exertion such duties entailed, though easily borne in earlier days, made themselves felt as his years advanced and his infirmities increased, and he was at last compelled to relinquish practice in pursuit of health. He visited and resided some months at Leamington and elsewhere, and at last came to Dublin, where he spent the remainder of his life. During this short period he received from his oldest friends in the profession the kindest and most unremitting attention, all of them cheerfully bestowing their valuable time and professional skill to solace and mitigate the sufferings of his deathbed.

As a surgeon Mr. Walsh united professional ability with sound judgment; he possessed, moreover, a kindliness of disposition and goodnatured gaiety of manner which made him both popular and highly esteemed. He was the warm friend of medical reform, and willingly lent his efficient aid whenever it could be promoted. No member of the profession could possibly entertain a higher sense of the honour and dignity attaching to it than he did. Mr. Walsh was a Member of the Royal College of Surgeons of England and of Ireland.

### DR. JOHN BERNARD, OF CHARLEVILLE, CO. CORK.

DR. BERNARD, after having received the necessary education, and gone through the usual examinations, at the age of 22, entered the royal navy as Assistant-Surgeon in H.M.S. *Druid*, on the 6th August, 1808; in which ship he remained until the end of 1809, when he joined the *Polyphemus* in Jamaica, at that period bearing the flag of Admiral Rowley; he served in this vessel up to November, 1810, when he was promoted to the rank of surgeon, and appointed to H.M.S. *Arion*, in which he continued to serve in the West Indies and in the Mediterranean until 1815. In 1817, he graduated at Edinburgh, and in the following year settled in Charleville, county of Cork, where his professional attendance at Dispensaries and Fever hospitals, in connexion with a respectable private practice extending over a circuit of some twenty miles, made his labours somewhat excessive.

Dr. Bernard's attainments as a physician were of a high order. He was indefatigable in the pursuit of knowledge relating to his profession, and he further possessed the happy faculty of imparting such knowledge in an agreeable

manner to others; and there are many young medical officers now serving in the army and navy who owe much of their present usefulness to his abilities in this respect. Dr. Bernard was also remarkably humane, as the following facts testify:—When the cholera first visited Ireland he frequently, in returning home from his labours, picked up from the road-side unhappy wretched beings, placed there on straw to expire, by their alarmed relatives, and conveyed them in his carriage to the cholera hospital at Charleville; and more recently, during the dreadful famine and pestilence, his labours in behalf of the sufferers were unremitting. With the aid of an old and attached friend in London he procured from ten to twenty pounds weekly, besides supplies of food and clothing, which were carefully distributed through the medium of two charitable ladies, who generously assisted in carrying out his views, and by this means nearly three thousand human beings were kept from perishing.

Dr. Bernard was the medical preceptor of his orphan nephew, the unfortunate Sidney Bernard, the last medical officer who fell a sacrifice on board the pest-ship *Eclair*, after conducting her home to the Isle of Wight and to Stangate Creek.

In private life, Dr. Bernard was characterized by deep unaffected piety, and the exercise of virtues which endeared him to his family and friends. His death was rather sudden, arising from disease of the heart, followed by rapid hydrothorax. He has left two sons, both of whom are serving in the royal navy; one as surgeon, the other as assistant-surgeon.

### DR. ROGER GREEN, OF YOUGHAL, CO. CORK.

DR. GREEN was born at Youghal, County Cork, Nov. 4th, 1798, and educated at Dr. Bell's school in that town. He studied Anatomy at Cork for two years, under Dr. Woodroffe, and completed his medical education at Edinburgh, where he was private pupil of Professor Hamilton. On receiving his diploma, in August, 1826, he undertook a temporary charge at Wakefield, in Yorkshire, of the duties of Mr. Bennett, Surgeon, who was suffering from ill health. In the year following he returned to his native town and commenced practice. At this period he paid particular attention to the subject of Insanity, and in furtherance of his views, he was in the habit of constantly visiting the Cork Lunatic Asylum, then under the superintendence of Drs. Hallaran and Osborne. In 1832, the Asiatic cholera broke out at Youghal, when Dr. Green exhibited the most fearless self-devotion in his endeavours to stay its ravages. The local hospital was confided to him, jointly with three other physicians; but two of these gentlemen withdrew after awhile, and the third caught the disease, and died in one of the wards. Thus the sole charge devolved on Dr. Green, who for three months slept every alternate night in the hospital.

