The Reverend Andrew Reed, D.D., a noted worker in the cause of Charity, was the founder of this Institution, and it is interesting to record that the other three Charities mentioned below are still being carried on successfully.

MEMBERSHIP AND PRIVILEGES.

All persons subscribing Half-a-Guinea a year or Five Guineas at one time, shall be Members and have the right to vote on the business of the Charity at the General Courts subsequent to the first year of membership, and also at the election of Candidates to the Foundation, from the date of such payment.

ANNUAL REPORT

for the year ending 31st December, 1945

To be presented at the Annual General Court on 25th April, 1946

It is with feelings of great thankfulness that the Board present the 99th Annual Report on the work of the Institution, for no casualties due to the War occurred to patients or resident staff, and the superficial damage to the buildings has now been repaired. The long disused dormitories at the top of the main building have been cleaned down and re-occupied, blast walls and blackout arrangements removed, and, as labour becomes available, some much needed renovations will be put in hand.

There is a serious shortage of accommodation for mental defectives at the present time throughout the country, every bed in the Institution is occupied, and it has been necessary to close the waiting list temporarily. Vacancies occur but rarely as patients are seldom removed, and the Board much regret that they have therefore been unable to help many urgent cases for whom admission has been sought.

The Sub-Committee on Staff Affairs mentioned in the last Report have considered further recommendations received through the Mental Hospitals Association of which the Institution is a member. These affect members of the Staff not covered by the Heatherington and Rushcliffe Reports. A Staff Committee has been formed to consider matters which concern themselves, and suggestions put forward by them will receive careful attention and be acted on whenever possible. Recommendations contained in the official booklet 'Staffing the Hospitals' are being adopted to the limit of the accommodation available, and additional cubicles for nurses are being provided.

The adoption of the rates of pay laid down in the Rushcliffe and Heatherington Reports has placed a serious additional strain on the charitable income of the Institution; the Board, however, has been informed that consequent on their adoption of these reports, the Minister of Health is willing to consider a claim on behalf of the Institution for a grant towards the additional expenditure involved.

Payments for private patients have been well maintained, and during 1945, \pounds 10,000 has been received for Life Maintenance. This latter arrangement, by which the patients' future is assured, is a great relief to parents who are in a position to pay the capital sums necessary. In view of the great increase in the cost of living, it is probable that in the near future the fees for private patients will have to be made higher.

The Board would welcome an increase in the number of annual subscriptions, and would be glad if all subscribers who have not already done so, would pay their subscriptions under a Deed of Covenant, as inset in this Report, so that the Institution might benefit by the Income Tax recoverable. The Deeds, when completed should be returned to the Secretary for stamping and registration.

The seaside Home at Walton-on-the-Naze, which has been in occupation by the R.A.F. during the War, has now been de-requisitioned, and it is hoped to re-occupy it shortly. Many patients are looking forward to spending their holidays there this year.

It has been decided to let the London Offices for three years. The premises will, however, be available when required, for Meetings or special interviews, and will continue to be the registered address of the Charity. Meanwhile the Secretary and his staff will remain at the Institution.

The Board express sincere gratitude to the Mayor and Corporation of Reigate, and the Trustees of charitable funds, for the generous grants and renewed Subscriptions detailed in the following list :—

are Subscribers. The Board are very grateful for this help from those so intimately acquainted with the work of the Institution.

The Board are mnch indebted to the Honorary Architect, Lt.-Col. Whittaker. During the year, he has devoted much of his time to planning and supervising the construction of additional cubicles for nurses, and to supervising war damage repairs, together with the claims for compensation. These matters have added considerably to his ordinary work voluntarily performed, and the Board are fortunate in having the benefit of such valuable services.

In accordance with the provisions of the Charter, three Subscribers are elected annually as Honorary Auditors. The Board sincerely thank Messrs. W. Boniface, F.C.A., R. M. Browne, F.C.A., and A. Colin Eiloart, F.C.A., for undertaking this work. Mr. Boniface and Mr. Browne have acted in this capacity for the past **3**7 years.

The Board have much pleasure in recording their high appreciation of the excellent work carried on by the Medical Superintendent, Dr. H. R. Ferguson. Owing to his skill and unfailing watchfulness, the health of the patients has been maintained at a very high level, and thanks to his sound and wise judgment, many administrative difficulties have been overcome.

The requirements of the Rushcliffe report and recommendations of the Mental Hospitals Association have necessitated re-organisation of the Staff, which has entailed an enormous amount of additional work for Dr. Ferguson, and further changes already foreshadowed will impose still further claims on his time and energy.

The Board thank the Medical Officers who have ably co-operated with Dr. Ferguson, and all the members of the staff who have helped in carrying on the work of the Institution during another difficult year. The Board are very grateful to Subscribers for their continued support. Their names and also certain statistics have been omitted from this Report owing to the paper shortage, but the list of donors can be inspected at the Secretary's Office in the Institution

by any Subscriber wishing to do so.

The Board earnestly plead for increased financial help so as to enable the Institution to keep all beds continuously occupied. It is therefore of the utmost importance that no effort should be spared to raise sufficient funds to meet the unavoidable increasing expenditure.

In addition there are 5 male Voluntary Boarders resident in the Institution.

The average age at death was forty-three years.

The past year has been a most eventful one with Victory over Germany and Japan. The termination of hostilities with Germany was an occasion for much thankfulness to Providence. Once again real constructive work could be undertaken without fear of destruction by bombs and rockets.

Conversion to single rooms of the female staff dormitories has gone on steadily. 28 rooms have been completed and the nurses are in occupation.

For the first time for several years part of the main building, the farm buildings and estate cottages were painted externally. This was necessary to prevent serious deterioration. One of the Lancashire Boilers was fitted by the Bennett Fan Force draught. This installation is an added insurance in the event of only inferior types of fuel being available. It is satisfactory to note that so far such a situation has not arisen.

