Do you remember how Peter Collinson (I think) complained about the expense that Grisebach put him to by publishing so many new works which made all former ones useless? But he brought them never the less; and so botanists now must do with yours.

My Dear Dr. Gray,

I have been "too busy for anything" for a week past and thus unable to answer until now. First as to the Am. Fl. N. Amer. I understand you to say that all as yet published is to be reprinted with supplements to each part and bound together, the price for the whole to be say \$5.00. I suppose the reprinting is to be from the original stereotyph plates and in cases where considerable alteration is needed, as in "Ditrichium" (olive), the whole thing will be done over in the supplement. Perhaps however the plates for Smilax, Krynia, Plagiotropys, and such like vegetation may be substituted for the old ones from which Ditrichium was

was formerly limited. If this could be properly done it might be better: but I really know very little about these things and can only speak of convenience in use. Now Addenda and Supplements are of course more or less inconvenient but often almost indispensable and especially in such a work as the *Synoptical Flora*, covering such an immense territory in its scope, much of which is not fully explored and in almost all parts of which active minds are at work making new discoveries as well as emendations of old observations, in which two that very inconvenient thing - a multiplied authorship in diverse or divers (at least) publications is taking place. Now looking at it in this way it certainly seems as if it must be a great boon to all former purchasers to have these things brought together and thoroughly

revised by the best possible authority and the two volumes in one (a real convenience) for the original price of one; while for future purchasers it would be most advantageous in every way. The lower price would induce many to repurchase and many others to buy who would be unable to pay the old one.

How it might seem to others I cannot of course say; but for myself I can only hope that you may carry out your design.

I am obliged for the names of the plants sent. Of course you are to keep the specimens. With regard to the western ones you and Watson do as you think best. Do not "respect" my names if better ones are to be had - only I shamed like Greeley to have the credit of the *Astragalus* especially as Knobell and Brongniart [?]
