Vicia tetrasperma, Var. tenuissima in America.—The common little weed, Vicia tetrasperma (L.) Moench, has oblong, round-tipped and merely mucronulate leaflets. The slender-leaved var. tenuissima Druce is beginning to appear with us. Its narrowly linear leaflets are attenuate to slender tips. I have examined specimens from Maine, Vermont, Massachusetts, New York and Oregon, all collected within the last half-century.—M. L. Fernald.
