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LINCOLN LUNATIC ASYLUM.

NINETEENTH REPORT.

Since the publication of the last Annual Report, the situation of House Surgeon has become vacant by the retirement of Mr. William Smith, who has entered upon the duties of House Surgeon of the Lincoln County Hospital. Mr. William Graham has been appointed to succeed in the vacant office, and has given much satisfaction to the Board, and every promise of future usefulness.

The avoidance of Instrumental Restraint, as well as of Solitary Confinement, still continues; and a remarkable confirmation of the principle has occurred, from the circumstance of the Board having ordered a register to be kept of every instance of Manual Detention continued longer than ten minutes. The desperate struggle, which used to occur for the purpose of inflicting the instruments, might easily extend beyond ten minutes; and yet only three instances of manual detention to that extent, have been found necessary during twenty-four successive months. The Boards submitted to have their time occupied in listening to the evidence of persons, discharged for misbehaviour towards the Patients; who endeavoured to justify their own conduct by exaggerations and mistatements; and among other matters affirmed, that it had been necessary to subject the Patients to manual detention for days together.

On the resignation of the House Surgeon, the Board passed the following resolutions.

Dec. 5, 1842. Resolved, on the motion of Dr. Charlesworth, seconded by Mr. R. G. Hill,

"That this Board, on the retirement of Mr. William Smith, cannot omit the opportunity of expressing its acknowledgments, for his having conducted the personal management of the Patients of this house, without a single instance of personal restraint, and, at one period, under peculiar difficulties, from the want of adequate and experienced attendants."

"That the best acknowledgments of this Board are due to Mr. William Smith, for his having latterly laid down and adopted in practice, the broad principle, that Solitary Confinement ought to be utterly abolished."

During the year a question has arisen, as to the extent of authority over the Patients, vested in the medical department; and the General Board thought it right, under the circumstances, to set all such questions at rest for the future; and at the same time to negative a variety of malpractices in treatment, either very long disused in this house, or never introduced at all into the system pursued there; but yet not formally forbidden by any express order of the Board, and therefore remaining matters of opinion, or discretion, as regarded their employment.

Jan. 11, 1843. Resolved, on the motion of the Rev. W. M. Pierce, seconded by Sir Edward Ffrench Bromhead, Bart., V. P.

"That the practice of the Medical Officers of this house is not arbitrary, or wholly discretionary, but is to be exercised under the Rules and the Orders of the Board, and within such limits, and on such principles, as this Board shall define."

"That the Board has always acted herein with the greatest reserve and caution, and not without reference to medical authority, and the results of medical experience in this house and elsewhere; and that the most ample latitude has been allowed to inquiry, and to the use of any tone of language and action, however hostile towards the Board, and the character and interests of the house."

Resolved, on the motion of Sir Edward Ffrench Bromhead, Bart., V. P., seconded by Mr. C. F. Sutton,

- "That, under the present circumstances, the Board thinks it proper to express its sentiments upon certain points of practice to be observed in this house."
 - 1 "That this Board disapproves and disallows the use of Fermented Drink, as part of the ordinary diet of the Patients, or under the plea of supporting strength during any employment; leaving, as heretofore, the widest discretion to the Medical Officer, in the use of wine and porter, for cases seeming specially to require the use thereof; and that this Board is fully determined to maintain the nutritious and substantial diet, substituted some years ago for the use of Fermented Drink."
 - 2 "That this Board is more and more confirmed in its reprobation of Instrumental Restraint, and in its previously expressed opinion to estimate the competency of its Officers, by the disposition shown to avoid the use of Instruments and other violent processes, and to avoid Seclusion as a means of coercion."
 - 3 "That the introduction into this house, of the 'Whirling Chair,' the 'Bath of Surprise,' the 'Douche,' and other such violent and abrupt practice towards the Patients, is hereby interdicted."
 - 4 "That no system of warming this house, by which the Patients may breathe a heated atmosphere, be introduced."
 - 6 "That the practice of 'Shaving the heads' of Lunatics, 'Blood-letting,' the 'Cold Bath,' 'Baths above blood heat,' the process of subduing violence by the use of 'Tartarised Antimony' or of 'Narcotics,' the practice of enforcing sleep by Opiates, and courses of Drastic Medicines, are hereby interdicted, except in special cases otherwise medically requiring the same."

