# **Foreword**

This five volume report has been prepared for the Congress and the American people as required by Public Law 93–179.

With the filing of this report, the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration (ARBA) is terminated.

The five volumes contain the following information:

—Volume II (this volume): an appendix to Volume I which provides detailed lists and brief descriptions of officially endorsed projects; names of persons who served with various national, state and local Bicentennial groups; ARBA staff members; all the officially recognized Bicentennial Communities; tables detailing grant monies; details of federal agency participation; private sector involvement; lists of public information materials produced; and other such information. It includes a limited number of black and white photographs.

—Volume 1: a narrative account from nine perspectives, with color photographs, of America's Bicentennial celebration as it occurred.



—Volumes III, IV and V: a 56 section listing of Bicentennial activities in all the states, territories, the District of Columbia, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico and foreign countries.

The sections are arranged alphabetically, and each begins with a brief descriptive overview. Following this, the projects and events are listed by city. These activity summaries are based on information reported to the ARBA and contained in the automated Bicentennial Information Network (BINET) system.

These five volumes contain only those events and projects which were reported to, or otherwise came to the attention of, the ARBC or the ARBA. There were undoubtedly thousands more.

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American Revolution Bicentennial Commission: Public Law 89–491 created the American Revolution Bicentennial Commission (ARBC), July 4, 1966/44. Congress, during remainder of the ARBC's life, authorized and appropriated funds for its operation. Congress authorized striking commemorative Bicentennial medals and an official Bicentennial symbol, to be designed, and increased the number of ARBC members. A matching grant program for Bicentennial organizations in states and other political entities was established.

American Revolution Bicentennial Administration: December 11, 1973, Congress approved Public Law 93-179, abolishing the ARBC and establishing the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration (ARBA), effective January 11, 1974/48. John W. Warner confirmed by the Senate as ARBA administrator. Subsequently, Marjorie W. Lynch and Jean McKee confirmed as successive ARBA deputy administrators. Appropriations and matching grant funds to Bicentennial organizations in states, other political entities approved. ARBA ceased to exist on filing this final report, June 30, 1977.

The American Revolution Bicentennial Commission (ARBC) was officially established on July 4, 1966 when President Lyndon B. Johnson signed Public Law 89–491. It was to have 34 members.

Two basic responsibilities were outlined in the legislation: (1) to prepare and submit to the President an overall plan and program for a nationwide observance of the nation's 200th anniversary; and (2) following approval of the plan, to encourage, develop and coordinate its implementation.

Legislative amendments subsequently expanded the 34 member commission to a total of 50. Half the members were appointed by the President from private life; half were members of Congress and other designated public officials.

The ARBC was in operation until January 11, 1974, when it was replaced by the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration (ARBA), as mandated by Public Law 93–179.

The following chronology lists the major activities and events associated with the ARBC during its seven year existence. A more detailed account of these activities can be found in Volume I, Chapter 9 of this report.

#### 1966

July 4—Public Law 89–491, signed by President Johnson, established the ARBC.

#### 1967

January 18—President Johnson appointed the first members.

January 23—Carlisle H. Humelsine, president of Colonial Williamsburg, was appointed the first chairman by the President.

February 22—At its first meeting, the ARBC agreed to write a legislative amendment to include the secretary of commerce as an ex officio member of the ARBC. Public Law 90–187, passed December 12, authorized the addition of the secretary of commerce to the ARBC.

#### 1968

July 9—Congress authorized an appropriation of \$150,000 for the staff and operations of the ARBC (Public Law 90–392). Of that, \$73,000 was expended. The remainder was carried through to the next fiscal year.

October 9—Richard W. Barrett was chosen as executive director at the second meeting of the ARBC.



#### 1969

January 14—Chairman Humelsine and all appointed members of the ARBC submitted their resignations to the President-elect, Richard M. Nixon, in accordance with a resolution adopted at their October 1968 meeting to permit the incoming President to appoint a new commission of his own choosing.

July 3—President Nixon appointed a new commission (seven members of the former commission were reappointed). Dr. J. E. Wallace Sterling, chancellor of Stanford University, was named chairman. Mr. Humelsine was appointed as vice-chairman. Richard W. Barrett resigned. He was replaced as executive director by Melbourne L. Spector, who was detailed to the ARBC by the U.S. Department of State.

Humelsine (right) with Winthrop Rockefeller, former chairman of the board of the Colonial Williamsburg Foundation July 4—The comprehensive report and recommendations of the ARBC were submitted to the President, as required by law. Three basic guidelines and three themes for the national celebration were outlined.

The guidelines were as follows: (1) the Bicentennial should be national in scope; (2) the celebration should extend from 1970 to 1987, with 1976 the focal

year and July 4, 1976 the focal date; and (3) the Bicentennial should be a time for Americans to review and reaffirm the basic principles on which the nation was founded.

The themes were: (1) *Heritage '76;* (2) *Open House USA* (later changed to *Festival USA);* and (3) *Horizons '76.* 

July 6—Dr. Sterling resigned as chairman. At the request of the President, he continued to serve as chairman emeritus.

September 11—The President transmitted the ARBC report to the Congress with his strong endorsement. He added that he had instructed the secretary of state to proceed with registration procedures for an international exposition, to be held in Philadelphia as part of the Bicentennial observance.

On the same day, he named David J. Mahoney, chairman of the board and chief executive officer of Norton Simon, Inc., as ARBC chairman.

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January 22-The Bureau of International Expositions approved the registration of the proposed Philadelphia international exposition.

February 4-The ARBC, meeting in San Francisco, resolved to adopt the national Bicentennial symbol developed by the design firm of Chermayeff and Geismar, New York, New York.

July 3—In a ceremony televised nationwide from the National Archives in Washington, D.C., President Nixon, Chief Justice of the United States Warren E. Burger and Speaker of the House Carl A. Albert officially announced the opening of the Bicentennial Era.

July 4—The national Bicentennial symbol made its appearance in public on the first of a series of U.S. Bicentennial commemorative postage stamps.

October 8—Chairman Mahoney announced the opening of ARBC regional offices in Atlanta, Boston, Chicago and San Francisco, the first of 10 such offices established to help assure nationwide participation in the Bicentennial observance. By October 28, 1973, all 10 were in operation. The other six were located in New York, Philadelphia, Dallas, Kansas City, Denver and Seattle.

November 8-Melbourne Spector was recalled to the U.S. Department of State. Chairman Mahoney named Jack I.

LeVANT acting executive director.

December 10-Niagara Falls, New York became the first officially recognized Bicentennial City under the multi-city concept outlined by the ARBC in the 1970 Report to the President.

#### 1972

February 15-With the approval of Public Law 92-228, the U.S. Mint was authorized to strike a series of official Bicentennial commemorative medals. The sale of these medals provided revenue which the ARBC (and later the ARBA) used to help fund Bicentennial projects across the nation.

February 21-At a joint meeting of the ARBC and the state Bicentennial commissions, Chairman Mahoney unveiled a prototype model of a Bicentennial park to be developed under a proposed Bicentennial park plan. Developed as an alternative to the proposed international exposition, the plan was designed to help create a park in each state to serve as the focus of Bicentennial participation.

April 21-Jack I. LeVANT was sworn in as executive director of the ARBC by Chief Justice Burger.

May 16—Faced with negative citizen reaction and a mounting projected budget for the proposed international exposition in Philadelphia, the ARBC voted unanimously to pursue the project no further.

May 22—The President informed Congress that he "reluctantly" concurred with the ARBC's negative recommendation concerning the Philadelphia exposition. This marked the end of a single site focus in Bicentennial planning. The Bureau of International Expositions accepted the withdrawal of the U.S. application at its May 25 meeting.

July 4—President Nixon, through the U.S. ambassadors, issued an *Invitation* to the World to visit the United States during the Bicentennial and urged Americans to open their hearts and homes and communities to welcome visitors. The nation itself was to be the exposition in 1976.

The first of the annual series of five ARBC Philatelic/Numismatic Combinations (PNC) was released for sale to the public at a stamp cancellation ceremony in Williamsburg, Virginia. The group of four stamps honored American craftsmen, while the medal honored George Washington. The PNC sold for \$5.00.

August 1—Executive Director LeVANT resigned. Hugh A. Hall was appointed acting executive director by Chairman Mahoney.

November 15—The ARBC decided that its role would be one of coordination and encouragement of Bicentennial activities. "It shall be the policy of the ARBC to assume operational responsibility for a particular program only when specifically authorized by Congress" (Resolution No. 28–72). This policy was later incorporated in the legislation establishing the ARBA (Public Law 93–179).

#### 1973

February 1—The President sent a message to Congress requesting legislation to replace the ARBC with the ARBA. Chairman Mahoney and Vice-Chairman Hobart Lewis joined him in urging speedy congressional approval.

March 26—The ARBC approved the Bicentennial Communities Program, thus providing a framework within which communities could participate in the national observance. The communities program was officially announced by Acting Executive Director Hall at the U.S. Conference of Mayors' national conference in July 1973. By July 4, 1976, the number of officially designated Bicentennial Communities had reached a total of 11.739.

April 23-Operation Sail-OPSAIL '76, a project that became the centerpiece for the July 4, 1976 weekend, was approved and officially recognized by the ARBC.

May 15-The ARBC voted not to pursue the Bicentennial parks plan. An independent study commissioned by the ARBC had found that the concept was feasible but difficult to accomplish within the time remaining before 1976. In addition, it was anticipated that 1.5 billion federal dollars would be required to complete the program.

At this same meeting, the ARBC announced that it would make available matching grants from nonappropriated funds to assist the official Bicentennial organizations of the states, territories, District of Columbia and Commonwealth of Puerto Rico in funding specific projects.

July 3—The Bicentennial Information Network (BINET) was inaugurated by the ARBC. This computerized master calendar logged 66,484 projects and

events by December 31, 1976.

December 4—Chairman Mahoney signed the last ARBC action, which recognized the program of the Girl Scouts of the U.S.A.

December 11—The Congress approved Public Law 93-179, abolishing the ARBC and establishing the ARBA, to become effective January 11, 1974.

1974

January 11--The President signed Public Law 93-179, making effective the dissolution of the ARBC and the establishment of the ARBA.

#### **ARBC Executive Committee**

On October 9, 1968, the ARBC authorized the chairman to appoint members to an executive committee, to meet at his discretion. During the next two years, due to major changes in personnel of the ARBC and delays in congressional funding, only an ad hoc executive committee, concerned primarily with procedural matters and the formation of a more permanent committee, was in being. In February 1971, a complete reorganization of the ARBC administrative structure was approved at a meeting of the full commission, and a formal executive






#### **ARBC Staff**

Although the ARBC was established with the approval of Public Law 89-491 on July 4, 1966, there were no funds immediately available to employ staff. In October 1968, Richard W. Barrett was chosen as the first ARBC executive

director, a staff of one. By January 11, 1974, when the ARBC was replaced by the ARBA, the number of staff had grown to approximately 80. The staff organization of the ARBC is outlined in the following chart.

#### **American Revolution Bicentennial Commission**




## The ARBC's Legacy

In January 1974, the ARBA replaced the ARBC. This change was made to provide for rapid and decisive action impossible to achieve within the commission structure but necessary to attain the goals set by the ARBC.

Despite difficulties, the ARBC's achievements were considerable. With its encouragement, Bicentennial organizations were established by each state, territory, the District of Columbia and the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico. A program to involve local communities was initiated. Commemorative Medals and Philatelic/Numismatic Combination Programs were well underway, and revenues were being used to fund the various Bicentennial entities. Basic themes and criteria for recognition of national programs, the design of a national Bicentennial symbol and the development of a number of major programs within each theme area were a part of the legacy bequeathed to the ARBA.

Efforts to launch a major international exposition in Philadelphia had failed, but that failure gave rise to the concept of the nation as the exposition. While the persons, places and events of the American Revolution provided a starting point for Bicentennial planning, the ARBC broadened the scope of the national observance by emphasizing the ideas and ideals of the American Revolution as a basis for entering the third century of national life.

The American Revolution Bicentennial Administration (ARBA) was established as an independent agency within the executive branch of the government by Public Law 93-179, enacted December 11, 1973, effective January 11, 1974. Congress created the ARBA to coordinate, facilitate and aid in scheduling Bicentennial events, activities and projects of local, state, regional, national and international significance. It was enjoined to draw upon the resources of public, private, civic and other organizations for planning and implementation to insure that appropriate observances would take place. It was also specifically directed to provide a Bicentennial master calendar or register of programs and projects occurring between March 1975 and December 31, 1976.

Hugh A. Hall, who had been acting executive director of the American

Revolution Bicentennial Commission (ARBC), was named acting administrator of the ARBA and served until John W. Warner was appointed the ARBA administrator by President Richard M. Nixon. Warner was sworn in the 11th of April, 1974.

Public Law 93–179 also established an 11 member American Revolution Bicentennial Board and a 25 member American Revolution Bicentennial Advisory Council.

#### **ARB Board**

The American Revolution Bicentennial Board, which held its first meeting on July 17, 1974, provided policy guidance and direction to the ARBA. As provided by law, members of the Board were: the administrator of the ARBA. two members of the House of Representatives, two members of the Senate, the chairman and the vice-chairman of the ARB Advisory Council, the secretary of the interior and three members appointed by the President from officers or staff of the Bicentennial organizations of the states, territories. District of Columbia and Commonwealth of Puerto Rico.

#### **Board Powers**

Public Law 93–179 empowered the Board to:

"(1) receive advice and information from the [ARB Advisory] Council and the Administrator with respect to the development of policy and guidelines to carry out the purposes of this Act; and

"(2) give final approval to grants to be made under the authority of Section 9 of this Act; and

"(3) review, approve, disapprove, or ratify from time to time, all basic policy and guidelines, including the proposed annual budget to be presented by the administrator, in carrying out the purposes of this Act."

Evans, Michigan American Revolution Bicentennial Commission and member of the ARB Board The 25 members of the American Revolution Bicentennial Advisory Council were named by President Gerald R. Ford on January 20, 1975. They were selected to be broadly representative of the nation and were to advise the administrator of the ARBA on matters relating to the Bicentennial. By law, the administrator was an ex officio member of the Advisory Council.

The first meeting of the Council was held in Washington, D.C. on February 24 and 25, 1975, in conjunction with the ARBA National Bicentennial Conference. At that time, David L.

Wolper was elected to serve as chairman and Ann Hawkes Hutton to serve as vice-chairman. By virtue of these positions, they also served on the ARB Board.

Subsequent meetings in 1975 were held on April 7 in Tucson, Arizona, in connection with the opening there of the ARBA-sponsored exhibit, *USA '76: The First Two Hundred Years;* June 2 in Washington, D.C.; September 11 in Denver, Colorado; and October 30 in Washington, D.C., in a joint session with the ARB Board. In 1976, the Council met on March 3 in New York City in connection with the U.S. opening of the ARBA-sponsored exhibit, *The World of* 

Franklin and Jefferson, and on June 28 in Washington, D.C. At this last meeting, the Council agreed that further meetings would not be held unless the chairman determined they were necessary.

#### **Council Contributions**

Among the major contributions of the Council were: the development of a set of nine recommendations outlining a national program of celebration for the Bicentennial weekend, which included four days of celebrations beginning on July 2 and ending on July 5, at least one show of unity through a national prayer or bell-ringing activity, and Sunday, July 4 as the focal day of the weekend; and encouragement of the development of the national ceremony at the National Archives. This ceremony highlighted the basic documents of American democracy—the Declaration of Independence, the Constitution and the Bill of Rights-and involved the President and Vice President, the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the Chief Justice of the United States.

#### The ARBA Chronology

The following chronology highlights the major activities and events associated with the ARBA from its establishment through June 1977, when this final report was filed.

#### 1974

January 11—The ARBA began operations as the official government Bicentennial coordinating agency in accordance with the provisions of Public Law 93–179. Hugh A. Hall was named acting administrator.

April 11—John W. Warner, former secretary of the navy, was sworn in as administrator of the ARBA by Vice President Ford. He had been appointed by President Nixon on March 11, 1974 and confirmed unanimously by the Senate on March 13.

June 27–28—A conference of leaders of ethnic and racial groups was hosted by the ARBA in Washington, D.C. As a result of the meeting, the 80 participants established an independent Bicentennial Ethnic/Racial Coalition (BERC). This organization expanded and continued to work throughout the Bicentennial period, with ARBA support, to help insure appropriate involvement in the national observance by ethnic and racial groups.

July 1—The ARBA established a special field office in Denver, Colorado to aid participation by Native Americans in the Bicentennial.

July 17—As required by law, the American Revolution Bicentennial Board was set up to provide policy guidance and direction to the ARBA.

August 22—The ARB Board approved guidelines under which the administrator was empowered to authorize the use of the national Bicentennial symbol. Also approved was a licensing program under which use of the symbol on educational

and commemorative items for sale could be authorized by the administrator. Royalties from the sale of these items were to be used to support Bicentennial programs.

October 2-The ARB Board issued guidelines for and approved matching grants for the states, territories, District of Columbia and Commonwealth of Puerto Rico for their Bicentennial programs. Up to \$240,000 was to be made available to each of the 50 states and \$230,000 each to the three territories, the District of Columbia and the Commonealth of Puerto Rico. Of these amounts, the Congress had authorized \$200,000 in appropriated funds for allocation to each entity, for a total of \$11 million. The remaining funds came from money raised through the sale of official Bicentennial medals. Each state received \$40,000, the other entities \$30,000 each. In subsequent actions, the Board authorized three additional \$40,000 grants for each entity, to come from nonappropriated funds.

November 8—The ARBA announced the *Bicentennial Colleges and Universities Campus Program* through which campuses could obtain official recognition for their Bicentennial efforts. The program was modeled on the highly successful *Bicentennial Communities Program* begun by the ARBC in 1973. By the close of the program on June 3, 1976, 929 campuses had received official Bicentennial recognition.

## 1975

January 2—Public Law 93-617 was signed, naming the ARBA the only

federal agency authorized to have official national medals struck in gold. The ARBA announced that the 1976 national Bicentennial medal would be struck by the U.S. Mint in gold, as well as in silver and bronze.

January 10—The ARBA-sponsored Bicentennial exhibit, *The World of Franklin and Jefferson,* opened at the Grand Palais in Paris. During 1975 and 1976, the exhibit was also seen in Warsaw, London, New York, Chicago and Los Angeles. In 1977, it was shown in Mexico City.

January 20—President Ford named the 25 members of the American Revolution Bicentennial Advisory Council.

January 24—Marjorie W. Lynch, former associate director for domestic and anti-poverty operations for ACTION, was sworn in as deputy administrator of the ARBA by Vice President Nelson A. Rockefeller.

February 24–25—The ARBA sponsored a National Bicentennial Conference in Washington, D.C. Representatives of the 50 state, three territorial, District of Columbia and Commonwealth of Puerto Rico Bicentennial organizations, as well as representatives of major national organizations and corporations, participated.

The ARB Advisory Council held its first meeting in conjunction with the National Bicentennial Conference. David L. Wolper was elected chairman and Ann Hawkes Hutton vice-chairman of the Council. By reason of their positions on the Council, they automatically became members of the ARB Board.

February 25—The ARBA announced the formation of the National Bicentennial Service Alliance to encourage participation by fraternal, service and civic organizations in the Bicentennial observance.

March 4—The ARB Board approved a one-time-only *National Grants Program* to provide matching grants for meritorious Bicentennial projects developed by nonprofit organizations. Sixty-five grants were provided from nonappropriated funds in the amount of \$924,677. (For administrative purposes, this program was later incorporated into the national/international programmatic grants program.)

May 5—The National Bicentennial Hospitality Alliance was announced to provide encouragement and recognition to organizations conducting hospitality and visitor exchange programs.

May 14—The Bicentennial Armed Forces Installations and Commands Program was announced by the U.S. Department of Defense and the ARBA on Armed Forces Day. This program was similar in purpose and intent to the communities and college campuses programs. By the close of the program on June 3, 1976, 599 military commands and installations had received official Bicentennial designation.

May 19—Administrator Warner announced new guidelines authorizing a wider display of the Bicentennial flag. He expressed his "fervent hope that the Bicentennial flag will fly from every building, house and flagpole in the country to proclaim our Nation's 200th Anniversary."

May 21–22—The National Bicentennial Consultation on Religion and the American Experience, sponsored jointly by the ARBA and *Project Forward '76*, brought together some 200 religious leaders from 90 national religious and interreligious organizations. The purpose of the meeting, held in Washington, D.C., was

to stimulate interest in the Bicentennial observance and to provide a forum for an exchange of ideas about Bicentennial efforts in the religious community.

June 24—The ARBA was authorized by the Department of Commerce to approve nearly \$2 million in Title X job-impact grants for 16 Bicentennial projects. The ARBA was eventually authorized to approve a total of \$16 million in Title X funds, disbursed by the Department of Commerce for 118 Bicentennial projects across the nation.

June 30—A National Bicentennial Ethnic/Racial Alliance was formed to encourage the efforts of ethnic, racial and cultural organizations whose Bicentennial programs reflected the plurality, variety and diversity of American society.

August 4—An official ARBA advisory committee on ethnic, racial and Native American participation in the nation's Bicentennial was appointed by the administrator. It held its first meeting in Washington, D.C. on August 11.

September 2—The ARBA announced the formation of the National Bicentennial Sports Alliance to encourage and provide recognition of the participation of national sports organizations in the Bicentennial.

November 10—The ARBA announced the formation of the National Bicentennial Business Alliance to provide recognition of the efforts of businesses involved, as a public service, in multistate Bicentennial programs which went beyond their normal business operations.

December 4—The ARB Board authorized the administrator to permit broader use of the official Bicentennial symbol at his discretion, including public service uses.

