Dear Sir,

Through the kindness of an old friend of mine, the Rev. J. W. Johnson, who is returning to the United States, I am enabled to forward you a packet of plants collected by me principally in this island, though a portion were gathered at Amoy - the Flora of which has not been so carefully investigated. They are at present in excellent condition; and, where the specimens are scanty, it is not owing to parsimony on my part, but because I have no more in my possession at the present time. I have carefully done them up in oiled paper - and I therefore trust they will reach you in good preservation Iader.

as far as possible, I have named the specimens - at least generically, to have attempted more with those from Amoy - though in many cases they appeared new - would have been presumptuous - removed as I saw here from access to large herbaria and libraries. Each plant has a number attached - the same borne by the species in my own herbarium - so that whatever specimens I distribute always appear under the same numbers whenever & to whomsoever sent. I shall be much obliged if you will send me any corrections or names for the undetermined plants. and the indication of the number will suffice. I have sent a full set to Mr. Bentham. I trust also that you will not think me troublesome when I ask you if possible - to be so kind as to send

me a parcel of named American plants which might be forwarded direct to Hongkong - or to my agent in London - MR. Franz Chinns, 3 Brook Street, Grosvenor Square, who would readily pay any charges attending their transmission. It would be necessary of course to pack them carefully - and if I might venture to express a preference - I would say that I should particularly like U. S. grasses Cyperaceae, more especially, Carices. Cyperaceae (Quercus, above all) also Orchideae, Umbelliferae - and any genera which possessed representatives in China or Japan. Hypericum, Euphorbia, Polygonum, Caryophyllaceae, Rosa, Lonicera, ^{Gnaphalaceae} are especially my favorites. I make no apology for preferring this request, as I am sure as a botanist, you will be aware how invaluable authentically named specimens are to a worker isolated as I am, and as the botanist par excellence
