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
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INTRODUCTORY NOTE

This, the second and concluding part of this work, contains the description and illustrations of the counterfeits of Roman, medieval and later coins and medals produced by Becker, and of his few original pieces, such as the medals of Prince Carl von Isenburg and of Paul Anton von Handel.

As in the first part, I have endeavoured to quote specimens of the kind which may have served as models for his graver. But it must be confessed that this has been much more difficult, especially with the medieval and later coins; for Becker allowed himself a much freer hand than with the Greek, and introduced much more confusion by combinations of types for which there is no warrant.

Towards the end of the series, also, it will be observed that the evidence of extant dies begins to fail. The diaries show that Becker made a number of pieces, especially in the Siebenbürgen series, of which the dies, having been passed on to friends, such as Fejervary and Appel, have not found a home at Berlin. It seems probable that two pairs, those for the two coins of Michael, Vaivode of Wallachia, have come to rest in the British Museum. But for the identification of the other counterfeits we can only depend on inference. I have endeavoured to limit the illustrations to those pieces for the attribution of which to Becker the evidence seems reasonably strong; but it should be understood that I do not insist on ascribing to him any pieces for which the dies do not furnish irrefragable proof.

As to these dies, I quote the observations of Dr. Regling, made in answer to an enquiry concerning the dies for no. 340, of which I submitted a photograph for his examination. It should be premised that this pair of dies seems, so far as Dr. Alexander Scott, Director of Scientific Research at the British Museum, could ascertain by simple testing with nitric acid, to be homogeneous throughout; as no trace of carbon was revealed by this test, it may be assumed that they are not of steel but of iron, not even case-hardened. Dr. Regling says:

" The Michael dies certainly look just like the Becker dies, which similarly often consist of a block with a raised central portion as lower-die and a bar or cylinder of round or angular section as upper-die. But that is not saying much; for many of the ancient dies that we have are similar (e. g. the Celtic lower-die and the Sasanian upper-die); similar too are some of the dies used for striking by hand down to the eighteenth and early nineteenth century (see e. g. the Catalogue of the Vienna Collection of Dies, I, Pl. 1, 1-3, 11 4, V 1, VII 23). Our upper Becker dies are nearly all very much damaged by hammerblows at the upper end; your Michael die can have been very little used ". (These dies, if they are Becker's, were not kept by him, but sent to Fejervary, who may not have made much use of them). " As for the material : our Becker dies seem to me to consist of a single piece, not of steel 'embedded' in iron " - the reference is to Part I, p. 45, the authority for which is a statement of Quilling's. - " As to whether they are of iron or steel — to me they seem to be all of iron — I will consult an expert." Later he adds "In the opinion of our mechanic, blocks of steel have been welded on to a base of iron; the trace of the welding cannot be seen, nor can an exact borderline, where the steel begins and the iron ends, be determined by mere testing of the hardness with a file."

In the preparation of this second part, I have once more to express my indebtedness to Dr. Regling; also to Drs. von Loehr, Münsterberg and Dworschak of Vienna; to Dr. Pál Harsányi of Budapest; to Dr. Adolf Resch of Kronstadt (Rumania); and, in this country, to Mr. L. A. Lawrence and to my colleagues on the staff of the Department of Coins and Medals.

Much still remains to be cleared up with regard to Becker and his productions; but I am happy to think that my attempt to state the evidence, such as it is, with impartiality, has been received with an approving interest by those most competent to form an opinion, and that collectors will be less liable in future to be deceived by "this mischievous but incomparable genius".

The illustration of 149a is from a tin-foil impression (made by Friedländer in 1857 from a specimen in the possession of one Binge), kindly lent by Dr. Regling.

169. (P. 167). Plotina. For obv. cp. Cohen, II, p. 98, no. 1 (Plotine et Trajan, N); p. 99, no. 1 (Plotine et Matidie, N), etc. Bach., Pl. 5 no. 1159. Obv. same die as no. 171. *Rev.* same die as no. 168. This combination, as shown in the lead impressions, is unwarranted; but see note on no. 170.

170. (P. 169). Plotina and Matidia, Obv. same die as no. 168. Rev. cp. Cohen, II, p. 99, no. 1 (A). Rev. same die as obv. of no. 173. This combination, as shown in the lead impressions, is unwarranted. The obv. combined with this rev. should be that of no. 169. and Becker actually struck specimens so (e. g. a denarius in Mr. L. A. Lawrence's collection).

171. (P. 171) Plotina and Matidia. *Obv.* same die as no. 169. *Rev.* cp. Cohen, II, p. 102, nos. 8 ff. (N, \mathbb{R}) ; Bach., Pl. 5, no. 1162 (N). This combination, as shown in the lead impressions, is unwarranted.

172. (P. 170) Marciana. Cp. Cohen, II, p. 100, nos 3 (A), 4 (A); Bach., Pl. 19, no. 1160 (A); Mont. Sale lot 271 (N).