1976

January 9—The ARBA announced the establishment of the *National Bicentennial Media Recognition Program* to provide official recognition of media organizations making special Bicentennial efforts.

March 3—Jean McKee, former administrative assistant to Senator Jacob K. Javits (R-NY), was sworn in as deputy administrator to replace Marjorie Lynch, who had left the ARBA post November 13, 1975 to become under secretary of health, education and welfare. Miss McKee was confirmed by the Senate March 1.

April 22—The ARBA announced the opening of a Bicentennial Weekend Media Information Center at 736 Jackson Place, N.W. in Washington, D.C. The center remained in operation through the Bicentennial weekend, providing dates, times and locations of major events taking place from July 2–5.

July 2—The Bicentennial weekend opened in Washington, D.C. with the *National Tribute to the Documents of Democracy* at the National Archives. The President, the Vice President, the Chief Justice of the United States and the Speaker of the House of Representatives participated in the ceremonies. More than 25,000 people signed the register of visitors to the National Archives during the 76 hour vigil which followed the ceremony.

July 4—Citizens of the United States and friends throughout the world celebrated the nation's 200th anniversary.

September 15—The ARB Board set aside an amount not to exceed \$500,000 to present a fitting national monument in Washington, D.C., dedicated to the 56 signers of the Declaration of Independence.

September 30—John W. Warner resigned as administrator of the ARBA. Jean McKee was named acting ARBA administrator by President Ford. Hugh A. Hall became acting deputy administrator.

#### 1977

January 11—The ARB Board approved the use of nonappropriated funds for final matching grants of \$17,000 to each of the 55 entities.

June 30—The ARBA filed its final report to the people and the Congress in accordance with Public Law 93–179. The offices of the ARBA were officially closed as of 5:30 EDST that Thursday.



Following are biographical sketches of the administrator, acting administrators and deputy administrators of the ARBA.

Honorable John W. Warner Administrator American Revolution Bicentennial Administration

John W. Warner, former secretary of the navy, was sworn in on the steps of the Capitol on April 11, 1974 by Vice President Gerald R. Ford as the first administrator of the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration. Mr. Warner received the Presidential appointment on March 11, 1974 and was confirmed unanimously by the Senate on March 13, 1974. Mr. Warner resigned as the ARBA administrator on September 30, 1976.

While serving in the Navy Secretariat, he represented the Department of Defense at international conferences on the law of the sea. Furthermore, the President designated him head of the U.S. delegation which met in Moscow in October 1971 and again in Washington, D.C. in May 1972 to discuss incidents at sea between U.S. and Soviet naval units. While Secretary of the Navy, Mr. Warner was a member of the Presidential party at the Moscow summit meeting and signed, on behalf of the United States government, the

Executive Agreement on Incidents at Sea between the United States and the Soviet Union on May 25, 1972.

On February 11, 1969, he was appointed under secretary of the navy and subsequently was appointed secretary of the navy. He is the first under secretary and secretary of the navy in history to have had active service in the uniform of both the Navy and Marine Corps. For his nearly four years' service as under secretary and then secretary of the navy, Mr. Warner received the Department of Defense Distinguished Public Service Medal on January 10, 1973 from the then Secretary of Defense, Melvin R. Laird.

Previous to his service with the Navy, Mr. Warner had been in private law practice and had served as an assistant U.S. attorney for the District of Columbia.

Mr. Warner received his early education in the public schools in Washington, D.C and has a B.S. degree from Washington and Lee University and an LL.B. degree from the University of Virginia Law School. He served on the Board of Trustees of Washington and Lee University.

Mr. Warner maintains his legal residence in the state of Virginia on his farm near Middleburg in the Shenandoah Valley. He was born February 18, 1927 in Washington, D.C. His father was the late Dr. John W. Warner, a physician, whose family came from Amherst, Virginia. His mother, Martha (Budd) Warner, came from St. Louis, Missouri.

Mr. Warner is the father of two daughters, Mary and Virginia, and a son, John IV. Honorable Marjorie W. Lynch

Marjorie Lynch served as deputy administrator of the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration from January 24, 1975 to November 13, 1975, when she was named by President Ford as the under secretary of health, education and welfare.

From 1971 to 1974, Mrs. Lynch served with ACTION—two years as regional director in Seattle, Washington and one year in Washington as an associate director. ACTION is the umbrella agency responsible for the administration of all federally funded volunteer programs previously located in a variety of government departments, including the Peace Corps, VISTA and Foster Grandparents.

She served 10 years (1961–1971) in the Washington State Legislature, five of those years as chairman of the Higher Education Committee. Her legislative record includes: establishing a new system of community colleges; group homes for the mentally retarded; licensing child care agencies; mandatory education for the handicapped; state scholarship programs; and particular concern for the problems of mental retardation, mental health and child abuse.

During the 25 years she resided in Yakima, Washington, Mrs. Lynch was active in many community services, including the Red Cross, Heart Association, Chamber of Commerce and various other social and medical service groups.

Mrs. Lynch is a native of London, England, coming to the United States in 1945. She became a U.S. citizen in 1948, settling in Yakima. During World War II, she was an officer in the British Women's Auxiliary Air Force, serving in an RAF front line station during the Battle of Britain. She also served with the American Red Cross in London and Paris as a home service worker.

Mrs. Lynch still maintains an avid interest in aviation, having traveled at twice the speed of sound while flying in an Air Force F-106 in 1969. Her other interests include horse breeding and training, the theater, literature and tennis. She has three daughters: Mrs. Valerie (Putnam) Barber of Tacoma and Ms. Daphne Lynch and Ms. Teresa Lynch, both of Yakima.

Honorable Jean McKee
Deputy, Subsequently
Acting, Administrator

On September 30, 1976, President Ford named Jean McKee acting administrator of the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration. She had served as deputy administrator since March 2, 1976. In that job, she shared responsibility with the administrator for the day-to-day operations of the federal Bicentennial agency, assisting in the coordination of state and local Bicentennial efforts through the ARBA's 10 regional offices.

Prior to joining the Bicentennial team, Miss McKee served as administrative assistant to Senator Jacob K. Javits of New York, the first woman to hold that position. She coordinated the work of Senator Javits' four offices—the Senate office in Washington, D.C., as well as three state offices. Miss McKee joined Senator Javits' New York staff in 1967 and moved to Washington, D.C. in 1969.

Previously she worked on the staff of Governor Nelson A. Rockefeller, and for seven years she was a commissioner with the New York State Bingo Control Commission, which set policy and regulations for and oversaw the operations of bingo games that brought to charities over \$144 million annually.

Miss McKee has also worked for Radio Free Europe, as a researcher for a private research organization and as a founding partner and treasurer of a political consulting and polling organization. Miss McKee can count at least 16 members of her family who fought in the Revolutionary War. Typical of them was Andrew McClary, who left his plow in the field to join Revolutionary troops in Medford, New Hampshire, becoming a major. He was killed at Bunker Hill and was eulogized by Daniel Webster as "the handsomest man in the army, the favorite of New Hampshire troops."

While preparing for her future endeavors in political and government service, Miss McKee was active in various community organizations such as the Visiting Nurse Association, the Brooklyn Home for Children and the League of Women Voters, as well as her college and school alumnae associations. In addition, she was elected the first woman president of the Association of New York State Young Republican Clubs, a 30 year old, 40,000 member organization.

Since earning her political science degree from Vassar College in Poughkeepsie, New York in 1951, Miss McKee has been active in government and political affairs at local, state and national levels. She is a long-time supporter of conservation and preservation efforts. She is a member of the National Trust for Historic Preservation and the Friends of Central and Prospect Parks. She serves on the Board of the Women's National Education Fund and is an active member of Executive Women in Government.

Hugh A. Hall
Acting Administrator and
Assistant Administrator for

Hugh A. Hall was named by President Nixon to be acting administrator of the newly established ARBA from January 11, 1974 to April 11, 1974, when John W. Warner was sworn in as administrator. He continued to serve the ARBA as assistant administrator for states, communities and programs for the remainder of the Bicentennial period.

Mr. Hall became involved in planning the national Bicentennial observance in 1969 when he was called upon to assist the ARBC in evaluating proposals from Boston, Miami, Philadelphia and Washington, D.C. for an international exposition as part of the U.S. Bicentennial. He also served as consultant and liaison to the ARBC on U.S. proposals to host the Summer Olympics in Los Angeles and the Winter Olympics in Denver. In December 1969, he was appointed deputy executive director of the ARBC.

His experience as celebration director of the San Diego 200th anniversary observance and as consultant to the Wichita Centennial, the ARBC of California, the Monterey Bicentennial Commission and the Gothenberg, Sweden 350th anniversary observance

furnished a broad background for his new ARBC duties.

As deputy executive director, he was responsible for establishing a Coins and Medals Advisory Panel. He participated in congressional hearings leading to the enabling legislation allowing for the *Bicentennial Commemorative Medals Program*, the chief source of nonappropriated funds available to the ARBC and later the ARBA, to be used in supporting worthy Bicentennial projects throughout the nation.

In August 1972, upon the resignation of Jack I. LeVANT as executive director of the ARBC, Mr. Hall was named acting executive director, a post he filled until the ARBC was replaced by the ARBA in January 1974. Under his direction, the ARBC assisted in the formation of the Bicentennial organizations of the states, territories, District of Columbia and Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, established 10 regional offices and developed the highly successful *Bicentennial Communities Program.* 

Born in Durham, North Carolina in 1926, Mr. Hall served in the U.S. Navy in World War II. After the war, he set out upon a career in marketing and sales promotion in Arizona and later in California. Throughout his successful business career, he found time to participate in community activities, providing leadership to a variety of organized efforts for community betterment.

Mr. Hall and his wife, V. Elaine, have a son, Stephen, who is news producer and director for KGTV in San Diego, and a daughter, Linda, who resides with her husband, Sergeant William B. Arthington, in Berlin, Germany.

## Legislative Histories

44 American Revolution Bicentennial Commission: Public Law 89-491 created the American Revolution Bicentennial Commission (ARBC), July 4, 1966. Congress, during remainder of the ARBC's life, authorized and appropriated funds for its operation. Congress authorized striking commemorative Bicentennial medals and an official Bicentennial symbol, to be designed, and increased the number of ARBC members. A matching grant program to Bicentennial organizations in states and other political entities was established.

> American Revolution Bicentennial Administration: December 11, 1973, Congress approved Public Law 93-179, abolishing the ARBC and establishing the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration (ARBA), effective January 11, 1974. John W. Warner confirmed by the Senate as ARBA administrator. Subsequently, Marjorie W. Lynch and Jean McKee confirmed as successive ARBA deputy administrators. Appropriations and matching grant funds to Bicentennial organizations in states, other political entities approved. ARBA ceased to exist on filing this final report, June 30, 1977.

Legislative History of the American Revolution Bicentennial Commission March 10, 1966–January 11, 1974

#### 1966

March 10—In a message to Congress, President Lyndon B. Johnson proposed creation of a national Bicentennial commission and recommended an authorization of \$200,000.

July 4—Public Law 89–491 created the American Revolution Bicentennial Commission (ARBC). Authorization of funds was deleted.

March 15—Representatives of the ARBC appeared before the Subcommittee on Interior and Related Agencies of the House Committee on Appropriations to request an appropriation of \$6.7 million for fiscal year 1973.

April 13—Representatives of the ARBC appeared before Subcommittee Number II of the House Judiciary Committee to justify the fiscal year 1973 authorization of \$6.712 million.

April 10—Representatives of the ARBC appeared before the Subcommittee on Interior and Related Agencies of the Senate Committee on Appropriations in support of the ARBC's fiscal year 1973 supplemental appropriations, to run from February 16, 1973 to June 30, 1973.

May 2—Representatives of the ARBC appeared before the Subcommittee on Consumer Affairs of the House Committee on Banking and Currency in support of H.R. 5244, a bill to authorize, for dollars and half-dollars, a new coinage design and date emblematic of the American Revolution Bicentennial.

May 16—Representatives of the ARBC appeared before the Subcommittee on Interior and Related Agencies of the House Committee on Appropriations in support of the ARBC fiscal year 1974 appropriations request of \$7.1 million. July 1—Public Law 93–50 authorized a supplemental appropriation for fiscal year 1973 of \$2.868 million through June 30, 1973, of which an amount not to exceed \$1.2 million was to be made available for state grants-in-aid, to remain available until expended.

July 1—Public Law 93–52 authorized continuing appropriations for fiscal year 1974 to September 30, 1973 (H.J. Res. 636).


July 11—Representatives of the ARBC appeared before the Subcommittee on Federal Charters, Holidays, and Celebrations of the Senate Committee on the Judiciary in support of H.R. 7446, a bill to establish the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration (with a fiscal year 1974 authorization of \$10 million).

October 4—Public Law 93–118 authorized continuing appropriations for fiscal year 1974 to October 11, 1973 (H.J. Res. 753).

October 16—Public Law 93–124 authorized continuing appropriations for fiscal year 1974 to "the sine die adjournment of the first session of the 93rd Congress" (H.J. Res. 727).

## Public Law 93-179 93rd Congress, H.R. 7446 December 11, 1973

## An Act

To establish the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That as this Nation approaches the bicentennial of its birth and the historic events preceding and associated with the American Revolution which are of such major significance in the development of our national heritage of individual liberty, representative government, and the attainment of equal and inalienable rights and which also had so profound an influence throughout the world, it is appropriate and desirable to provide for the observance and commemoration of this anniversary and for those activities of local, State, National, and international significance to be coordinated, scheduled, and facilitated by a governmental unit, drawing on the resources of public, private, civic, and other organizations for planning and implementation, to insure that the appropriate observances take place.

SEC. 2. (a) There is hereby established an independent establishment to be known as the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration (hereinafter referred to as the "Administration") to coordinate, to facilitate, and to aid in the scheduling of events, activities, and projects of local, State, National, and international significance sponsored by both governmental and nongovernmental entities in commemoration of the American Revolution Bicentennial.

(b) The Administration shall be headed by an Administrator (hereinafter referred to as the "Administrator") who shall be nominated by the President within sixty days after the effective date of this Act and appointed by and with advice and consent of the Senate. The Administrator shall serve at the pleasure of the President and shall be compensated at the rate now or hereafter prescribed for offices or positions at level III of the Executive Schedule.

(c) The President shall appoint a Deputy Administrator by and with the advice and consent of the Senate who shall be compensated at the rate now or hereafter prescribed for offices or positions at level IV of the Executive Schedule. The Deputy Administrator shall perform such duties as the Administrator may prescribe. The Deputy Administrator shall act for and perform the functions of the Administrator during any absence or disability of the Administrator or during a vacancy in the office of the Administrator.

(d) The Administrator shall have power to appoint and fix the compensation of such personnel as he deems advisable, however, not more than five such appointments may be placed in grades GS-16, GS-17, and GS-18, to carry out the functions of the Administration. The authority with reference to appointments in grades GS-16, GS-17, and GS-18 will be subject to the procedures prescribed under section 5108 of title 5 of the United States Code, and shall continue only for the duration of the exercise of functions of the Administration. The Administrator shall have power to appoint such advisory committees as he deems necessary.

(e) The Administrator may procure services as authorized by section 3109, of title 5, United States Code.

(f) The Administrator, to such extent as he deems necessary, may procure supplies, services, and personal property; make contracts; expend funds appropriated, donated, or received in pursuance of contracts hereunder in furtherance of the purposes of this Act; and exercise those powers that are necessary to enable him to carry out efficiently and in the public interest the purposes of this Act.

to budgeting, accounting, financial reporting, personnel, and procurement) shall be provided the Administration by the Department of the Interior, for which payment shall be made in advance, or by reimbursement, from funds of the Administration in such amounts as may be agreed upon by the Administrator and the Secretary of the Interior: Provided, That the regulations of the Department of the Interior for the collection of indebtedness of personnel resulting from erroneous payments made to or on behalf of an Administration employee and regulations of said Secretary for the administrative control of funds (31 U.S.C. 665(g)) shall apply to appropriations of the Administration: And provided further, That the Administrator shall not be required to prescribe such regulations.

(h) Any property acquired by the Administration and which remains upon its termination shall be transferred to the Secretary of the Interior for use by him under section 7(b) of this Act, or shall be disposed of by the Secretary as excess or surplus property as other-

wise provided by law.

(i) Whoever, except as authorized under rules and regulations issued by the Administrator, knowingly manufactures, reproduces, or uses any logos, symbols, or marks originated under authority of and certified by the Administrator for use in connection with the commemoration of the American Revolution Bicentennial, or any facsimile thereof, or holds out to the public objects in such a manner as to suggest any such logos, symbols, or marks not officially authorized by the Administrator, shall be fined not more than \$250 or imprisoned not more than six months or both: Provided, That this section shall be applicable upon publication in the Federal Register of notification of certification hereunder by the Administrator with respect to each such

logo, symbol, or mark.

SEC. 3. (a) There is hereby established an American Revolution Bicentennial Advisory Council (hereinafter referred to as the "Council") to be composed of twenty-five members appointed by the President, no more than fifteen of whom shall be appointed from the same political party. The members shall serve at the pleasure of the President, and their terms of office shall not extend beyond the termination date of the Administration. Members of the Council shall be chosen from private life and shall be broadly representative of the Nation's people. In appointing persons to the Council, the President shall give due consideration to the contributions, among others, of the Nation's youth, women, elders, racial and ethnic minorities, artists and craftsmen, and learned professions. The Administrator shall serve as an ex officio member of the Council. The Council shall meet at least once every two months and shall hold other meetings at the cell of the Chairman, the Administrator, or a majority of its members, and shall render advice to the Administrator on all matters relating to the purposes of this Act.

(b) Vacancies on the Council shall be filled in the same manner in

which original appointments were made.

(c) The Members of the Council shall receive no compensation for their services as such, but shall be allowed such necessary travel expenses and per diem as are authorized for individuals serving without nay under section 5703 of title 5. United States Code

(d) The chairman and vice chairman and other appropriate officers of the Council shall be elected by and from members of the Council

SEC. 4. (a) In order to assure a balanced program for the bicentennial commemoration, encompassing the themes of "Heritage '76", "Festival USA", and "Horizons '76", and in furtherance of the purposes outlined in section 2(a) of this Act, the Administration as a primary function shall prepare the master calendar of events of local, State, National, and international significance which will take place

between March 1975 and December 31, 1976. In carrying out the purposes of this subsection, the Administrator shall-

(1) provide for the bicentennial master calendar or register of programs and projects, and in other ways provide a central clearinghouse for information and coordination regarding dates, events, places, documents, artifacts, and personalities of bicentennial historical and commemorative significance;

(2) coordinate, facilitate, and aid in the scheduling of events, programs, and projects of States and private citizens, and national and international programs, which commemorate the

bicentennial; and

(3) develop standards for, and evaluate the feasibility, relevance, status, and desirability of various programs and projects associated with the bicentennial commemoration, acting in conjunction with the Office of Management and Budget in cases where Federal department or agency activities are involved. (b) In addition the Administrator shall-

(1) provide for the coordination of non-Federal bicentennial programs and projects with appropriate Federal programs and

(2) provide recognition as deemed appropriate in connection with bicentennial related programs or projects;
(3) provide for competitions and similar projects relating to

the bicentennial;

(4) provide for the preparation, distribution, dissemination, exhibition, and sale of commemorative medals and other historical, commemorative, and informational materials and objects which will contribute to public information, awareness, and interest in the bicentennial. In preparing the Administration's plans and programs, the Administrator shall give due consideration to any related plans and programs developed by State, local, and private groups, and he may designate special committees with representatives from such bodies to plan, develop, and coordinate specific activities.

(c) In performing the duties set forth in subsections (a) and (b) of this section, the Administrator shall not operate any programs unless specifically authorized by law, but shall limit his functions to stimulating and encouraging appropriate public and private authorities and organizations to assume operational responsibility for partic-

ular programs.

(d) In the Administration's planning activities, the Administrator shall give special emphasis to the ideas associated with the Revolution which have been so important in the development of the United States

in world affairs and in mankind's quest for freedom.

SEC. 5. (a) In fulfilling his responsibilities, the Administrator is authorized to consult, cooperate with, and seek advice and assistance from (1) the American Revolution Bicentennial Advisory Council and the American Revolution Bicentennial Board, (2) appropriate Federal departments and agencies, State and local public bodies, learned societies, and historical, patriotic, philanthropic, civic, pro-fessional, and related organizations, and (3) bicentennial commissions of the several States, the District of Columbia, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico and the territories, either collectively or individually. The Administrator may authorize travel as he deems appropriate for representatives and staff of such bicentennial commissions and may pay travel expenses and per diem therefor as authorized for individuals serving without pay under section 5703 of title 5 of the United States Code. Federal departments and agencies are authorized and requested to cooperate with the Administrator in carrying out his duties under this Act.

(b) The Chairman of the Federal Council on the Arts and the Humanities, the Chairman of the National Endowment for the Arts,

and the Chairman of the National Endowment for the Humanities are authorized and requested to cooperate with the Administrator, especially in the encouragement and coordination of scholarly works and presentations focusing on the history, culture, and political thought of the Revolutionary War period.

(c) The Librarian of Congress, the Secretary of the Smithsonian Institution, and the Archivist of the United States are authorized and

(c) The Librarian of Congress, the Secretary of the Smithsonian Institution, and the Archivist of the United States are authorized and requested to cooperate with the Administrator, especially in development and display of exhibits and collections and in the development of bibliographies, catalogs, and other material relevant to the period of the Revolutionary War.

SEC. 6. (a) The Administrator is authorized to accept on behalf of the Administration donations of money, property, or personal

services.

(b) Any books, manuscripts, miscellaneous printed matter, memorabilia, relies, and other materials donated to the Administration may be deposited for preservation in National, State, or local libraries, archives, museums, or other public or nonprofit institutions or be otherwise disposed of by the Administrator in consultation with the Librarian of Congress, the Secretary of the Smithsonian Institution, the Archivist of the United States, and the Administrator of Genual Congress.

