## P R E F A C E.

THE inquifitive Reader will naturally wonder, how a Narrative, fo interefting in every Particular as the following, and which was read with fuch Avidity near fifty Years ago, fhould again be brought forth: To this I can only fay, that my Profeffion inclines me to read and confider every Thing pro and con in the Way of my Bufinefs; and meeting with a Bundle of thefe Narratives, in an old Pamphlet Shop, I thought I might not only do fome Service to the Profeffion of Midwifery in general, by this Re-publication; but that it was alfo due to a Gentleman, whofe Knowledge, Learning, Genius, and univerfal Benevolence, cannot be too much extolled.

Dr. St. Andre is fill living, and his long Life has been marked with many very interefting Pe riods. In his early Days, he inftructed that good King, George the 1 ft in Anatomy ; and it was at that very Period, that Mayy Toft conceived, and became big with Rabbits. The King knowing (as he could not but know) how very ftrange a Thing it mult be for a Woman to kitten Rabbits, fent his Houfhold Surgeon, Mr. Ahlers, down to Godal.
ming to enquire into it ; but as Mr. Ahlers could make neither Head nor Tail of the Matter, he returned to London; and in Confequence of his Report, the King was gracioufly pleafed to put Matters paft all Doubt, by fending down his own A natomift, Dr. St. Andre : Notwithftanding this, there were many People then, (but:I hope there will be none now) who were weak enough to doubt the Fact ; but furely, when they fee the refpectable Names of Mr. Molincux, Dr. St. Andre, Dr. Howard (my Brother Midwife) and, I might add, my old Friend Sir Richard Maningham's, (for he wrote in Confirmation of the Fact, ) certainly it muft convince every rational unprejudiced Man, who poffeffes a Grain of Philofophy, or common Senfe, That Mary Toft not only longed for Rabbits, but that fhe conceived Rabbits, and was delivered of Rabbits. It may indeed be objected, that the poor Woman was never delivered of a perfect compleat Rabbit ; but neverthelefs; if the Legs were produced at one Time, the Head at a fecond, the Body at a third, and the Skin at a fourth; and thefe feveral Parts put together, would make up compleat Rabbits, it is all one ; for how often are we obliged to bore the Cranium of a Child, and to fqueeze out the Brains, in order to reduce the Head, or to take off an Arm or a Leg, to effect a Delivery: All the Difference here is, that Nature did the Violence in this Cafe, (it being only with a Parcel of Rabbits) which we are forced to do, when we handle our FellowCreatures.

Some People were weak enough to fuppofe that Mrs. Toft was not only an Impoftor, but that Dr St. Andre, Sir Richard Maningham, and Dr. Howard, were Parties concerned, and interefled in the Event; for it is very true, that many humane People, and particularly the Fair Sex, did contribute largely to the Support of this fingularly afflicted Woman; but when it is known that the whole Money collected for the unhappy Sufferer, was not above two hundred Pounds, and that Sir Richard Maningham was then the firt Man-Midwife in London, and Dr. St. Andre the firft Anatomift in the World, and in high Favour with the King, fuch a Conjecture muft fall to the Ground.

Dr. St. Andre, in the following Pages, gives fuch unqueftionable Proofs of the Truth of thefe preternatural Productions, and of his own great Abilities as an Anatomift, that it would be the higheft Abfurdity in any rational Being to doubt the Truth, or the Fact; for, fays he, in Page 5 , "the Woman made but very little Water, had a regular Pulfe, but fomewhat flow, a florid Tongue, and that between the Labour Pains the eat Beef, and preferred it to all other Food." -Why they did not give her what fhe originally longed for, I much wonder! I mean, I wonder why they did not give her Rabbits.; for bearing Rabbits from the Uterus, was no Reafon, in my humble Opinion, why they might not have been good for the Stomach : And indeed it might have prevented thofe violent Struggles the Animal made in the Uterus before the Delivery: Nay, I do not fee any material Reafon, why fhe might not have eat
a little
a iittle Bit, now and then, of her own Rabbits; I mean fuch as Dr. St. Andre found were, in their Form, and inteftinal Structure, nothing different from Rabbits taken from a real Warren; we fee Cats often eat their own Kittens, without any Inconvenience ; and it certainly tends to fome wife End which Providence conceals, perhaps very wifely from us. Page 12, Dr. St. Andre fays, " that the Stomach and Inteftines of natural Rabbits were fo notorioufly different from thofe Mrs. Toft was delivered of, that even the fucking Rabbits had Stomachs at leaft three Times larger than thofe Parts were in the preternatural Rabbits, and that the Lungs were, in his Opinion, as nearly as he could judge, twenty Times bigger in Capacity than thofe produced by Mrs. Toft.

