I have lately printed
 a portion of the Map of my
 former teacher Mr R a
 Salisbury. & have sent
 you a copy sent by post

Mr R A Salisbury was the
first person who introduced
the Works of Harrison to the
English public, the game-
bird of the farmer with some
more, & added to his Notes
he was a most industrious
& neat worker indeed I
consider him as the best
practical Botanist of that
period & we have but few
equals since. Unfortunately
he was not a happy man
either in his home or in society

he was so impetuous & he
concealed none of his opinions
a man of the most contrary feelings
to Mr R Brown his great opponent
His friends who regretted that
his work was not published soon
after his death, probably would have
made a great advance in
Botany then, but Burchell
was an odd person, he could
not write or do any thing but
when he was entirely by himself
When he edited his Travels
he told his friend he was going
abroad, he took a lodging at
Blackheath near London.
