

San Francisco Dec. 2nd 1872

Dear Sir

To-day I sent directed
to Prof. Sargent a Box of Trees & shrubs and
among them Garrya elliptica which together with
the Horns you speak of in letter of Nov. 23^d
were already mailed to before your letter came to
hand - So much for good luck, or passing to the
credit of the Good Genius that ever guides.

Among them are Cotinus (never seen the of yours) & our
Chestnut Oak of the Redwood - sorry I could not send
Chrysophyllum formerly Castanea Chrysophylla / It is
often of the utmost difficulty to find seedlings of
some trees where one would suppose them ought
to be abundant - spent part of two days searching for
Aesculus Calyx men's seedlings - gone at last the fine
day finally got 3 - failed altogether with our
Magnolia - shall try again - Azalea occidentalis
is often equally difficult to get well proportioned &
isolated &c - Garrya elliptica too old or
scraggy - wrote Sargent my faith in Cuttings
it is already putting up here, the male Cuttings in
clusters 3 inches long already; will be in full flower
here in Jan. at this rate 2 or 3 of these /

Prosternia arbutofolia seedlings are scarce 12.
Cornus Nuttallii (or other Scarce - ought I to have
sent you *Taxus brevifolia* Western Yew? Why
cannot it be transplant? If I tried & grow well
think I'll try it and at least be as foolish
as other people - never like to be singular.
Clandthus integrinus - very valuable for stock, increase
creams 18 to 16 per cent. Not an invaluable Med. &c.
Chamissoa foliolosa - I promise myself to do
some thing grand with this ere long. Wish I
could have got *Andromeda* - could, had
I the time I had all day & will not do so late.
Find my *Iris Macrospadix* again the sp. was in
bloom got some tiny seedlings as I take
them to be - send some down equivalent ones
could not clearly determine in my own mind
apart from this whether they might not prove
Iris Douglasii? two I certainly know to be
those I have labeled & put in full herbarium
paper are all right. Sent a Root of
Nicromeria Douglasii such a fruct. pendent
for a hanging basket - do with it as
twice you - own & give it to an appreciative
friend. *Appidium* are my reasons for sending
Ferns was just simply because by a day or two
delay I could fill up some blank space left
in the tree packing so you see I have anticipated
a little - now if there is no immediate call for

These just distribute them at discretion.
The *Lycopodium* we considered *Europeum* var. *Sinuatum*
not *Virginianum* - will send you a sp. The decision
of our Post Master here is that no botanical sp. sed
& c. bug. snail or other not List sp. can be allowed
a written name without involving letter postage!!
the name however may be printed; otherwise a
hieroglyphic mark, letter or fig. will be required
& letter explanatory thereof accompanying through
the letter Dept. This seems strange to the uninitiated
so contrary to our universal custom. It would
be the most sensible construction of the law, to
make no violation where none is intended
the spirit of the law & not the mere letter.

Sorry I did not send you all the roots of
Sagittaria which I took the trouble to dig
- now will be shrunk up & thrown away
