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### R E P O R T of the ACTING MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH.

During the Year 1942 there have been no real epidemics and the number of infectious fevers notified has dropped from 241 in 1941 to 46 in 1942, and of these 46 cases, 33 were Scarlet Fever.

The number of Tuberculosis cases has dropped from 13 in 1941 to 8 in 1942.

The birth rate remains roughly the same as in 1941, but the death rate has dropped from 153 in 1941 to 121 in 1942. This satisfactory decrease is undoubtedly due to the recent medical discoveries, increased employment, and better food conditions (both quantity and quality).

Among the outstanding improvements of the medical and Health Services during the year are the following.

- (a) Increased cubicle accommodation at the Isolation Hospital so that more than one disease can be treated at the same time.
- (b) A wholesome supply of water now available to the residents of Alvington from the Lydney Water Supply.
- (c) Improvements in the sanitary accommodation at the Lydney Bathurst Swimming Pool.
- (d) A serious epidemic of scables and impetigo abated by the Council supplying free, the necessary medical agents.
  Other interesting facts of the Health Services are :-
- (a) The Casualty Services of the Civil Defence have kept up their attendance, training and efficiency during these long months of inactivity.
- (b) There has not been one case of infectious fever notified from the London C.C. Training Ship "Exmouth" since their arrival in this town early in 1940 which speaks well for the health of the "Ship".
- (c) By the end of 1942, over 92% of the school children in the Lydney Rural District had been immunized against Diphtheria and I doubt if any other records in the County can show such good results.

### "ANNUAL REPORT"

I have the honour to submit for your consideration my Annual Report for the Year 1942.

### HOUSING.

Regarding Housing Repairs, this is a most difficult problem, and I am very much concerned with the condition detrimental to health existing at some properties, owing to the fact that very little of the repairs scheduled have been carried out. Owners of properties are unable to carry out repairs owing to the shortage of labour and materials.

The present state of affairs which permitted the calling to the colours of Building Trade Operatives without due regard to their usefulness in civil life creates a serious affect on the condition of the existing houses, particularly of the poorer classes.

45 inspections of unfit houses were made during the year. Minor repairs were carried out to 25 houses, these repairs do not render the houses in all respects fit for human habitation.

In accordance with Circular 2156 from the Ministry of Health the Council renewed the six-month licences granted to owners of the following properties:-

### SEWAGE.

Sewage samples were taken from the Disposal Plant at Clanna House, Alvington, and submitted to the Public Analyst with unsatisfactory results.

### MILK.

Methods of providing a clean safe milk to the public have been severely tested under existing conditions.

Lack of skilled labour and difficulty of securing sufficient labour has proved a very hard problem.

Complaints were received of the inferior keeping quality of the milk at some farms, particularly during the summer months.

In many cases it was traced to bad production methods, such as (a) failure to cool (b) wet handed milking (c) dirty udders and also in the winter months to the black-out.

Under the National Milk Testing and Advisory scheme every assistance was given to the Dairy Instructresses in operating the scheme.

Under the Milk & Dairies Order, 1926, and various Circular letters received from the County Council, 30 milk samples were taken from non-designated premises and submitted to the analyst at the Royal Infirmary (Department of Bacteriology & Pathology) Gloucester. 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The action taken by the Council on the 20th June, 1941, in entering into a three-year-agreement with the Gloucestershire County Council for the destruction of rats at the Lydney and Aylburton Refuse Tips against this danger to public health is proving satisfactory.

During several visits to the above refuse tips few rats were seen. The work carried out by Mr.J.C.Brocklebank the County Pests Officer in dealing with the infestation is making good progress.

### ANTI-GAS LECTURES & INSTRUCTION.

As L.A.R.P. Instructor in Air Raid Precautions, full Anti-Gas Lectures and Instruction were given to trainees in the district. Courses in "Individual Training (First Stage)", i.e., Elementary Training in A.R.P. Organisation, Incendiary Bomb Control, Protection against High Explosive Bombs etc., were also given.

### St.Briavels & Hewelsfield Housing.

During the absence of the official rent collector who is in H.M. Froces, I have carried out the duties of rent collecting, and I am very pleased to report that there was no rent arrears for year ending 31st December, 1942.
