Total number of Patients admitted since the establishment of the Hospital in 1802, 44,024.

The Committee have to report that the Hospital has maintained, through 1865, the character for unprecedented usefulness that has been claimed for it in the three previous years. The number of patients admitted in 1865 was 3355. This number was in excess of the largest number of patients admitted in any previous year since the foundation of the Hospital, with the one exception of 1864. Nor was the excess an inconsiderable one; for no year before 1864 had furnished a greater number of patients than 2699. In the course of the past four years the admissions have been more than one-third of the aggregate admissions of the previous sixty years.

All through the year the admissions have been very numerous, but the highest number was attained in November, when 394 patients were received, a larger number than has ever been admitted in one month since the foundation of the Hospital, and exceeding the total admissions of the entire year 1860. On October 25th, no less than 31 patients were admitted in a single day.

The daily average number of patients in the Hospital for the year was 178. The daily average for the month varied from 125 in August to 256 in December. The largest number of cases in the Hospital at one time was on the 15th of December, when the extraordinary number of 278 patients was reached, being considerably in excess of the proper capacity of the Hospital. Even including 1864, the patients had never before numbered more than 237 in a single day.

Of the 3355 patients admitted in 1865, 2930 were suffering from true specific fevers and 425 from febrile symptoms which were the result of local disease. The following table shows the nature of the prevailing fevers and the monthly admissions from each form:—

Concerning each kind of fever some more detailed statement may be made.

TYPHUS FEVER, which began to be epidemic in London in 1861, and which has since prevailed with incessant virulence though with many minor fluctuations, brought no less than 1961 patients to the Hospital last year. Having its maximum prevalence in January, this fever gradually declined, as its custom is, with the advance of summer, and again furnished more patients in the three last months of the year. But, owing partly to the high temperature of those three months, and partly, perhaps, to the disposition of the epidemic to abate in the metropolis, the admissions for typhus in the later months did not reach the same high numbers as at the beginning of the year.

The characteristic eruption of the disease was observed in  $93\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. of the typhus cases. Of the 1961 cases admitted, together with 168 patients who remained in Hospital from 1864 ill with typhus, 1,614 were restored to health, 113 remained in Hospital on December 31, and 402 died. The mortality was therefore 19 per cent. on the total cases of typhus under treatment, and was 19.4 in males and 18.3 in females. If those cases that arrived at Hospital too late to come fairly under treatment be excluded (28 typhus cases dying within 24 hours, and 35 others within 48 hours of admission) the mortality was 16.8 per cent. This does not differ materially from the average typhus death rate observed in the practice of the Hospital in recent years. According to a well-known rule of typhus, it was a much more serious disease to the old than to the young persons whom it attacked. The mortality at various ages of life is subjoined:—

Enteric Fever has this year a special interest. In 1864 the cases of this fever numbered 252, or 18 in excess of the largest number ever before admitted into the Hospital in one year. In 1865, they more than doubled this largest number, and the admissions for enteric fever reached 520. The excessive prevalence of this disease in London in 1865 is in a great measure to be ascribed to an exaggeration of the climatic conditions that habitually favour its developement. Up to June there were very few cases of enteric fever in Hospital, but then during several weeks of dry hot weather, they began to increase in frequency, and more and more were admitted as the summer advanced. In October, after six weeks' want of rain, and with a mean temperature through two of those weeks of  $66\frac{1}{2}$ °, the disease acquired a new power, and 91 patients suffering from it were admitted into the Hospital. In November this number increased to 128, and in December it was 101.

The skin eruption of enteric fever was present in 61 per cent. of the cases admitted, a smaller proportion than usually observed. Of the 532 cases under treatment (including 12 remaining from the previous year) for enteric fever in 1864, 96 proved fatal, giving a death-rate of 18 per cent. of the attacks; 18.5 in males, 17.7 in females. If three cases fatal in 24 hours, and five others within 48 hours of their admission be excluded as scarcely affording opportunity for treatment, the rate of mortality is reduced to 16.7 per cent. These results correspond pretty closely with the average of former years.

