My dear Sir

I am truly gratified to learn from your kind letter received yesterday that you have duly received my Lichens. - and what is still more gratifying to me that you are satisfied with them.

I hope to be able from time to time to send you others which may be useful and acceptable.

I venture upon enclosing a long list of my Desiderata of American Lichens. It is indeed a long one - but I have included all those both of North, Central & South America. If you can supply me with any of these I shall indeed be indebted. My collection of Lichens now a very large and valuable one, comprehending at least 15,000 specimens, I destined after my death to go to the National Herbarium at Kew. I am therefore desirous of making it as extensive and complete as possible, as it will be

of so much greater utility and value.

After you have done with the list may I ask you to take the trouble of transmitting it, with the enclosed letter to Mr. Tuckermann. in the hope that he may be induced to enter on an exchange. — and if you can add any recommendation it will no doubt have great influence with him.

I will not forget your wish as to the Carte de Visite.

I have just finished the examination of a large mass of Arctic American Lichens collected in 1826 by Dr. John Richardson — on which a Paper will appear in the Linnean Society's Journal "soon". There were some duplicates — a portion of which I have laid aside for your herbarium — and which I will send by some early opportunity to Trouton &c.

Sir J. R. in his letter says
"When you write to Dr. Asa Gray do me the favour of giving him my kindest remembrance,

I made his acquaintance nearly 60 years ago in London, and received kindred favor from him, at Harvard Coll."

I had nearly forgotten to send you an extract from a letter from Dr. W^m. Hyndly (4 Villa St. Léonie, Plaisance, Paris)

"M. le prof Babington a pris une collection Plantes Arctiques (phanerogames & fougères) de Tellman, grâce à l'avis que vous lui aviez transmis. Puisque vous êtes en rapports avec M. Asa Gray, pourrai-je vous prier de lui recommander l'acquisition d'un exemplaire de cette collection très rare, je serai bien aise de la voir représentée aussi en Amérique par au moins un exemplaire.
