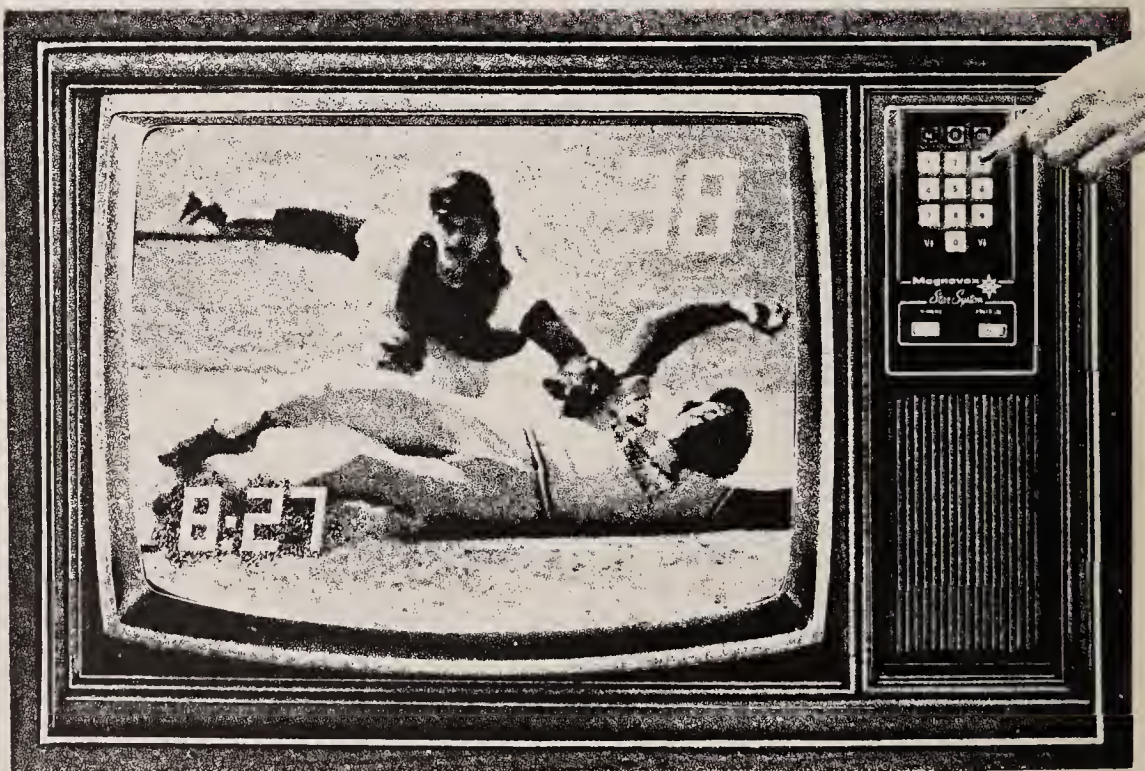

THE MANAGER

DONALD WILLIAM (ZIM) ZIMMER #34

Age: 48; Born: January 17, 1931, Cincinnati, Ohio. Ht.: 5'9"; Wt.: 185 lbs. Green eyes, Brown hair. Bats and Throws: Right. Home: Treasure Island, Fla. Married Jean Carol Bauerle. Children: Thomas 6/30/52, Donna 3/14/54.

In 2½ years Zimmer has become one of the most successful Red Sox managers. A 23-7 record in May put Boston in first place to stay until mid-September. For most of the season the Red Sox had the best record in the majors and they enjoyed a season-high 10-game lead the first week of July. The Yankees second-half surge put them into first place with two weeks left, but the Red Sox went 12-2 to force only the second A.L. playoff game ever. The 99-64 record included the team's most wins since 1946 (4th best in club history), and the best percentage (.607) since 1950. Zimmer's record of 238-162 (.595) is 4th all-time among Red Sox managers.

Don was the Red Sox third base coach for two and one-half years before replacing Darrell Johnson July 19, 1976. He was noted throughout his career as a hustling, aggressive player and the Red Sox have been that way as a team under his tutelage.

Zimmer started his pro career in 1949 in the Dodger system as a shortstop. In 1953 he was leading the American Association in homers (23) and RBI (63) at St. Paul when he was struck in the head by Jim Kirk of Columbus July 7, 1953 and missed the rest of the season. In 1954 he began a 12-year major league career with the Dodgers, Cubs, Mets, Reds and Washington Senators. He had to overcome another injury when he got a cheek bone fracture June 23, 1956 on a pitch from Hal Jeffcoat of the Reds that again disabled him for the year.

