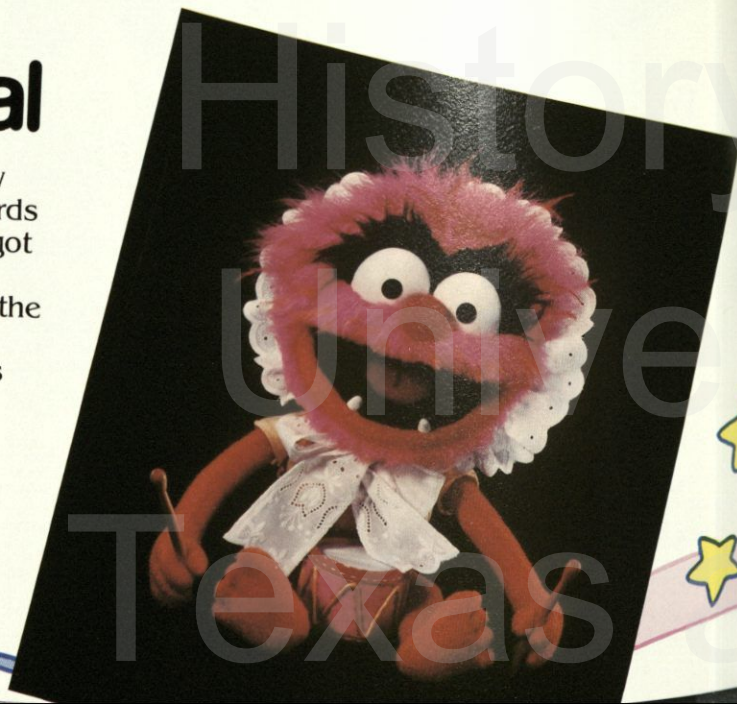


Baby Miss Piggy

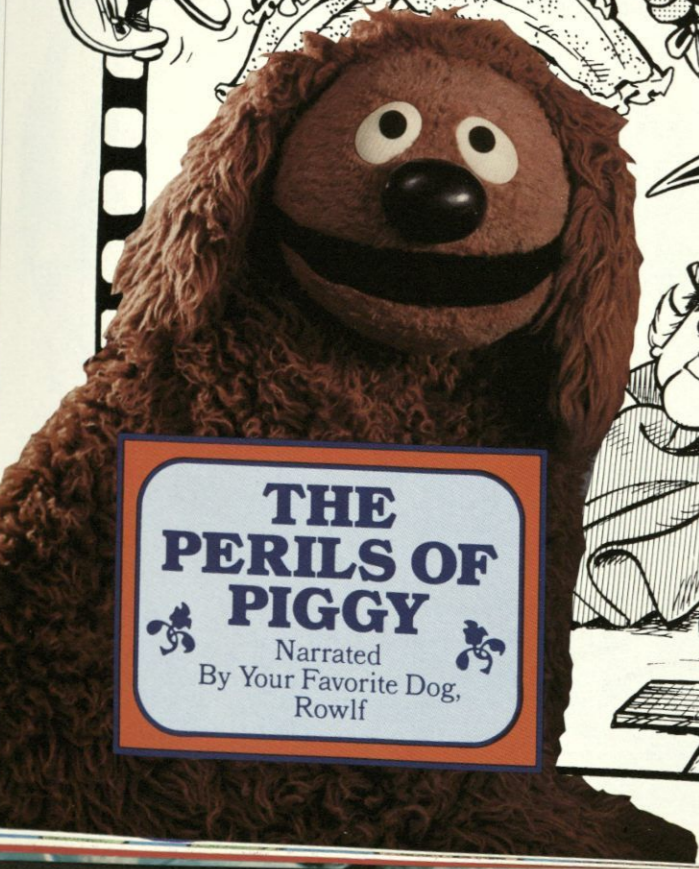
Baby Fozzie

Jim Henson

THE MUPPET SHOW ON TOUR stars Jim Henson's Muppets, a diverse troupe of wonderfully warm, eccentric characters led by Kermit the Frog who has been, for more than 30 years, an extension of Jim Henson's personality and right hand.

The Muppets were created because of Jim Henson's fascination with the television medium and its extraordinary possibilities. His first puppeteering job on television came as a manager. Then, in 1955, as an art major at the University of Maryland, a Washington, D.C. television station offered him his own five-minute late night show which he called "Sam and Friends." Network executives soon noticed the program's whimsical cast and the Muppets as Henson was calling them — began making guest appearances on the "Tonight Show," "The Ed Sullivan Show" and "The Jimmy Dean Show." In 1969, the Muppets became a household word on the award-winning "Sesame Street" Children's Television Workshop series. This was followed in 1976 by the premiere of the weekly television program, "The Muppet Show."

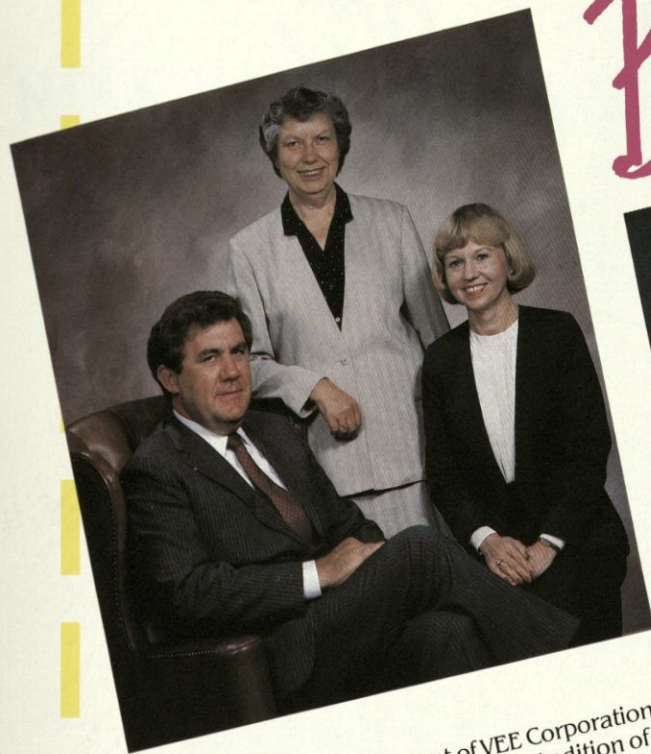
In 1984, the Muppets added a new dimension with the premiere of THE MUPPET SHOW ON TOUR, featuring life-size characters in an arena/theater environment. An all-new edition of the stage spectacular began its second tour in 1985. "Jim Henson's Muppet Babies," an Emmy award-winning animated children's television series, is in its second season on CBS and has been joined by a new program, "Little Muppet Monsters." His other award-winning weekly series, "Fraggle Rock," is beginning its third season on HBO and is viewed in almost 90 countries.

