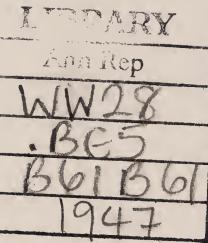

Report of the Committee of Management

TO THE GOVERNORS OF THE

Birmingham and Midland Eye Hospital

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31st DECEMBER, 1947.

THE Committee of Management have pleasure in submitting to the Governors and Subscribers the 124th Annual Report of the Hospital, together with the Report of the Medical Board, and the audited Statement of Accounts for the year ended 31st December, 1947.

It is interesting to note that there were nearly 10,000 more out-patient attendances during the year, bringing the total up to 139,000, which is an indication of the volume of work being dealt with by the Out-patient Department.

Statistics of the numbers of in-patients treated and the attendances of out-patients and casualties will be found in the Medical Report.

SCHEME OF DEVELOPMENT

In the Annual Report for 1946 the extensions and developments envisaged in Part I of the Scheme of Development were enumerated, and your Committee are pleased to report that the builders completed their task during November, 1947, and the Orthoptic Department and the Research Department were able to move into their new quarters.

Difficulty in obtaining delivery of equipment has been a serious problem, but the Main Kitchen has now been almost re-equipped and your Committee are pleased to be able to report that the excellent kitchen staff are now working in proper conditions. At the same time, they would like to place on record their appreciation of the cheerful and efficient way in which the kitchen staff carried out their duties during the interruptions and discomforts caused by the re-building.

It is hoped that the equally important Part II of the Development Scheme will be completed early in 1948.

NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE ACT, 1946

Your Committee have been informed by the Minister of Health that the Hospital will be transferred to the Birmingham Regional Hospital Board on the appointed day, i.e., 5th July, 1948.

It is understood, however, that the Hospital will continue to provide facilities for both graduate and post-graduate teaching for the University of Birmingham.

STAFF

Mr. F. M. Haughton, who was appointed House Governor in 1940, tendered his resignation in July, upon his appointment to the post of House Governor of the Harrogate and District General Hospital. Mr. Haughton's work for the Hospital was of the highest quality, and the opportunity is taken here of recording thanks and appreciation for the services he gave to the Hospital during the difficult war years.

In his place, your Committee appointed Mr. R. F. Lovett, Assistant Secretary of the Bristol Royal Hospital, who had served in the R.A.F. Regiment for four-and-a-half years during the war. Mr. Lovett took up his appointment on the 20th October, 1947, and has already displayed great energy, enthusiasm and ability in his work for the Hospital.

EQUIPMENT OF HOSPITAL AND NURSES' HOME

Much repair, replacement and maintenance work was necessarily deferred during the war years. Within the limits imposed by Government licensing, your Committee has, therefore, done its utmost during the last year to restore the structure, layout and equipment of the Hospital to the efficient pre-war standards. In accordance with this policy, the following matters should be mentioned:

Surgical Instruments, etc.

After careful examination of the present position, the sum of £3,500 was allocated for replacement and new instruments.

Furniture and Equipment.

Much ward furniture and equipment has become worn out, and a sum of approximately £3,000 has been allocated for the purchase of chairs, dining-room furniture, electric polishers, etc.

Internal Telephone.

The internal telephone system was very old indeed and had become unreliable and inefficient. Your Committee decided, therefore, to instal a modern internal telephone system, which will provide greater cover of the building than the old one.

Staff Location.

It has always been difficult to locate staff within the building. After careful enquiry and thorough practical tests, your Committee have authorised the installation of a Public Address system of location, which, owing to the structure of the building, appears to offer this Hospital some advantage over the more common visual method.

Boilers.

The main heating boilers of the Hospital broke down during September, 1947, whilst undergoing their periodical tests. It is hoped that the necessary permits can be obtained in order to instal new boilers before next winter.

Nurses' Home.

The Home, which was completed in 1939 and occupied in 1940, was partially vacated during the war years. It has become necessary to redecorate the whole building, and your Committee have authorised an expenditure of approximately £2,000 for this work. The specification for the work needed has been forwarded to the appropriate Ministry and it is hoped that the necessary licence will be issued in time to enable a start to be made in the near future.

Finance

INCOME

Your Committee are pleased to report that the total income for the year amounted to £42,696, an increase of £1,616 over that of the previous year.