On October 10, 1961 Don was selected by the Mets from the Cubs in the N.L. Expansion Draft. He was with the Senators for three years and then played with the Toei Flyers in 1966 in Japan. During his major league stay he played second, third, shortstop, the outfield and even caught 35 games for the Senators.

He became a minor league manager in 1967 in the Reds organization. In 1971 he moved up to third base coach with the Montreal Expos. Don started 1972 in the same capacity for San Diego and then succeeded Preston Gomez in April as manager. He led the Padres through 1973 and joined the Red Sox after that season.

THE COACHES

WALTER JOHN (WALT) HRINIAK #33

Age: 35, Turns 36 May 22; Born: May 22, 1943, Natick, Mass. Ht.: 5'11"; Wt.: 178 lbs. Green eyes, Blond hair. Bats: Left; Throws: Right. Home: Andover, Mass. Married Patricia Ann Doherty. Children: Jill 2/11/77.

Hriniak has been a constant "man in motion" during his two years as bullpen coach. He has earned a well-deserved reputation for his hard work and efficiency while also being acknowledged as one of the best batting practice pitchers in baseball. Walter had an extensive background as a player, coach and manager before joining the Red Sox. He managed Montreal's Rookie team at Lethbridge, Alb., Canada in the Pioneer League in 1976 after starting the year as a coach with Denver. In 1974-75 he was first base coach with the Expos, following two years as manager of their Jamestown team in the NYP League.

Hriniak, a native of Natick, Mass., signed a substantial bonus contract with the Milwaukee Braves in 1961. At Natick H.S. he was an All Scholastic choice as a baseball shortstop, football quarterback and hockey center. He had a 13-year pro career that included two years with the Braves and Padres in 1968-69 as a catcher. In 1970 he played for Zimmer at Salt Lake City.

ALVIN NEIL (AL) JACKSON #32

Al is in his third year as the Red Sox pitching coach. A hard-throwing left-hander during a 10-year career in the National League, Jackson also developed into a knowledgeable student of pitching. From 1970 through 1976 he was a pitching instructor in the New York Mets system. During his major league career he compiled a 67-99 record with a 3.98 ERA. His best years were with the Cardinals in 1966 (13-15, 2.51) and 1967 (9-4, 3.95). He did not pitch in the 1967 World Series against the Red Sox.

Jackson was chosen the outstanding player in Texas while pitching for Moore H.S. in Waco in 1954. He also won four letters as a football quarterback and two in track. He attended Wiley College in Marshall, Tex. In the off-season he's an account executive for Schley Shipping in New York. He was selected by the Mets in the 1961 Expansion Draft.

The terms popular, dedicated and versatile apply to Pesky. Now in his fifth year as first base coach, he has been a player, coach, manager and radio-TV announcer for the Red Sox. He's a long-time favorite of Red Sox fans in the New England area and has worked for the team in the off-season selling program advertising.

Johnny was an outstanding shortstop, third baseman and all-around hitter. He holds the Red Sox records for most hits by a rookie (205) and most singles in a season (172) and hit over .300 six times in his major league career. After 10 years with Boston, Detroit and Washington, Pesky coached under Ralph Houk in Denver in 1955 and managed in the Detroit farm system from 1956 through 1960. In the mid-1960's he was a coach for the Pirates and a manager in their system before joining the Red Sox broadcast crew in 1969. He spent six years as part of the radio and television team. He also managed Seattle for the Red Sox in 1961-62 before moving up to the parent Boston team in 1963-64.

EDWARD FRED JOSEPH (EDDIE) YOST #36

During his two years with the Red Sox Eddie has shown why he's been acclaimed as one of the best third base coaches in baseball. He came to Boston after a 14-year coaching tenure with the Washington Senators and New York Mets.

"The Walking Man," as he was known during his 17-year major league career, was an outstanding third baseman and leadoff hitter. He came from the campus of New York U. to the Senators in 1944 and went on to set several records for third basemen. He led the A.L. six times in walks, had over 100 walks eight times, scored over 100 runs five times and twice led the league in fielding. He still holds the A.L. record of 28 home runs as leadoff batter.