After what has been already faid, and what the difcerning Reader will learn from the Pen of Dr. St. Andre himfelf, I am unwilling to believe any Man of Senfe can doubt the Fact. How the Rabbits came into the World piece-meal, is nothing fo extraordinary, as we produce Pieces of Children frequently in the fame Manner; and as to their being ready fkinn'd, I confefs that is a phenomenon I am quite unable to account for; but as the Reader will be impatient to fee the moft material Parts of this Work, I fhall refer him to it, but not till I have related one very fingular anecdote of Dr. Howard, a Gentleman whofe Name is fo often made honourable Mention of in the following Narrative :

## P R E F A C E. vii

I believe there are few Men who have not heard of Bird Fancyers, Beaft Fancyers, \&c. \&c. but this fame Dr. Howard was a Toad Fancyer ; and really kept a great Number for his daily Amufement: And I know a Gentleman of Truth and Honor, who affured me that Dr. Howard took it ill of him that he would not ride five or fix Miles out of his Way, in order to take a View of his Collection of Toads! Now, if it had fo happened, that Mrs. Toft had produced living Toads inftead of dead Rabbits, (and certainly a Toad was as natural as any other Quadruped) in that Cafe I confefs we might have attributed it to the Force of Imagination, and that the Woman, knowing the Doctor to be a Toad Fancyer, and being big with fourteen or fifteen Children, might upon firft feeing the Doctor, think of his Collection of Toads, and become a Toad Fancyer too; for there is nothing more certain, than that Women frequently long for, nay, and actually eat, Things at that Time which they would abhor at any other; a very fingular Inftance of longing happened lately within my own Knowledge :

A young Woman, my Patient, had been feduced under a Promile of Marriage ; and during her Pregnancy fhe longed for a plain Gold Ring, fuch a one as a Lady of her Acquaintance, who had been rather more fortunate in her Amours, wore upon the third Finger of her left Hand: When this young Woman's Labour Pains came on, I was fent for, and in a very fhort Time I delivered her of a fine Male Child, with a plain Gold Ring on the third Finger; and upon drawing it
off, I found engraved round the inner Circle, "Two are better than one:" and as I was apprehenfive it might difturb the Mother, if I had mentioned the Subject of her Longing, and the Confequence thereof, I fecretly put the Ring into my Pocket; and am ready to Shew it to any Lady or Gentleman, who will honor me with their Company, at my Houfe in Figgtree Court, near Gol-den-Square.

## P O S TSCRIPT.

SINCE the above Preface has been wrote, a very extraordinary Account of a Woman being delivered of four Toads, within this laft Year, has appéared in the Fournal Encylopedique, publifhed Monthly at Paris by Bouilon.

