

RULES.

I.—Governors.

The body of governors shall consist of life governors and governors.

1. The life governors shall be—

- (1) Donors of Fifty Pounds and upwards at one time to the funds of the Hospital or their nominee.
- (2) One of the executors of any person bequeathing £500 and upwards to the funds of the charities.
- (3) Such donors or nominees of schools, clubs, institutions and societies, etc., collecting in any one year one hundred guineas and upwards.
- (4) No more than eight Honorary Life Governors elected by an Annual Meeting on the recommendation of the Committee, who shall not recommend more than two in any one year.

2. The governors shall be—

- (1) Annual subscribers of one guinea and upwards.
- (2) The nominee (in writing) of any firm, Body corporate Board of Guardians, School, Club, or Society subscribing ten guineas and upwards annually.
- (3) Governors shall continue qualified for 12 months from the receipt of the donation or collection.
- (4) Members of the Hon. Medical Staff.

II.—Subscribers.

Subscribers are those who contribute less than one guinea annually. Donors of £100 or over to the funds of the Hospital may name a bed for a period of five years for each £100 given. Donors of £2000 may name a bed in perpetuity.

III.—The Trustees.

- 1. The number of the trustees shall not be more than five or less than three. All appointments of future trustees shall be made by the Committee of Management. The trustees shall be ex-officio members of the Committee of Management.
- 2. All legacies and life governors' donations shall on receipt be applied as the Committee of Management shall direct unless there is a specific instruction of the testator or donor for such to be applied to any special object.
- 3. All income received by the trustees from stock or securities held by them shall be paid to the treasurer for the benefit of the Hospital.

IV.—Admission of Patients.

- 1. Letters of introduction will be issued to Governors and Subscribers to the Hospital when asked for. A letter from a qualified Medical Practitioner shall be considered to be a letter of introduction. Donors of uch letters are requested to give these to suitable cases only and to sign them prior to issue.
- N.B.—The object of these letters of introduction is to secure that only those persons entitled to receive the benefits of the Institution shall be recommended. It is hoped that governors and others will assist the

Committee of Management in carefully ascertaining the circumstances of applicants before supplying them with letters of introduction.

2. Patients are entitled to receive the benefits of the Institution provided they are consistent subscribers under the following scheme, and are considered by the Medical Staff to be suitable cases for Hospital treatment and except in cases of accident or sudden illness shall bring a letter or certificate from their own Doctor.

contributing Scheme A.—Provided that a contribution of not less than 3d. per week has been made for three months prior to applying for treatment and that contributions are not more than three months in arrears. This contribution will entitle the donor and his family (children limited to 16 years of age) to free treatment either as in or out-patients. Those whose income exceeds the income tax limit are not eligible.

The collection of these contributions will be made by the employer or someone authorised by the contributors, and a declaration by such person shall be considered sufficient evidence that the applicant, or a member of his family, is entitled to receive free treatment.

The following are not considered eligible to receive free treatment under the above scheme:

- (a) Persons who are ordered treatment by the Ministry of Pensions.
- (b) Women who are admitted for confinement.
- (c) Cases admitted under the agreement with the Local Health Authority.

Free treatment will not include the supply of instruments, appliances or spectacles, although these will be obtainable on special Hospital terms.

3. The Hospital is open for cases of accident or emergency at any time without Letters of Introduction. All cases not being admitted under A will be asked to contribute towards the cost of their maintenance. Necessitous persons at the discretion of the House Committee will be admitted and treated free of cost.

V.—President.

There shall be a President who shall be appointed annually by the Governors.

VI.—Annual Meeting.

- 1. A Meeting of the Governors shall be held annually not later than the last day of March for the purpose of
 - (1) Receiving the report of the Committee of Management and the accounts for the past year.
 - (2) Filling vacancies in the Committee of Management, appointing an auditor and altering rules (if necessary), and transacting any other business in connection with the Hospital.
- . The said annual meeting of the governors shall be convened by a circular sent to each governor not less than seven clear days before the date appointed for such meeting and shall be publicly advertised.

VII .- Voting.

