FOREWORD

Miss Belle Preston, Mrs. Bassett's sister, began work on her own ancestry about 1898, while living in Hinsdale, Illinois, using family papers, correspondence, and the Newberry Public Library of Chicago as references. In 1905 she moved to Brooklyn, and later, after her mother's death, came to live with her sister. She then began to trace the family ancestry on the Bassett side, so that each descendant might possess a record of his American forebears. She carried on this research at intervals in a very busy and useful life, making especial use of the New York Public Library and the Long Island Historical Society library.

The Bassett-Preston ancestry is remarkable for the large number of New England colonial immigrants. This book shows eighty-nine Bassett ancestors in the ninth generation, counting back from my children, and one hundred and forty-five in the tenth. It shows ninety-two Preston ancestors in the ninth generation, and one hundred and forty in the tenth. All lived in New England, and all were immigrants or the children of immigrants. All of the immigrant ancestors on both sides came to New England from the British Isles. The Bassetts have six Mayflower ancestors.

My wife, her sister and I probably know the New England environment of our two families more intimately than those who will follow us. I knew Elisha Bassett, for a long time clerk of the Federal District Court in Boston, and an indefatigable collector of family history, copies of whose records I possess. My brother, my sisters and I when children used often to make visits in Ashfield and neighboring towns, and we have kept in touch with our New England relatives. Similarly my wife and her sister used to go to the old farm in Chester, New Hampshire, and have known the relatives thereabout. This touch with New England relatives and their history cannot continue the same hereafter, because so many of those nearest have passed or will soon pass away.

It is hoped that this book will be an inspiration, not only to those members of the Bassett and Preston families who are now living but also to those who may come after us.

PREFACE

In 1629 the total English population in the Plymouth and Massachusetts Bay colonies was not over eight hundred. In that year Charles I dissolved Parliament and began his active crusade against all dissenting forms of religion. In April, 1630, Winthrop's company left for America, followed later in the year by seventeen ships and more than one thousand people. By 1634 the annual emigration had increased to four thousand. The outbreak of Civil War in England resulting in Puritan dominance during the Commonwealth (1649-1660), brought to a close the period of intensive migration. The population of New England was then twenty-six thousand.

These emigrants belonged, with few exceptions, to the middle classes of English society, small independent farmers, tradesmen and artisans, a few younger sons of the gentry and some adventurers. A vast majority were dissenters from the established Church of England, and most of them were Puritans, favoring the Congregational practice of church government.

To stop this drain on his kingdom, Charles I ordered every emigrant to take the oath of allegiance. Those who did so had their names, date of sailing, and often, birth, age and occupation recorded, while those refusing to sign away their independence sailed secretly, leaving no trace behind, and our first knowledge of them is on our shores.

This book is a history of some of these emigrants who earned their bread by the sweat of their brows, and worked together for the upbuilding of their colonial government and their churches, and for the protection of their homes.

The right of "freeman" in early New England was restricted to one who was twenty-one years of age, a respectable member of a Congregational church and—after 1671—one who had at least £20 in property. Only freemen had the right to vote or to hold office.

In Plymouth colony only those holding the highest civil and military offices, ministers and school teachers were given the prefix "Mr." (pronounced master), and their wives, "Mrs." (mistress), "goodman" being used for others, "goodwife" or "goody" for the women. This rule was rigidly enforced.

The spelling of names was a matter of indifference, and many names, such as Wetherbee and Hazeltine, were spelled in a score of different ways.

Beginning about the 12th century March 25th was considered the first day of the year. It was not until 1752 that England and the countries under her jurisdiction adopted the Gregorian calendar of the Catholic countries, and January 1st became the first of the year. The dates in January, February and March were written in New England with the double year as 1672/3. Since the latter number is the correct one as we now reckon, I have used only that one.

Extensive references have not been given. Countless books have been consulted, and to them I acknowledge my indebtedness. I have placed dependence on printed records, and when authorities differ—and they conflict a disconcerting number of times—a conclusion has been reached by critical comparison and weighing of evidence. Many family records, never before printed, have also been used.

The frontispiece is the work of Howard M. Bassett. It shows the faces of his four grandparents and eight great-grandparents. The average age at time of death of these twelve ancestors was eighty-two years.

EXPLANATORY

Only those families are traced which are in the direct line of Edward M. Bassett or his wife, Annie R. Preston.

The small number placed after the given name of a person indicates the number of generations from the founder of that line in America.

The number preceding the name of an ancestor indicates the number of generations, counting back from Preston R. Bassett and his brother and sisters.

The children in a family are numbered when the order of their birth is known.

The plus sign (+) preceding the name of a child indicates the one through whom the line is continued.

Abbreviations are used as follows:— b. for born; d. died; m. married, and a. for about.

Parentheses are used to enclose a woman's name before marriage or to enclose a father's name.

11. ROBERT¹ ADAMS, born in 1602, in England, was perhaps son of Robert and Elizabeth (Sharland) Adams of Devonshire, Eng. He married in England Elinor Wilmot, and brought her and their first two children to Ipswich, Mass., in 1635. He removed to Salem, 1639, and to Newbury in 1640, where he had a large farm and valuable property. A tailor, member of the Congregational Church at Newbury. His wife died June 12, 1677, at Newbury. He married, second, Feb. 6, 1678, Sarah (Glover), widow of Henry¹ Short; she died Oct. 24, 1697. He died at Newbury, Oct. 12, 1682, leaving a good estate. His will, dated Mar. 7, 1681, provided for his wife, Sarah, eldest son John; Jacob; Hannah; Joanna, wife of Launcelot Grainger and their children; Elizabeth, wife of Edward Phelps; Mary, wife of Jeremiah Goodrich, and Abraham.

He was executor of his father's will; a farmer; member of the Congregational Church; corporal in militia, 1685-1693; sergeant, 1703. He lived in Newbury and died there Aug. 14, 1714. His wife had died Sept. 19, 1705, at Newbury.

9. ABRAHAM³ ADAMS was born in Newbury, Mass., May 2, 1676, the son of Abraham² and Mary Adams. He married Dec. 1703, Anne Longfellow, who was born in Newbury, Oct. 3, 1683, daughter of William¹ and Anne (Sewall) Longfellow. He went to sea early, sailed to the West Indies; he was captain of a boat and made fourteen trips to England. After his marriage he built a house above the falls at Byfield, Rowley, and became a farmer. His wife died at Byfield, Feb. 24, 1758. He died April 8, 1763, at Byfield.

ALDIS

16. THOMAS ALDUS of Stradbroom, Eng., was born about 1440. His will was dated 1499. His wife, Johan, made her will in 1505. From these wills we have the names of their surviving children:—Robert, born about 1470, and Agnes, wife of Robert Firmage.

15. ROBERT ALDUS of Stradbroom, Co. Suffolk, Eng., married Margaret ——. His will of 1507 mentions their children:—John, born about 1495; Thomas, who made his will in 1566; Robert, born about 1500; George, and two daughters.

14. ROBERT ALDUS of Fressingfield, which was near Stradbroom, was born about 1500, and made his will in 1558. His wife, Elizabeth, made her will in 1566, naming seven children:—William, born about 1530; Agnes, wife of Robert(?) Barber; Thomas, born 1535; Joane, wife of William Fox; John, who made his will in 1595; Alice, and Robert who married —, and made a will in 1624.

13. THOMAS ALDUS, born about 1535, was living in 1595. We have the names of his children from the will of his brother John in 1595:—Elizabeth, born about 1560, married — Kettle; Francis; John, and Ann.

12. FRANCIS ALDUS of Fressingfield, Eng., was born about 1565. He had a wife, Sarah, in 1595, who was probably the mother of all his children, and a second wife, Mary, in 1625, when he made his will. His children were:—Francis, probably died young; Nathaniel, born about 1590, died before 1625, leaving widow Elizabeth; John whose will was made in 1639; Nathan, born about 1595, married Mary and came to New England; Anne, married Robert Andrewes who had died before 1625.

These records are from wills of the Aldus Family of County Suffolk, Eng., given in the N. E. H. & G. Register, vol. 64, p. 240.

11. NATHAN¹ ALDIS was born in England about 1596 and married there Mary ——. He came with his wife and two children to Dedham, Mass., about 1638. He was admitted to the church there Feb. 11, 1640, and his wife Mar. 11, 1641. He was freeman, 1640; viewer of fences, 1640; selectman, 1641-2-4; as a Dedham proprietor he signed the Dedham covenants, and received grants of land, which were small as he held only a small number of cow commons. In 1642 he bought one-sixth interest in the water mill on East Brook, but sold it in 1649. He was chosen one of the first two deacons of the church; he was on the committee on the meeting house and the pastor's salary. His name was spelled Aldace, Aldhouse, Alldys, Alldess and in other ways on Dedham records. The spelling of names was a matter of indifference in that age. The wits of Charles II amused themselves in signing their names in as many forms as they could devise. He died Mar. 15, 1676, at Dedham. Administration of his estate was granted "to Mary Aldis, his relict and John Aldis their sonne." His widow, Mary, died Jan. 1, 1677.

Nazing, Eng., Jan. 25, 1629, the daughter of Philip¹ and Elizabeth (Sybthorpe) Eliot. He and his wife were admitted to the Dedham church, Dec. 29, 1650. He was admitted "Townesman" Jan. 1, 1651. He was a yeoman; deacon; constable, 1660 and '63; selectman, 1675, and for twelve years; Deputy to General Court, 1683. On Sept. 30, 1675, he was directed to sit in the third deacon's seat. Served in King Philip's War, 1675. He died in Dedham, Dec. 21, 1700, and his wife died Apr. 17, 1711.

As the oldest son he probably received the land at Wrentham which had come to his father as a Dedham proprietor. He lived at Wrentham five years after his marriage, then removed to Roxbury, near the Dedham line. Served in King Philip's War, 1675. In Suffolk deeds, vol. 35, is recorded a deed of gift from John Aldis "to my well-beloved only son, Nathan Aldis, of Roxbury, Husbandman" 1721. He died Roxbury, Mar. 18, 1736. Wife was living in 1721.

He married first at Roxbury, June 24, 1708, Eunice Draper, who was born Dedham, June 5, 1689, and died Roxbury, June 13, 1714, daughter of James² and Abigail (Whiting) Draper. He married second, at Dedham, Apr. 19, 1715, Mary Chickering, born at Dedham, Oct. 15, 1680, died after 1745, daughter of Nathaniel¹ and Lydia (Fisher) Chickering. His will of Mar. 12, 1745, mentions his wife Mary, daughters, Rachel, Ruth, and Mary Draper, and "only son John." ANDREWS

10. HENRY¹ ANDREWS was born in England and came to Cohannet, Mass., where he was a freeman, 1636. He was in Taunton 1637, when the town was organized. He built the first meeting house in Taunton, 1647, for which the town gave him the calf pasture. He was Deputy from Plymouth Colony, 1639, '42 and '47. He married Mary (Williams?) who was born 1610, probably in England.

His will, dated Mar. 23, 1652, mentions wife Mary, daughters, Mary Hodges, Sarah and Abigail, and Henry. The names of his children are from his will. Inventory of his estate was made by Richard Williams Feb. 10, 1653. He died in Feb. 1652-3 in Taunton; his widow died in Taunton 1655. Her will, dated Feb. 14, 1653, mentions "two little daughters, Sarah and Abigail," son Henry and dau. Mary Hodges.

10. THOMAS¹ BAKER was probably born in Norwich, Eng., in 1608. He came to Massachusetts and was an early settler of Roxbury about 1636. A miller and a blacksmith; a freeman, 1649. He married in Roxbury Elizabeth —, who died there Aug. 6, 1655. He married second Mar. 27, 1663, Mary, daughter of Robert Gamlin. He served in King Philip's War, 1675. Massasoit, chief of the Wampanoags, kept sacredly for fifty years the treaty he made with the Pilgrims, and was helpful to them, but after his death his tribe, under his son Philip, joined with other tribes in ravaging the frontier settlements. The colonists conquered and the war ended, Aug. 12, 1676, with the death of Philip. The Indians had lost heavily and many of them were sent to the West Indies as slaves. This was known as King Philip's War. He died in Roxbury Jan. 28, 1684. On the church records we read "Father Baker was buried, a man old, blind, and godly." His will, dated Oct. 27, 1683, proved Feb. 1684, mentions his brother Richard Baker. His gravestone is still to be seen in Eustis Street burying ground.

His widow married, 1587, Mr. John Kinge of Norwich, and died 1592. Her will, proved Feb. 15, 1592, mentions her sons Robert and Edmond, daughters Sarah and Elizabeth Banges, but does not mention John who was son and heir.

12. JOHN BANGS was probably born at Norwich, about 1560, the son of Richard and Margaret Bangs. He married about 1588, Jane ——. He died Feb. 11, 1632, and was buried at Hempstead, Eng. His wife Jane died at just about the same time. John's will, dated Aug. 20, 1631, was probated Feb. 20, 1632. John Banges of Hempstead, Co. Essex, Eng., to "wife Jane all movable goods, unless she cupple herself to another man"; to children:— John, Edward, James, Jonas, Sampson and Joshua, and daughter, Jane Payne.

11. CAPTAIN EDWARD¹ BANGS, son of John and Jane Bangs, was born in England in 1592. He came from Chichester, Eng.,

to Plymouth in 1623 in the *Ann.* A shipwright, he superintended the building of the first ship, a barque, at Plymouth; later, after 1657, he was a merchant. Freeman, 1633; assessor, 1634; juror, 1636; member of the Plymouth Military Company, 1643. He was appointed in 1627, to build wolf traps. In 1645 he moved to Eastham, and was their first town treasurer, an office which he held for 19 years. He was Deputy to General Court from Eastham for several years. Captain of the guard against the Indians.

He married, 1627, Lydia Hicks, daughter of Robert¹ Hicks, who died soon. About 1630, he married, second, Rebecca ——. He died at Eastham, 1678, aged 86, having given forty years of public service to Plymouth Colony. A tablet to his memory was placed in the Town Hall of Eastham, Aug. 26, 1916, by his descendants. His will, dated Oct. 19, 1677, mentions his daughters Howes, Higgins, Done, and Hall, Merrick and Atwood, and children of daughter Rebecca, deceased, and sons John, Joshua and Jonathan. The claim that his second wife was Rebecca Hobart, the daughter of Edmund¹ Hobart, has no proof.

BARBER

10. GEORGE¹ BARBOUR (BARBER), born in England 1615, embarked in the *Transport* July 4, 1635, and was living in Dedham, Mass., 1640. He helped make the settlement of Medfield, where he built a mill and was an original proprietor; a freeman in 1647; member of Ancient and Honorable Artillery Co., 1646; chief military officer of Medfield after 1649; was selectman 10 years; town clerk 23 years; Representative to General Court, 1668-9, 1676-82; sergeant; captain; defended Medfield in King Philip's War, 1675-6. In 1663 he beat the drum for which the town paid him 4 bushels and 3 pecks of corn. He married, Sept. 24, 1642, Elizabeth Clark, daughter of Rowland¹ Clark of Dedham. She died Dec. 22, 1683, and he married, second, 1683, Joan (Faxon) Fisher, widow of Anthony² Fisher (who died 1670 at Dedham). He died Apr. 13, 1685. His widow Joan died 1694.

9. JOSEPH¹ BARTLETT of Cambridge Village (now Newton), married Oct. 27, 1668, Mary Waite who was born Feb. 15, 1646, the daughter of Richard¹ and Elizabeth Waite of Boston. BASSETT

10. WILLIAM¹ BASSETT came from England in 1621. The earliest Bassett record in England is of Thurstine de Bassett, who came from Normandy in 1066, as Grand Falconer of William the Conqueror. His name is in the Domesday Book and in the Battle Abbey Roll. Thurstine built Beaupre Castle, near Cowbridge in Glamorgan, Wales, soon after the battle of Hastings. His son Lord Ralph Bassett was Chief Justice of England, under Henry I (1068-1135). The Bassetts of England are probably descended from this family but we have no records that show any line.

The following translation from the records of the city of Leyden, Holland, where the Pilgrims were then living, may possibly refer to William who came in the *Fortune*, but more probably to his father. "On the 19th of March, 1611, were affianced William Bassett, drayman (or journeyman mason) from Sandwich in England, the widower of Cecilia Light, accompanied by Roger Wilson and William Brewster, his friends, and Margaret Butler." The bride died before the third calling, and was interred Apr. 9, 1611. "On the 26th of July, 1611, were affianced, and on the 13th Aug. were married William Bassett, Englishman, widower of Cecilia Light, accompanied by Roger Wilson and Edward Southworth, his friends, and Margaret Oldham, young maid from England."

William Bassett was one of thirty-five who came in 1621, in the *Fortune*, landing in November. He remained in Plymouth until 1638, then went to Duxbury where for several years he and Capt. Miles Standish were alternately deputies of the town to

General Court. As he was rated one of the highest on the tax list he must have been a man of property.

In 1645 the town of Duxbury was granted a plantation, to the west, four miles in each direction from a given center. This was divided between fifty-four, who were called original proprietors; among them were John Alden, Miles Standish, William Bradford, William Bassett, William Collier, Constant Southworth and Christopher Wadsworth—all but the first two being Bassett ancestors. They paid Massasoit, the friendly chief of the neighboring Indians, for this land, seven coats—a yard and a half in each coat—nine hatchets, eight hoes, twenty knives, four moose skins and ten and a half yards of cotton cloth. Each settler had a grant of a house lot of six acres. This was incorporated as Bridgewater in 1656.

The nearest corn mill was at Taunton and they often walked there carrying their grists on their backs.

He became a large land holder and had the largest library owned by any of the Pilgrims. He was a blacksmith and "armoror."

He was a volunteer in the war against the Pequots in 1637; a member of Capt. Myles Standish's Military Company, 1643.

He married, probably in England, Elizabeth ——, who was the mother of his children. When a division of the cattle of the colony was made in 1627, the sixth lot, consisting of "the lesser of the black coves came at first in the Ann, the biggest of the two steers, and two shee goats" came to a company of thirteen persons among whom were William and Elizabeth Bassett and Willyam Bassett, Jr., and Elyzabeth Bassett, Jr., showing there were two children at that time.

His wife died before 1650, and he married, after 1651, Mary (Tilden) Lapham, who was baptized in Tenterden, Eng., 1610, daughter of Nathaniel Tilden, and widow of Thomas Lapham—who died 1648. He had no children by his second wife. He died in Bridgewater in 1667, between Apr. 3—the date of his will—and May 12—the date of inventory. His widow, Mary, signed a receipt Sept. 1667, which is the latest record we have of her. In the inventory of his property appear, "a pair of bellowes, an Anvill, a vice, tongs and hammers and coal shovels, a feather bed and bolster and sheets, one other smal feather bed, 2 pillows, 2 blankets, 4 guns, 1 buggy," and several books, among them being "Wilson's

Dixonary," two concordances, and many commentaries on books of the Bible.

Later a highway was laid out to run by "old Goodm. Bassett's."

"The last will and Testament of William Bassett Sen. (as dictated by him on his death bed) exhibited to the court, holding at Plymouth the 1st day of June, Anno Dom. 1667, on the oath of William Brett and John Carey.

The third of the second month Anno Dom. 1667, the last will and Testament of William Bassett, Sen. being very weak and sick, and having spoken to his wife, and said, 'Wife, I must leave thee, but I shall leave thee with the Lord. If God had lengthened out my life it might have been that thou mightest have been more comfortably provided for.' But it being demanded of him by one who was acquainted with his mind about the disposition of his estate, whether his mind was as formerly: That he would give his movable goods with his chattels to his wife, answered, yes, it was his mind: and that she should have his house and grounds till she died: If she married not, and then he would give it to his son William, and his tools to his son Joseph: and it being demanded about his books which he formerly took care about, answered he could not now do it.

To satisfy as soon as we may. Present then with him we have set our hands as witnesses to the above writing so far as we know.

9. "MR." WILLIAM² BASSETT, son of William¹ and Elizabeth Bassett, was born in Plymouth, Mass., 1624. He was one of the early settlers of Sandwich, and lived there until his death. He was licensed in 1659, to set up an "ordinary," and to draw wines and sell spirituous liquors. He was Collector and Constable at Sandwich, 1657; Deputy to General Court at Plymouth, 1662;

member of military company under Capt. Myles Standish, 1643. William Bassett and William Bassett, Jr., were on the "rolls of males between the ages of 16 and 60 able to perform military duty in Aug. 1643" at Duxbury. He was one of the few in the colony called "Mr." He married about 1652, Mary Rainsford, who was born in Boston June 1, 1632, daughter of Elder Edward¹ and Mary Raynesford. He died June 10, 1670, at Sandwich. His children were minors and Mr. Winslow and Mr. Hinckley were chosen as guardians—both of whom later became governors of the colony.

His widow married, June, 1671, Lieut. James¹ Percival, who came from Virginia about 1670, to Sandwich. They had three children. He died 1692. His will provides for his wife Mary, his sons John and James and daughter Elizabeth, daughter-in-law (which means wife's daughter), Sarah Lewes, grandson John Williams that dwells with me, son of Mary Bassett dec'd, and son-in-law Nathan Bassett (that is, wife's son). Mary, twice widowed, died Apr. 12, 1694, at Falmouth.