That the French Nation are many Years behind us in Matters of Philofophic Enquiries, is paft a Doubr, and here is a recent Inftance of it. The Man-Midwife who attended the ToadW oman of France, in the fame Manner as Doctor St. Andre did the Rabbit Woman of Godalming, and who actually delivered the poor Girl of three live Toads, and one dead one, in the Pre-

fence of the Vicar, and a great Number of Spectators, was weak enough, not only to fufpect a Fraud, but foolifh enough to publifh to the World his Ignorance and Folly. He infinuates, that the Girl, having conceived a great Diflike to a young Man, with whom the had been too familiar, contrived this wicked Method, to be avenged of him; and gave out, that he was a Sorcerer, and had Dealings with the Devil ; and to evince the Truth of her Affertion, the repeatedly declared, that the was pregnant by the faid young Man, with Toads, and that fhe heard them croak, (and fo did many of her Neighbours alfo) in her Body : This fhe affirmed many Months before the Time of her Delivery. When her Labour Pains came on, the Man-Midwife, the Vicar, and a great Number of her Neighbours, were called in to be Witneffes of the Fact; and fhe was actually delivered of four Toads, three alive, and one dead! and yet, ftrange to believe it! neither the Vicar, nor the Midwife, are convinced that the Girl is not an Impoftor: The former was called upon to chriften the Toads by the tumultuous Rabble; but he infifted upon it, that though many Chriftians are Toads, Toads are not Chriftians; and they are actually now fo, ignorant, fo weak, or fo wicked, as to have commenced a Profecution againft the poor innocent Girl, for debafing her Nature, aggravated by endeavouring to deftroy and put to Death a young Man, who had been guilty of no other Crime, than. fimple Fornication with her.

It is therefore hoped, that Dr. St. Andre, whofe great Knowledge in Anatomy, in Botany, Mufic,

Mathematics, Surgery, Midwifery, Architecture, \& the Mechanics, has been fo univerfally known and admired, will exercife thofe amiable Virtues, which are known only to his private Friends and Acquaintance, and fet out immediately for Paris, and ufe his utmof Endeavours to exculpate the poor Toad-breeder, when fhe is brought to Trial; and not let a poor innocent Girl fuffer, when he has it in his Power to affert upon his own Knowledge, a fimilar Circumftance, which happened to a Patient under his immediate Infpection; I fay, a fimilar Circumftance; for though Mrs. Toft was delivered of dead Rabbits, and the French Girl of live Toads, yet they were equally extraordinary ; and as Dr. St. Andre has put the firft Inftance paft all Doubt, (as the difcerning Reader will prefently fee) it feems incumbent upon him, on the Score, not only of Humanity, but Philofophy alfo, to attend the Trial of a peor innocent Girl, who may otherwife fall a Sacrifice to the Bigotry and Superftition of a Popifh Prieft, and an ignorant Quack: And fortunate it is for us, that we have fuch a Man among us, who is able to inveftigate Nature, to explode vulgar Errors, to detect Falfehoods, and in Spite of the Prejudices of Men of Learning and fcientific Knowledge ; ftand forth a Champion for Truth, not only in private Converfation, but announce it to the World under his great and refpectable Name.
SHORT NARRATIVE

## D E L I V E R Y, \&c.

 Hatever may be the Fate of this Account, I think myfelf indifpenfably obliged to relate the Facts that I faw, and tranfacted myfelf, as alfo the Reafons which firft induced me to enquire into the Truth of fuch an extraordinary Event ; but I here declare, that I take on me no other Part of this Narration, than that in which I was actually. concerned.

As Mr. Horeard intends Chortly to publifi the whole Account, and prove every Circumftance of it, by fuch Evidences as will put this Matter out of all Poffibility of Doubt, I muft refer to him for feveral Particulars here omitted.

And as it will be impoffible to judge impartially of this Fact, till the Evidences abovementioned are produced, it cannot be doubted A 2
but

but all fuch Perfons as are not governed by Prejudice, or fome worfe Motive, will fufpend their Judgment till thefe Facts come to their Knowledge by a more certain Way, than by flying Reports and Conjectures.

The firft Intelligence I received of this Matter, was on the 5 th Inftant, when I faw a very particular * Account of a Woman living at Godliman, lately delivered of five Rabbets by Mr. Jobn Howard, Sürgeon, at Guilford in Surrey, a Man of known Probity, Character, and Capacity in his Profeffion, who has practifed Midwifery for above thefe thirty Years.