No governor shall vote at any meeting if his or her subscription be three months in arrear. Each Governor shall be entitled to one vote only, voting by proxy not permissible.

VIII.—Meeting of Governors.

A meeting of the governors may be convened by the Committee of unangement at any time when they deem it expedient and must be smmoned by them on receipt by the secretary of a requisition in

writing signed by ten governors. Such meeting shall be convened in the same way as the annual meeting. The circular shall state the particular business of such meeting and no other business shall be transacted thereat.

IX.—Quorum.

At any meeting of the governors ten members present shall be necessary to form a quorum except at any special meeting when the making altering or repealing of rules is under consideration in which case fifteen governors must be present. In the event of no quorum being present the meeting shall stand adjourned to some subsequent day to be fixed by the Committee.

X.—Chairman of Meetings.

At any meeting of governors the president shall take the chair. In his absence the meeting shall elect a chairman for the day. The chairman shall in addition to his vote as a governor have a casting vote.

XI.—Alterations of Rules.

The making altering or repealing any rules shall take place at the annual meeting or any meeting of governors of which thirteen clear days' notice shall have been given and at which not less than fifteen governors are present. Any governor desiring to make any new rule or to alter or repeal any existing rule shall give notice in writing to the secretary who shall set out such alteration in the circular convening the meeting at which the same is to be considered the consent of two-thirds of the members present and voting shall be necessary to carry such alteration.

XII.—Committee of Management.

The Committee of Management shall consist of the President, the Hon Trustees, Treasurer, and Hon. Sec., and 18 members elected from among their number by the Governors at Annual Meetings, and one-fourth of the Medical and Dental staff from among their number. The Committee of Management shall have power to co-opt Governors in addition to the members elected as above.

- 2. One-third of the members of the Committee elected by the governors shall retire by rotation on the day of each annual meeting, but shall be eligible for re-election. Members of the Board who have not attended any meetings during the previous year, without sufficient reason, shall cease to be members.
- 4. No member of the Committee shall be at the same time Chairman of the Management Committee and of the Finance Committee or House Committee. This, however, shall not prevent a Chairman from presiding at meetings of a sub-committee appointed by his own committee for some special purpose.
- 5. Nominations for election on the Committee of Management must be sent to the secretary in writing three clear days' at least before the annual meeting of governors.

XIII.—Vacancies on Committee of Management.

1. Any vacancy occurring by death resignation or otherwise in the number of members of the Committee elected by the governors may be filled up by the Committee of Management but the member so chosen shall retain his office so long only as the vacating member would have retained the same if no vacancy had occurred.

2. If any vacancy is not filled up by the Committee of Management it shall be filled up by the governors at the first succeeding annual meeting.

XIV.—Chairman and Vice-Chairman.

The Committee of Management shall at the first meeting subsequent to the annual meeting of governors in each year appoint a chairman who shall have the right to preside till the next annual meeting at any meeting of the Committee of Management at which he is present. The Committee shall also appoint a vice-chairman who shall in the absence of the chairman preside at any meetings. The Chairman and Vice-Chairman shall be *ex-officio* members of the Finance Committee and the House Committee. In case of these being absent from any meeting the members may appoint a chairman for that meeting. The Chairman of any meeting shall have a second or casting vote.

XV.—Committee Meetings.

- 1. The Committee of Management shall meet quarterly on the last Thursday in the months of January, April, July and October and at such other times as occasion may require.
- 2. Seven members exclusive of the representatives of the medical staff shall form a quorum.
- 3. No motion other than shall relate to the ordinary current business of the Institution shall be brought before the Committee of Management unless detailed notice of same shall have been given to the Secretary fourteen days previously, and particulars of the same communicated in writing to each member of the Committee, along with the notice of the meeting at which it is to bec onsidered.

4. No resolution passed by the Committee of Management shall be rescinded unless by a majority of two-thirds at a meeting at which two-thirds at least of the Committee shall be present and vote. Notice to rescind a motion of a resolution of the Committee shall be given to the Secretary at least fourteen days before a meeting of the Committee.

XVI.—Extraordinary Committee Meetings.

