My dear Sir,

I have just received through Sir
W. Hooker your letter of A. Sept: and
I have besides to thank you for the
previous communication of two copies
of your account of Horrocks Williams'
Japanese collection, which was most
acceptable and will be most useful to
me. It was not accompanied by any letter.
I am particularly glad that the basket
of plants I sent reached you in
perfect condition, and I trust you
found them interesting. I shall indeed
be very pleased to receive N. American
plants from you, especially named
Glumaceae, ^{& ferns,} and I much desire spec.
of Tea, Ranunculus, &c and any other
which have a close affinity (such
as Diervilla) to plants of Japan,
and Manchuria. I have not many
American plants in my collection, merely

a few collected by the late Dr. Lorrain
in Ohio - and a very small no. of books
on N. Amer. botany; I believe only
Prof. Torrey's Asc of Stanley's Utah
Plants - his memoirs on Batis &
Darlingtonia, & the Plantae fremontii
Eaton & Wright's Manual - and your
own beautiful Manual of the Boty.
of the Northern States latest edn - Plantae
Wrightianae & Genera of the U. S. I have
two vols. of the latter unparalleled
work. Will it be continued? My interest
in N. American botany has greatly increased
since I made a careful examination
of some Mantchurian & Japanese
plants, collected during the Russian
war, and found amongst others, —
Onoclea sensibilis (not hitherto recorded
from Japan) & Graphalium polycyathum,
besides Osmunda cinnamomea, &
a whole host of European plants, such
as Polygonum bistorta, Geranium
pratense, Polemonium coeruleum,

Linnaea borealis, &c &c. I can assure
you it will give me the greatest pleasure
to exchange specimens, and I should be
glad if you could name any American
house here which would take charge of
Plants to your address. Not but what
I dare say I could continue to send
them otherwise, but there are few ships
clear hence for Boston, most going to
New York where I could always I
think send to any agent you might
name. as to things for me, they might
I think be sent safely to the ^{kind} care
of H. B. M. Consul, at either of
the Ports, if addressed
