13. Rostral very broad.

Rostral half width of head: 30 scales romed middle of body, the diameter of which is 30 to 40 times in total length
T. blanfordii.

Rostral more than half width of head; $\because 6$ to 30 seales romnd middle of body, the diameter of which is 24 to 30 times in total length
T. panctatus.
