My friend D^r. Planchon has written to ask me to procure from Kew flowers or fruits of Planera Gmelini Michx., which he requires for his article on Ulmaceæ and Celtideæ for the Prodomus of D.C. - But as I find that there is no growing specimen of this tree in the grounds at Kew, and that it is but badly represented in the herbarium, I venture to pass on the request to you. If you can therefore send

me by the post the required flowers
or fruits for D. P., both he and I
will feel indebted to you.

I do not know whether the herb^m
at Cambridge is rich in duplicates of
your indigenous plants. In my own
small herbarium, I do not pretend
to have a general collection; but of
medicinal plants, I am glad to
possess all the (good) specimens I
can get. If you can supply me
any in illustration of the U. S. Pharma-
= copoeia, they would be very accept-
= able.

Specimens of Aristolochia Serpen-
= taria with the root, and of

Zanthoxiza apifolia also with the
root are among my desiderata. So
is the root of Frasera Walteri called
American Calumba: — a specimen
purporting to be this drug just sent me
from N. Y. is indubitably the true Calumba
root of Mozambique.

I shall be happy to offer you some
Brazilian Bignoniaceae of which I
have some very good specimens recently
collected.

Is Mr. Charles Wright in Cuba?
