



nd she said, Behold, thy sister in law is gone

back unto her people, and unto her gods: return thou after thy sister in law.

nd Ruthsaid, Intreat me not to leave thee, or to return from follow/ing after thee: for whith/er thou goest, I will go; where thou lodgest, I will lodge: thy people shall be my people, a thy Bod my Bod: where thou diest, will I die, a there will I be buried: the Lord do so to me, and more also, if ought but death part thee and me.

hen she saw that she was stedfastly mind/ ed to go with her, then she left speaking unto her.

Bef hold, he winnoweth bars fev tonight in the thresh inasfloor. Wash threelf therefore, anoint thee, a put thy raiment upon thee, and get thee down to the floor: but make not thybelf known unto the man, until he shallhave done eating anddrinking. Anditehall be, when he fieth down,

that thou shaft mark the place where he shafflie, and thou shaft go in, and uncover his feet, and fay thee down; and he will tell thee what thou shaft do.