Henson's film credits include "The Muppet Movie," "The Great Muppet Caper," "The Muppets Take Manhattan" and "The Dark Crystal." A new fantasy film, "Labyrinth," is scheduled for release in 1986. Albums recorded by the Muppets have earned several Grammy nominations and a number of "Sesame Street" and "Muppet Show" albums have won gold status.

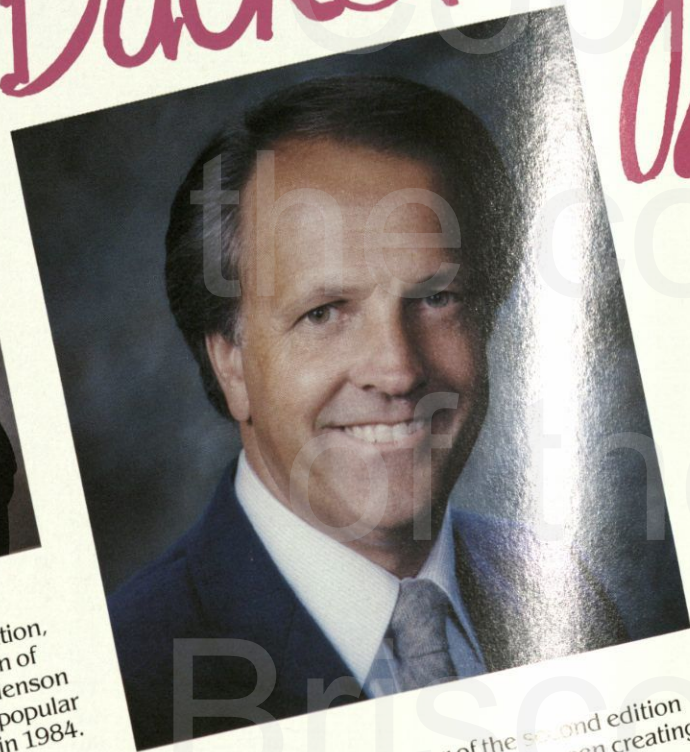

VINCENT E. EGAN, president of VEE Corporation, is the executive producer of the second edition of THE MUPPET SHOW ON TOUR. Working with Henson Associates, Inc., VEE Corporation brought the popular life-size Muppets to the arena/theater stage in 1984. Formerly vice president of marketing for Shipstads & Johnson Ice Follies and Holiday on Ice, Egan began his career with the Buick Motor Division of General Motors.

He formed the Minneapolis-based VEE Corporation in 1980 together with **Carolyn Huble** (seated), vice president/marketing, and **Pauline Knight** (standing), vice president/administration. Both former ice show associates, they have contributed their individual expertise and experience in the planning and launching of each new venture of VEE Corporation. The company's first innovative approach to the field of family entertainment was the stage spectacular, "Sesame Street Live." Now in its sixth season with two touring companies, it is rated among the top three arena shows in the country.

Proving the demand for expanded family entertainment, VEE Corporation approached even broader audiences with THE MUPPET SHOW ON TOUR, showcasing the universal comedy and appeal of the famous Muppets in a live show. Presenting a high quality product in a medium the whole family can share has been management philosophy since the formation of the company and will continue to be a major factor in future planning.



BOB SHIPSTAD, producer of the second edition of THE MUPPET SHOW ON TOUR, has been creating first class family entertainment for over 25 years. With Shipstad producing, the family and friends, movie stars, Kermit the Frog, Miss Piggy and friends, conquered new worlds and became "stars of the road" with the premiere edition of the live show in 1984.

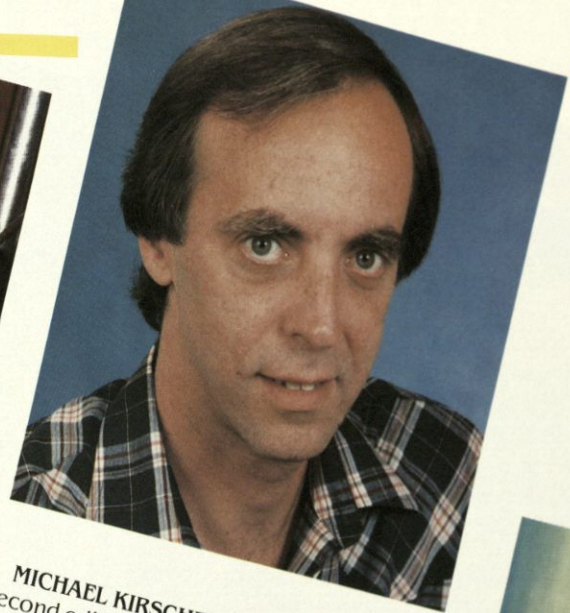
In 1980, he formed Shipstad Entertainment, Inc., and through this venture, began his association with VEE Corporation as the producer of the first edition of "Sesame Street Live." Now in its sixth season, Shipstad has produced each successive show. Son of Eddie Shipstad, one of the founders of Shipstads & Johnson Ice Follies, Shipstad produced and directed the world famous ice spectacular and two units of Holiday on Ice for 14 years. With his visionary talents and knowledge of show business, he has produced and directed shows at San Diego's Sea World, theater ice shows in Las Vegas and Lake Tahoe and network television specials, including two World Professional Figure Skating Championship television specials for ABC's "Wide World of Sports." His 1983 production, "ICE," a combination of theater, symphony and skates starring Peggy Fleming, Toller Cranston and Robin Cousins, played to rave reviews at Radio City Music Hall.

A graduate of the University of Portland, Shipstad, his wife, Gael, and their four children live in Los Angeles.

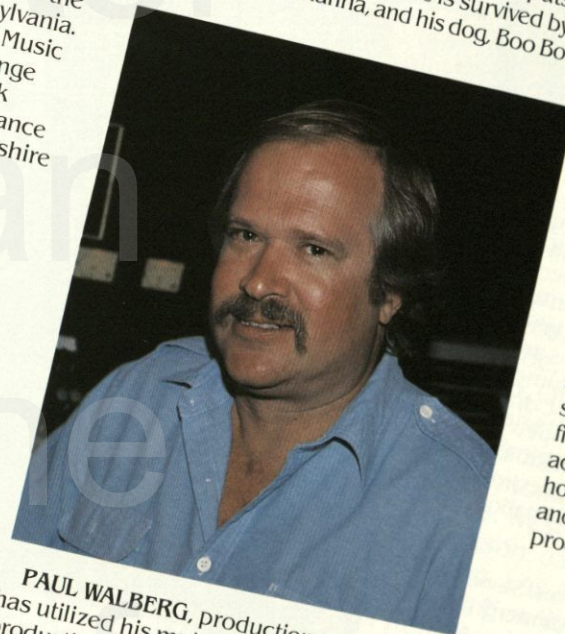


DIANE ARNOLD, director and choreographer for THE MUPPET SHOW ON TOUR, 2nd Edition, is a five-year veteran of VEE Corporation productions, including choreography for the 1984 premiere edition of the Muppet show. She is also director and choreographer for the current "Sesame Street Live" show and assistant choreographer for the television series, "Solid Gold." Arnold has been assistant choreographer for the "Sesame Street Live" touring shows since 1980 and has choreographed the stage production of the Sesame Street theme park in Pennsylvania. Beginning her career as a Radio City Music Hall Rockette, she acquired a wide range of professional experience on network television and Broadway. Her love of dance is equal to her devotion to a perky Yorkshire terrier named Sassy.