This Account was again confirmed by two + Letters from the faid Mr. Howard, the firft dated Noov. the 6 th, $40^{\circ} \mathrm{Clock}$ in the Afternoon, the Subftance of which is, That from the 4 th Inftant to the 6th he had delivered the Woman of three nore Rabbets; that the laft of them had leaped in her Belly for the Space of eighteen Hours before it died, and that the Moment it was taken away, another was perceived to Atruggle for Birth.

The fecond is dated Nor the 9th, and is here tranfcribed verbatim, viz.

## SIR

CINCE I wrote to you, I have taken or delivered the poor Woman of three more Rabbets, all three half grown, one of them a

dun Rabbet; the laft leaped twenty-three Hours in the Uterus before it died. As foon as the eleventh Rabbet was taken away, up leap'd the twelfth Rabbet, which is now leaping. If you have any curious Perfon that is pleafed to come poft, may fee another leap in her Uterus, and Thall take it from her if he pleafes, which will be a great Satisfaction to the Curious. If fhe had been with Child, the has but ten Days more to go, fo I do not know how many Rabbets may be behind: I have brought the Woman to Guilford for better Convenience.
I am, sir,

> If you fend a Perfon, let bims bring a Letter from you.

Thefe Letters, with others to Perfons of Diftinction in Town, which all agreed with the above-mentioned, were fufficient to make me defirous of being convinced perfonally of a Fact of which there was no Inftance in Na ture. Accordingly, on the 15 th Inftant, I attended the Honourable Mr. Molyneux, Secretary to his Royal Highnefs the Prince of Wales, who was inclined to enquire into the Truth of this extraordinary Cafe , and defired me to go with him to Guilford. We arrived there at about half an hour after two in the Afternoon. We fent to Mr. Howard, who came to us.immediately,

mediately, and told us that the Woman was actually in Labour of the fifteenth Rabbet. Wc had not been at his Houfe long, before the Nurfe who attends the Woman came to call Mr . Howard to her, fhe being then in one of her Labour Pains.

She was lodged over againft Mr. Howard's Houfe ; we found her dreffed in her Stays, fitting on the Bed-fide, with feveral Women near her. I immediately examined her, and not finding the Farts prepared for her Labour, I waited for the coming on of frefh Pains, which happened in three or four Minutes, at which Time I delivered her of the entire Trunk, fripped of its Skin, of a Rabbet of about four Months Growth, in which the Heart and Lungs were contained with the Diaphragm entire. I inftantly cut off a Piece of them, and tried them in Water; they feemed but juft fpecifically lighter than it, and Mr. Molynezix preffing them to the Bottom, they rofe again very flowly. The Heart was very large, and its Foramen Ovale entirely open; the Lungs were remarkably fmall, and of a much darker Colour than commonly the Lungs are of fuch Rabbets who have breathed for fome Time. No Perfon but myrelf touch'd her, from the fift Time that I had examined her, to the Time of her being delivered by me. Her Pains were pretty fmart, and lafted for fome Minutes ; they went off the Moment the was delivered, and fhe feemed chearful

and eafy; walked by herfelf from the Bedfide to the Fire, and fat on a Chair, where I examined her, and found, that in the courfe of the Fallopian Tubes there were fome Inequalities, but more fenfibly on the Right Side of her Belly; which made me conjecture that the Rabbets were bred in thofe Tubes, and only came into the Uterus when they gave her thofe Agitations, which, according to the Account of Mr . Howard, and of feveral other Perfons, were fenfibly felt many Hours before their Exclufion.

As there was no Blood nor Water that iffued from the Vagina, after I had delivered her; I again examined that Part, and found it not in the leaft inflamed or lacerated.

Upon examining her Breafts, I found Milk in one of them, but only a little yellowihh Serum in the other.