8. COL. WILLIAM³ BASSETT, the son of William² and Mary (Rainesford) Bassett, was born in 1656. He lived in Sandwich. He married Oct. 9, 1675, Rachel Williston (or Wilkinson) of Taunton, or (Society of Colonial Wars, Mass.), daughter of Thomas Willinton.

He was chief marshal of Plymouth Colony, 1689, until its union with Massachusetts Colony, 1691; a captain; member of Council of War, 1689; deputy, 1690, '97, '99, 1702, '06 and '07; major, 1702; colonel, 1707; Special Justice for the Indians. From 1710 to 1715 he was one of the judges of the Superior Court, and later, until his death was Register of Probate. He died in Sandwich, Sept. 29, 1721. The inscription on his gravestone in the Sandwich burying ground reads:—

Here lies ye body of Colonel William Bassett, Esq. who departed this life Sept. the 29th 1721 in ye 65th year of his age. He was a gentleman of great worth and usefulness. Blessed are the dead that dye in the Lord.

7. WILLIAM⁴ BASSETT, son of Col. William³ and Rachel (Williston?) Bassett, was born in Sandwich, Mass., and resided there. Probably he is the William who "died Feb. 3, 1744 in 64th year of his age" (gravestone in Sandwich burying ground); the adjoining stone is to Abigail his wife. He married Feb. 3, 1709, Abigail Bourne, who was born at Sandwich, July 22, 1684, daughter of Elisha² and Patience (Skiff) Bourne. She died Feb. 15, 1764.

6. CAPT. ELISHA⁵ BASSETT, son of William⁴ and Abigail (Bourne) Bassett, was born in Sandwich, Mass., Feb. 15, 1713-4. Removed from Sandwich to East Yarmouth—which was incorporated 1793 as Dennis. He held commissions as captain in the royal militia, 1765 and 1772, but early in the controversy he sided

with the colonies and surrendered his commission. Gen. Washington offered him a captain's commission early in the Revolution but on account of his age and other circumstances he declined it. Representative, 1774-5-6; ensign, 1748; lieutenant, 1758.

He married Oct. 11, 1739, Ruhamah Jennings, "a woman of fine education," born Sandwich, May 1, 1716, daughter of Samuel² and Remember (Smith) Jennings. She died Jan. 9, 1797; he died Feb. 12, 1793-4. They are buried in the burying ground near the center of Dennis, with gray slate gravestones, reading:—

"Francis Bernard, Esq., Captain-General and Governor-in-chief in and over His Majesty's Province of Massachusetts Bay, in New England and Vice-Admiral of the same.

To ELISHA BASSETT. Gent,—Greeting.

By virtue of the power and authority in and by His Majesty's Royal Commission to me granted &c, over this, His Majesty's Province of the Massachusetts Bay aforesaid I do by these presents (reposing special trust and confidence in your loyalty, courage and good conduct) constitute and appoint you, the said Elisha Bassett, to be Captain of the Second Military Company of foot of Yarmouth, and in the Regiment of militia in the County of Barnstable, whereof Silas Baum is Colonel.

You are therefore carefully and diligently to discharge the duty of a Captain in leading, ordering and exercising said Company—in arms, both inferior officers and soldiers and keep them in good order and discipline, and they are hereby commanded to obey you as their Captain—and you are yourself to observe and follow orders and instructions, as you shall from time to time receive from your Colonel or other superior officers, according to military rules and discipline, pursuant to the trust reposed in you.

Given under my hand and seal at Arms, at Boston, the eleventh day of June,—in the fifth year of the Reign of His Majesty, King George the Third. Anno Domini, 1765.

By His Excellency's Command John Cotten, Secretary."

In 1774 Governor Gage ordered an assembly to convene Oct. 5th, but later countermanded it. Ninety members of the assembly met however, the Governor not attending, they drew up a plan for the immediate defense of the Province, by enlisting

men and appointing general officers. One of these ninety men was Elisha Bassett of Yarmouth. Barnabas Howes of Ashfield, Mass., in 1883 wrote: "I have often heard his grand-daughter, my mother, speak of this patriotic act of his, as a manifestation of great courage and decision of character. For his house stood on the north side of Cape Cod, in what is now Dennis, close by the sea-shore. A war-ship might easily send men to arrest and hang him, and destroy his house and family. Then the pecuniary sacrifice of going a representative was severely felt by them. My mother has repeatedly told how her grandmother, whose name was Ruhamah Jennings before her marriage, was constantly saying, 'We could always get a piece of silver out of the chest before grand-father went representative.' "

5. LOT⁶ BASSETT, son of Elisha⁵ and Ruhamah (Jennings) Bassett, was born Jan. 22, 1755. He married Jan. 31, 1782, Deborah Howes born Nov. 15, 1761, Yarmouth, Mass., daughter of Thomas⁵ and Bathsheba (Sears) Howes. He resided in Yarmouth. A soldier in the Revolutionary War, 1776; corporal, 1777; sergeant, 1778, in Capt. Matthias Tobey's Company; on the pension rolls, March, 1833. He moved, 1782, taking his family in an ox cart, to Ashfield, where he was one of the first settlers. He died there July 23, 1835, and his wife died June 6, 1846. They are both buried in Ashfield at Spruce Corner. They were people of sterling good sense, honest, industrious, frugal almost to a fault. At that time the land between the Connecticut and Hudson rivers was a wilderness except where a pioneer had settled and made a home in the primeval forest. His brother Elisha moved to Ashfield in 1797.

3. CHARLES RALPH⁸ BASSETT was born Dec. 14, 1836, in Spruce Corner, Ashfield, Mass., the son of Francis and Mehitabel (Ford) Bassett. While still a boy, along with his farm work, he took trips, as far as New York State, with a pack, selling silk from farm to farm. When 21, having decided to follow merchandizing instead of farming, he came to New York, opening an office at 173 Broadway. This was the same building in which later he was a successful wholesale jewelry merchant for many years before he retired in 1897.

He married at Ballston, N. Y., Sept. 17, 1860, Elvira Rogers, who was born in Aurelius, N. Y., Sept. 17, 1837, the daughter of Elam and Caroline (Prentice) Rogers.

In 1862 he moved from Ballston to Brooklyn, N. Y. In 1870 he moved to Watertown, N. Y., which he made headquarters in his trade with country stores in surrounding counties. In 1884 he returned to Brooklyn, continuing from his New York office his merchandizing in Northern New York. In 1906 he removed to Buffalo where he died Apr. 20, 1919.

His wife had a remarkable knowledge of hygiene and was the neighborhood adviser in times of sickness. She was a great reader of the best literature and a brilliant letter writer. One of her principal ambitions was to give her children the best available education. She died at the home of her daughter Mary in Buffalo, May 28, 1923. Both are buried at Ashfield, Mass.

9. RICHARD¹ BOURNE, born Devonshire, Eng., about 1610. He came, 1630, by way of Barbados to Scituate, Mass., and soon moved to Saugus (now Lynn). In 1637, he was one of about 50 persons who went with Mr. Edmund¹ Freeman from Lynn and were the first settlers of Sandwich. He was one of the first two deputies to General Court, 1639, and later, for 14 years; member of the Council of War, 1675. He was one of three appointed to purchase land from the Indians for Yarmouth. He brought large property in cash from England. At his own expense he bought 16 square miles for a permanent abode of the Mashpee Indians, and it remains to the present an Indian Reservation. He acquired a thorough knowledge of the Indian language, and became a missionary to them, being ordained as their pastor by Cotton and John Eliot in 1670. His work was so successful that one of the tribe succeeded him as pastor. "He controlled them by his just and Christian behaviour and did more by the moral power he exerted than Bradford at the head of his army." He was a man of note, one of the most useful and active citizens of Sandwich. He married (1) 1637, Bathsheba Hallett, dau. of Andrew¹ and Mary Hallett of Sandwich. She died 1670. He married (2), July 2, 1677, Ruth (Sargent) Winslow, born 1642, dau. of Rev. William¹ Sargent and his wife Sarah, and widow of Jonathan Winslow. Richard died at Sandwich, 1685, and was buried on his own land near his house. His widow married (3) John¹ Chipman and died Oct. 4, 1713, ae. 71.

BREWSTER

13. WILLIAM BREWSTER lived in Scrooby, Nottinghamshire, Eng., where he died, 1590. His wife Prudence survived him; his son William administered his estate.

12. ELDER WILLIAM¹ BREWSTER, son of William and Prudence Brewster, was born, probably in Scrooby, Nottinghamshire, Eng., 1566-7. He studied at Peterhouse, Cambridge Univ., 1580, for two years. He was postmaster at Scrooby, 1590-1607, at a salary of 20 pence a day, and was responsible for relays of horses for the Royal post and entertainment of travelers on the post road. About 1602 his neighbors began to meet at his home, Scrooby manor house, for worship, and in 1606, they organized the Separatist Church of Scrooby. He was fined and imprisoned for heresy. In 1608, a number of the Separatists went to Amsterdam, Holland, for greater freedom and to Leyden in 1609 where he was chosen their Ruling Elder. He taught English for a living and printed books that had been proscribed by the English government.

He came on the *Mayflower* to Plymouth, 1620, and until the arrival of the first minister, in 1629, he was teacher and preacher "to ye great contentment of ye hearers and their comfortable edification." He was member and chaplain of the first military company, organized at Plymouth, under Capt. Myles Standish. He was the fourth signer of the Mayflower compact, of which he was probably the author. Deputy, 1636. He married in England, Mary —, who was born 1568 or 9. She came, 1623, in the

Ann with her children and probably died soon. He married second, 1624, Mary —, who died at Plymouth, Apr. 17, 1627. He passed the late years of his life with his son, Love, in Duxbury, who was apparently the wealthiest man in the town. He died at Plymouth, Apr. 16, 1644, leaving no will.

10. HENRY¹ BROOKS, a brother of Thomas Brooks of Concord, Mass., was born about 1592. He settled in Concord with his wife and children about 1639. He was freeman there, 1639. We know nothing about his first wife who was probably mother of all his children. He removed to Woburn about 1650, where he married, Mar. 27, 1651, his second wife, Susanna Bradford, widow of Ezekiel¹ Richardson (who died Oct. 1647). She died in Woburn, Sept. 15, 1681; he married, third, July 12, 1682, Annis Jaquith. He was selectman of Woburn, 1669. He deposed in 1658 that he was about 66 years old. He died Apr. 12, 1683, at Woburn.

His will, dated July 18, 1682, says he is a clothier, aged about 91 years; provides for his wife Annis; his sons John, Timothy and Isaac; son-in-law John Mousall; his daughters Sarah and Lestor; and Isaac, Henry and Miriam, children of his son Isaac.

9. TIMOTHY² BROOKS, son of Henry¹ of Woburn, Mass., married, in Woburn, Dec. 21, 1659, Mary Russell, daughter of John¹ and Elizabeth Russell. She died in Billerica, Sept. 15, 1680. He married, second, late in 1680, at Swansey, Mehitable, daughter of Roger Mowry and widow of Edad Kinsley.

As he owned land in Lyme, Conn., perhaps he lived there from 1662 to 1670, and several unrecorded children were born there. He was in Billerica about 1670 and about 1680 moved to Swansea, where a Baptist church flourished under protection of the Plymouth government. At Billerica the town ordered that his house should be a garrison house and he should have two garrison soldiers to defend his mill. He was representative from Swansea, 1689. Capt. of militia, 1690. About 1687, a number of families, including the Barretts, Bowens and others, with "Rev." Timothy³ Brooks as leader, moved to Southern New Jersey and settled at Bowentown, Barrett's Run and Shiloh. The first organized church in Cumberland Co., N. J., was the old Cohansey Baptist Church in 1683. In 1710, "Rev." Timothy³ Brooks and his company united with this church and he continued to be the pastor until his death in 1716. In 1702, he purchased 107 acres comprising the farm on the hill on which the brick house stands which later became the parsonage of the Cohansey Baptist Church until 1786. Timothy² Brooks moved with this company of Baptists who came originally from Swansea, Wales, to New Jersey, and died in Salem, N. J., about 1712.

His will, dated Mar. 1709, proved Oct. 1712, Mehitable, his wife, being executrix, mentions sons Josiah, John and Timothy, and daughters—names not given.

BULL

10. CAPT. THOMAS BULL¹ was born in Southwark, London, Eng., about 1609. He testified in April, 1684, that he was about 75 years old. He came in the *Hopewell* from London, Sept. 1635, remaining in Boston or Cambridge until the following May, when he went with Rev. Thomas Hooker to Hartford, and was an original proprietor. He married Susanna ———, who was born in England, 1610. He and his wife were original members of the South Church, 1670. He was "a godly and discreet man."

He was master of a vessel. He served in the Pequot War as lieutenant in 1637, and received a grant of land for his service. He was in command at Saybrook in 1675, where he was victorious. Lieutenant of Hartford Company, 1653; captain, 1673; deputy, 1648-49.

At Hartford, in 1642, an armed guard of forty men attended church every Sabbath and wore wadded coats, which the town ordered to be made for them, "basted with cotton wool to be defensive against Indian arrows."

His wife died in 1680, aged 70. His will was dated Apr. 19, and probated Oct. 24, 1684, between which dates he died. His will names his children.

CASE

10. JOHN¹ CASE came from England, and was in Hartford, Conn., about 1650; was residing in Windsor, 1657; in the spring of 1669, he removed to Massacoe (now Simsbury). The permanent settlement of Simsbury began in 1664. In 1670, John Case was one of two delegates to the General Court to ask for the separation of Simsbury from Windsor, and its incorporation as a town. On Mar. 26, 1676, the Massaco Indians, who had formerly been friendly, pillaged and burned Simsbury; the inhabitants were scattered, but returned and slowly rebuilt the town in 1677.

He was constable for Massacoe, 1669—the first civil office held by any of its inhabitants; representative to General Court, 1670, and several times later. He married about 1657, Sarah Spencer, who was born 1636, the daughter of William¹ and Agnes Spencer of Hartford; she died Nov. 3, 1691, aged 55 years. He married (2) Elizabeth, daughter of John² Moore, and widow of Nathaniel² Loomis of Windsor (who died 1688). He died Feb. 21, 1704, Simsbury; his widow died, July 23, 1728, aged 90, at Windsor.

CHANDLER

10. WILLIAM¹ CHANDLER was born in England, and married there his first wife, whose name is unknown, and who is supposed to have died in England. He came to Roxbury, Mass., in 1637, with four small children. Freeman there, 1640. He was taxed in Roxbury, in 1640, on 22 acres of land, one goat and one kid. He married, second, Annis Alcock, who came from England in 1635, aged 18, and they were both admitted to the church at Roxbury. She was a "sister of Deakon George Alcock." Rev. John Eliot says, in his diary, of William Chandler: "He lived a religious and Godly life, and fell into a consumption and lay neare a yeare sick." He died Nov. 26, 1641, and was buried at Roxbury. His widow married, second, July 2, 1643, John Dane, a widower with three children. He brought up William Chand-

ler's children. He died Sept. 1658. She married, third, Aug. 9, 1660, John Parmenter, Sr., of Sudbury, whose first wife, Bridget, had died the previous April. He died in 1671, aged 83. In his will he left "the use of my warming pan to my wife Annisse as long as she remain my widow." Church records say "Old Mother Parminter, a blessed saint, died Mar. 15, 1683," at Roxbury.

In her will of Nov. 1672, she bequeathed "to my sons and daughters by my former husbands—John, Thomas and William Chandler and married daughters, Hannah Abbot and Sarah Cleaves—the estate left me by my husband, John Dane."

9. LIEUT. THOMAS² CHANDLER, son of William¹, was born in England in 1628. (He deposed in 1692, aged 64.) He came with his father to Roxbury. He was a proprietor of Andover in 1644, and became a man of wealth. He, as a blacksmith, and his brother, a husbandman, were among the most prominent of the early settlers. Deputy to General Court, 1678-9; lieutenant of the Andover Foot Company, 1683; captain, 1690; proprietor of an iron foundry. He married, in 1650, Hannah Brewer, who was born about 1630, possibly the daughter of Daniel¹ Brewer (1596-1646) and his wife Joanna of Roxbury.

Thomas died Jan. 1703, and was buried in North Andover; his widow died in Andover, Oct. 25, 1717, aged 87. His will, approved Feb. 8, 1703, mentioned wife Hannah, sons Henry, John, Thomas and Joseph, daughters Hannah Bigsbee and Sarah Phelps, and his son William's three sons.

CHASE

10. AQUILA¹ CHASE and his brother Thomas (who married about 1642, Elizabeth Philbrick, daughter of Thomas, and died 1652), came from England to Hampton, N. H., in 1639, where they were among the first settlers. They had grants of land there in 1640 and 1644.

Their descent from the Chase family of Chesham on the Chess can not be proved, although the repetition of the name Aquila suggests relationship.

Aquila had a grant in 1646, in Newbury, Mass., of "fower acres of land for a house lott, and six acres of marsh, on condition he serve with a boat for four years." He was a sea captain and was said to be the first white man to cross the bar at the mouth of the Merrimac river. He married in Hampton, in 1641, Anne Wheeler, who was born in Salisbury, Wiltshire, Eng., daughter of John¹ and Anne Wheeler.

In Sept. 1646, he and his wife and her brother, David Wheeler, were prosecuted for picking peas on the Sabbath. He lived in

Newbury from 1646 until his death, Dec. 27, 1670. Tradition says he was buried in the old graveyard on the Plains. His will of Sept. 19, 1670, mentions his wife Anne, and all his children by name, and his son-in-law Charles Annis. His widow Anne married, second, June 14, 1672, Daniel Mussiloway (or Silloway or Musselwhite). She died Apr. 21, 1687, in Newbury.

9. MOSES² CHASE, born Dec. 24, 1663, in Newbury, Mass., son of Aquila¹ and Ann Chase, married Nov. 16, 1684, Ann Follansbee, daughter of Thomas¹, born about 1668. A weaver, he lived in West Newbury, and owned large tracts in Sutton, Rowley and Nottingham, N. H. In Sept. 1700, it was granted to Moses Chase "to set in the fore seat, by the pulpit." He was an ensign in the Essex Regiment of Snow Shoe Men, 1710. John March organized the Snow Shoe Men for service against the Indians who attacked from the surrounding Amesbury woods. He ordered "Corporal Chess" to clean them out. He did this in mid-winter and brought back the scalps. In May, 1718, he and others were granted permission to use the flats near Holt's rocks on condition they give one salmon a year to each, the pastor of the First and Second Church of Newbury, "if they catch them." His wife Ann died Apr. 15, 1708, and was buried in the old graveyard on the Plains, where her gravestone reads:—

"Here lyes buried ye body of Ann Chase the wife of Ensign Moses Chase, aged 40 years, died April ye 18, 1708. Being the Lords day."

He married, second, Dec. 13, 1713, Sarah, daughter of Thomas² Jacobs of Ipswich. She died in 1739. He died at Newbury, Sept. 6, 1743. They were buried in the old Ferry Lane burying ground at West Newbury. The inscriptions on their gravestones read:—

“Here lies buried the Insin Moses Chase who died Sep 6th 1743 in ye 80th year of his age.”

“Sarah Chase, wife of Insin Moses Chase died March 13, 1739 in ye 63rd year of hur age.”

8. SAMUEL³ CHASE, born in Newbury, Mass., May 13, 1690, son of Moses² and Ann Chase, married in Newbury, Dec. 8, 1713, Hannah Emery, who was born in Newbury in 1695, the daughter of John³ and Mary (Sawyer) Emery. A house builder by trade, he built a brick house about a mile from his father's home, and his wife carried the bricks in her apron to the masons from the kiln on the farm.

He died July 24, 1743, being thrown from a horse and fatally injured. His widow married, second, in 1762, Samuel Shute of Rowley. Their gravestones in the old Ferry Lane burying ground are inscribed:—

“Samuel Chase, July 24, 1743 in ye 54th year of his age.”

“Mrs. Samuel Shute, former wife of Samuel Chase, Oct. 6, 1776, age 81.”

13. THOMAS CHICKERING of Wymondham, Norfolk, Eng., lived in the reign of Henry VIII. He married Clare Browne, and died 1538, leaving a widow and three children.

CHIPMAN

11. THOMAS CHIPMAN of Dorset, Eng., was probably born at Whitechurch about 1567. He was married about 1590, and died about 1623. His widow died about 1637, leaving two daughters, Hannor and Tumsun (Thomasine), and one son, John.

10. ELDER JOHN¹ CHIPMAN, son of Thomas, was born in Brinspittal, Dorsetshire, Eng., about 1615. He was left fatherless early and sailed from Barnstable, Eng., in the *Friendship* in 1631. After eleven weeks of foul weather he landed in Boston. He settled in Plymouth, 1631; removed to Yarmouth, 1646, and in 1649, to Barnstable. Deputy, 1663-6, 1668-9; a ruling elder in the church at Barnstable, 1670; selectman several years. He was appointed with three others to attend meetings of the Quakers to try to turn them from the error of their ways.

He married in 1646, Hope Howland, who was born in Plymouth, Aug. 30, 1629, the daughter of John¹ and Elizabeth (Tilley) Howland. She died Jan. 8, 1683, and is buried at Lothrop Hill, Boston. He married, second, Ruth (Sargent) (Winslow) Bourne, daughter of Rev. William¹ Sargent, and widow of Jonathan Winslow and of Richard¹ Bourne (who died in 1685).

