## PREFACE.

I HAVE spared no pains to make this Bibliography exhaustive as well as accurate. Like its predecessor, THE BIBLIOGRAPHY OF RUSKIN, it is arranged mainly, though not entirely, in chronological order; and includes all the accessible printed utterances of CHARLES DICKENS that have come under my notice; not merely his larger and smaller separate works, but his scattered and uncollected contributions to journals, magazines, annuals, and keepsakes, his Letters to newspapers and to friends, and his Speeches. No entry has been made at second-hand.

I cannot be sure that my enumeration of the uncollected Letters is absolutely complete, and I shall be greatly indebted to any correspondent who will send me supplementary data for that portion of the work. It should be understood that the letters must have been printed somewhere; that it is not within the scheme and scope of the present

compilation to include autograph letters, unless deposited in some national Library or Museum.

I trust that the little work will prove useful to collectors and students, most of whom, I anticipate, will find some information in it that is new to them.

The Preface to these two volumes is dated "Furnival's Inn, February, 1836."

A second edition appeared in the same year, with a new preface, dated "Furnival's Inn, 1st August, 1836."

The Preface to this third volume is dated "Furnival's Inn, December 17, 1836."

*First Complete Edition of the Two Series*, with forty illustrations by George Cruikshank. In twenty monthly parts, demy 8vo, commencing November, 1837, and ending June, 1839. Twenty-seven of the twenty-eight illustrations to the former editions—(one illustration, "The Free and Easy" in *The Streets: Night*, being cancelled)—were re-drawn and engraved to suit the larger-sized page of this edition. To these were added thirteen new etchings. There was also a design on the first page of the pink wrapper by George Cruikshank. Preface dated "May 15, 1839." London: Chapman and Hall, 186, Strand. 1839, pp. 526.

The First Series of the *Sketches* comprised, as we have seen (including six chapters of "Our Parish"), thirty-five articles. The Second Series comprised twenty articles. The Complete Edition included all the above, with one additional sketch, viz., "The Tuggs's at Ramsgate;" re-arranged under the headings,—*Sketches from our Parish*, 7; *Scenes*, 25; *Characters*, 12; and *Tales*, 12.

A new Preface, dated "London, October, 1850," was prefixed to the first cheap edition.

The Dedication to Serjeant Talfourd is dated "48, Doughty-street, September 27, 1837."

The first two numbers contained each only 24 pages of letterpress, the first contained four and the second three illustrations by Seymour, who died suddenly April 20, 1836, while the second number was in preparation. The third and succeeding numbers contained each 32 pages of letterpress, with only two illustrations. Those in the third number were originally executed by a Mr. Buss, but his plates were replaced in later issues of the number by two different designs executed by Mr. Hablot Browne ("Phiz"), who illustrated the remainder of this and many subsequent works of Charles Dickens. The original green wrapper had a design by Seymour, representing scenes of fishing and shooting, and groups of sporting implements. Part ii. contained a notice respecting Seymour's death. Part x. an "Address" from the author to his readers, dated "December, 1836," and Part xv. another "Address," dated "186, Strand, June 30, 1837."

The first cheap Edition contains a new Preface, dated "London, September, 1847." This Preface was considerably amplified in the "Charles Dickens" edition (Chapman and Hall, 1867, pp. xii. 497).

\* No number was issued for June, 1837. The fourteenth number bears date "May, 1837" and the fifteenth "July, 1837;" the publication was suspended during that interval through a severe shock which the author received from the death of a younger sister of his wife (Mary Hogarth).

## OLIVER TWIST; OR, THE PARISH BOY'S PROGRESS.

Commenced in the second number of *Bentley's Miscellany*, in February, 1837, and concluded in March, 1839. Published in three volumes, post 8vo, in advance of its completion in the *Miscellany*, in October, 1838, with twenty-four illustrations by George Cruikshank.\* London: Richard Bentley, New Burlington-street. 1838. (C)

A *Third Edition* was issued with "the Author's Preface to the Third Edition," dated "Devonshire Terrace, April, 1841." 3 vols. 8vo. London: Chapman and Hall. 1841. (C)

\* The last of these illustrations—*Rose Maylie and Oliver*—as it appeared in the early copies, was objected to by the author, and was designed afresh at his request. "The publication had been announced for October," says Mr. Forster, "but the third-volume illustrations intercepted it a little. This part of the story had been written in anticipation of the magazine; and the designs for it, having to be executed *in a lump*, were necessarily done somewhat hastily. The matter supplied in advance of the monthly portions in the magazine formed the bulk of the last volume; and for this the plates had to be prepared by Cruikshank, also in advance of the magazine, to furnish them in time for the separate publication. None of these Dickens had seen until he saw them in the book on the eve of its publication, when he so strongly objected to one of them that it had to be cancelled. 'I returned suddenly to town yesterday afternoon,' he wrote to the artist at the end of October, 'to look at the latter pages of *Oliver Twist* before it was delivered to the booksellers, when I saw the majority of the plates in the last volume for the first time. With reference to the last one—*Rose Maylie and Oliver*—I am quite sure there can be little difference of opinion between us with respect to the result. May I ask you whether you will object to designing this plate afresh, and doing so *at once*, in order that as few impressions as possible of the present one may go forth?'" FORSTER'S *Life of Dickens*.

