THE CAMP,

SUNNINGDALE.

July 27, 1887

My dear Watson

Yours of the 11th reached
me two days since, and I
must send you a hearty line.
We have been here a few
days, and tomorrow we go to
bring up at Edinburgh

I have sent some postals