War damage repairs to windows. ceilings, doors and roofs have been completed. All blast walls have been taken down and the blue paint on the corridor windows removed.

The patients are now sleeping in the top floor dormitories, The temporary quarters, improvised during war for safety of the patients, have been restored to their normal use. In consequence, the wards are brighter and the ventilation improved. Overcrowding has been much reduced. This can only reflect beneficially on the health of everyone.

Lt.-Col. Whittaker, O.B.E., F.R.I.B.A., F.S.I., has directed the programme for the above works. He has obtained the necessary licences and ensured smooth working with the Government departments concerned.

GENERAL HEALTH.

The year has been free from any epidemic of infectious diseases. The general health has been good although skin affections such as boils and whitlows have been more prevalent during the winter months.

There have been two cases of Tuberculosis during the year. One male patient developed the disease and is still under treatment, and one male patient died of the disease.

Since 1932 there has not been a case of diphtheria although there are on an average 50 small children resident. Immunisation is carried out conscientiously on all new admissions, the results fully justify this precaution. It was with much regret that the resignation of Mr. F. Curtis, F.R.C.S., Consulting Surgeon to the Institution, was accepted in October. For a great many years his valuable advice has been available in all surgical emergencies. Happily his son, Mr. F. John Curtis, M.A., M.R.C.S., L.R.C.P., has consented to act in his stead.

Mr. Harold Gabell, L.D.S., has carried on the work in the dental department. The following is a record of the work done. Each patient had two routine examinations during the year.

24 patients had their teeth scaled.

28 patients had 41 fillings.

139 patients had 225 extractions.

Some new dentures were fitted and others repaired.

THE FARM.

It has been a good year on the Farm.

In the Spring, light rains interspersed with warm sunshine permitted rapid germination of all seeds.

The hay crop was heavy. Permanent grass has been reduced owing to the policy of taking the plough round the Farm. Much of the hay crop of 160 tons was from clover leys from which a second Autumn cut was also obtained. It is excellent food for the cattle and has helped materially in maintaining a milk yield sufficient to provide one pint of milk daily for patients and staff throughout the year.

The root vegetables have been above the average.

There has been a surplus of turnips, swedes and beetroot above the needs of the Institution. This surplus has been sold.

 $14\frac{1}{2}$ acres of potatoes were planted. The yield has averaged 7 tons to the acre, of clean potatoes of good marketable quality. With the dry weather in September and October they were harvested in good condition. The cereal crops, barley, oats and wheat amounting to 60 acres were secured in good condition.

The yield from the barley was light but was sold to the Ministry of Food at the full control price.

The green vegetables, cabbages, savoys, leeks and broccoli together with the roots, turnips, carrots, swedes and parsnips, are sufficient to provide a second vegetable at every mid-day meal.

The large indoor and outdoor tomato crop with lettuce, radish and beetroot provided appetising salads until November.

Gooseberrries, currants, plums, pears and apples yielded well, all were used in the Institution.

AMUSEMENTS AND RECREATIONS.

In Summer, picnics were held on the lawns. The VE and VJ days were celebrated by special entertainments out of doors and were much enjoyed. During the winter months an indoor weekly entertainment comprising pictures, dances, concerts and whist-drives has been held.

The Patients' Band gave a performance lasting one hour and the Patients' Concert Party an evening concert of two hours duration. This latter was attended by many relatives and friends.

GENERAL.

The training departments are the Nursery School, the "Three R" Class and the two handicraft classes on the Female Side.

On the Male Side there are the workshops, the Farm and the Continuation School.

In the Workshops, printing, shoe repairing and mattress making are taught. In the Continuation Schools, envelope making, rug making, basket making and brush making are practised. A new occupation which is being tried is book binding.

The Farm provides useful occupation for 20 boys

When training has been completed and character stabilised, an attempt is made to resocialise the patient by returning him or her to the outside world. The first stage is parole from the Institution.

Since July daily parole for male patients has been given. Boys in groups of three, one of whom is the leader, go out in the afternoon to Redhill, to the cinema or to tea, or to do their shopping. This privilege is appreciated and works well.

A small number of male patients were allowed fo travel alone when going on holiday.

Five patients, one female and four male are on licence in the care of relatives at home. One male patient has been in regular employment for the past three years.

The Rev. J. B. Phillips has conducted the Sunday services throughout the year. The simple services fulfil a real need in the spiritual life of the patients. Two Nurses and two Male Nurses passed the final examination of the Royal Medico-Psychological Association. One Nurse passed the Preliminary Examination.

I regret to record that Mr. George Flint, formerly Head Night Attendant, who had been on pension since 1931 died in December.

I take this opportunity of thanking the Officers and Staff for their loyalty throughout the year.

To the Chairman and Members of the Board of Management my sincere thanks are due for their counsel and advice.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE HEAD TEACHER.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I beg to submit to you the Annual Report on the work of the Mixed Schools and Handicraft Classes. There are on the register :---

The end of hostilities was instrumental in bringing a year of increased progress. More staff were available, and this was a great help in dealing with the children, especially those in the Nursery School, where much individual attention is needed.

Health was good throughout the year, and in consequence, attendance at school was regular. SENIOR SCHOOL.

Very satisfactory work was done in this section. There was a marked improvement in "Three R" work and good results were shown in handwork. With a little help, a number of children wrote letters to their parents during the year.

The handwork consisted of raffia and wool-work on canvas, clay-modelling, drawing, paper cutting, picture making and weaving with coloured strips. Several children made picture calendars for Christmas.

Oral lessons, games, eurhythmics and keep-fit exercises were taken throughout the year and enjoyed.

Gardening lessons were suspended, owing to air activity, but these will be resumed as soon as possible.

NURSERY SCHOOL.