He moved to Sandwich in 1679 and lived there until his death, Apr. 7, 1708, and was buried in the old cemetery at Sandwich. His widow died in Sandwich, Oct. 4, 1713, aged 71 years. He had ten married children and eighty-two grandchildren, nearly all of whom married and had children.

The inscription on his wife's gravestone reads:—

12. THOMAS COLBY of Beccles, Co. Suffolk, Eng., married Beatrix Felton, daughter of Sir Thomas and Mary (Gernon) Felton of Co. Suffolk, Eng., and had twelve children.

11. ANTHONY¹ COLEBIE (COLBY) was born in Beccles, Eng., probably the son of Thomas. He probably came with Gov. Winthrop's party to Boston in 1630. He was a church member in Boston, 1630; a freeman, 1634; a "planter"; in Cambridge, 1632; in Ipswich, 1637; received land in the first division in Salisbury, 1640, and again in 1643; received land in Amesbury, 1654 and '58. In 1654 he bought for \$200.00 "a house and barns together with the well and bucket and rope belonging to it." The Colby house was still standing in Amesbury in 1895. He was evidently a thorough Puritan.

He married, probably in Boston, widow Susanna Waterman, perhaps the daughter of William Sargent (although by tradition she was a Nutting). He died Feb. 11, 1661, probably between 65 and 75 years old. He was buried in the Golgotha Cemetery, Amesbury. He left no will. His estate was inventoried at £359. His widow died July 8, 1689. She had married, in 1663, William Whitridge, who died in 1669.

COLE

10. JOHN¹ COLE (COALE, GOWLE, COLES, COALES, COWLES) was born about 1598, and came from the north or west of England or perhaps Wales. He married Hannah ———, who was born 1613. He probably stopped at Hartford and then removed to Farmington, where he was one of the seven men who organized the church there Oct. 13, 1652, Stephen Hart, Thomas Judd, John Cole, Thomas Thompson, Robert Porter, John Bronson and Mr. Roger Newton—the first pastor—(the first four mentioned are our ancestors). He was one of the 84 proprietors who made a division of land at Farmington in 1672. A farmer. He was Deputy to General Court, 1653-4. He lived on the lot next south of the meeting house and his descendants lived there for 150 years. The homes of the sturdy pioneers were near together. Wild beasts prowled in the adjacent forests, and various tribes of Indians occupied the nearby country. The Indians were generally friendly, but occasionally raided the settlements, murdering the whites and plundering their homes. As late as 1691 a committee was chosen to designate certain houses to be fortified and stored with ammunition. On the Sabbath, the great day of the week, the inhabitants went armed to church, the women carrying their infants which they dared not leave behind, and a guard was stationed at the door during the services. A drum served as a bell to call the people together.

John Cole removed in 1664, to Hadley, Mass., later called Hatfield, where he died Sept. 1675. His widow died in Hartford, Mar. 16, 1684, at the home of her daughter Hannah Stanley, and was buried in Hartford. Her will of Oct. 27, 1680, mentions her sons Samuel and John, her daughters Hannah Stanley, Esther Bull, Elizabeth Lyman, Mary Dickenson, and children of daughter Sarah Goodwin, deceased.

COLLIER

11. WILLIAM¹ COLLIER was a merchant of London, Eng., where he had a brew house and was one of the principal financial helpers in England, of the *Mayflower* expedition. He came with his four daughters to Plymouth in 1633, in the *Mary and Jane* with 196 passengers. He was a freeman, 1633. He removed to Duxbury and lived in the southeast part, near Brewster, and was probably the wealthiest man in Duxbury, as he was rated highest on the tax list. He was on committees for assigning and laying out land, building a meeting house and to revise their laws. He was one of the two plenipotentiaries from Plymouth, in 1643, at the first meeting of the Congress of the United Colonies to form a confederation. He was governor's assistant, 1634 to 1665; representative to General Court; member of Council of War, 1642 and later. He was called "a distinguished early settler, and great benefactor to the Colony." "In 1658 the court ordered a servant to him, as he could not easily come to public business, being aged,

and having much private business." He died, 1670, at an advanced age. Some authorities say he brought his wife Jane from England with him, and some say she married him as her second husband, and the mother of his children died in England. In the will of Jane Collier, widow of William, she mentions her granddaughter Sarah (Walker) Warren. Jane, wife of William Collier, petitioned in 1653 "on behalf of her grandchild Sara." As Jane's husband did not join in the petition she was probably daughter of a child of Jane by a former husband, in England. Sara married, 1645, Nathaniel Warren.

8. JOHN COLSON was born about 1681, in Bermuda, according to his grandson. He married in Hingham, Mass., May 29, 1706, Susanna Lincoln, who was born Sept. 19, 1688, the daughter of Thomas² and Sarah (Lewis) Lincoln. He lived in Hingham and two children were born there. In about 1713 he removed to Weymouth, South Parish, and was admitted to the church there in 1742. Four sons and seven daughters were born there. His wife, Susanna, died in 1732, and he married Jan. 30, 1733, his second wife, Deborah Sprague of Hingham, and had three children. He died July 14, 1752, in his 71st year. His mother was probably the widow Mary Colson who died in Weymouth, Feb. 8, 1716.

COOKE

10. FRANCIS¹ COOKE was born in England about 1583. He went to Leyden, Holland, where he was married, June 30, 1603. The marriage record at Leyden reads "Francis Cooke, wool comber, unmarried, from England, with Hester Mayhieu, unmarried, from Canterbury, Eng., accompanied by Jennie Mayhieu, her mother, and Jennie Mayhieu, her sister." The Mayhieus were Walloons and Huguenots. Francis and his son John were on the *Speedwell* when it sailed from Delftshaven, July 20, 1620, with some of the Pilgrims bound for America. At Southampton they joined the *Mayflower* and set sail on Aug. 5. The *Speedwell* began to leak, but although the ships put into Dartmouth for repairs and sailed again Aug. 21, new leaks compelled the *Speedwell* to return to London, with such immigrants as could not be taken in the *Mayflower*, which then went on alone. Francis and his son were on the *Mayflower*, and he was the seventeenth signer of the *Mayflower* compact. His son John was living in 1694, probably the oldest male survivor of the *Mayflower*. His wife, Hester, and the rest of their children, came in the *Ann* in 1623. Winslow recorded "The wife of Francis Cooke being a Walloon, holds communion with the church at Plymouth, as she came from the French, by virtue of the communion of churches."

He was freeman, 1633; a member of Myles Standish's Company, 1643, and in the expedition against the Indians; on a committee to lay out roads in Plymouth. Bradford called him "a very old man" in 1650. He died April 7, 1663, aged 80, and was buried in the old Plymouth burying ground. His will of 1659 names his wife Hester and son John, executors. An agreement of the heirs in June, 1666, showed the surviving children were John, Jacob, Hester Wright and Mary Thompson. Hester, his widow, died in 1675.

CROSBY

11. ROBERT CROSBY, bapt. Oct. 30, 1596, was the fourth cousin of Simon¹ Crosby who married Anne Brigham (both being sixth in descent from John Crosby who was born about 1440; died 1502, at Holme on Spalding Moor, Yorkshire, Eng.). The name Crosby is Danish (as are so many in that part of England, the ending "by" like boro, meaning town), "the town of the Cross."

Robert married about 1622, Constance Brigham, who was born about 1602, the daughter of Thomas and Isabel (Watson) Brigham. He died about 1640, at Holme on Spalding Moor. His widow Constance came to Rowley, Mass., where as "Custins" Crosby she appears on Rowley records as one owning land there. In 1674, she asked that some one be appointed to care for her orphan granddaughter, Sarah Longhorne. She died and was buried in Rowley, Jan. 25, 1684.

11. "MASTER" JOHN¹ CROWE (later CROWELL), was probably from a family of Co. Kent, Eng., that moved to Wales; we do not know whether he was born in England or Wales. The family coat of arms had three cocks crowing. He came to Charlestown, 1635, and married Elishua. She had been received into the Charlestown church, 1634, the year she came from England.

He was one of the three grantees—with Anthony Thacher and Thomas Howes—of Matakeese, later Yarmouth, in 1638, and was a freeman there in 1640. Deputy from Yarmouth, 1641, '42, '43; juror, 1658; magistrate, 1640. His wife died 1688, and he died at Yarmouth, Jan. 14, 1673.

10. JOHN² CROWELL, son of John¹ and Elishua Crowell, was born at Yarmouth, Mass., about 1638. He married Mehitabel Miller, born Roxbury, July 13, 1638, daughter of Rev. John¹ and Lydia Miller.

A palisade house built by a Mr. John Crowe at Yarmouth stood two centuries, seldom needing repairs. The sills were laid on the ground, with two parallel rows of holes, six inches apart, for the poles; the space between being filled with stones and clay, and the walls plastered inside and out with shell mortar; the roof was of the long sedge grass from the meadows, with oiled paper for glass in the windows. Straw or sedge grass covered the floor instead of a carpet. He died, Jan. 28, 1689, at Nobscusset. The names of his children and his grandson, Thomas Tobey, are from his will. His widow died Feb. 23, 1715.

CURRIER

10. RICHARD¹ CURRIER was born May 3, 1616, in England or Scotland. He was one of the original settlers of Salisbury, Mass., in 1640, a planter and millwright. He helped build a saw mill

in 1656, and owned one in 1675. In 1667, Amesbury was set off and named. He was one of the most prominent men in the new town; he had property and held many offices in Salisbury and Amesbury. He was one of the committee of three to build the first meeting house, 1665, and on a committee of two to secure a minister; his name has the place of honor in seating the meeting house, 1667. He was town clerk, and a soldier in Narragansett War.

He married Anna —, who died 1675 or 6; he married, second, Oct. 26, 1676, Joanna, the daughter of Henry Pindor, and widow of Valentine Rowell (who died 1662), and of William Sargent (who had died, 1687). He was drowned Feb. 22, 1687. His wife, widowed the third time, died Oct. 1690, aged about 69.

DARE

9. CAPT. WILLIAM¹ DARE, born in England, came from county of Dorset or Somerset to West New Jersey. In 1682, he built the Blue Anchor Tavern in Philadelphia, which became the headquarters of William Penn when he landed. He later removed to Cumberland Co., N. J.; he bought 100 acres, Aug. 3, 1695, in Fairfield. He is called "Mariner" in some of the early deeds, and doubtless obtained his title "Captain" in a sea-faring life. He had a good education, was a fine penman, and became one of the leading men of the community; sheriff of Salem Co., 1703 and '04; captain of a company of militia, 1706; justice of the County Court, 1707, '08 and '10; a large land owner, among his purchases being 200 acres at Autuxit (now Newport, N. J.), where he finally settled, and died in 1720. He left a widow, Constant, and six children. His will of 1720 left to his son William his estate in Dorset, Eng.

10. MR. JOHN¹ DEMING, born in England, 1615, was probably the son of John Deming. He had a brother Thomas who married, 1645, Mary Sheaff, and a sister Elizabeth, b. England, 1595, d. 1683, m. 1615, Nathaniel¹ Foote, Sr.; he d. 1644; she m. (2) 1646, Gov. Thomas Welles. John Deming was one of four in Wethersfield who were called "Mr.", a courtesy paid to men of prominence. He was one of the first settlers of Wethersfield, Conn., 1639; freeman, 1645; a townsman, 1647-8; a deacon; a constable, which was considered an important office, 1653-4;

named as one of the 19 patentees of Connecticut, in the royal charter given by Charles II, Apr. 23, 1662, confirming the territory to the colonists and granting liberal powers of government. Representative to General Court, 1645, '46, '47, 1649-61; a prominent magistrate. He married about 1637, Honour Treat, who was bapt. in Pitminster, Somersetshire, Eng., Mar. 19, 1616, the daughter of Richard and Alice (Gaylord) Treat. He died in Wethersfield after 1701. His will, dated June 26, 1690, probated 1705, names his sons John, Jonathan, Samuel, David, Ebenezer; his daughters Morgan, Hurlbut, Beckley, Wright and Moody. His wife had died before 1690. Her father, Richard Treat, had willed his "daughter, Honor Demon, his great Bible."

DRAPER

11. THOMAS DRAPER was a weaver and fuller of Heptonstall Bridge, Yorkshire, Eng. Undoubtedly the Drapers are descended from William, John and Henry Le Drapeur, of Yorkshire, whose ancestor came from the Netherlands or some French province before 1415. Thomas Draper's children, all born and died in England, except James, who came to America, were:—Thomas, John, William, James, Mary and Martha.

10. "MR." JAMES¹ DRAPER, son of Thomas Draper, was born in Heptonstall, Yorkshire, Eng., April 21, 1618, and married there Apr. 21, 1646, Miriam Stansfield, who was born Nov. 27, 1625, the daughter of Gideon and Grace Stansfield of Heptonstall.

Gideon Stansfield (or Standfast), married Feb. 21, 1625, Grace Eastwood (who was born in Heptonstall, and died there Aug. 12, 1682). He died May 9, 1658. Their children were Miriam, b. Nov. 27, 1625; Marie, b. Jan. 20, 1628; Abraham, bapt. Mar. 11,

1632; Deborah, b. July 27, 1634; John, b. Feb. 5, 1637; Abigail, b. Nov. 25, 1638, m. 1654, Samuel May of Boston; and Sarah, b. May 30, 1641.

James Draper left England because of religious persecution in reign of James I, and settled in Roxbury, Mass., 1647. He gave largely of his time and means to build the church in Roxbury and to sustain it. He was prominent in town councils later in Dedham, and was freeman, 1653. He became an original proprietor of Lancaster, 1654. He followed the occupation of his ancestors and was a weaver, owning a number of looms. He died, July, 1694, in Roxbury, and was buried there beside his wife who died Jan. 1697. Their double tombstone, a single slab covering their common grave, is still standing in West Roxbury.

DWIGHT

11. JOHN¹ DWIGHT came from Dedham, Eng., in 1634, to Watertown, Mass., and was one of twelve petitioners for land for a settlement, in 1635, which they named Dedham. He was one of the founders of the church in 1638; a freeman, 1639; select-man, 1639-55; a miller; he became owner of one half the water mill, and the second man of wealth.

He married in England, Hannah, and brought her and three children with him. She died Sept. 5, 1656, and he married (2) Jan. 20, 1658, Elizabeth, who had first married Thomas Thaxter, and second, William Ripley (d. 1656). She died July 17, 1660, being drowned in a well. He died, Jan. 24, 1660, at Dedham. In his will, dated June 16, 1658, and proved Mar. 5, 1661, he names his wife Elizabeth; only son, Timothy; daughters, Hannah, wife of Nathaniel Whiting; Mary, third wife of Henry Philips; and Sarah, wife of Nathaniel Reynolds. President Timothy Dwight of Yale College was descended from him. Dedham records say: "He was publickly useful and a great peace maker." He was one of five trustees of the first free school in America supported by a town tax, 1644. He was probably a brother of Timothy Dwight of Medfield who m. Mary —; (2), 1669, Dorcas Watson.

10. CAPTAIN THOMAS¹ DYER was born in England about 1613, and came, in 1635, to Weymouth, Mass., where he was one of the founders. No proof of any relationship has been found to William Dyer of Abington. He was a freeman, 1644; a deacon; a Representative, 1646, and four other years; a captain; a cloth maker, and licensed inn keeper.

He married Agnes (or Alice) Reed(?); she died Dec. 4, 1668. He married, second, about 1673, Elizabeth (—) Harding Frary. Her first husband, Abraham¹ Harding, died 1655, and in 1657 she married John Frane (or Frary), Jr., who died 1670. She was born 1622, and died 1679. He joined the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company in 1640,

a privilege granted to only a few of Dedham's best citizens. In character, reputation and influence he stood high.

About 1671, Col. Goffe and Col. Whalley, two of the regicide judges of Charles I, were hidden by Capt. Daniel Fisher in a little wood back of his house near a pond. His daughter, Lydia, carried them food. Goffe was later sent, disguised as a serving man, on horseback to Hadley, where Capt. Fisher had friends, and he remained there a year in their care.

Daniel Fisher died at Dedham, Oct. 8, 1683, and his widow died three days later, Oct. 11, 1683.

10. THOMAS¹ FOLLANSBEE was born in England in 1637, of a family whose ancestors came from Normandy with William the Conqueror, who gave an estate in county of Durham, Eng., to the Follansbee family as a reward for their services in forwarding the conquest in England—a tract of land of seven hundred acres, called Follansbee Farms, and a house called Follansbee Hall. Their coat of arms was a beehive and swarm of bees, from which the name is supposed originally to have been Following bees or Follow bees.

Thomas, born about 1637, came from Derbyshire, Eng., in 1642, with his brother William, who later returned to England. He settled in Portsmouth, N. H., where in 1660 he married his first wife, Mary ——, the mother of all his children. He removed to Newbury, Mass., before 1677. A joiner; a snow shoe man of the North Regiment in Essex, under Capt. March of Newbury, 1710.

A Sarah, perhaps a second wife or a daughter, died in Newbury, Nov. 6, 1683. He died in 1726. He took the oath of allegiance to Charles II and loyalty to Massachusetts Colony in 1678, "aged 41."

FORSYTH-FORSAITH

ETHOD, brother of Eugenius, King of the Scots, had a son Ertus who married Rocha, daughter of Roderic, Lord and Prince of Denmark. Their son, Fergus II, assisted Alaric, King of the Goths, in taking Rome, 410 A. D., and later was King of the Scots. The younger son of Fergus II, Roderic, was brought up in Denmark and married a daughter of a Frankish noble of Austrasia. His grandson was Arnulf, born about 580, bishop of Metz in 614. Arnulf's son, Adalgiselus (or Ansighis), (died 640), married Begga, the daughter of Pippin (Pepin), who died 640, mayor of Austrasia. Their son, Pepin II, ruler of the Franks (died 714), by his mistress, Alpaída, had Charles Martel and Childerbrand.

Charles Martel (b. 689, d. 741), by his first wife, Chrutude, had Carloman and Pepin (d. 768, the father of Charlemagne); by his second wife, Sonahilda, he had Roderic—called Grippo.

Grippo, d. 754, married a daughter of Fionnlock, and had two sons:— Roland (or Ronald) and Forsyth, born 753, named for the Gothic prince, King Forsite, from whom he was descended. Forsyth married, in 810, a daughter of the Duke of Aquitania. His great-grandson was Hagamon Forsyth de Fronsac. The great-grandson of Hagamon was Grimwald, who married, 1010, Marie de Montenac, and had four daughters and one son. The seventh generation from the son of Grimwald was Osbert de Forsyth, the only male descendant at that time. Osbert was one of the attendants who accompanied Eleanor of Provence, when she went to England to marry Henry III. After that Guirand Forsyth went with his only son, Osbert, to Scotland, in 1246. Osbert had a son, Wilhelm, who had Robert I, who had Osbert II. Osbert II had a son, Robert II, who was appointed governor of Stirling Castle, in 1360. Robert I and his son, Osbert II, were leaders under Robert Bruce at Bannockburn, in 1314.

20. ROBERT II became the feudal Baron of Dykes—the first lord of Castle Dykes, Lanark Co., Scotland.

19. JOHN (his son), baron of Dykes, was governor of Stirling, 1379.

18. WILLIAM (his son) succeeded him in these offices, 1399, and had:—

17. ROBERT III, who married a daughter of Leslie of Roths. They had five sons, who established the University of Glasgow.

16. JOHN FORSYTH, the oldest son, Lord of Dykes, married the daughter of Sir James Douglas, and had David and Alexander.

15. DAVID FORSYTH, Lord of Dykes, 1488.

14. DAVID FORSYTH, Lord of Dykes, 1507, had John, James and Henry.

13. JOHN FORSYTH, Lord of Dykes, 1540, married Louise de Ravenel.

12. DAVID FORSYTH, Lord of Dykes, 1571, Commissioner of revenue for Glasgow, 1594; had sons:—Robert, who was the ancestor of the Forsayths of Failzerton; James, who d. unm., and William, his successor; Matthew; and Marguerite, who married Jean Denys (grandson of Jean Denys who, in 1506, made a chart of the “Gulf of North America,” later known as Gulf of St. Lawrence).

11. WILLIAM FORSAYTH, Lord of Dykes, Commissioner to Parliament for Forres, 1621; had sons:—William and John and James.

10. JOHN FORSAYTH, Commissioner to Parliament, for Cullen, 1652, married a daughter of Sir William Livingston of Kilsyth; had sons:—James and Walter.

9. WALTER FORSAYTH, born in Ayrshire, Scotland, married Margaret Forsayth, who was the heiress and sole proprietor of Failzerton, Ayrshire, the daughter of Capt. James Forsayth (son of Robert, son of David, 12, above). He was Provost of the University of Glasgow, 1678, by act of the Scotch Parliament. He had sons James and Alexander.

8. JAMES FORSAITH, born at Failzerton, Scotland, which he later inherited from his mother, married Margaret Montgomery, daughter of Major Hugh Montgomery. James favored the Stuarts and had to flee to Ireland. He was a captain under King William III in the battle of the Boyne, in Ireland, 1690.