173. (P. 172) Matidia. Obv. cp. Cohen, II, p. 99, no. 1 (Plotine et Matidie, N); Rev. cp. Cohen, II, p. 102, nos. 9 (N), 10 (\mathbb{R}); Mont. Sale lot 272 (N); Bach., Pl. 5, no. 1162 (N). This combination is unwarranted.

174. (P. 173) Hadrian. Cp. Cohen, II, p. 151, no. 540. Mont. Sale lot 283 (A').

175. (P. 174) Commodus. Cp. Cohen, III, p. 306, no. 567 (N).

176. (P. 175) Crispina. Cp. Cohen, III, p. 385, no. 39. Mont. Sale lot 454 (A).

177. (P.176) Pertinax. Cp. Cohen, III, p. 394, no. 39. Mont. Sale lot 457(N). Cohen wrongly describes the bust as draped.

178. (P. 177) Didius Julianus. Cp. Cohen, III, p. 399, no. 9 (A). The coin usually has the undraped bust (e. g. Mont. Sale lot 462). Possibly the Belley de Tavernost specimen described by Cohen was a Becker.

179. (P. 178) Didius Julianus. Cp. Cohen, III, p. 400, no. 14 (A).

180-182. (P. 179-181) Manlia Scantilla. Cp. Cohen, III, pp. 401-2, nos. 1, 2 N, \mathcal{R}); Mont. Sale lot 463 (N); Bach., Pl. 19, no. 1569 (\mathcal{R}). The three pairs of dies are thus distinguished:

180. (P. 179) Obv. One hair showing on neck, no stop before AVG. Rev. Head of sceptre between E and G, no stop after IVNO.

181. (P. 180) Obv. Three hairs on neck, stop before AVG. Rev. Head of sceptre between R and E, no stop after IVNO.

182. (P. 181) Obv. Four hairs on neck, no stop before AVG. Rev. Head of sceptre between E and G, stop after IVNO.

183. (P. 182) Didia Clara. Cp. Cohen, III, p. 403, no. 2 (N), 3 (R); Mont. Sale lot 464 (N).

184. (P. 183) Pescennius Niger. Cp. Cohen, III, p. 406, no. 15 (N). The only authority for the existence of a genuine coin of this type is the *Ancien Catalogue* of the French Cabinet.

186. (P. 185) Pescennius Niger. For *rev.* cp. Cohen, III, p. 411, no. 63. No genuine coin with exactly this inscription IMP.CAES.C.PESCEN.NIGER. IVSTI.AV. seems to be known, but IVST.AVG. (Cohen 38), IVST.AV. (Cohen 42, 51) and others nearly similar are found.

187. (P. 186) Septimius Severus. Cp. Cohen, IV, p. 48, no. 458. For obv. cp. Mont. Sale no. 478 (N). Cohen misdescribes Becker's *rev*. It is evidently copied from a *rev*. on which the shield rests on a cippus, which Becker did not understand; the Schellersheim specimen cited by Cohen may have been like this, and possibly itself a forgery.

188. (P. 187) Plautilla. Cp. Cohen, IV, p. 247, nos. 9 (N), 10 (R); Bach., Pl. 10, no. 1743 (N).

189. (P. 188) Macrinus. Cp. Cohen, IV, p. 301, no. 13 (A), 14 (A). Vautier and Collignon Sale lot 1286 (A).

190. (P. 189) Diadumenianus. Cp. Cohen, IV. p. 311, no. 1 (M.OPEL. DIADVMENIANVS CAES.).

191. (P. 190) Diadumenianus. Cp. Cohen, IV, p. 312, no. 2 (A), 3 (A). Vautier and Collignon Sale no. 1296 (A). Obv. die different from no. 190 (nose straight, C of CAES reaches slightly below the line, fold of mantle points to left hasta of first M).

Of these two obverses, no. 190 was probably copied from an original of which the *rev*. was PRINC.IVVENTVTIS, *e. g.* Mont. Sale lot 538 (A); *Num. Chron.*, 1902, P. XIX, no. 2 (A); Bach., Pl. 19, no. 1797 (AR). See Cohen's note on his no. 2.

192. (P. 191) Elagabalus-Julia Paula. For obv. cp. Cohen, IV, p. 323, no. 2 (**R**), p. 324, no: 13 (**R**), etc. Obv. Same die as no. 193. For *rev.* Cohen, IV, p. 377, no. 4 (*N*); Bach., Pl. 19, no. 1837 (**R**). *Rev.* same die as obv. of no. 194. This combination is not warranted.

193. (P 193) Elagabalus-Julia Maesa. Cp. Cohen, IV, p. 375, no. 1 (*R*, but IMP.ANTONINVS PIVS AVG.); this coin has been doubted. *Obv.* same die as no. 192. *Rev.* same die as *obv.* of no. 195. For *rev.* cp. *obv.* of Cohen, IV, p. 394, no. 29; Bach., Pl. 19, no. 1851 (*R*).