The work in this section was continued, in small classes, on the usual simple lines—Montessori work, games, physical exercises, simple eurhythmics, handwork and percussion band.

There are a number of promising children in these classes, and their progress during the year was very encouraging.

The handwork included rug-work, raffia and woolwork on canvas. Tea-cosies and dinner mats were amongst the articles completed.

HANDICRAFT CLASSES.

The work in these classes reached a high standard. It consisted of plain and fancy needlework, knitting (dishcloths, gloves, scarves and jerseys), shopping bags, dinner mats, trolley cloths, etc., (crochet in macrame twine) also useful work such as darning and the making of simple garments by machine.

The girls showed great interest in their work.

Physical exercises were taken each day. Walks, visits to the Cinema and Shopping Expeditions were arranged regularly and enjoyed. Evening classes for keep-fit exercises and country dancing were taken each week for the senior girls.

Visitors to the Schools included the Commissioners of the Board of Control and Members of the Board of Management.

In conclusion, I should like to express to the Board of Management and the Medical Superintendent my thanks for their interest and support throughout the year.

Extracts from letters received from parents and guardians of the patients.

1.7.1945. "I went to Earlswood 2 or 3 weeks ago and was very pleased to find P. so well and happy, he seemed very interested in his work and life there, and I thought there was quite an improvement. He had more assurance in himself, and he had more control over his eye, I did not once see it turn up, and he looked so nice in his clothes too. I should like to thank you very much and all your staff for all the care they take of P. He is very fortunate to be in such good hands. With my renewed thanks for all that is being done for P. at Earlswood."

19.2.1945. "I think you know the high esteem I have for Earlswood and can never be grateful enough for all you have done for A, you have known her for many years" now. I never worry about her now, for she is really very happy in her life at Earlswood, and I am most grateful for all the kindness and care given to her and thank you very much.

22.4.1945. "I felt, after my visit to P. on Thursday, I would like to express my great pleasure at seeing her looking so very well and happy. I think there is great improvement in her due to the loving care she has had at Earlswood. It is nearly eight years since she came to you."

9.7.1945. "I would like to take this opportunity to tell you how glad I am J. is to be allowed to stay at Earlswood, to thank those who are responsible for her health and care and the nurses on whom she looks on as her real friends. When she came to you she was eight years old, and Doctors said it was improbable she would live after the age of fourteen. J is twentytwo now and appears to be in better health than she has ever been. I could never have provided the medical care she has been able to have at Earlswood if she had remained at home, and I thank you all again. 20.12.1945. "With my sincere gratitude to each and every one of the Staff who give such untiring patient and loving service to those dear souls who cannot help themselves, and the very best wishes for a very happy Xmas to all at Earlswood."

4.1.1946. "My wife and I feel that we would like to express our pleasure at having the opportunity of visiting the Royal Earlswood Institution on the occasion of "Prize Day" at which we were present yesterday afternoon. I has often told us of this function and asked why we did not come. We did not know the dates but as it happened, when we paid J his usual Christmas visit in December your notice had been put up in the Entrance Hall, so we managed to make arrangements. The general demeanour of patients was I thought, excellent. It was so cheering to see the smiling faces and looks of comfort and happiness displayed by them as we looked at them whilst being taken up the Hall to our places, and later in the Recreation Room.

The quietness and decorum, especially during the speeches, were remarkable, and contrasted greatly with some similar gatherings of quite normal people which I have attended. Obviously everyone is well taken care of and the report showed that the inmates are getting all that can be provided for them. We feel so thankful about J."



ANNUAL REPORT

for the year ending 31st December, 1946

To be presented at the Annual General Court on 24th April, 1947

The Board of Management have pleasure in presenting to the Subscribers the 100th Annual Report on the work of the Institution.

The present year marks the centenary of the foundation of the Institution, for it was on October 27th, 1847, that the Founder, the Rev. Andrew Reed, D.D., arranged a public meeting in the City of London under the Presidency of the Lord Mayor, Sir George Carroll. At that time there was in the couutry no home for the mentally defective, and it was therefore decided at that meeting to make a National appeal to the charitable public for the purpose of establishing such a Home. The response to the appeal was so favourable that the Committee of Management was able to acquire Park House, Highgate, with sixteen acres of ground. There the first Home was opened in 1848, and at the end of its first year there were fifty patients. In 1849 the numbers had risen to 145, and there were 170 on the list for election to the Foundation. In that year the Board of Management acquired Essex Hall, Colchester, to accommodate vouthful patients.

The Foundation Stone of the present building at Earlswood was laid by His Royal Highness, the Prince Consort, on June 16th, 1852, and His Royal Highness attended the formal opening on April 15th, 1855. As accommodation was now available for 500 patients, "Park House" and "Essex Hall" were closed, and the patients transferred to Earlswood.

"Essex Hall" was later taken over by a local Committee as a separate Institution for East Anglian cases, and became the Royal Eastern Counties Institution for Mental Defectives, and as such it continues to-day.

The country owes much to the Founder and to those associated with him in this great pioneering work.

One hundred years of steady progress at the Institution has proved conclusively that under skilled medical supervision, the mental and physical capability of the mentally defective can be vastly improved.

During the year which has just ended, the accomodation at the Institution has been strained to its utmost. There are at present over 550 patients, and there is a long list of approved cases awaiting admission as vacancies occur. In view of the uncertain outlook and the serious rise in the cost of maintenance, it has been considered advisable to reduce the period of election from seven to five years, and, much as the Board of Management regret having to take this step, the fees for private patients have had to be increased, as foreshadowed in the last Report. The minimum charge is now £150 p.a.