- 1. On a requisition signed by three members of the Committee of Management addressed to the secretary and stating the object of the proposed meeting the secretary shall call an extraordinary meeting and in the notice shall set out the object of the meeting.
- 2. Extraordinary meetings of the Committee may be called at any time by the chairman or vice-chairman who in the notice shall set out the object of the meeting.

XVII.—Notice of Committee Meetings.

Seven clear days' notice in writing shall be given of Committee meetings (ordinary or extraordinary) to every member of the Committee but if in the opinion of the chairman or vice-chairman the circumstances demand it an extraordinary meeting may be summoned on three clear days' notice.

XVIII.—Duties of Committee of Management.

- 1. The Committee of Management in addition to having the general control of the Hospital shall have the appointment of the medical and dental staffs, of chaplains, treasurer, secretary, and Matron. They shall examine the accounts of the treasurer, prepare an annual report and present it to the governors at the annual meetings.
- 2. They shall also within the limits allowed by the rules for the time being in force make bye-laws for the general management of the Hospital and for defining the duties of all officers thereof.

XIX.—Finance Committee.

- 1. At the first meeting of the Committee of Management held after the Annual General Meeting of the Governors, the Committee shall appoint a Finance Committee which shall consist of the Chairman of the Committee, the Vice-Chairman of the Committee, the Chairman of the House Committee, the Chairman of the Medical Council, three members of the Committee, and the Hon. Treasurer and Hon. Secretary.
- 2. The Committee shall elect its own Chairman annually. Three members shall form a quorum.
- 3. The Committee shall act as an advisory Committee to the Committee of Management on any matters concerning the finances of the Hospital.
- 4. The Committee shall, subject to the approval of the Committee of Management, decide all details as to the collecting or raising of funds for the Hospital, and as to the investment or realisation of any of the Hospital funds or property, also be responsible for any agreement that may be made between the Hospital and any public authority or authorities.
- 5. The Committee shall receive and consider the Treasurer's annual and quarterly statement of receipts and expenditure before being submitted to the Committee of Management.

XX.—House Committee.

- 1. At the first meeting of the Committee of Management, held after the Annual General Meeting of the Governors, the Committee shall out of their number appoint a Committee to be called the House Committee. This shall consist of the Chairman of the Committee, the Vice-Chairman of the Committee, the Hon. Treasurer, Hon. Secretary,, the Chairman of the Medical Staff, the Chairman of the Finance Committee, six ordinary members of the Committee and two members of the Me dical Staff serving on the Committee for the year. The House Committee shall have power to co-opt two members from the Committee of Management who shall be members of the Committee until the next annual meeting of the Governors.
- 2. Of the said six ordinary members two shall retire annually in rotation by seniority of election (a ballot being taken for seniority at the first election) who shall be eligible for re-election for one year. Should any vacancy occur amongst any of the elected members, it shall be filled at the next meeting of the Committee of Management; the member so chosen shall retain his office so long as the vacating member would have retained the same.
- 3. The Committee shall elect annually its own Chairman and Vice-Chairman. It shall meet once a month on the third Thursday of the month and may be convened at any time by its Chairman or Vice-Chairman. Five members shall form a quorum.
- 5. The Committee shall supervise the general work of the Hospital and shall see that the buildings are maintained in a good state of repair and sanitation. It shall authorise the ordering of such goods, materials and provisions as are requisite for the maintenance of the Hospital, and shall, after the bills have been checked by two or more of the members, pass the same for payment. It shall appoint the House Surgeons, Dispensers, Clerks, Porters, Gardeners, etc. It shall regulate the number of the nurses, attendants, maids and servants after consultation with the matron. It shall determine and pay the salaries of all the officers and servants of the Hospital.
- 6. The Committee shall submit to the medical council for their opinion any matter which affects the interests or work of the medical, surgical and dental staffs.

- 7. The Committee shall investigate any cases about which there is any doubt as to admissibility to the benefits of the Hospital. It shall regulate and determine any charges for payment that patients attending the Hospital may be called upon to make.
- 8. The Committee shall supervise the reports of admission and discharge of patients and shall decide after investigation the desirability of retaining or discharging any of the patients in the Hospital. It shall receive the reports of the Secretary and the Matron, and shall enquire into any complaints.
- 9. The Committee may recommend but shall not authorise any structural alterations or extraordinary expenditure without the consent of the Committee of Management.

