 again - and impose myself on you.  
 I mail an aster, and two sedgs -  
 which please kindly name for me. The  
 aster, I was inclined to call *A. graminifolius*  
 but the scales of involucre are imbricated and  
 unequal and numerous, and the hardness  
 and rigidity of the plant is not mentioned. I  
 got it at Leominster yesterday, as I did the  
 slender sedg, that I can not get even a  
 start on, can't get it into any genus at all.  
 Would almost think it might be *Kyllingia pumila*  
 if it was not for the *Mnagucan acbeumium*.  
 The other (coryx) I got on Peaks Island  
 at Portland Me. lost much in a bog, the  
 slender one grow in a very sandy place, as  
 did the aster