More cubicles for nurses have been planned and constructed under the supervision of the Honorary Architect, Lt.-Col. G. Whittaker, to whom the Board are greatly indebted for his valuable services throughout the year,

The Board have implemented the Rushcliffe and Joint Conciliation Committee's recommendations regarding the wages of staff, and the culmulative effect of these increases necessitated an overdraft from the Bankers towards the end of the year. In common with other charitable institutions, there has been a diminution in the amount of subscriptions received. No legacies were received during 1946. Such gifts have hitherto formed a considerable part of the charitable income, and the Board hope that Subscribers will bear in mind this method of conferring permanent benefit on the Institution.

It has not been possible to re-open the seaside Home at Walton-on-the-Naze. It is, however, quite ready for occupation as soon as the necessary staff can be obtained.

The Board express sincere gratitude to the Mayor and Corporation of Reigate and Trustees of charitable funds for the generous grants and renewed subscriptions detailed in the following List :—

The Board has been pleased to welcome two new Members—Lt.-Col. H. G. Daniels, Chartered Accountant, and Mrs. John Watney. Mr. Graham L. Reid has, unfortunately, had to resign owing to pressure of work.

The Board sincerely thank the Honorary Auditors, Messrs. W. Boniface, F.C.A., R. M. Browne, F.C.A., and A. Colin Eiloart, F.C.A., for their valuable services. The Charter stipulates that the Accounts must be audited by three Subscribers, and Mr. Boniface and Mr. Browne have now undertaken the duties continuously for the past thirty-eight years.

To Messrs. Armitage, Chapple & Co., also, the Board tender their thanks for the ready manner in which their partner Mr. E. Richardson, who is a Member of the Board, gives his expert advice on legal matters. Messrs. Armitage, Chapple & Co., have acted as Honorary Solicitors to the Institution for the past twenty-four years.

The Board have again much pleasure in recording their great appreciation of the work done by the Medical Superintendent, Dr. H. R. Ferguson. The health of the patients has been well maintained, and many Staff difficulties overcome. The Board desire to thank the Medical Officers and all the other members of the staff for their loyal co-operation during a very difficult year.

Many enquiries have been received regarding the future position of the Institution under the National Health Service Act, but, unfortunately, no information is at present available. The Board hope to be able to continue the work as in the past, and so maintain the high reputation associated with "Earlswood" during its long history, especially for *individual* care of patients.

In addition there are 5 male Voluntary Boarders resident in the Institution.

The average age at death was forty-seven years.

In spite of continued shortage of many materials a good deal of essential repair and reconstruction work has been done.

The whole of the East wing of the female staff quarters has been converted into single rooms.

The male 6th class and a section of the ground floor corridor have been redecorated.

The estate cottages, thirty-three in all, on which only the most urgent repairs could be done during the past six years, have been redecorated.

150 bedside lockers for use in the dormitories were obtained in March. They have proved very satisfactory, permitting efficient airing of the day clothing during the night hours. A refrigerating cold store for milk, meat and fish is now being installed, the building licences for which were passed by the Ministry of Works in November.

Lt.-Col. Whittaker, O.B.E., F.R.I.B.A., F.S.I., has been of the greatest assistance in the above works. He has secured the licences and prepared the plans.

GENERAL HEALTH.

During May and June three male patients contracted mumps. There was a mild outbreak of chicken-pox in July affecting fourteen male and three female patients. In September a sharp epidemic of gastric influenza affected thirty-two male and sixteen female patients. Several of the children were seriously ill, but fortunately all recovered. Compared with the previous year there was a slight general reduction in weight due no doubt to the small allowance of fats.

One male patient died of tuberculosis. One male patient was notified as a case of pulmonary tuberculosis, but subsequent investigation proved him to be suffering from an atypical pneumonia. He is well again.

Mr. F. J. Curtis, M.A, M.B., B.S., performed two major surgical operations, both patients making satisfactory recoveries. His opinion has been sought on other occasions involving specialised surgical knowledge.

Mr. Harold Gabell, L.D.S., has attended regularly on Thursday afternoons throughout the year. Each patient has had two routine dental examinations.

23 patients had their teeth scaled.

30 patients had 46 fillings.

113 patients had 195 extractions.

THE FARM.

It has been a difficult year for farming operations.

Apart from ten days good weather during haymaking, rain has fallen nearly every day. This affected the cereal crops particularly and the yields are not more than two thirds of those of last year. There has been a compensatory increased yield of some root crops; carrots, beetroot, swedes and mangolds being well above the average and secured in good condition.

The plum crop was very small. Gooseberries, black currants and apples yielded well. Outdoor tomatoes failed completely. The potato crop of 65 tons from 15 acres was the smallest for many years.

The health of the livestock has been good. The milk yield has been well maintained, the butter fat content averaging 3.8 per cent.

AMUSEMENTS AND RECREATIONS.

Two picnics were held on the lawns in June and July. In August and September dances were substituted owing to the weather.

In the Winter months an entertainment has been held each week comprising pictures, dances, whist drives and concerts. In addition the male patients organised billiard and chess tournaments.

GENERAL.

While Institutional care will be necessary for many of the patients throughout their lives, some are capable of being trained to lead an independent life in the community.

On the female side there are the primary school divided into the Primary and Test classes; the "Three R" class and two handicraft classes.

On the male side, scholastic training is continued in the Boys Continuation School.

In the Workshops, matmaking, boot repairing, printing and brush making are taught under their respective instructors.

The Farm, garden and central kitchen give useful occupation to fifty male patients.

Forty-two male patients are allowed daily parole for shopping expeditions or to attend football matches, or the cinema in Redhill.

Seven patients are on long leave or licence at home. Three male patients have been in regular employment during the year.

One nurse passed the preliminary examination of the Royal Medico-Psychological Association. One male nurse was successful in the final examination. 14

The Rev. J. B. Phillips continues to minister to the spiritual needs of the patients. The Sunday services and the special service at Christmas, Easter and Whitsuntide are much appreciated.

The following members of the staff retired on pension during the year. All have long periods of service to their credit and it is hoped they will have many happy years in retirement.