SEC. 7. (a) (1) There are hereby authorized to be appropriated annually to carry out the provisions of this Act, except for the program of grants-in-aid established by section 9(b) of this Act, not to exceed \$10,000,000, of which not to exceed \$1,375,000 shall be for grants-in-aid pursuant to section 9(a) of this Act.

(2) For the purpose of carrying out the program of grants-in-aid established by section 9 (b) of this Act, there are hereby authorized to be appropriated such sums, not to exceed \$20,000,000, as may be necessary, and any funds appropriated pursuant to this paragraph shall remain available until expended, but no later than December 31, 1976.

(b) An annual report of the activities of the Administration, including an accounting of funds received and expended, shall be furnished by the Administrator to the Congress and a final report shall be made to the Congress no later than June 30, 1977. The Administration and the Board shall terminate on June 30, 1977, or on the date of the filing of the final report, whichever is sooner. In order to effect an orderly transfer, the President is authorized to transfer to the Secretary of the Interior on or after January 1, 1977, such powers and functions as he shall deem necessary for a continuation of appropriate commemoration of events relating to the American Revolution until December 31, 1983. All personnel, records, property, and appropriations of the Administration as relate to the transferred functions shall be transferred to the Secretary of the Interior and shall be available for carrying out such transferred functions.

SEC. 8. Appropriations or other funds available to the Administration for carrying out the purposes related to or in furtherance of the bicentennial commemoration may be transferred to another Federal department or agency as may be mutually agreed upon between the Administration and the Federal department or agency concerned. Funds so transferred may be used for direct expenditure or as a working fund, and any such expenditures may be made under the authorities governing the activities of the transferee department or agency or under the authorities of this Act, providing that the activities so

funded come within the purposes of this Act.

Sec. 9. (a) The Administrator is authorized to carry out a program of grants-in-aid in accordance with and in furtherance of the purposes of this Act. The Administrator may, subject to such regulations as may be prescribed—

(1) make equal grants of appropriated funds in each fiscal year of not to exceed \$25,000 to Bicentennial Commissions of each

State, territory, the District of Columbia, and the Commonwealth

of Puerto Rico, upon application therefor;

(2) make grants of nonappropriated funds to nonprofit entities, including States, territories, the District of Columbia, and the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico (or subdivisions thereof), to assist in developing or supporting bicentennial programs or projects. Such grants may be up to 50 per centum of the total cost of the

program or project to be assisted.

(3) in any case where money or property is donated, bequeathed, or devised to the Administration, and accepted by it for the purpose of assisting a nonprofit entity, including States, territories, the District of Columbia, and the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico (or subdivision thereof), for a specific bicentennial program or project, make a grant of the money or property for the purpose specified, plus an amount from otherwise available nonappropriated funds not to exceed the value of the donation, bequest, or devise: Provided, That the recipient agrees to match the total value of the grant for such bicentennial program or project.

(b) For the purpose of further assisting each of the several States, the Territories, the District of Columbia, and the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico in developing and supporting bicentennial programs and projects, the Administrator is authorized, out of funds appropriated pursuant to section 7(a)(2) of this Act, to carry out a program of grants-in-aid in accordance with this subsection. Subject to such regulations as may be prescribed and approved by the Board, the Administrator may make grants to each of the several States, Territories, the District of Columbia, and the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico to assist them in developing and supporting bicentennial programs and projects. Each such recipient shall be entitled to not less than \$200,000 under this subsection. In no event shall any such grant be made unless matched by the recipient.

SEC. 10. (a) There is hereby established the American Revolution

Bicentennial Board (hereinafter referred to as the "Board"). The

Board shall be composed of eleven members as follows:

(1) the Administrator;

(2) two Members of the House of Representatives appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives. Members appointed under this paragraph shall not be of the same political party;

(3) two Members of the Senate appointed by the President of the Senate. Members appointed under this paragraph shall

not be of the same political party;

(4) the Chairman and the Vice Chairman of the Council; (5) the Secretary of the Interior; and

(6) three members appointed by the President from officers or staff of State bicentennial commissions or comparable State

(b) The members of the Board shall serve for the length of time

the Board is in existence.

(c) Any person appointed to fill a vacancy on the Board shall be appointed in the same manner as the member whose vacancy he is

filling.

(d) Members of the Board shall be reimbursed for travel, subsistence, and other necessary expenses incurred in the performance of duties vested in the Board, but not exceeding the maximum amounts authorized under section 5703(b) of title 5, United States Code, and, in addition thereto, each member of the Board shall receive \$100 per day for each day he is engaged in the performance of duties vested in the Board, including traveltime; however, members of the Board who are officers or employees of the United States shall receive no additional compensation for their services.

(e) Four members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.

(f) The Chairman and Vice Chairman of the Board shall be elected by members of the Board from members of the Board other than the Administrator.

(g) The Board shall meet at least once each month and shall hold other meetings at the call of the Chairman, the Administrator, or a majority of its members.

(h) The Board shall be empowered to—

(1) receive advice and information from the Council and the Administrator with respect to the development of policy and guidelines to carry out the purposes of this Act; and
(2) give final approval to grants to be made under the authority of section 9 of this Act;

(3) review, approve, disapprove, or ratify from time to time, all basic policy and guidelines, including the proposed annual budget to be presented by the Administrator, in carrying out the

purposes of this Act.

(i) It shall be a duty of the Board to make a continuing study of

Boundary Biographical Administrathe activities of the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration. The Board shall, from time to time, but not less than every six months, report to the Committees on the Judiciary of the Senate and the House of Representatives, and to the Senate and the House of Representatives concerning the results of its studies, together with such recommendations as it may deem desirable. It shall make a final report thereon by June 30, 1977.

SEC. 11. At the request of the Board, the President may, when he determines it to be in furtherance of the purposes of this Act, direct that the functions authorized under this Act may be performed without regard to such provisions of law or limitations of authority regulating or relating to the making, performance, amendment, or modification of contracts, and the expenditure of Government funds

as he may specify.

SEC. 12. Except for members of the Commission, the personnel, property, records, and unexpended balances of appropriations, allocations, and other funds employed, used, held available or to be made available to the American Revolution Bicentennial Commission, established by Public Law 89-491, approved July 4, 1966, and the amendments thereto, shall be transferred to the Administration upon the effective date of this Act to be use for the purposes of this Act and to liquidate any outstanding obligations of the American Revolution Bicentennial Commission.

SEC. 13. (a) The President may authorize any person, including any person who immediately prior to the effective date of this Act held a position in the executive branch of the Government, to act as Administrator during the sixty-day period referred to in subsection (b) of section 2 of this Act, or until the office of Administrator is for the first

time filled pursuant to the provisions of this Act.

(b) The President may authorize any person who previously held a position in the executive branch of the Government who serves in an acting capacity under the provisions of subsection (a) of this section to receive the compensation attached to the office in respect of which he so serves. Such compensation, if authorized, shall be in lieu of, but not in addition to, other compensation from the United States to

which such person may be entitled.

SEC. 14. The joint resolution entitled "Joint resolution to establish the American Revolution Bicentennial Commission, and for other purposes", Public Law 89-491, approved July 4, 1966, as amended, is hereby repealed, and the American Revolution Bicentennial Commission is hereby abolished.

SEC. 15. The Act entitled "An Act to provide for the striking of medals in commemoration of the bicentennial of the American Revolution", Public Law 92-228, approved February 15, 1972, is amended as follows:



Wyoming State Archives Barrett Office Building Cheyenne, Wyoming 80002 The community nature of the Bicentennial commemoration was recognized and encouraged by the ARBC/ARBA by means of three major programs emphasizing local efforts.

The first, the *Bicentennial*Communities Program, was begun in March 1973 in order to encourage communities of varying sizes and governmental structures to help local citizens plan and carry out projects and programs. At the program's conclusion, June 3, 1976, 11,739 Bicentennial Community designations, encompassing 12,566 cities, towns, villages, counties and Native American localities, had been officially made. The table on page 73 gives totals by state.

A community took four steps to receive Bicentennial Community status:

- (1) Organized a Bicentennial planning and coordinating committee which represented all segments of the community.
- (2) Planned a program reflecting the national thematic areas of *Heritage '76*, *Festival USA* and *Horizons '76*. At least one project had to have lasting value or residual benefit beyond 1976.
- (3) Obtained approval for the program from the chief executive officer or governing body of the community.
- (4) Submitted an application with planning details to the ARBC/ARBA through the appropriate Bicentennial organization at the state or comparable level.



Official designation followed the successful completion of these four steps. The program operated so that communities which sought designation generally received it.

The tables on the following pages provide statistical analyses of officially recognized Communities. Not intended to rank degree of participation, they are statistical reports on the number of officially designated Communities, broken out in various ways.

## **BICENTENNIAL COMMUNITY APPLICATION GUIDELINES**

#### **FOREWORD**

On behalf of the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration, it is my pleasure to extend a cordial invitation to you and your community to participate in the Bicentennial Communities Program. This Program was developed to allow the maximum degree of individual citizen involvement in this Country's 200th Anniversary, and it has received the endorsement and support from the United States Conference of Mayors, National League of Cities and National Association of Counties.

The appeal of the Program resides in its approach to Bicentennial participation in that it allows the local community to plan activities and events selected by that community because they appropriately accommodate its historic role, present-day interests and tomorrow's goals and needs. Literally, then, in the truest American tradition, this Program is one that is of the people, by the people and for the people in the context of their community life. It provides an opportunity for the people of the smallest village or town to the largest city or county to become participants, not merely spectators, and to share equally in the distinction and designation of becoming a "Bicentennial Community."

We have already witnessed a tremendous outpouring of effort and interest in this program from every corner of our Nation. The real success of the Bicentennial depends upon you and your fellow citizens, planning and working together. We sincerely urge all to join this Program, and share cooperatively in the manner of our Founding Fathers and our pioneers to insure that this country and the entire world may witness a Bicentennial of the United States that is both memorable and meaningful.

#### **ELIGIBILITY**

- 1. The term "community" includes all political subdivisions having an elected government, such as a city, county, town, village, township, borough, any Native American tribe, reservation, and/or combination thereof. Unincorporated areas which have an established identity of their own may apply for designation if the county, within which the unincorporated area lies geographically, has already been designated as a Bicentennial Community and the Chief Elected Official of that county signs the application.
- 2. A combined application (two or more communities applying for a single designation) will be considered only under special circumstances. The determination of the need and merit for filing a combined application is primarily the responsibility of the State Commissions and the ARBA Regional Offices. The final decision, however, resides with the National ARBA. In a combined application, each participating community should be listed and upon approval each will receive a Certificate of Recognition which identifies all the communities included in the designation.

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#### SECTION BY SECTION INSTRUCTIONS

#### PART I-CERTIFICATION

The Bicentennial Committee Chairperson and the Chief Elected Official of the Community are required to sign the application. Their names should also be printed or typewritten beneath the signature. If the community has an official seal, it should be affixed to the application.

On combined applications (when more than one political subdivision is applying), the Chief Elected Official of each participating community must sign and the Official seal should be affixed.

#### PART II-STATE BICENTENNIAL ORGANIZATIONS

Mail the application to your State Bicentennial Commission. If approved by your State Bicentennial Commission, it will be forwarded to the ARBA Regional Director for review and recommendation to the National Office.

#### PART III-BASIC DATA

ALL OF THIS DATA MUST BE FILLED IN COMPLETELY. This information is absolutely essential for our computerized Master Calendar and Information Service and must be both complete and accurate. Please be sure to include the Area Code: with the telephone number. In the case of a combined application, be sure to include all names and addresses, using a separate sheet if necessary. Include the names of U.S. Senators and the U.S. Congressman for your District(s).

#### APPENDIX A

The locally elected governing body has the responsibility for the appointment of a Bicentennial Commission or Committee which must, in fact, be *broadly representative* of the entire community. This is a basic pre-requisite for designation. If you have more than 20 names, use additional pages and attach.

#### APPENDIX B

The National ARBA program, as established by the United States Congress (Public Law 93-179) embraces three broad theme areas for the observance: Heritage '76, Festival USA, Horizons '76. Your community program should include activities in all three areas. In some instances, themes will overlap one another. This is acceptable and should be noted in your program description. However, you must have one program which perpetuates or preserves into the Third Century of our Nation one or more activities or programs of lasting value which the community plans as an intrinsic part of its Bicentennial Program.

#### HERITAGE '76

The heritage of America embraces the whole country. It is the substance of our collective memory. The Bicentennial Era is rich in historic events to be commemorated and provides opportunity for direct citizen participation in examining the heritage and values of this Nation. The discovery of this heritage is an exciting experience; one to give optimism and confidence to all Americans. The American Revolution Bicentennial Administration (ARBA) urges all public and private groups in America to recall these first 200 years of growth and development. July 4, 1976 will close the second century of this Nation's existence. We have progressed from the time of a 4-week Atlantic crossing in 1776 to a 3-day voyage to the moon.

The Bicentennial is the anniversary of these first 200 years of growth and development. Though this Nation is now troubled by both ancient and modern problems of human society, the ARBA first urges an examination of our country: its heritage and values. The term "American know-how" is not folklore. We are a Nation of doers. We have faced countless problems and have continued to function and grow under our establishing Constitution longer than any other contemporary Nation. This heritage of acting, of change, and of willingness to change will carry America forward to its third century. The discovery of this heritage is an exciting experience; one to give optimism and confidence to all Americans.

Heritage '76 is concerned not only with the past but also with the present and the future. It is as interested in the continuity and contemporary validity of the ideas of the Revolution as it is in the origin and evolution of those ideas. It is as much concerned with the present state of our national inheritance as it is with the events which led up to the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution.

#### **FESTIVAL USA**

Festival USA is a central and unique component of the Bicentennial. It evokes the spirit of hospitality and movement which has characterized American development; it invites Americans to share experiences with each other and with their visitors and thus to enhance understanding; it encourages everyone to participate in the Bicentennial. Festival USA is firmly focused on people, the sights and sounds of the people—all the people—the multiplicity of their ideas, their expressions, their interests which best convey the diversity of our culture, the warmth of our hospitality, the vitality of our society, the tradition upon which we draw and the traditions we create.

#### HORIZONS '76

Within the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration's (ARBA's) mandate to relate the basic principles on which the Nation was founded to Bicentennial programs, Horizons '76 is primarily future oriented. Within the ARBA's charge to provide coordination and leadership for the 200th commemoration, Horizons '76 encompasses the substantial portion of responsibilities for this to be an occasion: for looking ahead; for defining and dedicating ourselves to our common purposes; and for speeding the accomplishment of specific local projects responsive to our changing national priorities.

Neither the President, the Congress, nor the ARBA would represent that the programs the ARBA supports, endorses, or activates can provide a panacea for all the ills of our society. The ARBA's role is seen to be that of a catalyst in both the public and private sectors to bring forth by 1976 and beyond new levels of achievement. Hopefully, from programs thus begun will flow a continuum of *improvements in the quality of life for every American*, even into Century III.

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#### **Bicentennial Campuses**

In November 1974, the successful communities program was extended to the nation's colleges and universities, which, in many cases, were already involved in Bicentennial activities themselves. The *Bicentennial Colleges and Universities Campus Program* was similar in framework to the *Bicentennial Communities Program*, but tailored specifically to accommodate the academic community.

The term "colleges and universities" included all institutions which had post-secondary programs leading to a bachelor's degree and were listed in the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare publication, "Education Directory, 1973-1974, Higher Education," DHEW Publication Number (OE) 74-11404. Colleges or universities with more than one campus had to submit individual applications for each campus wanting to participate. Each campus qualified for separate designation and subsequent receipt of the Certificate of Official National Recognition and an ARBA flag.

Applications for recognition had to be signed by the chief administrative officer of the institution (such as the president, chancellor or their counterpart). The application then had to be approved by the Bicentennial organization at the state or comparable level and forwarded by it to the ARBA regional director for review and recommendation to ARBA headquarters.



Each institution had to set up a Bicentennial committee broadly representative of the institution. Membership was the responsibility of the chief administrative officer. Broad representation meant at least one member from the student body, the faculty and the administration.

When the program ended on June 3, 1976, 929 colleges and universities, 30 percent of the country's eligible academic institutions, had applied for and received official ARBA recognition. Participating institutions represented a composite, geographic mosaic of the academic community. There were two year community colleges as well as state universities, private as well as church-affiliated institutions, and schools with enrollments of fewer than 500 students as well as others with almost 50,000.

#### **Armed Forces Program**

A program for America's military forces was established in 1975-the Bicentennial Armed Forces Installations and Commands Program.

On May 14, 1975, Armed Forces Day, the first recognitions were given. At the program's end in July 1976, 599 Armed Forces units had been recognized—82 Army, 219 Navy, 89 Marine, 152 Air Force and 57 Coast Guard. Of the 599 units. 86 were based overseas in 18 different countries.

The Bicentennial Armed Forces Installations and Commands Program was similar to the Bicentennial Communities and Bicentennial Colleges and Universities Campus Programs, also sponsored by the ARBA. However, each service issued guidelines tailored to its needs. Generally, though, the program:

- (1) Applied to military installations and units world-wide, including Navy ships.
- (2) Called for Bicentennial plans and programs involving dependents and civilian employees where appropriate.
- (3) Required submission of applications for national recognition. with an outline of plans and programs, through military channels to service headquarters in Washington. On approval by service headquarters, the application was sent to the ARBA for final review and official designation.

U.S. Air Force personnel assigned to Goose Bay Airport, Canada, raise the Bicentennial Flag honoring their selection as a Bicentennial Military Installation

Military units recognized under the Bicentennial Armed Forces Installations and Commands Program received authorization to fly the national Bicentennial flag. Service regulations prohibiting the flying of any flag other than that of the United States on main flagstaffs were suspended through 1976, the Bicentennial year.

# National Recognition Program

While the Bicentennial celebration was essentially local in nature, it was hoped and expected from the beginning that projects of regional, national and international significance would play an important part in the total celebration.

To this end, the American Revolution Bicentennial Commission (ARBC) developed, and the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration (ARBA) continued, a program to provide national recognition to such projects. They could be undertaken in either the public or private sector. Essentially, the program was an effort to help these significant projects succeed by bringing them to the attention of the public, thus encouraging support. These programs were also of value in supplementing state and local Bicentennial activities and provided additional opportunities for individual participation.

# **Recognition Criteria**

To be considered, a project had to have regional, national or international significance, determined, to a large extent, on the basis of the number of people affected, the composition of the audience and the geographic area involved. For example, a local project could be recognized if it served as a prototype—a unique program which other communities could undertake as well. A project also had to be supportive of the purposes and objectives of Public Law 93–179 and capable of being accomplished by June 30, 1977.

Sponsors of projects were to submit an "Application for Official Recognition" (see page —) to the ARBA to obtain official recognition. Each application had to include a comprehensive description of the project, a narrative statement indicating how the project was to meet the criteria established by the American Revolution Bicentennial Board, and as much support information as possible. Approval by the appropriate Bicentennial organization at the state or comparable level was required if the project was to be conducted within a single state.

For various policy reasons, the ARB Board excluded the following classes of programs from recognition: publications, commissionings of works of art, battle reenactments, contests, petitions, public solicitations of funds, awards (if the primary purpose), individual works of art, educational courses or other curriculum programs and commercial products. The guidelines for recognition did allow the administrator of the ARBA to make exceptions to these exclusions. As a result, certain contests and publications were granted recognition because of their unique nature and national significance.

## **Benefits of Recognition**

Officially recognized projects received a Certificate of Official Recognition and a Bicentennial flag and were authorized and encouraged to use the national Bicentennial symbol, along with the legend, "Recognized by American Revolution Bicentennial Administration." Officially recognized projects were included in the ARBA master register of Bicentennial projects, maintained by BINET—the Bicentennial Information Network.

# **Number of Recognitions**

From December 1971 through December 1976, national recognition was granted to 284 projects. These ranged from the *American Issues Forum*, which was aimed at encouraging local discussions on the American experience, to the summer-long *Festival of American Folklife*, which was based in Washington, D.C., but provided for tours of ethnic performers throughout the country, and the *Exterior Sensory Learning Environment (ESLE)*, a model park developed in Miami, Florida for severely handicapped children.

# **Nature of Programs**

The statistical data in ARBA's BINET system showed that the most popular subject areas for officially recognized projects were human values and understanding. The next in order of popularity was general history. Following these two were education and learning; folk, ethnic and minority cultures; citizenship; community development; history of the American Revolution; and leisure and recreation.

By far the predominant sponsoring organizations were federal government agencies and educational organizations. Business organizations and civic groups were the next most active sponsors.


Bicentennial exhibits were the most popular method of presentation—62 recognized programs included an exhibit. The next most popular methods of program delivery, in order, were program facilitation; buildings, facilities or monuments; conferences and conventions; commemorations; performances; and natural areas, parks and plantings.

Because they are so numerous, youth, especially high school and college students, were the most popular audience for recognized program sponsors. Volunteers, women and Native Americans were sought after next, either as audiences or as participants.

