There must be some mistake
about the *Dohlewinia* "Reynoldiae"
The plants when growing, in all
essential features, were like those
I collected in Virginia - no difference
whatever except such as are found
in almost any plant in latitudes so
different. These plants were stouter
more elongated than in the frosty
Va. wood & perhaps less fragrant.
I found these Fla. species about the 1st.
of March '81 and at same time *Corallorrhiza*
odontorhiza which in Virginia bloomed
in Novr. ! There it was much smaller.

I have observed that species
growing here & on the S. coast
vary much in aspect.

As to those *Euphorbias*, your
opinion coincides with mine - *E. corollata*
is slender & variable in W. Fla. Dr. Engelmann
once named a S. Fla. *Euphorbia* after me, forgetting
that the name was preoccupied! *E. tithymaloides*
