

The Annual General Meeting

In the unavoidable absence of Lord Kemsley (Chairman) and Sir Austin Low (Vice-Chairman), Mr. J. Railton moved that Mr. E. C. Durant occupy the Chair at the Annual General Meeting held in the Board Room on May 27, and this was unanimously agreed to. Also present were Major-General Sir Richard Howard Vyse, Lady Edward Spencer Churchill, Lady Mary Crichton, the Rev. C. H. Hamilton, Rev. H. Tower, Rev. B. Harvey, Capt. Fullarton James, Mrs. Bentley, Mrs. Charles Seymour, Mrs. L. Blomfield Smith, Mrs. E. S. Batty, Messrs. J. Wedderburn Wilson, S. F. Oxley, A. D. Selkirk, E. C. Mumford, J. Stanley Phillips, Cyril F. Schnadhorst, A. R. Bosman, F. Jackson, M. Butter, F. J. Craswell, with Miss M. Schofield (Matron of the Hospital), Lt.-Col. Sir Arthur Churcher (Secretary of the Hospital), and Capt. T. Watson (Assist. Secretary of the Contributory Scheme).

Besides Lord Kemsley and Sir Austin Low apologies were received from Lt.-Col. F. Allhusen, Mr. C. M. Woodbridge (the Hon. Treasurer), Major Eliot, Major Mewburn Watson, Mr. S. S. Timmis, Mr. E. H. Savill, and Mrs. Thomas.

Mr. Durant said all deeply sympathized with Sir Austin Low in the loss of his wife who had been seriously ill for some time. He moved that a letter be sent from the meeting to Sir Austin Low expressing their deep sympathy and the proposition was unanimously carried.

LORD KEMSLEY'S REPORT.

Mr. Durant read Lord Kemsley's report to the meeting. Dealing with finance he wrote: Hospitals which depend upon what is called the voluntary support of the public, depend actually, as I have been happy to indicate, upon a sort of inner ring of kind and devoted people who by giving their services in such capacity as they are able—serve at the same time to rouse

Public memory and conscience to the craving needs of the sick. Yet in spite of the heroic efforts of those who so particularly concern themselves with work for the hospitals there are causes which operate to defeat the balancing of Hospital Budgets. It would not be difficult to analyse these causes, but it will be of more interest to mention one means which is becoming increasingly successful in broadening the foundations of Hospital finance, I refer to the Contributory Scheme. This has again shown a steady growth and our sincere thanks are due to all the local committees and collectors and helpers for their splendid work. The advantages of the Contributory Scheme for persons of moderate means are now beginning to be realised.

In the accounts it will be noticed that the cost of maintaining the Hospital has again increased, the reason for this being that we have had a full year's working of the beds added last year.

There has been a good deal of discussion in Slough about a project to erect another Hospital and a committee is examining the proposal in every aspect.

Lord Kemsley reviewed the events of the past year and said the King had graciously consented to become Patron of the Hospital and the Duke of Gloucester had kindly accepted the office of President. They had lost a very old friend in Mr. George Mitchell, Chairman of the Finance Committee for many years. A second loss was only partial. Sir Joseph Skevington after no less than thirty-three year's devoted service as Honorary Surgeon resigned his position on December 31 last, but the Hospital retained his expert advice as Honorary Radiologist.

The report then turned to the election of Sir Austin Low as Vice-Chairman and to the appointment of members of the Committee.

Mr. Wedderburn Wilson presented the Treasurer's report and statement which was accepted.

Mr. Rawkins was thanked for his duties as Honorary Auditor and again re-elected. The Chairman pointed out that

for twenty-four years, Mr. Rawkins had rendered wonderful voluntary service.

The Chairman moved the election of two Vice-Presidents, Col. the Rt. Hon. Lord Wigram, P.C., G.C.B., and Col. Sir Courtauld Thomson, K.B.E., C.B., saying that those who knew what Lord Wigram had done for the Hospital, would realise they could not have a better man. Sir Courtauld Thomson wished to become more interested in the domestic matters of the Hospital. Mr. Råilton seconded the proposition and it was passed unanimously.

The meeting confirmed the election of Mrs. Bentley and the Rev. O. B. Parsons to the General Committee.

Six members of the General Committee retired in rotation and were re-elected. The Rev. H. Tower, Lady Edward Spencer Churchill, Mr. S. F. Oxley, Colonel W. N. Davis, Mr. S. S. Timmis, and Mrs. Hargreaves.

