Prof. E. A. Minchin, M.A., Vice-President, in the Chair.

The Secretary exhibited a series of photographs taken in the South Orkneys in 1908 by a correspondent of 'The Times,' and kindly sent to him by the Editor of 'The Times.' The photographs included views of scenery and an interesting series of studies of living Seals, such as the Sea-Leopard (Stenorhynchus leptonyx), Weddell's Seal (Leptonychotes weddell), the White, or Crab-eating Seal (Lobodon carcinophagus), and Ross's Seal (Ommatophaga rossi).

Mr. R. I. Pocock, F.L.S., F.Z.S., exhibited a fiving specimen of a Mole-Rat (*Georychus*) recently presented to the Society by Capt. C. H. Armitage, who brought it from Ashanti. Mr. Pocock remarked that the animal possibly belonged to the species from Togoland described by Matschie as G. zechi, and certainly represented a form never previously exhibited in the Gardens.
