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

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## INTRODUCTORY

The early records of the New England Pendletons which appear in the following pages are based almost entirely upon Colonial, town, church, and county records, the originals of which for the most part were examined by the compiler during his business trips through New York and New England, or during his summer vacations. At the same time he was enabled to interview hundreds of people—from some of whom data could not have been obtained by letter—and to examine thousands of published genealogies, local histories and the like in the libraries of Boston, Albany, Buffalo, and New York.

This work was greatly simplified by the fact that Brian Pendleton was the only one of the name to establish a New England family. Consequently we did not experience the trials involved in separating the descendants of several unrelated ancestors bearing a common name. Indeed, outside of a few late comers, there is to-day but one other Pendleton family in the United States—that of Virginia, descended from Philip Pendleton who settled there in 1683. [See Appendix IV.]

Another factor to our advantage is to be found in the records of Westerly, R. I.—the town which may be regarded as the old home of the New England Pendletons. These records from the earliest settlement of the place down to the present day, are in a splendid state of preservation and include not only thousands of births, marriages, and deaths, but also a great wealth of probate matters, deeds, and minutes of town and council meetings—rich mines of information that well repaid the careful working to which they were subjected. Nearly all the early Pendletons left wills or had administrations made upon their estates, so it would seem impossible to controvert any pedigree set down in this book.

While we believe this part of the work to be accurate, yet we cannot feel as much certainty over any of the dates noted. Town records, Bible records, tombstones, and genealogies invariably disagree in this respect. In fact it has not been an uncommon experience to receive from one man at different times records of the births of his own children in which these discrepancies would occur. Names also are frequently puzzling as many people not only have peculiarities of handwriting which are hard to make out, but besides often diverge from the usually accepted spellings. With these minor exceptions we believe this work will be found as accurate as a genealogy can be made. Where errors are found the compiler would be thankful to receive notice of them so that they can be corrected.

In the earlier generations we have usually given the authorities for the various records noted. From the seventh generation on much of

the material was obtained through correspondence, and was largely confirmed by different members of the family and by such later vital records, etc., as are noted in Appendix VII. Except in a few instances this work does not carry the descendants of the Pendleton women beyond their own immediate families. To trace all their descendants would be a matter of interest, but at the same time a task beyond the compass of one man's life. It has been our aim to include an unusually large number of families in which at least one parent bore the family name and to search out those Pendletons who vanished in the long ago.

In the preparation of our records concerning the later generations of the Pendleton family no especial difficulty was encountered outside of the usual one in obtaining answers to a small percentage of the letters sent out. On the whole the Pendletons have been greatly interested in their family history and have given freely of the facts in their possession. Not a few went to considerable trouble in furnishing data upon other lines than their own, and among those especially deserving of thanks for their valuable assistance should be mentioned: Charles H. Pendleton, of Westerly, R. I.; Dr. Cyrus H. Pendleton, of Hebron, Conn.; Eugene A. Pendleton, of Waterbury, Conn.; the late Robert P. Pendleton, of South Canaan, Conn.; Charles H. Pendleton, of Rockland, Me.; the late John Jefferson Pendleton, of Granville, O.; Judge George F. Pendleton, of Findlay, O.; Mrs. Roderick D. Pendleton, of Winter Harbor, Me.; Joseph M. Stuart, of Deer Island, N. B.; Miss Alice L. Pendleton and Mrs. Rose Pendleton Small, of Islesboro, Me.; Capt. Frank I. Pendleton, of Park, Me.; Mrs. Eliza Bills, of Hope, Me.; William R. Pendleton, of Westfield, Mass.; Edwin Vincent, of New York; Miss Helen D. Pendleton, of Willimansett, Mass.; Mrs. J. H. Montgomery, of Camden, Me.; Lewis Pendleton, of Cleveland, O., and last but not least, the compiler's brother, Charles M. Pendleton, of Boston, Mass., who was always ready to search records or to interview people whenever called upon. The compiler's wife and his father as well, deserve a vote of thanks for their faithful work upon the index to this book.

To all others who have contributed to the success of this work either by contributing data or the sinews of war which made the publication possible, the compiler wishes to express his gratitude. It is his hope that the reading and study of this book may be a source of as much pleasure and interest to them as its compilation was to him.