In 1833, he founded "The Youghal Literary and Scientific Institution," on the plan of one established at Waterford, by Thomas Wyse, Esq., M.P. His intentions were to diffuse in the town of his birth a taste for literature, science, and the fine arts, and he carried out his design with great ability. During the first two years of its existence there were three horticultural exhibitions, and one of paintings; the pupils in the drawing school exceeding eighty, and lectures were delivered on a variety of popular scientific subjects. This interesting association has since become defunct in all its departments, save one. As "The Youghal Horticultural Society" it still exists, and is the means of diffusing a spirit of improvement and progress in the surrounding district. In 1834 his active mind originated the plan of a Proprietary High School, modelled in great measure after the "Rochester and Chatham Classical and Mathematical Institution." He issued a prospectus, which was reviewed in the *Athenæum* (Dec. 20th, 1834), in the following flattering terms:—"We have before us the prospectus of a Proprietary School proposed to be established at Youghal; and the course of education which it propounds is one of the most enlightened, and will probably be one of the most useful of any that have yet been established in Britain." All further notice of Dr. Green is that of a physician rising in fame and prac-

tice, in proportion to his standing. The Cholera again appeared at Youghal in the summer of 1849, and Dr. Green was at his old post, in care of the hospital. He was elected physician of the Poor-Law Union in 1850, and his unremitting attention to his duties drew forth the admiration of all who witnessed it. While engaged in the discharge of these duties, he died of dysentery after a week's illness. Dr. Green was a man of taste, genius, and varied endowments, all which were felt and appreciated by those who enjoyed his friendship, or the pleasure of his acquaintance.

### DR. GEORGE GUMBLETON ROGERS, OF YOUGHAL, COUNTY CORK.

WE are not in possession of the particulars of this gentleman's early life and education. He obtained the degree of B.A. from Trinity College, Dublin, in the year 1806, and then proceeded to Edinburgh, where he studied for four years, and took his medical degree and midwifery diploma from that university in 1810. He afterwards commenced practice in Youghal, where he continued up to the time of his death, a period of forty-one years, during a great portion of which his practice was very extensive. He died from a general break up of his constitution, after five months' very severe illness. Dr. Rogers was a gentleman of very superior attainments, and highly accomplished, both as a physician and a private individual.

### DR. HENRY MARSHALL.

THIS truly excellent man, with whose person and worth many of our readers must have long been familiar, died on the 12th of May, after a protracted and painful illness. Dr. Marshall was born at Kilsyth in 1775: he studied medicine at the University of Glasgow, and in 1803 became surgeon's mate in the navy, a service which he soon left, and, in 1805, was appointed assistant-surgeon to the Forfarshire Regiment of Militia. In 1806 he became assistant-surgeon to the 1st battalion of the 89th Regiment, and proceeded with it to Ceylon, in which island he remained till the spring of 1821. In the same year he was appointed to the staff, and stationed at Edinburgh. After remaining here for two years, he was removed to Chatham, and from thence went to Dublin as surgeon to the recruiting dépôt; from that time till 1830, Dr. Marshall was actively engaged in his public duties. He was then gazetted as Deputy-inspector General of Army Hospitals, and retired on half-pay. About this time he settled in Edinburgh, where he afterwards remained. Few men have had the honour of doing so much substantial good as Dr. Marshall. We may safely say this. In the words of Dr. Craigie, "he not only performed the duties of the military medical officer in different climates in the most praiseworthy and conscientious manner, but did everything in his power to render his long and varied experience beneficial to his successors. He was the first to show how the multiplied experience of the medical officers of the British army, at home and abroad, might be applied, by methodical arrangement and concentration, and the use of computation, to furnish exact and useful results in medical statistics, medical topography, the geographical relations of diseases, medical hygiene, and indeed every branch of military medicine. He was the first not only to suggest this method of inquiry, but to show in what manner it could be carried into effect. Dr. Marshall must be regarded as the father and founder of military medical statistics, and their varied applications. He was further the steady and almost the only real friend of the common soldier, in exposing the multiplied and pernicious evils of intemperance, and showing how fertile a source it is of crime and military delinquencies and offences. Lastly, it is no less creditable to him that, through good and bad report, he stood forward as the indefatigable champion of humanity—as the advocate of a more rational and less degrading system of managing soldiers; and that, with judgment equal to his benevolence, he has laboured (and as we now know successfully) to demonstrate the cruelty as well as the absurdity of the ordinary methods so long pursued, by means of restraint,

