I have a letter from Boott, 2^d Inst. who says his health is better.

Thursday 22 July 1852.
My dear Gray.

Your letter reached me, yesterday, & I take the earliest opportunity of thanking you for your kind attention to my inquiries.

I had previously supposed that the plant raised from Wright's seeds might be Nuttall's *E. peplis*, with which the Chas. agrees well enough. I hardly see, however, where in it differs from American *E. peplis*, & it may be, after all, that we have not the real European species, in the Country, - the Manual to the contrary notwithstanding! (what a heresy!) Certainly, *Lupulinaria*'s *E. communata* (ambr. " *E. peplis*, I suppose) is well enough described by Dr. Chas. of *E. peplis*, in the Manual & is probably not distinct from *E. peploides*, Nuttall -

It was to clear up this question, that I
asked you for European *E. peplius*, which,
it appears, you have not got.

You remark that when you "said
E. pepliares has smooth seeds, we had
before you only specimens of *E. peplius*"—
which has pitted seeds! However, I
suppose this last slip was in writing
E. peplius for *E. platyphylla*. But it is
of no consequence, as I now understand
that you had no authority for describing
the seeds of Nuttall's plant.

I have no Oakesian Spec.^w of
E. Esula, & shall feel obliged for that
you offer to me — also for
Fallopia coeruleocircinum & *parviflora*
I have until *F. teretifol.* from Dartigan.

I thank you, very much, for the
flower of *Epilobium latifolium* from
Labrador — also for the Samarae of
Nuttall's *Fraxinus triptera*, &
specimen (purporting to be of this
species) which I have from Hale.
has much smaller — perhaps less
mature — Samarae, with the third

wing very narrow, & small.
I have written to Shantz for Frax.
quadriangularata, & we shall doubtless
get it from him, if within his reach.
I shall get the paper of Nuttall's
to which you refer — I have seen
certain Spec.^ws referred to names
of Elliott, not in the sketch. Can
you direct me to any papers of his,
elsewhere? — *me*.

If you can spare a Specimen
of *Rumex 2. 3. 7. 8* (manual)
I should be very glad of them, as
I have none of either species.
3. *R. salicifolius*, being one of Oakes'
& a grass-like species, is probably
abundant with you.

I fear you are not yet working
at the Flora, since Lindheimer's
plants are not looked out beyond
the "great terminus". Sprague
will be right after all! — "No
you won't." I thank you,
heartily, for your invitation