7. MATTHEW¹ FORSAITH, born in Failzerton, Ayrshire, Scotland, in 1700, graduated from the University of Edinburgh. He removed to Ireland where he married Esther Graham, the daughter of Robert¹ and Janet (Hume) Graham. She was probably born about 1700 as she died July 1, 1784, aged over 80 years.

About 1732 he came to the manor house in Gaspésie, Acadia, Canada (where his great-grandfather, Nicholas Denys (b. 1598), had been Governor of New France and Newfoundland), and became the last royal Governor of Gaspésie, 1732-38. He was annoyed by boats from Cape Cod and burned and sank them, so England sent two ships against him in 1738, and he was driven out and his house burned. He saved his ship and returned to Ulster, Ireland, where he had left his family. There he heard of the success of the Scotch colony in New Hampshire.

He came to New England about 1740, and bought land in Chester, N. H., 1742, "north of the meeting house." He brought with him considerable property and silver plate with the family crest on it.

He was an enterprising business man; his name frequently appears on town and Presbyterian records—the colony of Scotch Irish who settled around Londonderry, N. H., were Presbyterians. He was a deacon and a lay preacher, and often preached in the absence of the minister.

He bought 2,000 acres of land and owned a woolen and a grist mill. He was chairman of several committees to petition the Provincial Legislature for improvements for Chester. He was chairman of the committee of Public Safety, 1777; he raised the Chester company of 1776; he was deputy to choose the representative to the Continental Congress; he was commander and proprietor of the privateer *La Monet*. He died Sept. 6, 1791, and was buried in Auburn (formerly a part of Chester), N. H.

He removed to New Chester (now Hill), where he lived for a few years, and five children were born; he then returned to Chester and lived on his wife's father's place on Walnut Hill, and took care of her father and her insane brother as long as they lived; five more children were born here.

He was a lieutenant, 1776-1783; called ensign in Revolutionary Rolls, vol. 1, pp. 381 and 385, New Hampshire State Papers. He died in 1810; his widow died Jan. 13, 1835.

9. CAPT. SAMUEL³ FREEMAN, son of Samuel² and Mercy (Southworth) Freeman, was born in Eastham, Mass., Mar. 26, 1662. He married, Feb. 5, 1684, Elizabeth Sparrow, daughter of Jonathan² and Rebecca (Bangs) Sparrow of Eastham. He married (2) about 1693, widow Bathshua (Bathsheba) Lothrop Smith (widow of Samuel Smith, who died 1692). She was living in 1749.

He had a large property for the times, was always engaged in public affairs, and a liberal supporter of education and religion. A deacon; Representative, 19 years, and had charge of the militia of

Eastham; selectman, six years. His will, dated Dec. 13, 1742, proved Feb. 10, 1743, mentions wife Bathsheba, four sons, Samuel, Barnabas, Enoch and John, and sons of wife by her first husband, Samuel and Joseph Smith. He died, Jan. 30, 1743, ae. 82. Jonathan² Sparrow, in his will of Mar. 10, 1707, bequeathed to "the children of Capt Samuel Freeman by my daughter, Elizabeth."

FREEMAN

11. MR. EDMUND¹ FREEMAN was the son of Edmond Freeman of Pulborough, Co. Sussex, Eng., whose father was prob-

ably John Freeman very likely of Kent. A contributor to the Boston Transcript, Apr. 2, 1923, says: "After much time given to the English ancestry of Edmund¹ Freeman, I must deny the probability of his line through Edmond, Henry, Laurance and John of Northampton, Eng." An Edmund Freeman, possibly this one, was married in Graveley, Herts, Oct. 13, 1617, to Elizabeth Gurney, who was born 1600, and died in Sandwich, Mass., Feb. 14, 1676. Another authority says he married June 16, 1617, Bennett Hodsoll, dau. of John Hodsoll or Hatsuld. He came from England with his wife and four children in the ship *Abigail*, 1635, to Lynn. He was one of the ten original proprietors of Sandwich, 1639, and received the largest land grant. In 1637, ten men of Lynn were given liberty "to choose a place to sett down and have land for three score families," they chose Sandwich. He had moved to Duxbury, 1637, and was a freeman that year. He presented the colony twenty corslets of armor, 1637. He was always a prominent, active and influential man. Deputy to General Court, 1646; assistant to Gov. Prence, 1640-46; member of Council of War, 1642. He and his wife were said to have a leaning toward the Quakers. He died Oct. 1682, and he and his wife were buried at Sandwich. His will of June 21, 1682, proved Nov. 2, mentions "my three sons, Edmond Freeman, John Freeman and Edward Perry, daughter Elizabeth Ellis and grandson Thomas Paddy."

10. MAJOR JOHN² FREEMAN, son of Edmund¹ and probably Bennett (Hatsuld) Freeman, was born in England, 1621; came with his parents in the *Abigail*, 1635. He married, Feb. 13, 1650, Mercy Prence, b. 1631, daughter of Gov. Thomas¹ and Patience (Brewster) Prence. He moved from Sandwich and, with his father-in-law, became an early settler of Eastham, where he was a large landholder. He was prominent in public affairs; a deacon

in the church; ensign, 1654; major, expedition against Indians at Saconet, 1677; member, Council of War, 1667-1676; captain against Indians at Taunton, 1675; major, Barnstable Troops, 1685; deputy to General Court from Eastham, 1654, and for eight years; selectman, 1663, for ten years; assistant, 1666. His wife died Sept. 28, 1711, and he died Oct. 28, 1719; both are buried in Eastham. His children were all born in Eastham, Mass. His will, dated June 1, 1716, proved Nov. 4, 1719, provides "freedom for my negroes." On the gravestone of his wife, Mercy, there is a heart carved, inside of which the epitaph is engraved.

He helped found the first church of Harwich and was their first deacon and for many years. His will was dated Feb. 4, 1715. He died, Feb. 9, 1715, at Harwich.

10. LIEUT. THOMAS¹ FULLER was born in England in Apr. 1618, and came to Woburn, Mass., 1638, one of the earliest and most active settlers there. He married, June 13, 1643, in Woburn, Elizabeth Tidd, the daughter of John¹ and Margaret Tidd, born in Charlestown; she died in Woburn. His wife dying, he removed to Middleton, a part of Salem, about 1664, and back to Woburn, 1684, where he married (2) Aug. 25, 1684, Sarah Wyman, the widow of John, who had died May 9, 1684, and

daughter of Miles Nutt. She died 1688. He moved to Danvers and married (3) Hannah ——. His will mentions daughters Dean, Ruth Wilkins, Deborah Shaw; sons Thomas, David and Benjamin; grandchildren, David Richardson, Ruth Wheeler and Bethia Fuller. He died in Middleton, June, 1698, ae. 80.

GRAHAM

8. ROBERT¹ GRAHAM was born in Ireland in 1668, in Fermanagh Co., a descendant of Walter Graham, the son of Alexandria Graham, second Earl of Monteith, whose grandmother was a daughter of Robert III, King of Scotland. He married, in Ireland, Janet Hume, who was of the family of Hume, of Hume Castle, county of Fermanagh, Ireland, descended from Sir John Hume, Provost of Edinburgh in 1450, son of the Earl of Mauh-mant, according to the Peerage of Scotland.

Robert Graham brought his wife and children—all of whom were born in Ireland—to America about 1730, and purchased land in Chester, N. H., 1733. He was a blacksmith. In 1747, he deeded half of his land to his son William, who died soon after, leaving no children.

Robert died in Chester, N. H., in 1748, aged about 80. His will was proved in Dec. 1748, at which time his wife was still living. We obtain his children's names from his will. William Graham, a relative, probably brother of Robert, came from Ireland and married Margaret, daughter of John Aiken of Chester. He had other brothers, Andrew and Jack, both of whom came before 1747.

10. THOMAS¹ GRIDLEY was baptized in Essex Co., Eng., in 1612, came to Massachusetts, 1631. He was a member of Rev. Thomas Hooker's flock that came from Cambridge and settled Hartford, Conn., in 1636. He was a member of Capt. John Mason's company in the Pequot War, 1637, and received a grant of 50 acres of land for his services; a blacksmith. He married in Hartford, Sept. 29, 1644, Mary Seymour, born in England,

daughter of Robert and Elizabeth, and a sister of Richard¹ Seymour of Hartford. He removed to Farmington and thence to Northampton, where he was killed by Indians, June 12, 1655. His widow married (2) Deacon John Langdon, and died in Farmington.

He later removed to Westfield, Conn., and gave his homestead in Windsor to his son-in-law Timothy Thrall, when he went to Westfield. He died in Westfield, Feb. 26, 1681. We know nothing about his wife except the date of her death in Westfield—Nov. 28, 1678. Nathaniel Gunn who married Sarah Day, 1658, and had died before 1664, was possibly his brother.

HALLETT

10. MR. ANDREW¹ HALLETT was born in England, and married there Mary ——. He brought his wife and several children to Lynn, 1636; Plymouth, 1637; thence to Sandwich, 1638. He is probably the one who was called a schoolmaster. He was given the title "Mr."

Public schools are not mentioned until 1663 in records of Plymouth Colony. Then the General Court advised the towns to set up a schoolmaster to teach the children reading and writing. In 1677 public grammar schools were required in towns having twelve families. Before these dates children received private instruction from friends or others.

He was a proprietor of Yarmouth, 1639, where he owned 200 acres, most of it in Barnstable after its division from Yarmouth. He was a brother of John Hallett of Yarmouth, 1650.

Andrew Hallett, "now in New England," was taxed in Bowood, Dorset, Eng., in 1640, on a subsidy. Not many of the New England emigrants are found on these subsidies, as only a few of

them were freeholders. These subsidies were a special tax which Parliament allowed the king to collect for a special purpose. They were imposed on land holders possessed of enough personal property to make the collection of the tax profitable. His death is given as 1648. His wife, Mary, survived him. He left a cow for the use of the poor in Yarmouth.

He was one of the twenty original settlers, and had 100 acres at Lynn, Mass., 1637. He was one of seventeen who formed a company in Lynn in 1640, and went to Southampton, L. I., and established Connecticut jurisdiction there. For many years he was the richest man in the town; adjutant of the Train Band, 1650; served in the Indian wars; deputy from Southampton, colony of Connecticut, 1664. He married in England, Phoebe ——. She was killed in 1649, by two Pequot Indians. They were later caught, sent to Hartford and there tried, convicted and executed. The first death recorded in the town of Southampton was that of his wife Phoebe, and the first marriage recorded was his, to his second wife, on July 25, 1660, to Ann, widow of Edward Johnes (who had died about 1655). He died Aug. 27, 1678; his will, made in June, 1677, named his wife, his sons Thomas, Isaac and Daniel, and his daughter Elizabeth, wife of Richard Howell.

12. RICHARD¹ HARDING was born in Northampton, Eng., about 1580. He came in 1623, with his two brothers, Joseph and John, and their cousin Gov. Gorges, to the south part of Braintree, Mass., near Weymouth landing, where Gov. Gorges planted his colony. The first settlement of Weymouth was made in 1622, by the company under Wesson (or Weston), and was abandoned in 1623. In 1624, Capt. Robert Gorges, son of Ferdinando Gorges, renewed it, and in 1633 it was incorporated as a town.

Richard had an original land grant from Gorges which was later owned by his son John. He was a freeman in Braintree, 1640. He was probably a mariner and engaged in fishing. His first wife came from England with him and died before 1630. He married (2) Elizabeth Adams. His will, dated 1657, named his wife executor and left property to his son John and granddaughter Mary.

HARDY

10. THOMAS¹ HARDY was born about 1605, in England. He was one of the twelve who went with John Winthrop, Jr., from Boston, in March, 1633, and founded Agawam (later Ipswich). He had a grant of land in Ipswich, 1641; removed to Rowley about 1653, and ten years later to Bradford (a section was set off from Rowley in 1668, and called Merrimack, but the name was changed to Bradford in 1672). He may have married in England, Lydia —, who was perhaps the mother of his children, but before 1670 he had married Ann —. Thomas Hardy and wife,

Ann, deeded land in 1670, to his daughter Mary, wife of Samuel Currier. He died in Bradford, Jan. 4, 1678. His will, dated Dec. 12, 1677, proved Mar. 26, 1678, mentions his wife, unnamed; eldest son, Thomas; other sons, John, Joseph, William and Jacob; son-in-law, William Hutchins; my daughter Mary and her children.

Anah, widow of Thomas Hardy, was received in the Bradford church, 1682. She died May 1, 1689.

HARRIS

12. WALTER¹ HARRIS, born in England, married there Mary Fry. He probably came in the *William and Francis* in 1632, and was an early settler of Weymouth, Mass., later removing to Dorchester. Freeman, 1641. On "May 20, 1652, a house lott was granted to Walter Harries of Dorchester," near Pequot Harbor, New London, where he settled and lived until his death. Additions to this house lot were granted from the ox pasture, and a quantity of "hideous rocks were thrown in unmeasured." In 1653, Goodman Harries gave "his son Gabriell sixe ackers of land for an house lot." In June, 1654, Goodman Harries was chosen by the town to be an ordinary keeper. On Nov. 6th, 1654, he died at Dorchester, and on that same day "widdo Harries was granted by voat, also to keep an ordinary, if she will." His widow died Jan. 24, 1656. New London records give their death dates and add "both deceased at Pequett." Her will, dated Jan. 19, 1656, bequeathed "to my eldest daughter, Sarah Lane, the biggest brass pan, to her daughters Mary a silver spoone and pewter candlestick, and Sarah the biggest pewter dish and a silken ribbon; to daughter Mary Lawrence my blue mohere petticoat, my straw

hatt and a feather boulder, my next brass pan and my great chest; to her eldest sonne a silver spoone, her second son a silver whistle, her youngest son a pewter bassen. My youngest daughter, Elizabeth Weekes a piece of red broadcloth, being about two yards, a damask livery cloth, a gold ring, a silver spoone, a feather bed, a boulder, my best hatt, my gowne, a white apron, a brass kettle, a woolen jacket for her husband, &c. To my sonne Gabriell my house, land, cattle, swine, &c.—the house consisted of a front room, lean-to, shop room and two chambers,—To my sonne Thomas tenn shillings if he doe come home or be alive. To sister Migges—sister Hannah Rawlin and brother Rawlin.” This will was “taken from her own mouthe, 19th of Jan. 1655.” Her brother William Fry had died in 1642, leaving a kid to each of his three sisters’ youngest children. Their sister Thomasine Fry married John Meigs.

HART

11. STEPHEN¹ HART, born probably in Braintree, Essexshire, Eng., 1605, came to America and was one of the 54 settlers at Cambridge, Mass., 1632. He was a deacon in Rev. Thomas

Hooker's church, organized at Cambridge, 1633, and in the church after they removed to Hartford, Conn., 1636. He discovered the Farmington valley, inhabited by the Tunxis, a powerful tribe of Indians. It is said the name Hartford was given to the ford he discovered and which was used in crossing the Connecticut river at low water. He was freeman, 1634; an original proprietor of Hartford in 1639; served under the popular leader, Capt. John Mason, in the Pequot War, 1637, and was given a lot for his services.

He moved to Farmington, which was incorporated in 1646, and was one of the 84 proprietors there in 1672. One of the seven who organized the church at Farmington in 1652, with John Cole and others, and was one of the first deacons. He and his wife had previously taken the ten-mile journey to Hartford to church. He was deputy from Farmington to General Court, 1647, 1655 and 1660. He was a large land holder, a leading character and a man of great influence in Farmington.

In 1673, he had a grant of land on the Ousatunnuck river. He married in England, and had children born there. His wife, name unknown, died in Farmington after 1652. About 1679, he married (2) Margaret, who was widow of Arthur Smith (d. 1655), and of Joseph Nash (d. 1678). She died 1693. He died in Farmington, Mar. 1683. His will of March 16, 1683, mentions his sons John, Stephen and Thomas, son-in-law John Cole, daughters Sarah Porter, Mary Lee, grandchildren Thomas and Dorothy Porter, John Lee and John Hart. His name is on Founders Monument, erected in Hartford about 1846, to the 84 proprietors.

9 and 10. SERGT. RICHARD¹ HAVEN was born about 1620, and came from the west of England to Lynn, Mass., in 1644. He married in Lynn, Susanna Newhall, who was born about 1624, the daughter of Thomas¹ and Mary Newhall; a farmer and carpenter; freeman, 1691. He served under Captain Samuel Brocklebank, June, 1676; a sergeant.

In 1692, it was "voted that Sergeant Haven" and seven others named, "should sit in the pulpit." He died, probably in 1703, between May 21, 1701, the date of his will, and June 14, 1703, the date of probate. He was one of the patentees of Connecticut under the charter from Charles II, 1662; deputy to General Court, 1657, 1662 and 1665; governor's assistant, 1668-70. His wife, name unknown, died in Windsor, July 12, 1655. July 16, 1656, he married (2) Mrs. Ann (Welles) Thompson, daughter of Gov. Thomas¹ Welles, and widow of Thomas¹ Thompson. She died 1680. 10. JOHN¹ HAZELTINE was born in Lincolnshire, Eng., 1620, the son of Peter. He came with his brother Robert¹ in Rev. Ezekiel Rogers party from Rowley, Eng., to Rowley, Mass., in 1639, and was freeman there in 1640. He married Joan Anter,

said to be from Biddeford, Eng. He and his brother Robert helped build the first meeting house in Rowley. He lived in what is now Bradford, but later removed to Haverhill (originally called Pentucket), where he gave, in 1665, an acre of land for a meeting house. He died there, Dec. 23, 1690, "aged 70." His will of Aug. 17, 1689, was proved Mar. 1691. His widow died July 17, 1698.

It was voted at a legal town meeting in Bradford, Mar. 1683, to pay the minister sixty pounds per annum; the first half in October, payable in wheat, pork, butter and cheese, one pound of butter for every cow, and one cheese from a family; the other half in March, in malt, pease and rye, and sufficient fire wood, he allowing a sixpence per cord for bringing it and cording it up in his yard. In 1698 it was voted to pay one-third of his salary in money.

10. SAMUEL HINCKLEY¹, son of Robert and Elizabeth Hinckley, was baptized in Tenterden, Co. Kent, Eng., May 25, 1589. He married in Hawkhurst, May 7, 1617, Sarah Soule, who was

bapt. June 8, 1600, at Hawkhurst, Co. Kent. Eng., the daughter of Thomas and Mary (Indenden) Soole.

In 1634, he brought his wife and four children in the *Hercules* to Boston, and settled at Scituate. There were a total of one hundred and two passengers, all from Tenterden, and more than one-half of them settled at Scituate. His wife, "Goody Hinckley," joined the church there in 1635.

In 1639, he removed to Barnstable, where he was one of the first settlers, and helped establish the church. The name of "Goodman Hinckley" is prominent in the records. He was juror, town officer, surveyor of highways, lieutenant in Thomas Dymock's company, Barnstable, 1643. His wife died in Barnstable, Aug. 18, 1656, and he married, second, Dec. 15, 1657, Bridget, widow of Robert Bodfish. His will, dated Oct. 31, 1662, gave to his wife Bridget the use of his house, garden and certain land, gave her his two cows Prosper and Thrivewell, and all the household stuff she brought with her, bequeathed to sons Samuel, John and Thomas, daughters Susanna, Sarah, Mary and Elizabeth.

10. DANIEL¹ HITCHINGS, born in England about 1632, son of Daniel, married Eleanor ——. He came to Lynn; was freeman, 1691. His wife died Sept. 10, 1694, and he married (2) Sarah ——. He was a member of the Lynn Co., in King Philip's War, 1675. In 1695 and 1696 he deeded property to his only son, Daniel. He and his wife Sarah gave a deed in 1707. 11. WILLIAM HOWELL, who died 1557, in Buckingham, Eng., purchased in 1536 the old stone manor house of Westbury, in Marsh Gibbon, Buckinghamshire, which is still standing, covered with ivy. He married Maude —, and had a son John; he married (2) Anne Hampton, and had a son Henry; he had other children by either wife:—Jacob, Rachel, Isabel, Jane, Cecil, Agnes, Anne, Joane, Alice.

10. HENRY HOWELL, son of William and Anne, was buried July 20, 1625; had Edward.

9. MR. EDWARD¹ HOWELL, bapt. Marsh Gibbon, Buckinghamshire, Eng., July 22, 1584; married in England, Frances, who died and was buried in England, July 2, 1630. He came to Boston with his family and settled in Lynn, where he was freeman in 1639, and where he had 500 acres. In 1640, he was one of the eight original grantees of a settlement that was projected on Long Island; he was probably the leader as the plans for the plantation and the laws that were adopted are in his writing. He was one of a company who purchased a sloop in Boston for the transfer of their families and goods. Their first selection of land was innocently made in a section claimed by the Dutch who drove them from it. They then chose land between Peaconeck and the east end of Long Island with the whole breadth from sea to sea, in 1641, and named it Southampton. In 1644, he was granted 40 acres of land to build a grist mill. He was governor's assistant, or magistrate, 1647, for six years under the jurisdiction of Connecticut; to the last year of his life he was a member of the Colonial

legislature. He was one of the wealthiest and most influential men of the town. He married (2) Eleanor ——. He died in 1655. He was not related to Richard Howell of Southold, L. I.