194. (P. 192) Julia Paula. Obv. same die as rev. of no. 192. Rev. same die as rev. of no. 195. This combination is not warranted, no Vesta type being known for Paula.

195. (P. 194) Julia Maesa. Obv. same die as rev. of no. 193. Rev. same die as rev. of 194. No seated Vesta type is recorded for Maesa. This was perhaps copied from a coin of Domna (Cohen, IV, p. 124, no. 226).

196. (P. 195) Severus Alexander-Orbiana. Obv. cp. Cohen, IV, p. 405, no. 30 (*R* quinarius). *Rev.* cp. Cohen, IV, p. 486, no. 2. The combination is not warranted.

197. (P. 196) Julia Mamaea. Cp. Cohen, IV, p. 492, no. 17 (A); 18 (N); Bach., Pl. 19, no. 1895 (A).

198. (P. 197) Maximus. Cp. Cohen, IV, p. 524, no. 1 (*A*); Vautier and Collignon Sale, lot 1430 (*A*).

199. (P. 198) Balbinus. Cp. Cohen, V, p. 11, no. 23 (*A*). Vautier and Collignon Sale lot 1454 (*A*). Rev. same die as no. 200.

200. (P. 199) Balbinus. Similar to no. 199, *rev.* die same, *obv.* different (more space between IMP and C, more mantle showing behind neck, last letters of inscr. larger).

201. (P. 200) Pupienus. Cp. Cohen, V, p. 18, no. 37 (A, with IMP.CAES. etc.). For silver, cp. Bach., Pl. 20, no. 1949.

202. (P. 201) Gordian III and Tranquillina. For *obv.* cp. Bach., Pl. 21, no. 1964 (.R); for *rev., ibid.*, Pl. 20, no. 1980 (**R**). This combination is not warranted.

203. (P. 202) Tranquillina (bust on crescent). Cp. Cohen, V, p. 88, no. 1 (**A**). For *rev.*, Bach., Pl. 20, no. 1980.

204. (P. 203) Pacatianus. Obv. same die as no. 206. Cp. Cohen, V, p. 182, no. 6 (*R*); E. F. Weber Sale lot 2193, Pl. xxxv (*R*).

The dies for this coin were made in 1827. Becker was working at them on 22 and 24 May, Zindel on 18 and 22 Aug., on which last day he finished the *rev*. A specimen was sent to Danz on 20 Sept. The other two coins of this Emperor were made earlier and appear in Becker's printed list.

205. (P. 204) Pacatianus. For obv. cp. Cohen, V, p. 181, no. 2 (*R*), etc. There is no authority for this reverse under this Emperor. It was doubtless copied from some other, such as Cohen, IV, p. 513-4, nos. 74-5 (Maximinus).

206. (P. 205) Pacatianus. Obv. same die as no. 204. There is no authority for this *rev*. under this Emperor ; for a possible original cp. Cohen, VI, p. 551, no. 554 (Maximianus).

207. (P. 206) Herennia Etruscilla. Cp. Cohen, V, p. 210, no. 18 (A'); Mont. Sale lot 595; Bach., Pl. 11, no. 2055.

208. (P. 207) Herennius Etruscus. Cp. Cohen, V, p. 217, no. 10 (A; the Wiczay specimen).

209. (P. 208) Hostilianus. Cp. Cohen, V, p. 228, no. 33; Mont. Sale lot 599 (N).

210. (P. 209) Hostilianus. Cp. Cohen, V, p. 229, no. 37 (N, the Wiczay specimen); E. F. Weber Sale lot 2227, Pl. XXXVI (N, but VALES). The *obv*. inscr. is in smaller letters than on no. 209; the M broken up into four nearly parallel strokes. *Rev.* same die as no. 254 of Numerianus.

211. (P. 210) Trebonianus Gallus. Cp. Cohen, V, p. 248, no. 92 (N); Mont. Sale lot 600. The aureus in Bourgey's Sale, Paris 16 XII, 1913, lot 532, seems to be from Becker's dies.

212. (P. 211) Trebonianus Gallus. Cp. Cohen, V, p. 251, no. 113 (N), 114 (R).

213. (P. 212) Trebonianus Gallus. Cp. Cohen, V, p. 253, no. 131 (R).

214. (P. 213) Volusianus. For obv. cp. Mont. Sale lot 604 (A); for rev. Cohen, V, p. 266, no. 1 (**R**).

215. (P. 214) Aemilianus. Cp. Cohen, V, p. 288, no. 4 (A). The G at the end of obv. inscr. has a curved tail.

