My dear Sir!

I am in receipt of your letter of 30<sup>th</sup> ult.  
and beg to thank for your kind efforts with  
regard to the publishing of my treatise on the  
flora of these islands, as well as for your offer  
to correct the proofs.

As my object in asking for seeing the proofs  
corrected myself principally was to avoid miss-  
prints with regard to local names of plants and  
localities, I am glad to inform you, that in  
case you should have any doubt as to the proper  
spelling of any creole name from these localities,  
Mr. A. D. Brown of Princeton, New Jersey, a  
personal friend of mine, who has travelled frequent-  
ly over these islands, has offered to assist in  
correcting the proofs as far as names are concerned  
in case you should think it desirable. If  
therefore my Attn. should not be clearly enough  
written in some places in this respect, you might

obtain a good assistance from Mr. Brown, who  
is going home by this mail and intend remain-  
ing in Princeton for some months to come.  
As I should like to present copies of my treatise  
to my friend here in the West Indies as well as to  
those in Europe and elsewhere, I should be glad  
to receive about 150 copies. If however this is too  
large a number, I would beg you to do me the  
favour in applying to the Smithsonian Institute  
to curtail the number to the one, you may think  
proper.

If you will let me know, whether you wish  
the dried plants sent to your address or to any  
other place, I shall be happy to forward to you  
specimens of the endemic West India species  
of plants as far as I can obtain them here.  
Having a good collection myself already I  
will be able to send you the greater part by  
next mail already.