# A Cooperative Effort

The officially recognized programs of public, private, civic and other organizations enabled the ARBA to fulfill its responsibilities under Public Law 93–179 by drawing on the resources of these organizations to help assure a balanced program for the Bicentennial under the national themes of *Heritage '76, Festival USA* and *Horizons '76.*

National Audubon Society originated as the "National Association of Audubon Societies", composed of some 35 state Audubon societies, and was incorporated in the state of New York on January 4, 1905. The founding societies initially had the primary objective of halting the feather trade which was threatening with extinction several species of plumed birds -- egrets, herons, etc. Over the years since 1905, the Society has become a leader in American and international conservation. National Audubon works with state and federal government agencies, industry and educational and environmental organizations to promote the cause of conservation of wildlife and other natural resources. The Society itself maintains 61 wildlife sanctuaries in 18 states of the United States, a system totalling over 170,000 acres. A number of its local chapters also maintain sanctuaries. Among the wide variety

## II. ARBA CRITERIA FOR RECOGNITION.

- 1. The Audubon Bicentennial Project will be a national one in scope and significance.
  - a. It is expected that well over 1,000,000 people will be reached directly by one facet or another of the Audubon Bicentennial Project.
  - b. The Project is designed to reach the general American public through Audubon's 358 chapters from coast to coast. Audubon has a membership of 335,000 covering every state and U.S. territory.
  - c. The geographic area of the Project is all 50 states.
  - d. The Project will affect significant numbers of people in more than one state, especially California, Connecticut, Florida, the Carolinas, Ohio, Wisconsin, etc.
  - e. National Audubon cooperates with other countries and international organizations for the conservation and protection of natural areas and wildlife. Its sanctuaries and nature centers for which special public programs are planned serve as models for conservation groups worldwide.
- 2. National Audubon Society believes the Audubon Bicentennial Project is supportive of the purposes and objectives of Public Law 93-179.
  - a. In 1776, the United States of America was founded on principles of freedom, equality and democracy for its citizens. Every citizen gained basic rights to life, liberty and pursuit of happiness. America's natural lands and wildlife provided rich resources for these rights

  - a. (cont.) and principles to grow physically, spiritually and intellectually into a great nation. Rapid physical expansion, however, brought with it abuses of land, water and wildlife resources. Spiritual and intellectual growth have gradually brought better understanding of such abuses and a realization that some wilderness and wildlife must be preserved for all generations of Americans as a part of their American heritage and for their continuing education. By 1975, many free Americans understood that one of their rights includes a healthful, relatively unspoiled natural environment. In 1976, through its Bicentennial Project, National Audubon Society will seek to expand every American's appreciation and understanding of the value of that right.
  - b. The Audubon Bicentennial Project stresses the following themes:
    - 1. Ecology is part of both American Heritage and  $\mbox{\it American Horizons.}$
    - 2. America must preserve some of its original ecology for the benefit of future generations.
    - 3. Americans must learn more about the life support system of their planet and their nation -- land, water, air and plant and animal life -- so that they will cherish and protect it more wisely.

4. of the United States by celebrating America's natural heritage and seeking to assure its vitality for the Tricentennial and beyond.

Ecology is part of American Heritage because the natural resources have aided growth of the American experiment by sustaining both life and growth. Land, water and wildlife resources spawned industry, migration and immigration and supported education and commitment to ideals of democracy. Ecology is part of American Horizons because it is necessary to preserve some natural lands, waters and wildlife for education, enjoyment and enrichment of Americans present and future. Wanton or careless destruction or abuse of natural lands, waters and wildlife strikes at a basic American resource. National Audubon Society comes within themes of Heritage '76 and Horizons '76 with The Audubon Bicentennial Project because it strives to preserve natural lands, waters and wildlife from America's past for America's future. c. The Audubon Bicentennial Project aims primarily toward broader and better understanding and appreciation of America's natural heritage. National Audubon Society has chosen the following means to do this:

    - 1. Cont. will be special educational programs using the American natural heritage theme. The Society's 358 chapters will present special programs of their own choosing, and the five regional conferences in '76 will emphasize the Bicentennial.
    - 2. <u>Guide</u>: Audubon is producing a 32-page, four-color guide to its 61 original American natural areas of special ecological importance in 18 states of the United States. The guide emphasizes the heritage of land, waters and wildlife and the need to preserve this heritage.
    - 3. <u>Magazine</u>: <u>Audubon</u> magazine in 1976 will devote an entire issue to the American Bicentennial, emphasizing America's natural heritage.
  - d. The National Audubon Bicentennial Project will widen citizen participation in the Bicentennial commemoration. The project will remind the American citizen that people alone do not make America a nation; Americans must use wisely and preserve the natural resources of the land, air and waters they depend on. It will result in citizen participation through special programs mounted by Audubon chapters, sanctuaries, nature centers and regional conferences.
  - e. The National Audubon Bicentennial Project will contribute to all aspects of original American life for American citizens in our Nation's third century and beyond. The Project will improve the quality of life for this and later generations through education in the need to use wisely all the gifts of nature.

Public Law 93–179, which established the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration (ARBA), called for ". . . drawing on the resources of public, private, civic, and other organizations for planning and implementation, to insure that appropriate observances take place."

In promoting this concept, the ARBA contacted thousands of corporations, associations and individuals to enlist their support. Many organized and funded their own Bicentennial projects, while others contributed to the support of local, state and national programs.

The following list provides only a sampling of the private sector's support for Bicentennial projects. The total contribution will never be known, but according to ARBA estimates, the monetary contributions represented by this sample list of 421 organizations comes to over \$38,900,000.

### 214 The Bicentennial Alliances

Five National Bicentennial Alliance Programs helped the ARBA obtain the support and involvement of millions of Americans associated with a large variety of interest groups.

An alliance was formed for each of five types of organizations in the private sector—hospitality, service, ethnic/racial, sports and business. Those wishing to join were judged on the merits of their program, in particular the extent to which they encouraged members, affiliates or employees to become active in Bicentennial efforts through the dissemination of information, and the degree to which they provided opportunities for participation in their own programs.

# Even Critics Overwhelmed by Celebration

There was a centerpiece for the Bicentennial of the United States of America, after all.

The centerpiece was America and its citizens.

The 200th Fourth of July celebra-

The mandate of the law. The communications challenge. Philosophy and goals, goals quoted.

Public Law 93–179 directed the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration (ARBA) to:

". . . provide for the bicentennial master calendar or register of programs and projects, and in other ways provide a central clearinghouse for information and coordination regarding dates, events, places, documents, artifacts, and personalities of bicentennial significance; . . ."

It further called for the ARBA to:

". . . provide for the preparation, distribution, dissemination, exhibition, and sale of commemorative medals and other historical, commemorative and informational materials and objects which will contribute to public information, awareness, and interest in the bicentennial."

### The Challenge

Communicating with literally uncountable numbers of individuals, communities, organizations and agencies around the nation was perhaps the biggest challenge faced by the ARBA and its predecessor, the American Revolution Bicentennial Commission (ARBC).

There could have been no national recognition program if project sponsors had not known about it, no communities program if local citizens had not been informed, no international participation if foreign nations had not been kept abreast of happenings. Nor would there have been full citizen participation if the vast majority of Americans had not

been fully aware of the nature and scope of the overall Bicentennial commemoration.

While the channel of person-to-person communications was important—the ARBA was responding to upwards of 20,000 letters per week at the end of 1975 and beginning of 1976, the peak period—it was obvious from the start that widespread dissemination through mass communications would be vital to the success of a decentralized Bicentennial celebration. The ARBC recognized this fact by establishing a Communications Committee as one of its first actions. The mission of the ARBA's staff of communications specialists, under an assistant administrator for communications and public affairs, was to communicate the

Bicentennial story broadly and to provide professional assistance to other ARBA divisions in their activities.

Staff efforts were supplemented as necessary by the professional services of public relations firms, advertising agencies and other organizations and groups such as the Discover America Travel Organizations, Inc., working under contract with the ARBA.

### Philosophy and Goals

The underlying philosophy of all the communications efforts was one of service rather than of promotion. In the course of events, most recognized techniques of mass communications—from pamphlets, press releases and posters to films, fact sheets and slide presentations—were employed. Heavy

emphasis was placed on assisting the nation's mass media.

By early 1975, six areas of concern had been specifically identified by the communications office from which six information and public awareness goals were developed. They were promulgated to all ARBA public affairs personnel as follows:

"ARBA Information and Awareness Goals

"Background

"To assist the various personnel in the Communications and Public Affairs Divisions in their daily activities and to establish a basis for a National Public Awareness Program, six broad information goals were developed. These goals are listed in no particular order of priority. They are considered to embrace the major objectives which the Communications Divisions are attempting or undertaking in support of Public Law 93–179.

"We know from a variety of sources that the national symbol is not widely recognized, is misunderstood and not generally utilized in connection with the Bicentennial. There are many problems both internal and external which we are working to solve: the symbol often is perceived by the media as a U.S. Government symbol and not the national (citizens') symbol; it is looked upon by other Government agencies as the ARBA-agency symbol and not the national symbol; our own (ARBA) policies in the past have been conservative and restrictive thereby forcing many organizations and groups to design their own (now competing) Bicentennial symbols; the symbol has been used in the past as an incentive to get groups and communities involved causing the problem of now liberalizing the policy. Our major objective in regards to this goal is to have the national symbol widely recognized, respected and utilized-in much the same way as is the Olympic symbol.

"(2) Motivate Project/Event Managers to Furnish Information for BINET (Bicentennial Information Network):

"We have learned from research organizations, the media, travel organizations, the ARBA network (regional offices, State Commissions, Bicentennial communities) that BINET does not contain nearly enough information to be currently useful or provide a complete archival record of

the Bicentennial. Like any computer, BINET is dependent on human beings to furnish information for its data base. We know that for a wide variety of reasons people are not motivated to provide ARBA with Bicentennial information (apparent complexity of the forms, resistance to providing information for a U.S. Government computer, little practical reason to do so, etc.). Our major undertaking in this area will be to

motivate individuals to provide the information by countering the negativism and educating them about how the information in BINET is now and will be utilized.

### "(3) Motivate Individual Citizen Involvement:

"This is, of course, our major objective and the goal which is hardest to define in absolute terms. Basically, we hope to at the very least reach every possible individual and inspire them to participate in some way—in their own way. One way to accomplish this task is to publicize the activities of other citizens—whatever they might be.

"(4) Explain ARBA Role and Particularly ARBA Availability to Assist News Media, Travel Industries, and General Public:

"ARBA is often perceived as either the organization expected to totally run and finance the Bicentennial or as just a ponderous Government agency which is ineffective and not worth contacting at all. Neither of these extremes are true. While ARBA does not run programs or completely finance activities, it has as an agency given the American public more than its money's worth, i.e., the Bicentennial Communities Program, Matching Grants Program, Official Recognition Program, Licensing Program, Bicentennial Times, etc. Our objective here is to inform the American public, media, private sector and other organizations that there is a competent, authoritative agency willing and able to assist. Once this confidence in ARBA is realized, many of the other objectives in the overall program would be realized.

"(5) Explain Purpose of ARBA Licensing Program as Distinguished from General Misconception of Buy-Centennial Commercialism:

"This goal has two distinct parts. It is not an advertising campaign for our licensed products but rather an explanation of the Licensing Program under law and the use of the monies realized from that program. More importantly, it would be shameful if the Bicentennial celebration should be tarnished by repeated attacks of 'commercialism and buy-centennial.' We are a capitalistic country. We wish to reemphasize that 'commercialism' is not a dirty word-indeed, it is one of those unique things that have made our country great. One of the freedoms our founding fathers fought for was freedom of enterprise. The American people will decide which products they wish to buy.

"(6) Portray Bicentennial as a Joining Together of all Segments of Society in Celebrating our 200th Anniversary in an Apolitical Manner:

"In 1976 the world will be watching the United States to see how we execute two important events in the history of our young country—the elections (most importantly the Presidential and the Congressional elections) and the celebration of our 200th anniversary. That the two events occur in the same year is fortuitous and a wonderful thing to celebrate. We should not be building walls between the two occurrences but rather constructing bridges to show the world how the electoral process sets our country apart from the rest of the world and is one of the unique freedoms which accounts for our continued success. After

presidential assassinations and the resignation of both a Vice President and a President, our country has survived in an orderly and prescribed manner—proving forcibly and tangibly that the system created by our founding fathers works very well. We must celebrate this fact."

### **Communications Efforts**

The following information, while not all-inclusive, outlines the major efforts of the ARBA to implement these goals and encourage participation in the Bicentennial.

### Media Services and Liaison

Intensive and continuous efforts were made to establish and maintain working relationships with representatives of the major print and broadcast media in order to stimulate national coverage of the Bicentennial. The media were provided with general and specific information and audio-visual materials in response to their needs and requests. In September 1974, the mailing list for news and feature releases was expanded to include all daily and weekly newspapers and radio and television stations in the country. From then through early 1976, an average of three releases a week was sent to just over 20.000 representatives of the media as well as to communities and other organizations.

Public service announcements for radio and televison were also produced and distributed on a regular basis.

In addition, selected publications such as the monthly *Bicentennial Times* and the periodic *Comprehensive Calendar of Projects and Events* were provided to the media.

Press conferences were held on appropriate occasions, and facilities were operated for the press at major events such as the National Bicentennial Conference, held in February 1975. On request, interviews with ARBA staff were arranged for the press in order to provide them with more detailed background information.

Following is a sampling of the major activities undertaken to enlist the support of and provide services to the nation's media:

 In the spring of 1973, nearly 20,000 Bicentennial media kits were distributed by the ARBC to the nation's media. There were three separate versions of the kit: one for television stations, one for radio stations and one for print media. Included in the kits were audio and video spot announcements, color slides, mats and offset material for reproducing the Bicentennial symbol, and brochures setting forth ways in which reprints could be used to help spread the message of the Bicentennial. Written, oral and visual material was provided in Spanish as well as in English.

• In 1973, a series of five feature articles on Bicentennial subjects was distributed to 3,500 weekly newspapers through a commercial news service.

 In mid- and late 1974, a public service campaign based on the theme "Get into America" was conducted with the broadcast media. Radio stations were provided with discs of theme music that had time in the middle for copy to be read by local announcers. A variety of musical arrangements was provided to fit a wide range of station formats. The records were designed for use with public service copy provided by the ARBA or

local Bicentennial committees. The ARBA provided a series of six 60 second and six 30 second spots to 6,300 radio stations for use with the disc.

A series of six 60 second and six 30 second filmed announcements was distributed to 854 television stations, including the major networks. The announcements were self-contained and featured animated puppet characters voicing various Bicentennial messages. The television spots were also translated into Spanish for use by 150 of the Spanish-language stations in the country.

- In 1976, the ARBA produced two 10 second television film spots featuring the national Bicentennial symbol in animated form. These were distributed throughout the nation and world-wide via the American Forces Radio and Television Service. Two additional one minute public service spots were produced for radio and distributed to all U.S. radio stations and the American Forces Radio and Television Service. They featured ways to display the national Bicentennial flag and announced the availability to the public, at no charge, of the monthly Bicentennial Times.
- A promotional package on the July 4, 1976 national bell-ringing program, for use on the air, was produced and distributed to all radio and television

stations and networks. A set of 35mm color slides and other materials were included in the package for television.

- The ARBA organized an information clearinghouse that covered a range of commercially syndicated programs of an historical/Bicentennial nature broadcast by radio and television stations, and provided a quarterly listing of such programs to stations requesting it. As the demand for this service grew, the National Association of Broadcasters began distributing the information to 4,500 radio and 750 television management executives.
- A Bicentennial College Network
  was established in which 40 college
  radio stations exchanged Bicentennial
  programming among themselves. The
  network provided a medium through
  which student-operated radio facilities
  could join in the national celebration and
  encourage an interest in and awareness
  of the Bicentennial within the college
  community.
- A four page, tabloid size photographic reproduction sheet featuring 25 Bicentennial-related black and white photographs was produced by the ARBA and distributed to 12,440 small and medium size newspapers to meet their growing demand for such material.

- A photographic/color slide service was provided to magazines, newspapers, employee publications, television networks and locally owned stations and other non-print audio-visual users such as exhibitors and companies producing Bicentennial multimedia presentations. The slide library grew to some 10,000 35mm color slides of Bicentennial-related people, places and events.
- In April 1976, a Bicentennial Weekend Media Information Center was established to offer information services to print and broadcast journalists. Group and individual briefings on nationwide July 4 Bicentennial weekend activities took place daily. Display boards showed major and representative events. A Bicentennial Information Network (BINET) terminal provided immediate access to specific program details in answer to media requests. The center coordinated the nationwide simultaneous bell-ringing program on July 4th at 2:00 p.m. EDST.

· ARBA Administrator John W. Warner, in meeting his pledge to visit each state, territory, Puerto Rico and the District of Columbia, responded to invitations of newspapers—from The San Diego Tribune to The Atlanta Constitution, from The New York Daily News and The New York Times to The Washington Star and The Arkansas Daily Leader—to brief editorial boards and other representatives. He also met with representatives of major national women's magazines such as Ladies' Home Journal, McCall's, Mademoiselle, MS, Family Weekly, Woman's Day and Good Housekeeping, all of which carried aritcles on the Bicentennial. Warner appeared regularly on local and national television and radio programs. For example he was on the TODAY SHOW (NBC), Good Morning America (ABC) and The Dinah Shore Show (CBS), among others.

In addition, Warner, both in his travels and while in Washington, gave hundreds of individual interviews.

- Steady contact was maintained with major general and special interest magazines, which were provided with ARBA materials and suggestions for coverage.
- Grade school, high school, college and university publications reaching millions of young people were given

continuous assistance in the form of finished articles, resource materials and releases, briefings for editors on feature materials, consultation on editorial problems, and contacts with different sources of information. Feature articles and stories exploring how the nation's youth could effectively join in the Bicentennial appeared in virtually every issue of major youth publications, such as the Scholastic Magazines group, My Weekly Reader group (with some 20 separate publications), Student Advocate (the publication of the National Association of Student Councils), Teen Times (Future Homemakers of America), Junior Messenger and National Geographic World.

• A contract not to exceed \$184,000 was entered into with Discover America Travel Organizations, Inc. (DATO) to develop a national and regional media campaign to assist the traveling public by providing information about Bicentennial events. The program, called *Discover Bicentennial America*, involved the release of biweekly, regional listings of the top activities in each of the nine DATO travel regions and a listing of the top 20 major events nationwide on a monthly basis.

DATO distributed these listings to 5,100 daily and weekly newspapers, 1,000 radio stations and 949 television stations, blanketing the major media markets.





 In October 1975, the ARBA signed a contract with Carl Byoir & Associates, Inc. to assist in carrying out a national public awareness program to further the ARBA's six broad information goals (see page 221). The request for proposal and the contract, which was awarded according to standard government procedures, had two unusual features: (1) bidders were told in advance how much money was available (\$200,000) and made their proposals according to what they felt could be accomplished for that amount; and (2) submissions were evaluated in part on the "extent to which offeror will make available his resources as a public service to the accomplishment of the contract objectives." This obviously meant the amount of services which would be donated free of charge.

Under the contract, the Byoir organization produced 25 five minute radio shows and distributed them to 920 interested stations; a 90 second



television spot for 156 stations requesting it; a 75 second television news feature for 325 stations requesting it; and prepared and distributed a series of 25 Bicentennial feature columns, used by 385 daily newspapers. Byoir representatives also made personal visits to the management of all major dailies and radio and television stations in 50 principal cities; arranged for appearances by ARBA Administrator Warner on national television shows: and arranged for a continuous Bicentennial message to be displayed on the Bulova Watch sign in Times Square, New York City, during November and December 1975.

The Byoir contract was later amended to provide an additional \$40,000 to be used to stimulate minority involvement in the Bicentennial, primarily through assistance to the minority media.

• The ARBA transferred \$49,665 to the National Hispanic Bicentennial Commission for three special Spanish language issues of the *Bicentennial Times* and for Spanish language Bicentennial radio spots.

• The ARBA also sponsored a "registration and vote" campaign with The Advertising Council, Inc. in the fall of 1976. The campaign, designed by Needham, Harper and Steers, Inc. of New York City, the volunteer agency selected by The Advertising Council, was keyed to "carrying forth the Bicentennial spirit displayed on the July 4th weekend

into the local and national elections scheduled in November of 1976." The ARBA provided \$90,598.66 to reimburse The Advertising Council and the volunteer agency for the cost of materials and out-of-pocket expenses incurred in the production and distribution of the public service campaign. The campaign was carried out via radio, newspapers, magazines and advertisements on buses.

### **Publications and Kits**

A broad array of printed materials was produced by, for or with the support of the ARBC/ARBA in efforts to communicate with general or specific audiences. Material ran the gamut from pamphlets encouraging participation to booklets suggesting ideas "how to." In between were a monthly newspaper covering Bicentennial news events and a booklet answering the questions most often asked about the Bicentennial. Some of the materials were produced in large quantities for mass distribution. Others were printed in more limited numbers for distribution to selected audiences.

A variety of reports, some required by law, was produced as part of the overall communications effort. In addition to those distributed free by the ARBA, many were sold through the U.S. Superintendent of Documents, Washington, D.C.

Mass-produced material was shipped in bulk to ARBA regional offices and state Bicentennial organizations and used to respond to individual queries and requests for general information. All of the major publications were provided to the nation's media, which were permitted to reproduce the material.

The following selective list of publications illustrates the scope and kinds of printed materials produced to communicate information about the Bicentennial. (A complete list of all master register and calendar of event books derived from BINET appears later on page 255.)

 The Bicentennial Times—the monthly newspaper of the ARBA. It grew out of a monthly newsletter called Bicentennial Era, begun by the ARBC in 1970. Circulation increased from 60,000 in December 1973 to almost 400,000 by 1976. Offered free to everybody, the 35 editions of the *Times* carried articles on international, national, regional, state and community participation in the Bicentennial, as well as news of ARBA programs and activities. A half-million copies of the 20 page, July 1976 souvenir edition were printed to satisfy requests. The final issue, published early in 1977, provided a recap of the commemoration up to that date; it ran 24 pages.

Bound editions of the entire series were produced and are being sold by the U.S. Superintendent of Documents. Washington, D.C.