## EARLY PENDLETONS IN ENGLAND

Surnames, as family names, were unknown in England until the middle of the eleventh century. Up to that time the various Johns, Williams and Roberts were distinguished one from another when necessary, by also mentioning their occupations, their places of residence, their parents' names, or some personal trait or peculiarity. In the next two hundred years this system of nomenclature underwent a gradual change, and by the fourteenth century the distinguishing appellations had been generally converted into and established as family surnames. The slow progress of the transition is reflected in the records of the period. Where several men are referred to in a single item, one or two will appear with a surname, while the others are described according to the old system. An instance of this appears in the following record from the Lancashire Court of Final Concords:

On the 20th of October, 1246, an agreement was made between Hugh, son of William, and Cecily, his wife, Henry de Dunham, and Hawise his wife, plaintiffs, and Hugh Querderay and Isold, his wife, tenants of the moiety of two ox gangs of land in Penelton, which Henry [Hugh?] and Cecily, and Henry and Hawise claimed to be the reasonable share belonging to Cecily and Hawise of the inheritance of Siward de Penelton, father of Cecily, Hawise and Isold, whose heirs they were. (Lancashire and Chester Record Society, Vol. XXXIX, p. 105.)

About this same time the Assize Rolls of Lancashire in the thirtieth year of the reign of King Henry III [1246] show that Hugh Querderay and Thomas de Parva[little] Pendleton were sureties of Adam, Richard, William and Roger, sons of Matilda. (Ibid., Vol. XLVII, p. 92). It is possible that this Matilda was widow of Siward de Penelton, the first resident of that town to be given its name as far as we have found record.

In the next century the Perquisites of the adjoining town of Salford show that on the 6th of November, 1324, Thomas de Boulton was fined 4d. because he did not prosecute against Adam de Penilton. Adam was fined a like sum because he did not have Henry Penilton present. The records of this court for 9 May, 1325, contain the name of Roger de Penilton, and for 16 Sept., 1325, Thomas, son of Agnes and Adam de Pennulton. (Ibid., Vol. XLI, pp. 151, 157).

By this time the designation "de Pendleton" had become established as a surname. The Exchequer Lay Subsidies in 1332 show that Adam de Penhilton *of Salford*, paid a tax of 3s. while Robert de Penhilton, and Thomas de Penhilton, *both of Penhilton*, paid taxes of 18d. and 12d., respectively. (Ibid., Vol. XXXI, pp. 29, 37).

It is obvious from the records just quoted that the name Pendleton as applied to a family takes its origin from the ancient town of Pendleton, near Manchester, in Lancashire. The word itself appears to come from the Gaelic "pen"—a hill, or head, "Pendle," the summit.

In the sixteenth century the prefix "de" to the surname Pendleton had been dropped entirely, as was generally the case with all names of place origin. The family had greatly increased in Lancashire by this time. The Parish Registers there containing scores of references to them. The records of the Probate Court at Chester between 1574 and 1634 show thirty-one wills and administrations under this name, also one in 1534 and another in 1561. Among other early records relating to the Pendletons in this county we find the following in the publications of the Lancashire and Chester *Record Society*:

23 March, 1546, one Brenthall of Pendulton, brought suit in the Dutchy Court against Robert Bradshaw, Thomas Pendulton, Bryan Fowler and others, "Men of great substance and wilful and unreasonable persons." (Vol. XXXV, p. 214).

ffraunces Pendulton of Salford Hundred, paid tax for £70 in goods in 1541. (Vol. XII, p. 138.)

Hugh Pendleton and his sons Henry and William were members of one of the merchant guilds in Preston in 1562. (Vol. IX, p. 129.)

Robert Pendleton of Salford, gentleman, was fined £10 for not accepting the order of knighthood [about 1600]. (Vol. XII, p. 216.)

Thomas Pendleton of Butley, was christened, 15 July, 1564. (Vol. V, p. 12.)