10. THOMAS¹ HOWES was born in 1590 in Norfolk, Eng., and came to Lynn, Mass., in 1637. He was one of the three original grantees of Yarmouth in 1638. He lived at Nobscusset, on the north side of Cape Cod (later called Dennis). He was representative to General Court from Yarmouth in 1652 and for six years following. He married in England about 1630, Mary — (no proof has been found that she was Mary Burr). She died Dec. 9, 1695, in Yarmouth. He had died in Oct. 1665, aged 75. His will, dated Sept. 26, 1665, proved Mar. 1666, mentions his wife Mary and three sons. His widow married, second, in 1668, Gov. Thomas Prence, his fourth wife.

9. JEREMIAH² HOWES was born in 1637, some authorities say on the passage from England, the son of Thomas¹ and Mary Howes. He lived in Yarmouth where he was a prominent and influential citizen, on many church and town committees. A freeman, 1663. He was appointed to secure the bodies of whales that were cast up on shore, and to receive £4 a whale. He was constable; was on the Council of War for Yarmouth in 1676;

deputy to General Court, 1679. He married Sarah Prence who was born, 1646, daughter of Gov. Thomas¹ and Mary (Collier) Prence. He died Sept. 9, 1708; his wife had died Mar. 3, 1706. Both were buried in the old Howes burying ground at North Dennis, where their gravestones, in excellent condition although evidently the oldest in the cemetery, furnish the only statement of their ages. He was "aged about 71 years," and she was "in her 60th year." His will, dated Aug. 4, 1708, mentions eight daughters and four sons.

8. PRINCE³ HOWES was born in Yarmouth about 1671, son of Jeremiah² and Sarah (Prence) Howes. He married about 1695, Dorcas Joyce who was born in Hokonum, Yarmouth, probably in Mar. 1674, the daughter of Hosea² and Elizabeth (Chipman) Joyce. He built a house in New Boston, which was standing in 1914, on the farm which he inherited from his father, and in which he and his wife lived until their death, with their son Lot. He died, Oct. 2, 1753, aged 82 (gravestone), and his widow died, Nov. 14, 1757, aged 85 (gravestone). They are both buried in North Dennis. His will, dated Feb. 18, 1740, proved Oct. 16, 1753, names sons Prince, Jeremiah, Thomas and Lot; daughters Desire Hallett and Dorcas Matthews.

11. ARTHUR¹ HOWLAND, born in England, brother of John¹, came with his brother Henry to Plymouth on the second trip of the *Mayflower*. In 1647 he bought 300 acres of land at Marshfield for £21 in cash, the balance in "corne and cattle"—the ordinary pay of the times. He lived and died on this estate. A man of firmness and uprightness, he early accepted the Quaker faith, and during their persecutions his house was their headquarters. The descendants of Arthur and Henry were Quakers, but none of John's. No religious society has more Howland members than the "Friends."

He married widow Margaret (—) Reed who died June 16, 1683. He had died and was buried at Marshfield, Nov. 30, 1675. Their names are on a monument in the graveyard on the Daniel Webster estate at Marshfield. He mentions his daughter Martha Damon in his will of Mar. 14, 1675. In 1669 he was fined for not paying the "rate to the minnistry."

11. JOHN¹ HOWLAND was born in Essex, Eng., in 1592, a brother of Humphrey Howland who was a citizen and draper of London. Humphrey's will, which was proved July 10, 1646, by his wife Anne, mentions his brothers Arthur, John and Henry, his sister Margaret Phillips, nephew Simon Howland, and sister Hannah Howland. The brothers Arthur, John and Henry were in Scrooby, Eng., in 1608; were a year in Amsterdam, and then in Leyden until they migrated to New England. The brother Henry died in 1671; he married Mary Newland.

John Howland came in the *Mayflower*, 1620, to Plymouth. During the passage he was thrown overboard by a heavy sea, but held onto the halliards and was rescued with a boat hook. He was in the "First Encounter" with the Indians at Great Meadow Creek, three days before the landing of the Pilgrims. He was the thirteenth of the forty-one signers of the Mayflower compact. In 1627 he was one of the eight undertakers who assumed the debts and management of the colony.

He married in 1622, Elizabeth Tilley, who was born about 1607, the daughter of John Tilley, with whom she came on the *Mayflower*. John Howland was governor's assistant, 1633-35; in

command of Kennebec Trading Post, 1634; deputy to General Court, 1641, and later. His tax in 1633 was 18s, the same as that of Myles Standish. It was written of him "He was a godly man and an ancient professor in the ways of Christ."

He died Feb. 23, 1673, and was buried at Plymouth. His will, dated May 29, 1672, names his wife Elizabeth, executrix; sons John, Jabez, Joseph and "youngest son Isaac," daughters Desire Gorham, Hope Chipman, Elizabeth Dickarson, Lydia Brown, Hannah Bosworth and Ruth Cushman. His widow spent her widowhood at the home of her daughter Lydia Brown, and died at Swanzey, May 12, 1687.

His wife's surname was Clark; she survived him and died Apr. 4, 1664. He died Nov. 14, 1651.

INGERSOLL

12. RICHARD¹ INGERSOLL, born 1600 in England, came from Sands, Bedfordshire, Eng., with his wife, two sons and four daughters in the *Talbot*, 1629, to Salem, Mass. He came with his brother John [who was born 1615, m. 1651, Dorothy Lord, (2) Abigail Bascomb, (3) Mary Hunt (John)], and with Mr. Higginson, first minister of the first church at Salem. He was granted two acres for a house in 1635; in 1636 was granted 80 acres for a farm; in 1637 he established a ferry at North River which he kept.

He married, Oct. 20, 1616, Sands, Eng., his second or perhaps third wife, Ann (or Agnes) Langley, who was the mother of his children. His will, dated July 21, 1644, was probated Jan. 2, 1645, between which dates he died in Salem. It mentions his wife Ann, his sons George, Nathaniel and John, his sons-in-law Richard Pettingill and William Haines, and daughters Alice Walcott and Bathsheba. His farm of 50 acres was inventoried at £7 and a pair of oxen at £14. His widow married (2) John Knight, Sr. (whose first wife, Elizabeth, had died Mar. 1645; he died May, 1670). She died July 30, 1677.

A recipe found among his papers:— “A metson to make a man’s hear groe when he is bald: Take some fier flies and sum Redd worms and sum black snayles and sum hune bees and dri them and pound them to powder.” In 1636 it was “agreed that Richard Inkersall shall have one penny for every p’son hee doth ferry over the North River.”

12. CHRISTOPHER JACKSON, a merchant tailor of Mile End, London, Eng., married Oct. 1602, Susan Johnson, who was baptized Mar. 1579. He married a second time, ——. He had five sons and ten daughters, of whom his sons John (1602-1674) and Edward came to America. He died Dec. 1633.

11. EDWARD¹ JACKSON was baptized, Feb. 3, 1604, at St. Dunstan's, Stepney, Whitechapel Parish, London, the son of Christopher and Susan (Johnson) Jackson. He came to Cambridge Village (Newton), about 1642; a freeman, 1645; a nail-maker; a proprietor of Cambridge. He bought a farm of 500 acres for £140, the original price of which in 1638, with buildings, was six cows. He had a good education and was prominent in the town and colony; his name often appears on the most important committees. He was probably the first slave owner in Newton. He gave 400 acres of land in Billerica to Harvard College. He left an estate of 1,600 acres, and two slaves, value £5 each. Deputy from Cambridge, 1647, and for 16 years.

He married in London, Eng., Frances ———, who died Oct. 5, 1648, at Cambridge. He married, second, Mar. 14, 1649, Mrs.

Elizabeth (Newgate) Oliver, dau. of John Newgate, and widow of Rev. John Oliver. She was born, 1617, and died Sept. 30, 1709. He died in Newton, July 17, 1681. His gravestone of slate is still standing in the first graveyard of Newton, in Centre St. His will reads, "I do give to my grandchildren and great grandchildren, to the number of 36, 10 shillings apiece with which to buy them bibles." Repairs on his gravestone in 1825 made his death date June. It should be July as given in Inventory of his estate.

11. SEABORN² (SEBUS) JACKSON, son of Edward¹ and his first wife, Frances Jackson, was born according to a family tradition,

on the passage to America, in 1642. He lived in Newton, Mass. On Dec. 8, 1691, that part of Cambridge village which was on the south side of the Charles River and had been set off from Cambridge, was given the name Newtown. He married, Apr. 19, 1671, Sarah Baker, born in Roxbury, Apr. 24, 1650, daughter of Thomas¹ and Elizabeth Baker. She died Apr. 20, 1725. He served in Capt. Poole's Co., King Philip's War, 1675, and for his services his heirs received a grant of land in Narragansett. He died in Newton, Dec. 6, 1690, and is probably buried there. A monument in the West Roxbury burying ground bears the inscription, "Here lyes ye body of Mrs. Sarah Jackson, widow to Mr. Sebes Jackson, aged 75 years. Dec'd April ye 20, 1725."

8. JOHN¹ JENNINGS came from England to Sandwich, Mass., about 1667, and was freeman there in 1702. He was probably a friend of the Quakers, and perhaps a member. He was a mariner

and a cordwainer; constable, 1690. He married, June 29, 1667, Susanna —, and later married, second, Ruhama —. He died in Sandwich, June 8, 1722, at "an advanced age."

7. SAMUEL² JENNINGS was born in Sandwich, Feb. 28, 1685, the son of John and Ruhama Jennings. A family tradition says he was mutilated by a shark in the West Indies while swimming to escape from a man-of-war in which he had been impressed into service, losing a hand and foot. Baylies says, Samuel at 19 years of age went to England to recover the estate of his deceased brother John, a sea captain, and was impressed into service. Because of this accident he probably devoted himself to acquiring a superior education, as he was a schoolmaster in Sandwich in 1710, when he was voted a salary of "£20, and his diet, he to board round." It was also voted "Those who send shall pay additional and board." He was town treasurer, 1719-51; town clerk, 1721-51; representative, 1714, 1717 and 1721; surveyor, and a trader. He became possessed of a large estate. He married, Jan. 20, 1713, Remember Smith, who was born about 1690, daughter of Shubael² and Lydia (Skiff) Smith. She died Jan. 25, 1718, and he married, second, Deborah —, who died Feb. 10, 1753. He died and was buried in the old burying ground at Sandwich, where their gravestones read, "Here lyes ye body of Remember Jennings, dec'd Jan. 25, 1717-18 aged about 28 years." "In memory of Samuel Jennings, Esq. who having served God and his generation in several important trusts, deceased May 13, 1764 in his 80th year."

11 and 10. THOMAS¹ JUDD was born in England about 1608, and married there. He came to Cambridge, Mass., 1633; removed to Hartford, Conn., 1636, where he was an original proprietor; freeman, May 25, 1636. In 1645, he removed to Farmington and was one of the 84 original proprietors, and he and five of his sons owned large tracts. He was deputy from Farmington to the General Court of Connecticut, 1647, and often later to 1679. He was one of the twenty-seven founders of the Farmington Church, 1652, and one of its deacons for over twenty

Richard's will of Mar. 5, 1675, proved Sept. 8, 1675, names all his sons and daughters except Martha. It has not been proved that Richard¹ was the son of Richard and

9. THOMAS² KIMBALL, born in Rattlesden, Co. Suffolk, Eng., in 1633, married Mary Smith, daughter of Thomas¹ and Joanna Smith. 11. WILLIAM¹ LANE was born in Norfolk Co., Eng., and came to this country, probably a widower, with two adult sons and four daughters, to Dorchester in 1635, where he was a freeman, 163—. He married, second, before 1637, Agnes Farnsworth. There is

no mention of his wife in his will which was dated Feb. 28, 1650-1, and proved July 6, 1654. It names two sons and four daughters, and sons-in-law Thomas Rider, Thomas Lincoln and Nathaniel Baker. He was one of seventy-one men of Dorchester who gave their land, in 1641, on Thompson's Island for a free school, which was the first public school in the country to be supported by taxation. GEORGE² LANE was born in England, about 1612, the son of William¹ Lane. He came with his father in 1635, and was an early planter of Hingham, Mass., and one of the 30 proprietors. At the first distribution of land in 1635, a house lot of five acres was given him; he received later a grant of ten acres and thirteen shares in the common lands. A shoemaker; selectman, 1669 and 1678. He married Sarah Harris who was born in England, the daughter of Walter¹ and Mary (Fry) Harris.

The first meeting house in Hingham, built 1635, was palisaded for defence, and had a bell. A new church was built in 1681, which is now the oldest meeting house in New England in continuous use. George Lane was rated £6. 6s, for the building and was assigned "ye seate under ye pulpit." His will, made Oct. 16, 1688, proved Aug. 20, 1689, mentions his wife; sons Josiah, Ebenezer and Peter; daughters Sarah Luis, Elizabeth Poor and Mary Ellis, and grandchildren Thomas Robbart, George, William, Ebenezer and Joseph Umphrey, and Mary Lane, daughter of son Josiah. He died June 11, 1689, and his widow died in 1695.

11. GEORGE¹ LEWIS, born in England, came with his brother John, from East Greenwich in Kent, Eng., about 1633, to Scituate, Mass. Freeman, 1636. The name Lewis is the English form of

Llewellyn, and nearly every Welsh family had a son Llewellyn. When surnames were adopted and the father's name was used as a surname the families of Lewis became numerous. He married in England, Sarah Jenkins, sister of Edward Jenkins. He removed about 1640 to Barnstable, and his wife died there. Before 1654 he had married, second, Mary ——. Goodman Lewis was a clothier; a surveyor of highways, 1648 and 1650; constable, an office of dignity and honor in those days, in 1651. He died in Barnstable in 1662. His widow was still living in 1670. His will, probated Mar. 3, 1663, names wife Mary, sons Ephraim, George, Thomas, James, Edward and John, and dau. Sarah.

13. EDWARD LEWIS and Margaret Jones of Cardiff, county seat of Glamorgan, South Wales, were married May 8, 1550.

12. WILLIAM LEWIS of Penarth, Wales, the sixth son of Edward, born Apr. 1, 1561, married Aug. 3, 1592, Sarah Cathcart, and had William, Christopher and Robert (b. 1603, m. 1639, Ann Cozens), and Ann, d. 1676.

11. SERGT. WILLIAM¹ LEWIS, born in Landough, Wales, Jan. 3, 1594, was probably the son of William and Sarah Lewis. He married, Feb. 7, 1618, Felix Collins, the daughter of Walter and Felicia (Bandrib) Collins of Cardiff, Wales (who were married Sept. 3, 1594). He removed to Stanstead, Co. Essex, Eng., 1623. He came in the *Lion* with his wife and only child, arrived at Boston, Sept. 16, 1632, and settled at Braintree; freeman, Nov. 6, 1632; removed to Cambridge, 1633, and to Hartford, Conn., 1636, with Rev. Thomas Hooker's band, and was an original proprietor there. He returned to England (probably Wales), and brought back with him, in 1649, his sister, Mrs. Ann Stanes, whose

husband had come in 1642. He and his son, William, signed the agreement and became the earliest settlers of Hadley, Mass., 1659, for which he was representative in 1662. He removed to Northampton and was representative, 1664 and 1665. He must have been of a roving disposition as he removed to Farmington, Conn., 1667, then back to Hadley where his wife died, Apr. 17, 1671. He returned to Farmington, where he died Dec. 2, 1683, "at great age," in his 90th year. His will, dated Aug. 30, 1683, mentions his son William, his grandchildren Ezekiel, Nathaniel, Abigail, Philip and Ebenezer. He was a trooper in John Pynchon's company. He had only one child, William.

10. CAPT. WILLIAM² LEWIS, born in Wales, Aug. 19, 1620, the son of William¹ and Felix Lewis, came from Wales to England with his parents in 1623, and to New England, 1632. He married in Hartford, in 1644, Mary Hopkins, who was probably born in England. She was the daughter of William¹ and Mary Hopkins. He was one of the first settlers of Farmington, and became a prominent man; the first town clerk when it was incorporated and its name changed from Tunxis, 1645; was first lieutenant in 1651, and later captain of its military company, in 1674; sergeant and captain in the Narragansett campaign of King Philip's War, 1675; deputy to General Court, 1689 and 1690. He and Samuel Steele bought of the Indians a hill (now part of Plymouth and Litchfield) and all land within eight miles on every side, where they dug black lead in 1657. During that year the Indians were very troublesome and burned his and other houses, for which they agreed to make an annual payment for seven years of 80 fathoms of wampum (each shell bead of white wampum was accepted as worth a farthing).

His wife Mary died about 1670, and he married (2) Dec. 22, 1671, Mary, daughter of the well-known teacher, Ezekiel Cheever. He died Aug. 18, 1690; he and his father are buried in the Old Colonial Burying Ground at Farmington. His widow married, in 1692, Thomas² Bull, son of Thomas¹, and died 1727, aged 87.

He was one of the first slave owners on record in Farmington, and left his slaves (two Indians) by will to his wife. After his death, however, his slave Sampson, with his wife and children, were given their freedom.

9. SERGEANT SAMUEL³ Lewis was born Aug. 18, 1648, in Farmington, son of William and Mary (Hopkins) Lewis. He lived in Farmington; was freeman there 1677; "Sargeant in ye trained band," 1676 (at that time the militia was called the "trained band"). He married Elizabeth Orton, who was bapt. 1654, daughter of Thomas¹ and Margaret (Pratt) Orton. "Elizabeth, wife of Samuel Lewis, joined the church in 1691." She probably died, and he married, second, Mary —, who was mother of his last six children. "Mary, wife of Samuel Lewis, joined the church in Farmington, 1707." He died Nov. 13, 1725, at Farmington. Authorities do not agree on names of his wives.

LINCOLN

10. THOMAS¹ LINCOLN, brother of Stephen, came from Wymondham, Co. Norfolk, Eng., to Hingham, Mass., in autumn of 1638. A farmer, he was known as "husbandman" to distinguish him from the other three by the name of Thomas, who were known as "cooper," "miller" and "weaver." There were eight Lincolns in Hingham among the early settlers, all probably from Co. Norfolk, Eng., but so far as we know not related: Daniel called "Sergt." or "the boatman"; three brothers, Thomas, "the weaver," who had no children, Daniel, "the husbandman," who died unmarried, and Samuel, "the mariner," who was the ancestor of Abraham Lincoln.

The name, from Latin, *linum colonia*—flax colony—was spelled Lyncoln, Linkoln, Linckon, Lyncolne, etc. Lincoln and Cologne are the only two colonies of Imperial Rome which retain the designation of *colonia* in their names. His name was often on the early records of the town; selectman, 1662, 1669 and 1672. He married Margaret, daughter of Richard¹ Langer. She died Mar. 5, 1694, at Hingham. He had died Aug. 16, 1692. His will, made May 24, 1681, names his wife and eight children.

LONGFELLOW

10. ENSIGN WILLIAM¹ LONGFELLOW was bapt. Oct. 20, 1650, at Guiseley, Hampshire, Eng. He came in his youth to Newbury, Mass., where he married, Nov. 10, 1678, Anne Sewall, who was born in Newbury, Sept. 3, 1662, daughter of Henry¹ and Jane (Dummer) Sewall. He was ensign of the Newbury Company that went with Sir William Phips against Quebec, and was drowned with nine others off Anticosta, in 1690, in a violent storm on their return. An extract from the report of the expedition against Quebec: "I set saile from New England, Mar. 1690, with seaven hundred men and seaven saile of ships, and we reduced Accady. With 2300 men and with 30 saile of ships, I sailed Aug. 10, 1690, for Quebeck. Contrary winds delayed our arrival till Oct. I brought the ships within Musquett shot, we fired and dismounted severall of their best cannon, so that the city must have been taken in two or three daies but small pox and the feavour broke out, and the weather grew so extream cold that no further progress could be made therein, so I returned to New England. William Phips."

His widow married, May 11, 1692, Henry Short, son of Henry and Sarah (Glover) Short, and had several children. She died 1706.

16 years: Zaccheus, 14; John, 8, and Ellen and James, twins, 1 year, embarked with Rev. Joseph Hull's party of 106 persons, including John Ford, John Tower and John Whitmarsh, and came from Weymouth, Eng. After 46 days' voyage, these friends, mostly from Dorset and Somerset shires, landed in Boston, and settled in Wessagusset, which name was changed to Weymouth, Sept. 1635. He was a husbandman, a man of substance, and became a member of the church in 1635, and a freeman.

His will was dated 1654, but not probated until June, 1672, which was probably the year of his death. It mentions "wife," sons John and James, and son-in-law Andrew Ford.

His will, dated June 30, 1666, probated Aug. 1667, gives land and a house in England to his son Thomas, land to son William, and daughters Hannah Hoppin, Mary Willis, Hester, wife of John Brown, and their five children; Waitawhile, wife of Josias Cooper, and to his wife's three daughters. He deposed in 1662, he was aged near 70 years. He died Jan. 1667, Boston.

11. THOMAS¹ MARRYOTT was born in England in 1589. A shoemaker and cordwinder. He came to Cambridge, Mass., 1635, and was chosen a deacon of Shepherd's church, when it was organized in 1636. A freeman, 1636, and a prominent citizen. A selectman, 1639-1647.

