Professor Gray

Dear Sir: Your favors of 5<sup>th</sup> & 15<sup>th</sup> are at hand,

the latter containing the interesting & very nice letter of Prof. Parsons. We accept cordially, our share of the advice, and will do what we can to verify what the Learned Judge avers respecting the influence of publishers. His opinion of the work will be very valuable; we hope to have a circular by another season that will do something towards making known the merits of the work.

We are very glad you consent to undertake the Juvenile Botany. Your suggestion as to size of page, viz. 4½ × 6, suits us precisely: as also your ideas of illustration. Some new cuts, but not expensive, shd be given. As to size, we shd say, speaking solely in reference to profit & business, that it shd certainly not exceed 300 pp - nor 250 if possible. Comparatively with the prices of the others, it w<sup>d</sup> be a great benefit if the book c<sup>d</sup> be brought so as to retail for 50¢. Something near this, it seems to us, shd be aimed at, if compatible with your objects &c.; & not to exceed  $\frac{2}{3}$  of the price of the others - Of course, this is merely a commercial view, which must be made subordinate to literary & scientific claims: but if possible, it w<sup>d</sup> be much to the benefit of the book..... The idea of English nomenclature is very happy. & will be a feature... As to copyright, we suggested 10p ct. on wholesale price, because that is the basis of our arrangement with Putnam; and as we do no retail business, & those prices fluctuate with very different locality, it no percentage on such a shifting sum c<sup>d</sup> be made. Besides, we make our arrangements for a very large sale, & resort to very expensive means to obtain it - thinking that the diminished profits on each book will be more than made up by the increased sale. That is the principle on which we proceed, & we shd like our Authors to take the same view of the subject. Always the heavier the

Some of the French have a larger copyright; & some of the other books are  
published for definite sums per ann. so that it is difficult to get no percentage. But the principle we intend to adopt  
copyright, the less can be expended in obtaining circulation, &  
the less will be sold. We have no doubt that in the long run, an  
Author will net more profits by giving his publisher free scope, &  
a light burden, than by receiving a large proportional sum on each  
individual copy. And the circulation we would give such a work w<sup>d</sup>  
more than equal the proportion that which was ordinarily  
attained by publishers when the old plan of 10p ch. on the retail  
price was in vogue. All our large selling books are published on these  
terms - as Readers, Anthologies, Chemistry, Geology, Nat. Philosophy - French  
books.\* Histories &c. Our projected Classical Series is to be published on  
these terms. Still if you shd prefer it, we might hit upon some definite  
sum per annum, as in case of Patram; and we should be obliged to  
you if you w<sup>d</sup> state what sum (if you shd prefer this plan) w<sup>d</sup> be  
regarded as a fair remuneration. We shall ~~hope~~ to make the  
terms entirely satisfactory, on whatever basis, & trust that one or the other of the above  
will be so.\*\*

The Patram is entirely cordial in the arrangement by which we  
take the sole publication of this.

We have been applied to by Mr Smith, Ed. Horticulturist, Phila. to loan  
to print the 23<sup>d</sup> Lep., (or some other one) or to furnish him cuts or carts. It seems  
to us "very good way of advertising: if you approve it, will you send cuts of this  
Lep., or get them electrotyped at our expences? & send to us. Please inform  
us. The editor of "Life Illustrated" in this city (having about 20,000 circ) also  
w<sup>d</sup> like a page of this paper, more a Lep., filled with an article on Botany,  
&c. illustrated with the cuts; we shd like to see it done. Would  
you approve?