At this same time we find the family had spread over several counties to the south of Lancashire. In the Calendar of Wills and Administrations in the Consistory Court of the Bishop of Litchfield and Coventry there are filed the wills of the following Pendletons: Thomas (1536); Agnes (1543); Anne (1631); George (1630); Ralph (1634); Robert (1574); Robert (1631); Thomas (1556); William (1599), and an administration upon the estate of Richard Pendleton (1547). [British Record Society, Index Library, Vol. VII.] In the Court of the Archdeacon of Northampton there is the will of a Richard Pendleton recorded in a volume covering the period from 1590-1602. [Ibid., Vol. I.]

The Shropshire Parish Registers for the Litchfield Diocese [Vol. III] also contain a number of entries relating to the descendants of one Thomas Pendleton who was buried 20 Sept., 1556, and in the Prerogative Court of Canterbury there is the will of a Richard Pendleton in 1574.

Many other old English records contain references to men and women bearing this name before Brian Pendleton's time, and it would be of much interest to make some research there to determine his parentage. If this could be settled his earlier ancestry might be run back for several generations without much difficulty, and perhaps the effort will some day be made.

## COAT OF ARMS

Much confusion exists in this country over the right to display coat-armor. The whole subject has been very carefully treated by a committee appointed by the New England Historic Genealogical Society and those who wish to obtain a thorough knowledge of this subject are recommended to read the report submitted by that committee.

Briefly, a coat of arms, "Does not belong with a family name, but only to the particular family bearing the name to whose progenitor it had been granted or confirmed. Proof of right must be established by authentic pedigree direct from an armiger."

While it is true that Burke's "General Armory" shows three coats of arms under the name Pendleton, yet as nothing is known of Brian Pendleton's ancestry it is obvious that no legitimate claim can be made to any one of them at present. As described in the cryptic language of heraldry these arms are as follows:

Pendleton (Lancashire). Azure on a fesse gules, three garbs or; a chief argent.

Pendleton. The same arms. Crest, a lion's paw sable holding a battle-ax or.

Pendleton (Norwich). Gules, an inescutcheon argent, between four escallops in saltire or. Crest, on a chapeau gules turned up ermine, a demi-dragon with wings endorsed or, holding an escallop argent. These arms belong to the Pendletons of Virginia whose descent from the Pendleton armiger of Norwich has been established.

## DOUBLE DATING

In the early part of our records there will be noted a good many "double dates" such as 20 Feby. 1681/2, 16 Jany. 1734/5, etc. This system was employed to distinguish partly between the "Old Style" of reckoning time and the "New Style," which the English with characteristic conservatism could not adopt until over a century and a half after it had been in use elsewhere.

Under the Julian calendar the year began on the 25th of March and its average duration was fixed at  $365\frac{1}{4}$  days. This average year proving too long by a few minutes, the error was rectified by the Gregorian calendar, introduced by the bull of Pope Gregory XIII, in February, 1582, and adopted in England by act of Parliament in 1751. January 1st was then made the beginning of the year 1752, and the excess of eleven days which had accumulated under the former method was cancelled by making the 3rd of September, 1752, the 14th.

Prior to this time the double datings used so generally by the colonists between the 31st of December and the 25th of March show that they had taken cognizance of the new calendar in so far as it changed the initial day of the year. They made no attempt to absorb the excess time accumulating under the Julian reckoning until the change

was brought about by statute, and in this work no correction of such dates has been made. They are given just as they appear in the old records.

## EXPLANATION OF NUMBERING SYSTEM

The numbering system used in this book is a modification of the one employed by the New England Historic Genealogical Society and is readily understood.

Every person bearing the name Pendleton is numbered consecutively according to the order of his or her appearance. In any family record of Pendletons the names of all the children who married are carried forward to the next generation, where they reappear under their original numbers as heads of families of their own, except where such marriages did not result, or have not yet resulted in issue, or where, as in the case of many of the Pendleton women, their children are given at once.

For example, among the children of [273] Benjamin Crandall Pendleton noted on page 221, [822] Benjamin Franklin Pendleton who married Delia Jones is not carried forward because the marriage did not result in issue. His sisters, [824] Ethelinda Davis and [825] Harriet Eliza Pendleton are not carried forward either as their family records are given on this page. Their brother, [828] Mason Mandeville Pendleton, however, has merely his marriages noted without other statement and this indicates his own family is carried over to the next generation. Turning the pages it will be found that his number occurs again on page 393, where he appears at the head of a family of his own.

