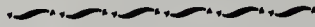


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AN INTERESTING RECORD OF *TEMNOPSOPHUS*
BIMACULATUS HORN
(COLEOPTERA: MELYRIDAE)

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On a recent trip to Lake Superior to collect in territory from which many of LeConte's types came, I spent the night at Menominee, Michigan. At dusk on 10 July 1970 I was sweeping weeds along the shore of Lake Michigan. The only catch of interest was a series of small anthicid-like beetles about 2.5mm in length, black with humeral spots, with the base of the pronotum orange. After an extensive literature search by me, Ross Arnett took the specimens to the U.S. National Museum and decided that they were *Temnopsophus bimaculatus* Horn of the family Melyridae. It has been recorded previously from Florida and Louisiana.