Receipts on account of Services Rendered totalled £35,149, an increase of £2,844 over the corresponding figure of 1946. The contribution received from the **Birmingham Hospitals** Contributory Association has decreased this year by nearly £2,000, which is due to the fact that all school-children attending maintained schools are now treated free under the provisions of the Education Act, 1944. Fees due from the various **Education** Committees for the year amounted to £6,459, an increase of £3,400 over the previous year. But it should be appreciated that the charges made for services rendered to members of the

Birmingham Hospitals Contributory Association and to Education Authorities are based on formulae which do not fully cover the costs of the treatments given. In consequence the receipts of the Hospital for the services it renders must always lag behind any rises which may take place in the costs of rendering those services.

Income derived from **E.M.S. Fees** has decreased considerably and amounted to only £226.

A grant of £912 was made by the University and showed an increase of £284.

EXPENDITURE

The Ordinary Expenditure, which amounted to £46,403, represented an increase of £5,780 over that of the previous year, and the increases of the principal headings of Expenditure are summarized below:

Your Committee have continued to exercise careful control over the expenses of the Hospital. The greater part of this increase in cost results, however, from causes beyond their control. Comment should perhaps be made on the following items:

Surgery and Dispensary includes Drugs, Dressings, Instruments, and Appliances. The increase in cost is partially due to the fact that the Hospital has had to purchase Penicillin, which until May, 1946, was provided free by the Ministry of Health. The prices of all other supplies have increased during the year.

Domestic.—The largest increase under this heading was the cost of coal.

Salaries and Wages.—All branches of the Hospital Staff have received nationally-negotiated increases in salaries and wages, the principal items being: Domestic, £1,500; Other Officers, £1,600. There will be further increases during 1948 resulting from the higher scale for Orthoptists, which was nationally agreed recently.

Miscellaneous.—The cost of Printing and Stationery has increased considerably during the year, due to higher prices and purchase tax.

Establishment.—During the year considerable damage was caused by gales and over £600 had to be expended on repairing the roofs and turrets.

The accounts disclose an excess of Expenditure over Income amounting to £3,706 14s. Id. Considering that Legacies received, which this year amounted to £3,396, are not included in the Hospital's Income, your Committee feel that the financial results of the year are not unsatisfactory.

HOSPITALS CENTRE SITE

Your Committee wish to report that during the year several meetings were held in connection with the development of the Hospitals Centre Site, but, as stated in the last Report, the completion of this most important work will be taken out of their hands by the State.

A communication had been received from the Ministry of Health stating that consideration of the matter should be held in abeyance until the Birmingham Regional Hospitals Board and the Board of Governors of the Teaching Hospital had been constituted and would be in a position to express an opinion on it.

GIFTS TO HOSPITALS AFTER THE TRANSFER TO THE BIRMINGHAM REGIONAL HOSPITAL BOARD

Your Committee wish to record their very grateful thanks to all Subscribers and Donors for the great assistance they have given to the Hospital during the past year.

Although the National Health Service Act lays a duty on the Minister of Health to provide a comprehensive service, it has been made equally clear that there will still be need in the Hospital Service for local interest, initiative and support, and it is hoped that those generous helpers who have done so much in the past will continue to render their very valuable service to the community.

It is understood that the new Hospital Management Committees, about to be formed, will be empowered to apply gifts for the benefit of an individual hospital. It will be still possible for those who cherish an intimate association with a particular hospital to ensure that their financial support goes to benefit that hospital and no other.

Gifts and legacies should be accompanied by an express wish for their application for particular purposes and at particular hospitals. Your Committee sincerely hope that their supporters will take advantage of this scheme in the future, because there are many ways in which gifts will benefit both patients and staff.

THE LADIES' GUILD.

The thanks of your Committee are extended once again to the members of the Ladies' Guild for their continued interest in the welfare of the patients.

It is understood that the Guild intends to purchase suitable outdoor amusements for the children who are in-patients at Burcot Grange.

Your Committee wish to thank Mr. Alan Priestley, the Manager of the Hippodrome and Mr. E. C. Thomas, who have kindly made available to the staff tickets for entertainments and concerts.

Your Committee desire to express to the Honorary Medical and Surgical Staff their warm appreciation of the skill and attention which they have devoted to the care of the patients and of the interest they have displayed in the work of the Hospital.

In conclusion, your Committee wish also to record their appreciation of the services of the House Governor, the Matron, and the Nursing, Domestic and Administrative Staffs, who have worked together to maintain a high standard, which is gratefully acknowledged.

The total number of out-patient attendances continued to increase during the year and totalled 139,893—an increase of 9,990 over the previous year.

An increasing number of school children are attending for eye testing and this has added to the problem of accommodation of so many patients in our restricted space.

