

Whether I do agree it should be considered as done
for this year or a part for in my salary.
Your speak of compensation, this
introduces a subject upon which
hitherto I have preferred to be
silent, but ^{about} which I wish now to
speak frankly. It is well that
you as President of the University
should be fully informed of what
is & has been the condition of
things.

In the fall of '70 I had completed
my Report on the Botany of the 40th State
& my connection with that survey ceased.
The Com. of Agric^l & Prof. Baird wished me
to take the post because the bot^l of the Agric^l Dept
at Washington with a salary of \$1800, Dr. Torrey
wished me to take charge of the Herbarium of
Columbia College, and Dr. Gray wished me
to come to Cambridge for what he could
afford to pay me. I preferred the latter on
account of the greater facilities it gave
me for the work which I wished to do. In
1874 I received from the Corporation the ^{formal} appoint^{mt}
of Curator of this Herbarium, without men-
tion of salary, the amount of which has always

been left (so far as I know) with
Dr. Gray. For several years my nominal
salary was \$1000, since Sept. 1/41ⁿ ^{it has been} \$1200. The
amount which I have actually received
^{from} from the Herbarium between Sept. 1/73 and
Sept. 1/67ⁿ ^(14 years) was \$10,990.20. This has been sup-
plemented by compensation for work done
upon the Flora of California, &c., but
my receipts from the Herbarium have
barely paid my expenses while I have
been in Cambridge. I have not com-
plained often & do not now. I have been
willing to work, and to work hard, for
the love of my work. But in the
changed relations of the Herbarium since Dr.
Gray's death the compensation ^{should} now be
paid upon the amt of salary that I should
receive. I am willing to leave it to you
to determine whether it is not fitting, ^{fitting to the} fitting to the
University & to the character of the work which
I am expected to do - that my present
salary should be increased.