The frequency and fatality of the various complications of enteric fever are subjoined; herein diarrhoa, as being a symptom rather than a complication, is not investigated:—

Scarlet Fever was the cause of admission in 247 patients last year, 95 males and 152 females. These admissions were not very unevenly spread through the different periods of the year. Of the whole number of scarlet fever cases under treatment,  $96\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. had the scarlet eruption; 37 cases were registered as having malignant characters; and 33, or 12.7 per cent. were fatal. This is a smaller mortality than usually seen in the practice of the Hospital. And of these fatal

cases, three died within 24 hours of admission, and five others within 48 hours, several of whom therefore came in too late to receive effectual treatment. The frequency and fatality of scarlatina complications is here shown:—

Thirteen cases of Measles, of which one was fatal, and 22 cases of Small-pox were in the Hospital in 1865. The small-pox cases having been brought in contravention of the Hospital rules and to the hazard of other patients, since there is no provision for the proper isolation of this disease, were sent on to the Small-pox Hospital at Highgate, with the exception of four persons, who were on their admission too ill to bear a further journey, and two of these died.

A list of the Diseases that were not true specific Fevers, but which were admitted into the Hospital in 1865, is given below. Of the 444 persons affected with such other diseases (including 19 who remained from 1864) 113 died, or 25.4 per cent. Deducting 6 cases fatal in the first, and 13 others within the second day after admission, the mortality was 22 per cent. The acute character and the asthenic type which caused these diseases to be mistaken for specific fevers account also for their high fatality.

Of the whole number of patients admitted into Hospital in 1865, 192 were the servants of Governors or had a fee paid on their admission; 38 were admitted without any recommendation at all; and the remaining 3125 were received upon parish orders. In this last category were the great bulk of the cases of typhus; but a larger proportion than usual of the paid cases were also typhus.\*

This vast amount of contagious disease has of course not been treated with complete immunity to the attendants. During the year, a resident medical officer and six nurses contracted typhus, and two of the nurses died. Out of the 79 persons who have been engaged during the year in the management of the Hospital, this is, however, but a small amount of loss. During the year also twelve persons who had been in Hospital with one kind of fever became affected with another kind: thus ten patients caught typhus, one caught scarlet fever, and one small-pox: and of the twelve, three died.

<sup>\*</sup> The numbers were—Typhus, paid, &c., 69; free, 21; the rest from the parishes. Enteric—62 paid, &c.; 9 free, and the rest from the parishes. Scarlet fever—61 paid and Governors orders, 8 free, and the rest on parish orders.

Mischievous fallacies can hardly be too often refuted, and it is worth while to insist again that a few casualties of this sort in the Fever Hospital constitute no reason for diffusing fever cases through the wards of general hospitals. Here is an instance of the result of the latter practice. It is not an unfair, though a somewhat extreme, instance. Into a London hospital of 4-500 beds, 60 cases of typhus were some years ago admitted. Fourteen of these died, a larger proportion, it is to be observed in passing, than in typhus treated at the Fever Hospital. And to other patients and attendants the following was the result. Eleven students were attacked by the fever and three died, 16 nurses and 21 patients were attacked by the fever and of them 10 died, besides others that were not recorded. This is then how the matter stands:-Sixty patients in a general hospital infected at least 48 persons and killed 13 of them. Sixty times sixty patients in the London Fever Hospital in 1865 infected only 19 persons and only five of them fatally.

The chief changes in the medical staff of the Hospital have consisted in the retirement of Dr. Jeaffreson from the office of Resident Medical Officer which he had filled for two years to the great advantage of the charity, and in the appointment of Dr. Squarey as his successor. Dr. Wyber has been recently appointed Assistant Medical Officer.\*

Such has been the medical history of the London Fever Hospital in 1865. But the governors of the charity, while of course considering the recovery of the sick as their primary object, have ever sought to use what means were in their power for the prevention of fever. In the earlier period of its history, when the importance of preventive measures was very little understood, when sanitary legislation was almost unknown, and no authorities were charged with the execution of such laws as did exist, the Hospital used to advise the public directly how to prevent contagion, and by its own servants undertook to cleanse and disinfect premises from which fever patients were brought. The present sanitary organization of London has put an end to the functions of the Hospital in these respects. There are

<sup>\*</sup> At the date of this report Dr. Wyber was in good health: while it is passing through the press he has fallen a victim to typhus. In his short term of office, he had worked with rare assiduity and intelligence, and his character and conscientiousness had won him the respect and affection of his colleagues. In deploring the loss of Dr. Wyber, the Committee observe that—of some thirty medical men who have been from time to time in charge of the wards—they have not had the misfortune to lose any one from tiphus during the past thirty-four years, though several have been attacked. The last previous death of a medical officer from typhus contracted in the Hospital was that of Dr. Dill in 1832.