He was traded from Washington to Detroit in Dec. of 1958 and was selected by the Angels in baseball's first expansion draft, Dec. 14, 1960. When Yost retired after the 1962 season he held the major league record for most games at third base (2,008) and the A.L. marks for putouts (2,356), assists (3,659) and chances (6,015). He was selected for the A.L. All Star team in 1952 but did not play. He has a Master's Degree in Physical Education from N.Y.U.

Offensively Rick had an off year in 1978, but he was still a clutch performer and one of the league's best shortstops. Despite missing 17 games in July with an ankle injury (the Red Sox were 7-10) he was second among A.L. shortstops in putouts, assists and total chances and cut his errors from 24 to 15 (only four on throws).

After a slow start in which he was hitting .183 in mid-May, "The Rooster" came back with a .322 mark in June to raise his average to .255. He later had a career-high 17-game hitting streak in July-August while sparkling in the field. He hit safely in 16 of the season's final 20 games and his two-run homer against Toronto October 1 was a key blow as the Red Sox tied the Yankees for first place.

Despite a .248 average Rick was second among A.L. shortstops with 42 extra-base hits (Roy Smalley 53), and third with 49 RBI (Smalley 77, Robin Yount 71) and 155 hits (Smalley and Craig Reynolds 160). In 1977 he was the A.L. shortstop of the year with 194 hits, a .293 average and a starting berth in the All Star game. He was chosen All Star shortstop by The Sporting News, A.P. and U.P.I. Last summer he was named to the All Star squad but was replaced after he hurt his ankle July 9 in Cleveland.

Burleson was the Red Sox first selection in the 1970 winter draft, after playing short for the Connie Mack World Champions of 1969 and for two school league champions at Warren H.S. of Downey, Calif. He also lettered in football and basketball.

Bill had continuous arm problems that limited him to his least games (29) since 1973, with seven wins and four saves. It was a disappointing year for Campbell after he earned top relief pitcher laurels in 1977 with a 13-9 record and a league-high 31 saves in 69 games.

After getting into only two games in May he had his best month in June (2-0, 1 save in 6 games). He later had two strong, long scoreless relief efforts, in N.Y. August 2 (5.2 IP) and in Detroit Sept. 19 (5 IP). He underwent extensive post-season examinations and rehabilitation programs and a successful recovery would greatly enhance the Red Sox pennant chances in 1979.

"Soup" won the A.L. Rolands Relief Award in 1976-77 and totaled 30 wins and 51 saves in 147 games in that span. With the Twins in 1976 he tied John Hiller's 1974 A.L. relief record with 17 wins and his 167.2 innings broke Eddie Fisher's mark of 165 set in 1965 at Chicago.

Twins' scout Jess Flores signed him as a free agent in 1971 after he pitched a no-hitter against Flores' semi-pro club. Through Little League, Colt League and high school baseball in Pomona, Calif. Bill was an outfielder, and didn't become a fulltime pitcher until 1966 at Mt. San Antonio J.C. There followed two years of duty in the Army, with service in Vietnam, before he returned home and to semi-pro ball.

He made All Star teams as a starter at each minor league level and was "Pitcher of the Year" with Charlotte of the Southern League in 1972, before coming to the major leagues to stay in mid-1973, as a reliever.

Bill is an avid golfer and has been active in community affairs. He was selected as the BoSox Club Man of the Year for 1978 and organized a blood drive with his wife, Linda, to help the Red Cross.

From 1972-77 he ranked as one of the best fielding shortstops in the American League.

He led A.L. shortstops in fielding in 1973 (.986) and 1976 (.983, with a league-low of 10 errors). For four years (1972-75) he teamed with Jack Brohamer to form the Indians shortstop-second base combination.

Duffy was the number one selection of the Cincinnati Reds in the secondary phase of the 1967 June draft. In 1970 he was the MVP in the American Association All Star game while playing for Indianapolis. He finished that year with the Reds and was their starting shortstop in the 1971 opener. A strong finish brought Eck an excellent 20-8 record with a 2.99 ERA and 16 complete games in 35 starts. He had three shutouts, seven other games in which he allowed only one run, and set personal highs in complete games, wins and innings. Dennis came to the Red Sox last March 30 with Fred Kendall in a six-player trade.

