My dear Doctor,

I have recently heard,

with equal surprise & grief, that you have been at N.Y. without my having the pleasure of seeing you. The newspapers, which, without my knowledge, gave a notoriety to my afflictions, will have informed you, that during the night of the 18/19 July, amidst the din & alarm of the dreadful fire, I lost my poor dear Henry, & while attending his last hours, my own residence, (where you called) fell a prey to the flames, & I lost every thing! My Herbarium - Books - Inps. &c. all are gone, & in my present desolation of heart, you can scarcely imagine how I miss them - I go no where, & see no one; & having, (as I believe I intimated the intention, when I had the pleasure of seeing you) resigned my engagement, in Wall street, I am now thrown upon my own resources at a time of mental & corporeal prostration such as I never knew, or expected to experience - Indeed, Sam. has urged me to endeavour to take to the woods & fields again, but (had I the heart)

I have no longer the Strength, as my Nervous System  
is so impaired by the excitement & trials of the past  
2 years, that my Right Side is, at times, seriously  
affected - On the morning of the fire, after having had  
the Body of my poor dear Bay removed, my Brother,  
wife & 4 Chil.<sup>m</sup> (he himself being unfortunately at  
Pleasure,) I <sup>myself</sup> was taken away by Dr. Beale's in a  
languor & remained on the floor, for 4 hours!

However, Dr. Beale said, in the evg., that the  
dangerous symptoms (whatever they were) had passed  
away; but I am still unfit for every thing -  
I sent you an Advert<sup>t</sup>, which I put in the Papers,  
with a view to inform you of my loss, & I did  
the same to Dr. Torrey, (advised to Princeton) but  
whether he is there, or not, I cannot tell, as I have  
neither seen, nor heard from, him since my departure  
for Buff. 2 1/2 years ago! However, I trust he is well  
& happy, as he is one of whom I have ever cherished  
a very sincere esteem & regard, & perhaps, when  
you write to, or see, him, you will take the trouble  
to communicate to him an account of my losses.  
I want write myself, but, as I observed, I know

not where he is; & it is, perhaps, hardly worth while  
to write for the mere purpose of recounting my woes.

By the merest accident, a handful of my Books were saved  
by my Landlady, in my absence, & amongst them the (bound)  
1<sup>st</sup> vol. of your Flora, & the 2<sup>nd</sup> part of the 2<sup>nd</sup> Vol. - which  
will induce me to complete the work; & if, therefore,  
you have thick paper copies of the 1<sup>st</sup> & 3<sup>rd</sup> numbers, please  
send them to W. Sputum, with whom I shall settle, but  
if none remain, in your hands, I shall buy of them  
the ordinary impressions - Whilst my poor dear Henry  
was at Madeira (from Oct. to June) I found a resource  
in my Herb. & observing that I had very many  
Canada localities to add to Hooker's Flora, I  
had my copy interleaved, & by great good luck  
it was at the Binders, & thus saved! However  
the project is, of course, at an end, & I find myself  
in possession of a small fragment of my Tool. Chest,  
without wood to work upon - I have saved (that is to  
say, I have picked up, piece-meal, in different houses)  
Elliott - Mt. - Kunth & Nuttall - also my manufac.  
vol. of Hyperaceæ - Burk's Gram & Lat. - 3 or 4 vols.  
of Deland. (which were also at the Binders) & some  
dozens, perhaps, of miscell. Books - I know nothing,  
whatever, of your Proceedings, but in the hope that you  
are successful & happy to the utmost extent of your wishes,