Four afternoon clinics have been instituted in order to relieve the pressure of morning work and reduce the period of waiting.

The Committee of Management have sanctioned the appointment of two additional medical refractionists, and also a supernumary Registrar, to help with this problem.

SPECTACLE PRESCRIPTIONS.

The spectacle prescriptions issued during the year totalled 11,571, a decrease of 390 on the previous year. The delivery of spectacles has improved considerably during 1948.

NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE ACT, 1946.

The Hospital has been informed that on the "appointed day" it will be transferred to the Birmingham Regional Hospital Board.

COLLABORATION WITH THE UNIVERSITY OF BIRMINGHAM:

Extension of Teaching Facilities.

In order to improve the teaching facilities at the Hospital, the Honorary Medical Staff have re-arranged their duties, thereby enabling more time to be devoted to the teaching of students. We continue to provide a major portion of the undergraduate teaching in Ophthalmology for the University.

Post-graduate Course.

The University has approved the arrangements made at this Hospital for a Post-graduate Course in Ophthalmology, and the first course will commence on the 1st July, 1948.

NEUROLOGICAL CLINIC.

Á valuable addition to the service offered by this Hospital to patients will be the establishment in the near future of a Neurological Clinic, in association with the Neurological Department of the United Hospital. The Medical Board welcomes this further connection with the Teaching Hospital.

SCHEME FOR DEMOBILISED MEDICAL OFFICERS.

The Scheme for Demobilised Medical officers has been continued and the Hospital still receives requests from present serving medical officers to undertake their specialist training in Ophthalmology at this Hospital upon demobilisation.

RESEARCH DEPARTMENT.

The Department continued its active work during the year and moved into its new quarters in November. The Medical Board wishes to express its appreciation of the work done by the Department during the year.

The Directors' report appears on pages 24 and 5.

OPHTHALMIA NEONATORUM.

The Medical Board wishes to convey its appreciation of the assistance given by the Medical Officer of Health (Dr. H. P. Newsholme), the Deputy Medical Officer of Health (Dr. Matthew Burn), and their assistants, in the work undertaken by the Hospital in the treatment of Ophthalmia Neonatorum. The financial assistance granted for this work on the prevention of blindness by the Public Health Department is gratefully acknowledged.

The externe nursing staff have continued their attendance at the homes of patients who, for one reason or another, have been unable to attend the Hospital. During the year 3,065 domiciliary visits were made, of which 2,237 were for the treatment of cases of Ophthalmia Neonatorum.

THE RICHARD MIDDLEMORE ENDOWMENT.

The 59th Annual Post-graduate Lecture under this Endowment was delivered at the Hospital on the 3rd October, 1947, by Mr. John Foster, Ophthalmic Surgeon, Leeds General Infirmary, who took as his subject: CURIOSA OPHTHALMICA.

RE-EQUIPMENT OF THE HOSPITAL.

The war years made it difficult and sometimes impossible to replace obsolete instruments and obtain new ones, and the Medical Board has reviewed the instrument situation in the Hospital during the year. A comprehensive scheme for renewal and replacement of instruments, amounting to £3,500, was subsequently approved by the Committee of Managment, but the difficult conditions still prevail and have prevented the completion of orders.

PUBLICATIONS BY THE HONORARY MEDICAL STAFF.

The following publication has been issued by a member of the Honorary Staff since the last Medical Report, and a number of others were accepted for publication during the year but have not yet appeared:

"Tendon grafting operations for paralytic squint," by Mr. P. Jameson Evans.

GENERAL.

The Board wishes to convey its best thanks to the Committee of Management and the House and Finance Committee for their continued co-operation, and also to the Matron and her Nursing Staff for their untiring efforts during a very difficult year.

RESEARCH DEPARTMENT.

Research work has continued throughout the year, particular attention being paid to the subject of miners' nystagmus.

The staff of the Department have had the active co-operation of Dr. F. Sharpley of the Research Department of the Oxford Eye Hospital, and of Dr. Stern, a psychiatrist.

The result of these investigations has been made the subject of a report to the Miners' Nystagmus Committee of the Coal Board and will shortly be published.

The Orthoptists, Mrs. Harrison and Mrs. Vertigen, have carried out an investigation of the binocular vision of normal subjects and of miners, under conditions of low illumination.

Miss Tonks has continued her bio-chemical investigations on the Vitamin "A" content of blood in certain eye diseases, together with preliminary investigations on the bio-chemical changes in subjects suffering from migraine.

In November, 1947, the Department was transferred to its new premises, which are most satisfactory and will provide great possibilities of development.