XXI.—Hon. Medical & Surgical Staff.

- 1. There shall be as many consulting physicians, consulting surgeons and consulting medical officers as may from time to time be determined by the committee of management. Those who have acted for not less than ten years on the medical staff of the hospital shall be eligible for such appointment.
- 2. The acting medical staff shall consist of physicians, surgeons, assistant physicians, assistant surgeons and medical officers appointed to special departments.
- 3. The physicians shall have charge of medical in-patients. Preference shall be given to Fellows or Members of a Royal College of Physicians, Doctors of Medicine of a British University, or to those who have acted as assistant physician to the hospital for a period of seven years.
- 4. The surgeons shall have charge of the surgical in-patients. Preference shall be given to Fellows of a Royal College of Surgeons, Masters of Surgery of a British University, or to those who have acted as assistant surgeon to the hospital for a period of seven years.
 - 5. The Dental Surgeons must be licentiates of a College of Surgeons.
- 6. Members of the Medical Staff shall retire after twenty years' service on the in-patient department or on reaching sixty years of age, which ever event shall first happen. The committee shall have the power, on the recommendation of the Medical Council, in the interest of the hospital to extend the period of service of any member of the staff.
- 7. No appointment to the medical staff shall be made until the expiration of one month from the time when the intention to make such appointment has been advertised in either the Lancet, the British Medical Journal, or the British Dental Journal and in two local papers.
- 8. Should any member of the medical staff be elected to fill any vacancy he shall automacitally vacate his previous appointment, but may hold more than one appointment if elected in accordance with the rules.
- 9. The medical staff, consulting and acting, shall form a council to meet from time to time for the purpose of advising on all matters connected with the medical departments. They may elect annually one fourth of their number to serve on the committee of management, and two of their number to serve on a medical staff Selection Committee.
- 10. The committee of management shall have power to suspend or remove any member of the medical or surgical sraff for such cause as they shall think fit, but such power shall be exercised only after conference between the committee and the medical council, and then by a majority of two-thirds at a meeting of the committee at which not less than two-hirds of the whole committee shall be present and vote.

11. Any member absent for a period of three months without a reason considered satisfactory by the committee of management shall be considered to have resigned his post.

XXII, -- Honorary Dental Staff.

- 1. There shall be as many dental surgeons as may from time to time be determined by the Board of Management. They must be registered under the Dentists Act 1878.
- 2. Any dental surgeon who has been at least ten years on the acting dental staff of the Hospital may on resigning his office be appointed a consulting dental surgeon.

XXIII.—Medical Staff SelectionCommittee.

- 1. There shall be formed a medical staff selection committee, consisting of the Chairman of the committee of management, two members of the House Committee, the Chairman of the medical council, the Hon. Secretary, the Hon. Treasurer and two members of the medical council elected by the Council annually.
- 2. The selection committee shall select and recommend to the committee of management candidates for appointment to the honorary medical staff, whose names have been approved by the medical council.
- 3. The selection committee shall arrange the duties of the medical staff and appoint annually the members of the staff to the special clinics and a house surgeon as occasions arise.
- 4. They have power to make suitable porvisions for the absence of any member of the medical staff, and to make a temporary appointment for a period of three months if necessary.

XXIV .- Chaplains.

The Chaplains shall be elected annually at the first meeting of the Management Committee after the Annual Meeting and shall have charge of the religious services and private ministrations; but if any patient expresses a desire to have the ministrations of any particular clergyman or minister such clergyman or minister shall be informed thereof and he shall have free access to such patient.

XXV.—Treasurer.

Shall keep or cause to be kept an accurate account of all monies received and paid, and shall submit an abstract statement to each quarterly meeting of the Committee of Management and at such other times as the Committee may require. He shall also submit to the Committee an annual statement duly audited previous to the annual meeting of the governors.

2. The Committee may also appoint an assistant treasurer if they consider it desirable.

XXVI.—Resident Medical Officers.

