Dear Dr. Gray

I was much pleased to see your letter; I warmly welcome you to our land! If you should eventually be able to visit York, it will give me much pleasure to have you & Mrs. Gray under my roof - should you be able to make a stay here?

Most gladly will I send you strong plants of both the Cypripedium (i.e. spectabile & pubescens) that are "certain to flower" (as far as we can judge).

But I cannot think of making any charge. I am only glad to be able - in a very small way - to reciprocate your past kindness! But nothing can be sent now! The mean temperature here (for 4 consecutive days & nights) has been under +9° Fahr! The minimum being  $-5\frac{1}{2}$ °

\* Three nights running, the temp. averaged less than  $-1^{\circ}$ .

This seems almost "American"? It is the greatest <sup>continuous</sup> cold ever recorded here, I believe.\*