He was 4-1 vs. the Yankees, 11-1 in Fenway Park (best mark since Dave Ferriss was 13-0 in 1946), 12-3 vs. the East, and he beat every team except the Orioles and Rangers. After a slow start (0-1 in five April games, 5.09 ERA), he went 20-7 with a 2.67 ERA the rest of the year. He was a clutch pitcher down the stretch with four straight wins in which he allowed three runs and 21 hits in 33.2 innings. He became the only pitcher, other than Luis Tiant, to win 20 games for the Red Sox since 1967.

Control has always been one of Eck's strong points and he had a strikeout-walk ratio of 162-71. He had four walkless nine-inning games and four others in which he walked just one batter. He was reached for 30 home runs, but 14 came in his first 12 games.

Dennis was the A.L. Rookie Pitcher of the Year in 1975 (13-7, 2.60 ERA). He beat Oakland 6-0 in his first major league start and did not allow an earned run his first 28.2 innings, a M.L. rookie record. In 1976 he was 13-12 (8-4 after the All Star game), with 200 strikeouts in 199 innings. He became only the eighth pitcher since 1900 to fan 200 in a season before the age of 22, and his average of 9/9 innings was second in the majors to Nolan Ryan. On Aug. 13, 1976 he had a career-high 14 strikeouts in a 2-1 loss to Texas.

In 1977 Eck tossed a 1-0 no-hitter with 12 strikeouts vs. California and Frank Tanana on May 30 in Cleveland. The no-hitter was part of a 22.1 hitless inning string, second longest in baseball history to Cy Young's 25.1 inning feat in 1904. That Aug. he pitched a one-hitter vs. the Brewers (1st inning triple by Cecil Cooper) and also pitched two perfect innings in the All Star game.

Eckersley was the Indians third selection in the 1972 June draft. He played baseball, basketball and football at Washington H.S. (Fremont, Calif.). He had a 23-8 H.S. record and was All League and All County three times. Dennis hurled a shutout in his first pro start at Reno in 1972 and was the Texas League's right handed pitcher of the year in 1974.

Dwight enjoyed his most productive home run season (24) while performing in the outstanding fashion in right field that earned him his second Gold Glove selection. He had personal highs in homers, runs (75), games (147), walks (65) and stolen bases (8) but had an up-and-down year at the plate that resulted in a .247 average.

In May and June Evans played a major role in the team's surge into first place. He hit .306 in May with 11 homers and 21 RBI and .292 in June with five homers and 15 RBI. He fell off the final two months and never really recovered from a beaming by Seattle's Mike Parrott Aug. 28. He led the team with 14 assists and was selected to the A.L. All Star team for the first time. Overall Dwight made a fine comeback from an injury to his right knee that caused him to miss most of the 1977 season and required surgery that fall.

In addition to his two Gold Glove selections he had a 191 consecutive-game errorless streak in 1973-74 that is 6th best in A.L. history. He opened the 1977 season in center and played 12 games there during injuries to both Fred Lynn and Rick Miller.

Evans was the Red Sox 5th selection in the 1969 June draft, after he was an All League third baseman and MVP at Chatsworth H.S. Earlier he was an All Star as a pitcher and third baseman in Little, Colt, Pony and Connie Mack Leagues in Northridge, Calif. He also won two letters as a football flanker at Chatsworth. In 1972 he won the International League MVP award.

Fisk was again one of the best and most-durable catchers in baseball. He played in 157 games (caught in 154, 151 as a starter) and hit .284 with 20 home runs, 88 RBI, 94 runs, 39 doubles and 64 extra-base hits. He came close to the Major League record of 42 doubles for a catcher, set by Mickey Cochrane, 1930. Fisk had a strong middle of the year with a .337 average in June and a .365 mark in July (28 RBI in 26 games). He hit safely in nine of the season's final 11 games.

He was voted the starting catcher in the All Star game for the fourth time (his 6th selection to the A.L. team) and to the end of the year A.L. team by U.P.I. and A.P. He needs to catch in 132 games to eclipse Sammy White's Red Sox record of 967 games (1951-59). In 1977 he tied the major league record with four passed balls in 151 games. In addition to holding the club record of 26 home runs by a catcher Fisk is one of five catchers in history to score 100 runs and drive in 100 in the same year (1977), joining Cochrane '32, Berra '50, Campanella '53 and Bench '74. The Boston Baseball Writers chose him the winner of the Thomas A. Yawkey Team MVP award for 1977.