coercion, torture, and punishment, and that, with great good sense, he has inculcated the principle, that in governing soldiers, they are amenable to the same arguments and considerations by which other men generally are influenced—all this, and much more, Dr. Marshall has done." Besides an immense number of valuable papers in medical and military journals, and in parliamentary reports and returns, Dr. Marshall published the following works:—"On the Medical Topography of Ceylon;" "On the Enlisting, Discharging, and Pensioning of Soldiers;" "The Military Miscellany;" "Description and Conquest of Ceylon;" "On the Feigned Diseases of Soldiers;" &c.—*Medical Times*.

### GEORGE PATON, ESQ., OF DUNDEE.

THIS gentleman served an apprenticeship to the late Dr. Hogg of Dundee, and completed his medical education at Edinburgh. He became a Licentiate of the College of Surgeons of that city in 1833, and immediately commenced the practice of his profession in his native town. His practice, though not highly remunerative, was a very extensive one, particularly in the Obstetric department. For two or three years prior to his death, the continual toil of professional life had been undermining a constitution never robust. An attack of fever, induced by over exertion, coupled with the fatigue occasioned by the visitation of the cholera, in 1849, produced evident symptoms of phthisis, of which disease he died on the 16th May, after having been confined to the house from the previous September.

Mr. Paton was of a retiring and unobtrusive disposition. He, however, possessed many amiable qualities, and his premature death is deeply regretted by a circle of attached friends.

### DR. D. M. MOIR, OF MUSSELBURGH.

DR. MOIR, of Musselburgh, the well-known "Delta" of *Blackwood's Magazine*, who expired suddenly at Dumfries, at two o'clock on Sunday morning, the 6th of July, had been long known alike in the medical and in the literary world, and his death has occasioned a sad blank in both. To the virtues of a Christian he added a gentle winning manner that made him beloved by all who knew him. His character is reflected in his poetry, which is ever sweet and pleasing, ever graceful and delicate in its fancies, and ever appealing to the purest and best emotions of the heart. Some of his poems belong to the very first class. As "Delta," Dr. Moir contributed to *Blackwood's Magazine* almost from its first starting, and he continued to do so to the end. His "Lament of Selim" appears in the number for July; and a melancholy interest attaches to it as being the last piece the lamented author ever wrote. As a critic of poetry, he stands deservedly high; and the crowded audiences who last winter attended his lectures on the poetry of the last half-century will long remember them as models of popular criticism—at once clear, condensed, and animated, and delivered with a manner that would have lent interest to far inferior criticism. Besides his bereaved wife, who for more than twenty years was the devoted sharer of his joys and sorrows, he has left a family of eight children; the eldest of whom is now the wife of Dr. Scott, who for many years has been the able and successful partner of his father-in-law. By all who knew him, and more especially by his fellow-townsmen, Dr. Moir was much beloved; and, at the urgent request of the inhabitants of Musselburgh, his funeral was a public one. It took place on Thursday, the 15th of July, at two o'clock, in the churchyard of Inveresk, and was attended by many of his friends and admirers in Edinburgh.