- Documents of Democracy—the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution, with the Bill of Rights and other amendments, set in readable type. (Two hundred thousand distributed through the ARBC/ARBA, plus sales by the Superintendent of Documents.)
- 200 Years Young—a pamphlet describing youth projects and activities already underway and giving examples of activities young people could initiate in commemoration of the Bicentennial. (Five hundred thousand distributed through the ARBA.)
- What You Can Do: A Bicentennial Idea Book—described 20 ways
  Americans were participating in the
  Bicentennial and illustrated a diversity of ideas for commemorating the nation's 200th anniversary. (Four hundred thousand distributed through ARBA regional offices.)
- Questions and Answers about the Bicentennial—a 20 page, four color brochure answering the 16 questions most frequently asked about the Bicentennial. (One million distributed through the ARBA.)
- These Are Your Flags, Fly Them Proudly—an illustrated full color brochure explaining the origin, purpose and availability of the official national Bicentennial flag and covering in detail the correct manner in which it and the 50 star national ensign should be displayed. Information on well-known historic flags

and their display was also included. (One hundred and ten thousand distributed through the ARBA and 110,000 through the Peoples Life Insurance Company of Washington, D.C., which designed and printed the brochure as a public service.)

- Above Ground Archaeology—a booklet describing a program developed for junior and senior high school students, which involved a search for artifacts and objects relating to our cultural heritage. (Forty-five thousand distributed through the ARBC/ARBA, plus the Superintendent of Documents.)
- Visitors' Official Bicentennial Guide to the Nation's Capital—a special guide for visitors to Washington, D.C. during the last half of the Bicentennial year.

(Five hundred thousand distributed through the ARBA.)

- City Host: A Program to Improve Visitor Services—a manual of methods, based on Boston's Bicentennial planning experiences, for developing visitor services programs, to assist other communities. (Fifteen thousand distributed by the ARBA.)
- Low-Cost Accommodations—

   a handbook describing means of establishing low-cost lodging in communities. Names and addresses of sponsors of existing low-cost accommodations and of federal agencies involved in projects were listed. (Fifteen thousand distributed by the ARBA.)
  - · Travelers' Guide to Source

Information—a guide which included sources for all types of travel information, including accommodations and transportation. (Ten thousand distributed by the ARBA.)

- Bicentennial Travel Intentions
  Survey (October-November 1975)—an
  analysis of current information on
  consumer travel plans for vacations and
  weekend trips in 1976, with special
  reference to Bicentennial sites
  and events.
- Call for Achievement—a general booklet encouraging citizen participation in community planning and setting of goals. It also provided helpful information on how to get a program started. The booklet was designed to make available to citizens information and tools helpful in the organization and implementation of citizen involvement programs.
- Characteristics of Community-Wide Citizen Involvement Programs—Call for Achievement Booklet I—described citizen participation efforts in different communities which had undertaken programs to set goals.
- Determining Citizen Interest in Beginning a Citizen Involvement Program—Call for Achievement Booklet II—contained helpful suggestions for establishing a local citizen participation program for planning and for setting community goals.
- Community Rediscovery '76—a "how to" kit for communities on developing projects to identify and dramatize aspects of their cultural heritage.
- Community Resource Center Notebook—provided comprehensive "how to" advice on setting up and running a community resource center.
- Event Planning Workbook—based on Boston's experiences in planning and

- organizing its commemoration of the Bicentennial, the workbook served as a basic research and resource tool for communities of all sizes and varieties.
- Horizons '76 Ideabook—a booklet describing successful local, state and national Bicentennial projects of lasting value which could be duplicated by other communities and organizations.
- Horizons on Display—a 120 page catalogue spotlighting 200 community projects across the country which demonstrate the continuing American capacity to find creative solutions to community needs.
- Challenge/Response—Part of the Continuing American Revolution—a series of 10 papers encouraging community discussion of health, the environment, leisure, economic development, human values and understanding, communications, learning, transportation, citizen involvement and community development.
- A Guide to 200 Sites—a brochure identifying the location of and briefly describing the 200 Horizons on Display sites.
- The American Bicentennial Jazz Celebration—a plan for a multi-part program to commemorate jazz as the United States' truly indigenous art form.
- Resource Development in the Private Sector: A Technical Assistance Manual—a guide to help develop skills and refine approaches for effective fundraising in the private sector.
- Bicentennial Junior Committees of Correspondence Kit—a set of materials to assist elementary schools across the country in establishing Committees of Correspondence for the exchange of letters by students on their programs, plans and activities for commemorating the Bicentennial.

- Environmental Living Program Kit a teachers' "how to" manual for planning overnight visits to cultural and historic sites which provide students with unique learning experiences.
- Graphics Manual—a booklet on the design and use of the national Bicentennial symbol, including artwork suitable for reproduction.
- Guide to Religious Activities—a listing of national Bicentennial programs sponsored by religious and interreligious organizations.
- Report to the President—submitted by the ARBC on July 4, 1970. It outlined proposals for the commemoration of the nation's 200th anniversary.
- Report to Congress—submitted annually by the ARBC in 1970, 1971, 1972 and 1973.
- Report to Congress—submitted annually by the ARBA in 1975 and 1976. In 1977, this final report was submitted.
- Bicentennial Ethnic/Racial Council (BERC) Conference Report, January 20–22, 1975—a description of the national BERC conference, the policy recommendations adopted and recommendations for federal agency Bicentennial programs dealing with ethnic and racial topics.
- Bicentennial Ethnic/Racial Report, January 1976—summary of previous BERC reports, national and international activities, National Bicentennial Ethnic/Racial Alliance news and a calendar of ethnic events.
- Bicentennial Ethnic/Racial Report, April 1976—highlighted significant racial and ethnic activities nationwide and overseas for the Bicentennial.

- Religion and the American Bicentennial—A Report—a summary of the major activities undertaken by religious groups and organizations to commemorate the Bicentennial.
- Report on the National Bicentennial Consultation on Religion and the American Experience—the proceedings of a meeting of religious leaders held in Washington, D.C., jointly sponsored by the ARBA and Project Forward '76.
- Women Involved: A Report on the Bicentennial Achievements of Women—highlighted a variety of programs and activities undertaken by women for the Bicentennial.

### Audio-Visual Materials

As indicated earlier, the ARBC/ARBA concentrated a great deal of effort on providing audio-visual support and materials to the nation's broadcast industry. Emphasis was also given to providing schools, clubs, organizations and communities with informational and motivational films, film strips and slide shows for use in their efforts to stimulate participation and to reach special audiences with particular interests.

The rapidly changing nature of the Bicentennial and the communications challenge is revealed by titles of some of the films produced by the ARBC/ARBA.

Brothers Ron and Lloyd Walker, winners of Wells Fargo Bank's "Toward Our Third Century" Bicentennial Awards program for their film on the need for a balanced environment



The first was titled *Call to Action*, reflecting the planning phase of the Bicentennial. It was followed by *Launching of the Bicentennial Era*, on the implementation phase. A final film, produced by the ARBA in late 1975, was called simply *Bicentennial USA*. It depicted the commemoration as it was being carried out across the nation. A similar progression was characteristic in the production of slide presentations.

The following examples illustrate the variety of audio-visual materials produced by the ARBC/ARBA.

- Bicentennial Film List—a
  compilation of titles and availability for
  rental and purchase of films dealing with
  the Bicentennial and the history of the
  United States.
- Bicentennial USA—a three screen, nine projector, multimedia production. The show, which contained 720 slides and ran 14 minutes, provided a panoramic view of the U.S. and an overview of the wide variety of Bicentennial activities and events taking place across the country.
- Bicentennial USA—a 13 minute, 16mm color film explaining the themes and goals of the nation's 200th anniversary commemoration and offering glimpses of Bicentennial activities across the country. It was also available on videotape cassette for use by television.
- *CIVIC Videotapes*—10 videotapes on successful citizen involvement programs undertaken through the *Call for Achievement* program.
- Horizons '76 Slide Show—a description of the Horizons '76 concept, giving examples of Horizons projects across the country.

- *Many Voices*—a 10 minute, 16mm color film encouraging participation in the Bicentennial and promoting cultural pluralism.
- The Third Lantern for the Third Century—a 30 minute color film on the ceremony at the Old North Church commemorating the 200th anniversary of Paul Revere's ride. This film was an edited version of Boston television station WBZ's live coverage of the April 18, 1975 event.
- A Gift of Time—a 28 minute, 16mm film on the development and role of voluntarism in the United States.
- Horizons on Display—a 16 minute sound and slide show explaining the national Horizons on Display Program.

### Talking Up the Bicentennial

Following the example set by the ARBA administrator, staff agreed to speak at the drop of an invitation. Warner himself traveled over 300,000 miles and visited every state, territory and the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico at least once during the two and a half years he served as Bicentennial administrator. He spoke before joint sessions of state legislatures, to civic and business groups, to Bicentennial organizations, and to any other gathering of people, large or small, with an interest in commemorating the nation's 200th anniversary. The entire staff, from assistant administrators to secretaries and youth volunteers. ranged far and wide to fill speaking engagements coordinated by the ARBA Speakers' Bureau, which actively sought speaking engagements through which to reach a broad variety of audiences.

Concerted efforts were made to persuade other officials, dignitaries and public figures to include a Bicentennial message in their speeches. Special emphasis was placed on providing members of Congress with general background information and specific details of Bicentennial activities taking place among their constituents. Two speakers manuals were developed primarily to support the needs of the Congress. The manuals were also made available to members of the ARB Board and ARB Advisory Council and to other speakers. They contained sample speeches, quotes and other material covering a wide variety of pertinent information and current data on national. state and local Bicentennial activities.

### Posters, Exhibits, Decals

The ARBC produced 10 identical 14 panel Bicentennial traveling exhibits—one for circulation in each of the 10 federal regions. The ARBA developed three smaller tabletop exhibits for use by its regional directors and by state and local Bicentennial committees. In addition, 1,000 cardboard stacker exhibits were distributed to local organizations, and a special 20 foot audio-visual exhibit was constructed and placed in the National Airport in Washington, D.C. by the ARBA.

A series of five posters was developed, covering the national Bicentennial symbol, the slogan "A Past to Remember/A Future to Mold," and the theme "Get into America." In 1973, the "Past to Remember" poster was placed in each of the country's 24,000 post offices. By 1974, bumper stickers and decals had been designed and produced with the "Get into America" theme and the national symbol. Limited free distribution of the posters and decals was made to state Bicentennial commissions, but these items were primarily available by purchase through the Superintendent of Documents, Washington, D.C. or through firms licensed by the ARBA. Bulk rates were available.

A postage meter ad plate was also designed, featuring the national Bicentennial symbol and the slogan, "A Bicentennial Community." The plate was distributed free of charge by the ARBA to each of the Bicentennial Communities, Campuses and Military Commands.

### **Special Events**

A great deal of time, effort and energy went into staging and supporting special events as a means of communicating the Bicentennial. At local, state,

regional, national and international levels, these efforts drew extensive media coverage, which called attention not only to the program or project involved, but also to the Bicentennial generally. Special events ranged from presentation of national Bicentennial flags and certificates of recognition for communities and designated projects to support for and participation in such major attractions for television audiences as the Super Bowl, the Tournament of Roses Parade and other football events, i.e., the Orange, Liberty, Cotton, Sun and Sugar Bowls.

Taking advantage of that unique American institution, the football half-time show, the ARBA developed a plan for a Bicentennial half-time show. It was distributed free to college and high school bands. Participants in ARBA-sponsored or supported events included the President, Vice President, cabinet officers, members of Congress, the ARBA administrator and deputy administrator, members of the ARB Advisory Council and the ARB Board and members of the ARBA staff.

When Communities, College Campuses, Military Installations and Commands, members of Bicentennial Alliances, national recognition programs, and international projects and programs are taken together, over 15,000 Bicentennial flags and certificates of recognition were awarded by the ARBC/ARBA, usually with special ceremonies coordinated by the ARBA and generally covered by the media.



### Media Recognition Program

A total of 332 news media or related organizations were recognized by the ARBA under the *National Bicentennial Media Recognition Program* for their contributions to the nation's 200th birthday celebration. Recognition was possible for any media group whose primary function was to communicate news, feature articles and programs of historical, cultural or educational value and which provided public service information on a regular basis.

Eligible organizations received recognition for undertaking one or more of the following activities:

(1) development of special Bicentennial programs and feature material beyond the scope of their regular activities, aimed at furthering public awareness, interest and support for the national Bicentennial program;

- (2) substantial expansion of public service efforts to include special messages on various Bicentennial activities; and
- (3) direct sponsorship of one or more major Bicentennial programs in support of international, national or regional Bicentennial efforts or state or local Bicentennial efforts having special significance to the nation.

Recognition came as a result of a variety of contributions, such as for these types of activities:

 Television stations aired historical programs researched and performed by students. Radio stations aired one minute slices of local history, provided air time for citizens to suggest ways to join in the Bicentennial, and broadcast up-to-the-minute tourist information; and

 Print media published supplements and special editions detailing local and regional history and sponsored essay, art and poster contests.

### The Media Pitch In

A sampling of the activities of the 332 media organizations which received recognition makes clear that they played a leading role in the commemoration and contributed significantly to local, state, regional and national historical knowledge through special programming and printed supplements. In many cases, they were catalysts for individual and community participation in the Bicentennial.

- A television station in Harrisonburg, Virginia produced a series of four films on the history of the Shenandoah and its people.
- In Blackwell, Oklahoma, The Blackwell Journal-Tribune provided its readers with articles about the history of the area, featuring heirlooms and photographs found in attics and submitted by readers.
- A student-run newspaper, Stuarts Draft Meteorite, is the only newspaper in Stuarts Draft, Virginia. It offered citizens an opportunity to express their thinking about the Bicentennial and kept them abreast of major Bicentennial events in the state and area.

Edward Herrmann and Jane Alexander starred in a special two hour ABC-TV theater presentation, Eleanor and Franklin

- Radio stations WCYN in Cynthiana, Kentucky and WAGE in Leesburg, Virginia supported the restorations of log cabins.
- WSBS Radio in Great Barrington, Massachusetts served as a center for information on abandoned cars in its listening area.
- The Enderlin Independent in Enderlin, North Dakota donated an antique printing press to the Enderlin museum.
- Proceeds from the sale of special editions of *The Daily News* in Batavia, New York were used to buy display cases for a museum in that city.
- Senior citizens in Redfield, South Dakota were featured in KFCB (Victoria Broadcasting System) Radio's historic minutes.
- The Newport News-Times in Newport, Oregon promoted friendship between citizens of Japan and the United States through sponsorship of a Sister City program.
- The Saginaw News (Saginaw, Michigan) cosponsored a three day Bicentennial Constitutional Convention. Nearly 150 high school students, representing every school in the county, participated in an exercise to rewrite the Constitution.
- In Washington state, Washington State University's television station for children documented the history of Blacks in the Pacific Northwest.

Among the larger organizations recognized were CBS Radio, the National Broadcasting Company, The Washington Post, Louisville's Courier-Journal and the National Newspaper Association. The Conrad (lowa) Record, with a weekly circulation of 1,238, and the one kilowatt radio station WKBK in Keene, New Hampshire were typical of the small organizations recognized. Coin World, published in Sidney, Ohio, was one of many magazines recognized.

#### The BINET Chronicle

As mentioned previously, provision of a master Bicentennial calendar was a key goal of the ARBC and the ARBA. The ARBC staff first discussed the concept of a computerized master calendar in 1969. In April 1971, the ARBC recommended to Congress that it be authorized to provide "a Bicentennial calendar or register of programs and projects . . . a central clearinghouse for information and coordination."

While the ARBC was awaiting congressional action, it asked the National Bureau of Standards (NBS) to study ARBC's information system needs. In October 1971, the NBS recommended computerization with an on-line or direct access system for information storage and retrieval. During 1972, positive congressional response to the original ARBC recommendation led to further refinement of the concept.

#### Development Under ARBC

By January 1973, funds were made available, and development of the Bicentennial Information Network (BINET) began, BINET was to be the basic computer system to support the ARBC's efforts to meet its requirements for a master calendar, register of projects and information clearinghouse. BINET was to provide not only a means of storing and retrieving data on Bicentennial activities, it was also to enable various publications, such as the calendars of events and lists of projects, to be produced more easily and cheaply. In addition, it would permit statistical analyses of the data, for example, projects by theme or region. This enabled the ARBC and the ARBA, as well as other organizations, to monitor

activities to ensure balance among the theme areas, to encourage diversity and to prevent duplication or overlap.

## BINET Unveiled

BINET was officially "born" on July 3, 1973, the date that availability of the on-line computer terminal service was announced. At that time, barely 100 activities were on file in the computer. By October of that year, however, BINET had registered 488 Bicentennial activities of state, national and international scope. In addition, a prototype publication listing those events had been produced using the computer; seven of the 10 ARBC regional offices had terminals with access to the centralized BINET data base: 10 terminals were in use at ARBC headquarters; and a staff of six had been assigned to BINET development and operations.

#### BINET Under ARBA

The law creating the ARBA in 1974 placed prime emphasis on the need for a master calendar and broadened BINET's scope by calling for the inclusion of local as well as state, national and international Bicentennial projects. By April 1974, when the first formal master calendar/register book was produced, 1,869 Bicentennial activities had been catalogued in BINET.

Under newly-named Administrator Warner, ARBA policy reviews of the BINET operation led to an augmented staff and a new name for the division—Master Calendar Services, located within the Office of States and Programs. The Master Calendar Services staff was primarily involved in supporting Bicentennial program

development and coordination. They also continued to expand the BINET on-line terminal service and publications program.

During this same period, development of an automated information management and reporting system to support ARBA's *Bicentennial Communities Program*—BICOM (Bicentennial Communities System)—was begun. It became operational by the end of 1974.

ARBA staff functions were reorganized in January 1975 to adjust to the shift from a planning role to an operational role of coordinating and supporting other Bicentennial activities. The Division of Master Calendar Services was transferred to the Office of Communications and Public Affairs. For BINET, the emphasis was shifted from project registration to acquisition of data on Bicentennial events and communication of details of those events to a wide audience through a newly-designed series of calendar publications. The first of the comprehensive calendar of events books appeared in June 1975; information was based on details of the 5.078 events on file in BINET at the time.

From the summer of 1975 through the fall of 1976, Master Calendar Services was fully occupied with operation of BINET, BICOM, the publications program and an ad hoc special report capability.

The last calendar publication appeared in September 1976. BINET on-line service to the public was discontinued in December 1976. The last BINET file update was carried out on January 28, 1977. It showed that 66,484 Bicentennial activities had been processed since the system's inception. With the delivery of the copy comprising the bulk of Volumes III, IV and V of this report, BINET ceased operations in March 1977.

## Communications Through BINET

BINET provided the ARBA with three effective means of reaching its audience: on-line service, books and special reports.

#### On-Line Service

Through ordinary telephone connections, computer terminal users coast-to-coast were able to query the central computer data base directly. Over the four years of operations, 55 organizations and individuals used their terminals to make an estimated total of 30,000 calls to the BINET computer. Nine federal agencies used terminals to assist with coordination (i.e., the National Park Service) and with foreign visitor services (i.e., the Department of State). Eight private firms used BINET for relatively brief periods for public relations and demonstrations (i.e., Sperry UNIVAC and IBM). Ten state Bicentennial commissions participated in an ARBA-sponsored shared-cost terminal use program.

Internally, ARBC and ARBA staff in the Washington, D.C. headquarters used 10 terminals for a wide variety of informational needs. The 10 regional offices also had terminals giving access to the BINET files as well as to the growing Bicentennial Communities data base. Master Calendar Services staff itself, and contractors working on the data-gathering operation, used another eight terminals for operation and maintenance of the complex system with its many programs and thousands of pages of data and indices.

Much of the ARBA's on-line use. involved response to media inquiries. Hundreds of newspaper, magazine, radio and television reporters called for quick, up-to-date facts, and BINET delivered. Eventually some of this traffic was handled in a centralized manner through the previously mentioned DATO contract, through which capsule summaries of Bicentennial events were provided to key media outlets. DATO used BINET printouts as the basis for its listings and summaries and a BINET terminal to update them each week.

### Books Reached Further

The computer terminals were effective in spreading the word quickly through a relatively small number of outlets. But the ARBA needed to satisfy the informational needs of thousands of planners, coordinators and publicists. So BINET data were put into books. Computer phototypesetting technology was used to reduce book production time to about a month and the wholesale cost per copy to less than \$2. The timely availability of up-to-date reference books at a reasonable cost permitted the widespread dissemination of Bicentennial information. Copies of each book in the series of 14 (see accompanying list) were sent to members of Congress, all federal agencies, each state Bicentennial commission and recognized Bicentennial Communities. ARBA regional offices had additional copies to meet further state or community needs.

The publications were the most comprehensive record of Bicentennial activities available, and they had a far-reaching effect on Bicentennial planning. Local, state and regional Bicentennial organizations learned of worthy model projects and copied them. Plans were checked against those of other locations, and the resulting friendly competition increased both the quality and quantity of Bicentennial observances. The publications fostered greater diversity by reducing duplication, thus helping to ensure a more balanced nationwide celebration. A comparison of the numbers of events listed in two two-volume editions of the comprehensive calendars—one set containing events east of the Mississippi, the other events west of the Mississippi—revealed a healthy balance of activities across the country.

Beginning with the first calendar, which was published in June 1975, copies of all publications were sent to the 15,000 names on the mailing list of print and broadcast media. Hundreds more had gone to tour and travel organizations, foreign embassies in this country and American embassies and consulates abroad. Through these outlets, the calendars sparked a wave of increasingly positive publicity which reached millions here and abroad. The appearance of the thousands of events listed in the Bicentennial calendars as early as June 1975 showed people that they did not have to wait until July 4, 1976 to participate in Bicentennial activities.