Mr. Harry Parker retired in March after thirty-three years service as a stoker.

Mr. W. A. Jenkins, Clerk and Steward, retired in July. In appreciation of his forty-six years service the Board presented him with a gold watch and chain suitably inscribed.

Two male nurses, Henry Ball and Percy Dawes retired in November and December respectively. Both had forty-six years service.

Mr. George Eyres, Assistant Engineer, retired in December after fifty-two years service.

I regret to record the deaths of the following pensioners, Mrs. Flint in February, Mrs. Ibbetson in April and Mr. Sargant in May 1946.

It is pleasing to welcome the return of the following members of the staff from His Majesty's forces: male nurses Alun Bowen, Alfred Bennett, William Drawbridge, William Evans, Arthur Hunt, Charles Unwin and Clifford Parry, assistant clerk.

I should like to convey my thanks to the Officers and Staff for their loyalty during the past year.

To the Chairman and Members of the Board, my sincere thanks are due for their counsel and guidance at all times.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE HEAD TEACHER.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I beg to submit to you the Annual Report on the work of the Mixed Schools and Handicraft Classes.

The past year was one of steady work and satisfactory progress. The health of both children and staff was good, and this was very helpful in preventing interruptions in the school routine. A few more staff were available which was also a help.

SENIOR SCHOOL.

Very satisfactory work was done again in this section, and the reports showed a marked improvement in all subjects. The children were most enthusiastic, and always willing to try new work. Special apparatus was used in the teaching of "Three R" subjects. Amongst the apparatus used for number were "The Ten Set"—used for the four simple rules—bricks and other objects, Montessori number boxes and cards with number and objects to correspond. Reading was taught by phonetics, also the "Look and Say" method. Apparatus used included letters for wordbuilding, "Chelsea" individual apparatus for word

15

and sentence making, also pictures and words for matching. The latter, used in a form of a game, proved very helpful to beginners, With a little help, an increased number of children wrote letters to their parents during the year, and also made Christmas cards and calendars to send to them.

The handwork included clay-modelling, drawing, paper-cutting, wool and raffia work on canvas. Other handicrafts introduced during the year were simple weaving, table-mats in plaited twine and door-mats in plaited binder twine.

Oral lessons, games, eurhythmics, country dancing, percussion band, skipping with and without music and "keep fit" exercises were taken throughout the year and thoroughly enjoyed. Speech training in the form of short plays was very popular.

NURSERY SCHOOL.

The work in this section was continued on the usual simple lines—Montessori and McDowall work, games, physical exercises, handwork, eurhythmics and percussion band.

Children in the senior class are beginning to show interest in "Three R" work, and are attempting writing, simple number, sounds of letters and combination of sounds. With help, several children wrote short letters to their parents at intervals, and at Christmas made very simple Christmas cards.

The handwork included raffia and wool work on canvas, rug-work, drawing and clay-modelling. Good specimens of work were completed. At Christmas a very easy play was attempted and the results were very pleasing.

The work was carried out with patience and enthusiasm.

HANDICRAFT CLASSES.

The work in these classes consisted of plain and fancy needlework, darning, knitting, (dishcloths, gloves, scarves, cardigans, jumpers and bed-socks), crochet work, (shopping bags, dinner mats, trolley cloths, table centres, etc.), raffia work on canvas, also the making of garments by machine.

In the junior class simple felt slippers were made.

The girls showed much interest and their work was excellent.

Physical exercises were taken daily. Walks, shopping expeditions and visits to pictures were arranged and enjoyed.

Evening classes for "keep fit" exercises and country dancing were taken each week for the senior girls.

Visitors to the schools included the Commissioners of the Board of Control, Members of the Board of Management and two groups of students from the National Association for Mental Health.

In conclusion, I should like to express to the Board of Management and the Medical Superintendent my thanks for their interest and support throughout the year.



ANNUAL REPORT

for the year ending 31st December, 1947

To be presented at the Annual General Court on 22nd April, 1948

After nearly 101 years of successful voluntary effort, this Institution, together with its investments and other assets, will be taken over by the Government on 5th July, 1948, under section 6 (1) of the National Health Service Act, 1946. In view of the high reputation which has been built up during its long history, the Board hope that the premier position of the Institution will be maintained in the future. The status of the Institution, however, can only be decided by the S.W. Metropolitan Regional Hospital Board. The present Board of Governors will be replaced by a Management Committee which will be subordinate to the Regional Hospital Board. It is anticipated that a certain degree of autonomy will be allowed the Committee with respect to management, but the general principles to be observed will be laid down by the Regional Hospital Board. As treatment will be provided at public cost, the voting privileges of the Subscribers and the election of candidates will cease from the 5th July, 1948. Gifts and legacies for all purposes, apart from general maintenance, will still be welcome, and these will be administered entirely by the Management Committee. Most important from the patients' point of view is their Recreation Fund, which provides them with all kinds of extra amenities, such as outings, drives, concerts, etc., and as appeals for any purpose will not be permitted in future, the present Board of Governors earnestly hope that the relatives of patients

will keep in mind the desirability of keeping this Fund in being by subscribing to it generously.

The Institution has remained full throughout the year, and there is a long waiting list of approved patients awaiting admission as vacancies occur. There is a serious shortage of accommodation for mental defectives throughout the country, and one of the urgent problems facing the Regional Hospital Boards will be how best to alleviate the position. Where ampleland is available as at Earlswood, enlargement on the villa principle might be entertained, for it had been the intention of the Board to build villas for this purpose from time to time, as circumstances allowed, but the difficulties in carrying out any building programme are so severe that there is little likelihood of any extension being carried out for some considerable time.

It is with the deepest regret that the Board report the death of Mr. H. Elliot-Smith, who was Chairman of the Finance Committee. He had been on the Board for eleven years, was very regular in his attendance at the Board and Committee Meetings, and at all times took the keenest interest in the work. His expert advice on financial matters was most valuable, and his genial personality endeared him to all his colleagues.