### JOHN GIBSON, ESQ., OF LANARK.

MR. GIBSON was born at Carstairs, in the neighbourhood of Lanark, and at an early period of life was apprenticed to the late Mr. Law. He prosecuted his

Medical and Surgical studies in Edinburgh up to May 1st, 1810, when he procured his Diploma from the College of Surgeons of that city. He forthwith commenced practice in Lanark, where his skill, tact, and kindness of manner, speedily gained him an extensive practice. This was continually on the increase, up to the period of his death, when he was confessedly the first practitioner of the town and neighbourhood. As an evidence of the estimation in which he was held by the inhabitants of Lanark, they twice elected him to the civic chair as Provost, in which position he devoted much of his time and energies to the furtherance of measures conducive to the interests of the Burgh. It was, however, as a medical practitioner that he was chiefly estimated, and it may be safely said, that no medical man has ever practised in Lanark, whose loss has been more widely and universally regretted.

## MEDICAL CHARITIES' ACT.

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As the Act for the "better distribution, support, and management of Medical Charities in Ireland" is now in full force, and seriously affects the interests of the medical and surgical practitioners of that country, we have inserted a reprint of its provisions in the DIRECTORY, believing that it will be found useful as a reference on all disputed points arising out of the operation of the Act.

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*An Act to provide for the better Distribution, Support, and Management of Medical Charities in Ireland; and to amend an Act of the Eleventh Year of Her Majesty, to provide for the Execution of the Laws for the Relief of the Poor in Ireland.*  
[7th August, 1851.]

WHEREAS it is expedient to provide for the better distribution, support, and management of certain of the medical charities in Ireland, and to amend for this purpose the provisions of an Act passed in the eleventh year of her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to provide for the Execution of the Laws for Relief of the Poor in Ireland;" be it enacted by the Queen's most excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the lords spiritual and temporal, and commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same,

### *I. Appointment of Commissioners to act with Poor Law Commissioners.*

That it shall and may be lawful for her Majesty the Queen, by warrant under her sign manual, from time to time to appoint two persons (one of whom shall be a physician or surgeon of not less than ten years' standing, and shall have the title of medical commissioner,) who, together with the commissioners appointed under the provisions of the aforesaid act of the eleventh year of her Majesty, shall, from the time of the publication hereinafter directed to be made in the *Dublin Gazette*, be "the Commissioners for administering the Laws for Relief of the Poor in Ireland," within the meaning of the aforesaid act, pursuant to and with the powers and authorities given by, the said act, and the several acts for the more effectual relief of the destitute poor, and also for executing this act, and such two persons so appointed under this act shall hold office during the pleasure of her said Majesty; and immediately on the publication aforesaid the office of assistant-commissioner created by the said first-mentioned act shall cease and determine; and in the absence of the chief commissioner for the time being in the said act mentioned the powers, duties, and functions of the said chief commissioner under the said act shall be exercised by such one of the other commissioners as shall be appointed so to act by a majority of the commissioners, with the approval of the lord-lieutenant of Ireland.

II. *Appointment of Commissioners to be published in Gazette.—Powers given by this Act how to be exercised.*

Notice of the appointment of such two persons by her Majesty shall be published in the *Dublin Gazette*, and on the day after the publication of the first appointment of such persons all the powers and authorities given by this act to the said commissioners for administering the laws for relief of the poor in Ireland shall take effect, and shall be exercised by them, in like manner as the powers and authorities given to the commissioners appointed under the said act of the eleventh year of her present Majesty: Provided always, that any order for the formation or alteration of any dispensary district or districts under this act, as hereinafter mentioned, or for framing or establishing any general rules or regulations relating thereto, or altering or revoking the same, shall be signed by not less than two of the said commissioners.

III. *Appointment of Inspectors.*

The said commissioners may from time to time appoint so many fit persons as the commissioners of her Majesty's Treasury shall sanction, being practising physicians or surgeons of not less than seven years' standing, to be inspectors to assist in carrying out the provisions of this act, and may remove all or any of the said inspectors, and appoint others in their place.

IV. *Salaries of Commissioners and Inspectors to be paid from any funds provided by Parliament for such purpose.*

There shall be paid to the said two commissioners to be appointed under the provisions of this act, and also to the said inspectors, such salaries as shall be from time to time appointed by the commissioners of her Majesty's Treasury, out of any monies which may from time to time be provided by Parliament for that purpose.