216. (P. 215) Aemilianus. Cp. Cohen, V, p. 292, no. 53 (\mathcal{R}), 54 (\mathcal{N}). The *obv*. has the head placed more in the middle of the circle of the inscr. than no. 215, and the G is the of usual shape.

217. (P. 216) Cornelia Supera. For rev. cp. Cohen, V, p. 295, no. 2 (**R**). Becker has turned the first C into a G with a curved tail.

218. (P. 217) Cornelia Supera. Cp. Cohen, V, p. 296, no. 5 (*R*); Bach., Pl. 21, no. 2103; E. F. Weber Sale lot 2260, Pl. XXXVII (*R*).

219. (P. 218) Valerianus Sen. For obv. cp. Mont. Sale lots 609ff. (A); rev. cp. Cohen, V, p. 310, no. 140 (Æ, ORIENS AVGG.). Same rev. die as no. 229 (Postumus).

220. (P. 219) Mariniana. Cp. Cohen, V, p. 341, no. 1 (A). This was copied from an aureus in the Wiczay collection (note in the diary, 14 Dec. 1828). On 11 Aug. 1828 Becker gave Zindel two pairs of dies (*i.e.* evidently dies partially executed or perhaps not even begun) and impressions for the "Mariniana and Tetricus of Wiczay in gold." On 20 July 1829 he notes that Zindel brought him the dies of the gold "Marciana" — evidently a slip for "Mariniana", since the Marciana, no. 172, was already in existence, having appeared in the printed list.

221. (P. 220) Gallienus. For obv. cp. Cohen, V, p. 375, no. 310 (\pounds), rev., p. 449, no. 1107 (\pounds). Same rev. die as no. 233 (Postumus). Cohen (note on no. 1107) says that Becker made dies for a coin with this rev. and obv. IMP.C.P.LIC. GALLIENVS AVG., bust r. laureate, cuirassed and draped. He does not note the present obverse, and is probably in error.

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222. (P. 221) Saloninus Caesar. For rev. cp. Cohen, V, p. 522, no. 42 (N).

223. (P. 222) Postumus. Cp. Cohen, VI, p. 15, no. 5 (bust 1.). For obv., Mont. Sale no. 657 (N); rev. Mont. Sale lot 654 (N).

224. (P. 223) Postumus medallion. Cp. Cohen, VI, p. 20, no. 44; Gnecchi *Med. Rom.*, I, p. 8, no. I(A). The only authority for the existence of a genuine medallion like this is the *Ancien Catalogue* of the Paris Cabinet.

225. (P. 224) Postumus medallion. The *obv*. does not seem to be warranted by any original of this size; it is probably enlarged by Becker from an ordinary aureus (cp. Cohen, VI, p. 19, no. 43). Cohen (VI, p. 20) gives the inscription as *Postumus Pius Felix Aug.*, on what authority I do not know.

226. (P. 225) Postumus medallion. Obv. same dies as no. 224. Rev. same die as no. 225. Cohen (*ibid.*) has the same divergency in the obv. inscription here as in no. 225.

227. (P. 226) Postumus. Cp. Cohen, VI, p. 31, no. 145 (N). For. obv. cp. Mont. Sale lots 650-652; Bach., Pl. 11, no. 2170.

228. (P. 227) Postumus. For obv. cp. rev. of Cohen, VI, p. 46, no. 289 (N). For rev., *ibid.*, p. 31-2, nos. 145-6. Cohen seems to be wrong in saying that there is a die by Becker for the obv. of his no. 146.

229. (P. 228) Postumus. *Rev.* same die as no. 219. There seems to be no original for this coin. The inscr. *Postumus Pius Felix Aug.* regularly accompanies the jugate heads of Postumus and Hercules, not the head of the Emperor alone.

236. (P. 235) Marius. Same obv. die as no. 238. Cp. Cohen, VI, p. 88, no. 4 (Æ). The original gold coins with this *rev.* (*e. g.* Cohen, VI, p. 87, no. 3; Mont. Sale lot 670) read IMP. C.M.AVR.MARIVS P.F.AVG.

237. (P. 236) Marius. Cp. Cohen, VI, p. 88, no. 11 (A). For obv. cp. Mont. Sale no. 670. Same rev. die as no. 238.

238 (P.—) Marius. Cp. Cohen, VI, p. 88, no. 13 (Æ). Same *obv.* die as no. 236, same *rev.* die as no. 237. Not issued in the lead impressions ; a silver specimen in Mr. L. A. Lawrence's possession.

239. (P. 237) Tetricus Sen. Cp. Cohen, VI, p. 101, no. 90; Bach., Pl. 11, no. 2185 (N).

240. (P. 238) Tetricus Sen. Cp. Cohen, VI, p. 105, no. 126 (N). Obv. same die as no. 244.

241. (P. 239) Tetricus Sen. Obv. has two small dots at the end of the ties of the diadem; the P of IMP leans to r. Rev. the leaves of the laurel-wreath extend beyond the contour of the Emperor's head.