The Committee confirmed the nominations made by the District Sub-Committees for representation on the General Committee during 1937–8: Messrs. Butter, Craswell, and Sexton (Ashford), Miss Billiter (Beaconsfield), Mrs. Batty (Datchet), Mrs. Purnell and the Rev. T. J. Lewis (Slough), Major Mewburn Watson (Langley), Mr. E. N. Bartlett and Miss Eames (Windsor), Mrs. Pound (Bracknell), Mrs. Thomas (Englefield Green), Mr. Jackson (Bourne End), Mrs. Chetwynd Stapylton (Windlesham), Mrs. Adams (Lightwater), Miss Herring (Wraysbury), Mrs. Hutt (Horton), Mr. Beard (Colnbrook), Miss Aird (Dropmore), Mrs. Coombes (Virginia Water), Miss Bennett (Dorney).

Mr. J. Railton proposed a vote of thanks to the local District Committees for their untiring efforts during the past years to increase the Hospital's funds and on behalf of the Governors thanked the President, Chairman, Vice-Presidents (and the ladies organising different districts) of the Linen Guild, the members of the Weekly Sewing Party and the ladies assisting in the canteen daily. This was seconded by Lady Edward Spencer Churchill, and the proposition was carried.

The cordial thanks of the Governors were expressed to the Honorary Medical Staff for their unfailing attention given voluntarily to the patients in the Hospital and acknowledgement was made of the valuable services rendered during the year by the Hon. Treasurer, and the Hon. Solicitor, also the Chaplain, Matron, Nursing Staff, and the Secretary for their excellent work during the year.

Before the close of the meeting Mr. Schnadhorst proposed a vote of thanks to Mr. Durant for presiding and he acknowledged the compliment.

Report of the Committee of Management For the year 1937

The 119th Annual Report (New Series) has two outstanding events to record, the honours accorded the Hospital by His Majesty King George VI becoming Patron and H.R.H. the Duke of Gloucester, President.

Lord Kemsley in September, owing to pressure of work, felt it incumbent to resign the Chairmanship of the Hospital which he had held since 1933 when he succeeded the late Lord Burnham. The Committee wish to place on record the great work Lord Kemsley has done for the Hospital for a number of years and it was with very real regret they accepted his resignation, but they are pleased to state that Lord Kemsley still remains a Vice-President.


The question of appointing a new Chairman has been left for the present, Sir Austin Low (Vice-Chairman) is kindly carrying on as Acting Chairman.

The Committee regret to record the death of a very old friend of the Hospital, Alderman Bampfylde, who had been a member of the Committee for twenty-one years. Another who will be sadly missed is Doctor Sadler of Slough who has been a member of the Honorary Medical Staff for twenty-three years. No other changes have been made in the Honorary Medical Staff during the year.

Mr. F. J. Craswell who has represented Ashford on the General Committee for a number of years resigned on leaving the neighbourhood and has been replaced by Mr. George Hatcher.

The receipts and expenditure, pages 30—33 show that the Hospital has had a better year during 1937, but the smallness of the annual subscriptions is very much regretted and an urgent appeal for these to be increased will shortly be made.

The Orthopaedic Clinic, held each Tuesday under the supervision of Professor Girdlestone is entirely and efficiently staffed by the Windsor Detachment V.A.D. of which Mrs. W. E.

H.M. the King graciously granted the munificent sum of £1700 from the State Apartments Fund; the Committee have again received exceptional help from the members of the Stock Exchange Dramatic and Operatic Society who allowed the Hospital to participate in their Christmas Charities; also from the League of Mercy, the Bernhard Baron Trust, the ladies who helped to make the Alexandra Rose Day in Windsor and the surrounding districts such a success and the Hospital Parade Committees throughout the district.

The Linen Guild during the past twelve months has been responsible for keeping the Hospital supplied with linen and the Committee offer their sincere thanks for this continued support.

The Committee have to thank Mrs. Mumford for again arranging sewing parties during the year and those ladies who have so ably seconded her by their regular attendance each week; to Mrs. Wakefield and others who have working parties in the district. Also those owners of cars who have so kindly brought patients to and from the Hospital.