# 256 Special Reports

Certain specialized requests could not be satisfied through either the computer terminals or the periodic publications. In one case, a major TV network wanted listings of selected activities in the viewing areas of each of the seven stations it owned and operated. In another, a mass transit operator wanted a list of events occurring along its major routes. In a third, a publisher of calendars wanted, for one of its products, event lists of certain subject areas on a monthly basis. And a major national newspaper needed a comparable list for a Bicentennial promotion.

The Beaver County Bicentennial Commission in Pennsylvania prepared a monthly listing of Bicentennial activities for publication in the Beaver County Times (shown examining a mock-up of the special page are commission members Eugene V. Atkinson, Eli G. Corak, George T. Pettibon and Chairman Edward A. Sahli)



Master Calendar Services prepared tailor-made BINET reports at cost in response to these and hundreds of similar special requests. However, the majority of the more than 770 special reports produced were prepared for internal ARBA use, often to provide basic data for other ARBA publications. Examples were the compendia on ethnic/racial programs, women's activities, international participation and *Horizons* programs.

The most visible ARBA publication was the *Bicentennial Times*. Beginning in early 1975, it regularly presented a centerfold calendar of key nationwide events, based on BINET files.

Among the most frequently produced reports were the periodic statistical analyses of Bicentennial activities, used as a basis for tracking the relative effects of planning and encouragement within certain geographic areas and the selection of subjects and areas of special emphasis. These reports on program subjects and balance appeared in a format similar to the tables which are shown on page 258 and succeeding pages.

#### The Statistical Bicentennial

BINET provided an excellent means of carrying out a variety of interesting statistical analyses of Bicentennial activities. Entries in BINET were cross-indexed in a variety of ways, permitting easy compilation of the tables which follow.

While the statistics in those tables are not based on every Bicentennial activity—project sponsors were not required to register their activities with BINET—approximately two-thirds of an estimated total of 100,000 activities were catalogued. Thus the statistics can be considered as representative of the overall balance and emphasis of Bicentennial planning and execution.

One further characteristic of the tables should be noted. When entries were made in BINET, they were characterized as "projects" or as "events." A project was seen as a planning or ongoing activity, whereas an event was something which happened at a particular time and place with an audience and participants. An example of this distinction would be the American Freedom Train "project" which gave rise to 137 "events" as the train crisscrossed the country during 1975 and 1976. In all, BINET recorded 27,489 projects and 38,995 events, for a total of 66,484 activities. However, the figures shown in the tables represent 25,343

projects and 38,995 events, for a total of 64,338 activities. The difference is a result of listing only once project entries which represented planning activities for one or more events, in order to avoid any double-counting.

Descriptive summaries of all project and event entries submitted by the states and other entities appear in Volumes III, IV and V of this report.

## Distribution of Activities

A primary piece of information recorded for each project and event was its location—city and state (or comparable jurisdiction). Table 1 shows the totals recorded by BINET for each state, territory, the District of Columbia, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico and foreign countries as a whole. It illustrates the distribution of activities across the country and abroad.

## From Agriculture to Travel

When submitting details to BINET, program sponsors were asked to indicate for their projects and events from one to five applicable subject areas from a list of 44. The resulting distribution by subject area is shown in Table 3. Because more than one subject area could be assigned, the totals are greater than the net number of projects and events—64,338.

The totals, while meaningless in themselves, do permit broad estimates to be made on the proportion of activities in certain subject areas—i.e., one out of 10 activities involved subjects related to community culture.

## From Awards to Trail Markers

Methods of presentation of Bicentennial activities are shown in Table 4. Sponsors were asked to indicate from one to five methods of presentation from a list of 31 for projects and 13 for events.

Though the same caveat applies to the totals in this table as applied in Table 3, here again they do allow broad estimates to be made of the relative popularity of the methods of presentation for the activities.

# Special Interest Groups

To identify activities which were directed toward a special interest group, such as youth, minorities, women and patriotic organizations, sponsors were asked to check from one to three categories from a list of 19 which indicated the special emphasis.

In over two-thirds of the cases, the category "general interest" was chosen by sponsors. The breakdown by other categories of interest is found in Table 5.

Totals are not given in this table, since the overlapping nature of the categories would make them meaningless.

# 264 By Geographical Scope

Table 6 provides a breakdown by geographical scope—the area from which an activity was realistically expected to draw the greatest interest, audience or participation. The scope could be local, state, regional, national or international.

As the figures show, it was a grassroots Bicentennial—nearly 80 percent of all activities were local.

#### Peak, Decline Confirmed




Figure 1 - Bicentennial Events, by Month, during the 22 Month Focal Period, March 1975-January 1977

In Figure 1, Bicentennial events are plotted on a graph using dates recorded for each event. The graph shows the expected peak in July 1976, but also emphasizes the continuity of activity between March 1975 and December 31, 1976, the period which by mandate the Master Calendar was to cover. The graph also shows an expected decline in activity for January 1977, after the end of the Bicentennial year.

The upper line on the graph shows the total number of events; the lower line represents longer events which continued from month to month. The vertical distance between these two lines gives the number of events starting in a given month.

Though the Bicentennial was definitely not "made in Washington," the federal government actively joined in the commemoration in a variety of ways appropriate to the missions of individual departments and agencies. All three branches of government participated.

## Legislative Branch

To ensure that the nation's Bicentennial commemoration included recognition of its historic and continuing role, the Congress established a Joint Committee on Arrangements for the Commemoration of the Bicentennial. The committee provided a central focus and acted as a clearinghouse for the planning and implementation of congressional Bicentennial programs and activities.

The purposes of the joint committee were threefold:

(1) to develop and implement programs to inform and emphasize to the nation the role the Congress has played from its historic beginnings in pre-Revolutionary days through 200 years of growth, challenge and change;

- (2) to coordinate congressional Bicentennial activities with activities and events planned by other governmental and nongovernmental groups; and
- (3) to make recommendations on congressional representation at appropriate Bicentennial ceremonies and events around the nation.

The committee, as established on September 5, 1975 by action of both the House and the Senate (Senate Concurrent Resolution 44), had 12 members:

Among the activities and facilities coordinated by the committee were a special ceremony commemorating the birthday of Thomas Jefferson, held April 13, 1976 in the Chamber of the House of Representatives; acceptance of the loan from Great Britain of one of the oldest copies of the Magna Carta, for display in the Capitol Rotunda from June 3, 1976 through June 1977; and a Congressional Visitor's Center—on the Mall just east of the U.S. Botanic Gardens—which operated during the summer of 1976 to assist visitors to the nation's Capitol.

Congressional support agencies also had active Bicentennial programs.

## Architect of the Capitol

- Coordinated the public opening and exhibition of the contents of the *Centennial Safe*.
- Coordinated the ceremony of acceptance and the exhibition of one of the four remaining copies of the Magna Carta, on loan from Great Britain.
- Exhibited Thomas Jefferson's draft of the Declaration of Independence.
- Exhibited the original drawings from the architectural competition for the design of the Capitol.
- Assisted the Joint Committee on Arrangements for the Commemoration of the Bicentennial.
- Restored the Old Supreme Court and Old Senate Chambers, now open to the public.
- Partial restoration of the Old Hall of the House.
- Publication of a 500 page catalogue, *Art in the United States Capitol*, under the direction of the Joint Committee on the Library.

## Library of Congress

- Letters of Delegates to Congress, 1774–1789, to be published in approximately 25 volumes. They will include more than 20,500 letters, documents and diary entries composed by delegates to the Continental Congress and the Congress of the Confederation. Publication is being assisted by a Ford Foundation grant; the project was not completed in 1976.
- With a grant from the Cafritz Foundation, presented five scholarly symposia on the American Revolution, devoted to fostering a deeper understanding of the Revolution, and published the papers of the symposia.

- Published a guide to the library's manuscripts from the Revolutionary period, entitled *Manuscript Sources for Research on the American Revolution*. Also published a guide to the library's prints and drawings from the same period, which was entitled *The American Revolution in Drawings and Prints*, and a guide to cartographic materials of the period.
- Other publications included: The American Revolution: A Selected Reading List; Periodical Literature on the American Revolution; Creating Independence, 1763–1789 (for young people); Children's Reading in America 1776; and Revolutionary America, 1763–1789, containing more than 12,000 bibliographic entries.
- Reprinted scarce Revolutionary period publications, including: English Defenders of American Freedoms, 1774–1789 and A Decent Respect to the Opinions of Mankind: Congressional State Papers 1774–1776, consisting of memorials to the peoples of Quebec, Great Britain, Ireland and North America, petitions to the king and circular letters.
- Prepared for publication such neglected source materials as an autobiographical memoir of American Captain John Paul Jones to Louis XVI justifying claims for a pension.
- Produced facsimiles of Paul Revere's engraving of the Boston Massacre and two 1778 rebuses. Prepared, also in facsimile, *The Journal of Gideon Olmsted*, the adventures of an American privateersman during the Revolution.
- With the support of the Ford Foundation, assembled for examination 17 of the 21 extant copies of the first printing of the Declaration of Independence—the broadside produced

- in John Dunlap's printing office on the night of July 4-5, 1776.
- With a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts, production of 15 long-playing recordings of folk music in America.
- In cooperation with the Eastman School of Music, presented the Bicentennial premiere of America's first ballad-opera written by a native, in the library's Coolidge Auditorium, on October 29 and 30, 1976. Composed by Andrew Barton, *The Disappointment, or the Force of Credulity,* as the libretto was called, was first published in 1767.
- Staged a major exhibit on the American Revolution in the library's Great Hall and issued a brochure on the exhibit, entitled *To Set a Country Free.*
- Renamed the Library of Congress Annex Building the Library of Congress Thomas Jefferson Building and held a symposium on Jefferson in October 1976 to mark the renaming.

#### **Judicial Branch**

The federal judiciary's Bicentennial programs were aimed at informing Americans of the role the federal courts played during the nation's formative years and at explaining its current functions. The Federal Judicial Conference, the policymaking body of the 100 federal courts, sponsored the efforts. The conference was chaired by Chief Justice of the United States Warren E. Burger.

The program included five 26 minute films dramatizing historical cases. Designed for use by television in schools and at civic meetings, the films and a book explaining the judicial system emphasize points of interest to laymen and give histories of each of the federal courts.

#### **Executive Branch**

Almost all executive branch departments and agencies developed special projects and events for the Bicentennial. To stimulate participation and to encourage the exchange of ideas, a Federal Agency Bicentennial Task Force of the Domestic Council Cabinet-Level Bicentennial Committee was formed in 1973 by Counselor to the President Anne L. Armstrong. The purpose was to bring together top level agency representatives on a periodic basis.

## 3rd Century America

The only government-sponsored exposition during the Bicentennial took place at Cape Canaveral, Florida, from May 30 through Labor Day, September 6, 1976. The National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) was designated by President Ford as host and lead agency for the exposition, called *3rd Century America*. The exposition dealt with the role science and technology are playing in improving the quality of life in America.

Seventeen federal departments and agencies, 10 industrial firms and seven universities and colleges sponsored exhibits based on the theme, "The Third Century of Human Progress and Free Government." Exhibits were displayed at various sites: in 15 geodesic domes assembled for the occasion; in the Vehicle Assembly Building, the third largest building in the world, where the nation's giant spacecraft have been assembled; and in the Launch Control Center.

The exposition served not only to demonstrate America's advances in science and technology, but also as an opportunity for all Americans to think about the future. The exhibits showed the present role of science and technology in health, education, industry, finance, communications and government affairs. Anticipated developments in such technologies as housing, agriculture, communications, aeronautics and space were also featured.

In addition to NASA, governmental agencies responding to the President's call for voluntary participation in the exposition included:

#### **Executive Branch Participation**

Following are descriptions of the Bicentennial programs of those executive branch departments and agencies which submitted information to the ARBA for inclusion in this report.

#### **ACTION**

• Provided technical assistance and \$25,000 for the Association of Junior Leagues' film on voluntarism, entitled *A Gift of Time*.

- Provided guidance, with \$25,000 from the ARBA under an Interagency agreement, for *Citizen Alert*. The program was sponsored by Women in Community Service. Women volunteers were trained to work with economically disadvantaged women and their families in communities across the nation.
- Granted \$267,414 to the Michigan Bicentennial Commission for the Michigan Bicentennial Volunteer Program, a cooperative effort between the federal and state governments and local Bicentennial committees to place and support local volunteers across the state to perform a wide variety of locally selected tasks.
- Provided technical assistance and guidance to the *National Congress on Volunteerism and Citizenship—1976*, held November 19–23, 1976 in Washington, D.C.
- Through the RSVP program for senior citizens, older Americans were placed in school systems to assist teachers.
- Authorized \$500,000 for a nationwide mini-grant program for various projects such as a Community Resource Center in Alaska.

#### Agriculture

- The Face of Rural America, a major Bicentennial photography project depicting American farming in 1976. Over 50 outstanding photographers participated. Photos from this collection are featured in a traveling exhibition and in the 1976 Yearbook of Agriculture.
- Participation in 3rd Century America. The exhibit showed what must be done to boost food production if population continues to increase. The substance of the exhibit was later moved to the Museum of Science and Industry in Chicago as a permanent feature.

- Accepted a collection of 53 bonsai trees from Japan on behalf on the people of the United States. The National Bonsai Collection was opened to the public on July 9, 1976 at the National Arboretum in Washington, D.C.
- The Herb Society of America provided a \$250,000 herb garden at the National Arboretum as a Bicentennial gift to the American people.
- Sponsored a Child Nutrition
   Bicentennial Project in cooperation with state departments of education and the American School Food Service
   Association.
- Extension Service produced and distributed over 40,000 copies of a brochure, entitled *Let's Plan a Birthday Party*, to local communities to assist them in planning Bicentennial celebrations.
- The May–June 1976 issue of the Extension Service Review featured 200 years of agriculture.

- Production and distribution of over 650 lightweight tabletop exhibits on home economics, in cooperation with various state and county extension offices.
- Limits, a Bicentennial slide presentation developed by the Soil Conservation Service, traced the development of conservation during the last 200 years.
- The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (SCS) distributed a variety of materials to its state and county offices for use in promoting Bicentennial activities. These included: Profiles in Agriculture, Our American Heritage and a series of articles on agricultural themes (George Washington Writes the First Crop Report, Birth of a Farm Census, Black Farmers: Winners of the Soil, Democracy in Education: The Land Grant Colleges and Women in American Agriculture).
  - SCS offices issued their own locally

- prepared newsletters, sponsored exhibits at state and county fairs and prepared sets of slides related to American agriculture's 200th anniversary.
- Celebrations of the Forest Service Centennial, 1876–1976, and the national Bicentennial were initiated at the Independence Hall in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.
- The Forest Service sponsored a series of landscape paintings by regional Forest Service artists, depicting the service's role in the past and present.
- Moon Tree seedlings, symbolizing *Horizons* and *Heritage*, were planted by the Forest Service at a special celebration, with the cooperation of state foresters in 40 states.
- The Bicentennial Woodsy Owl Campaign was promoted throughout the United States. The materials suggested nonpolluting ways to wish America a happy birthday.
- Highlights of the History of Forest Conservation was written and distributed nationally by the Forest Service.
- Staff at 155 National Forests and 740 ranger stations planned mini-museums and exhibits on local Bicentennial themes.
- Roots of the Nation, a film on the part forest resources played in the developing nation, was produced by the Forest Service.
- Research on Parade, an Agricultural Information Bulletin, chronicled 200 years of science in support of American agriculture.

#### Civil Service Commission

- Exhibits entitled *Civil Service and the Nation's Progress* were produced, one each for the commission's 10 regional offices and the central office. Showings were scheduled locally and throughout the nation.
- A revised CSC information pamphlet, *Civil Service and the Nation's Progress*, reflected the role of the civil service in the nation's history.
- Produced a sound/slide show, An Inventive Bunch/Civil Service and the Nation's Progress. Showings were scheduled locally and throughout regional and area offices and were also available to the public through the General Services Administration's National Audiovisual Center.
- Used the Bicentennial logo on commission stationery and on a number of CSC publications.
- The three commissioners and other CSC officials made reference to the Bicentennial year in a number of speeches.

#### Commerce

- The Economic Development Administration (EDA) funded numerous restoration projects and Bicentennial activities in conjunction with the ARBA. The most significant grant was for \$3 million in seed money for 3rd Century America.
- The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) provided a satellite weather project and a 50 foot ocean buoy for display at the Cape Canaveral exposition.

- The U.S. Travel Service encouraged domestic tourism through a public service advertising campaign entitled, See More of America When There's So Much to See.
- The Domestic and International Business Administration (DIBA) decorated 11 trade centers abroad with a Bicentennial theme and presented specialized exhibits explaining the 200 years of commercial relations between the U.S. and the countries in which the centers are located.
- The Patent and Trademark Office issued Patent No. 4,000,000 and Plant Patent No. 4,000 on December 28, 1976. It also held a *National Inventors Day* exhibit and issued a patent for the Bicentennial symbol.
- The Bureau of the Census placed Census USA, a three-dimensional lighted exhibit, in the lobby of the Department of Commerce in Washington, D.C. In addition, Census developed two color films: We and Fact Finder of the Nation. It also issued a third edition printing of Historical Statistics of the U.S.—Colonial Times to 1970 in honor of the Bicentennial.
- The Commerce Department hosted the Bicentennial Visitor's Center in its headquarters in Washington, D.C.

## Commission on Civil Rights

- Conducted a major study on school desegregation entitled, *Fulfilling the Letter and Spirit of the Law*.
- Published a series of reports based on the theme, "20 Years after the Brown Decision."



- Commemoration of the Army, Navy and Marine Corps Bicentennials in 1975.
- The Armed Forces provided many units and activities for patriotic celebrations, including special color guards, bands, exhibits, art collections and aerial demonstration teams: the Navy's Blue Angels, Air Force's Thunderbirds and Army's Silver Eagles and Golden Knights.
- On September 5, 1974, in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, the Armed Forces participated in the reenactment of the First Continental Congress with bands, troops and color quards.
- The Armed Forces Bicentennial Band, made up of 91 musicians from the premier Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps and Coast Guard bands, made appearances in more than 300 cities in all 50 states.
- Armed Forces Bicentennial Exhibit Vans were another major multiservice project. The tours of the vans focused on small cities and towns, of which more than 1,000 were visited.
- The International Naval Review coincided with Operation Sail-OPSAIL '76. The review included participation by 25 countries and 29 foreign warships of all classes.
- Recorded a special stereo record album of military music from America's heritage, called Broad Stripes and Bright Stars.
- Produced a 28 minute color film. Not for Ourselves Alone, on the role of the Armed Forces over the past 200 years.
- · Issued, in cooperation with the U.S. Postal Service, special 10 cent stamps honoring the Army, Navy, Marine Corps and National Guard.
- A special area for an historical art exhibit, designated The Bicentennial

Corridor, was dedicated at the Pentagon in May 1976.

- Improved the appearance of many headquarters, buildings and museums and provided tours of military installations.
  - Participated in 3rd Century America.

## Energy Research and Development Administration

- Cosponsored with the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development and the Federal Energy Administration the Solar Energy and Conservation Exhibit on the Washington, D.C. Mall from May 25 through October 5, 1976.
  - Participated in 3rd Century America.
- Published Bicentennial booklets. films and charts, including a booklet entitled Energy Trails, a film entitled Energy—The American Experience and an Energy History Chart showing the history of energy use in the United States.
- · Sponsored an exhibit and information center module for the Intermountain Science Experience Center in Idaho Falls, Idaho.
- · Sponsored the Experimental Breeder Reactor I, an Historic Landmark Exhibit, and other nuclear energy displays at Arco, Idaho.
- Sponsored the construction and operation of the new American Museum of Atomic Energy in Oak Ridge, Tennessee. It features displays and demonstrations on the history as well as the present and future uses of energy.

#### Environmental Protection Agency

- Participated in 3rd Century America.
- · Sponsored the President's Environmental Merit Awards Program

aimed at encouraging elementary and secondary school students to undertake environmental projects.

## Equal Employment Opportunity Commission

· Produced a slide show entitled, Destroying the Myths.

## Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation

- Arranged for exhibits in the lobby of the FDIC building in Washington, D.C. They included Smithsonian-sponsored exhibits such as Blacks in the Westward Movement, Ride On (on the development of the bicycle) and Manuscripts of the American Revolution.
- Imprinted the Bicentennial logo on corporation stationery.
- · Arranged for the distribution of Bicentennial memorabilia such as bumper stickers and patches to all FDIC employees.

#### Federal Energy Administration

 Participated in the Solar Energy and Conservation Exhibit on the Washington, D.C. Mall.

## Federal Reserve Board

- Contributed \$3,000 to the Bicentennial Information Center in the Great Hall of the Commerce Department
- Established a cultural program of art exhibits to acquaint employees and visitors with various types of paintings.
- Sponsored a series of exhibits by employees and their immediate families who are talented in the fine arts.

#### General Services Administration

 Established a Bicentennial Awareness Program for employees and their families by offering educational,

cultural and social opportunities related to the Bicentennial.

- GSA's 37 Federal Information
   Centers across the country served as focal points for information about
   Bicentennial activities.
- Publications developed by GSA during the Bicentennial period incorporated the Bicentennial logo in cover designs and included a Bicentennial theme where appropriate.
- Seven designs by artist Peter Max were used on bilingual welcome signs placed at 185 U.S. border stations, beginning June 1, 1976.
- GSA's Bicentennial Beautification Program included landscaping the grounds of federal buildings located in the Federal Triangle of Washington, D.C. and restoration of the U.S. Custom House in Philadelphia.
- Contracted for the development of a prototype for a nationwide system of new permanent exterior signs for federal buildings. Prototypes were installed in the Federal Triangle area during July 1976.
- Placed 10 three-dimensional replicas of the Federal Triangle area at locations around the triangle, to serve as permanent visitor orientation aids.
- Invited school children in communities where new federal buildings were being built to paint "Bicentennial" murals on fences surrounding construction sites.
- GSA construction site signs were redesigned to include the Bicentennial logo.