He married Susanna (perhaps Cranniwell) in England, and his first four children were born there. He was attorney of his brother-in-law, Richard Cranniwell of Woodbridge, Suffolk Co., Eng., in 1642. Susanna died Feb. 23, 1665. He had died, June 30, 1664, ae. 75, at Cambridge. McEWEN

9. ROBERT¹ McEWEN was born in Dundee, Scotland, in 1662. He was persecuted on account of his religion, fined and imprisoned, his property confiscated, and he was banished from the country. On Sept. 5, 1685, he and one hundred others of similar faith were put in an old unseaworthy ship bound for Virginia. One half of the number died because of a severe storm, which necessitated continued and hard pumping, from exposure, lack of food and prolonged voyage. They at length, on Dec. 18, put into the port of Amboy, N. J., to which they added the name Perth from their Scottish home. In Feb. 1686, he removed to Stratford, Conn., for the religious liberty he had heard was allowed in Connecticut. Tradition says eleven of the passengers came on foot to Stratford. A tailor. He married there, June 20, 1695, Sarah Wilcoxson, who was born Dec. 26, 1671, the daughter of Timothy² and Joanna (Birdsey) Wilcoxson. He died in Stratford, Feb. 24, 1739. The name was spelled on Stratford records McEwen; later his children appear as McIan, Macune, Macon and Mason.

McMURPHY

8. JOHN¹ McMURPHY, born in Ireland, 1682, was probably the son of James McMurphy. He came to New England and joined the settlement in Londonderry, N. H., in 1719, a short time after its commencement. In 1720, he built the second frame house in the town; his name appears on the earliest records of the town; selectman in 1722; a member of the most important committees to adjust the concerns of the colony; the first representative from Londonderry, and as representative was a member of the General Court of New Hampshire for eleven years. He was early appointed Justice of Peace; town clerk, fourteen years; a man of intelligence and probity. He died at Portsmouth, while attending General Court, Sept. 21, 1755, aged about 73. His body "was carried in procession to Londonderry and buried with an extraordinary company" at the old burying ground in Londonderry. A record has been preserved of the distribution of kid gloves to be worn at his funeral in Portsmouth, which was the custom of those days, sixty-seven pairs of white kid gloves, while thirty-four pairs of black gloves were given to the near relatives, among whom are the names Widow MacMurphy, Deacon Tolford and wife, Major Tolford and wife, Alexander Caldwell and wife, Alexander MacMurphy and wife, Matthew Patten and wife, William Craig and wife, John Caldwell, Elizabeth Tolford, John Tolford, Mary Tolford 2d, Mr. MacGregor and wife.

He married in Ireland, Mary —, and some of his children

were born there. Robert was executor of his father's will, dated Feb. 25, 1755, and received the homestead. Alexander McMurphy who came with John¹ was probably his brother. The Scotch form of the name, McMurchy—meaning Murchison—was changed in Ireland.

The Scotch Presbyterians who had gone from Dumfries, Scotland, to Ulster in North Ireland, about 1680, found the system of renting land so discouraging that they sent to Gov. Shute of Massachusetts a petition, signed by 319 representative men, asking for land for a settlement. His answer was favorable and about one hundred and twenty families left Ireland, from the counties of Londonderry and Antrim. They "filled five large ships, and numbered 750 men, women and children." The first ship arrived in Boston, July, 1718; some of these families settled in Boston, where they eventually formed the Federal Street Church; many went to Pennsylvania, some located near Worcester, while others went to a section of land twelve miles square assigned to them by Gov. Shute, which later proved to be in the Province of New Hampshire, and was named by them Londonderry. By Sept. 1719, there were seventy families here with their pastor, Rev. David McGregor, and it became the mother town from which ten other settlements were made in New Hampshire. Several families settled in Chester, and later organized the Presbyterian Church. The Scotch were not welcomed by the old settlers and their settlements were on the frontier where they were buffer walls against the Indians and often suffered greatly. There was mutual dislike between the Yankees and the "Irish" and there were no intermarriages for many years. The Irish raised flax and spun the linen; they ate potatoes, churned milk and drank buttermilk, none of which the English did; the Irish made barley broth while the English made bean porridge, but they became friendly neighbors as time passed.

11. REV. JOHN¹ MILLER, son of Martin Miller of Kent, Eng., was born in England, 1606. He studied at Cambridge, Eng., receiving the degree A.B. in 1627, from Caius College. He preached in England, and married there Lydia ——. He brought his wife and son John with him to America. He was Elder in the church at Roxbury, 1634. Freeman, 1639. Preached in Rowley, 1639-41. He was a proprietor and had a grant of land in Sandwich, 1641, and in Newbury, 1642. In 1642 he was asked to go as a missionary to Virginia, but declined "because of bodily weakness." He preached in Yarmouth, 1646 to 1662; in 1663 he was called to Groton and preached there until his death, June 12, 1664. He was succeeded there by Samuel Willard (son of Simon), who was the seventh president of Harvard College. It was said of him, "He was a man of low stature but high literary attainments." "Lydia, wife of Mr. John Miller of Yarmouth," died in Boston, Aug. 7, 1658. He was one of the few University graduates among the early settlers.

MOORE

10. DEACON ISAAC¹ MOORE, born 1622, was probably that youth of 13 who came in the *Increase* to Boston, in 1635. He married in Hartford, Conn., Dec. 5, 1645, Ruth Stanley, who was born in England in 1628, the daughter of John¹ Stanley. He was a deacon of the church in Farmington, and in May, 1649, was appointed sergeant of the Train Band. In 1665 he was freed from training because he had been chief officer of the Train Band. In 1650 a title to the lands at Farmington (previously called Tunxis) was obtained by an agreement with the Indians. The Land Records of Apr. 9, 1650, read "Sutch agrements as were made by the majistrates with the Indians of Tunckses concerning the Lands & sutch things In reference thereunto as tend to setle peace In a way of truth and Righteousness betwixt the Inglish and them." Pethus and Ahamo signed for the Indians. Jo: Haynes for the Colony, in the presence of Stephen Hart, Thomas Judd, Thomas Thompson, Isack Moore, Thomas Stanton and Roger Newton. This was an effective treaty for war was never declared by or against the Tunxis Indians.

He was one of the 84 proprietors when the division of lands at Farmington was made in 1672. In 1651 he removed to Norwalk, and was one of the first settlers. "Isacke More was granted one home lott containing four akers." In 1654 Goodman Moore was chosen townsman; in 1657 with others he "made a wolfe pit and was allowed 10s. for every wolfe." He was deputy, 1657 and 1658, to General Court. He returned to Farmington in 1660. His wife Ruth died in Farmington, May 26, 1691; he married, second, after 1693, Dorothy, the daughter of Rev. Henry¹ Smith,—her fourth marriage. He died 1705, and his widow died the next year.

11. JOHN¹ MOSES, probably born in Wales, married in England, and came to New England, 1632, probably to Lynn, then Salem, then Duxbury, where we find him in 1639, a blacksmith and shipwright. He brought with him his tools and an anvil which weighed 126 lbs., and long remained in the family. He was a member of the Church of England so probably did not come to escape religious persecution but to meet the need for men who could build ships.

10. JOHN² MOSES, son of John¹ Moses, married May 18, 1653, Mary Brown. He located in Windsor, Conn., before 1647. Was a soldier in Capt. John Mason's troop of horse, 1637. He remained in the Church of England; he had ownership in a cider mill, saw mills and a grist mill. He removed with the group of early settlers to Simsbury. All his life he was a negotiator between the colonists and Indians. He died Oct. 14, 1683; his widow died Sept. 14, 1689. His estate was inventoried at £575. He was in the war against King Philip and the Narragansetts. Administration was given Oct. 1683, to his widow and son John. He left legacies to his eldest daughter, Mary, and to son Timothy and to each of his children £60 at lawful age. Mary Moses,

widow of John, bequeathed in her will "two barrels of syder to her son John, and her cyder mill to Timothy," all the rest of her property to be divided among her children equally.

H.; a carpenter; he went with quite a company from Londonderry to Belfast, Me., where he married Nov. 8, 1774, Elizabeth Durham, who was born about 1758, daughter of John¹ and Mary (Tolford) Durham. He died 1789, and his widow died about 1833, aged 75. His children were all born in Belfast, but are not recorded as the British occupied Belfast during the Revolution. His marriage is recorded as "James Morro" to Elizabeth Durham.

MYGATT

10. DEACON JOSEPH MYGATT was born in England, 1596, and married in England, Ann ——, who was born in 1602. He came in the *Griffen*, 1633, with his wife and his pastor, Rev. Thomas Hooker. Rev. Thomas Hooker, Rev. Mr. Stone and the celebrated Rev. John Cotton were obnoxious to the government and were suspected of planning to leave England, and spies were

watching for them at every port. They came aboard the *Griffen* disguised, and remained incognito until the ship was well out at sea. One of the three ministers preached every day and sometimes all three preached—Mr. Cotton in the morning, Mr. Hooker in the afternoon and Mr. Stone after supper. They arrived Sept. 4, after eight weeks' sailing.

He settled in Newtown (later Cambridge), where he received a grant of land in 1634; and was freeman, 1635. In 1632, a church had been built in Newtown with a bell on it.

In May, 1636, a band of 150 people with their pastor, Rev. Thos. Hooker, started from Newtown for the new settlement on the Connecticut River—later named Hartford. They travelled through a dreary wilderness with no guide but compasses; they drove one hundred and sixty cattle, and lived on the milk of the cows; for one hundred miles the people carried their packs, arms and utensils and were two weeks on their way. Their supplies, which were sent around by boats, sunk. By winter a church was built, small, with a door in the middle of one wall and a window each side of it, and seats outside for the guard.

He was selectman in 1639; an original proprietor in division of lands, and one of the committee to make the division in 1640; a deacon in the church; a merchant; he was licensed in 1656 to sell strong liquors by retail (only responsible persons were so licensed). He was representative in 1656 and 1658; on a committee with John Steele to demand compensation from the Indians for buildings they had burned.

He died, Dec. 7, 1680, at Hartford, and his widow died, in 1686, at Hartford, "aged 84"; both left wills and a good estate. In 1688, May 7, he deeded his estate to his children—in place of a will—to his son John, daughter Elizabeth Lewis, daughter Sarah Dewey, and her three daughters and four sons, and daughter Mary Root. He and his wife both died in Farmington.

Ezekiel Rogers' party from Rowley, Yorkshire, Eng., arriving at Salem, Mass., Dec. 1638, and helped form the settlement of Rowley, Mass., in Apr. 1639. Made freeman, May 13, 1640. Representative, 1640-42. He returned to England on business and died while there about 1656. He made his will Nov. 18, 1650, when

11. RICHARD¹ PETTINGILL, born 1621, came from Co. Norfolk, Eng., to Salem, Mass., before 1640. He was a freeman, 1641, which was a dignity given to church members who were recommended by their minister. He married at Salem, 1643, Joanna Ingersoll, who was born in England about 1625, the daughter of Richard¹ and Ann (Langley) Ingersoll. She died about 1693.

the names of such persons and to present them to the magistrate, whereby they may be accordingly proceeded against. The names of such as are ordered to doe this service are — for the 6th day, Richard Ingersoll, for the 7th day John Ingersoll. Richard Pettingill.”

In 1642 he was granted ten acres at Enon (later Wenham), and later at Newbury, 1651, where he bought land. He died 1695, at Newbury.

11. JOHN¹ PLUME was bapt. in Great Yeldham, Essex Co., Eng., July 28, 1594, the son of Robert and Grace Plume. He married about 1616, Dorothy —. In 1634, he was seated in Ridgewell Hall, where all his children except Dorcas were born. He sold his property in England and bought a ship in which he came to Dorchester, Mass., 1633, and settled in Watertown, but soon went with a party from there to Wethersfield, Conn., where he was one of the first settlers and proprietors in 1636. In 1637 he was one of Capt. Mason's company of 77 men in the Pequot War, which nearly exterminated the Pequot Indians, and received a grant of land from the colony. He was deputy to Court, 1637, and often until 1644, when he removed to Branford, where he was town clerk until his death, having been elected at the first town meeting. He was on the committee to buy corn from the Indians for from four to six shillings a bushel; to mark the boundaries of towns; to lay out roads, and to improve the land of the plantations. He died July, 1648, at Branford. His widow administered his estate, and was living in 1669. He was a ship owner and traded up and down the river with the Indians.

10. GOV. THOMAS¹ PRENCE, b. Lechdale, Eng., 1600, came in the ship *Fortune* to Plymouth, 1621, where he lived until he moved to Duxbury, 1635; he moved to Eastham, 1644, and later returned to Plymouth. He married Aug. 5, 1624—the ninth marriage in the colony—Patience Brewster, who was born in England, dau. of Elder William¹ Brewster, and came with her mother, 1623, in the *Ann*. She died, Plymouth, 1634, and he married, second, Apr. 1, 1635, Mary Collier, who was born in England, dau. of William¹ Collier. He married, third, 1662, Apphia, wid. of Samuel¹ Freeman; and married, fourth, 1668, Mary, wid. of Thomas¹ Howes. She survived him and died in 1695. “His appearance was particularly dignified and striking. He had a countenance full of majesty, and was therein a terror to evil doers.”

In 1627 he and a half a dozen of the most prominent colonists devised means to bring over more of their friends who had been with them at Leyden. In 1634 he was elected governor of New Plymouth. Having moved from Plymouth to Duxbury he could not be re-elected governor (as the governor had to be from Plymouth), so he was elected assistant, but in 1638 he was elected governor with permission to live in Duxbury. He was succeeded by William Bradford, who died 1657, and then he was elected governor for the third time and held the office until his death, which occurred Mar. 29, 1673. He was buried in Plymouth. His will, dated Mar. 13, 1673, mentions his wife Mary.

He was constable and collector of taxes, 1769-1772. He married, Nov. 19, 1745, Phoebe (Rist) Draper of Uxbridge, the daughter of Joseph and Phoebe (Richardson) Rist. 6. COL. ISAAC⁴ PRESTON, born in Fairfield, N. J., Nov. 20, 1735, son of Isaac³, lived in Fairfield, and was married there to Hannah Bower, who was born in Fairfield, Mar. 20, 1737, the daughter of Ebenezer³ and Priscilla Bower. He was ordained an elder in the Fairfield church, Feb. 14, 1771. He was a private in Capt. Allen's Co. of State troops of New Jersey; appointed colonel of First Battalion, Cumberland Co., N. J., troops, Feb. 4, 1777; served under Washington during the memorable campaign of 1776. His regiment was in service in the northern part of the state, where he died in camp in Somerset Co., Mar. 5, 1777, as a result of exposure during the marches following the battles of Trenton and Princeton. His will, dated 1-8-1775, appoints his wife executor, and mentions his new cedar log house, and leaves legacies to his three sons and five daughters—all minors. Theodotia who was born later was not mentioned. His widow, Hannah, mentions all nine children in her will dated Jan. 12, 1782, probated Mar. 1, 1782, between which dates she died of small pox at Fairfield. She named her brother John Bower, and son-in-law Ephraim Newcomb, executors.

5. REV. JOHN BOWER⁵ PRESTON was born in Fairfield, N. J., Oct. 3, 1770, the son of Col. Isaac⁴ and Hannah (Bower) Preston. "He began life in a feeble state and for six months continued to languish, and wholly lost the sight of one eye." He was left fatherless at seven, and motherless at twelve, and used all his inheritance in his education. He graduated from the University of Pennsylvania, in 1793, taught two years, then studied theology with the celebrated Dr. Emmons of Franklin, Mass., as this was before the days of theological seminaries. In 1798 he went to his first and only pastorate at Rupert, Vt., where he died Feb. 21, 1813, aged 42. He was married at Franklin, Mass., Jan. 6, 1799, to Polly Haven, who was born Dec. 15, 1776, the daughter of Asa⁴ and Eunice (Aldis) Haven.

"He was a good classical scholar, a frank and hearty friend. His peculiar characteristics were system, energy and perseverance. He was kind, affable and obliging, punctual, modest and had a high sense of duty, a beloved and successful pastor" (extracts from a sketch of his life printed at the time of his death). His widow married, second, 1816, Deacon James Fisher of Frankestown, N. H., born 1750, son of Samuel¹ Fisher of Londonderry, N. H., who died Aug. 15, 1840. They had one child, Isaac Preston Fisher, born Mar. 14, 1820, d. Dec. 1896. She died at the home of her daughter Mrs. Harvey D. Smith, Gouverneur, N. Y., Mar. 23, 1848.

He married, June 7, 1831, Mary Whedon, dau. of Capt. David Whedon of Hebron, N. Y.; she died Aug. 4, 1832. He married, second, at Farmington, Conn., Clarissa North, who was born Aug. 15, 1811, daughter of Linus⁶ and Dolly (Woodruff) North. He preached as a Home Missionary at Ripley, N. Y., 1830-33; Lodi (now Gowanda), N. Y., 1833-37; Attica, N. Y., 1837-44; Byron, N. Y., 1844-48; Berlin, Wis., 1849-59; Oconomowoc, Wis., 1859-61; Omro, Wis., 1861-65; Cape Vincent, N. Y., 1865-68; Woodville, N. Y., 1868-73; Manlius, N. Y., 1873-76. He had a stroke of paralysis in the pulpit one Sunday in Jan. 1876, after which he never preached. He died at the home of his son Deming, Oct. 17, 1877, in Chicago. His widow died at Hinsdale, Ill., Nov. 26, 1896, and they are buried in Rose Hill Cemetery, Chicago. He was sympathetic, gentle and lovable, very fond of music. He helped build several churches, and in some of his parishes a parsonage also.

3. REV. MARCUS NORTH⁷ PRESTON was born at Gowanda, N. Y., July 1, 1835, the son of John Bower⁶ and Clarissa (North) Preston. He studied at Miami University, Oxford, Ohio, 1853-56; was graduated from Williams College, 1859; studied one year at Union Seminary, New York City, and then at Auburn (N. Y.) Theological Seminary, 1860-62. He married, May 12, 1862, at Chester, N. H., Rebecca Bailey Tenney, who was born in Chester, Oct. 4, 1835, the daughter of William⁷ and Emeline (Murray) Tenney.

His first pastorate was in Skaneateles, N. Y., from May, 1862, to Dec. 1884, when he accepted a call to the Presbyterian Church in Bath, N. Y. In Jan. 1896, he became pastor of the Congregational Church in Hinsdale, Ill., and died there Dec. 24, 1904. His widow moved to Brooklyn, N. Y., where she died Mar. 7, 1921. They are both buried in Rose Hill Cemetery, Chicago.

Somersetshire. She was born in England, 1616. He was the first representative from Weymouth, Sept. 1636. He was a representative when the General Court of Massachusetts, Oct. 28, 1636, agreed to "give £400 towards a schoale or colledge." Nov. 15, 1637, it was voted "The Colledge is ordered to be at Newetowne." Mar. 13, 1638-9, "It was ordered that the colledge agreed upon to bee built at Cambridg shalbee called Harvard Colledge." He was prominently identified with the affairs of the new colony. Was "Townsmen," Nov. 1651. He died before 1659, as in Feb. 1659, widow Avis Reed was granted a garden plot, and in 1663 another lot of 10 acres.

Selectman, 1681, 1686, 1687 and 1696, and an extensive dealer in land. A dam that he built across the river between 1680-90 was still there in 1902. In 1688 he was one of five who agreed to ring the bell and sweep the meeting house for one year "for fortie shillings." He was a private in Lieut. Edward Oakes Co., in King Philip's War, 1676; representative to General Court. His will was dated Oct. 26, 1705, and proved Sept. 12, 1706; he and his wife both died between those dates at Weymouth.

RIST

9. NICHOLAS¹ RIST (RISSE OR RICE) was in Boston, Mass., Sept. 1648, and was apparently from Walden, Essex Co., Eng., as

in Sept. 1648, he gave Peter Gardiner power of attorney to collect from the executor of Thomas Rice of Walden, Eng., a legacy due him, and also anything due him by the deaths of his brothers and sisters. In Oct. 1648, he gave power of attorney to Gardiner to collect another legacy of £10 from the estate of Richard Rice, shoemaker of Kelton, in Suffolk, Eng. As he was old enough to execute legal papers he must have been born before 1628. He appears later at Noodle's Island, Lynn, Boston, Andover in 1662, and Reading, calling himself LeRisse, Rist and Rice at various times. The family is said to have come to England from Wales, in 1599, where the name was spelled Rhys.

Philip Risse, Rich or LeRisse, a tailor of Boston, who died in 1664, may have been a relative. A Nicholas Rist of Wenham, Philip Rist of Sudbury, 1712, Thomas Rist of Reading, John Rich of Reading, 1700, and Mary Rish, who joined the church in Reading in 1700, had family names and were probably related to him.

Nicholas married, about 1671, Sarah (Clark) Davis, who was born in England before 1633, daughter of William Clark, and widow of George Davis, a sea captain of Lynn, who had died in 1667. Sarah had had Hannah, born 1648, and five other children by her first husband. June 1, 1692, Sarah Rist was accused of witchcraft, with Lydia and Sarah Dustin, and imprisoned for five months. In October her husband petitioned court for her release, calling her "aged and decrepit" and saying he had been her husband for the past twenty years. They were later released and not brought to trial. Mar. 23, 1694, Nicholas and wife Sarah deeded eighteen acres in Reading to their dutiful son, Joseph Rist, to be helpful to them in their old age. Sept. 20, 1697, Sarah made her will, leaving legacies to her Davis children. She does not bequeath to Nicholas, nor call herself "widow," but "wife" of Nicholas Rist.

