My very dear Sir -

You have made me a great pleasure by your favour of the 18th of February, and by the rich sending of interesting botanical works which accompanied it. I beg to excuse, that I have not yet rendered you my deepest and sincerest thanks, but I would not appear before you empty-handed and procastinated it, hoping to present you at the same time, the second volume of my *Enumeratio plantarum quas in Australi colligit Dr. Preiss.* In November of the last year I had already sent to the printing-house the Index and prefate of this second volume, but since we have free press in Germany, there was no time to print other scriptures than political, and people also thinks and reads now in whole Germany nothing than what take that course. Only a few days ago I received the first copies of my book.

For a collection of seeds it was already too late for this year when I received your favour, I shall however choose a quantity of seeds from you, as soon as the harvest of seeds is finished, consequently in the next autumn and immediately forward. As to you I request the same complaisance from you for our botanical gardens, and pray particularly for the rare and beautiful flowering species of all families, but especially the seeds of trees and shrubs will be very welcome; and namely the seeds of all sorts of the genus *Hedera*. — Almost all the copies of my *Pagella* have become a prey of the flames at our great fire. I have kept of some a few copies, and of those I send you enclosed.

My collection of Hepaticae is now by far the most complete which exists and namely I have much more than what had been marked *Herb. Leib.* in the *Synopsis Hepaticarum*. I have observed the greatest number of species by the botanists themselves, who named and described them. I would therefore have been able to collect some hundred species for Mr. Sullivant, so whom I beg to recommend myself. As he however probably will have communication with other European botanists of whom he receives sendings, I think it more convenient for him to choose in the *Index* of the *Synopsis Hepaticarum* which I send, and to mark those species which he wishes to receive from me. I possess now many of

the species described by Dr. Hooker jr. and Dr. Thomas Taylor by the descriptions themselves, my whole collection has also been exactly compared on publishing the Synopsis.

I observe that your consignments to Dr. Goldfuß at Altona, Charles Willd at Halle, and Dr. Lindenberg at Bergedorf have been forwarded immediately.

N.B. I shall be very glad to receive from you the dried plants which you had the kindness to promise me, and I continue to lay aside for you those which I hope will be agreeable to you. Should you have some particular wishes regarding botanical objects I observe that nobody in the whole north of Germany is perhaps more able than I to accomplish them, and certainly nobody more willingly to render service to you. Should you however wish to communicate with younger botanists, I beg to allow me to name you those who can be useful to you.

My friend Dr. Pahl's *Fibres* occupied with a flora of macrandria being provided with a very rich material part it. As soon as his book appears I shall ^{send} a copy of it to you, and if you will be so good to specify me in this work, what you wish to have I hope to receive it for you from my friend Dr. Pahl himself. I now suppose a new flora of Capensis, before it can be finished it is necessary to compare the herbarium of Mr. Thunberg.

I received nothing in a very long time from Mr. Donney Dr., although I have sent him repeatedly very fine interesting dried plants, namely Hyperaceæ and grasses. I dare think that you have become an happy husband, and offer you my retarded but cordial gratulation to your marriage.