Medical Officers of Health whose special duty it is to take cognizance of epidemics and to point out the most efficient mode of checking their spread; and there are in every parish, authorities appointed to administer a number of laws more or less adapted to their object of protecting the public health. But although the direct function of the Hospital in preventing disease at its source is thus in great measure superseded, the Governors have ever kept this object in view. For example, to discourage the practice of conveying infectious diseases about the metropolis in public cabs, they have provided and maintain at their own expense an ambulance, which can be had at any time upon payment of horse hire. And the formation of the "Hospital carriage fund," during the past year, leads the Committee to hope that their Hospital will soon be in direct communication with all the telegraph offices of London, and that poor patients may be removed to and from the Hospital wholly free of charge.

A very important service which the Hospital renders to the sanitary organization of the metropolis, and which has, perhaps, been insufficiently appreciated hitherto, consists in the access to the registers of the hospital that is freely given to officers of health These registers, from which some particulars have and others. been abstracted for this Report are, on the evidence of Government Inspectors, "kept on a plan and with a degree of detail that renders them unusually instructive and interesting." Among other points, they record for each patient the house and parish from which he came and the nature of his illness-information of great value to sanitary officers in tracing the places where measures of improvement are most urgently needed, and even indicating to some extent the nature of the sanitary defects that may be expected. For it is now certainly known that epidemic typhus fever depends mainly upon the huddling together of uncleanly people upon too limited area, and into too confined rooms, and that where enteric fever exists, these defects of drainage and foulness of water are to be sought.

The following summary will show how considerable is the information that sanitary authorities from London can gain from the Hospital records. Some Officers of Health are at present in the habit of consulting them with much advantage; and the Committee invite all who are concerned in the local government of the metropolis to make free use of them.

<sup>\*</sup> In this table, patients admitted free, by Governors' orders, or by payment, are classified as far as possible, but the parish in which they had lived was often unknown. St. Giles' Union began to send patients on April 6th only; Whitechapel sent none till December 1. It will be observed that all the London districts but Mile End, Poplar, and Lewisham have contributed cases of fever: cases of fever occurring in those districts are provided for by local arrangements.

Upon this table the Committee desire to make one observation for the consideration of subscribers to the hospital and of the public. the main, the poorest districts will be found to have sent most fever; and in what follows, the committee do not imply that any consideration stands before charity as a motive for liberal support to the hospital. But it is remarkable, that from many well-to-do districts of London, which commonly send but few cases of fever, an unusual number have been received in the past year. Partly this is due to the greater recognition the hospital has recently obtained; and partly to the greater prevalence of enteric fever, which confines its attacks to no one rank of life in the way that typhus usually does. But the fact is also attributable to the singular way in which the typhus epidemic had wandered, in 1865, beyond its customary limits, and had appeared in districts where there are few of the destitute and filthy class. Thus, it is rare to find nearly a quarter of the whole number of typhus cases brought (as they were brought in 1865) from the western and northern divisions of the town; and again, the experience of the hospital, of late years, had not shown any typhus cases brought from St. George Hanover Square, or Hampstead, or Paddington; but a few cases were admitted from these districts in 1865. From these facts, the committee would point out anew, that the richer part of the community derives benefits almost as important as the poor, though not so direct, from the action of the Fever Hospital. Had the seven or eight thousand typhus patients (to say nothing of people suffering from other fevers) who have entered the Fever Hospital in the past four years remained at their homes for treatment, they must have formed so many fresh centres of infection, the disease must have acquired a greater power of diffusion into the better districts, and a multitude of homes would have been invaded that have now escaped the epidemic. To persons who have actually had occasion to send a sick servant to the hospital, and so have prevented contagion spreading in their families, the claims of the charity do not need to be commended; but the committee, in addressing those who can afford to give, are justified in urging as much upon those whose families have escaped fever, as on those who have directly felt the usefulness of the hospital, that everybody is concerned in maintaining the institution in the highest state of efficiency.