In the same way one's ancestry may be traced back by following the numbers from son to father. Benjamin Crandall Pendleton whose record appears on pages 220 and 221, can first be found by looking back for his number—273—among a list of children, when it will be found to occur on page 130. Similarly, his father, Major Joseph Pendleton—number 94—first appears on page 78. Every ancestral line can in this way be run back to Major Brian Pendleton, and while the index may be of some help it will not serve alone unless these numbers are also followed.

# The Pendleton Genealogy

BRIAN PENDLETON

## I

BRIAN PENDLETON was born in England about the year 1599, for on the 2nd of July, 1669, when testifying in regard to the boundary line between Portsmouth and Hampton, N. H., he stated that his age was about seventy years.\* Nothing is known at present of the exact date and place of his birth, nor of his early history. In view, however, of his career in the colonies, where he was a man of distinction almost from the time of his arrival until his death, it is fair to assume that he came of good stock, was fairly well educated for his time, and possessed of some means when he left the old home.† Not a single item bearing upon his origin appears in any record he has left in this country, and the published records of such English Parish Registers as we have examined—some three hundred available in the libraries of Boston, Albany, and New York,—contain no reference either to his baptism or to his marriage.‡

It was thought at one time that a clue to Brian Pendleton's antecedents might be given in the deposition of one Job Tookey, and while subsequent investigation of the records of the county indicated [Huntingdonshire] bore no fruit, yet this ancient document is so ingenuous and the related testimony so quaint that both are worth giving in part as an example of the unconcealed humor to be found in the writings of that sombre time.

It appears in the records of Essex County, Mass.,§ that at a Court held the 27th of June, 1682, Dr. Richard Knott brought suit against Tookey for breach of contract. Tookey had agreed to go on a fishing voyage in the Doctor's interest in consideration of the latter assuming one of his debts, but at the last moment refused to sail. The reason for his change of heart is suggested by one Nicholas Pickett, who testified that when he and Tookey carried some ballast aboard the Doctor's ketch, the hatches being open, "Tookie ran to a hogs-head of rum that stood in ye Hold and tooke out ye bounge, took ye steme of an Indian tobaco pipe which was like a read and drank out of ye bounge of ye Hogg<sup>h</sup> soe terrible that in a short tyme he was uncapeable for to doe any business."

Tookey in his own defense deposed as follows:

"May it please the Honored Court

I beseech your Honou<sup>rs</sup> To take this sad miserable and deplorable Condition I am now in; into your honours considerations; in considering in the first place of my Education & bringing up w<sup>ch</sup> was to learning (my great grandfather was a Doctor of Divinity in London in Queen Elizabeth's Tyme & Deceased there; my Grandfather was Minister of St Ives\* (Well known by ye honored Govern<sup>r</sup> Bradstreet as his honour told me himselfe) And likewise by Major Pembleton of Winter haven now Deceased, etc., etc."

While in Tookey's estimation Brian Pendleton was so eminent a personage that merely for one's grandfather to have known him was a clear title of respectability, yet we have been unable to learn the exact date of his arrival in this country, nor do we know the ship on which he came. The earliest notice of him in the Colonies appears in the records of Watertown, Mass.,† which show that at the first meeting of the citizens there, 23 August, 1634, William Jennison, Brian "Pembleton," and John Eddie were chosen by the freemen to order the civil affairs of the town. A few days later, 3 September, 1634, the General Court made him a freeman of the Colony.‡ This establishes his connection with the Puritan church, as under the law passed in 1631 none but a member of some congregation in that faith could be admitted to full citizenship and have any voice in the government.

On the 14th of August, 1635, the people of Watertown agreed that Daniel Patrick, Brian Pendleton, and certain others "Shall devise to every man his propriety of meadow & upland that is plowable and the rest to lie common." At town meetings held 30 August, 1635, and 10 August, 1636, eleven men were chosen to conduct the civil affairs of the settlement and Pendleton was one of those elected on both occasions. The number of men thus chosen varied for several years, and in 1647 they began to be called Selectmen. We may accordingly regard Pendleton as one of the first to hold this office in Watertown.