(P. —) Mathias Corvinus, King of Hungary, 1489. On 6 June 1829 Fejervary asked Becker to get to work as soon as possible on the "Hungarian medal with the raven" of which he had given him an impression. The price of the die was agreed at 30 florins Conv. money. On 26 July Becker gave Bertold the die of the "Matthias Corvinus" to turn. On 11 Aug. he began the "two-ducat piece of M. Corvinus"; on 29 Aug. he finished the "Matthias Corvinus ducat of 1498" (a slip for 1489, either on Becker's part or in my note). He worked at it again on 1 Sept. 1829. A proof struck on 2 Sept. was unsatisfactory; a new "double ducat" struck on 4 Sept. was passable. On 29 Mar. 1830 a letter came from Fejervary asking for the dies to be sent to him, and the packet was sent on 4 Apr. 1830. These dies have disappeared. The gold specimen here illustrated (British Museum) has long been regarded as false. At Vienna is one in copper, from the Neumann collection acquired in 1875; this too has always been suspect. Rupp, Numi Hungariae, no. 1619 is an illustration either of Becker's work or of his model.

327. (P. p. Ix, no. 1) Livonia. Caspar von der Linden and Walther von Plettenberg, 1516. Cp. Madai, *Thalercabinet*, I, p. 293 no. 934. The Beckerian origin of this is too uncertain to justify its inclusion here.

328. (P. p. IX, no. 2) Münster, Jan van Leyden, king of the Anabaptists. 1534. Mentioned by Steinbüchel (p. 5, no. 10) as Becker's work, but not further described. It was doubtless one of the "Anabaptist thalers" (cp. Brause, *Feld-Noth- und Belagerungsmünzen*, I, Pl. 20). There is a forgery at Berlin, which Dr. Regling informs me may well be by Becker. But as there is no further evidence than that of style, I have thought it better not to include it here.

329, 330. (P —) Elizabeth of Hungary. Becker made one, perhaps two, coins of "Isabella Queen of Hungary", by whom he probably means, according to Dr. von Loehr, Elizabeth, wife of John I Zapolya (1538-40) and wife and guardian of John II Sigismund until 1571. Dr. von Loehr suggests that the 10 ducat-piece of 1557 (Resch, *Siebenbürgische Munzen*, p. 8, no. 26), hitherto regarded as genuine, may be Becker's work. There is also an Elizabeth Bocskai (Resch, p 26), whose coins seem to be somewhat suspect. Becker began the dies of what he calls the "small Isabella" on 5 Dec. 1825; he finished the *obv.* on 25 Dec. and the reverse on 29 Dec. The dies were packed for sending to Fejervary on 30 Dec. 1825, and then described as dies for a $2 \frac{1}{2}$ ducat coin. Yet more than a year later (5 Jan. 1827) Becker says that he has sold the dies of the small Michael (see no. 340) and the Isabella to Fejervary for f. 60 C.M.,

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and will send them to him when the mistake in the reverse is altered. (It is not clear whether the mistake was in the Isabella or the Michael; but see below, note on no. 340). It would seem then that Fejervary sent them back for correction. Since Becker speaks of this as the "small Isabella", it may be inferred that he had made a larger one (perhaps the 10 ducat-piece mentioned above) in the period before the diary begins; and if the dies were made for Fejervary, that would explain why no such coin appears in Becker's printed list. I have therefore, with some hesitation, included the 10 ducat piece already mentioned (cp. Resch, Pl. 2, no. 26, and see Pl. 84, no. 2) and the smaller piece (Pl. 84, 5), the former from a gold specimen at Vienna, the latter from a gold specimen in the British Museum. Herr Resch kindly informs me that he now considers both the conis of Isabella, Pl. 84, nos. 2 and 3 of his work, to be Becker's manufacture, as also the coin of Elizabeth Bocskai, Pl. 84, no. 5. The dies have disappeared.

331. (P. 322) Livonia, 1559. Gotthard von Kettler. Cp. Brause, Feld-Noth- und Belagerungsmünzen (1897), I, Pl. 16, nos. 5, 6 (A).

332. (P. 323) Middelburg, 1572. Cp. Brause, II, Pl. 24, nos. $iff(\mathcal{R})$. Becker has omitted the shield with the castle.

333. (P. 324) Breda, 1577. Cp. Brause, II, Pl. 16, no. 4 (A).

334. (P.—) Siebenbürgen. Elizabeth Bocskai, 1577. Cp. Resch, Siebenbürgische Münzen, p. 22, no. 1, Pl. 6, no. 1 and see also Pl. 84, no. 5. I have not included either of these since there is really no objective evidence that Becker made them. See above on no. 330.

335. (P. 325) Campen, 1578. Cp. Brause, II, Pl. 17, no. 3 (A).

