

XXXIII. Additional Remarks on the Wood Sandpiper, Tringa glareola. By William Markwick, Efg. F. L. S.

Read June 4, 1793.

W HEN my defcription and figure of this bird were communicated to the Linnean Society, and which they thought proper to publifh in the first volume of their Transactions, I thought it, on the authority of Meffrs. Pennant and Latham, a diftinct species, and a new discovery as a British bird; but, having fince been favoured by Mr. Latham with some letters on the subject, and also a dried specimen of the *Tringa ocropus* (a bird that I had not seen before), I have little or no doubt that the *Tringa glareola* is a mere variety of that bird; for, according to my recollection of the bird, and on comparing the *Tringa ocropus* with my defcription and figure, they appear to agree very nearly in fize and dimenfions, the principal difference confisting in the colour of the plumage on fome parts, which may probably be occasioned only by difference of fex or age.