The Board are much indebted to their Honorary Architect, Lt.-Col. G. Whittaker, for his valuable services throughout the year. Under his guidance, improved accommodation for female nurses is rapidly being provided. He has also prepared plans for two new cottages for employees at Burfords Farm, which will be put in hand as soon as the official permits are issued. The general maintenance work on the

5

buildings has been carried out under his supervision, as well as the erection of a new cold storage plant.

The road through the Estate made by the Military Authorities during the war, has been de-requisitioned, and compensation received. The road has been closed, so that the Estate is now intact, and the former amenities are being restored.

The income from charitable sources and from the fees from private patients has been well maintained, but expenditure has exceeded income owing to present-day conditions, and some investments have had to be realised to bridge the gap. The Board have continued to implement the Rushcliffe and Joint Conciliation Committees' recommendations regarding the wages of the staff, and have also considered, in conjunction with a firm of Actuaries, the provision of a fund to safeguard their pensions. The National Health Service Act, however, has made the latter unnecessary.

It is hoped to retain the use of the seaside Home at Walton-on-the-Naze, although it is outside the South-West Metropolitan Regional Hospital Board's area. The Board consider it essential that facilities for patients' holidays should be available.

In addition there are 5 male Voluntary Boarders resident in the Institution.

The average age at death was forty-two years.

GENERAL HEALTH.

The death rate has been higher than usual, and there has been less resistance among the patients to infectious disease.

In March twenty male and eight female patients were affected by a mild type of influenza.

An outbreak of German Measles in August affected ten male and five female patients. Recovery in all cases was uneventful.

Deaths from Tuberculosis numbered five, four males and one female.

The Consulting Surgeon, Mr. F. J. Curtis, M.A., M.B., B.S., performed two operations for the removal of tonsils and adenoids.

Mr. Harold Gabell, L.D.S., has attended each Thursday afterncon, and on other occasions, for dental emergencies.

Each patient has had two dental examinations at six monthly intervals.

- 30 patients had their teeth scaled.
- 30 patients had 44 fillings.
- 126 patients had 250 teeth extracted under gas and oxygen anaesthesia.

Several patients have been fitted with dentures.

Good progress has been made in redecorations, repairs and improvements, much of which had necessarily been held in abeyance during the war years. All arrears of this work have now been overtaken.

The most noteworthy items included in this work are the following:—

The washrooms on the Victoria and Main corridors on the male side have been redesigned.

- The Victoria corridor and West corridor on the female side have been redecorated.
- The central kitchen, scullery and bakehouse have been painted, the baking ovens overhauled and rendered practically as good as new.
- The Refrigerating plant to which I referred in my last report is now in full working order. It ensures storage of meat, fish and milk in ideal conditions.

A vegetable store has been provided in place of the former dry goods store. In July, plans which Colonel Whittaker had prepared for a sanitary annexe to the female staff quarters were approved by the Board of Control. Work is now in progress, and when completed the annexe will provide bathrooms, a shampoo room, an ironing room, drying room and rest room for the nurses.

THE FARM.

The very severe Winter destroyed the early cabbage plants and Spring broccoli. Spring planting was delayed and supplies of green vegetables to the Institution were seriously affected until July.

The drought in the Summer was beneficial to the cereal crops, but root crops were small and much below average in yield.

The hay crop was forty tons less than last year, but was secured in excellent condition. With the carry forward from the bumper harvest of 1946, there is sufficient hay for all needs this season.

The beet crop was very light, but the sugar content is high, thus enhancing the table value of this vegetable. Mangolds and swedes were small and the potato harvest was the lowest in the history of Earlswood farming.

The plum crop was very good and the yield of gooseberries, black currants and apples was above the average. The apples have stored well and provide a welcome change in diet when other fresh fruits are scarce. The outdoor tomato crop was very satisfactory.

The milk yield has fallen during the year, but in

the past two months six milking cows have been added to the herd, and the milk yield is now adequate.

AMUSEMENTS AND RECREATIONS.

Three picnics were held on the lawns in the Summer months. Cricket matches were played each week.

Since the beginning of October a weekly entertainment has been given. These have consisted of dances, whist drives, concerts and cinema performances. A talkie apparatus was provided by the Board of Management in November. This permits modern films to be shown. They are much appreciated by the patients.

GENERAL.

It is still unfortunately true that little is known of the causes of mental deficiency. With continued research, no doubt, many patients classed as primary amentia will, in future, be grouped as secondary to some known cause. The position is now that what nature has not provided we cannot provide. What can be done is to make the best of what nature has provided, by education and training.

The training departments at Earlswood are the Primary School, the Three R Class and the Handicraft Classes on the female side.

The Boys' Continuation School has been regrouped. There are two departments with two teachers in each School of thirty pupils. Some of the pupils are of very low grade, but the curriculum is specially designed for them and they derive much pleasure in carrying out the simple tasks.

Sixty male patients are usefully employed in the workshops, kitchen, farm and garden.

Daily parole is allowed to a number of the senior male patients.

Four male patients are on licence or long leave of absence. Three are in regular work in unskilled occupations.

One male patient was discharged from licence in the course of the year.

Three male nurses and one nurse passed the Final examination of the Royal Medico Psychological Association, in May.

Two male nurses were successful in the Preliminary examination.

The Rev. J. B. Phillips, Vicar of St. Johns, Redhill, has conducted the Sunday services throughout the year.

Dr. E. A. Ritchie, M.B., B.S., M.R.C.S., L.R.C.P., was appointed Senior Assistant Medical Officer in March, 1947. He has proved to be a most able and congenial colleague.

The following members of the staff retired on pension. Head Nurse E. Hicks in July, and Night Attendant R. Mack in December.