ROGERS

9. JEREMIAH¹ ROGERS, whose parents are not known, was one of the first settlers of Lancaster, Mass. He married Mehitabel Pierce, daughter of John and Mary Pierce. She was born probably in Dorchester, and probably about 1630, as she had three children to whom her father left legacies in his will in 1661. When Indians, in Feb. 1676, burned all the buildings in Lancaster except the church and one house, all the inhabitants who were not killed or captured fled to Dorchester. Among the refugees were Jeremiah and his family, and he died there Sept. 26, 1676, probably in the small pox epidemic which had broken out. Lancaster records say Abiah Rogers, widow of Jeremiah, died at Dorchester, Jan. 10, 1678. She and two of her daughters, Abigail and Bathsheba, died of small pox the same month. As the birth and death records of

their children in Lancaster all read child "of Jeremiah Rogers and Abiah his wife," that must have been another name for Mehitabel.

Jeremiah Rogers of Salem, wheelwright, Ichabod of Lancaster, cordwainer, and Jehoshaphat of Topsfield, tailor, conveyed their interest in lands of their father, Jeremiah Rogers of Lancaster, to Edward Phelps, May 12, 1710.

Samuel Trescott and Margaret, his wife, one of the daughters of Jeremiah Rogers, late of Lancaster, deceased, convey to Edward Phelps, land purchased of Abiah Warren of Boston, widow, one other daughter of said Jeremiah Rogers, May 21, 1710 (Middlesex Co. Deeds, vol. 15, p. 261).

4. ELAM⁶ ROGERS was born in South Brimfield, Mass., Sept. 23, 1801, the son of Abijah and Polly (Wetherbee) Rogers. From 10 to 21 years of age he lived with a farmer in South Brimfield whom he called Uncle Cyril Carpenter. After his marriage he manufactured hoes with his brother-in-law, Baker Batchelor at Groton. Later, both worked in the Wadsworth Scythe Works, Auburn, N. Y.—probably residing in Aurelius. He moved to Ballston, N. Y., 1841, and made scythes and axes with Isaiah Blood, owner of the Ballston Scythe Works. He built a home there at 134 Maple Ave., where he died Aug. 5, 1887.

He married, Nov. 27, 1828, at Northbridge, Mass., Caroline Matilda Prentice, who was born Dec. 7, 1808, at Northbridge, the daughter of Nahum⁷ and Nancy (Whipple) Prentice. When she was a little over four years of age her mother died, and she was taken into the home of her uncle, Levi Prentice, at Prentice Corners, one mile west of Whitinsville, Mass. She died of apoplexy, Mar. 11, 1887, at Ballston, N. Y., and they are both buried in the cemetery there.

11. ROGER RUSCOE (or RESCOE) was probably the son of widow Hannah Ruscoe, who was buried in Strawbridgeworth, 25 miles northeast of London, Aug. 5, 1634, aged about 80. William Ruscoe, who was born about 1593, died 1682, married about 1620,

Rebecca —, and came to Hartford in 1636, was probably a younger brother of Roger. Roger was born about 1585, and lived in Strawbridgeworth, Herts, Eng. He was probably from a Flemish or Dutch family who came to England with the Huguenot immigrants in the 16th century (especially good textile workers who settled in the cloth manufacturing towns of Essex and Suffolk).

He married Sarah —, who survived him; he died May 17, 1618. His will of May 16, 1618, mentions his wife Sarah, his son John, and daughters Mercy and Katherine.

RUSSELL

10. JOHN¹ RUSSELL was born in England in 1616, and perhaps married there, Elizabeth —. He was in Cambridge, Mass., in 1634; a proprietor and freeman there, 1635; in Charlestown, 1640; one of the first settlers of Woburn, 1644; a shoemaker, and appointed to be sealer of leather; in 1664 he was on important committees for division and distribution of plow lands, swamps and timber land; selectman several years. He was a deacon, in 1664, of the Congregational Church at Woburn. As an officer of the church, because he turned his back at the ceremony of infant

baptism, he was tried and committed to prison; although he was soon released his health was broken. He was one of the founders of the first Baptist Church in Boston in 1670, the members of which had gathered together in Noodles Island some years earlier.

His first wife died Dec. 16, 1644, and he married a second wife May 13, 1645, Elizabeth, daughter of William Baker of Charlestown. She survived him, and died Jan. 17, 1690. He died at Woburn, June 1, 1676. His will, dated May 27, 1676, mentions only two children:—son John, and daughter Mary Brooks. His son John was a Baptist minister.

SEARS

10 and 11. RICHARD¹ SARES or SEARS was born in 1590. The name Sares is a common one in the Island of Guernsey. S. P. May thinks it possible he came from there. The first records of him here are in Plymouth, May 8, 1630. He was in Marblehead, 1637-8. In 1639, he with others settled on a tract of land called by the Indians, Mattakeese, which they named Yarmouth. Freeman, 1653; representative to General Court, Plymouth Colony, 1662; member, Yarmouth Co., Lieut. William Palmer. He married 1632, Dorothy Jones, who was born in England. She was a sister of Richard¹ Jones (of Dinder, Co. Somerset, Eng., and Dorchester, Mass., d. 1641, m. Alice ——), and of Elizabeth Jones, who married Anthony¹ Thacher. She died Mar. 1679, "Goody Sares was buried Mar. 19, 1679," Yarmouth.

He was called "a husbandman." His will, dated 1667, proved Oct. 1676, names "my eldest son Paule, my youngest son Sylas, dau. Deborah and son-in-law Zachary Paddock." He died and was buried, Yarmouth, Aug. 26, 1676, ae. 86.

His will, dated Feb. 20, 1707, proved Apr. 8, 1708, mentions wife Deborah and five sons. He died Feb. 20, 1708, and is buried, Yarmouth. His stone slab is the oldest dated gravestone still standing in the Yarmouth graveyard.

Paul² and Deborah (Willard) Sears, married at Harwich, 1693, Mercy Freeman, who was born Harwich, Oct. 30, 1674, dau. of Thomas³ and Rebecca (Sparrow) Freeman. 11. HENRY¹ SEWALL, born in England, 1614, only child of Henry and Anne Sewall, came in the *Elizabeth and Dorcas* to Ipswich, 1634. Removed to Newbury, 1635, where he was free-man, 1637, traveling 40 miles on foot for that purpose, and married there Mar. 25, 1646, Jane Dummer, who was born in England, 1628, daughter of Stephen¹ and Alice (Archer) Dummer. After his marriage he returned to England where he officiated as a minister for a short time in Warwick, then in Tunworth, Co. Hants. He returned to Newbury, 1661; deputy from Newbury, 1661, 1668 and 1670; one of the largest land holders in Massa-

chusetts in his day. He died in Newbury, May 16, 1700, and his widow died Jan. 13, 1701. The inscription on his gravestone, still standing in Newbury, reads:—

“M^r Henry Sewall (sent by M^r Henry Sewall, his father, in ye ship Elsbeth and Dorcas, Capt. Watts, Commander.) arrived at Boston 1634. Winterd at Ipswich helpd begin this plantation 1635. Furnishing English servant. neat cattel and provisions. Married Mr^s Jane Dummer March ye 25, 1646 Died May ye 16, 1700 Aetat 86. His frutfull Vine being thus disjoined fell to ye ground January ye 13 following. Aetat 74. Psal. 27.10.”

10. RICHARD¹ SEAMAR was bapt. Jan. 27, 1605, in Strawbridgeworth, Co. Herts, Eng., son of Robert and Elizabeth Semare. He married at Strawbridgeworth (local pronunciation Sapsearth), Apr. 18, 1631, Mercy Ruscoe, who was born about

1610, daughter of Roger and Sarah Ruscoe. He came to New England in 1638, probably as soon as he had finished settling his father's estate, and he naturally went to Hartford where he was among old neighbors. Of the 136 proprietors of Hartford, in 1640, at least one-half were from Essex Co., Eng., where Rev. Thomas Hooker had preached before his exile to Holland, in 1630. Later he came with a large part of his flock to Hartford, and was the pastor of their church.

Richard Seamer was one of the original proprietors of Hartford, 1639. He was chosen chimney viewer in 1647. Removed to Farmington; was captain of Seymour Fort; was one of the fourteen signers for the planting of Norwalk, 1650; was selectman there in 1655, and died there in Sept. 1655. His will, dated July 29, 1655, in which he is described as "very weak and sike," was proved Oct. 25. It mentions his wife Mercy, his oldest son Thomas, and leaves his sons John, Zechariah and Richard, who are minors, to their mother's guardianship. His widow married, second, Nov. 25, 1655, John¹ Steele of Farmington, who had administered her first husband's estate.

11. ABRAHAM¹ SHAW, a clothier, came from Northowram, Halifax, Yorkshire, Eng., in the *Anne*, 1636, to Watertown, Mass. In Oct. 1636, his house and all his goods were burned and he removed to Dedham, where he had twelve acres and was called a planter. In Feb. 1637, he was granted 60 acres and the right to build a corn mill, and was one of the men appointed to govern the town. Freeman, 1637; constable, 1638. He married in Halifax, Eng., June 24, 1616, Bridget Best, who was bapt. Ovenden, Halifax, Eng., Apr. 9, 1592, daughter of Henry Best. Names of their children are from the church records of Halifax, Eng.

He probably died in 1638, as his will was proved late in that year. It mentions his oldest son Joseph, dau. Mary, and calls John and Martha infants. His wife had died earlier.

9. CAPTAIN STEPHEN² SKIFF was born in Sandwich, Apr. 14, 1641, son of James¹ and Mary(?) Skiff, and spent all his life there. He married Lydia Snow, who was born in 1640, the

daughter of Anthony¹ and Abigail (Warren) Snow. He was deputy to General Court, 1675-85, and 1696-1706. He was appointed on the Council of War, 1675. In 1680 he was one of a committee of three to buy land of the Indians, "to buy all they can purchase of the rightful proprietors." In 1689 he was authorized to solemnize marriages. A justice, 1690-91, and served on many important committees.

SMITH

12. REV. HENRY¹ SMITH was born in England in 1588. Some authorities say he was son of Robert Smith of London, while others claim he was son of Erasmus Smith (who was born about 1540, at Withcock, died 1616, married about 1576, his second wife Margery (Cecil) Cave, widow of Roger Cave, and daughter of William Cecil, Lord Burleigh, Lord High Treasurer of Queen Elizabeth). Henry Smith studied at Cambridge, Eng., and was persecuted by Laud. He came, in 1630, to Watertown, Mass.; removed to Wethersfield, Conn., and became the first settled pastor of the church there, in 1636. He had bitter quarrels with some of the inhabitants.

He married, first, in England, but we know nothing about that wife. He married, second, Dorothy —, who after his death married, in 1649, John¹ Russell, the father of Rev. John Russell, who succeeded Henry Smith as minister at Wethersfield. They moved to Hadley, Mass., where she died in 1694.

Samuel Smith, son of Rev. Henry¹, in a letter to his son Ichabod, described his father as follows:—

“He was an ordained minister, educated at Cambridge College, Eng. He came to New England by reason of great persecution. He brought from England both men and maid servants. He was 5 ft. 10 in. tall, and spare, active and sinewy, delighted in sports of strength. He helped erect his house and the first church building in Wethersfield, where he preached for several years. He was well featured, fair of skin and had long, curly hair, merry eyes and a sweet smiling mouth, though he could frown when need be.”

An extract from a letter written by this same son, Samuel Smith, Jan. 1, 1699, shows some of their experiences:—

“After ye Red Skins ye grate Terror of our lives at Weathersfield & for many years after we had moved to Hadley to live, was ye wolves. Catamounts were bad eno' & so was ye Beares, but it was ye wolves was ye worst. The noyse of their howlings was eno' to curdle ye bloode of ye stoutest, & I have never seen ye man yt did not shiver at ye Sounde of a Packe of em.”

Henry Smith was appointed by Gov. Winthrop, a member of the General Court of Connecticut, in 1636. He was a soldier in the Pequot War, 1637. He died Aug. 9, 1648. His will of May 8, 1648, mentions his wife, “My son Samuel to have what was intended for my son Peregrine; my second son, Noah; my two married daughters 20s. each, and every one of their children 5s. each; and the rest of my children £20 at 21 years of age.”

James Skiff and William Bassett were two of the five active male members left after severe religious dissensions for thirty years previous.

He was member of Lieut. Thomas Dimmock's Co., Barnstable, 1643; deputy to New Jersey Assembly, 1669, 1671 and 1672; assistant, 1670-71. He married at Barnstable, June 13, 1643, Susannah Hinckley, who was baptized, Nov. 6, 1625, in England, daughter of Samuel¹ and Sarah (Soule) Hinckley. He died, Oct. 2, 1710, ae. 96, at Sandwich.

SOUTHWICK

11. LAWRENCE¹ SETHICK, or SOUTHWICK, was born in England, and married there Cassandra ——. They came together from Lancashire in 1625, but returned to England the same year. He returned to America with his family in 1630, and obtained lands for their trade of pottery and glass-making in Salem. He and his family were admitted members of the Salem church, 1639, and he was a freeman the same year.

In 1659 he and his wife and son Josiah were imprisoned twenty weeks in Boston because they were Quakers. He and his wife, son Josiah and daughter Mary were fined, whipped, imprisoned and finally banished from Massachusetts for being Quakers. His son Daniel and daughter Provided, their fines not being paid, were sentenced by court to be sold into slavery to any English planter in Virginia, or the Barbadoes, but no ship owner would carry them so they were released. Lawrence and his wife, being banished under pain of death, went to Shelter Island where they both died the following spring, 1660, from exposure and

privation, Cassandra surviving her husband only three days. Josiah, who had established a home in Rhode Island, returned to Salem to attend to settling his father's estate, and was flogged for returning. See Whittier's poem "Cassandra Southwick."

The sect of Quakers arose in England about 1650. Laws were passed to prevent Quakers from settling in Massachusetts; fines were laid on those who entertained them or attended their meetings. They were banished from the colony, imprisoned and a few were executed. It was claimed they interrupted public worship; showed disrespect to rulers, were intemperate in language to judges, and insulting to officials.

His will, made at Shelter Island, names his sons John, Daniel, Josiah, daughter Provided, daughter Mary, wife of Henry Trask, and their three daughters.

His connection with his stepfather, Gov. Bradford, gave him much prominence. In 1640, he, and his brother, Thomas, were each granted 50 acres apiece in Duxbury, next to Francis Cooke's. In 1645 he was one of the original proprietors of Bridgewater. He died in Duxbury, Mar. 10, 1679. His widow died in Bristol, 1682. His will, proved Mar. 15, 1679, names wife Elizabeth, sons Edward and Nathaniel and William, daughters Marcy Freeman, Alice Church, Mary Alden, Priscilla, "to my daughter Elizabeth Southworth, if she do not marry William Fobes"; but she evidently married him.

He married about 1633, Agnes Heane. He removed to Hartford, Conn., with his brothers Gerard and Thomas, and Rev. Thos. Hooker, 1639; representative to General Court of Connecticut, 1639-40. He died in Hartford between May 4, 1640, the date of his will, and Mar. 4, 1641, its probate. He gave one-third of his property to his wife, Agnes, and two-thirds to his children Samuel, Sarah, and Elizabeth, "my cozen Matthew Allen and brother John

They worked along twelve miles west, made friends with the Indians and probably wintered there in tents. In the spring of 1629 an engineer, Rev. Mr. Bright, the minister, and others came, laid out a town, built houses, and named it Charlestown. The brothers were "persons of character, substance and enterprise, excellent citizens, generous public benefactors, heads of large and respectable families of descendants."

In 1635, he married in Charlestown, Millisaint Eames, who was born in Dorset, Eng., daughter of Anthony¹ and Margery (Prisse) Eames. She was admitted to the church in Charlestown, 1635. In 1645 he was one of seven selectmen. In 1662, constable and collector. In 1636 he and his father-in-law moved to Hingham. He died at Hingham, Oct. 26, 1675, and his widow died at Hingham, Feb. 8, 1696. His will, dated Oct. 19, 1675, names his wife Millesaint, sons Anthony, John, Samuel, Jonathan and William, Persis Doggett, Joanna Church and Mary King.

STANDISH

10. THOMAS¹ STANDISH was born about 1612, in England. He was probably a son of Myles Standish and his first wife Rose, and was left in England, although Myles' will mentions only four sons, and they were sons of his second wife, but if not a son he must have been a younger brother or a nephew, as authentic tradition says he was of that family, and there was a striking similarity of traits of character, physical likeness, and family names. If a

brother, he was son of Thomas Standish of Duxbury, Eng., who died about 1600. He came from England to Plymouth Colony, and in 1636 was one of the original settlers in Wethersfield, Conn.; a list of his property is given in the first records of the town, in 1640. He was a soldier in the Pequot War, 1637, and had a grant of land on that account; and was keeper of the fort at Wethersfield. He married Susanna Francis, who was born in 1624, the daughter of Robert and Joan Francis; she died, Nov. 30, 1692, aged 68, and he died, Dec. 5, 1693, aged 80. He was a brother-in-law of John¹ Deming, who left legacies to "cousins Unis Standigge and Sarah Wyer."

In the autumn of 1635 he led a pioneer band through the wilderness from Newtown (now Cambridge), Mass., to the Connecticut River. As leader and magistrate he led and directed safely and wisely. They spent the winter clearing the land, building log houses, fighting Indians and wild beasts. In the spring their wives and families, with Mr. Hooker, their minister, came to the new settlement which became Hartford. He was one of eight commissioners appointed by the General Court of Massachusetts to govern Connecticut, Mar. 1636, for one year. His brother George¹ Steele and brother-in-law John¹ Talcott were of the party.

He became an original proprietor of Farmington, 1645. He was elected to the principal colony court for twenty-three years, and was first Colonial Secretary of Connecticut, 1636-9. He was deputy to the court in 1636, which declared war against the Pequots. His wife died Oct. 24, 1653, and he married, second, Nov. 25, 1655, Mary (Ruscoe), widow of Richard¹ Seymour. He died at Farmington, Feb. 27, 1664. His will, dated Jan. 30, 1664, proved June 15, 1665, mentions his wife Mercy (or Mary); Samuel and his wife Mary Boosey; son-in-law William Judd and wife Mary; son-in-law Thomas Judd and wife Sarah; and John, Samuel and Benoni, sons of his son John, deceased. A part of Rowley was set off in 1672, named Bradford, and incorporated in 1675. The part in which he lived was set off from Bradford in 1850, and called Groveland.

His wife died May 11, 1737; he married, second, June 3, 1742, Susanna Johnson, who died July 28, 1776. He died in Bradford, Dec. 29, 1783, and was buried in the old burying ground at Groveland. 10. RICHARD¹ SWAN was born in England about 1606, and married there Ann —, who was mother of his children. He

came to Boston, 1638. He was dismissed from the church in Boston to Rowley, Sept. 24, 1639, where his was one of the sixty families who settled Rowley in Apr. 1639. After they had worked together about five years clearing the land, they divided it and he received two acres. A freeman, 1640; a husbandman; he held office for many years as selectman, constable, marshal, and representative from Rowley to General Court, 1666-73. TENNEY

10. THOMAS¹ TENNEY was born in England, 1614, and married there Ann (Mighill?). They were one of a company of twenty families who because of the religious persecution of King Charles, sailed with their pastor, Rev. Ezekiel Rogers, for America in 1638. They were joined by forty more families in April, 1639, and made a settlement thirty miles from Boston, known as Rogers Plantation, but later called Rowley from their home in England in Yorkshire. The town records name him ensign, marshall, 1653-66; warner of town meetings, 1650, and other years; overseer of plains, 1656, etc.; selectman, 1660, 1661, 1670; viewer of fences, highways, and chimneys, 1669; constable, 1665-6; tithing man, 1680; sergeant and ensign of Rowley Foot Co., 1677. His wife was a sister of Deacon Thomas Mighill of Rowley. She died Sept. 24, 1657, and he married, Feb. 24, 1658, (2) Elizabeth, widow of Francis¹ Parrat, (died about 1656). He spent his last years in Bradford, Mass., where he died Feb. 20, 1700, and is buried in the old cemetery. His grave is marked with a dark slate stone. His brother, Deacon William¹ Tenney, came, 1639, one year later, to Rowley, married about 1642, Katherine —, and died 1685.

DEACON JOHN² TENNEY, born in Rowley, Mass., Dec. 14, 1640, son of Thomas¹ and Ann Tenney, married in Rowley, Feb. 26, 1663, Mercy Parrat, who was born July 23, 1646, daughter of Francis¹ and Elizabeth Parrat. She died Nov. 27, 1667, and he married, second, Dec. 2, 1668, Susanna Woodbury (daughter of Humphrey). She died Apr. 9, 1716. He was moderator of the first town meeting held in Bradford, Feb. 20, 1668. He had bought, in 1664, for £50, 100 acres southeast of the Merrimack River, and four acres of meadow. He was a lieutenant in the Continental Army; a member of the Colonial Assembly when, in 1725, he was one of the thirty who voted against receiving the king's charter. He died Feb. 3, 1748, and was buried at Groveland Cemetery. A slate stone, elaborately decorated, says, "Here lies the body of Elder Samuel Tenney, who died Feb. 3, 1748, in his 81st year."