Her Pulfe was regular, but fomewhat low her Tongue florid; and upon afking for her Water, thofe about her anfwered; the made very little, and that they had not faved any.

She informed us, that in the Intervals of her Labour Pains fhe was tolerably eafy, and had no Inclination for any Sort of Food but Beef.

About two Hours after we had left her, they came again to call Mr. Howard, the being at that Time in violent Labour Pains; but he and myfelf were gone to fee the Mayor, who was then ill. The Nurfe that attended her had delivered her, before our Return, of the lower

Iower Part of a Male Rabbet, which we found to tally with the Trunk which I had before extracted. This was alfo ftript of its Skin, and compleatly perfect in all its Parts, but more manifefly fo in thofe of Generation.

- In the Rectum of this Animal, which remained affixed to the Body, we found five or fix Pellets, much of the fame Colour and Confiftence as the common Dung of a Rabbet, little Bodies, like dried Fragments, being matted together with a mucous. Matter. The like was obferved in fome other Parts of thofe Rabbets which had come away before. In the other Bowiels there was a dirty-coloured Mucus, of the Nature of that which is conftantly found in the Bowels of all fotus Animals, and which, in thofe that void their Excrement in Pellets, is commonly hard and dry; but the Matter in the Guts of the firft Animal was of an entire Gifferent Kind, Colour and Subftance, from any of the reft, this being like little Filaments of an Animal Subitance. In the Middle of the Gut Ilium of this Creature, I found a very flender, brittle, white Body, of the Length of half an Inch, which in Shape was like very fmall Finh-bones.
- Between fix and feven the fame Evening we again vifited her; we had not been there long, before the fell into viclent Labour Pains, infomuch that four or five Perfons could hardly confine her to an Arm-chair. As foon as the Violence of the firft Pain was fomewhat abated,

I examined her as before, and found the Va gina perfectly clear, and the Orifice of the Uterus fo far clofed, as not to admit of the little Finger. I conftantly ftood before her, nor did any Perfon whatfoever touch her, during that Time. After three or four very ftrong Pains, that lafted feveral Minutes, I delivered her of the Skin of the aboveraid Rabbet, rolled and fqueezed up like a Ball, without the leaft Moifture or Blood about it ; upon which The recovered of her Pain.

From that Time I did not ftir from before her, nor did I withdraw my Hand, but to deliver the Skin to a Stander by.

About ten Minutes after, as near as I can judge, the again fell into Labour Pains, tho' more fudden and fhort than the former; at which Time I again delivered her of the Head of the Rabbet, with the Fur on, Part of one of the Ears being torn off, alfo without any Blood or Moifture: And as to thefe two Deliveries, and particularly as to the Circumftances of the latter, Mr. Molyneux having drawn up an Account of this whole Affair, for his own private Satisfaction, immediately upon our Return to London, I beg leave to refer, for the Conviction he had of the Truth thereof, to that Account, which I have his leave to fay, he will communicate to any Gentleman that is defirous to perufe it.

After this fhe foon grew eafy, and Mr. How ard gave her a fleeping Draught.

About ten in the Evening we faw the Woman for the laft Time, fhe being then in Bed. Having felt her Belly, I found it foft, except thofe Lumps, which fill were in the fame Place as before-mentioned.

Between the Times of vifiting the Woman, we examined the feveral Rabbets, which were all kept feparate in diftinct Pots, with Spirits of Wine, in the Order that they were brought away.

The firft Animal did not appear to be a perfect Rabbet in all its Parts, three of the Feet being like the Paws of a Cat, the Stomach and Inteftines like thofe Parts in the fame Animal, as alfo the Shape and Figure of the Thorax; the Lungs and Heart of which were entirely out of their natural Situation, and fqueezed out between the upper Ribs and Vertebra of the Neck, to which Parts they fercngly grew and adhered. The Lungs of this Creature, had they been placed in their natural Cavity, would not have filled above a fixth Part of it: The Bones of this Creature being alfo different in Subftance and Structure from thote of common Rabbets, the Head and one Paw only excepted.