The Contributory Scheme has again shown a steady growth throughout the Hospital's area and our sincere thanks are due to all local Committees, Collectors and helpers for their splendid work. Householders, however, are not fully availing themselves of the Scheme by taking cards of membership for their servants, it is not necessary to name them, and employers can provide for Hospital treatment for employees by paying only 2d. per week each for all single persons and 3d. for married people.

The Extended Benefit Scheme is fully appreciated by those who have become members but the number joining is disappointing, especially considering the many advantages offered.

The work on the new Out-patient Department which it was hoped would be started in 1937 has had to be postponed owing

to the question of a Hospital at Slough and until that is settled, the Committee do not feel justified in commencing this very urgently required extension to the Hospital. The League of Mercy very generously contributed a donation of £50 towards this Building and other subscribers to the Fund have been Sir Henry Martyn and Doctor Bruce Ronaldson.

The Committee wish to express their high appreciation of the efficient manner in which the Nursing Staff have carried out their duties throughout the year.



Full details may be obtained on application to the Secretary. Householders can insure their servants on special terms.

PARTICULAR attention of Employers of Labour is directed to the CONTRIBUTORY SCHEME.

In many districts the Employees' contributions to the Scheme are augmented by a special grant from the Employers.



REPORT FOR 1937.

The Subscription Organisation Committee in submitting their tenth Report are pleased to state that still further progress has been made, especially in the Districts, and an increased number of members has been obtained, but there are a very large number of people who have yet to be enrolled.

Forty-six District Committees have been organised and eighty-two firms have enrolled their employees, one Firm very generously doubling their employees contributions. It would be very pleasing if other Firms would follow their example, as the Scheme is now one of the chief sources of revenue to the Hospital. Many expressions of appreciation have been received from patients as to the skill and attention of the Medical and Nursing Staff.

From the Statement of Accounts on the next page it will be seen that the sum of £14,454 3s. 5d. has been collected against £14,110 19s. 4d. in 1936.

The expenditure on treatment of members in other Hospitals has considerably increased owing to all Schemes having to pay to the London Hospitals £2 2s. per week, the same as the Hospital Saving Association pay to provincial Hospitals for their members.

The Committee wish to express their great appreciation of the work of the District Secretaries, Treasurers, Collectors, and Office Staffs of Firms for their untiring efforts and voluntary work in connection with the Scheme.

THE FRACTURE CLINIC

During the past year, a Fracture Clinic has been organised at the Hospital on the suggestion of Professor G. R. Girdlestone. The establishment of fracture clinics at central hospitals has been recommended by the committee of the British Medical Association and the commission set up by the Government to enquire into the rehabilitation of the workman after injury.

Mr. N. A. Miller and Mr. R. Vaughan Payne have been appointed Surgeons in charge of the Clinic, and Professor G. R. Girdlestone and Mr. W. B. Foley, the consulting orthopaedic surgeons, have been appointed consulting surgeons to the clinic. The Bucks 14 (Slough) detachment of the Voluntary Aid Detachment under the command of Mrs. Tanner have been kind enough to attend each week to assist the out-patient nursing staff with plaster work.


The Fracture Clinic deals with an average of 30 new fracture cases each week, and between 50 and 70 cases are seen at the clinic on Monday morning. Fracture cases not requiring admission to Hospital are seen and treated by the Casualty Officer in the outpatient department, who reduces and splints the fracture. If the radiograph shows the position of the fracture to be satisfactory after reduction, the patient is told to attend on the following Monday when the weekly clinic is held. Difficult cases are seen by one of the Surgeons in charge of the clinic each day, and the necessary treatment carried out. The majority of fracture cases admitted to the wards are under the care of the surgeons in charge of the Fracture Clinic, and are referred to the Clinic on discharge from Hospital, where the after-care is supervised until the patient is fit for work.


The Consulting Surgeons to the Clinic visit the Hospital every Tuesday, advise and if necessary treat difficult cases in the wards and also see out-patient cases referred from the weekly Faacture Clinic. There is an arrangement whereby a fracture case needing special treatment may be transferred to the Wingfield-Morris Orthopaedic Hospital at Headington.

The advantages of the Clinic are that a patient with a fracture is under continuous supervision by the same staff from the time he first attends hospital until he is discharged fit for work. Continuity of treatment and after-care are essential in cases of injury if the period of disability is to be shortened. This point should be of great benefit to employers of labour in the district served by the Hospital.

To reap the full benefit of the Clinic, more accommodation, and more apparatus for the treatment of special fractures are urgently required.