V. *No Medical Commissioner or Inspector to practise as Physician or Surgeon.*

Neither the medical commissioner nor any such inspector as aforesaid shall, while he continues in such respective office, practise as a physician or surgeon, or in any other professional capacity.

VI. *Power to Guardians to divide Unions into Dispensary Districts.*

The guardians of each union in Ireland shall, when so required by the said commissioners for administering the laws for the relief of poor in Ireland, with all reasonable despatch, divide such union into so many dispensary districts, having regard to the extent and population of such districts, as may to them appear necessary; and in case the said commissioners shall approve of the districts so formed by the said guardians, they shall issue an order under their seal declaring the same; and in case they shall not approve of the districts so formed by the said guardians, the said commissioners may and they are hereby empowered to issue an order under their seal declaring the districts which to them may appear necessary; and it shall be lawful for the said commissioners, and they are hereby empowered, when they may see occasion, from time to time to require the guardians to alter such districts, subject to the approval by order under seal of the said commissioners, and in case of their disapproval, or of the neglect of the guardians to make such alteration when required, the said commissioners may alter such districts by such an order; provided always, that in no case shall an electoral division formed under the acts for the more effectual relief of the destitute poor be divided; and from and after a day or days to be named in any such order the cost of all medical relief afforded within any such dispensary district to which such order shall relate, together with all the salaries and charges incidental to the same, shall be charged on the poor rates of the



electoral division or divisions comprised therein, according to the net annual value of each such division under the poor law valuation in force for the time being; and the said commissioners shall declare in such order the number and qualifications of the officers to be appointed for the service of each such dispensary district, and shall likewise declare in the said order the number of persons who shall be members of the committee of management of such districts, as hereinafter is provided.

#### VII. *Appointment of Dispensary Committee.*

Within one month after the receipt of the said order the guardians of the Union shall elect, if necessary, a sufficient number of ratepayers resident in each district, and liable to pay poor rates in respect of property therein of the net annual value of thirty pounds at the least, who, together with the *ex-officio* and elected guardians of the poor resident or being the owners or occupiers of property therein, shall be a committee for the management of the dispensary of such district, so that the number of the members of the said committee shall amount to the number named in the order of the said commissioners, and shall from time to time fill up any vacancies occurring after any general election of such committee; and the committee so appointed shall hold office until the appointment of a new committee after the next annual election of guardians in the said union; and at the first meeting of the guardians after such annual election, or as soon thereafter as conveniently may be, the committee of management for the said dispensary district shall be appointed in like manner for the ensuing year, and so likewise in each succeeding year.

#### VIII. *Guardians to provide Offices for Meetings, &c., and also Medicines, &c.—Committee of Management, with Approval of Commissioners, may appoint Officers, and with such Salaries as the Guardians, with like Approval, may determine.*

The guardians of the union shall, as soon after the receipt of the said order as conveniently may be, provide a house, building, room or rooms, to be used as a dispensary or office for the medical officer of each such district, and for the meetings of the committee of management, and shall provide such medicines and medical appliances as may be necessary for the medical relief of the poor in the said district, and the committee of management shall appoint, from time to time, subject to the approval of the said commissioners, one or more medical officers for the said district, with such qualifications as the said commissioners shall determine, and with such salaries as the guardians, subject to the approval of the said commissioners, shall determine; and the said commissioners may, and they are hereby empowered when they may see occasion, from time to time to regulate the amount of salaries or allowances payable to such officers respectively, and the time and mode of payment thereof; and it shall be lawful for the said commissioners to remove any such medical officer on sufficient grounds, and to direct the said committee of management to appoint another medical officer in his stead; and, on failure of the said committee to appoint a medical officer of such dispensary district for one month after the receipt of the direction of the said commissioners, it shall be lawful for the said commissioners to appoint such medical officer by an order under their seal.