All the other thirteen Arimals were, in every Particular, like well-formed, common, natural Rabbets, from the Size of two Months Growth to four. They were all broken in Pieces, and much in the fame Manner. I fhall defrribe there Pieces in the Order that Mr. Howard

told us they had commonly been brought away. Firft. the four Paws with the Fur on; then the Liver and Inteftines ; the Trunk and Shoulders in another Part. In three or four Animals the loins feparated from the Os Sa crum; and in the reft, the I/chium and Thighs in one Piece, with the Loins; the Head with its Fur, and laftly the Skin.

When all thefe feveral Parts were put together in their proper Order, they manifeftly made up, and appeared to belong to the abovementioned Animals; but the Vifcera were wanting in four or five of them. One remarkable Circumftance is, that moft of thefe Animals were Females, as far as I could judge.

The Heart and Liver of thofe which we examined, appeared much larger than ufual, when compared with the Lungs and Inteffines which belonged to them, which on the contrary were extremely fmall. The Coecum and Colon, which are remarkably large in Rabbets, appeared not to exceed in Bignefs the other Intertines, and the firal Structure of the Cocum was not yet unfolded; the Stomach was in like manner much contracted, and its Pilorus very ftreight and narrow. I could not difcover, in any of the Livers that I examined, the Ductus Venofus, nor the Implantation of the Umbelical Vein in that Organ.

I opened three or four of the Hearts, and found in every one of them the Foramen Ovale, and the Ductus Arteriofus fully open, the two B 2 Trunke

Trunks of the Defcendant Cava united at the right Auricle of the Heart, agreeable to that Structure which is peculiar to natural Rabbets, and fome few other Animals.

The Flefh of thefe Creatures, particularly of that which I extracted, had the Smell of Rabbets juft killed; and the Subftance of their Bones were, in all Refpects, like the Bones of Fcetus Rabbets; in feveral of them the Epipbyys were feparated from the Bones themfelves. - All the Heads which I examined had their compleat Number of Teeth, four Cutters before, and ten Grinders on each Side, but they appeared not in the leaft worn nor ftained, as the Teeth of other Rabbets are by Maftication. -7. The Nails of the Paws were moft of them - exceedingly flarp.

The Skins were all produced, being dreffed in Allum; they were of feveral Colours as to their Fur, which was confiderably long, and in one particularly (which was the fifth Rabbet,) that Part which covered the Head was curled.

The Rabbet which I extracted weighed one and twenty Ounces Avoirdupoize, making an Allowance for one of the Paws not yet come away, and Part of the Vifcera that were loft.

From all thefe Confiderations I was fully convinced, that at the fame Time that the external Appearance of thefe Animals was exactly like fuch Creatures, as muft inevitably undergo the Changes that happen to adult Animals; by Food and Air; they carried within
them the ftrongeft Marks of Fattus's, even by fuch Parts as cannot exift in an Adult, and without which a Foctus cannot poffibly be fuppored to live. This, I think, proves in the ftrongeft Terms poffible, that thefe Animals were of a particular Kind, and not bred in a natural May; nor will there be any Doubt remaining (even with the leaft knowing in thefe Watters) when thofe Parts which are fubfervient to the Circulation of the Blood, and Nourifhment between an adult Creature and its Fcetus are brought away, which I am fully fatisfied muft hortly happen, or, if retained, be the Caufe of this Woman's Death.:

All there Facts were verified before his Majefty, on Saturday Nov. the 26th, by the anatomical Demonftration of the ifit, the third, fifth, and ninth of thefe Animals, which were compared with the Parts of two natural Rabbets, the one of the Age of four Months, and the other of five Days, Dr. Steigertbal and Dr. Teflier being prefent.