In 1972 "Pudge" was a unanimous pick as A.L. Rookie of the Year and his dramatic 12th inning game winning home run in Game 6 of the 1975 World Series has been voted as one of the all-time great moments of baseball. It followed his powerful batting finish that year to spark the Red Sox to the pennant.

He was the Red Sox first selection in the 1967 winter draft after being MVP in baseball, basketball and soccer at Charlestown H.S. in N.H. and briefly attending the U. of New Hampshire. He has been chairman of N.H.'s Easter Seals drive and is on the National Easter Seals Sports Council.

Andy was a valuable mid-season acquisition. He joined the team in Minnesota July 24 just as the second game of a two-nighter started. Shortly thereafter he appeared in relief in the fifth inning and pitched 3.1 scoreless innings to get the win.

A severe cut on his left hand in a fishing accident April 5 cost Hassler a spot in the Royals pitching rotation. He came back in May and was in 11 games before being traded to the Red Sox. He made 11 relief appearances and two starts for Boston and had some strong efforts in September. An operation to repair the tendons in his throwing hand was performed successfully the day after the season ended.

He was originally drafted and signed by California in 1969 after graduation from Palo Verde H.S. (Tucson). In 1974 he came to the Angels to stay in June and put together a 7-11 record with a 2.61 ERA, third best in the A.L. That included a one-hitter September 8, 1974 against the White Sox (2nd inning double by Lee Richard) in which he was a hard-luck loser, 1-0 on an unearned run.

He was sold to the Royals in July of 1976 and was a key contributor to their first Western Division title. However, he had to overcome an 18-game losing streak that started with the Angels in late April of 1975. He broke the hard-luck string with a 9-2 win in Chicago August 6, 1976. In 1977 he won nine games for the Royals, despite missing a month with a knee injury. That included a brilliant 1-0 one-hitter over the Indians Dennis Eckersley (a one-out, 6th inning infield chopper by Duane Kuiper), in which he walked none and retired the final 11 hitters.

Hobson had a difficult year with continuous injuries (elbow chips and hyper-extended muscle in right arm and a pulled left hamstring) that hampered his all-around play. He missed 15 games with the hamstring (June 30 to July 19) and ended with a .250 average, 17 home runs and 80 RBI. Twenty-three of his league-high 43 errors came after Aug. 4 and he had to move from third base to DH for the final nine games. He still managed to hit safely in nine of the last 11 games (.350). Three bone chips were removed from his elbow the day after the season ended and mid-winter examinations showed Butch hopefully on the way to a successful recovery.

The injuries ruined what might have been another outstanding year for Hobson. He had a great start with a 10-game hitting streak (6 homers) in April, including at least one RBI in each game (total of 21). He had 15 homers when he pulled the hamstring in Baltimore June 29.

Butch hit 30 homers with 112 RBI in 1977 to set team records for third basemen. He won the third base position by hitting .351 in Spring Training in 1977. He went on to have an 18-game hitting streak that July and to lead the team with 18 homers on the road, while playing 159 games.

He played for "Bear" Bryant's Alabama team in the 1972 Orange Bowl vs. Nebraska for the national championship, but chose baseball over football when the Red Sox selected him on the 8th round of the 1973 June draft. That year he set a Southeastern Conference home run record for Alabama. Butch led the Bessemer Legion team to state titles in 1969 and 1970 while winning MVP honors. His father was the MVP in the 1953 Orange Bowl at quarterback for Alabama and later played baseball briefly in the Cleveland Indians farm system.

Lynn made a strong comeback from his injury-plagued 1977 season. He hit .298 with 22 home runs, 33 doubles, 82 RBI and a .492 slugging % in 150 games. In the process he had new highs in games, at bats (541), homers and walks (75) and a low in strikeouts (50), and his .384 on-base % was sixth in the A.L.

Fred had a consistent season with .310 in April, .305 in May, .357 in June and .315 in July, and he reached a high of .333 July 16. In August, however, he missed five games with a stomach injury and hit only .218. But he rallied in September to hit .379 the final 17 games and ended the month with 17 RBI and 18 walks in the last 30 games.