- Federal facilities controlled by GSA throughout the country were made available upon request to support national or community-based Bicentennial events.
- Remodeled the Great Hall in the Department of Commerce building for use by the Department of the Interior as a Bicentennial Visitor Center.
- Held approximately 60 ceremonies involving public buildings or fine arts. All ceremonies had a Bicentennial flair.
- FTS telephone operators altered their answering phraseology to include "U.S. Government—Bicentennial Greetings."
- The Federal Supply Service contracted for procurement of supplies and material relating to the Bicentennial. Federal agencies used these contracts for purchase of such items as plaques, bumper stickers, labels, decals, appliques, posters, traffic signs and Bicentennial flags.

Health, Education and Welfare

- BI-CENT-EX, HEW's Bicentennial exhibit, provided an educational and entertaining overview of the activities of the department and how they touch the lives of Americans. The exhibit center, at 200 Independence Avenue, S.W. in Washington, D.C., served as a rest area and meeting place for community groups.
- HEW's Bicentennial office provided brochures, articles and a *Bicentennial Bulletin* to disseminate information on the Bicentennial observance.
- The Public Health Service's Emergency Medical Services office sponsored a seminar in Baltimore, Maryland at which representatives of 25 countries delivered papers and discussed the status of emergency medical services in their respective nations.

- The Bicentennial office compiled a history of social services in the United States, entitled From Few to HEW, based on the life of Revolutionary Colonel William Few, Jr. The book is illustrated with cartoons.
  - Participated in 3rd Century America.
- The Office of Education produced an illustrated history of education in the United States, entitled *A Nation of* Learners.
- The National Institutes of Health provided a Bicentennial Health Research Trail at the NIH Campus Visitors Center and hosted a Public Open House, an Alumni Reunion and the dedication of a portrait honoring Charles Drew, a Black physician and "father" of the American Red Cross blood bank.
- NIH's National Library of Medicine exhibited rare books, journals and photographs of major figures in American medicine.
- The regional offices of HEW supplemented and encouraged local Bicentennial efforts with conferences, symposia, awards ceremonies and exhibits.

## Housing and Urban Development

• Cosponsored with the ARBA Horizons on Display, a national program recognizing 200 examples of community achievements that illustrate creative solutions to community problems. Horizons on Display was also the U.S. exhibit for Habitat, the United Nations Conference on Human Settlements, held in Vancouver, Canada in 1976.

- Issued Challenge/Response, a series of discussion booklets addressing citizen involvement, communications, community development, economic development, environment, health, human values and understanding, learning, leisure and transportation. The purpose was to involve citizens in dialogues about issues and policy for local action.
- Cosponsored a Solar Energy and Conservation Exhibit on the Mall in Washington, D.C. with the Energy Research and Development Administration, the Federal Energy Administration and Project Concern, a nonprofit organization.
  - Participated in 3rd Century America.
- Provided funding to the District of Columbia to develop an historical marking program as part of the D.C. Bicentennial Commission's *Heritage* program.
- Provided funding to the Citizen Involvement Network, a nonprofit organization, to lead an experiment with 20 community-based citizen involvement programs to demonstrate the effectiveness and techniques of citizen participation.
- Recognized with Bicentennial Design Citations 200 American design achievements accomplished prior to 1976.
- Provided funding to the Association of Science-Technology Centers to coordinate the development of a traveling exhibit on urban planning, entitled *Planning America's Great Cities*.

#### Interior

- America 1976, a touring art exhibit, consisted of some 75 original art works by 45 specially commissioned artists. It depicted the natural and historic resources administered by the Department of the Interior.
- The Office of Public Affairs published its annual *Conservation Yearbook* as a special Bicentennial edition, entitled *America 200—The Legacy of Our Lands*.
- A Bicentennial Open House in Interior's auditorium included films covering Interior's responsibilities and mission.
- The National Park Service (NPS) completed a \$100 million construction and development program at areas of historic and Revolutionary significance. Included were visitor facilities such as roads, centers, displays and exhibits.
- The NPS extensively renovated and reconstructed Independence National Historical Park in Philadelphia.
- At Minute Man National Historical Park in Massachusetts, the NPS commemorated the Battles of Lexington and Concord.
- The NPS's major construction and development projects in Washington, D.C. included: Constitution Gardens; elevators for the handicapped at the Lincoln and Jefferson Memorials; and athletic complexes at Fort Circle and Anacostia Community Parks.
- The NPS cosponsored with the Smithsonian Institution the Festival of American Folklife; sponsored the Frederick Douglass Mobile Bicentennial Theatre; cosponsored with the Marriott Corporation a revue of American music, presented at the Sylvan Theatre at the

foot of the Washington Monument; and cosponsored with the Association for Afro-American Studies a seminar on Black culture.

- The NPS produced two dramatic presentations—A Little Look Around and People of '76—and a traveling exhibit of Indian artifacts, Indian Pride on the Move.
- The NPS produced and distributed to parks 12 Bicentennial films, 13 folders, four booklets, 15 posters, one chart and over 30 exhibits.
- The Bureau of Land Management marked Oregon Trail, Pony Express Trail and Dominguez-Escalante Trail with line-of-sight concrete markers, erected information signs along public highways and established 24 historical interpretive sites.
- The Bureau of Land Management provided for hiking and riding along portions of its trails.
- The U.S. Geological Survey coordinated Interior's scientific 3rd Century America technological exposition.
- The Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) produced videotapes on cultural, economic development, ecological and other subjects selected by various tribes.
- Prominent Indian writers read from their own and documented works of the past in the BIA Literature and Oratory Program.
- A National Exhibit of Contemporary Indian Art toured nationwide through the end of 1976 and into 1977.

• The Johnny Horizon '76 environmental program, with the theme "Let's Clean up America for Our 200th Birthday," was the first *Horizons '76* program of the federal government to receive official ARBC recognition.

### Interstate Commerce Commission

 Worked with and encouraged regulated industries to engage in Bicentennial activities.

### Justice

- Participated in the ARBA/HUD exhibit, Horizons on Display. The department's contribution stressed the importance of community involvement in criminal justice and highlighted the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration's role in providing federal assistance to local communities.
- The department sponsored, as part of the Law Day celebration, a performance on Friday, April 30, 1976 of *The Boston Tea Party* by the theater group, The Proposition.
- Sponsored a series of lectures at colleges, universities and law schools throughout the nation on the theme, "Equal Justice under Law."
- The Immigration and Naturalization Service arranged mass naturalization ceremonies during the Bicentennial year. Sites included Fort McHenry, Baltimore; Williamsburg, Virginia; Boston Harbor, aboard the *U.S.S. Constitution;* and Norfolk, Virginia, aboard an aircraft carrier.
- The Federal Bureau of Investigation expanded its FBI Building Tour during the Bicentennial year.

## Labor

- Published *The American Worker*, a 328 page book with four-color illustrations chronicling the history of American working people from pre-Revolutionary to modern times. It was written by the nation's leading labor historians.
- Commissioned four 12 by 12 foot murals tracing the history of working Americans through four centuries, which have been installed in the new Department of Labor Building in Washington, D.C.
- Commissioned Morton Gould to compose an original musical salute to the American worker, which was presented Labor Day, 1976 at the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C.
- Sponsored a nationwide *Paul Revere Awards* program honoring citizenship and craftsmanship of school age citizens.
- The Working Americans Project was an integral part of the Smithsonian Institution's Festival of American Folklife.

### National Academy of Sciences

• The National Academy of Sciences Bicentennial symposium, *Science: A Resource for Humankind*, took place at the academy on October 11–13, 1976. Participating were invited members of the American scientific community and the general public, plus representatives from over 50 academies, royal societies, research councils and other world scientific bodies comprising the National Members and Constituent Unions of the International Council of Scientific Unions (ICSU), which was holding its 16th General Assembly at the academy the

same week. The symposium examined aspects of future benefits and hazards with respect to the projected growth of world population over the next century or two. The program included: (1) a retrospective analysis of the role of science and technology in the social and economic development of seven selected countries and the nature of this complex interaction; (2) consideration of the problem of successfully managing, world-wide and as of today, the quality of the human environment and the global supply of natural resources; and (3) discussion of innovations in science and technology, desirable or otherwise, that over the balance of the 20th century might affect such interrelated problems as world food supply, the nutrition, health and size of human populations, utilization of natural resources and the adequacy of energy supplies. A report of the symposium was filed with the Commission on International Relations, Office of the Foreign Secretary, National Academy of Sciences, 2101 Constitution Avenue, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20418.

- Displayed text, equipment and photographs outlining the history of calculators and computers since the 16th century in an exhibit entitled Calculators and Computers, History and Recent Advances.
- The roles of the Institute of Medicine and the National Research Council in Science, Technology and Public Policy were described in an exhibit entitled, Science, Engineering, Medicine in Service to the Nation and People.

## National Aeronautics and Space Administration

- Designated as host and lead agency for the only government-sponsored exposition during the Bicentennial year—*3rd Century America*—at Cape Canaveral, Florida, May 30 through September 6, 1976.
- Field installations participated in Bicentennial observances with educational television programs, a Tournament of Roses Parade float and conferences.
- Dedicated new Visitor Information Centers at Goddard Space Flight Center, Greenbelt, Maryland, and Lewis Research Center, Cleveland, Ohio.
- Cooperated with the Energy Research and Development Administration, Department of Housing and Urban Development and the National Home Builders Association to build a 1,500 square foot demonstration home at the Langley Research Center in Virginia. It features solar heating and cooling, wastewater recycling, solid-state appliance controls and other spinoffs from the space program.
- Participated in the opening of the Smithsonian Institution's National Air and Space Museum on the Mall adjacent to NASA headquarters in Washington, D.C.
- During a demonstration project on the transfer of advanced technology, a Bicentennial message from President Ford was beamed by satellite to television viewers in 27 developing countries.

• Other highlights of NASA's Bicentennial contribution were the landings on Mars of Viking I on July 20, 1976 and Viking II on September 3, 1976, as well as the first public appearance of the Space Shuttle Orbiter, a reusable spacecraft of the future, shown in rollout ceremonies at Palmdale, California on the 17th of September, 1976.

## National Archives and Records Service

- The primary Bicentennial project was the compilation of a massive *Index:* Journals of the Continental Congress, 1774–1789.
- The Publications Division produced a series of special booklets and reproductions of documents for Bicentennial visitors, including: special reproductions of the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution; souvenir certificates enclosing a reproduction of the Declaration of Independence; Declaration of Independence: Adventures of a Document, a history of the travels of the Declaration; a revised version of The Story of the Bill of Rights; and a 112 page illustrated book based on the National Archives' major Bicentennial exhibit—the Declaration of Independence, the Constitution and the Bill of Rights.
- Published Media for the Bicentennial, a 42 page booklet listing 50 motion pictures made by federal agencies.

- Prepared for later publication a *Guide to Pre-Federal Records in the National Archives,* which will describe records dated prior to March 4, 1789, as well as selected records of later dates which pertain to the pre-Federal period.
- Completion of a documentary study of the impact of the American Revolution on the British West Indies, supported by the National Historical Publications and Records Commission.
- Established an annual competition with a prize for scholarly articles honoring America's first official recordkeeper, Charles Thomson. Articles awarded the Thomson prize will be published in the Archives' quarterly journal, *Prologue*.
- Held the Quadrennial Congress of the International Council on Archives in Washington, D.C., September 27 to October 1, 1976, with 500 archivists from around the world attending.
- A Bicentennial conference on women's history, held April 22–23, 1976 at the Archives, focused on the political and social experience of women in America over the past two centuries, as reflected in federal records and other archival resources.
- The Archives' branch at Laguna Niguel, California was the sponsor of a conference on Bicentennial perspectives on the family, held January 24, 1976.
- The Philadelphia branch sponsored a conference on the theme, "American Revolution in the World Context."
- The Bayonne, New Jersey branch sponsored a spring conference on sources of history of New York and New Jersey during the Revolutionary War period.

- Exhibited *Her Infinite Variety: A 200-Year Record of America's Women* at the National Archives building in Washington, D.C.
- Exhibited *The Written Word*Endures: Milestone Documents of

  American History, containing 22 key
  documents that trace the nation's
  history, shown at the National Archives
  building.
- Undertook major renovation of the Exhibition Hall in the Archives building so that cherished documents could be displayed to best advantage.
- Prepared a series of exhibits for the Pennsylvania Avenue lobby of the National Archives building, including *The Founding of San Francisco*, 1776.
- Produced facsimiles of six major documents of the Revolutionary War period, accompanied by reproductions of famous paintings, portraits and maps, for exhibition at all 10 regional offices of the GSA.
- Exhibited at the 11 regional branches of the National Archives various Bicentennial-related facsimile records from the Archives in the areas of foreign assistance, financing the Revolution, land in the west, diplomacy and the armies of the northern and southern colonies.
- Made many loans from its valuable holdings of Papers of the Continental Congress and other Revolutionary War documents. Borrowers ranged from the Smithsonian Institution to the city of Greenville, Ohio and the *American Freedom Train*.

- Presidential libraries across the nation participated in the Bicentennial with exhibits and conferences, to name only two types of activities.
- On July 2, 1976, cosponsored with the ARBA the ceremonies opening the 76 hour vigil and viewing of the Declaration of Independence. In attendance were the President, Vice President, Chief Justice of the United States and Speaker of the House, as well as other dignitaries.
- On July 4, 1976, celebrated with an open house and reading of the Declaration of Independence, attended by some 10,000 people.

# National Capital Planning Commission

- Cosponsored with the Smithsonian Institution and the Commission of Fine Arts an exhibit entitled, *The Federal City: Plans and Realities*. A permanent exhibit is currently on display in the Smithsonian's Castle Building.
- Contracted with Frederick Gutheim, a recognized urban historian, for a book entitled, *Worthy of the Nation*, which relates the history of the physical development of the nation's capital.
- A shorter version of the Gutheim book was published for use with the exhibit, *The Federal City: Plans and Realities*.

#### National Endowment for the Arts

• Endowment efforts to preserve and disseminate the legacy of the performing arts resulted in the designation of *Dance Films* as a Bicentennial program, with grants awarded to organizations filming performances, primarily of modern dance.

- In fiscal year 1974, regular dance program funds for Bicentennial projects were awarded to well-known companies or choreographers to remount previous works.
- In 1975, choreography fellowships connected with Bicentennial projects went to six grantees.
- Professional dance companies received 10 grants in fiscal year 1976 to support the performance of new works, restaging of works from previous years, statewide tours and dance films.
- Museum Program: Renovation was designated as a Bicentennial program, to focus on identifying the need for and subsequent installation of climate control and security systems. During fiscal years 1974–1976, 134 grants were awarded, totaling \$6.2 million.
- Museum Program: Conservation
  was expanded in light of the need for
  conservation work as exhibits were
  planned and collections refurbished for
  the Bicentennial. During fiscal years
  1974–1976, \$3.6 million was granted to
  172 grantees.
- Preservation of the American Architectural Heritage was designated as a Bicentennial program. It was designed to reverse the trend which had led to the destruction of nearly one-third of the structures listed on the National Register of Historic Sites.
- A National Theme/City Edges/ City Options pilot program received designation as an official federal agency Bicentennial program and was designed to highlight the physical problems of towns and cities and to assist in their solution.

- Excellence in Federal Design, a comprehensive program coordinating the improvement of graphics and publications of all federal agencies, was designated a Bicentennial program. Its purpose was to enhance effective public communication.
- Regional Theatre Touring was a Bicentennial-designated theater program meant to expose audiences to live theater in areas deprived of this cultural resource.
- Within the visual arts program, three categories provided funds for Bicentennial-related projects: Works of Art in Public Places, Crafts Special Projects and Photography Exhibition Aid. Over 50 Bicentennial projects were supported in fiscal years 1973–1976.
- An Expansion Arts Tour-Event pilot program promoted artistic interchange among community-based centers with established programs, as well as among established groups and beginning companies. Four mini-festivals joined already operating community arts groups in southern Appalachia, the midwest, the New England states and southern Mississippi.
- The Expansion Arts Film Report focused attention on the variety and richness of neighborhood and community arts activities.
- City Spirit was designed as a Bicentennial initiative to involve communities in a process leading to a reassessment of their cultural identity and needs. Six pilot projects were approved and funds made available in fiscal years 1975–1976 to 80 cities and towns to encourage the exploration and development of community cultural resources.

- The Folk Arts program awarded more than 100 grants in two years for projects ranging from field research and implementation of a folk arts festival in Maryland to support for the position of a Massachusetts State Folklorist.
- The Crafts and Special Projects program focused on certain expansion arts activities, museum purchase plans, special exhibitions, residencies and workshops to highlight traditional and contemporary skills and to ensure preservation of these skills for future generations.
- Special Bicentennial grants were awarded to professional cultural institutions for special projects of high quality in the arts.
- The Composers/Librettists/ Translators Fellowship Program made possible the appearance of new works for the enjoyment of present and future generations of Americans.
- In the program development area of the Federal/State Program, 25 states received staff assistance in developing Bicentennial projects in fiscal years 1974–1976.
- The NEA made available special state grants to state arts agencies for the Bicentennial.
- Two major special state grants were given to the Connecticut Foundation for the Arts and the Washington State Arts Commission for special Bicentennial projects.
- The Bicentennial Public Media Program awarded grants to states for films on aspects of their arts activities, as well as for plans for films on American song and community arts and a series of television programs on American dance. These were designed to broaden awareness and interest in the arts through the media.

Over the three fiscal years
 1974-1976, the NEA granted funds for more than 1,600 Bicentennial-related projects, for a total expenditure in excess of \$39 million.

## National Endowment for the Humanities

- The American Issues Forum, a national program of public discussion, was the NEH's major undertaking for the Bicentennial. It was cosponsored with the ARBA.
- The States and the Nation, a major national Bicentennial state history project for the general public, was produced as a 51 volume set of interpretative and evaluative book length essays, each written by a distinguished author.
- Supported development of *The Adams Chronicles*, the longest historical series ever produced by American television and the most extensive series of any kind undertaken by public television.
- The NEH's state-based humanities committees established themes closely related to the Bicentennial and used their funds to support a variety of community projects which brought the humanities to bear on public policy issues.
- Supported a range of national media programs relating to the American Issues Forum. Among them were Course-by-Newspaper, WNET/13's (N.Y.) award-winning OURSTORY and National Public Radio's Radio Forum.
- Cosponsor of the *Bicentennial Youth Debates*, a national program enlisting 9,900 schools and colleges and encouraging the participation of 100,000 young people in competitive debates on our history, values and issues.

• Sponsored 23 international conferences designed to bring the world's most distinguished intellectuals and cultural leaders to the United States during 1975–1976.

## National Gallery of Art

- Exhibitions:
- —The Eye of Thomas Jefferson, the most complex exhibit ever mounted by the National Gallery of Art, included major works of art loaned by a number of foreign countries, among them the Venus de' Medici from the Uffizi Gallery in Florence, Italy.
- —The Triumph of Reason and Order over Chaos and War, developed under the auspices of the National Gallery, presented 18th century fireworks in the kind of display witnessed by Jefferson during his service in Paris as Minister to France.
- —Feu d'Artifice: Three Centuries of French Fireworks, organized by the International Exhibitions Foundation, illustrated the kinds of pyrotechnical spectacles that Jefferson and his contemporaries could have witnessed.
- —The European Vision of America showed the development of the visual image European minds had of the Americas from the time of Columbus to the late 19th century. It was organized by the Cleveland Museum of Art and shown there and subsequently in Paris.

- —New Glory: Flag Design and History was a display of American flags in replica in the National Sculpture Garden (jointly administered by the National Gallery of Art and the National Park Service). It was the first of a two part exhibition. The second part, scheduled for the summer of 1977, will present contemporary flags which were named as the best designs in a nationwide competition. The exhibition is being organized by the Santa Barbara (California) Museum of Art.
- —Master Paintings from the Hermitage and the State Russian Museum, Leningrad presented 30 paintings by old masters from the Hermitage and 13 works by Russian artists of the 18th and 19th centuries from the State Russian Museum.
- —Goya in the Prado offered eight masterpieces by this great Spanish master, loaned by the Prado in Madrid. They illustrated the full range of Goya's work, from the black paintings to the naked and clothed Majas.
- A concert by the Alessandro Scarlatti Orchestra and the Chamber Chorus of Italian Radio and Television, a contribution by the Italian government, offered music admired by Thomas Jefferson.
- The American Music Festival, in its 33rd year of presenting music by American composers from all periods of American history, was extended to 12 weeks.
- The National Gallery Orchestra presented a special program of 18th century works based on Jefferson's music library. It devoted the final two concerts of its 34th season to American music such as Sousa marches and other patriotic works.

- · Publications, Lectures and Films:
- —A comprehensive catalogue on *The Eye of Thomas Jefferson* elucidated the exhibit.
- —Jefferson and the Arts: An Extended View, a collection of essays by seven distinguished scholars, explored more fully the arts of Jefferson's time and his involvement with them.
- —The Andrew W. Mellon Lectures in the Fine Arts, delivered by the eminent classical scholar Peter von Blanckenhagen, concentrated on "Aspects of Classical Art," classical art being one of the intellectual and aesthetic preoccupations of Thomas Jefferson's society.
- —A special series of lectures on Jefferson's interests in painting, architecture, garden design and city planning and on the works of art that he particularly admired was given in conjunction with *The Eye of Thomas Jefferson* exhibit.
- —Members of the gallery's Education Department offered a series of lectures surveying American painting, sculpture and architecture. Combined, the lectures comprised a brief course on the history of American art.
- —A 30 minute documentary film based on the theme and research for *The Eye of Thomas Jefferson* exhibit is now in production. Upon completion, it will be available for loan to schools and colleges throughout the nation through the gallery's Extension Service and for presentation on television.
- —Audio-visual programs on *The Eye* of *Thomas Jefferson* and *The Triumph* of *Reason and Order over Chaos and War* exhibits were presented throughout the summer of 1976 in the gallery auditorium.