During 1865, the committee are happy to be able to say that they have not turned from their doors a single applicant for admission. The new wing that was opened in January, 1864, enabled the hospital to receive all patients, though at the end of the year the wards were too crowded, and the system of classification of diseases, that has been for some years in beneficial operation, was occasionally interfered with. But at the end of the year the increased number of applicants was such that the committee had to face the alternative: Shall patients be sent back, and thus be compelled to do the very mischief which the hospital is ever striving to prevent, of spreading contagion in their homes, in workhouses, and through London indefinitely—Or shall we make a fresh extension of our Hospital?

After much consideration, in which the great expense of increasing the hospital and maintaining so many patients, and the liberality of the public in supplying the means for maintaining the former extension, were advanced as arguments on either side, it was determined to build a second new wing. To bring the history of the hospital down to the date of this report (February 9th, 1866), the foundations for a building that can hold 120 more patients have been laid. To meet the more pressing emergencies, an iron shed, well warmed, lighted, and ventilated, has been put up in ten days, and holds 30 patients; and the committee will be prepared—if they are supported, as they hope to be, by the public—for any additional amount of pressure that appears likely to be made on their resources.

But this new extension of the hospital, with ward furniture, beds, and bedding, will, with the greatest economy, cost £5,000. The maintenance of its hundred and twenty beds, filled with a succession of patients, will involve a yearly outlay of some £4,000 or £5,000, in addition to the present annual expenditure of £7,000 or £8,000 a-year.

Regarding the amount of good that the hospital confers upon all classes, both by the work it does and the harm that it prevents, the committee urge with confidence its claims on the liberal support of the public. They beg alike for more annual subscriptions to meet their large current expenditure, and to enable them to be always prepared for such epidemics as the present; and for immediate donations, that may enable them to complete the building they have begun, and to take in every poor applicant suffering under contagious fever.

## LAWS AND REGULATIONS.

## OBJECTS OF THE INSTITUTION.

- 1. All poor persons (not being parochial paupers) and domestic servants of subscribers, labouring under contagious fever, and residing in the metropolis or its neighbourhood, shall be considered proper objects for this charity, and shall be admitted gratuitously, according to the next regulation. Parochial paupers, domestic servants, and non-subscribers, and all inmates of other public charities (except medical hospitals), shall be admitted on the payment of such sum for each patient as the Committee shall from time to time determine.
- 2. On application for the admission of any patient to the hospital, notice shall be immediately given to the resident medical officer, and the person after inspection may be admitted by an order signed by him, or on a certificate signed by any physician, surgeon, or apothecary, stating the disease to be fever of a contagious nature, or likely to become such. The order or certificate shall entitle the patient to admission, subject to the provisions contained in Rule No. 1, unless the case shall be deemed an improper one by the resident medical officer, or unless the hospital shall be full.

#### GOVERNORS.

3. All subscribers of one guinea annually, or of ten guineas in one donation, shall be governors of this hospital.

## GENERAL MEETING AND ELECTION OF THE COMMITTEE.

4. A general meeting of the governors, of which ten days' previous notice must be given in three morning newspapers, shall be held every year, on the second Friday in February, or as near thereto as may be convenient, for the purpose of approving or rescinding the proceedings of the Committee for the preceding year; for receiving an annual report of the state of the funds; and for electing a president, vice-presidents, treasurer, honorary secretary, and other members of the Committee for the ensuing year. At all meetings connected with the affairs of the hospital, a simple majority of the governors

present and voting shall bind the minority; and in case of equality of votes, the chairman shall have an additional vote or casting vote.