336. (P. 326) Siebenbürgen. Christoph Bathory, 1580. Cp. Brause, I, Pl. 38, nos. 2, 3 (\mathcal{R}); the latter looks suspiciously like Becker; so too Mailliet, *Monn. Obs.*, Atlas, Pl. CXIII, no. 2. The diary is not always clear as between Christoph and Andreas Bathory. On 7 Mar. 1825 Becker began the Klippe of "Christoph Bathory". On 7 Aug. he continued work on "Bathory"; on 8 Aug. he finished the *obv.*, on 9 Aug. the *rev.* of "Bathory". On 26 Sept. he made for Fejervary 3 double ducats, 3 single ducats and 3 Klippen in silver of "Andreas Bathory", for f. 20, f. 10 and f. 6 C. M. respectively. For Andreas, see no. 338. Herr Resch informs me that in his opinion both the coins of Christoph Bathory (Pl. 84, no. 4 as well as Pl. 6, no. 28 of his book) are Becker's work. There is however no evidence that Becker made more than one coin of Christoph Bathory, that of which the die is preserved (as Resch, Pl. 6, no. 28). This is presumably the Klippe begun in March 1825, and not mentioned again in the diary. It appears in the printed list. The references in August 1825 are evidently to the Andreas Bathory dies, which have disappeared. I therefore include only the one "Feldthaler" of Christoph Bathory in Becker's work. Incidentally I may observe that the non-appearance of the Andreas Bathory in the printed list does not necessarily prove that that list was printed before the dies for it were completed, since it is probable that they were intended for Fejervary's use.

339. (P. ---) Michael, Vaivode of Wallachia (larger piece). On 19 Oct. 1825, Feiervary ordered the dies of the large medal of "Michael Vaivode" for 20 ducats. The drawing of the obverse was made on 5 Dec. 1825, the cutting begun next day; it was finished on 14 Dec. The reverse was drawn on 15 and 16 Dec., and finished on the 19th. From these dies Becker produced for Fejervary a ten-ducat Klippe, as well as round gold pieces of ten ducats and five ducats, and two "Guldenthaler". They were packed to go to Fejervary on 30 Dec. with the dies; as remarked above (on no. 329), if the dies went, they came back again for correction. Finally on 18 Jan. 1828 Becker records sending the Michael dies to Fejervary : whether those of the larger or of the smaller piece, is not clear. The gold Klippe of ten ducats in the British Museum (Num. Chr., 1876, Pl. VII, no. 2; Resch, p. 221, no. 24) has generally been accepted as genuine; I must confess that it looks very doubtful, and certainly seems to me to be by the same hand as no. 340. It is from different dies on both sides from the round piece illustrated as a forgery by Resch, Pl. 85, no. 7, and from that which he catalogues as genuine on Pl. 65, no. 25. The dies for it were presented to the British Museum in 1904 by Mr. Thomas Bliss; the pedigree was given as "Pearson-Eastwood-Pulski," and they were described as "Becker's dies."

340. (P. —) Michael, Vaivode of Wallachia (smaller piece). Becker first mentions working on this on 21 Nov. 1825; he finished the *obv*. on 27 Nov. and the *rev*. on 1 Dec. From it he produced a $2^{1/2}$ ducat piece for Fejervary,

which was ready on 30 Dec. On 5 Jan. 1827 he had dies for this coin in his possession (see above, no. 329); either these, or those of the larger piece, were however despatched on 18 Jan. 1828.

In 1875 (*Proc. Num. Soc.*, Oct. 19, 1876, p. 3) G. H. Vize exhibited at the Numismatic Society a pair of dies for striking the piece illustrated here. These were sold at Glendining's Auction on 2 Mar. 1925 (lot 58) and secured for the British Museum.

Specimens of this coin in silver, supposed to be genuine, are illustrated by Sturdza in *Num. Zeit.*, IV (1872), Pl. 111, no. 8 and Resch, Pl. 65, no. 27. At Vienna, however, is a specimen which, as Dr. von Loehr informs me, has been assigned to Becker. This appears to be from the dies just described, but it has a plain border instead of the ornamental border shown in our illustration. It may therefore have been struck before the alteration to which Becker seems to allude in his diary under 5 Jan. 1827 (see above, note on no. 329). There is another specimen at Budapest from the same dies as that at Vienna.