*Edition in One Volume.* Issued with the same plates as the former editions, in ten monthly parts, demy 8vo, uniform with *Pickwick*, commencing January, 1846. The first page of the green wrapper was from a design by George Cruikshank, and depicted eleven scenes (mostly different from those represented in the body of the work), illustrating incidents in the novel, pp. 311. London: published for the Author by Bradbury and Evans, Whitefriars, 1846.

The first cheap Edition contains a new Preface, dated "Devonshire Terrace, March, 1850." This Preface was considerably modified and abridged in the "Charles Dickens" edition (Chapman and Hall, 1867, pp. viii. 258), and a new paragraph was added at the end.

Written and printed in the *Examiner*, "to express publicly," says Mr. Forster, "his hearty sympathy with Lockhart's handling of some passages in his admirable Life of Scott that had drawn down upon him the wrath of the Ballantynes."

Notice of Hood's "Up the Rhine." Printed in *The Examiner*.

"I find him noticing, in the *Examiner*, a book by Thomas Hood ('Up the Rhine'): 'rather poor, but I have not said so, because Hood is too, and ill besides.'"—FORSTER'S *Life of Dickens* (ed. 1876, vol. i., p. 121).

MASTER HUMPHREY'S CLOCK. With illustrations on wood by George Cattermole and H. K. Browne; George Cruikshank and Daniel Maclise. In eighty-eight weekly numbers, imperial 8vo, commencing April 4, 1840, and ending November 27, 1841, and in twenty monthly parts,—forming three volumes. Vol. i., pp. iv. 306; vol. ii., pp. vi. 306; vol. iii., pp. vi. 426. London: Chapman and Hall, 186, Strand. 1840-41.

*The Old Curiosity Shop* began at page 37 of the first volume, and continued, with occasional interruptions in its early part from the intercalary Pickwickian and other chapters, to page 223 of the second volume.

[The first cheap Edition of *The Old Curiosity Shop* contained a new Preface, dated "London, September, 1848."]

*Barnaby Rudge* began at page 229 of the second volume, and was finished with its 82nd chapter at page 420 of the third volume, after which the *Clock* was wound up by a closing chapter from Master Humphrey (pp. 421-426).

[The first cheap Edition of *Barnaby Rudge* contained a new Preface, dated "London, March, 1849."]

The first volume of *Master Humphrey's Clock* was dedicated to Samuel Rogers, and the Preface was dated "Devonshire Terrace, September, 1840." The Preface of the second volume was dated "Devonshire Terrace, March, 1841;" and the Preface of the third and concluding volume, "Devonshire Terrace, November, 1841."

Seven of the eight stanzas of this squib are quoted by Mr. Forster in the twelfth chapter of Book ii. of his *Life of Dickens*. Mr. Forster professes to give it entire, and states that it "had no touch of personal satire in it," and that Dickens "would himself, for that reason, have least objected to its revival." The stanza omitted by Mr. Forster is the sixth, which runs thus:—

"Those were the days for taxes, and for war's infernal din;  
For scarcity of bread, that fine old dowagers might win;  
For shutting men of letters up, through iron bars to grin,  
Because they didn't think the Prince was altogether thin,  
In the fine old English Tory times;  
Soon may they come again!"

I doubt if he ever enjoyed anything more than the power of thus taking part occasionally, unknown to outsiders, in the sharp conflict the press was waging at the time.”—FORSTER'S *Life of Dickens*, ed. 1876, vol. i., pp. 186-187.

This Prologue was not printed *in extenso* in any of the newspapers, nor with the play itself, which indeed had been published in the previous year (1841), before it was produced on the stage. It appears, with some variations from the above version, in the first volume of the recently-published collection of Charles Dickens's Letters (pp. 77-78).

Page 299, line 13, for "W. H. H." read "W. H. W."

Two letters to Mr. George Cattermole are wrongly placed :—  
1840.

The letter dated "Devonshire Terrace, Friday Morning," and printed on pp. 34-35, instead of coming between the two letters of December 21 and 22, 1840, and breaking their obvious sequence and continuity, should precede the former. It belongs presumably to the month of August: it refers at any rate to "the end of September" as yet to come :—"I want to see you about a frontispiece to our first 'Clock' volume, which will come out (I think) at the end of September."

