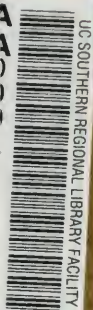

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PREFACE.

THE following Bibliography of Cumberland and Westmorland, and Lancashire North-of-the-Sands Dialect Literature has been compiled with a view of preserving and bringing up to date a list of the books and fugitive pieces that have been printed and published.

The Bibliographies of Cumberland and Westmorland Dialect Literature that have already been attempted previous to this are (1) John Russell Smith's "A Bibliographical List of the works that have been published towards illustrating the Provincial Dialects of England," London, 1839. This pamphlet contains notices of eighteen editions of nine books in the Cumberland Dialect, and five books in the Westmorland dialect; and (2) the List published by the English Dialect Society as prepared by the late Wm. Jackson, F.S.A., of St. Bees, and afterwards printed in the second volume of his "Cumberland and Westmorland Papers and Pedigrees." Edited by his wife. London, 1892.

It would be an endless task to attempt to enumerate the various dialect pieces that have appeared in the newspapers of Cumberland and Westmorland, and in "Notes and Queries," but as many as have come under my notice I have set out in detail.

The Dialect Literature of Westmorland is not nearly so extensive as that of Cumberland, but the books in the latter dialect circulate largely in the County of

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Westmorland. Mrs. Wheeler's Dialogues are admirable specimens of the Southern part of Westmorland. Clarke's "T' Reysh Bearin," &c., of the Appleby dialect, and Southey's "Terrible Knitters e' Dent" of the Western Border and Langdale Dialect.

The Dialect of these two counties, it is said, changes with each mile, and the language is difficult of understanding by people living six miles apart.

The subject of this small publication is one in which from its nature only a limited interest can be felt. But I venture to think that the more contributions of the kind published the sooner we shall realise the ideal, so long suggested by the Bibliographical Society, of a comprehensive National Bibliography.

The Rev. Jonathan Boucher died before any portion of his Dictionary was printed. Under the superintendence of his friend, Sir F. Morton Eden, the first portion containing the letter A was published in London in 1807, but no more was printed. It was again announced for publication under the editorship of the Rev. Joseph Hunter and Joseph Stevenson, Esq., in numbers at intervals of two months, an engagement never performed, for the first number appeared in 1832, and the second in 1833; the work was left unfinished.

Sir F. Morton Eden was the author of a playful satire entitled "The Vision," a poem addressed to the late Rev. Jonathan Boucher, London, 1828. A note on page 6 of this poem gives some idea of the spirit in which the poem was written:—"The learned Glossarist has incontrovertably proved that this great personage (*i.e.* Auld Nick) is no other than the northern Saint Nicholas. Indeed so tenacious is he of his Saint's pre-eminence, that he places him in the van of his Glossary; and Auld Nick must be looked for under the letter A; and not under the letter N."

"T' Sang o' Solomon" is interesting reading to Dialect-lovers, and is a forcible reminder of the great number of good old words that are rapidly passing out of use. As showing the manner in which the Rev. John Richardson did his work, I quote a few verses from the fourth chapter, which may be compared with the authorized version by the uninitiated.

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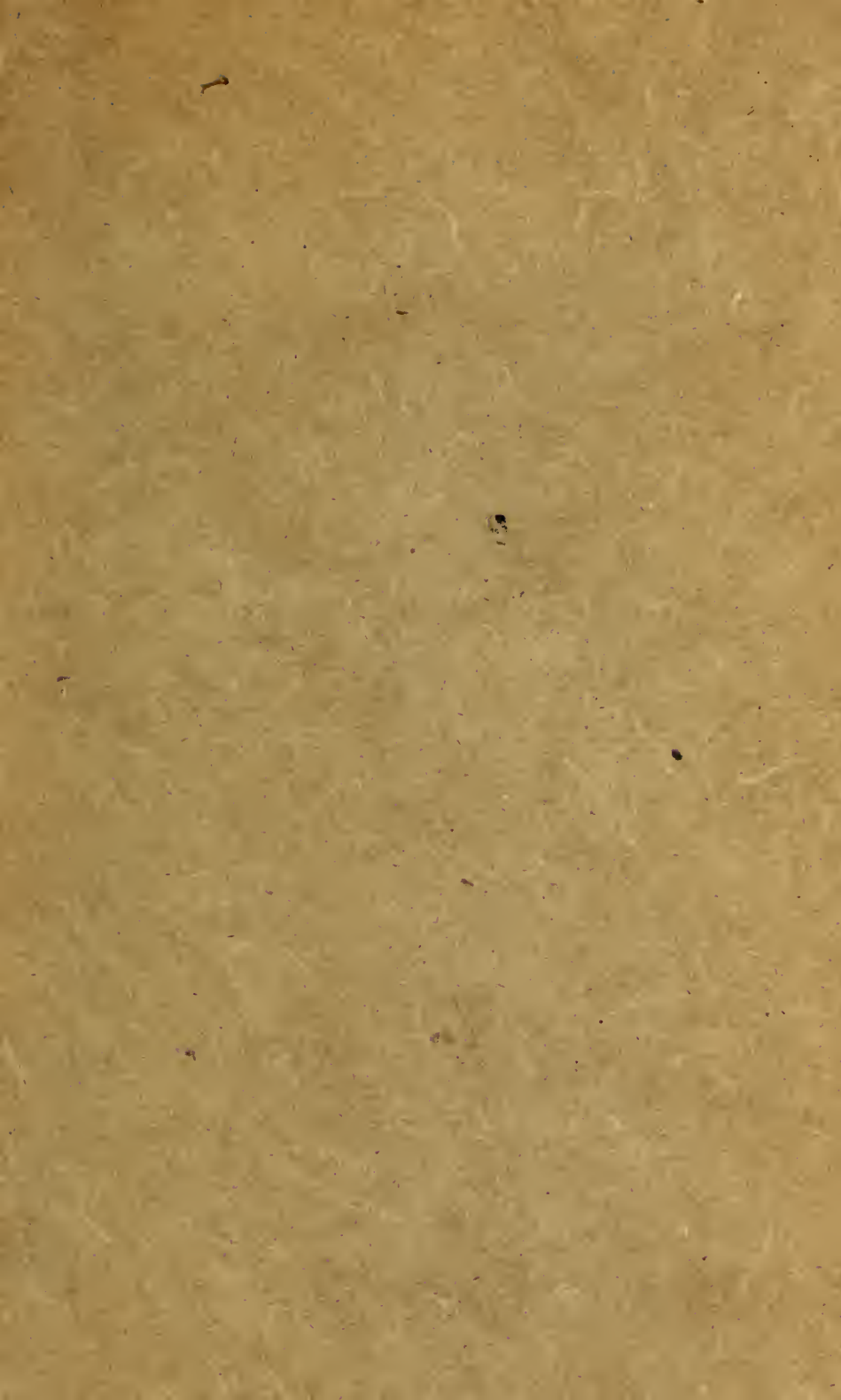
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