I thall with all convenient Speed publifh the Anatomy of thefe preternatural Rabbets, with their Figures taken from the Life, and compared with the Parts of Rabbets of the fame Growth, that the Differences beforementioned may be fully underftood.

In the mean while, I hall relate what appeared in the Diffection of two Rabbets, which I performed in the Prefence of Mr. Molyneux, the very Day that we returned from Guilford;

the one was of four Months growth, and much of the Size of that which $I$ had taken from the Woman, the other was barely fifteen Days old.. The Lungs of the larger were, as nearly as I can judge, twenty times bigger in Capacity than thofe of the præternatural one, and the Lungs of the fmaller were at leaft eight times the bignefs of the forementioned; both thefe were exceedingly different, in Colour and Confiftench, from thofe of the præternatural Rabbet.

The Foramen Ovale of the fmaller Rabbet was more than two thirds open, and that in the larger was fo far clofed, as but juft to admit a very fmall Probe.

As to the Stomach and Inteftines, the Difference was fo notorioully great from thofe we had examined, that even in the fucking Rabbet, the Stomach and Cocum were at leaft three times larger than thofe Parts in the praternatural ones.

I thall give no other Account of the Woman, than what I think pertinent to this Subject. By the feveral Queftions which I put to her, I was informed, that the was born and bred at Goalyman; the feemed to be of a healthy ftrong Conftitution, of a frnall Size, and fair Complexion, of a very fupid and fullen Temper: She can neither write nor - read : She has been married about fix Years to one Foflua Toft, junior, a poor Journeyman Clothier at Godlyman, by whom the has had three Children. The Account the further gave

of herfelf, was, that on the 23 d of April laft, as the was weeding in a Field, fhe faw a Rabbet fpring up near her, after which the ran, with another Woman that was at work juft by her ; this fet her a longing for Rabbets, being then, as fhe thought, five Weeks gone with Child. The other Woman perceiving we was uneafy, charged her with longing for the Rabbet they could not catch, but fhe denied it. Soon after another Rabbet fprung up near the fame Place, which the endeavoured likewife to catch. The fame Night fhe dreamt the was in a Field with thofe two Rabbets in her Lap, and awaked with a fick-Fit, which lafted till Morning ; from that Time, for above three Months, fhe had a conftant and ftrong Defire to eat Rabbets, but being very poor and indigent, could not procure any. About feventeen Weeks after her Longing. The was taken with a Flooding and violent Cholic Pains, which made her to mifcarry of a Subftance that the faid was like a large Lump of Flefh. Three Weeks after this, the was again taken with a Flooding, and voided another Subftance like the former, but not fo large. Notwithftanding thefe Accidents, fhe did not perceive herfelf to grow lefs, but continued with the Symptoms of a breeding Woman ; infomuch that in the Beginning of September, as the was working in the Hop-ground, the Milk flowed profufely from her Breafts; and as fhe had Children before, the thought the felt very differently

from what the ufed to do. That on the 27 th of September laft fhe was taken very ill in the Night, and fent for her Mother-in-law, who is a Midwife, and a neighbouring Woman, at which time the voided fomewhat, which the took to be the Lights and Guts of a Pig, which her Hufband carried to Mr. Horvard, who fome Days afterwards came to her, and delivered her of fome Parts of the Animal firft mentioned. After a Fortnight fhe was churched, and thought all was over with her. She told me that her Hufband had not cohabited with her from the Time of her firft Mifcarriage; and that after the firft Rabbet was brought away, the had one regular menftrual Evacuation.

The Account Mr. Horeard gave was, in every material Circumftance, the fame with the Woman's Relation. He faid, the Guts and Liver (as he thought) of a Rabbet were brought to him, but he never knew or heard of the Woman or her Friends till then, and that at firf he took this to be intended as an Impofition upon him, but was at laft with much Perfuafion prevailed on to go to affift her at Godlyman; that he did accordingly deliver her of Part of the firf Rabbet; that he attended her at Godlyman, till the was delivered of the ninth Rabbet; but that it being very inconvenient to attend her there, which made him neglect all his other Bufinefs, he had brought her to Guilfora for better Cus veniency.