DEACON SILAS⁶ TENNEY, born in Bradford, Mass., Dec. 4, 1772, son of Thomas⁵ and Hannah (Stickney) Tenney, married Oct. 28, 1795, Rebecca Bailey, who was born May 13, 1773, daughter of William⁵ and Anne (Chase) Bailey. He lived in Bradford (now Groveland), on the farm said to have been occupied by Deacon John² Tenney and his descendants from 1670 to about 1804 when Silas sold it, and removed to Chester, N. H., to the farm which is still occupied by his descendants. He and his wife became members of the Hampstead church, and their children were all baptized there. He died, July 11, 1834, of typhoid fever. His widow died in Chester, Mar. 11, 1873, lacking two months of being 100 years old.

THOMPSON

9. LIEUT. JOHN¹ THOMPSON (TOMSON) was born in North Wales, 1616, and came with his mother to America with Wesson's company in May, 1622. The two ships sailing under Wesson were the third embarkation from England, being next after the *Fortune* in 1621. He married, Dec. 6, 1645, Mary Cooke, who was born in Plymouth, 1626, the daughter of Francis¹ and Hester (Mayhew) Cooke.

He was a farmer, living first at Sandwich and Nobscusset, then moved to the border of Bridgewater and Middleboro, where he bought more than 6,000 acres from the Indians. His farm remained in his family until 1900. With Richard Church he built the first framed meeting house in Plymouth, 1637. He built his log house thirteen miles west of Plymouth and lived there until it was burned by the Indians. He or his wife walked to church every Sunday. Two Sundays, one June, his wife carried a six months' old child and walked to Plymouth to meeting and return the same day. His family had to start for church before daylight, and one morning, hearing wolves, they climbed upon a high rock until daylight, when they could go on.

He was representative, 1674, and for eight years following; sergeant, lieutenant, in King Philip's War, 1675. He died June 16, 1696, and was buried in Middleboro. His widow removed to Abington, and died Mar. 21, 1715. She was buried in Middleborough. He understood the Indians so well, escaped from them, outwitted them and surprised them, that they thought the Great Spirit protected him. His gun (length, including stock and barrel, 7 feet, 4½ inches, weight 20 pounds, 12 ounces), and sword, 3 feet, 5½ inches long, were preserved in Plymouth Hall, Plymouth. His will of Apr. 3, 1696, proved July 8, mentions wife Mary, sons John, Jacob, Thomas and Peter, and six daughters.

The inscription on his gravestone reads:—

He was justice of the peace for several years at Middleboro, and in 1711, was captain of the Middleboro Co. He was appointed administrator of the will of his mother-in-law in 1723. In Oct. 1652, he was one of seven who organized the church there, and his wife was admitted "about one month later." He was deputy to General Court, 1650; constable, 1652. He died Apr. 25, 1655, in Farmington. His will of Apr. 1654, names his wife, his children John, Thomas, Beatrice and Mary. Executors, "my two brothers in England, and my brother Thomas Welles." His widow married (2), July 16, 1656, Anthony Hawkins, by whom she had three children. She died in 1680.

TILLEY

12. JOHN¹ TILLEY came with his wife, whose name is unknown, and his only child in the *Mayflower*, three of the one hundred and one passengers of whom more than half died before the end of March, 1621, from a disease—probably a kind of scurvy. John and his wife were two of that number, leaving the daughter, Elizabeth, alone. Fourteen out of eighteen wives of the Pilgrims died. He was the sixteenth of the forty-one signers of the *Mayflower* compact.

Haxtum says John was the older brother of Edward Tilley, who with his wife Ann came in 1620.

A John Tilley was married in Leyden, Holland, to Bridget Van de Velde, in Feb. 1615. He was probably another John, or it may have been a second marriage of our John.

THRALL

10. WILLIAM¹ THRALL (THRAIL, THRALE, TRAIL, etc.) was born in England about 1606. He came in the *Mary and John*. The *Mary and John* sailed Mar. 20, 1630, from Plymouth, with 140 passengers from Dorset, Somerset and Devon, with Rev. John Warham, who had broken away from the established church. They settled in Dorchester, Mass. In 1636, many of these with some other residents went with Mr. Warham to Connecticut and established the settlement which became Windsor. Among these was William Thrall. He was a freeman and planter of that colony; was granted a tract of land for his services in the Pequot War, in 1637, under Capt. John Mason.

He was about 72 years old when he made his will Dec. 11, 1678, and died in Windsor, Aug. 3, 1679. We know nothing about his wife except the record "old goode Thrall died July 30, 1676."

7. WILLIAM¹ TOLFORD was born about fifteen miles from Londonderry, Ireland, in 1700. He came to New England in company with John Aiken and bought land in Chester, where he lived and died. He married in 1735, Isabelle McMurphy, who was born, probably in Ireland, July 15, 1713, daughter of John¹ and Mary McMurphy; she died Oct. 17, 1748; he married, second, Agnes Aiken, who died Jan. 22, 1785, aged 66, leaving no children. He was a deacon in the church, and an ensign. He died Sept. 25, 1792. His will, made in 1787, mentions his son John, daughters, Elizabeth, wife of William Powel; Mary, wife of David McMurphy, and Robert Forsaith. His brother, Major John Tolford, born July, 1701, in Ireland, died in Chester, N. H., 1790, married, 1734, Jean McMurphy (John¹). 11. ROBERT TOWER was born and lived in Hingham, Norfolk Co., Eng.; he died and was buried there, May 1, 1634. He married, Aug. 31, 1607, Dorothy Damon, who died and was buried in Hingham, Eng., Nov. 10, 1629. They had one son, John.

10. JOHN¹ TOWER was bapt. Hingham, Eng., May 17, 1609, son of Robert and Dorothy Tower. He came with John Ford and Samuel Lincoln—an ancestor of Abraham Lincoln—in 1635, from old Hingham, Eng., to new Hingham, Mass., where he settled in 1637, and was a freeman, 1638. He married in Charlestown, Feb. 13, 1639, Margaret Ibrook, who was born in England, 1617, the daughter of Richard and — (Clark) Ibrook. During King Philip's War he fortified his dwelling at Hingham—later known as Tower's Garrison House. With his four sons and one or two others hired at his own expense he defended it, and the twenty people who had taken refuge in it, throughout the war. When the town had to have any dealings with the Indians they would say, "You go, old John Tower, the Indians all know you and won't hurt you." His wife died at Hingham, May 15, 1700, aged 83, and he died, Feb. 13, 1702, aged 92, leaving 39 grandchildren, and 13 great-grandchildren. It is probable that he could not write as he signed the many deeds and conveyances by his mark.

10. HENRY¹ TRASK was born in England, 1625, and came to Salem, Mass., in the *Mary and John*, 1634. He married, 1650, Mary Southwick, daughter of Lawrence¹ and Cassandra Southwick of Salem. Mary was born 1630, and died 1696. She was beaten ten stripes, in 1659, was fined and then with her father and mother imprisoned ten months for being a Quaker.

Henry died about 1689, and his widow, Mary, married, second, William Nichols (1596-1696). Lawrence¹ Southwick in his will, proved 1660, left a suit of clothing to each of the daughters of Henry Trask—Mary, Anna and Sarah, his granddaughters. Henry Trask in his will, dated 1683, appoints his wife Mary executrix, mentions his son Henry; his daughters Anna and Sarah; and Mary, the daughter of his deceased daughter Mary. He was probably a brother of Capt. William Trask (1589-1666) of Salem.

He came to America and was in Wethersfield, Conn., 1639, where he was one of the wealthiest men, of high social standing and of great influence in the colony of Connecticut. He owned about 900 acres in what is now Glastonbury. He was many times representative to General Court from 1644 to 1658; assistant magistrate of the colony, 1658 to 1665. In 1643 he was a juror, and later a grand juror. He and two of his sons-in-law, John Deming and Matthew Campfield, were three of the nineteen to whom the Connecticut charter was granted by Charles II, Apr. 23, 1662. The royal governor, Andros, tried to recall this charter in 1688 but the colonists refused to deliver it and hid it in the famous Charter Oak tree. In 1663 he was appointed to procure a minister. He was one of those appointed to collect funds for "mayntenaunce of scollers at Cambridge." His will, dated Feb. 13, 1669, names his wife Alice, his daughter Honour Deming, and son-in-law John Deming. He died in Wethersfield, in 1669, probably December; his wife, Alice, survived him.

WADSWORTH

10. CHRISTOPHER¹ WADSWORTH (Xtopher Waddesworth) came from Yorkshire, Eng., in the *Lion*, 1632, to Duxbury, where he lived and died. A freeman, 1633. He was the first constable, in 1634, and again, 1638. Only the most faithful and honest were appointed to this office. He was surveyor; selectman; deputy, 1639. In Capt. Myles Standish's Co., 1643. He married Grace Cole. His will, dated July 31, 1677, was probated Sept. 1678, mentions his wife Grace and his daughter Mary Andrews, widow. His widow's will was dated Jan. 13, 1687, and probated June 13, 1688, between which dates she died. It mentioned sons Joseph and John, and dau. Mary Andrews. The William Wadsworth who came with him in the *Lion* was probably his brother.

WAITE

10. RICHARD¹ WAITE was born in England about 1600. A tailor. He had land grants in Watertown, Mass., 1630. Moved to Boston and was admitted to the church there, 1634. Freeman, 1637. His brother Gamaliel (born about 1598, died 1685, married Grace ———) was a freeman, 1635.

Richard married Elizabeth ———, who was admitted to the church in Boston, 1645, from the church in Newbury, which she joined in

1639. She died about 1651. He married, second, Rebecca Hepbourne, daughter of George¹. He was reprov'd by the church for using buckskin leather for gloves but was soon reinstated. He was one of the petitioners, in 1640, for a town, to be called Braintree. In 1659 he was granted £5 "for his great and diligent pains, riding day and night in summoning those entertaining Quakers to this court." He was a member of the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Co., 1638; sergeant, 1647, and was sent as messenger to the chief sachem of the Narragansett Indians. Being marshal of Massachusetts colony he was appointed "commissary of the horse" against the Narragansett Indians, 1654; commissary in Pequot War, and received 300 acres for his services, 1658. His will, dated Jan. 6, 1679, proved Nov. 9, 1680, mentions wife Rebecca, and children Return, Richard, John, Abigail Jones, and brother Gamaliel. He died, Sept. 17, 1680, ae. 84. His gravestone is standing in Kings Chapel Burying Ground, Boston.

15. THOMAS WARNER of Braintree, Eng., had a son John.

14. JOHN WARNER of Great Waltham, Essex Co., Eng., died 1584. His will of May 23, 1584, named his wife Margaret and nine children:—Thomas, John, Edward, Andrew, Mary(?), Margery, Elizabeth, Margaret and Joan.

13. JOHN WARNER moved to Hatfield, Essex Co., in 1609, and lived there till his death. He married Mary Purchas, of one of the prominent families of Essex. Her father, John Purchas, in his will of 1585, mentioned "my daughter Mary, wife of John Warner, and her two children Thomas and Mary." John Warner was a yeoman, one who lived upon and tilled land which he owned. His will, dated July 16, 1614, mentions his wife Mary, his sons Thomas, Edward, John and Andrew, daughters Elizabeth Warner and Rose, wife of Ezekiel Sandford, and their three sons.

His widow Mary, in her will May 12, 1627, mentioned nineteen grandchildren, among them being two children "of my son Andrew" who was executor.

12. ANDREW¹ WARNER, born in Hatfield, Eng., the son of John and Mary (Purchas) Warner, was probably a minor when his father willed him property in trust, in 1614. He married in England, Mary(?). He came to Cambridge, Mass., 1632, and received in Nov. 1633, "one acker of land in an award of lotts for cow yards"; freeman, 1634; in 1635 was one of the nine townsmen. In 1636 he removed to Hartford, Conn., and was an original proprietor, and in 1639 was chosen deacon of the Hartford church. Andrew Warner and his next neighbor, in 1649, had to pay for "curing the eare of the Indian squaw, which their doggs bit of." Before 1659 his first wife had died, and he had married a second wife, Esther, the daughter of Francis Wakeman, and widow of Thomas Selden.

After the death of Rev. Thomas Hooker, differences arose with his successor, and some of the members of the church, with friends from Wethersfield and Windsor, moved and founded Hadley, Mass., in 1659. Andrew Warner was one of these, and in 1661 was on the committee to build a meeting house, and later to found a grammar school, and provide a ferry boat. He was on many important committees and on the jury. In 1663 he bought "a pair of cristall spectacles for 12d." In 1658 he was a private in Major John Mason's Company, and in 1663 was in the Hampshire Troop. His will, dated June 18, 1681, was proved Mar. 31, 1685. He died at Hadley, Dec. 18, 1684, aged almost 90. His widow died in 1693. His name is on the monument to the Founders of Hartford.

WARREN

10. MR. RICHARD¹ WARREN was born in England. No authentic ancestors have been found. He was not of the Leyden company, but joined the Pilgrims from London, and sailed in the *Mayflower*, Sept. 6, 1620. He was the twelfth of the nineteen signers of the compact framed in the cabin of the *Mayflower* in Cape Cod harbor.

On Dec. 6, 1620, in an attempt to find a better water supply and harbor he was one of ten men who set off for what they called their "third discovery," and had their "first encounter" with the Indians, who shot a number of arrows but no one was hurt. The landing at Plymouth was made three days later. He married in England, Elizabeth —, who was born about 1583. She came in 1623 in the *Ann* from London, with their five daughters.

The third expedition to New Plymouth sailed from London, Oct. 1622, with 109 persons, in the *Paragon*. After fourteen days she had to return to London for repairs because of storms. She sailed again Dec. 22, but met such "extreme tempestuous weather" that in February when half way across she became dismantled and was driven back to Portsmouth, a shattered wreck. The *Ann* of 140 tons burden brought the 60 people of the final party and 60 tons of goods. It arrived in Plymouth late in July, 1623.

Richard Warren was a man of integrity, justice, uprightness and piety, who bore during the short time he lived a deep share in the difficulties and troubles of the Plantation. He died in Plymouth in 1628. His widow died, Oct. 2, 1673, aged above 90. "Having lived a godly life she came to her grave as a shoke of corn ripe." In the list of her property were "seven horses." She had occupied an important social position, and was usually referred to as Mistress Elizabeth Warren. Hers is one of the rare instances in an early colony of continued widowhood.

on the ship coming to America, fell overboard. John Watson saved her and later married her.

He was surveyor of highways in Hartford, 1647. In 1645, "The eare marke for Jo Wattson: a little slitt of the side of the neare eare & both the topps cutt of both eares." He died in Hartford in 1650, between Mar. 26, the date of his will, and June 4, its probate. He left his property to his wife, naming portions to be given his son John when of age, and five pounds each to his daughters Sara and Mary, at eighteen years old. His widow died Mar. 1683. The will of Margarett Wattson, made Mar. 26, and probated May 31, 1683, mentions her daughters Sarrah Merrals and Mary Seamor; and granddaughters Mary and Margaret Seamor; and the new wife of her son John Watson.

He married in England, Mary Shatswell or Shotwell. She had two brothers who came to Massachusetts:—Theophilus Shatwell, b. 1614, d. 1663, came with wife Susanna ———, to Haverhill, and Deacon John Shatwell, b. in England, d. 1647, m. Joanna ———, was in

Ipswich, 1633. In his will of Feb. 1646, he gives "sister Webster seven yards of stuff to make a sute." John Webster died in 1646, and his widow administered his estate in Sept. 1646. After his death the family moved to Newbury, where widow Mary married, second, Oct. 29, 1650, John¹ Emery, his second wife, and died Apr. 28, 1694. The name Webster came from one working in cloth on a loom.

John Tomes, in his will dated May 21, 1602, proved Nov. 3, mentions his wife Agnes, and his sister Alice Kecke. He had daughters Ann, Joan and Alice, and, by a former wife, a son John.

Thomas Welles brought his wife and six children to Cambridge, Mass., where he owned a house in 1635. In Mar. 1636, he was one of eight who were appointed to govern the new plantations on the Connecticut River for one year, and he moved to Hartford, where he was an original proprietor, and at once became one of the prominent men of the colony. He was an original proprietor of Tunxis—which in 1645 became Farmington—but did not live there, and later gave his land there to his daughter Anne Thompson and his son John.

He served as magistrate, 1637 to his death, and as a magistrate was frequently appointed by the General Court on committees of importance. He was second treasurer of the colony, serving from 1639 to 1651, and was secretary of the colony, 1640 to 1648.

The Pequot War of 1637 showed the need of the union of the colonies for protection, and in 1643 the colonies of Massachusetts Bay, Plymouth, Connecticut and New Haven became the "United Colonies of New England." He was commissioner for the United Colonies, 1644-5; deputy governor of Connecticut, 1654, 1656-57 and 1659; was chosen the second governor, 1655-58.

His wife died at Wethersfield about 1640, and before Oct. 1646, he had married his second wife, Elizabeth (Deming) Foote, sister of John¹ Deming, and widow of Nathaniel Foote (who died, 1644, in Wethersfield). He bought land in Wethersfield and resided there the rest of his life. Wethersfield was made a township in

1636; was added to by purchase of land from the Indians in 1672. In 1685 a patent for all the territory was granted to John Deming, Sr., Robert Welles and Richard Smith.

He died in Wethersfield, Jan. 14, 1660. His widow died, July 28, 1683, aged about 88 years. His will was dated Nov. 7, 1659, and proved Apr. 11, 1660, mentioning his wife; Robert and Thomas, sons of his son John, dec'd; the children of his daughter Mary; and his daughters Anne and Sarah.

11. LIEUT. JOHN¹ WHEELER, son of Dominick and Mercy Wheeler was born in Salisbury, Eng., about 1590. In St. Edmunds in Salisbury, Wiltshire Parish Register, is recorded John Wheyler and Agnes Yeoman were married Dec. 1, 1611. The names Agnes, Annis and Ann were used for the same person. He brought his wife and six children in the *Mary and John* in 1634, leaving four children in England. He was in Aggawam—now Ipswich—for about a year; he went to Hampton, N. H., soon after that town was settled; he received land in Salisbury, Mass., in 1641; he removed to Newbury before 1650, but was still taxed

in Salisbury in 1652. A barber. His will was dated Mar. 28, 1668; he was then of Newbury, and died there Aug. 29, 1670, aged 80. His will was probated Oct. 11, 1670. His wife had died in Newbury Aug. 15, 1662. He mentioned in his will his daughter Anne Chase, and sons Edward and Adam of Salisbury, Eng.

WHIPPLE

10. CAPTAIN JOHN¹ WHIPPLE was born in England, 1616, and came to Dorchester, Mass., where he received a grant of land in 1637. He married, in 1639, in Dorchester, Sarah —, who was born, 1624. He and his wife were received in the Dorchester church, 1641. Six sons and two daughters were born in Dorches-

ter. In 1658 he removed to Providence, R. I., and two sons and one daughter were born there. He was town clerk, 1670, and for several years; town treasurer, 1668-1683; deputy to Rhode Island General Assembly, 1666-1677. In 1674 he received a license to keep a public house, and an inn license was granted, 1680, and he became one of the three most conspicuous inn holders of the century. Whipple Inn was a favorite place of meeting for the town council. In 1690 the October session of the Rhode Island General Assembly met there. He took the oath of allegiance to Charles II, 1666; served in King Philip's War, 1675; was one of the defenders of Providence when it was attacked by the Indians. A "house carpenter." His wife died, 1666, and he died May 16, 1685. They were at first buried in a lot near their home, but were later removed to the North Burying Place, Providence. He mentioned in his will all his eleven children; his will, dated May 8, 1682, was probated May 27, 1685. He was one "who staid and went not away," in 1676, so he had a share in the Indian captives whose services were sold for a term of years.

She died Apr. 2, 1677, and he married, second, in Hingham, Nov. 11, 1677, widow Hannah (Tower) Cowell, who was baptized in Hingham, July 17, 1652, the daughter of John¹ and Margaret (Ibrook) Tower. She had had one child by her first husband, Joseph, b. Dec. 29, 1673. They lived in Providence, R. 10. NATHANIEL¹ WHITING was born in England about 1617. His mother was Sarah, the daughter of John Smith of County Middlesex, Eng. Nathaniel and his brother Samuel are mentioned in the will of their grandfather John Smith.

Nathaniel came from Lincolnshire, Eng., in 1638, to Lynn, Mass., where he received a grant of land. He moved to Dedham in 1640, and was a proprietor there; a freeman, May, 1642; he was admitted to the Dedham church, and resided there until his death. He married in Dedham, Nov. 4, 1643, Hannah Dwight, who was born in England, 1625, the daughter of John¹ and Hannah Dwight. He and his son-in-law, James Draper, erected a fulling mill which remained in the Whiting family until it was sold in 1823. He was the first to operate a corn mill in Dedham. It was on "Mother brook"; "Nathaniel Aldus and John Dwite" were joint owners of the mill. He died Jan. 15, 1683, and his widow died Nov. 4, 1714, ae. 89. His estate was inventoried at £489. His wife Hannah was executrix of his will, dated May 15, 1677, and proved Apr. 19, 1683.