341. (P. p. 1x, no. 3) Moses Szekely, Vaivode of Transilvania, 1603. Cp. Resch, Pl. 14, no. 1 (A). This was one of Becker's last productions (see Part I, p. 36). On 10 Feb. 1830 he gave Bertold the die to turn; Zindel was set to work and on 22 Feb. he received an impression; on 5 Mar. we read "Anfang Moses Zekel", next day "Schrift zu M. Zekel", and notes of further work are given on 17th and 19th Mar. The die of the reverse is preserved at Berlin and an impression is illustrated here; the obverse die can no longer be traced. It is a question whether it was completed. Resch illustrates on his Pl. 85, no. 10 (p. 257, no. 9) a forgery which he considers Becker's work; the illustration was made from a tin-foil impression supplied to him by Friedländer. No such piece is now at Berlin; and, unless Resch's illustration is very incorrect, the reverse of the piece from which Friedländer's impression was made was not from Becker's die. Neither among the impressions sent me from Berlin, Offenbach, Budapest and Vienna, nor in the trays of the British Museum, have I been able to find any piece struck from this reverse die. A pair of dies, presented by Mr. Bliss at the same time as those for no. 339, from the same source and similarly described as "Becker's," represent yet another variety.

342. (P. 328) Jülich, 1610. Cp. Brause, I, Pl. 12 and 13 (A; none closely resembling Becker's production).

343. (P. 319) Palatinate. Frederick V, elector. Cp. J. T. Köhler, Vollst. Ducaten-Cabinet (1759), no. 1150.

344. (P. p. x, no. 4) Glogau, Ferdinand II, 1622. The attribution to Becker is quite conjectural, and I have not been able to trace any specimen.

345. (P. 329) Frankenthal, 1623. Cp. Brause, I, Pl. 10, no. 1 (N).

346. (P. 320) Albert von Wallenstein, Duke of Friedland. An invention.

347. (P. 321) Gran, Peter Pazmany, archbishop (1629-37). Cp. Schönvisner, Catal. Num. Hung. ac Transilv. Inst. Nat. Széchényiani, Pars III (1807), p. 10, no. IV, Pl. 7, no. 48.

348. (P. p. x, no. 5) Vienna, Melchior Klesel, archbishop, 1630.

Becker drew the design on 5 Nov. 1825, began cutting next day, finished the *obv*. on the 7th. and the *rev*. on the 8th. ; on the 9th he struck five impressions for Appel, who took them away with the dies on 17 Nov. Becker charged 20 florins for this pair of dies. They have not been traced. Steinbüchel, p. 5, no. 7, mentions the coin as Becker's work. Our illustration is from the specimen at Vienna.

349. (P. p. x, no. 6) Cardinal Richelieu 1631. Cp. Milford Haven, Naval Medals, Vol. II (France, etc.), p. 208, no. 14b. Not included here for lack of evidence.

350. (P. —) Siebenbürgen, Franz Rhedei, 1658. Resch engraves (Pl. 85, no. 13) a forgery of a ducat of this Prince. Becker began the *obv.* of "Redei" on 8 Feb. 1825, and finished it next day. I noticed no further reference to this ounterfeit in the diary. It does not appear in the printed list, and possibly when completed the dies went to Fejervary. They have not been traced. The illustration is from the gold specimen in the British Museum.

351. Achatius Barcsai, 1659. There is a forgery of a coin of this Prince at Budapest, as Resch, Pl. 36, no. 2, which Dr. Harsányi is inclined to attribute to Becker; but as I have found no evidence for it, apart from style, it is not included in the illustrations.

352. (P. 330) Mainz, 1688. Cp. Brause, I, Pl. 17, no. 3.

353. (P. —) Siebenbürgen, Emerich Tököli, 1690. Resch would attribute the ducat, Pl. 85, no. 15, to Becker, and Dr. Harsanyi is of the same opinion. I can however find no reference to his having made anything of the kind. The dies for the ducat were presented to the British Museum by Mr. Bliss toge-

ther with those for nos. 339 and 341, from the same source and similarly described as "Becker's dies."

354. Georgsthaler. The signature BECKER appears under the dragon. The dies are not preserved, nor is there any other record of Becker's having made this piece. The illustration is from a cast of the silver specimen at Budapest.

355. (P. p. x, no. 7) French Revolution, 1789. Cp. Hennin, *Hist. num. de la Rév. fr.* (1826), Pl. 4, no. 34. A counterfeit of this is attributed to Becker by Steinbüchel, p. 5, no. 5 of the Nothmünzen.

356. (P. p. x, no. 8) Zara, 1813. Cp. Brause, I, Pl. 42, no. 3 (AR). The attribution to Becker is merely conjectural.

357. (P. p. XI, no. 9) Napoléon," Retour de l'Empereur, Mars MDCCCXV". Cp. L. Bramsen, *Médailler Napoléon le Grand*, II (1907), no. 1591; *Trésor de Num., Emp. fr.*, Pl. LXIV, no. 3. Steinbüchel, p. 5, no. 13, attributes a reproduction of this to Becker. Becker on 28 May 1829 asked Fejervary to get from Friedländer a sharp plaster cast of the medal in order that he (Becker) might work on it during the summer. Fejervary however on 25 July 1829 sent him a genuine specimen. He gave Bertold the dies to turn on 26 July, received them on 4 Aug., and gave them to Zindel next day. Zindel kept the dies until 28 Jan. 1830, when he brought them back partly done; next day Becker began on them; the last reference is on 8 Feb., when he notes that the work is getting on and the *obv*. should be ready in a few days. This is the medal referred to by Miss Elise Becker as finished by Zindel (see Part I, p. 57, note 51). The dies of this piece have not been traced. Fejervary wrote asking for the return of his original on 7 Apr. 1831. Possibly he got the dies as well.