Mr. Howard further related, that when the was delivered of one Rabbet, another was immediately felt in her Belly, ftruggling with fuch Violence, that the Motion thereof could be fenfibly felt and feen; that this Motion has formetimes been fo ftrong, as to move the Bedclothes, and that it has lafted for twenty and above thirty Hours together. This particular Fact was unanimoufly agreed on, and attefted by moft of the People at Guilford, who have had the Curiofity to go to fee her, and was confirmed to Mr. Molyneux and myfelf by above ten different Perfons, who all feemed to be indifferent in this Matter.

Mr. Howard further told me, that, during this Motion, the was always free from Pain; and chearful; but that immediately upon the ceafing of it, the grew fick, and foon began to perceive her Labour-pains drawing near ; that upon her firft Pains, the Bones of the Animal were fenfibly heard to fnap and break by the violent convulfive Motions of the Uterus. This laft Circumftance was likewife related by the fame Perfons that attefted the former. He further added, that fhe had four Breakings of Waters in the coming of the Rabbets, altho' in no great Quantity.

On Wednefday the 23 d Inftant, I fet out again for Guilford, with Mr. D'Anteny, being refolved to bring the Woman to Town, if there was any further Profpect of more Rabbets. We arrived there at one in the Afternoon,
and we fourd Mr. Howard ftanding at his Door, who told us, that the had heen delivered of two more Rabbets fince I had feen her, and that he hoped all was over, heing he did not perceive in the Uterus any Motion as ufual. I vifited her feveral times that Day, and proceeded in every refpect as hefure ; her Pains, which, when I faw her the firft Time, were mixed with Intervals of Quiet and Reft, now were conftant and fixed on the right Side of her Belly; her Pulle was more irregular; the defcribed her Pain as if very coarle brown Pa per was tearing from within her. Towards eight o'Clock that Evening the voided a Piece of one of the Membranes of a Placenta, rolled up like Parchment; when it was extended, it meafured about fix Inches over The next Morning, as I was packing up fome of the Rabbets to bring to Town with me, Mr. Howeard was fent for over, and Mr. D Anteny, Dr. Hampe, and myfelf attended him. We found her in exquifite Torture, and after feven or eight Minutes, the was again difburthened of a Membrane, in Structure, Shape and Size exactly like the former. This was the firf Part that I faw come from heriwith fome Effufion of Blood. She did not feem in the leaft relieved after this Operation, her Pulfe continued irregular, her Tongue white, and her Urine deeply ftained with a Mucus and livid Blood.

Mr. Ablers having been at Guiford, by his Majefty's Order, (as Mr. Howard told us) to enquire
enquire into the Truth of this Fact, was fully convinced of it, as he himfelf declared, having affifted the greateft Part of Sunday the 20th Initant, at the Delivery of fome of the 16th Rabbet, which he brought to Town with him. But as on this Occafion his Behavicur has been reprefented here different from what it was at Guilford, I cannot better vindicate that Gentleman's Character, than by fubjoining the following Affidavits, which were taken in the Prefence of Mr. D'Anteny and Dr. Hampe. And that the Truth, fo far as it relates to this Point, may be known, I think he is ftrietly obliged, in Juftice to the Public, furthwith to give an Account of what he faw and tranfacted there, as I here have done.

IHave carefully read the above Narrative. Whether the Animals mentioned therein were praternaturally produced in this Woman, or that a Fraud is pracricable in this Case, I do not take upon me to fay: Gentlemen who are fufficient 7udges will determine that Matter upon proper Evidence. I can only certify, That 1 did draw up a Relation as is above-mentioned, which, in the moft material Circumftances of Fact, agrees with this Narrative; and I can further affirm, that I did not perceive the leaft Circumftance of Fraud in the Conduct of tbis Affair while I was at Guilford.