"A Letter from the late House Surgeon, having been read as follows,"

LINCOLN LUNATIC ASYLUM, JAN. 11, 1843.

Gentlemen,

I cannot take leave of your invaluable Institution, in which I shall never cease to feel the deepest interest, without

reconsidering an opinion I have lately entertained, of a benefit from Stimulants, in the ordinary diet of the Insane. A more mature experience of the practice of this house, aided by careful inquiries and the practical views of many well informed persons, has convinced me that stimulating drink (except there should be any special cases medically requiring it) must further exhaust the already impaired nervous system of the Insane; and that the surest means of restoring and sustaining a healthy tone, will be found in nutritious aliment, fresh air, warm clothing, dry lodging, and other means of the same nature well known in this house. I will venture to express my belief that the substantial nutritious dietary of the Lincoln Asylum, is not surpassed in any other public Asylum in this kingdom; -and, while I contemplate the spacious Day rooms, warmed with open fires kept up throughout the summer months, when the season is cold or damp; the broad extensive Galleries for exercise in wet weather; the Boarded floors in every room throughout the house; the cheerful Grounds and ample Courts; the total abolition of the depressing influence of Instrumental Restraint, and of Solitary Confinement as an alternative; with other notable improvements, in which this Institution has taken so conspicuous a lead; I would respectfully deprecate any attempt at returning to the system of Stimulants, and the withdrawal of the increased allowance of Animal Food, so happily substituted in this place.

Resolved,—"That the same be entered on the Minutes, and that Mr. Smith be thanked for his communication."

The improvements in the treatment of the Insane, have here-tofore been more in the general economy of their management, and the negativing injurious practices, than in any positive medical means; which must generally depend upon the source of the disease in each case. The greatest benefits however have arisen from the clear stage thus left to nature, under a careful attention to the general health. It is quite remarkable to observe

how a regular and sober general management, tends to diminish all the more striking evils, which are so prominent in these institutions; and which render the management in such cases so painful and so very difficult. The evils assume a milder and more manageable form, or almost wholly melt away without any very defined reason, under a sound general economy; though the greatest efforts and most ingenious expedients had previously been resorted to in vain. Such inconveniences must however more or less exist at all times; and it would be of great public benefit to collect into one focus and publish, all the minor contrivances, which experience has suggested for meeting these difficulties. It is hoped that the Medical department, and the Board of this Asylum, will endeavour to accumulate materials on these points for future reports; and it is not improbable that other heads may occur to them, not enumerated among the following.

- 1 Excitement and violence.
- 2 Insomnolence,
- 3 Noisiness.
- 4 Abusive, profane, and obscene language.
- 5 Mischievous tricks, tearing cloths, undressing, &c.
- 6 Treachery.
- 7 Suicidal propensities.
- 8 Refusing food.
- 9 Depraved appetites for food.
- 10 Depressing habits.
- 11 Irretention by the bowels.
- 12 Irretention by the bladder.
- 13 Bedridden.
- 14 Crippled.
- 15 Sinking, and extreme debility.
- 16 Fits.

The practice of Monthly Assemblies for the amusement of the Insane during the Winter Season, seems to be extending to other Institutions; and it may therefore be worth while to mention, that the comparative dullness of the male side of the house on these occasions, has been removed by the introduction of Female Children, who appear to enjoy much joining in these dances, and apparently with less fear than any other persons of their own sex, who may

be present. Dr. Pritchard's able Report of the Northampton Asylum, just issued, mentions that there the time for closing the scene is announced by the National Anthem.

The Board has been desirous that the Tables, appended to their Reports, should be as full, accurate, and candid as possible. These are actually necessary to elucidate the true state of the house, and the statistical results of practice. Every Board honestly desirous to serve the public, and advance this most important branch of science, will fearlessly and unhesitatingly state the real facts, without any attempt to soften appearances, totally relying on upright intentions. Suicides should not be disguised under other names; and on this point the Board has been most scrupulous. The cases of Recovery should not be exaggerated, nor the proportion of deaths mystified, by any loose statement affecting the amount of Re-admissions. The Accounts should invariably be furnished, as indicating the general economy of the house, and numerous points of treatment, the scale and rate of expenditure of the Household, and the amount of property wasted under the guise of profitable employment, requiring increased capital, and enhancing the rates of charge. The Tables should also be retrospective, fairly indicating either progress or regression in the management, and offering very valuable statistical results, for drawing general conclusions. Publicity and the public eye, reaching every recess of the establishment, are the only ground to be permanently depended upon, against the growth of errors and abuses. Every false step (and the best intentions may make many) which may be kept back from the public, is a beacon and warning lost to other establishments.