#### IX. *Power to afford Dispensary Relief.*

Every member of such dispensary committee, and every relieving officer and warden acting for an electoral division included in such dispensary district, shall have power to afford medical relief by the issue of a ticket for medicine and advice, or a ticket, in such form as the said commissioners shall prescribe, addressed to the medical officer of the district, directing him to afford medicine and advice to or attend any poor person resident therein; and it shall be the duty of the medical officer to afford medicine and advice, or to attend such poor person, as thereby directed: provided always, that if any person who shall

obtain a ticket for medical attendance from any relieving officer or warden, or from any member of the committee, shall, at the next or any subsequent meeting of the committee after the issue of the ticket, be declared by a majority of the members then present not to be a fit object for dispensary relief, the ticket shall be cancelled, and the holder thereof disentitled to further relief.

*X. Other Provision made for Dispensary Relief to cease after day named in Order of Commissioners—Proviso as to County Infirmaries, &c. under 5 G. 3, c. 20 (I.)*

From and after the day to be named as aforesaid in the order of the said commissioners declaring any dispensary district, all provision now made by law for affording dispensary relief from poor rate, or by means of presentment from the county cess, shall, except for the purpose of defraying expenses incurred before such date, cease as to the baronies or portions of baronies or places included in such dispensary districts, and all funds and property derived or arising for the support of such institutions from bequests shall be applied to the support thereof according to the trusts on which such bequests were granted: Provided always, that where, under the provisions of an act of the parliament of Ireland passed in the fifth year of his late majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for erecting and establishing public infirmaries and hospitals in this kingdom," any allowance or stipend is now payable to any officer of a county infirmary or other medical institution, such respective allowance or stipend shall wholly cease to be payable to or to the use of such infirmary or medical institution under the provisions of the said act, when and as soon as the person holding such office at the time of the passing of this act shall wholly cease to hold the said office in the said infirmary or medical institution: Provided also, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to deprive of the benefit of aid from any parliamentary grant any infirmary or hospital in the city or county of Dublin now receiving such aid, so long as such aid shall continue to be granted by parliament.

*XI. Members of Committee of Dispensary not to be concerned in supplying Articles for use in Dispensary, under Penalty of 50l. and Costs.*

No guardian or member of the committee of management, paid officer, or other person concerned in the providing, ordering, management, control, or direction of the medical relief of the poor in any dispensary district, shall, either in his own name or in the name of any other person, provide, furnish, or supply for his own profit any medicines, instruments, furniture, or goods, for the use of any dispensary in any district for which he shall act in any such capacity as aforesaid, during the time for which he shall retain such office, nor shall during such time be interested, directly or indirectly, in any contract relating thereto, under pain of forfeiting the sum of fifty pounds, with the full costs of suit, to any person who shall sue for the same by action of debt or on the case in any of her Majesty's courts of record at Dublin.

*XII. Regulations as to Management of Dispensaries.*

The said commissioners shall and may, and they are hereby directed, with all reasonable despatch after the first appointment of commissioners under the provisions of this act, to frame general rules and regulations for the government of each dispensary district, and for the guidance and control of the guardians, the committees of management, and the several officers to be appointed in connection therewith respectively, and shall be empowered to alter or revoke such rules and regulations, and make such new rules and regulations, from time to time, as they may think fit.

*XIII. Regulations as to Vaccination—3 and 4 Vict. c. 29.*

The medical officer of every dispensary district constituted under this act shall and he is hereby required to vaccinate all persons who may come to him

for that purpose, subject to such regulations as may be issued by the commissioners in that behalf, and which regulations the said commissioners are hereby required to make and issue; and that from and after the declaration of any such dispensary district it shall not be obligatory on the board of guardians of the poor law union containing such district or any part thereof to make a contract with a medical practitioner for the vaccination of persons resident in such district, under the provisions of an act passed in the fourth year of the reign of her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to extend the Practice of Vaccination;" and after the appointment of a medical officer for such dispensary district all existing contracts theretofore made with the guardians under the authority of the last-mentioned act shall cease and determine, payment being made to such medical practitioner of such proportional sum for past services as may then be due to him.

