Dear Sir:-

I thank you very much for sending me your "Contributions" for 1887.

The Hieracium of which I wrote is H. aurantiacum. I have seen Lathyrus maritimus again since I wrote, & the one ~~found~~ found on our campus must be that, tho' the stipules are smaller. Seed may have been brought with stone or brick for our new Gymnasium, - this was found not very far from it.

I have seen Mimulus luteus in two places here in Norfolk this year. Found it first in 1881.

Solidago juncea, ait., began to blossom here about July 15, this year.

But the plant is stem larger taller & the ^{lower stem} leaves ^{much} larger than the Syn. Flora ^(Bar 9 in diam long) statia, page 155. I do not think I can be mistaken in the identification, - the ray flowers

are about 12, somewhat surpassing the
disk.

Potentilla tridentata grows
near here, — I found it in June, —
some 1400 feet above the sea. You
speak of it, I believe, as Alpestrine.