## National Science Foundation

- Cosponsored, with the ARBA and Xerox Corporation, *Knowledge 2000*, a series of international symposia, each focusing on a specific dimension of knowledge: its generation, its uses and its communication during the next 25 years.
- A special issue of *DAEDALUS*, published in March 1977 by the American Academy of Arts and Sciences in Cambridge, Massachusetts, entitled, *In Celebration of Scholarship*. It was cosponsored by the NSF and the ARBA.
- A two volume monograph called Resources Directory for America's Third Century was cosponsored by the NSF and the Library of Congress and includes a wide range of research information.
  - Participation in 3rd Century America.
- A 27 minute film with the title, Celebrating a Century: The 1876 Philadelphia Centennial Exhibition, was produced by the Smithsonian Institution with a partial grant from the NSF.

# Securities and Exchange Commission

• Produced a 12 minute narrated slide show entitled, *Eagle on the Street*, giving a brief review of the history of the securities industry.

## Small Business Administration

• Moments in History was researched, published and posted weekly in the 100-plus Small Business Administration (SBA) offices.

- Held a Bicentennial Salute to Small Business Conference in Washington, D.C. in May 1976. It consisted of three days of activities designated respectively as the "National Education Community Salute to Small Business," "National Financial Community Salute to Small Business" and "Congressional Salute to Small Business."
- Project 1776 was completed in December 1976. A total of 1,776 speeches were made by SBA staff to a total audience of 200,000 persons from every walk of life. In a nine month period, the SBA staff presented the following addresses to service clubs, educational groups, conventions, trade groups and radio and TV audiences:
- —"Free Enterprise—The Nation's Strength" (April)
- —"A Salute to the Small Business Owner" (May)
- —"Jobs for People: A Product of Small Business" (June)
- —"Bicentennial—Reflection of the Past—A Glimpse of the Future" (July)
- —"Together, We Make It Happen: Public and Private Sector" (August)
- —"Free Enterprise and Your Piece of the Pie—Profit Is Not a Dirty Word (Everyone Profits from Profits)" (September)
- —"Getting the Business—
  Procurement Assistance" (October)
- —"Management Assistance: A Survival Kit" (November)
- "Small Business—An Opportunity for Everyone" (December)
- Special emphasis was given in 1976 to selection of "Small Business Persons of the Year," first at the city level, then at the state level in the 50 states,

culminating finally with an award to the "National Small Business Person of the Year," made during National Small Business Week in May 1976.

- Encouraged local Bicentennial participation by SBA employees.
- Held an International Symposium on Small Business in November 1976 in Washington, D.C.

## Smithsonian Institution

- The new National Air and Space Museum was opened July 1, 1976.
  - Exhibitions in Washington, D.C.:
- —A Nation of Nations told the story of America's evolution from many nations of the world;
- —Our Changing Land—Ecology 200 showed the impact man has had on the land, detected by looking at the changes which have occurred over the past 200 years in plant, animal and land forms;
- —1876: A Centennial Exhibition recreated the character of the International Exhibition of 1876 in Philadelphia;
- —The Federal City: Plans and Realities focused on the architectural and planning history of the Mall area from 1776 to present;
- —Arts of Asia at the Time of American Independence provided an insight into the civilizations of the Near and Far East during the period of the American Revolution;
- —The Golden Door: Artist-Immigrants of America (1876–1976) explored contributions made by immigrants and refugee artists to the development of American art;

President Ford and Vice President Rockefeller got special tour of the new National Air and Space Museum, Washington, D.C.



- —America as Art showed how American art has been identified with and related to changing concepts or ideals over the past 200 years;
- —Abroad in America: Visitors to the New Nation highlighted the observations of some 28 European, South American, Asian and African travelers to the United States:
- —In the Minds and Hearts of the People: Prologue to the American Revolution, 1760–1774 set the historical stage for the Revolutionary period by identifying the persons involved and the events that occurred;
- —The Dye Is Now Cast detailed chronologically the two crucial years in American history which began with the confrontation at Lexington and Concord and ended with the Declaration of Independence:
- —Signs of Life: Symbols in the City focused attention on various spaces in the city—streets, parks and houses—from a design perspective.
- —Americas—Decorative Arts in Latin America in the Era of the Revolution concentrated on Latin American countries in the decade of the Revolution.
  - Traveling Exhibitions:
- —Portfolio Series—The American Experience, a visual history of America in 20 units with more than 1,000 images, was circulated to schools, libraries and other institutions:
- —Poster Panel Series—The Evolution of American Culture, 32 special participatory Bicentennial exhibitions used by some 1,680 local communities;

- —Over 200 exhibitions, including some 30 international ones created by foreign nations in recognition of the Bicentennial, were circulated by the Smithsonian Institution Traveling Exhibition Service (SITES), in cooperation with the ARBA.
- —Four special exhibitions of particular interest to minority groups were designed in multiples for use in community centers, storefronts and other non-museum settings: Blacks in the Westward Movement, The Black Woman, The Anacostia Story: Evolution of a Black Community and The Frederick Douglass Years.
- The Festival of American Folklife, cosponsored with the National Park Service with support from the ARBA and other organizations and institutions. It included live presentations on the Mall from June 16 through September 7, 1976, ranging from singing, dancing and instrumental music to storytelling, demonstrations of skills and crafts and preparation of foods for special gatherings.
- Inventory of American Paintings before 1914 supported a search for and recording of works of art from the whole range of American paintings from the earliest years of American history to the 20th century. The first directory was published in July 1976.
- Publication of a *Bibliography of American Art*, which will provide a critical, scholarly listing of major published works and important periodicals, articles, variant editions and recordings and tapes on American art. It is scheduled for release in 1977.

- The Encyclopedia of North American Indians will summarize what is known to date about all Indian groups north of Mexico. It will be 20 volumes. The first two are to be published in 1977.
- An international Bicentennial conference, entitled *The United States in the World*, was attended by 300 Americanists from around the world who discussed 200 years of American international relations. It was held September 26–October 1, 1976.
- A symposium on the role of family institutions and communities in shaping the nation and as continuing links to Africa, Asia and Europe was held in June 1977. It was called *Kin and Communities: The Peopling of America*.
- The New Immigration: Implications for American Society, a scholarly symposium examining aspects of immigration to the United States since 1965, was held in November 1976.

### State

- Produced a series of 30 minute films on U.S. diplomatic history from Revolutionary times to the present.
- In cooperation with the ARBA, published a *History of the Great Seal of the United States*.
- In conjunction with the U.S. Information Agency, encouraged the initiation of new and expanded programs of study about America in universities and other institutions abroad.
- Organized a series of five regional conferences on American studies during 1975–76, each on a different continent.
- Projects under the Mutual Education and Cultural Exchange Program were tailored to enhance the Bicentennial commemoration at home and abroad.
   Among them were: grants for

educational travel in the United States for individuals responsible for American Bicentennial programs in their own countries; travel grants for American lecturers to participate in Bicentennial events overseas; a series of 10 regional conferences across the United States; an International Congress, which was held in Washington, D.C. and sponsored by the Board of Foreign Scholarships, for former Fulbright scholars from the U.S. and other countries; sponsorship of Bicentennial tours abroad by distinguished American performing arts groups; and grants-in-aid to nongovernmental organizations in the United States for Bicentennial programs having an international focus.

- Provided Bicentennial information and advice directly and through United States embassies to other governments and to nongovernmental organizations in the United States and abroad.
- Arranged Bicentennial visits of chiefs of state and heads of government of other nations.
- The department's monthly newsletter carried two series of articles, one on buildings occupied by the department over the last two centuries, and another on the beginnings of American diplomacy. The newsletter also carried reports on Bicentennial commemorations around the world during the July 4th weekend.
- At the State Department headquarters, presented an exhibit on U.S. diplomatic history and opened for public visits the Diplomatic Reception Area, with its exceptional collection of Early American furnishings.
- The Agency for International Development (A.I.D.) staged a series of demonstrations on the applications of advanced and space technologies to the problems of developing countries.

- Awarded the ARBA's national Bicentennial medals to 50 outstanding leaders in private and voluntary organizations in developing countries.
- War on Hunger, the special July 1976 edition of A.I.D.'s monthly magazine, was devoted to A.I.D. activities with private and voluntary organizations.
- 1776–1976, Independence to Interdependence, A.I.D.'s Bicentennial exhibit in the State Department building.

## Transportation

The Department of Transportation funded some 43 Bicentennial projects including:

- A Bicentennial transit and parking program for Washington, D.C.;
- Funds for transit improvements in Philadelphia;
- Funds for various pedestrian and street improvements in the Faneuil Hall area of Boston;
- Participation in the Smithsonian Institution Festival of American Folklife:
- Participation by the Coast Guard in Operation Sail—OPSAIL '76. The Coast Guard also provided musical and marching units for various community celebrations;
- Highways of History, some 100 paintings depicting the history of highways and roads, displayed in the Pension Building, Washington D.C.;
- The Federal Highway Administration developed rules on directional signs for Bicentennial attractions on interstate highways and encouraged states to use them:
- *History of Public Roads,* published by the Federal Highway Administration;

- Participation in 3rd Century America;
- Departmental cooperation with the Bikecentennial program.

## Treasury

- The U.S. Mint issued three series of medals: (1) ARBA medals honoring early patriots; (2) reissuance of the first 10 medals voted by the Continental Congress; and (3) Commemorative Customhouse Medals.
- In addition, the Mint issued three Bicentennial coins: half-dollar, quarter and dollar. Designs for the coins were chosen from among those submitted in a national contest.
- The U.S. Savings Bonds Division issued savings bonds with a new motif and created a Bicentennial exhibit that included posters of early bonds.
- The U.S. Customs Service's *Historic Customhouse Program* commemorated customhouses of historical and architectural merit in all areas of the nation.
- The U.S. Customs Service established a permanent museum and visitor center at its headquarters and worked with the Smithsonian Institution to develop an exhibit on the founding and development of its museum.
- The Treasury Department's Bicentennial Living Museum presented a series of rotating exhibits, including *Treasury Women, 1795–1975,* in honor of International Women's Year; *Treasury Around the World,* commemorating the 30th anniversary of the International Monetary Fund and the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development (World Bank); and *Symbols of Our Public Trust,* the department's major Bicentennial display.

- The Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms produced a Bicentennial exhibit and established a permanent museum on the history of the bureau.
- The Comptroller of the Currency prepared an exhibit depicting its history, its role in examining banks and its relationship with the national banks.
- The Treasury Department adapted the historic Cash Room for use for public meetings, press conferences, ceremonies and official treaty signings.
- A *Bicentennial Outreach* project increased the public's knowledge of Treasury's functions and responsibilities through a Bicentennial Cube display, films, special events, printed materials, expanded tours of Treasury buildings and the Bureau of Engraving and Printing, and Bicentennial Information Centers located in Washington, D.C. and San Francisco. California.
- Treasury Department participation in 3rd Century America.

## United States Information Agency

- Helped 27 foreign countries to coordinate their own participation in the U.S. Bicentennial. Worked informally with numerous foreign countries on Bicentennial activities.
- Conducted activities, provided literature and cooperated with the U.S. Travel Service to attract international visitors to the United States.
- USIA overseas posts assisted the Smithsonian Institution and the National Park Service to ensure regular contact with cultural officials abroad and foreign participation in the *Festival of American Folklife* on the Mall in Washington, D.C.
- Organized The World of Franklin and Jefferson exhibit at sites overseas.
   The exhibit was sponsored by the ARBA in cooperation with The Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York City.

- Coordinated the planning of five regional Bicentennial seminars, held abroad in 1975. Their purpose was to encourage an exchange of ideas among experts on America.
- Supported the production of an *International Directory of Americanists*, published in the spring of 1975.
- Facilitated 80 *Bicentennial Partnership Projects* involving ongoing activities sponsored by foreign organizations to improve mutual understanding.
- Published diverse feature articles, folders, leaflets and brochures on the subjects of the American economy, occupations, housing, industry, farming, transportation, higher education, public education, social programs, cultural diversity, population patterns and society, history, geography, government, architecture, jazz, motion pictures, dance, literature and theater.
- Provided voluminous news items and feature news coverage for overseas radio, TV and newspapers on various Bicentennial activities.
- Voice of America used all means to convey the meaning and history of the Bicentennial to listeners abroad. It carried items on the Bicentennial for a period of three years, covering special events, feature interviews, music, a forum series and special documentaries.
- Produced and distributed overseas 1,700 copies in five languages of the display, *Life, Liberty and the Pursuit of Happiness*. The display was shown in several hundred cities world-wide and is the centerpiece of a specially prepared American studies learning package.
- Organized, in cooperation with the Baltimore Museum of Art, the exhibit *Two Hundred Years of American*

- Painting, a major retrospective survey of American painting.
- Organized and circulated to major world capitals a significant photographic exhibit on American life, *Reflections: Images of America*.
- Organized the exhibit, *USA-200 Years*, shown in Moscow for one month. It attracted some 270,000 visitors.
- Developed multimedia cultural programs involving participation by outstanding authorities on American history and culture in scores of seminars, lectures and symposia on the U.S. over the past 200 years.
- Arranged Salute by Satellite—live TV coverage of 4th of July weekend activities in the U.S. It was seen by 100 million viewers in 37 countries.
- Produced a 13 part documentary film series, Century Three, concentrating on challenges and trends for the America of today and tomorrow.
- Sponsored Bicentennial film-making grants for young motion picture talents.
   Twenty-six winners were selected from 377 entries.

### U.S. Postal Service

- Twenty-one million elementary and junior high school students participated in a program called *Junior Committees of Correspondence*, cosponsored with the National Association of Elementary School Principals and the ARBA.
- Children of postal employees participated in a *Bicentennial Art Contest*, cosponsored with the San Jose State University, Memphis State University, Pennsylvania State University, State University of Oswego, Oswego, New York and Chicago State University, Chicago, Illinois.
- Seven hundred and fifty thousand elementary school students participated in a *National Art Program*—consisting of

3,000 pieces of art mounted for traveling exhibits. It was cosponsored with the National Art Education Association.

- Over 1,400 awards were presented to U.S. Postal Service employees who contributed their off-duty time to local and state Bicentennial activities.
- Provided postal facilities at American Freedom Train exhibition sites. Also provided special Freedom Train philatelic cancellations.
- Provided special Bicentennial philatelic products to Bicentennial groups and communities to aid in their fundraising efforts.
- Provided special Bicentennial philatelic items for distribution to foreign visitors via the U.S. Travel Service.
- Established an 18th century postal facility in Franklin Court in Philadelphia, with the National Park Service.
- Cohosted *Interphil '76* in the city of Philadelphia.
- Issued several stamps which commemorated the Bicentennial.

## Veterans Administration

- Conducted a nationwide
   Bicentennial art contest among patients at Veterans Administration hospitals, nursing homes and domiciliaries. There were 122 winning paintings. First Lady
   Betty Ford posed with the top 21.
  - Two hundred and sixty-one VA

Bicentennial tree-planting ceremonies were held throughout the nation, Puerto Rico and the Philippines to honor Medal of Honor recipients. President Ford participated in the October 25, 1976 ceremony at the Seattle Veterans Administration hospital.

 At the community level, VA staff and volunteer activities included arts and crafts contests, fundraising drives for special Bicentennial projects and writing of local VA station histories. Patients participated in writing, arts and crafts contests and patriotic quizzes.

Other nations expressed early interest in the Bicentennial. On July 4, 1972, President Nixon invited the world to take part. Diversity of participation. In all, 27 foreign countries established Bicentennial committees. More than 100 countries took part.

Listing of events involving other countries, both in the U.S. and abroad. Commemorative stamps issued (listing by country). Foreign Bicentennial organizations (list). The ARBA recognized Bicentennial projects abroad (list).

International participation played a major role in the Bicentennial.

In discussions with numerous embassy representatives as early as 1970, it was learned that some foreign governments were already making plans to take part in our 200th anniversary celebration. The U.S. Department of State agreed to a low key approach by the ARBA to foreign embassies on the possibility of some form of participation.

In an address on July 4, 1972, President Richard M. Nixon invited all nations to help us commemorate our Bicentennial, On July 4, 1973, on behalf of the people of the United States, the chiefs of our diplomatic missions delivered a formal Invitation to the World to the governments of other nations for their people to visit the United States or otherwise join in our Bicentennial. Countries and their citizens were invited to participate in a number of ways, including activities by performing arts groups, educational and cultural exchanges, athletic events, exhibits, arts and crafts, projects, conferences, symposia and seminars, special events, military visits and events, commemorative publications, stamps and medals, ethnic activities and ceremonies and tourism.

## **British, French Committees**

The British and French were the first to set up Bicentennial committees and held their initial formal meetings in July 1972. In time, 25 other foreign government Bicentennial committees were formed.

Although some countries had expected a "centerpiece" such as an international exposition, it was the multi-national programs like the Smithsonian's Festival of American Folklife, Operation Sail—OPSAIL '76, the World Food Conference and the International Salute to the States program of the Smithsonian Institution Traveling Exhibition Service (SITES) that eventually provided major focuses for foreign participation.

In all, more than 100 countries participated in some way.

While it is not possible to compile a comprehensive list of all the projects, programs and events which occurred in the United States and abroad which foreign governments, private organizations and citizens sponsored, a partial list follows. It includes all of the countries and many of their contributions, particularly those taking place in the United States. Activities abroad were so numerous and diverse that for the most part they can be listed in only a general way.

Volume V provides more complete descriptions of the foreign participation described below.





## **Nonappropriated Revenues**

Public Law 92–228, approved on February 15, 1972 (as amended December 11, 1973), authorized the U.S. Mint to strike a series of medals. The ARBC approved a program to market a series of combination Bicentennial philatelic/numismatic commemoratives, the first to be released July 4, 1972.

In 1975, the ARB Board authorized the licensing of the Bicentennial symbol for use on approved commercial products upon payment of a royalty by the manufacturer.

A total of \$22,303,000 in nonappropriated revenues was generated by these programs:

## 332 Expenditures

Of the \$51.9 million in appropriations received by the two Bicentennial agencies, \$19.9 million went to the Bicentennial organizations of the states, territories, District of Columbia and Commonwealth of Puerto Rico as direct support or as matching grants. The total of \$22.3 million in nonappropriated revenues was made available to fund matching grant programs and for other purposes. Thus, for the 11 year period involved, the effective total operating budget of the two agencies was \$32 million in appropriated funds.

## 342 Project Matching Grants

Funds appropriated under Public Law 93–179 were made available on a project matching grant basis to the Bicentennial organizations of the states, territories, District of Columbia and Commonwealth of Puerto Rico—55 entities in all. The total amount came to \$11 million, or \$200,000 per entity.

In addition, the ARB Board approved matching grant programs with funds from nonappropriated revenues totaling \$8.75 million. At the programs' end, \$160,000 had gone to each state and \$150,000 to each territory, the District of Columbia and the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico.

Under the matching grant-in-aid programs, the various entities were allowed broad discretion in developing programs in keeping with the three Bicentennial themes of *Heritage '76, Festival USA* and *Horizons '76.* However, special emphasis was to be given to youth, women, racial, ethnic, minority and Native American programs.

In no instance could recipients meet matching requirements with "in-kind" services in excess of 50 percent of a given state's grant.

The value of the matching funds put up by grantees actually totaled at least four times the amounts granted by the ARBA.

The table shows that, on the average, the total value of each project, when state, local and private sector contributions are included, was four times as great as the initial ARBA grant.

### **Final ARBA Grants**

On January 11, 1977, the ARB Board approved a final nonappropriated matching grant program of up to \$17,000 to the Bicentennial organizations or their successor agency in each state, territory, the District of Columbia and the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico and to the National Congress of American Indians. A total of \$972,000 was earmarked for these 56 grants.

Also approved was the establishment in Washington, D.C. of an ARBA memorial to the 56 signers of the Declaration of Independence, at an estimated cost not to exceed \$500,000.

### **Grants Monitoring**

As part of its administrative responsibility, the ARBA had issued quidelines which required that grantees report periodically on projects supported by ARBA grants. To facilitate this process, the ARBA established a program entitled Grants Performance Progress Monitoring (GPPM). It covered all matching grants whose duration was longer than six months and whose ARBA grant was more than \$2,500. The information was computerized so that grant data could be easily retrieved and analyzed. Approximately 1,000 grants to the various entities or to individual grantees were monitored under this system.

The final analysis by the GPPM system indicates that nearly 100 percent of the monitored grants were considered satisfactory and that the projects were carried out as planned in almost every case.

### **Title X Grants**

Through Title X Programs, the ARBA was authorized to issue just over \$16 million in job-impact grants to aid Bicentennial projects around the nation.

The grant money was not part of the ARBA's appropriations or revenues, but was part of \$125 million which Congress made available to the U.S. Department of Commerce for funding programs recommended by federal agencies.

Appropriated by the Congress under Title X of the Public Works and Economic Development Act of 1965, the funds were authorized for the purpose of reducing unemployment in high impact areas in the country.




#### **ARBA Licensees**

Licensing agreements were entered into with the following 99 manufacturers, authorizing use of the official Bicentennial symbol on commercial products approved by the ARBA. Licensees were required to pay a royalty on net sales (usually five percent), and most made an advance payment (usually \$5,000) against which earned royalties were applied.

Gross royalty income totaled \$1,614,000, with a deduction of \$565,000 for promotion costs, leaving a net royalty income of \$1,048,000.