*XIV. As to existing Medical Officers of Dispensaries.*

When, on the formation of any district under the provisions of this act, a medical practitioner shall be in possession of a medical office connected with any dispensary subject to the authority of the said commissioners, and situate in the locality included in such district, it shall be lawful for the commissioners, if they shall think fit, to declare him to be, in the first instance, the medical officer or one of the medical officers of such new district; and so likewise when two or more medical practitioners shall be circumstanced as aforesaid, in case the like number of medical officers is required in such new district, it shall be lawful for the said commissioners, if they shall think fit, to declare such persons to be the medical officers of such new district; but in case a smaller number of such officers shall be required for such district, then it shall be lawful for the said commissioners, if they shall see fit, to nominate such persons, or any of them, as the persons from whom a selection shall be made for a medical officer or officers under the provisions of this act, by the parties entitled to appoint to such office; and it shall not be necessary for the said commissioners, unless they think fit, to reject any such medical practitioner so in possession of any such office before the formation of such district, by reason of the want of such qualifications as may be required by them in other cases.

*XV. Salaried Medical Officers of Districts to attend at examination of dangerous Lunatics, and to give attendance at Bridewells within their districts.*

It shall be the duty of any salaried medical officer of a dispensary district under this act, or (if more than one) then the nearest of such medical officers, save in the case of his sickness or necessary absence, and then the other nearest of such medical officers, without any further fee or reward, to examine and certify under the statute in that behalf as to the case of any dangerous lunatic brought before a justice of the peace, within his respective district, when summoned by such justice so to do, and also to give his medical attendance and care, so far as shall be necessary, to the prisoners or inmates in any Bridewell or House of Correction situate within such respective district, and to supply to such prisoners and inmates the necessary medicines, the account of which medicines shall be submitted to the next meeting of the committee of such respective district, who shall make provision for the payment thereof; and it shall be lawful for the said commissioners, if they shall think fit, to take into account the probable extent of such extraordinary duties with respect to any such Bridewell or House of Correction, in fixing the amount of the salaries of the medical officers of such districts.

*XVI. Power of Commissioners and Inspectors to inquire on oath, or require a declaration.—Provisions as to the summoning of witnesses, &c. by Commissioners and Inspectors.*

The commissioners or any one of them, and also any such inspector acting in execution of this act, by summons under the seal of the commissioners, or under the separate hand and seal of any commissioner or inspector respectively, as the

ease may be, may require the attendance of all such persons as they or he shall think fit to call before them or any of them respectively upon any matter connected with the execution of this act, relating to any dispensary subject under this act to the authority of the said commissioners, at such time and place as shall be set forth in the summons, and may make inquiry and require returns, and may administer oaths, and examine all such persons upon oath, and may require and enforce the production upon oath of books, contracts, agreements, accounts, maps, plans, surveys, valuations, and writings, and copies thereof respectively, in anywise relating to any such matter as aforesaid; or when the commissioners, or any one of the commissioners, or any inspector, shall think fit, instead of requiring such oath as aforesaid, they or he may require any such person to make and subscribe a declaration of the truth of the matter respecting which he shall have been or shall be so examined: Provided always, that no person shall be required, in obedience to any such summons of any of the said commissioners, to go more than thirty statute miles from the place of his abode, or, in obedience to any such summons of an inspector, to go more than five miles from the place of his abode: Provided also, that nothing herein contained shall empower the commissioners or any commissioner or inspector to require the production of the title, or of any papers or deeds relating to the title, of any lands, tenements, or hereditaments, not being property under the authority of or vested in the said commissioners by this act: Provided also, that nothing herein contained shall authorize the said commissioners or any of them, or any such inspector, to exercise such powers of summons, inquiry, examination, or other such last-mentioned powers as aforesaid, in the case of any hospital, infirmary, or medical institution supported by private endowments, bequests, property, or subscriptions.

*XVII. Penalty for giving false evidence.—Penalty for refusing to attend to summonses or to give evidence.*

Every person who upon any such examination as aforesaid under the authority of this act shall wilfully give false evidence, or wilfully make or subscribe a false declaration, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor; and every person who shall refuse or wilfully neglect to attend in obedience to any such summons as aforesaid of the commissioners, or any one of the commissioners, or any inspector, or to give evidence as aforesaid, or shall wilfully alter, suppress, conceal, destroy, or refuse to produce any books, contracts, agreements, accounts, maps, plans, surveys, valuations, or writings, or copies of the same, which may be required as aforesaid to be produced for the purposes of this act, to any person authorised by this act to require the production thereof, shall be liable to forfeit a sum not exceeding five pounds, to be recovered before any justice or justices at petty sessions under his or their warrant, by distress and sale of the goods of the party so offending, returning to such party the overplus.

