Dear Dr Gray

I should have earlier re-  
plied to thy kind letter had  
not absence from home prevented.  
I believe that Prof. Sargent's  
letter to which I referred in my  
last was the result of a mis-  
understanding on his part, & that  
had he known the real facts  
more correctly, he would not  
have written as he did.

I have sent him a quotation  
from his own letter of the order  
we rec'd relative to the unfor-  
tunate case of plants, which will  
probably do all that is needful  
in the way of explanation. And  
I endeavoured also to show him  
that in endeavouring strictly

to obey that order, we could have had no other motive than a desire to please.

It will give me much pleasure to send for your Gardens examples of anything that Dr. Parry or Kellogg send to us direct, which such are fit for transmission.

But it <sup>is often</sup> a slow process where they have to be raised from seed.

I am much obliged for the 2 bags (of Fraxinus anomala & Dalea) both of which are safely received. I have since rec'd <sup>from Dr. Parry</sup> a post of Gilia setosissima which promises to be a little gem.

Do ask for anything we possess freely, forgetting for ever all the misunderstanding before alluded to! To be acting upon the idea ever of a "commercial balancing" is a thing which I hate! Though

I do not pretend to be free from human frailty, I have still some ability to realise the truth of the words - even in botanical exchange or supply - "It is more blessed to give than to receive".

The sending of the Inertensia roots alone was a mistake. It was the Lithurum hirtum that I really wanted specially. The other was quite secondary & not intended to branch alone. I am sorry that Dr. P's correspondent was not able to get the Lithurum, for it would have been a valuable addition.

Primula suffruticosa is improving with me, & one or two plants have flowered. The blossoms are small as yet, but the colour is charming. We have flowered Caltha leptosepala also, & though not yet flowered, Ranunc