I regret to record the deaths of Miss Nev, formerly Assistant Matron, and Mr. Halfpenny, Carpenter, both of whom were on pension.

I should like to take this opportunity to thank the officers and staff for their loyalty during the past year.

Once again it is my great pleasure to thank the Chairman and Members of the Board of Management for the help they have afforded me, and to place on record my sincere appreciation of their counsel and guidance so freely given at all times.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE HEAD TEACHER.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I beg to submit to you the Annual Report on the work of the Mixed Schools and Handicraft Classes.

The work of the past year was carried out successfully.

The Senior School attendance was interrupted during the illness and death of Miss Smith. It is with deep regret that I record this, as Miss Smith was a much valued member of the Teaching Staff. We were fortunate in obtaining the services of Mrs. Wells, Assistant Teacher, to fill the vacancy.

SENIOR SCHOOL.

The children in this section were very interested in their work, and the annual reports showed satisfactory progress.

"Three R" work was continued for those who could benefit. Reading was taught in various ways, including word and picture matching, in the form of a game, for beginners, phonetics and "Look and Say Method." Varied apparatus included letters for word-building, "Chelsea" individual apparatus for word and sentence making, and primers of various

16

stages, followed by more difficult books, chiefly of the story and nature types. A number of children can read reasonably well and with understanding.

The four simple rules in arithmetic were taught with the aid of the "ten set" bricks, beads and other objects. Simple money values were taught with actual and cardboard coins.

Shopping expeditions were made in the form of a game.

A number of children wrote regular letters to parents during the year.

Handiwork included drawing, paper-cutting, claymodelling, wool and raffia work on canvas, rug-work, door-mats in plaited binder twine, knitting (dishcloths and scarves, also shopping bags in Macrame twine). Work with plastic materials was introduced, and will be developed further. Oral lessons, eurhythmics, country dancing, games, percussion band and skipping exercises were taken throughout the year. Speech-training, in the form of short plays, was very popular and beneficial.

NURSERY SCHOOL.

A number of promising children were in attendance in this section during the year. Work, taken on the usual lines, was steady, and the results were most encouraging. Ready response and independence were specially noticeable. Montessori and McDowall apparatus were in use, also attractive jig-saw puzzles in various grades. Games, physical exercises, percussion band and eurhythmics played a great part in bringing about the good standard of work which was obtained. Children in the senior class showed interest in "Three R" work, and improvement was shown in writing, number and reading of simple words. With help, several children wrote short letters to parents, some of whom were residing abroad. They also made simple Christmas Cards.

The hand work consisted of rug-work, raffia and wool-work on canvas, drawing, paper-cutting, claymodelling, knitting and plaiting. Many good specimens of work were completed. These included needle-cases, tea-cosies and dinner-mats.

Several children were transferred to the Senior School during the year.

HANDICRAFT CLASSES.

The work in the two handicraft classes reached its usual high standard. The girls showed much interest, and were keen to learn. The work consisted of plain and fancy needlework. darning, the knitting of jerseys, cardigans, gloves, scarves, Dutch bonnets, socks, slippers and dish-cloths; crochet work, including shopping bags, evening bags and trolley cloths; Indian basketry, such as dinner mats, and the making of simple garments by machine.

Physical exercises were taken daily. Walks, shopping expeditions and visits to the cinema were arranged and enjoyed.

We were fortunate in obtaining the services of Miss Walker, as an extra Teacher of Handicrafts.

In February, a successful concert was given and was enjoyed by many parents.

The items were as follows :---

Nursery School-a simple play.

- Senior School—a more advanced play, Skipping exercises to music, and country dancing.
- Older Girls—an exhibition of "keep fit" exercises.

Visitors to the Schools included the Commissioners of the Board of Control, Members of the Board of Management, groups of Students from the National Association for Mental Health and from Bedford College. During the year, three students each spent a few weeks in the Institution, in order to gain practical teaching experience.

In conclusion, I should like to express my thanks to the Board of Management and the Medical Superintendent for their interest and support throughout the year.

ONE HUNDRED YEARS OF MENTAL DEFICIENCY.

The foregoing pages give what, with little doubt, comprises the last Report of the Board of Governors of the Royal Earlswood Institution. It may, therefore, be opportune to review briefly the achievements of the Institution during the hundred years of its existence for the care and training of Mental Defectives.

The Institution owes its origin to the Rev. Andrew Reed, D.D., who was born in London on 27th November, 1787. His father who hailed from Dorset and had set up in London as a clockmaker, belonged to the Newton Gospellers, a non-conformist religious body in the Western Counties at that time.

When Andrew was twenty-four years of age he was ordained Congregational minister and appointed to Wycliffe Church in New Road, London. It is from this setting that his philanthropic work developed.

During his lifetime he founded four national asylums, now known as the Reedham Orphanage; the London Orphan Asylum at Wanstead; the Royal Earlswood Institution for Mental Defectives, and the Putney Home for Incurables. They are charitable institutions supported by voluntary subscriptions; all carrying on their activities today in accordance with the wishes of their Founder.

Dr. Reed first felt the need for some care for mental defectives in 1837, the year of Queen Victoria's accession to the Throne, but it was not until 1846 that he was able to find time to devote to the project.

He entered into correspondence with foreign medical men, such as Dr. Itard of Paris, Dr. Saegert

of Berlin, and Dr. Seguin, also of Paris, as to the provisions for the care of defectives in their respective countries. At this time his attention was drawn to a report by Dr. Connolly of Hanwell, on the Bicetre in Paris, and a life-long friendship with this great humaniser of the treatment of mental disease was the result.

Two articles in the Chambers Journal in early 1847 on the education of Idiots, written by Dr. Gaskell, then Medical Superintendent of the Lancashire Lunatic Asylum, were brought to the notice of Dr. Reed by Mrs. Plumbe, a lady living in London, who reeognised in him the person most likely to succeed in initiating efforts similar to those practiced at the Bicetre, for at that time in England there was no provision for the care of idiots, as they were known in England and Wales, although mental disease had been provided for as far back as 1403 at Bethlem in London, where six patients were confined.