Lynn was the starting center fielder in the 1978 All Star game, the fourth time he was picked. He was selected to The Sporting News All A.L. team and won his second Gold Glove. Lynn's consistency can be seen from his averages of .312 home, .283 away, .316 days and .287 nights. He went 5-5 (four singles and a triple) Aug. 28 vs. Seattle and hit safely in 10 of the last 11 games. Fred's .498 career slugging mark ranks fourth for the Red Sox behind Williams, Foxx and Rice.

The 25-year-old righty was recommended to the Red Sox by Cees Herkemy, a coach in the Dutch Amateur Baseball Federation. He joined the Red Sox team in the Florida Instructional League in the Fall of 1974 and shortly signed.

As a youngster he was on two Dutch Little League champions and one Babe Ruth champion. In 1973 he was on the Dutch All Star team that won the European Amateur Championship and was voted the team's best player. He played in Ponce, P.R., for Manager Jose Pagan this past winter.

Remy was a steady and valuable performer in his first year with the Red Sox. He hit .278 in 148 games with 87 runs and 30 stolen bases and committed only 13 errors (three on throws). He had new highs in average, at bats (583), runs, hits (162), triples (6) and doubles (24). His absence for 16 games, August 26 through September 6, with a chipped bone in his left wrist was a factor in the club's slide from first place. The Red Sox were 7-9 in that span as Remy was limited to pinchrunning.

Jerry hit .309 in April and .316 in August, with a team and career-high 19 game hitting streak. When injured he had hit safely in 26 of 27 games. He came back from the injury to hit .354 the last 16 games.

He became only the second Red Sox to steal 30 bases in the last 44 years, along with Tommy Harper's club record 54 in 1973. Jerry led A.L. second basemen with 114 double plays and was second with 784 total chances. He was picked for the A.L. team in the All Star game but didn't play.

Remy was an All League choice at Somerset H.S. at shortstop twice and was All State at second base as a senior. In the 1970 June draft he was selected by the Washington Senators (the 453rd player picked) but didn't sign. The Angels then made him their third pick in the secondary round of the 1971 January draft. In 1973 he was the Midwest League batting champion and MVP, in 1975 he was selected to the major league all-rookie team, in 1976 he won the Angels Owners' Trophy, voted by his teammates for leadership, sportsmanship and professional ability, and in 1977 he was the Angels team captain.

Jim had one of the best all-around seasons in the last 40 years. He led the majors with 46 HR, 139 RBI, 15 triples, 406 total bases, a .600 slugging %, 213 hits and 214 runs produced and was second with 121 runs, while setting Red Sox records of 163 games and 677 at bats. At the same time he hit .315 and was the first A.L. player to get 400 TB since 1937 (406 is a new Sox mark), and the first player to ever lead either league outright in HR, triples and RBI. The hits and HR are second best in Red Sox history, to Speaker (222, 1912) and Foxx (50, 1938). Thirty of his home runs either tied the score or put the team ahead, and 14 times he homered in the first inning. Rice hit into 15 double plays, but none after July 25 (66 games).

He was voted the A.L.'s most valuable player and co-winner of the prestigious "Joe Cronin Award" (with Ron Guidry) presented by the A.L. In addition he was named A.L. Player of the Year by The Sporting News and to the A.L. All Star team by The Sporting News, U.P.I. and A.P. and the winner of the Thomas A. Yawkey Red Sox MVP award by the Boston Baseball Writers. Jim was named A.L. Player of the Month twice (May .372, 13 HR, 33 RBI and Aug. .379, 12 HR, 33 RBI) and Player of the Week twice. Despite a .270 average in September Rice came through with 10 HR and 25 RBI.

He had three four-hit games and 18 three-hit games, and led the club with 16 game-winning RBI and a .339 average with men on base. Rice played in 100 games in left, 15 in right, one in center and 49 as the DH. He led A.L. outfielders in the voting for the All Star game and started in left field. From the seventh inning on in 1978 he hit .316 and has averaged .320 in that category the last four years.

In four years and one month of major league baseball Rice has a .306 average with 133 HR, 453 RBI, 775 hits and a .541 slugging %, third best in Red Sox history behind Williams and Foxx. He is only the second Red Sox to have more than one 200-hit season (1977-78), to join his batting coach Johnny Pesky (1942-46-47).

The Red Sox picked Rice number one in the 1971 June draft after he won 10 letters in baseball, football, basketball and track for Westside and Hanna H.S. in Anderson. He moved rapidly up the farm system as an All Star in the Florida State and Eastern Leagues and was Minor League Player of the Year in 1974 when he led the Int. League in hitting, HR and RBI.

