TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE KESWICK URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL

Statistical and Social Conditions of the Area

Area (acres): 1,272.

Registrar-General's estimate of resident population:—4,350. mid-1964 — 4,410; mid-1963 — 4,600; mid-1962 — 4,590; mid-1961 — 4.630.

Number of inhabited houses: 1,654.

Rateable Value: £187,957.

Sum represented by a Penny Rate: £748.

The Tables of Vital Statistics are set out below, showing birth rates, death rates and rates for maternal and infantile mortality.

Crude birth and death rates are corrected by means of an Area Comparability Factor supplied each year by the Registrar General. They allow for varying age and sex distribution of the population in different areas and enable comparisons to be made with figures for other areas.

This year the factor for births is 1.12 and for deaths 0.83. The total live birth were 52. This corresponds to a birth rate of 12.0 per thousand of the population (13.4 corrected), compared with 13.8 in 1964. Six of the births were illegitimate.

There were no deaths of infants under 1 year of age. There were no still births.

There were no deaths due to pregnancy and childbirth, and no deaths from tuberculosis.

Deaths at all ages were 89, an increase of 4 on 1964.

Deaths from cancer fell from 15 in 1964 to 13 in 1965.

Infectious Diseases

The total number of cases of infectious disease notified in 1965 was 4, all measles.

There were no notifications or deaths from Diphtheria, Poliomyelitis, Typhoid Fever, Puerperal Pyrexia, or Food Poisoning.

Diphtheria, Whooping Cough and Tetanus.

Immunisation against these diseases is usually combined by means of a triple vaccine, and during the year 39 children completed a full course of three injections. Booster doses were given to 86 children.

POLIOMYELITIS.

The figures show those having had 2 doses of Vaccine, those having completed a course of three, and those who have had four doses. All protection now is by means of the Sabin oral vaccine.

B.C.G. Tuberculosis.

Mantoux skin testing and B.C.G. vaccination was continued in 1965, the age groups being those born in 1952. The table gives detailed figures. 61 children were tested and 5 (8.2%) were found to be positive reactors.

The remaining 56 negative reactors were given B.C.G. vaccination. This figure of 8.2% for positive reactors again shows a welcome decrease on last year.

Smallpox.

A total of 45 vaccinations were carried out during the year, the majority being young adults.

The vaccination of adults will be performed at the County Council clinic upon request.

General Provision of Health Services in the Area.

Sanitary Circumstances of the Area

WATER SUPPLY

The supply from the ghylls was ample at all times and no difficulty was experienced in maintaining supplies.

The Consulting Engineers continued their work in the preparation of a scheme to be undertaken jointly with the West Cumberland Water Board, for the improvement of the water supplies in Keswick and adjoining parishes.

36 samples of water were submitted for analysis during the year, 32 of which were regarded by the analyst as highly satisfactory.

All houses in the district have a water supply inside the house.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE

The improvement and reconstruction of the sewage disposal works was substantially completed by the end of the year.

The County Engineer is now considering a scheme to relieve certain sewers which are surcharged with storm water in periods of heavy rain.

The sewers generally in the district are adequate and give very little trouble.

Scavenging and Removal of Refuse.

This service runs at a loss and consequently a good deal of material which could be salvaged is disposed of on the refuse tip.

In 1955 the Council received £8 per ton for mixed paper. In 1964 the price dropped to £6 and it now stands at £7 per ton. During this time costs have continued to rise and unless the price received for the waste paper can be related more directly to costs of collection it is clear that collections will have to be curtailed.

The salvage of paper and cardboard was continued during the year and comparative figures of sales in the past five years are as follows:—

The price paid for paper was increased from £6-10-0 to £7-0-0 per ton on the 1st January, 1965.

A total of 46 factories are entered in the Factories Register, 12 inspections were made of these premises during the year.

THE OFFICES, SHOPS AND RAILWAY PREMISES ACT, 1963

The following is a report of the work done in connection with this Act during the year:—

On the 31st December, 1965, 163 premises were registered. During the year 95 visits have been made for purposes of the regulations. In general the bulk of requirements requested for compliance have been met. Two or three premises still await structural alterations to achieve the requisite standard.

No prosecutions have been made. Good results have followed tact and quiet persuasion. Public Health visits have been found useful and helpful in assisting with the necessary un-announced calls.

Lighting.

- 1. The majority of premises have a good standard of either natural or artificial light. No really poor standard was encountered.
- 2. Of the premises which could have made a better provision the toilets of Public Houses in particular need attention. Vandalism is an additional problem in such premises. Premises badly lit can often lower the whole standard of cleanliness and maintenance.
- 3. No specific standards of lighting have been recommended to occupiers.
 - 4. Cases of excessive glare have not been noticed.

The detailed information requested for the month of November, 1965, dealing with the measurement of light in lumens at premises is not available, the equipment needed to provide such information is not at our disposal.

PREVENTION OF DAMAGE BY PESTS ACT, 1949

The Council employees undertake treatment as recommended. The sewers were treated several times during the year. Treatments were also carried out at 10 private house.

The refuse tip is sited very close to the Council's Derwentwater Caravan and Camping Sites and pest control is therefore very important in this area. The Council engaged Messrs. Rentokil Laboratories Ltd., with a Contract to deal with rats and flies and these pests were kept well under control during the year.

CARAVAN SITES

There are four licensed caravan sites in the district and these were inspected on many occasions.

CARAVAN SITE

The Council's Derwentwater site continued to operate successfully.

CAMPING SITE

The Derwentwater Camping Site which is being developed by the Council continued in operation.

Housing

FLATS AT GRETA COURT

This is a scheme comprising 42 flats on the disused allotment gardens at the Headlands. Twenty-three of these flats were completed and occupied by the end of the year.

DERWENT CLOSE FLATLETS

The 20 aged persons flatlets at Derwent Close continued to serve a very useful purpose.

The Council own a total of 389 houses, of which 258 are post war houses.

Improvement Grants

12 applications were received for Improvement Grants and Grants were made in all cases. All the applications were in respect of owner occupied premises.

This is an increase of 1 application over last year's figure.

Rent Act, 1957.

No applications were received for Certificates of Disrepair and no action was taken by the Council under this Act.

Inspection and Supervision of Food

MILK AND DAIRIES

32 milk samples were submitted to the analyst.

Under a local arrangement made in this County, the inspection work is still being carried out by the local Public Health Inspectors and 32 such inspections were made during the year.

Meat and Other Foods

There are no slaughter houses in the Urban District, all meat is transported from abattoirs outside the district.

The following is a brief summary of food stuffs for which certificates of unsoundness were issued by the Public Health Inspector.

178 lbs. Cooked Meat, 111 small cartons Yoghurt, and 125 tins of various foods. These food stuffs were removed by the refuse collectors and buried at the refuse tip.

FOOD HYGIENE REGULATIONS

The work of inspection of food premises continued during the year.

In 1964 a prosecution was brought against a caterer when fines totalling £55 plus costs were imposed and the caterer was disqualified from participating in the management of a catering business for two years. The cafe was closed down but in April, 1965, it was opened up again for business. The Council then instituted proceedings against the owner occupier of the cafe for breach of the disqualification order. In court the caterer argued that the cafe was now being managed by her husband and she was taking no part in the running of the business. Although the Council proved that she was still living above the cafe with her husband and was the occupier of the premises for rating purposes and was still stamping the various insurance cards as employer, the court held that she had not committed a breach of the Order and dismissed the case.