MICHAEL KIRSCHENBAUM, writer of the second edition of THE MUPPET SHOW ON TOUR, was born in Brooklyn, New York to short, but loving, parents. After graduating from school, Kirschenbaum took time out to find himself. And he did, about 20 years later, in a small town outside Vesteros, Sweden. Returning to the United States, Kirschenbaum embarked upon his present career. He has written Saturday morning children's shows, comic books, children's books and variety shows for radio and television. He enjoys writing for the Muppets because, as Kirschenbaum puts it, "The Frog pays on time." He is survived by his daughter, Johanna, and his dog, Boo Boo.



JIM WATERS, art director and technical coordinator, created the imaginative design and special effects of the second edition of THE MUPPET SHOW ON TOUR as well as the premiere show in 1984. He has also been the art director for the "Sesame Street Live" stage productions for the past five years. Waters' other professional credits include design for the Minnesota Opera, Midwest Opera Theater, Children's Theatre of Minneapolis, Lyric Opera of Kansas City and Actors' Theatre of St. Paul. He was the scenic designer for the award-winning film adaptation of "Touch," the highly-acclaimed Illusion Theatre play. Waters holds a Master of Fine Arts degree in design and a Bachelor of Arts in television production/theater arts.



PAUL WALBERG, production associate, has utilized his multiple talents in the production of THE MUPPET SHOW ON TOUR for the past two years. He has also been production associate since 1980 for VEE Corporation's five editions of the "Sesame Street Live" touring shows. A graduate of the University of Southern California in music and cinematography, his background includes musical composition, arrangement and direction for Ice Follies, Disneyland, Holiday on Ice, the "ICE" spectacular at Radio City Music Hall, television and radio commercials, and television specials.



The shaping of the second edition of THE MUPPET SHOW ON TOUR involved the special talents of many of the Henson organization people and their associates. Their various areas of expertise included costume design and construction; script, drama, staging, clowning, puppeteering and character consultation; creative and design direction; and production coordination.

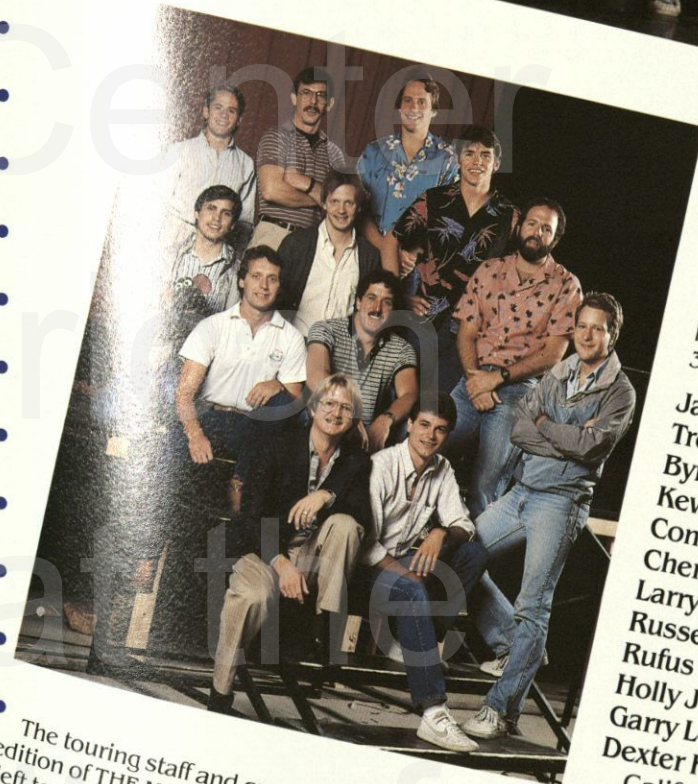

JOAN GANZ COONEY has revolutionized children's television with an approach blending entertainment and education in fresh and cheerful combinations that aim to attract and teach. As a founder and president of the Children's Television Workshop (CTW), she has guided the creation of the critically acclaimed and extremely popular educational programs, "Sesame Street," "The Electric Company" and "3-2-1 CONTACT."

The Phoenix native was graduated from the University of Arizona with a bachelor's degree in education. She became a reporter for the Arizona Republic, and a publicist for ABC and the "U. S. Steel Hour." Her career took a total turn in 1962 when she started producing news and documentaries for WNET, New York City's educational television station.

In 1967, the Carnegie Corporation asked Cooney to explore how television might be used as an educational tool to prepare preschoolers, particularly those in inner cities for formal schooling. Her report led to CTW's formation in 1968, with funding from the federal government and private foundations, and the debut of Sesame Street in 1969. Following the success of the daily one-hour show, Cooney guided CTW into more children's programming on PBS with The Electric Company in 1971 and 3-2-1 CONTACT in 1980. To increase CTW's financial self-reliance, she moved the nonprofit Workshop into magazines, books, records, games, toys and puzzles. CTW's innovations also include "Sesame Place," a theme park in Pennsylvania, and two SESAME STREET LIVE touring arena shows.

Cooney has received more than 70 honors and awards and has served on two Presidents' Commissions. She is a trustee of the Educational Broadcasting Corporation and the National Child Labor Committee and a member of the board of directors of Xerox, Metropolitan Life Insurance Companies, Johnson & Johnson, The Chase Manhattan Corporation and the Chase Manhattan Bank.