In the present day it is not customary to elect a man to more than one position of authority at the same time, but this practise was not regarded then. While still a Selectman of Watertown, Pendleton was chosen Deputy [Representative] to the General Court on the 3rd of March, 1635/6, and re-elected as such on the 18th of April, 1637, 6th of March, 1637/8, and 2nd May, 1638.§ The Court of Assistants also appointed him a member of the Grand Jury in September, 1637. These years were marked by various procedures which entrenched the Puritan theocracy in power and at the same time dis-

played the ancient hatred of orthodoxy toward freedom of thought. An alien law was passed, Roger Williams was banished in 1635, and two years later the Rev. John Wheelwright and Ann Hutchinson, whose teachings were regarded as heretical and liable to disrupt the church, suffered the same fate. Pendleton was not a member of the Court which engaged in this religious persecution in November, 1637, and as the Deputies therein from the towns outside of Boston seem to have been selected by the ministry for the express purpose of getting rid of the dissenters, it would appear that they did not regard him as being sufficiently illiberal in his views to work their will. Indeed, we shall find that some years later, on an occasion not dissimilar, Pendleton showed himself not without mercy, and mercy has no place in the scheme of a religious despotism.

While these events were in progress the population of Watertown had increased to such an extent that it was feared the township would not be large enough to support all the inhabitants. Accordingly, in 1638, Brian Pendleton and a number of the other leading citizens there, petitioned the General Court for liberty to form a new plantation to the westward, and on the 6th of September in that year the Court passed an order granting this petition.\* The plantation was named Sudbury. Many of the petitioners settled there where they were soon joined by other immigrants who came direct from England. On the 4th of September, 1639, Brian Pendleton was commissioned by the Court one of those "To lay out lands in Sudbury to the present inhabitants according to their estates and person."† On the 13th of May, 1640, he was "desired" by the Court to drill the military company in that town,‡ a duty to which he was again appointed by the Court of Assistants, 5 September, 1643.

The "History of Sudbury" [p. 32] says that his name appears on the records as one of the foremost business men of the place, and that he was one of the early Selectmen of the town. He was also active there in forming a church and in erecting the first meeting house. Up to within a recent date the depression where his house stood was still visible near the Clay Pit bridge in the present town of Wayland.§

After spending several years in Sudbury, Pendleton returned to Watertown, where on the 30th of September, 1646, he purchased of Robert Lockwood, a few acres of remote meadow and all the land Lockwood had been granted by the town. In the same year he became a member of the military organization since styled "The Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company," but then known as the Artillery Company of Massachusetts.¶ Pendleton soon resumed his leadership in the affairs of Watertown, and was elected a Deputy to

the General Court on the 26th of May, 1647, and re-elected 10th May, 1648.\*

In the earlier of these two sittings of the Court there occurred another instance of those oppressions and persecutions, which, culminating with the hanging of Quakers in later years, form such an ugly blot on the history of the Bay Colony. We have already seen how the Puritans dealt with dissentients of their own faith, as in the cases of Williams and Wheelwright. A new danger was now at hand. Under the Massachusetts theocracy church and state were one and the franchise could be enjoyed by their church members alone. As the community prospered a general immigration set in. Before many years the Puritans found themselves outnumbered and confronted by a growing agitation for an unrestricted suffrage. Their problem now was not so much to suppress dissensions among themselves as to keep a firm grip on the reins of government, and partly from religious intolerance, but more as a matter of political self-preservation, they adopted a rigorous and iron-handed policy toward any who protested their control.

Accordingly, we find that when in 1646, one Dr. Robert Child and several of the other agitators joined in a petition to the General Court complaining of the denial of civil rights to such as were not members of the Puritan church, the Massachusetts authorities took vigorous action. Child was immediately arrested and with his fellow petitioners bound over to the sitting of the next Court. The Doctor started for England to lay the matter before Parliament, but on the evening of his departure was again arrested and committed to prison. When his case came up before the Court of 1647 he was fined £200, and his associates were also heavily penalized. Several of the members of the House of Deputies, "Differing from the sentence of the Courte desired their contradicents might stand on the records. Brian Pendleton sentenced Mr. Dand 100<sup>li</sup>, Mr. Mavericke. Mr. Smith & Mr. Burton 40<sup>li</sup> apiece. Doctor Child he could not pceed to sentence besides his imprisonment."† Only two other Deputies, Robert Payne and Edward Carleton, showed a similar spirit of mercy, as rare as it was praiseworthy in that age of intolerance and persecution.