- 5. A special general meeting of the governors may at any time be called, by direction of the president or of the Committee; or on the requisition of any twelve governors, provided the requisition be made in writing to the secretary, and the purpose for which the same is summoned be published in three morning newspapers at least ten days prior to the next meeting; but the proceedings of such special general meeting, though acted upon pro tempore, shall not be deemed final, until confirmed by another general meeting.
- 6. No new rule or law shall be made, nor shall any existing rule or law be repealed or altered, until determined upon at a general meeting by a majority of governors present and voting, and until confirmed at a subsequent general or special meeting.
- 7. The presence of seven governors shall be necessary to constitute a quorum at general meetings, and without that number no business shall be transacted.
- 8. At the annual general meeting, a Committee for the management of the Institution shall be elected, consisting of the president, the vice-presidents, the treasurer, honorary secretary, and twenty-four other governors; four of which governors shall not have been members of the preceding Committee. They shall meet on the last Friday, or on such other day of every month as the Committee may appoint; and three members shall be necessary to constitute a meeting, and to transact business. A special meeting of the Committee may be called by the direction of the treasurer, or by any three members of the Committee, on giving at least three days' notice of the same, and specifying the business for which it is called.
- 9. The Committee shall have authority to appoint sub-committees, whose reports shall be submitted to their consideration; they shall elect all the officers, except the physicians of the hospital and the honorary secretary, who shall be elected by the governors at large; and with the assistance of the medical officers, shall form regulations and by-laws for the internal management of the hospital.
- 10. The resolutions of one meeting of the Committee shall not be rescinded by another, unless it be specially summoned for that purpose. All accounts, except such small sums as may be comprised under the item of petty cash shall be submitted to the Committee at the monthly meetings, after having been duly examined by the secretary, the resident medical officer, and the house-directors; and such accounts, if approved, shall be paid by cheques payable to order, signed in Committee by the chairman and one other member, or, in case a Committee cannot be formed, by two of the house-directors, and in all cases countersigned by the secretary. All the larger articles of supply,

when practicable, shall be furnished by contract made after public tender. No expenditure for repairs of premises or any machinery shall be incurred, without a written order from the Committee or house-directors.

- 11. The Committee shall yearly publish a report of the state of the hospital.
- 12. No person being a member of the Committee, shall furnish for profit any goods, provisions, or other articles, for the use of, or on account of, the hospital, or be concerned in any contract for supplying the same, or be employed for hire, or wages, or profit, in any office or employment under the charity.

#### TREASURER.

13. The treasurer, if present, shall take the chair at all meetings of the Committee, in the absence of the president or vice-presidents. He shall keep an account at the bankers, and all moneys received for the use of the hospital shall be paid to such account; he shall honour all cheques signed, as provided in Rule 10; and the signature of the secretary shall be a sufficient warranty that the cheques purporting to be so signed are properly signed, and shall be an indemnity to the treasurer against risk.

#### AUDITORS.

14. Three gentlemen shall be appointed annually at the meeting of the Committee in November, who shall audit the accounts of the Institution for the current year, and approve an abstract of all receipts and disbursements to be prepared by the secretary, and laid before the annual general meeting in February.

## MONTHLY DIRECTORS.

- 15. The Committee shall, at each monthly meeting, appoint three members of their own body as Directors of the hospital, of whom two shall be a quorum, and who shall continue in office until the next monthly meeting of the Committee. The Trustees and the two senior physicians shall be ex officion Directors of the hospital, in addition to three members to be appointed at each monthly meeting, as provided by this rule.
- 16. They shall from time to time cause the beds, clothes, and apparel belonging to the hospital to be examined, and shall report thereon, if necessary, to the Committee. They shall inspect the tradesmen's bills, and take care that the provisions, bedding, clothing, furniture, and every article for the use of the hospital, be supplied on the most reasonable terms; they shall order in writing all permanent stores.
- 17. They shall be authorized in all respects to enforce the observance of the regulations of the hospital; they shall notice and report to the committee

any irregularity or misconduct on the part of the officers, servants, or patients of the charity, and shall, at every meeting of the Committee, cause a statement of the house expenditure to be produced for the preceding month. They shall appoint the porters, nurses, and other menial servants of the hospital, and dismiss them for misconduct.

#### PHYSICIANS.

- 18. There shall be two physicians, and two assistant-physicians, who shall be Fellows or Members (formerly called Licentiates) of the Royal College of Physicians of London; and also a consulting surgeon, who shall be a Fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons.
- 19. The physicians and assistant-physicians shall be elected by the governors at large; and no governor shall be qualified to vote, unless he shall have become a governor three months before a vacancy is declared.
- 20. One of the physicians shall visit the hospital at least once every day, and at such times as they may deem necessary. They shall have the power of dismissing any patient or convalescent for refractory conduct or disobedience of orders.