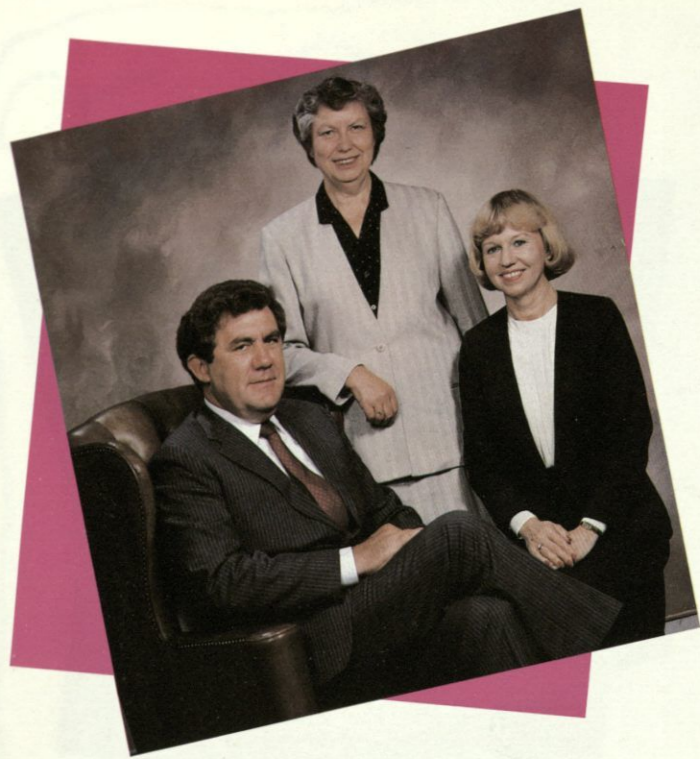


JIM HENSON'S Sesame Street Muppets are the stars of SESAME STREET LIVE. A diverse troupe of feathery, furry and friendly characters, they have endeared themselves to both youngsters and adults in the live stage productions touring the country since 1980.

The Muppets were created because of Jim Henson's fascination with the TV medium and its extraordinary possibilities. His first puppeteering job on television came as a teenager. Then, in 1955, as an art major at the University of Maryland, a Washington, D.C. television station offered him his own five-minute late night show which he called "Sam and Friends." Network executives soon noticed the program's whimsical cast and the Muppets began making guest appearances on the "Tonight Show," "The Ed Sullivan Show" and "The Jimmy Dean Show." In 1969, the Muppets became a household word on the award-winning "Sesame Street" Children's Television Workshop series. This was followed in 1976 by the premiere of the weekly television program, "The Muppet Show."

In 1984, the Muppets added a new dimension with the premiere of "The Muppet Show On Tour," featuring life-size characters in an arena/theater environment followed by a second edition in 1985. "Jim Henson's Muppet Babies," an Emmy award-winning animated children's television series, has completed its second season on CBS. "Muppet Babies Live," a stage presentation featuring life-size characters from the cartoon show, began its world premiere tour in 1986. His other award-winning television series, "Fraggle Rock," has ended its fourth season on HBO and is viewed in more than 80 countries.

Henson's film credits include "The Muppet Movie," "The Great Muppet Caper," "The Muppets Take Manhattan," "The Dark Crystal" and a new fantasy film, "Labyrinth," released in 1986. Albums recorded by the Muppets have earned Grammy nominations and a number of "Sesame Street" and "Muppet Show" albums have achieved gold status.

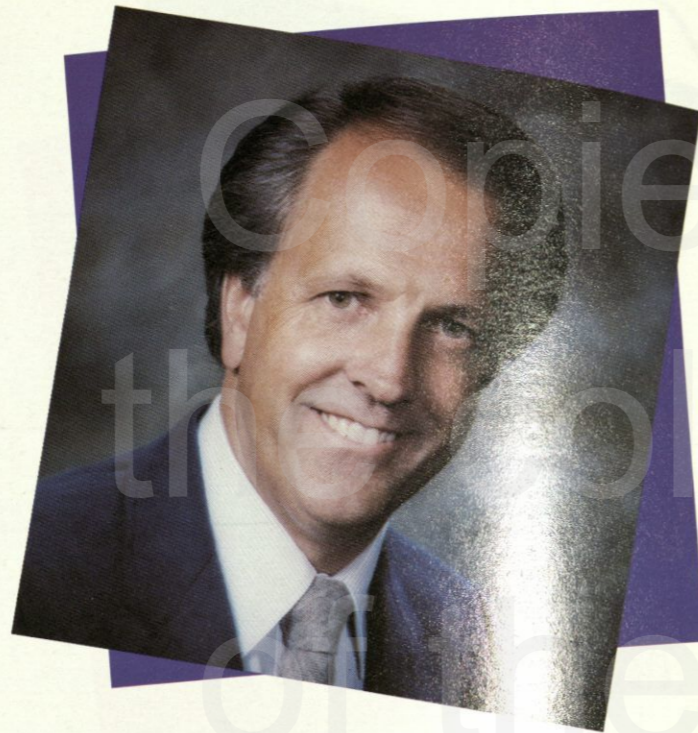
Formerly vice president of marketing for Shipstads & Johnson Ice Follies and Holiday on Ice, Egan formed the Minneapolis-based VEE Corporation in 1980 together with **Carolyn Huble** (seated), vice president/marketing, and **Pauline Knight**, (standing), vice president/administration. Both former ice show associates, they have contributed their individual expertise and experience in the planning and launching of each new venture of VEE Corporation.

The company's first innovative approach to the field of family entertainment was transforming the successful "Sesame Street" television show onto the arena/theater stage as SESAME STREET LIVE. One of the first touring stage spectaculars aimed at the vast preschool market, it is now in its seventh season with two touring companies. Rated among the top three arena shows in the United States, SESAME STREET LIVE productions have attracted audiences totaling over nine million people.

Proving the demand for family entertainment, the Minnesota entrepreneur embarked on a new venture in 1984 with the introduction of Jim Henson's famous Muppets in a live stage production, "The Muppet Show On Tour" followed by a second edition in 1985. An all-new show, "Muppet Babies Live" began in 1986 featuring Jim Henson's Muppet Babies from the TV cartoon series.

Presenting a high quality product in a medium the whole family can share has been management philosophy since the formation of the company and will continue to be a major factor in future planning for VEE Corporation. "We are grateful to the millions of people who have supported us through the last six years. It reaffirms our belief that good quality family entertainment will always find a large audience," Egan said.

Born in Minneapolis, Egan was graduated from the University of Minnesota and began his career with the Buick Motor Division of General Motors Corporation as a district sales manager. True to his roots in middle America, he spends his leisure time at home on a farm near Dayton, Minnesota and boats on the Mississippi.



BOB SHIPSTAD has been producing first class family entertainment for over 25 years. In 1980, he formed Shipstad Entertainment, Inc., and, through this venture, began his association with VEE Corporation as the producer of the first edition of SESAME STREET LIVE. Now in its sixth season, he has produced five successive editions of the highly successful touring arena shows.

In 1984, he also produced the premiere of a new live stage production, "The Muppet Show On Tour," as well as the currently touring second edition starring Kermit, Miss Piggy and friends.