Dr. Reed spent his summer holiday in 1847 on the continent, visiting France, Switzerland and Denmark, to see for himself the methods of care and training of idiots.

As a result of his enquiries a first meeting was held on the 20th July, 1847, at the King's Head, Poultry, London, when a provisional committee was set up consisting of the Rev. Dr. Reed, Dr. Connolly, Dr. Little, Dr. Carlile, Alderman Wire, Mr. Gay, the well-known Surgeon, Mr. Gilpin, Mr. Monk, Mr. King of the Bank of England, Rev. H. Holloway and Mr. Millard.

The purpose of this committee was to formulate a scheme for a new Asylum, the declared object of which was "to take care of and by skilful and earnest

application of the best means, to prepare as far as possible for the duties and enjoyment of life, the Idiot who, not being a mere pauper, was likely to derive benefit from the treatment without restriction as to age, sex or Country." Dr. Reed was asked to make further investigations by visiting Paris and Berlin, which he did in September, 1847.

The 27th October, 1847, witnessed the formation of the Society to found a National Asylum for Idiots; the meeting, held at the Mansion House, was presided over by Sir George Carroll, Lord Mayor of London, the address being headed "We Plead For Those Who Cannot Plead For Themselves." As a result of the appeal then made it was possible to open the first Asylum at Park House, Highgate, on the 26th April, 1848, with fifty patients. Mr. Millard, who had experience in teaching at a ragged school. was appointed superintendent. A resident medical officer was also appointed.

The first gathering of the Idiot Familydis closed to the visitors a most unsatisfactory state of affairs, so much so, that some who witnessed the scene retired from it in disgust and others in despair. It seemed as though nothing less than the accommodation of a prison would meet the needs of such a family.

The scene moved Dr. Reed deeply, but within a year it was possible for him to write, "There is now order, obedience to authority, classification, improvement and cheerful occupation. Windows are safe, boundaries are observed without walls, and doors are safe without locks. The desire now is not to get away, but to stay. They are essentially not only an improving, but a happy family. And all this is secured without the aid of correction or coercion." The Highgate house soon filled, and a branch was opened at Essex Hall, Colchester, in May, 1850, through the benefaction of Sir Norman Peto.

Differences which arose between the members of the Board of Management resulted in Essex Hall developing independently, presided over by Gentlemen of the Eastern Counties. It was formally established as the Eastern Counties Idiot Asylum on 28th February, 1859. Today it is the Royal Eastern Counties' Institution.

The need for greater accommodation remained acute. A public appeal for funds was accordingly launched in London and the provinces in 1852, for the provision of an Asylum near London to accommodate up to five hundred patients.

Resulting from this appeal Earlsmead Estate, near Redhill, was purchased, and on 16th June, 1852, the Prince Consort laid the Foundation Stone of the new Earlswood Institution. Patients were first admitted on the 15th April, 1855.

By this time it was confidently expected that, with education and training, many of the patients would return to normal life. Perusal of the early reports of the Institution show how that expectation has been largely realised. Great stress is laid on the improvements resulting from education.

In 1862 the Commissioners in Lunacy reported that of seventeen patients discharged from the Asylum, nine had obtained gainful employment as labourers and in domestic service.

On the 25th November of the same year a Royal Charter was granted under the title of "The Asylum for Idiots," and this gave the Board of Management very wide powers in conducting the affairs of the Institution to the best advantage.

In 1872 lessons were given on speaking, reading, writing, arithmetic, drawing, music and puzzles. There is a note that some of the subjects would be out of place in ordinary schools, such as learning their own names, to dress themselves, to tie, to button, to lace.

In the same report a list of occupations for older patients is given; these are tailors, shoemakers, carpenters, gardeners, basketmakers, on the farm, in the laundry, in the kitchen, boot and shoe cleaners, matweavers, plumbers, painters, bakers, blacksmiths, bedmakers, sewing maids.

These occupations bear comparison with those of today.

In the early 1900's a change is noticeable in that training as a means to return to outside life is no longer emphasised. There is no doubt that the Board of Management were influenced by the alarm as to the increase in mental deficiency and by reports from America, notably the history of the Kallikak family. The history of this family, which obtained world-wide publicity, attributed all crime and antisocial activities to the intermarriage of mental defectives. It has since been exposed as a complete fraud, as most of the statements were obtained by hearsay and had no scientific basis. It did, however, profoundly influence public opinion at the turn of the Century.

The awakening of the public conscience on the need for care and control of mental defectives, initiated by the Rev. Andrew Reed, contributed to the passing of the Idiots Act in 1866, and it was only a matter of time and experience before the pressure of public demand for further State recognition resulted in the Royal Commission of 1904 and the passing of the Mental Deficiency Act in 1913.

This Act was not all-embracing, and permitted the care of mental defectives to be continued on a voluntary basis. Consequently, apart from having to comply with the quasi-judicial provisions of certification of patients, Earlswood remained an independent Charity presided over by the Board of Management. It has provided up to the present time for the care of patients from middle class homes, whose parents would have found it difficult to maintain them in those private homes run for profit.

The generous donations of the subscribers of the Society, both in annual subscriptions and in legacies, and careful management have permitted the Board to maintain, on reasonable terms, patients to the number of 560.

On the 5th July next the State assumes responsibility for full care and control of mental defectives, but the Board cherish the hope that the aims and atmosphere which have quickened the life of the Institution for 100 years will persist under the new conditions.

NOTE.—When a Will has been already made, and it is afterwards desired to benefit the Institution, it will be sufficient if the form overleaf is filled up, detached, duly signed and witnessed in like manner as the Will itself, and carefully attached to the existing Will.