This letter should be immediately followed by the one dated "Devonshire Terrace, Thursday, August 13," printed at page 47-48, and wrongly assigned to the year 1841. It belongs to the year 1840, as is evident, first, from the date, "Thursday, August 13," August 13 falling on Thursday in the year 1840, and on *Friday* in the year 1841 (see previous letter printed on page 46, and dated "Friday, August 6, 1841"); and, secondly, from the nature of

the contents: "Will you turn your attention to a frontispiece for *our first volume*? The volume is not published until the end of September." The first volume of *Master Humphrey's Clock*, to which this refers, was published with a Preface dated "September, 1840." *Vide supra*, p. 17.

1841.

The second paragraph of "Narrative," on page 37, runs as follows: "The letter to Mr. George Cattermole (26th June) refers to a dinner given to Charles Dickens by the people of Edinburgh on his first visit to that city." No letter of this date, or containing any such reference, appears in the book.

1851.

In the "Narrative," under this date, page 241, it is stated: "This year he wrote and published *The Haunted Man*, which he had found himself unable to finish for the previous Christmas. It was the last of the 'Christmas Books.'"

In the "Narrative" of 1847 it is stated (page 170): "He decided to let this Christmas pass without a story and postponed the publication of *The Haunted Man* until the following year."

Again in the "Narrative" of 1848, page 185: "The autumn months were again spent at Broadstairs, where he wrote *The Haunted Man*, which was illustrated by Mr. Frank Stone, Mr. Leech, and others. . . . The letters to Mr. Stone on the subject of his illustrations to *The Haunted Man* are written from Brighton."

*The Haunted Man* was in fact published Christmas, 1848.

1853.

The undated and unsigned letter to Mr. Wills, printed p. 299 as the first of the letters of 1853, was evidently written late in the month of November, 1852. It refers to the arrangements for the forthcoming Christmas number and to "Mrs. Gaskell's ghost story," which "I have got this morning" but "not yet read." There is a note to Mrs. Gaskell accompanying a proof of this story, and dated "Dec. 1, 1852," printed at page 292.

## MEMORANDA.

Narrative 1838, page 7, second paragraph.—“The letter which we give in this year to Mr. Justice Talfourd is, unfortunately, the only one we have been able to procure to that friend.” Three other letters to Talfourd are printed in Dr. Shelton Mackenzie’s *Life of Dickens*.

Letter to Douglas Jerrold, dated “Devonshire Terrace, May 3, 1843.”—Page 88, line 9.—“There were men there who made” runs in the original letter—“There were men there—your City aristocracy— who made,” &c. “Dismal features” (last words of the same paragraph) reads “dismal flatness” in the version of the letter printed by Mr. Blanchard Jerrold; but it would require reference to the original autograph to decide which is correct.

Page 422. Why should "*Earl Russell*," already so entitled in 1865 (see page 235), figure again in 1869, in the margin, as "The Lord John Russell?"

1870.

The letters to Mrs. Dallas and to Mr. S. L. Fildes, both dated "Jan. 16" (pp. 434-435), should precede the letter to Mr. W. H. Wills, dated "Jan. 23" (pp. 433-434).

## MEMORANDA.

In a footnote (editorial) to page 350 it is stated that Mr. H. F. Chorley "was the well-known musical critic, and a dear and intimate friend of Charles Dickens and his family. *We have no letters to him*, Mr. Chorley having destroyed all his correspondence before his death." In the *Autobiography, Memoir and Letters of Henry Fothergill Chorley*, edited by H. G. Hewlett (Bentley, 1873), vol. ii., pp. 161-166, 229-236, are printed six letters from Charles Dickens to Chorley dated between the years 1860 and 1867.

Page 407. The "lady who prefers to be anonymous," authoress of the "remarkable story" called *An Experience*, appears to be a

Miss Jolly (see British Museum Catalogue). Her contributions to *Household Words* and *All the Year Round* were republished in three volumes in 1875, under the title of *A Wife's Story and other Tales*, with three letters from Charles Dickens, dated in 1855 and 1869, the last referring to this very story, "An Experience."

