every aspect from all my sticks - which came from trying a new method when the old did very well.

I can be sure of the seed that goes with this. Was white & variegated - sure, unless mixed by mice, whose work I find in looking them over.

I thought the Arabis we found on Mt. Hood to be furcata, but I also thought it might be like the 'dwarf alpine form' mentioned in "Descriptions of New Species of Plants from our Western Territories" as found on Mt. Adams.

I was rather anxious to know, because we have always heard that the flora of Mts. Adams and Hood differed

greatly - which I doubt - judging from the specimens we have seen from both.

Next season we hope to go again, and to both - through in a more economical way. Having only a week to spend this year Dr. Barrett paid a guide to take us over the best Floral Territory, in that time at the rate of four dollars a day - which we could scarcely afford for a long trip.

If the *Sisyrinchium* box does not reach you safely please send us directions for their better preservation on the road.