The resident medical officer must be registered under the Medical Act 1858. He shall reside in the Hospital shall give his whole time to the duties of his office and shall not practice on his own account.

XXVII.—The Matron.

The matron shall reside in the Hospita I and shall give her whole time to the duties of that office.

XXVIII.—Secretary.

The secretary shall be appointed by the Committee of Management. He shall attend all meetings of the board of governors and committees, and shall keep a record of the proceedings. He shall carry out such administrative duties as the Committee may direct and shall receive such remuneration as the Committee shall from time to time determine.

XXIX.—Out-Patients.

- 1. The out-patient department is intended for those who are unable to provide medical assistance for themselves, and for purposes of consultation provided they bring a letter of introduction from their medical practitioner.
- 2. Out-patients must be either cases of accident or emergency or they must present a letter of introduction from a subscriber or from their medical practitioner.
- 3. Out-patients who are not contributors under Rule 4 clause 2 shall pay on a scale approved by the Committee.

XXX.—In-Patients.

- 1. Applicants for admission as in-patients who are not transferred from the out-patient department must be provided with a letter of recommendation or be recommended by a medical practitioner. They shall send their applications to the resident medical officer at the Hospital together with the letter of recommendation and a medical certificate as to the nature of their illness.
- 2. If a case duly recommended and judged admissible cannot be received for want of room it may be treated as an out-patient case (if necessary) until a vacancy occurs.
- 3. In case of there being any spare beds persons may be admitted by the House Committee as paying patients without letters of introduction. They shall pay the cost of their maintenance and treatment and shall be attended at their own expense by any member of the medical staff whom they may select.
- 4. A person shall not be admitted as an in-patient whose case will allow of equal relief as an out-patient.
- 5. Accidents and cases of special emergency shall be admitted at any hour of the day or night without letters. Any patients thus admitted who are not objects of charity or regular contributors shall pay the cost of their maintenance and treatment to the Hospital and shall be attended at their own expense by any member of the medical staff under whose care they are placed.
- 6. Members of the Government Services may be admitted on payment under arrangements with the respective Government Departments.
- 7. No patient discharged for misbehaviour shall be admitted again unless in case of accident or operation.
- 8. In-patients must bring a proper change of linen which they shall give in charge to the sister of the Ward.

XXXI.—House Visitors.

Two House Visitors shall be appointed from among the Governors by the House Committee each month. Their duty shall be to visit the entire Hospital and premises at any time, and enter in a book kept for that purpose such report as they think proper. They are to specially report on any matter which appears to require attention.

XXXII.—Private Wards.

- 1. The charge for a paying patient shall be fixed by the House Com mittee, having regard to the state, position in life, and circumstances of the patient. Application for admission shall be made in writing to the Secretary or Matron, who shall submit the case for the decision of the House Committee, or, in urgent cases, to the Chairman of the House Committee, or the Chairman of the Medical Board.
- 2. The House Committee have absolute power, at any time, without assigning any reason, to vary the charge for a paying-patient, or to put an end to the stay of a patient in the Institution; but in the event of a patient being required to leave in the middle of a week, a proportionate part of the payment made by the patient for the current week shall be returned, except in the case of dismissal for misconduct.

THE COMMITTEE HAVE PLEASURE IN PRESENTING THEIR THIRTY-NINTH ANNUAL REPORT TO THE GOVERNORS AND SUBSCRIBERS FOR THE YEAR 1927.

Your Committee regret to record the death of Mr. W. Llewellin of Upton House. Mr. Llewellin was one of the original Trustees appointed by Lord Wimborne, when the Hospital was moved to its present site in 1907. For many years he was a regular attendant at the Committee Meetings where his sound advice and legal knowledge were always freely given and highly valued. Mr. Llewellin was always a generous subscriber to the funds both special and annual. His loss is a very real one and we tender our sincere sympathy to Mrs. Llewellin and her family.

The attention of the Committee during the year has been mainly engaged in the extensions being made to the Hospital. Estimates were received in March, 1927 for additions to the Nurses Hostel, new Kitchen and adjuncts, and a new Childrens Ward of 16 beds. A tender amounting to £15,000 was accepted and work was commenced at once. Good progress has been made and it is hoped that the whole of the new additions comprising this scheme will be completed in the Spring, 1928.