Son of Eddie Shipstad, one of the founders of Shipstads & Johnson Ice Follies, Shipstad produced and directed the world famous ice spectacular and two units of Holiday on Ice for 14 years. With his visionary talents and knowledge of show business, he opened up new worlds for the ice shows by creating and producing additional units that toured Mexico, South America and the Orient.

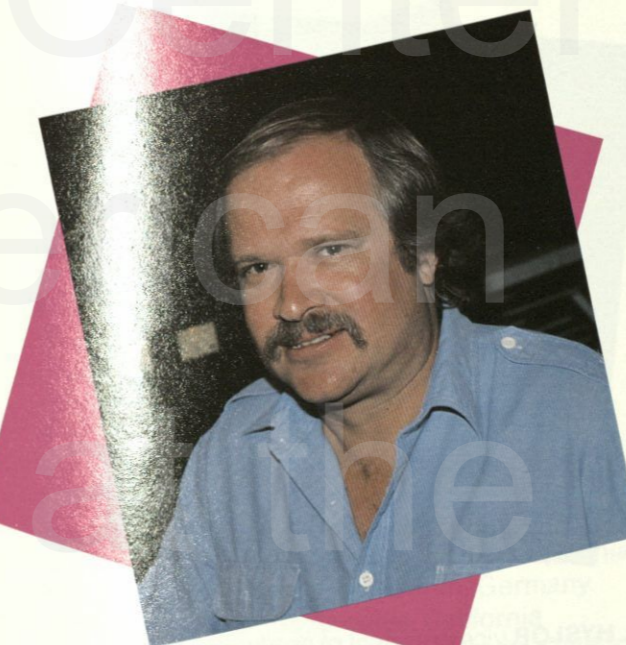
Shipstad has produced shows at San Diego's Sea World and theater ice shows in Las Vegas and Lake Tahoe, one of which won him the prestigious Georgie Award for the Best Produced Las Vegas Show. He brought his family-oriented ice extravaganzas to television by producing four highly acclaimed network specials, including two World Professional Figure Skating Championship specials for ABC's "Wide World of Sports." DIAN ARNOLD is the director and choreographer for the current SESAME STREET LIVE shows. She was choreographer for the 1984 premiere edition of "The Muppet Show On Tour," director/choreographer of the 1985 production and choreographer of the new "Muppet Babies Live" stage show. Arnold is assistant choreographer for the television series, "Solid Gold," and choreographed the stage production of the Sesame Street theme park in Pennsylvania. Beginning her career as a Radio City Music Hall Rockette, she acquired a wide range of professional experience on network television and Broadway. Her love of dance is equal to her devotion to a perky Yorkshire terrier named Sassy.

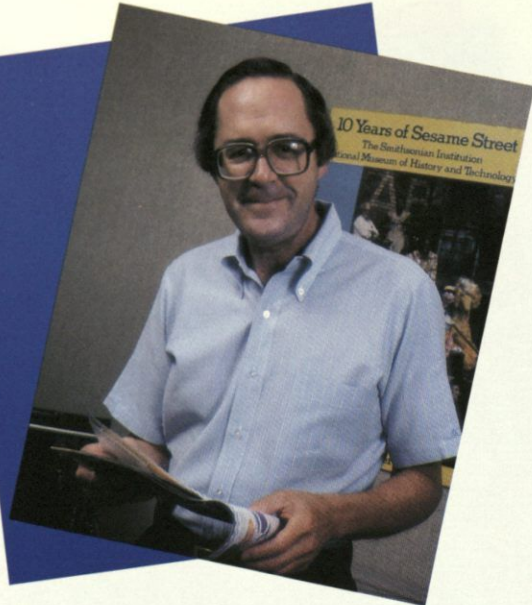

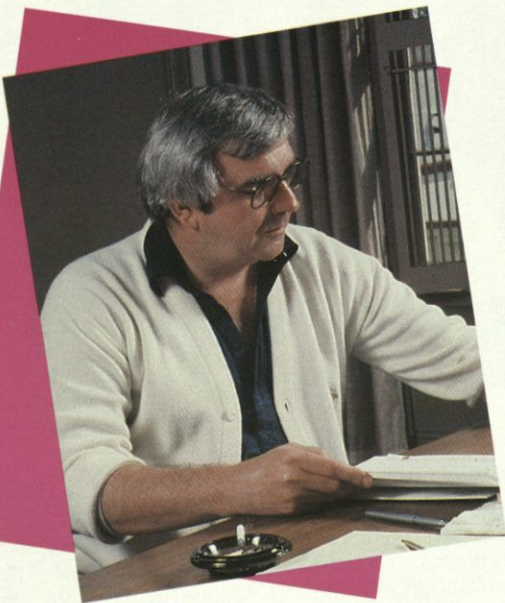

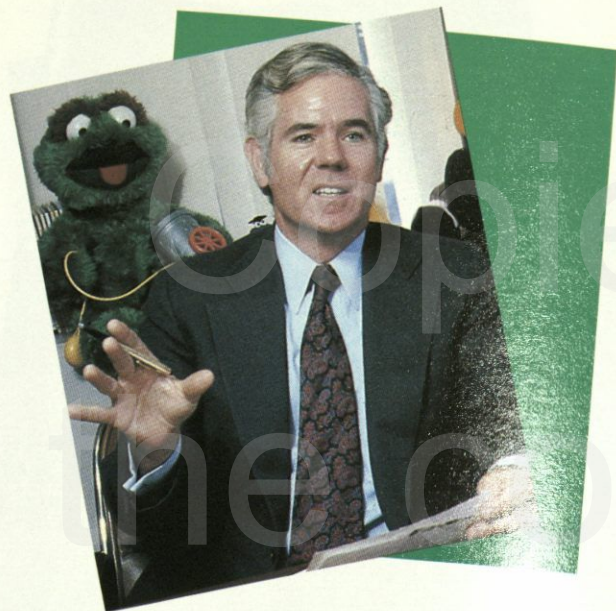

He is responsible for product development and licensing of educational products and activities based on the Workshop's three acclaimed television series, "Sesame Street," "The Electric Company" and "3-2-1 CONTACT." More than three dozen licensees manufacture and distribute a wide range of children's items throughout the world. Whaley is also president of CTW International Television and is responsible for the distribution and co-production of the Workshop's series in more than 50 countries. A graduate of Notre Dame, Whaley was previously an executive of Western Publishing Company.