Is it possible that the variety of this medal which was in the Wilmersdörffer Coll. (J. Hamburger, Auct., Oct. 1905, Pl. xv, no. 2381; Bramsen, no. 1591) was by Becker? The eagle carries an oil-flask, instead of the badge of the l egion of Honour, and the inscriptions on both sides are barely indicated.

358. (P. p. XI, no. 10) Napoléon, 1815, Bertrand's medal. Cp. Trésor de Num., Emp. fr., Pl. LXIV, no. 7. On 24 Dec. 1828 Becker received an original of this from Horrack, and started the two dies on 7 Jan. 1829; he drew the rev. on 10 Jan. After working at it for some time, he appears 10 have handed the obv. die to Zindel on 2 Mar. By 26 Mar. he had nearly finished the rev., but was still working at it on 11 Apr. On 27 Apr. Zindel brought back the obv. die; on the 30th he finished the obv. and retouched the rev. The price paid to Zindel was f. 20. On 6 May 1829 Becker informed Danz that he had the piece ready. The dies of this piece (formerly in President Lucas's possession) are now in the Berlin Museum, which also possesses a specimen of the counterfeit, from which our illustration is made.

359. (P. 331) Carl, Fürst zu Isenburg, 1818. See Part I, p. 16.

360. (P. —) Paul Anton Freiherr von Handel, 1822. This medal is fully described and illustrated by J. Bergmann, *Med. auf berühmte u. ausgez. Männer des Oesterr. Kaiserstaates*, II (1857), p. 491f., Pl. xxv, no. 129. Handel was Austrian Minister at Frankfurt at the time. Becker was still striking specimens in silver of this medal in 1829 (entries in the diary, 21, 24 and 30 July). Our illustration is from the silver specimen at Vienna.

361. (P. XI, no. 11) Satirical piece, one-sided, size of a half Kronthaler. A knight in armour on horseback, a little dog in front of him; inscr. in Gothic lettering "Aber du hast Luder gefressen". The attribution is a guess, and I have traced no specimen.

ADDENDA and CORRIGENDA

The dies described in part I as being in the possession of President Lucas have now, Dr. Regling informs me, been handed over to the Berlin Cabinet, with the exception of the Syracuse no. 26 and the Athens no. 63.

4a. (P. —) Tarentum. My attention was called to this piece by M. Vlasto as being from the same obv. die as nos. 99 and 106. I illustrate on Pl. XIX a specimen in gold in the British Museum collection of forgeries.

18 and 20 (see Part I, p 64). Mr. Newell informs me that he possesses an old silver strike with the Gela chariot and the Messana have showing that Becker himself was responsible for the false combination.

63a. Mr. Newell informs me that he possesses an Athenian decadrachm, absolutely Beckerian in style, but quite different in dies from no 63. I can find no mention in the diary of the making of any other counterfeit of Athens than no 63. The coin which appears as Athens in Becker's printed list (no 41) is our 36.

133*a*. Mr. Newell has a curious hybrid; it has the rev. of no. 133, but the obv. is struck with the die of no. 42. The latter die was of course much too large but was so used that only the horse's head appears.

P. 26, etc. Gabriel Fejérváry. From a biographical note prefixed to the "Catalogue of the Collection of the Monuments of Art formed by the late Gabriel Fejérváry, of Hungary ... arranged and described by Doctor E. Henszlmann" (London, Trübner and Co. 1853) it appears that Gabriel Fejérváry de Komlos Keresztes was the son of Charles Fejérváry, whose historical MSS. are in the Library of the National Museum at Pest. He devoted thirty years of his life to the formation of the Collection of Antiquities which was in 1853 exhibited at the Archaeological Institute of Great Britain and Ireland, and described in the above-mentioned Catalogue. This collection included " a collection of Hungarian Gold Coins, some of them, especially those of the princes of Transylvania, very rare." It may be guessed that these were Beckers. Many of the objects in this collection (but not the coins in question) were acquired by Joseph Mayer, and are now in the Liverpool Museum. See also "Catalogue of the Fejérváry Ivories in the Museum of Joseph Mayer, Esq., F.S.A.... preceded by an Essay on Antique Ivories by Francis Pulszky, F.H.A.", Liverpool 1856. There exists also the Catalogue of the Sale of Greek, Roman, Medieval and Renaissance works of art from the " de Fegervary - de Pulszky " Collection at Paris, Hôtel Drouot, on 18 to 23 May 1868.



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
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