Your Committee wish to draw your attention to the Children's Ward which is designed on an entirely new plan, and provides the maximum of sunlight and ventilation so necessary in the interests of the little patients. The Ward is built on three sides of a quadrangle with a paved 'garden' in the court. In the centre of the garden there will be a bird bath which has already been given by a subscriber, which will be a pleasing attraction for the children. The windows are glaxed with Vita glass to allow the Ultra Violet Rays to pass into the Ward.

Your Committee feel that the public should be made acquainted with the present position with regard to the financial side of the extension scheme. At present the amount received has been about £7,000 out of the £15,000 required, and the provision of the remaining £8000 is causing the Committee many anxious moments. They hope that this sum will soon be forthcoming so as to reduce the Bank overdraft as the interest will be a heavy drain upon the finances of the Hospital.

As soon as the extensions now in hand are in occupation more accommodation for Out-patients will be provided in a part of the existing Hospital which will then be vacated. Your Committee are fully alive to the increased accommodation needed in this Department. The number of Out-patients has increased by no less than 957 during the year, this increase has taxed the accommodation to its utmost and there is every indication that the work will go on increasing.

The X-Ray Department was very busy, no less than 1,299 examinations were taken during the year, which is an increase of nearly 400. The other Special Departments have also proved extremely beneficial. Better accommodation must be provided for Sunlight Treatment.

Your Committee in common with other Hospitals consider that the attention of the Government should be called to the number of casualties of which are admitted as the result of motor accidents, and are of opinion that all motorists should be compelled by law to insure against all risks.

Your Committee feel that the time has arrived for entirely revising the Rules governing the Hospital; they have prepared more comprehensive ones which will be presented to the Governors at the Annual Meeting. Your Committee consider that in view of the great area and population which the work now covers a more comprehensive title should be given to the Hospital, so that residents and new comers in the district would be better able to realise the District covered by the work of the Hospital. The name recommended by the Committee of Management by which the Hospital would now be known is: "The Cornelia and East Dorset Hospital, Poole."

The Committee desire to express their thanks to the Hon. Medical and Surgical Staff for their ungrudging services, and to the Matron and Nursing Staff who have performed their duties under many difficulties, owing to lack of accommodation, and to building operations, in a most praiseworthy and cheerful manner.

They also offer their thanks to the many friends and supporters in the Borough of Poole and surrounding districts including the Poole Carnival Committee, The Ladies Collecting Committee, St. Luke's Guild and the Approved Friendly Societies, all of whom have done great service for the Hospital, and would earnestly plead for continued and increased support either by donation or annual subscription. It is of the utmost importance that the highest state of efficiency in nursing and equipment should be maintained if the Hospital is to adequately do its work for the relief of the sick and suffering in the area it serves. At the same time the Committee recognise that they must on their part do all in their power to effect every economy consistant with its efficiences.

CORNELIA HOSPITAL, POOLE.

Patients will in future be asked to pay the cost of their *maintenance in Hospital if their circumstances permit, but Contributors will have the following privileges:—

They and their dependents will be exempted:—

- 1. From any enquiry as to means.
- 2. From any payment either as an In-patient or Out-patient.

Contributors are those who have paid, or authorized their employers to deduct 3d. per week from their wages for the benefits of the Hospital.

Such contribution covers the following **Dependents**: Wives and children under sixteen, parents, grandparents and brothers and sisters living with and dependent upon the Contributor.

Persons who are ordered treatment by any public authority and women admitted for confinement are not eligible for free treatment and maintenance.

The decision as to whether any case is suitable for hospital treatment and as to the order of priority in which applicants are admitted lies with the Medical Staff, and therefore a letter from the Contributors' Medical Advisor must accompany all applications, except in cases of accordent or sudden illness.

*Maintenance includes the cost of food and laundry only, therefore, all nursing, the cost of drugs and dressing, and establishment charges are borne by the voluntary subscribers, and medical treatment is given by the Honorary Medical Staff.

Entrance Forms can be obtained on application to the Hospital.