For the more recondite matters which give the chief if not the sole value to a compilation of this kind, the reader will search this bulky *brochure* in vain. Nor is the record of more commonly known and accessible details anywhere thoroughly reliable either as to accuracy or completeness. And the sins of commission are as great and grievous as the sins of omission. Mr. Cook's unwieldy pamphlet may be said to resemble a waste ground, with a notice-board attracting the passer's eyes and bearing the legend, "Rubbish shot here." What can it avail a bibliographer of Dickens to know or to tell how this or that piratical dunce or dullard published an imitation or a continuation of the *Pickwick Papers*, of *Oliver Twist*, of *Nickleby*, or of *Dombey* (pp. 50-51); how an obscure would-be artist issued a worthless series of catch-penny "extra illustrations (pp. 17, *sqq.*) now so rare as to fetch ten times their original price" from the pockets of collectors "more enviable for superfluity of cash than commendable for sufficiency of understanding;" how such and such inept or inane Grubstreet garretteers attempted to solve the *Mystery of Edwin Drood* without having first solved the mysteries of English orthography and syntax (p. 51); how Mr. So-and-so, the notorious West-end

bookseller, foisted upon an unwary collector a made-up set of original editions, "elegantly bound by Pratt in his best manner," for five times their published price (pp. 48-49); or how Mr. This-or-that, his bibliopolic neighbour, administered a judicious and well-merited snubbing to the compiler by declining to answer an impertinent inquiry as to the names and addresses of private customers who had purchased sumptuously illustrated copies of Mr. Forster's Life of the novelist, and other curiosities (pp. 67, 72-73); or what were the titles of, and who were the contributors to, the Christmas numbers and "extra summer numbers" of the New Series of *All the Year Round*, under the conduct of Charles Dickens, junior (p. 60).

Mr. Cook's pamphlet is also disfigured by a considerable number of *errata*, which should be corrected in a future edition; *e.g. inter alia* :—

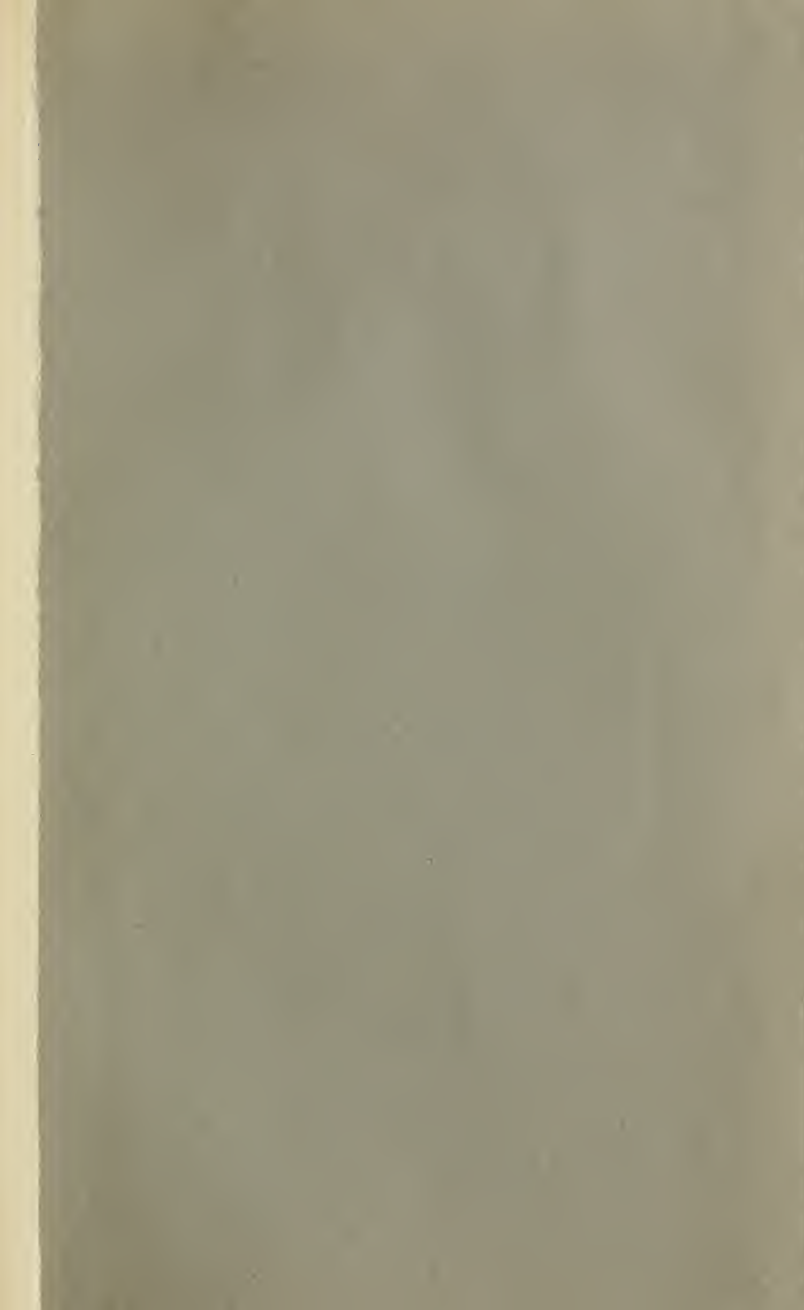