AL HYSLOP, vice president of production for the Children's Television Workshop, was educated in England and New York and began his career in the theater. His early television experience was acquired in the 1960's as vice president of Robert Keeshan Associates and producer of "Captain Kangaroo." In 1973, Hyslop founded the Texas Theatre Foundation, an innovative nonprofit group engaged in making live theater more readily available in the state. He became executive producer of "Sesame Street" in 1977 and was responsible for the Emmy award-winning Sesame Street special taped in Puerto Rico. 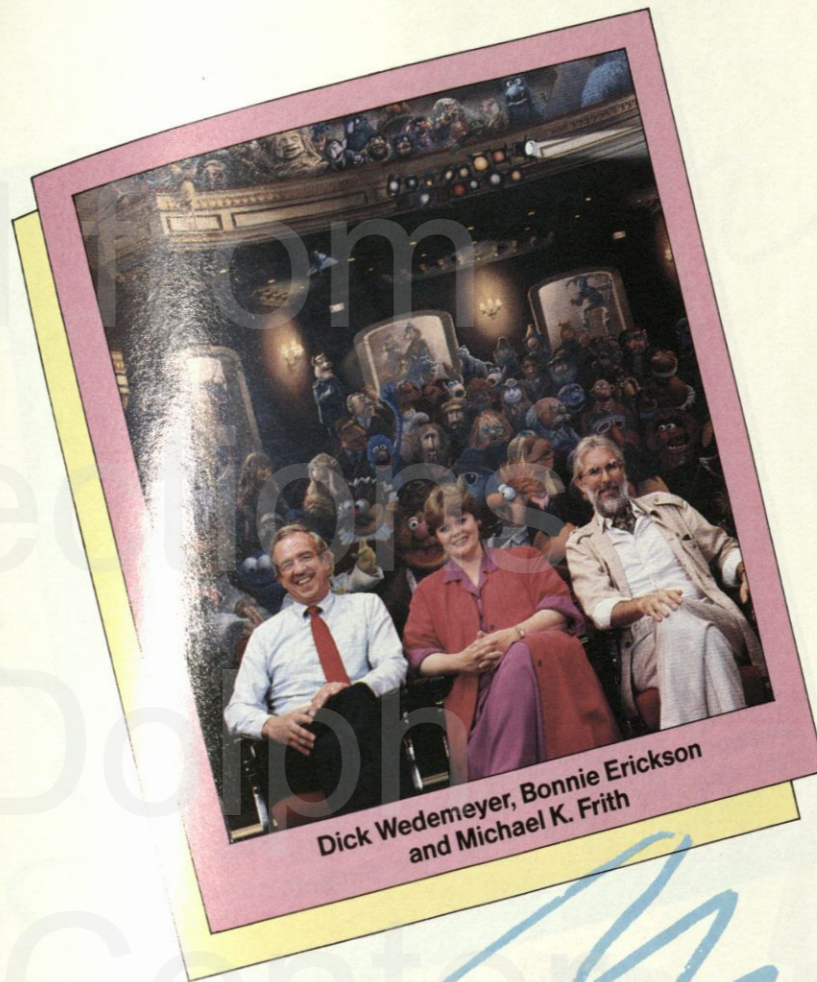
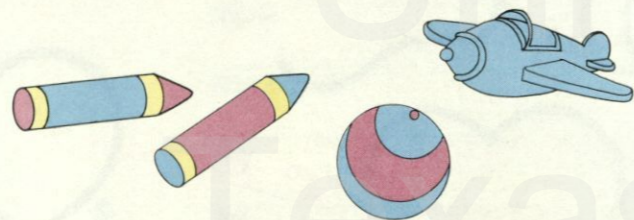
The Muppets are a diverse troupe of wonderfully warm, eccentric characters led by Kermit the Frog, who has been, for more than 30 years, an extension of Jim Henson's personality and right hand. They were created because of Henson's fascination with the television medium and its extraordinary possibilities. Henson's first puppeteering job on television came as a teenager. Then, in 1955, while an art major at the University of Maryland, a Washington, D.C. television station offered him his own five-minute late night show which he called "Sam and Friends." Network executives soon noticed the program's whimsical cast and the Muppets—as Henson was calling them—began making guest appearances on "The Tonight Show," "The Ed Sullivan Show" and "The Jimmy Dean Show."

In 1969, the Muppets became a household word due to the popularity of the award-winning Children's Television Workshop series, "Sesame Street." This

was followed in 1976 by the premiere of the weekly television program, "The Muppet Show." "Fraggle Rock," an award-winning weekly television series now in its fifth season on HBO, is viewed in more than 80 countries.

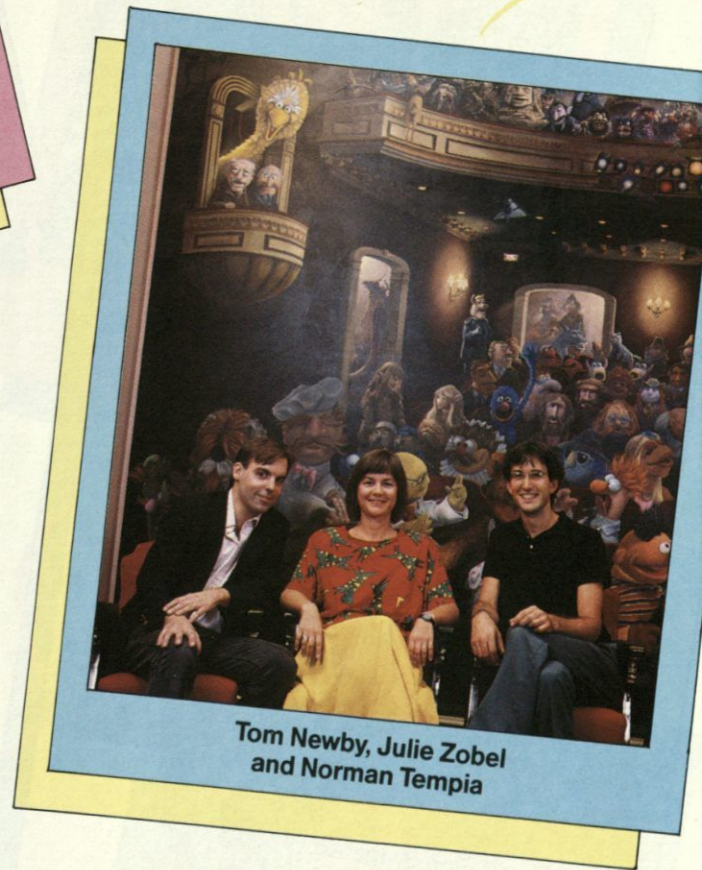
"Jim Henson's Muppet Babies," an animated children's television series and winner of two Emmys, began its third season on CBS in 1986. MUPPET BABIES LIVE, a stage presentation featuring life-size characters from the cartoon show, began its world premiere tour in August 1986.