*XVIII. Inspectors to visit Dispensaries and attend meetings of Guardians, &c.—Commissioners and Inspectors to inspect and report upon Hospitals, &c. supported by public funds, rates, &c.*

Every inspector acting in execution of this act shall be entitled to enter at all times into and to inspect every dispensary or building used for the purposes of this act, and to attend the meetings of every board of guardians or dispensary committee, on all business arising in the execution of this act, and to take part in the proceedings, but not to vote at such meeting; and the said commissioners, or an inspector by their order in writing, shall be empowered (when they shall deem it expedient) to enter, inspect, and report upon any infirmary, hospital, or medical institution supported in the whole or in part by any public funds, rates, or assessments.

XIX. *Commissioners to execute in Ireland the Nuisances Removal and Diseases Prevention Act, 1848, (11 and 12 Viet. c. 123,) and the amending Act (12 and 13 Viet. c. 111).*

The said commissioners shall be the commissioners for executing in Ireland the powers and purposes of "The Nuisances Removal and Diseases Prevention Act, 1848," and an act of the following session of parliament amending the same; and all committees, inspectors, medical officers, and other persons appointed or employed under the powers of this act shall and they are hereby required, within their respective districts, to aid the guardians of the poor, and such officers or persons as they shall appoint or employ, in the superintendence and execution of any directions and regulations which may at any time be issued by the said commissioners for the time being, under the authority, and by virtue of, the said Nuisances Removal and Diseases Prevention Act, and the said act, amending the same, or under or by virtue of the provisions hereof in relation thereto: and all expenses which shall be incurred on account or in execution of the said last-mentioned act or acts, and chargeable upon the poor rates, shall hereafter be charged on the poor rates of the respective electoral division situate within such district, in like manner, and be ascertained, paid, and audited, in all respects as directed for the expenditure under the provisions and for the purposes of this act.

XX. *Annual Reports to be made to Lord Lieutenant, and laid before Parliament.*

The said commissioners shall once at least in every year submit to the lord lieutenant a general report of their proceedings under the provisions of this act, including the total expenses incurred in Ireland and in each union in carrying this act into execution in each year, together with a list of all districts and dispensaries under this act, and the total annual expense of each; and every such general report shall be laid before both houses of parliament on or before the thirty-first day of March in each year, if parliament be then sitting, or if parliament be not then sitting, within six weeks after the next meeting of parliament.

XXI. *Interpretation of Terms.*

In the interpretation of this act, the words "Lord Lieutenant" shall extend to and include the chief governor or governors of Ireland for the time being, and the word "Medical" shall be construed to extend to and include the word "Surgical," unless there be something in the subject repugnant to such construction.

XXII. *Commencement of Act.*

This act shall commence and take effect from and after the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one.

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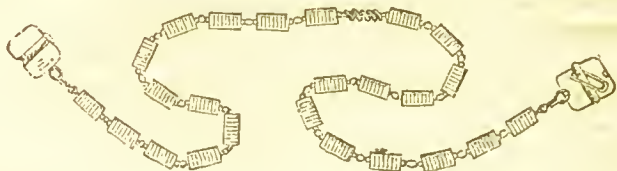
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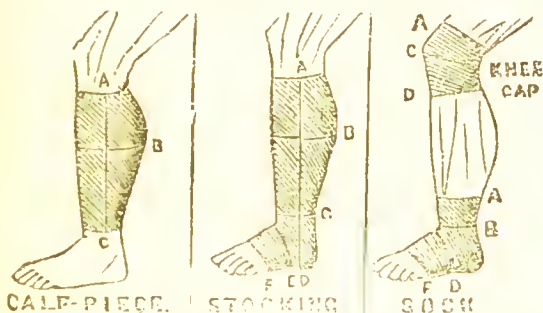
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