Rice has become a good golfer and has driven a golf ball tremendous distances. He did not play in the 1975 A.L. Playoffs or World Series because of a broken left hand suffered in Detroit the final week of the season.

Torrez had his fifth straight winning record, 16-13, with a 3.96 ERA in 36 starts and 250 innings, and he had a personal high of 120 strikeouts. He beat every team except the Rangers and Royals. Mike had a fast start with an 11-3 record through June and 15-6 through August 18.

He then went 0-6 in 8 starts, that included three one-run defeats. Mike came through with a crucial 1-0 three-hitter over Detroit September 28 and then was the losing pitcher in the special playoff game against the Yankees, 5-4 October 2 (6.2 IP, 5 H, 4 R) on a Bucky Dent three run homer.

The Red Sox got Torrez via the Free Agent Re-Entry Draft after he was the hero of the 1977 Yankee surge to the pennant and World Series title. Two complete games and 15 strikeouts in 18 innings against the Dodgers thrust Mike into national prominence during the World Series. During his four A.L. seasons Mike has compiled a 35-20 second half mark.

Mike was signed by the Cardinals in 1965 after graduating from Topeka H.S. which did not have a baseball team. However, he pitched in Little League and Pony League programs and was an All State selection in Legion baseball in 1964. He also won two letters as a basketball center. In 1976 at Oakland he pitched three straight shutouts with 38.1 scoreless innings to set two A's records.

Yaz was still one of baseball's best clutch players despite back and wrist injuries that curtailed his performance the final two months. He hit .277 with 17 HR and 81 RBI in 144 games, walked 76 times against 44 strikeouts and hit into only nine double plays. He saw action in left and center fields, first base and as the DH. He received 8 intentional walks for a new A.L. career record of 161, one more than Harmon Killebrew.

Carl needs 131 hits to reach the 3,000 mark and should attain that cherished goal in 1979. He finished 1978 ranked in the top 20 all-time baseball rankings in games, at bats, doubles, home runs, RBI, walks, total bases and extra base hits, and should climb higher in 1979. The lists on the next page show his standings.

During 1978 Yaz hit .358 in July and was chosen to the All Star team for the 14th time. He hit .299 in August, despite missing 13 games, and had 6 home runs with 19 RBI in September. Yaz hit .318 with men on base and brought in 26 of 39 runners on third base with less than two out (.667). He had 5 RBI in a key win in Detroit September 19 and beat the Orioles 2-0 with a two-run homer September 6. In the finale vs. the Yankees he homered in the second inning for a 1-0 lead off Guidry and singled in another run in the eighth, before fouling out in the ninth to end the season.

In 1977 he won his seventh Gold Glove while leading A.L. outfielders with 16 assists (the 7th time to extend his own major league mark) and no errors in 140 games.

Now in his 19th Red Sox season, he has the most longevity with the club as a home-grown player. Ted Williams, who played 19 Red Sox seasons, was obtained in a trade while Yaz signed off the campus of Notre Dame as a shortstop in 1959. He later obtained a degree from Merrimack College in Business Administration. Yaz makes his off-season home in Florida and is an avid fisherman.

DID YOU KNOW?

Sacrifice hits were first recorded in 1889. They were credited to batters for advancing runners on any out and at bats were charged. In 1894 the rule was changed so that only bunts were counted as sacrifices with no at bats charged. A sacrifice fly was tabulated with no time at bat for scoring a runner with a fly ball out from 1908 to 1930, 1939 and 1954 to the present. In addition, from 1926 to 1930, a sacrifice fly was counted for advancing any runner with a fly ball out.

The last RED SOX triple play was 5/25/72 at Fenway Park vs. the Orioles. Elrod Hendricks lined out to 1B DUANE JOSEPHSON, who tagged the base and threw to LUIS APARICIO at 2B for the third out. The last one against the RED SOX was 9/4/65 in N.Y. BOB TILLMAN grounded to Clete Boyer at 3B, who started a 5-4-3 DP with Bobby Richardson and Joe Pepitone. Pepitone then threw back to Boyer to get TONY CONIGLIARO at third.

Three pitchers have batted a total of four times for the RED SOX since the DH rule went into effect in 1973. LUIS TIANI flied out 7/12/75 vs. Texas, JIM WILLOUGHBY flied out 5/21/76 in N.Y., DICK POLE grounded out 6/17/76 in Oakland and TIANI struck out 7/5/76 vs. Chicago.