Henson's film credits include "The Muppet Movie," "The Great Muppet Caper," "The Muppets Take Manhattan," "The Dark Crystal," and a new fantasy film, "Labyrinth," released in June 1986. Albums recorded by the Muppets have earned several Grammy nominations and a number of "Sesame Street" and "Muppet Show" albums have achieved gold status.



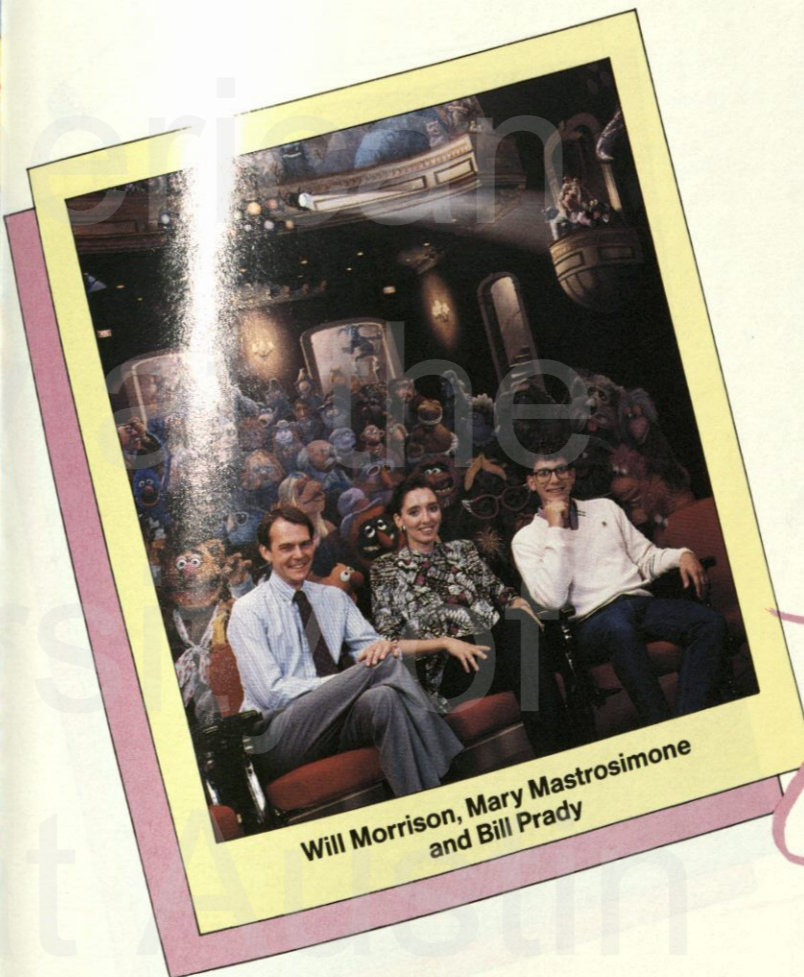
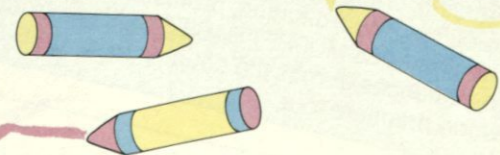

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BEHIND THE SCENES



Joan Ganz Cooney has revolutionized children's television with an approach blending entertainment and education in fresh and cheerful combinations that aim to attract and teach. As a founder and president of Children's Television Workshop (CTW), she has guided the creation of the critically acclaimed and extremely popular educational programs, "Sesame Street," "The Electric Company" and "3-2-1 CONTACT!"

The Phoenix native was graduated from the University of Arizona with a bachelor's degree in education. She became a reporter for the Arizona Republic, and a publicist for NBC and the "U.S. Steel Hour." Her career took a pivotal turn in 1962 when she started producing news and documentaries for NET, New York City's educational television station.

In 1967, the Carnegie Corporation asked Cooney to explore how television might be used as an educational tool to prepare preschoolers, particularly those in inner cities, for formal schooling. Her report led to CTW's formation in 1968, with funding from the federal government and private foundations, and the debut of Sesame Street in 1969. Following the success of the daily one-hour show, Cooney guided CTW into more children's programming on PBS with The Electric Company in 1971 and 3-2-1 CONTACT in 1980. To increase CTW's financial self-reliance, she moved the nonprofit Workshop into magazines, books, records, games, toys and puzzles. CTW's innovations now include "Sesame Place," a theme park in Pennsylvania and two SESAME STREET LIVE touring arena shows.

Cooney has received more than 70 honors and awards and has served on two Presidents' Commissions. She is a trustee of the Educational Broadcasting Corporation and the National Child Labor Committee and a member of the board of directors of Xerox, Metropolitan Life Insurance Companies, Johnson & Johnson, the Chase Manhattan Corporation and the Chase Manhattan Bank.

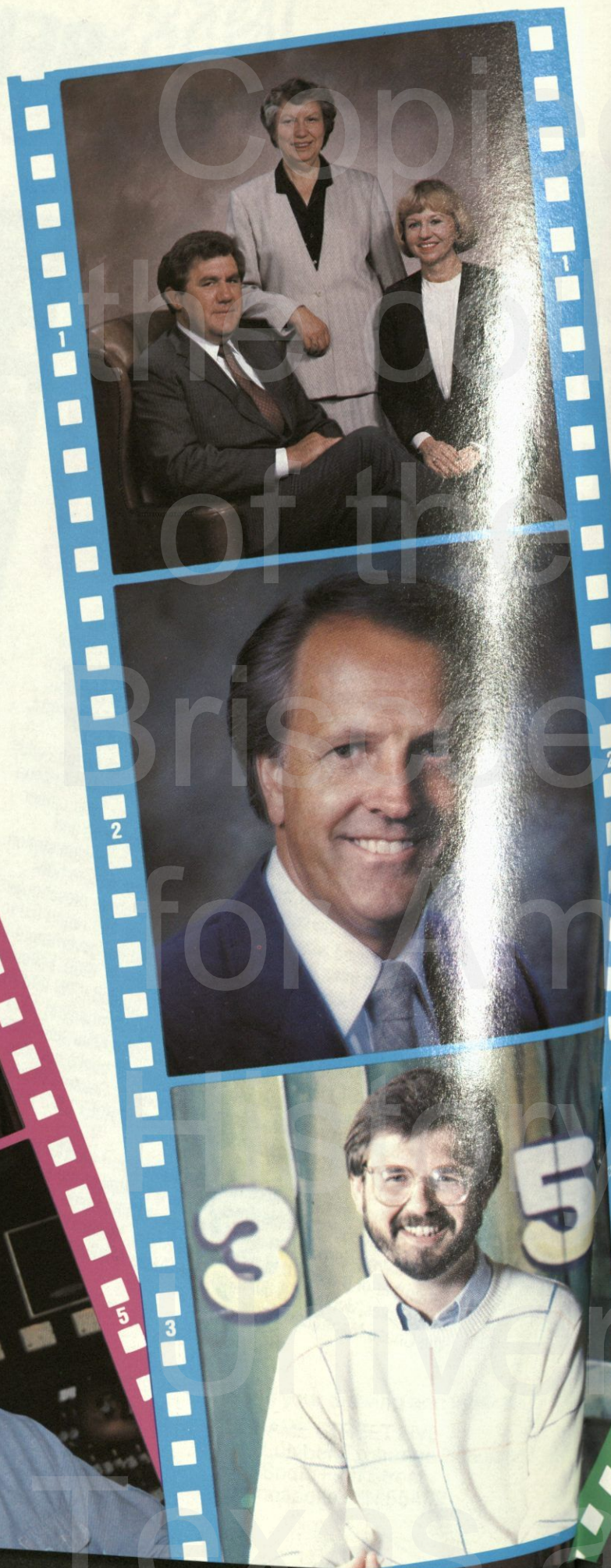
Jim Henson's Sesame Street Muppets are the stars of SESAME STREET LIVE. A diverse troupe of feathery, furry and friendly characters, they have endeared themselves to both youngsters and adults in the live stage productions touring the country since 1980.