The attention of the Governors is requested to a new table, adopted with variations from the noble national establishment at Hanwell, forming a return of the daily state of the Patients.

#### EXTRACTS FROM THE RULES.

#### BOARDS.

An Ordinary Board of the Governors is held Weekly at the Asylum, on Monday, at One o'clock.

A General Board of the Governors is held Quarterly on the second Wednesday in January, April, July, and October, at Twelve o'clock.

#### ADMISSION OF PATIENTS.

The Ordinary Board regulates the admission of Patients.—The Forms of Admission, with other necessary information, are immediately supplied to applicants, by the Secretary or House. Surgeon.

The House-Surgeon, during the intervals of the Boards, may, on emergency, provisionally admit Patients who have complied with the necessary Forms, subject to the opinion of the Physician.

Where any difficulty occurs in conducting Patients to the Asylum, the Physician may send a confidential Attendant for the purpose; for which no charge is made beyond the expenses incurred.

The following are the usual terms for Board, Lodging, Attendance, and Medical Treatment.

Special Contracts may be made for extra Attendants and Diet.

A "Deposit of six weeks' payment," and a "Payment in advance up to the next Quarter day," are required with each Patient on admission.—The Friends may advance for any additional Quarters, if more convenient.—The Quarter Days fall on the first day of January, April, July, and October, respectively.—On the removal or death of any Patient, the amount due to the Institution is deducted, and the surplus returned.

#### OFFICIAL VISITING.

A "Governors' Memorandum Book" shall lie upon the Board Room Table, for their remarks at such times as they shall think proper to visit the Asylum.

At each Quarterly General Board the Governors present or some of them, shall be requested to inspect the Asylum, and see every Room and Patient, and report forthwith to the Board.

At each Ordinary Board, one of the Governors shall be appointed Visitor for the week next succeeding, to visit the Asylum daily, if convenient, to see every Patient once at least in the week, to make any inquiries which may seem fit, and to enter his observations in the "Weekly Visitor's Book;" and no person whatsoever shall interfere to prevent the most minute examination of the Establishment.

#### OCCASIONAL VISITING.

Persons wishing to visit the Asylum, may be personally introduced by one of the Physicians, Surgeons, or Governors, or by the written order of a Governor; and the House-Surgeon may admit any respectable non-resident of Lincoln to see the Establishment, without a special order.

#### VISITS OF FRIENDS.

The Rules affecting the admission of the Patients' friends, are appended to each Quarterly Account.

#### OFFICERS, SERVANTS.

No Officer or person whatsoever employed in this Institution, shall give to, or receive from any Tradesman, Servant, Patient, Stranger, or other person whatsoever, any fee, reward, gratuity, or present, directly or indirectly, for anything done on account of the Asylum, on pain of expulsion; nor bargain with any Patient for the sale, purchase, or exchange of clothing, food, or other article.

#### BOOKS, ACCOUNTS.

Any Governor may at all times inspect, extract, or copy, any Bills, Accounts, Journals, Registers, Minute-Books, or Documents whatsoever, provided that the names of the Patients shall not be copied: and all Documents, kept by order of the Rules or of any Board, shall be the property of the Institution.

Note. A Key to the Official Books, Bills, Vouchers, &c., is left always in the House, so that they may be accessible to the Governors.

## FORM FOR LEGACIES.

Persons disposed to contribute to the Asylum by their last Will, are particularly requested to use the following words.

I give and bequeath to the Treasurer of a Society who call themselves
GOVERNORS OF THE LINCOLN LUNATIC ASYLUM, the Legacy or sum of
_________, which sum I charge on such part of my personal estate
as does not consist of Chattels real, and direct to be paid by my Executors within
_______months after my decease, and applied to the Charitable uses of the
said Asylum, for which, on payment, the Treasurer's Receipt shall be a sufficient
discharge.

For want of this Form many Charities have lost their Legacies, the Testators having charged them on their real instead of their personal estate.
