RESOLUTION

ON THE DEATH OF WILLIAM SAUNDERS.

The death of William Saunders, C. M. G., L. L. D. on September 13th, 1914, at the age of seventy-nine years removed one of the pioneers of Entomology on this continent.

As one of the founders of the Entomological Society of Ontario in 1863 and of "The Candian Entomologist" in 1868, which journal he edited successfully from 1874 to 1886, and as author of "Insects Injurious to Fruits" published in 1883, he rendered meritorious services to the science of Entomology in its varied aspects. His active interest in the science was only limited by his appointment in 1886 as Director of the Experimental Farms system of the Canadian Department of Agriculture, the organization and development of which stands as an enduring monument to his tireless spirit and industrious zeal.

He was elected a Fellow of our Society in 1907 and as a tribute to his memory and as a public acknowledgment of his conspicuous services in the development of Entomology, which should serve as an example to the younger generation, we recommend that this record be entered in the minutes of the Society and published in the Annals.