ITEMS OF INTEREST

FREE AGENT DRAFT RULE — A BRIEF SUMMARY: Major League and National Association clubs meet twice a year for the purpose of drafting free agent player talent . . . The winter meeting is conducted by conference phone . . . Selection of a free agent entitles the club to the exclusive right of negotiation with that player for a specified period (from date of selection until 15 days prior to next draft meeting).

Approximate dates of draft meetings: Summer (early June) and Winter (mid-January) . . .

There are two phases to each draft meeting:

(1) Regular Phase — Clubs choose in inverse order of major league standings, selecting free agents and previous draftees who had not signed contracts but had instead enrolled in four-year colleges and since had either completed his junior year or become 21 years of age . . . Each organization may select only one player for each of its major league, AAA and AA rosters but is not limited to the number of picks for "A" level . . . Minor league clubs select in the same relative order as their parent clubs.

(2) Secondary Phase — Selection of free agents who had been drafted previously but who had not signed contracts before the negotiation right expired (except those draftees who had enrolled in a four-year college and had since graduated or become 21 years of age — now drafted in Regular Phase) . . . It is possible for a club to redraft a player whom it had been unable to sign after the original selection, but only with the express written consent of that player . . . The order of selection is by lot with the 26 major league clubs divided into two 13 team groups with the groups alternating having first selections in respective drafts.

SUSPENDED GAME RULE: A game terminated by curfew or by a pre-arranged time limit is a suspended game if it has progressed far enough to be an official game (i.e. 4½ or 5 innings) (Rule 4.10).

A game terminated by light failure or malfunction of a mechanical field device under control of the home club is a suspended game anytime after it begins.

Rule 4.11 (d) . . . A called game ends at the moment the umpire terminates play . . . **EXCEPTION:** If the game is called while an inning is in progress and before it is completed, the game becomes a **SUSPENDED GAME** in each of the following situations: (1) The visiting team has scored one or more runs to tie the score and the home team has not scored. (2) The visiting team has scored one or more runs to take the lead and the home team has not tied the score or retaken the lead.

Suspended games shall be resumed at the exact point of suspension immediately preceding the next scheduled, single game between the two clubs on the same ground . . . If this is not possible, other provisions for resumption are specified in American League Regulation 4.12 . . .

Any **LEGAL** game called due to weather with the score **TIED** is a tie game and must be replayed in its entirety.

BATTING/PITCHING (ERA) CHAMPION QUALIFICATIONS: 502 or more plate appearances. 162 or more innings.

ROOKIE QUALIFICATIONS: A player shall be considered a rookie unless, during a previous season or seasons, he has (a) exceeded 130 at bats or 50 innings pitched in the major leagues; or (b) accumulated more than 45 days on the active roster of a major league club or clubs during the period of the 25-player limit (excluding time in military service).

SAVE RULE — A relief pitcher shall be credited with a save when he meets all three of the following conditions: 1.) he is the finishing pitcher in a game won by his club; 2.) he is not the winning pitcher; and 3.) he qualifies under one of the following conditions: a.) he enters the game with a lead of no more than three runs and pitches for at least one inning, or b.) he enters the game with the potential tying run either on base, at bat, or on deck (i.e., the potential tying run is either already on base or is one of the first two batsmen he faces), or c.) he pitched effectively for at least three innings.

PLAYER LIMITS — 25 players from opening day through August 31 . . . 40 players from September 1 through end of season . . . Players in military service do not count against the under control list while on active duty. Upon separation from the service, a player will be reinstated to his club's normal player limits after he has completed a 15-day trial period or has participated in a championship game, whichever comes first.

DEFINITION OF NIGHT GAME — Any game scheduled to start after 6 p.m. will be considered a night game. If a game is scheduled to start at 6 p.m. and is delayed for any reason, it will be considered a day game. If a game is scheduled to start at 6:01 p.m., it will be considered a night game. Twi-night double-headers shall be included in double-header statistics and shall be considered two night games. When afternoon and night games (separate admissions) are played on the same date, the games shall be day and night and count as single games.

AMERICAN LEAGUE CURFEW RULE — All night games must be called at 1 a.m. local time. But if an inning is started prior to 1 a.m. city time, it can be completed.