The Muppets were created because of Jim Henson's fascination with the television medium and its extraordinary possibilities. His first puppeteering job on television came as a teenager. Then, in 1955, as an art major at the University of Maryland, a Washington, D.C. television station offered him his own five-minute late night show which he called "Sam and Friends." Network executives soon noticed the program's whimsical cast and the Muppets began making guest appearances on the "Tonight Show," "The Ed Sullivan Show" and "The Jimmy Dean Show." In 1969, the Muppets became a household word on the award-winning "Sesame Street" Children's Television Workshop series. This was followed in 1976 by the premiere of the weekly television program, "The Muppet Show."

In 1984, the Muppets added a new dimension with the premiere of "The Muppet Show On Tour," featuring life-size characters in an arena/theater environment followed by a second edition in 1985. "Jim Henson's Muppet Babies," an Emmy award-winning animated children's television series, has completed its second season on CBS. "Muppet Babies Live," a stage presentation featuring life-size characters from the cartoon show, began its world premiere tour in 1986. His other award-winning television series, "Fraggle Rock," has ended its fourth season on HBO and is viewed in more than 80 countries.

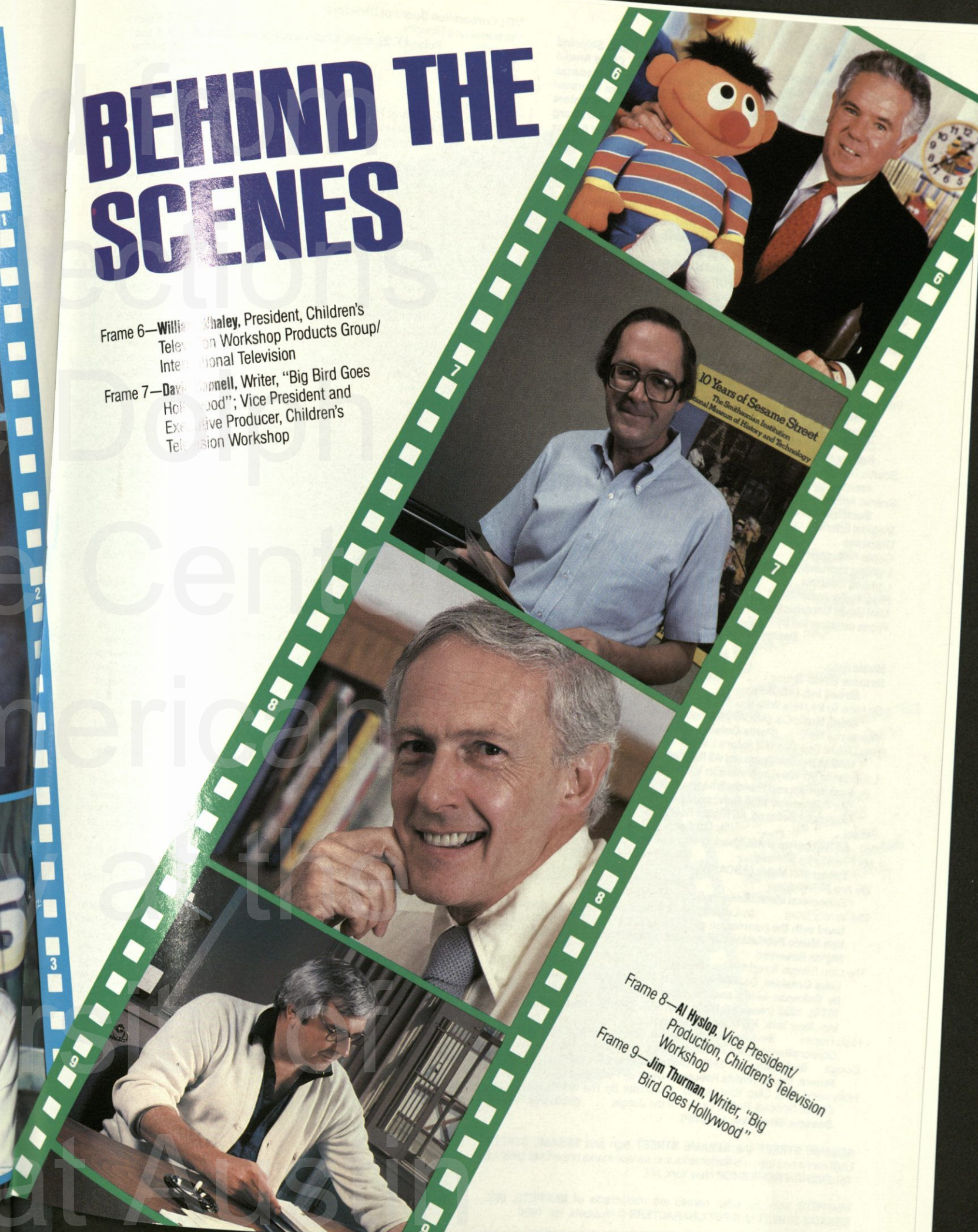
Henson's film credits include "The Muppet Movie," "The Great Muppet Caper," "The Muppets Take Manhattan," "The Dark Crystal" and a new fantasy film, "Labyrinth," released in 1986. Albums recorded by the Muppets have earned Grammy nominations and a number of "Sesame Street" and "Muppet Show" albums have achieved gold status.
