


#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE.

Board Room, Yarmouth Hospital,

June 25th, 1857.

THE REPORT, which the Committee are enabled to make of the operations and prospects of the Yarmouth Hospital and Dispensary at the close of the nineteenth year of its existence, though in many respects a satisfactory one, is presented under circumstances which cannot but excite feelings of anxiety and regret.

It is a subject of sincere gratification that the benefits conferred by the Institution during the past year upon the sick and suffering poor, have been quite as great as in any previous year of its history. The privileges of the Subscribers have been exercised almost to their full extent, and the advantages which the Hospital offers have been eagerly sought and duly appreciated. The Medical Officers have discharged the duties which they have voluntarily and gratuitously undertaken with great kindness and efficiency; and those duties have been more onerous than usual, in consequence of the resignation of one of the Surgeons, whose place has not yet been supplied. The arrangements which the Committee were obliged to make for filling up the office of House Surgeon by the appointment of a Dispenser not duly qualified to practice, and which received the sanction of the last general Meeting, continues to give them perfect satisfaction; and they believe that the Institution is in all respects, so far as its management is concerned, perfectly competent to fulfil the benevolent objects for which it was established.

Some few changes in its present laws have been thought desirable, of which notice has been given, and which will be brought forward at the present Annual Meeting. Of these the Committee would strongly recommend for adoption that which reduces the number of Governors whose presence is necessary to sanction any future alterations, because the difficulty of securing the attendance of twenty subscribers of two guineas and upwards has been found so great as to render it impossible to amend any regulation however strongly experience may have proved the necessity of doing so.

THE Committee do not feel it necessary to offer any observations on the other proposals which have been made, though they all refer to details in the government and management of the Institution, and are well worthy the attentive consideration of the Governors and Subscribers.

An addition has been recently made to the Library of the Hospital, by the presentation of a copy of the Report made to the Secretary at War on the Pathology of the Diseases of the Army in the East, together with some other books, by the Lord High Steward of the Borough; and the Committee have much pleasure in referring to this fact, as a proof that the Library has not been lost sight of, and as an encouragement to those who may have the opportunity of increasing the number of useful volumes upon its shelves.

THE Committee desire to call the serious attention of the Governors and Subscribers to the very unsatisfactory state of the Institution in a financial point of view. The policy of the Committee has always been to add such Legacies as may from time to time have been bequeathed to the Hospital to its funded stock; and it is most desirable that the capital so accumulated should be increased as opportunity offers, and that it should never be diminished. It will be impossible, however, to adhere to this system unless a considerable addition to the amount of annual subscriptions can be obtained; and the Committee have reason to fear that a considerable falling off in that amount will be

experienced during the year which has now commenced. death or removal of eight Subscribers since last June, will entail a loss of £16 16s. Od., to meet which the Committee are not aware of more than £2 2s. Od. as likely to be received from new Subscribers. The regular income of the Institution, together with the donations and legacies received up to the 14th of May last, would have fallen far short of its expenditure; and though the generosity of an anonymous benefactor, (who presented through Messrs. Barclay and Co. the handsome donation of £50.) has for the present enabled the Committee to meet this difficulty, they look forward with much anxiety to their financial position during the current year, though they trust that it only requires to be more generally known, that an Hospital so benevolent in its object, and so beneficial in its operation, is in urgent need of additional support, to secure for it such an increase to its funds as may enable it to maintain the very important position which it occupies among the charitable Insitutions of the town.

The CHAIRMAN having briefly stated the business to come before the Meeting, and the advertisement calling the Meeting having been read:—

The Rev. B. VAUX read the Report, and the ACCOUNTANT read a Statement of the Accounts for the past year.

Mr. R. Ferrier then moved and Mr. S. C. Marsh, seconded "That the Report now read be received and adopted; and that the same, together with an Abstract of the Accounts, a list of the Subscribers and Benefactors for the past year, a list of the Officers for the ensuing year, and such other details as usually accompany the Report, be printed and circulated."—motion carried unanimously.

Mr. W. Worship moved and Mr. H. Boulter seconded:—
"That the present Officers and Committee be re-elected."—
motion carried unanimously.

Mr. J. G. FISHER moved and Mr. B. Dowson seconded:—
"That the words in the 10th rule, 'for which purpose 20 Governors at the least shall be present,' be expunged, and the words, 'for which purpose 15 Governors at the least shall be present,' be inserted in lieu thereof."

Mr. W. Worship moved and Mr. R. Barber seconded an amendment:—

"That the present rule be not altered."—amendment put, 13 for—9 against. Amendment carried.

The Rev. B. Vaux moved and Mr. S. C. Marsh seconded:—
"That the 5th rule be expunged and the following substituted in lieu thereof:—

"That there be a Committee of Governors for the management of the affairs of the Hospital and Dispensary; which Committee shall include a President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and eight other Governors, all of whom shall be elected annually, at the General Board in June; and that in addition to such elected members, the Physician and all the Surgeons of the Hospital shall be ex-officio members of the Committee. That the election of the President, Vice-President, Treasurer, and Secretary be by nomination in the usual way; that the election of the eight elected Governors shall be by the Governors and Subscribers present handing to the Chairman for the day lists of names not exceeding eight of the Governors eligible for the Committee. And that the eight Governors having the majority of votes

according to rule eight, shall be of the Committee for the following year and shall be re-eligible."—motion carried unanimously.

Rev. B. VAUX moved and Mr. W. RISING seconded:-

"That the words 'Mondays, Thursdays, and Saturdays,' in the last two lines of the 18th rule be expunged, and the words 'Tuesdays and Saturdays' inserted in lieu thereof: and that the words 'Monday, Thursday, and Saturday,' in the 28th rule, be expunged, and the words, 'Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday' inserted in lieu thereof."

Mr. W. N. Burroughs moved and Mr. R. Ferrier seconded an amendment:—

"That the question be adjourned,"

The amendment and the motion were put to the meeting and the Chairman declared the motion to be carried by a majority of 12.

It was moved by Mr. B. Dowson and seconded by Mr. R. D. Barber:—

"That Mr. Charles Palmer be elected a Surgeon of the Hospital, in the room of Mr. C.B. Dashwood, resigned.—elected unanimously.

Mr. C. L. Chipperfield was re-appointed Accountant.

Mr. W. H. Palmer moved, and Mr. J. G. Fisher seconded, and it was carried unanimously:—

"That the thanks of this Meeting be given to those Ministers who have preached sermons in aid of the Hospital funds during the past year."

Rev. B. Vaux moved, and Mr. W. H. Palmer seconded, and it was carried unanimously:—

"That the thanks of this Meeting be given to Dr. Dunne and the Medical Officers of this Institution for their valuable and efficient services."

Mr. S. Dowson moved and Mr. J. D. Waters seconded a vote of thanks to the Chairman, and the Meeting terminated.


