My dear Sir,

I wrote to you, and
Dr. Torrey some months since with regard
to a portion of Elliott's Herbarium. You
will recollect that several years since
(10 or 15?) I selected parts of that Herb.
and transmitted them to Dr. T., if I re-
member rightly, at his request. I have
been applied to in order to have them brought
back, and on writing to Dr. T. he informed
that you had them. I feel uncertain whether
I wrote ^{to you} distinctly on the subject, and I write
now to urge their return as soon as you con-
veniently can. Could you not return at
once those you have finished with, and
take the others in hand at an early date?
Are the Smilaxes among them? I can find
them no where in Elliott's Herb. and
this induces me to ask you, as it

Could be done immediately, to give
me a list of the plants or families and
genera that were sent on to you; for if
the proprietor of the Herb. were to ask
me for the information I could not give it.

You are quoted by Sullivan for
Mosses &c from Table Rock South Carolina.
Were you ever there? Also for plants from
Augusta Ga. I did not know that you
had travelled in ^{the} South further than the Moun-
tains of No. Ca. — Did you ever see in those
Mts *Hesperis occidentalis*. I have not seen
it there and cannot learn that any one has.
Elliott inserts in it his work on the culture
of Pinch I think. Walter has it in his Flor.
and Dr. Bachman has it in his Catalogue
of Plants of Charleston. I cannot believe
it native of the lower country.

I will not trouble you any more about
Pinus Copa, my Tin., as you have decided against
it. I will not take as much pains to convince
you as Ravenel took about *O. glabra* but leave
you to future convictions. I will change the
name and introduce it to the public under
another title and perhaps you will be

rather pleased with the stranger.

See Deccandolle quotes "Broussfield in
Phytologist". Is that a periodical? Have
you a copy of it?

Do you know of any work taking up the
remaining orders of Endogens left by Kunth?
or works that would serve that purpose? Lind-
ley's *Colubridacea*, — is that complete what is
its cost? is it illustrated so as to increase the
price considerably? Hooker's Ferns — will you
answer similar questions for that?

I enclose a bit of a Fern Miss Memon
gave me; she could not recollect whence she got
it but thought at the Bot. off. garden in Weymouth
what is it?

How is Dr. Torrey? neither he nor his
daughter replied to a letter of sympathy
I addressed ^{him} after receiving from you the news
of Mrs. Torrey's death, so that I know nothing
about him, and am unwilling to trouble him