### ASSISTANT-PHYSICIANS.

21. In case of the illness or necessary absence of either of the physicians, one of the assistant-physicians shall attend regularly in his stead. Such attendances are to be reported to the Committee.

### HOSPITAL PUPILS.

22. No medical student shall be permitted to visit the hospital unless in company with one of the physicians, and unless he is regularly entered or registered as a pupil.

#### RESIDENT MEDICAL OFFICER.

- 23. The resident medical officer shall reside constantly at the hospital, and shall devote himself entirely to the duties of his office; and previously to his election, he shall be required to produce satisfactory testimonials to the Committee.
- 24. He shall superintend the patients between the visits of the physicians, and the dispensary shall be exclusively under his control. In the absence of the Committee and house-directors, he shall be recognised as the head of the establishment.

- 25. Accurate registers of the patients admitted, as well as of the remedies employed for their recovery, shall be kept—which registers shall be the property of the hospital; he shall produce a special report every month, to be laid before the Committee.
- 26. When the number of patients shall be great, a medical assistant shall be appointed by the House Directors, subject to the confirmation of the Committee, and he shall receive such remuneration as the Committee shall from time to time determine.

#### HONORARY SECRETARY.

27. There shall be an honorary secretary, who shall also be a member of the Committee, and chosen annually with them. He shall be at liberty to attend all deputations to public bodies and private persons. He shall communicate with persons concerning the affairs of the hospital during the intervals between the monthly meetings of the Committee, and shall report to the Committee, at their next meeting, all special or important events that shall have occurred within his knowledge during the month. He shall also assist the treasurer in the discharge of his duties when necessary.

## SECRETARY AND HOUSE STEWARD.

28. The duties of this officer shall be to reside in the hospital, if required by the committee, and in the absence of the House Directors to have the management of the domestic affairs of the hospital, under the general superintendence of the resident medical officer. He shall be required to enter into a bond, with sufficient sureties for the due and faithful performance of his duties. He shall also perform the several duties specified in the by-laws.

#### MATRON.

29. The duties of the matron shall principally relate to the wards, the kitchen and the laundry. She shall exercise a strict superintendence over the nurses; shall have the charge of linen, bedding, glass, crockery, and ordinary kitchen and skullery stores, subject to the general supervision of the house steward; and shall visit every ward of the hospital at least three times in the day. She shall also perform the several duties specified in the by-laws.

## COLLECTOR.

30. The duties of this officer shall be—
To call on subscribers and collect all donations and subscriptions of the hospital;
to give only authorized printed receipts for the same; to attend all meetings,

to give only authorized printed receipts for the same; to attend all meetings, when required; to keep correct lists and duplicate lists of all donations and subscriptions, with the residences of the donors and subscribers made up from

day to day; to pay weekly all moneys he may receive to the bankers; to deliver weekly to the secretary reports in writing of all moneys received and paid, with the balance at the bankers; to keep the accoun's regularly entered in the collector's cash book; to deliver a copy of the annual report to each subscriber; and to give such security, with sureties, for the due and faithful performance of his duties, as may be required.

### NURSES.

- 31. The head nurse in each ward shall attend principally to the patients; and to the keeping of the wards clean and quiet.
- 32. The under-nurses shall be under the direction of the head-nurses, and shall perform the more menial offices of the hospital.

## PORTER AND ENGINEER.

33. The porter and the engineer shall be employed as the Committee or directors may think proper. They shall not absent themselves without the permission of the house-directors or resident medical officer.

#### TRUSTEES.

- 34. The legal estate in the lands, buildings, and premises of the hospital shall be vested in three trustees; new trustees being appointed when vacancies occur at a general meeting of the governors.
- 35. All legacies of £100 and upwards, unless otherwise directed by testators, shall be invested for the benefit of the hospital, in the names of the three trustees.
- 36. No variation in the usual gratuities and fixed salaries shall be made, unless the Committee be specially summoned for the purpose, and unless the proposed addition, or diminution, be confirmed by a subsequent Committee.

### BY-LAWS.

37. The by-laws which shall from time to time be made by the Committee shall be open to the inspection of any subscriber, and shall contain, among other things, a full specification of the duties of the resident medical officer, the matron, and other officers of the Institution, with the practices usually adopted for their election; which specification shall be read out to every individual before his appointment, and referred to on all occasions of doubt.