Toward the end of this sitting of the Court,—in March, 1647/8—it was voted that "Mr. Pendleton and Willi: Parks be ioyned w<sup>th</sup> the audito<sup>r</sup> generall to take an account of the magistrates expences for dyet for this session & so ev<sup>y</sup> session two of the deputies shall be chosen for that purpose.‡ Pendleton's first military title appears at this same date when it was next voted that "Capt Ting, Mr Glover, Leift Pendleton, Willi: Parkes & Edmund Jackson are chosen a comittee, they or any of them, to view Mistick bridge."†

These two terms were the last that Brian Pendleton was to serve in the General Court as a member from Watertown. On the 26th of March, 1648/9, he sold to Robert Daniel much of his property in

that place,\* and soon afterward removed to Ipswich, where on the 9th of November, 1648, he bought of John Whittingham a 600 acre farm.† His residence here was of but short duration, and he does not seem to have concerned himself much in affairs outside of his business. As a merchant, Pendleton was engaged in many law-suits against debtors, and even during his brief stay in Ipswich he was plaintiff in several actions of that kind. He evidently believed in the sound business principle that no time should be lost in obtaining settlement, and as we shall see later, he was equally prompt in making claims upon the colony whenever he thought he had occasion.

## II

Pendleton's natural aggressiveness, combined with some knowledge of the law, and much political and military experience, made him well equipped to take a leading part in the affairs of the new country to which he now turned his eyes. North of Ipswich there was but little semblance of a centralized government. The territory now comprised in the states of Maine and New Hampshire was originally granted to several patentees, among whom John Mason and Ferdinando Gorges were the only ones to make any serious attempt at colonizing. In 1635, the tract from Salem to the Piscataqua river was given to Mason and the land beyond, as far as the Kennebec, to Gorges. Mason's grant, of course, conflicted with that made to the Bay Colony, whose northern boundary was described as a line "Three miles north of the Merrimac river."‡ When Mason died the Massachusetts authorities decided that this clause meant a line drawn east and west three miles north of the *source* of the Merrimac, and under this interpretation they had some basis to claim jurisdiction over the settlements in the Piscataqua region.

In Mason's company one of the Puritan leaders, Lord Say and Sele, had already acquired a share, and Massachusetts experienced little difficulty either with the proprietors or with the settlers in extending its power to the north. After some negotiations the Bay Colony arranged in 1641 to assume control over the New Hampshire settlements, and gave the inhabitants full rights as citizens without religious conformity. A considerable influx of Puritans followed, and there was more or less friction between them and the earlier settlers, much confusion, and little real government. For a number of years, indeed, one of the towns was without magistrates and sent no deputies to the General Court.

It may have been that Brian Pendleton realized the political opportunities he would have in a country like this, or the greater business possibilities and commercial advantages there may have induced him to leave Ipswich. At any rate he removed to Strawberry Bank

[Portsmouth] about 1651, as on the 11th of August in that year the Selectmen of the town "Granted unto Mr. Pindelton in the behalfe of mr. william Paine a parsill of land for a husse and gard." He seems to have concerned himself at once in organizing the affairs of the settlement, as soon afterward he appeared before the General Court with a petition from the inhabitants of Strawberry Bank, dated 20 October, 1651, and praying that the Massachusetts authorities would lay out the town under their jurisdiction, and further that "We may have here & at Dover two Courts every yeare with two magistrates and their assistants. whereof this Barer Mr. Bryan Pendleton to bee one of the Assistants Chosen for this place; And whereas by reason of divers shipping & others coming into this harbour, as likewise some of our owne Inhabitants, several abuses are committed & noe Magistrate neere at hand to administer justice uppon the parteyes soe offending, that before justice can be done many depart hence without punishment, & others suffer rather that seek so farre for justice, Humbly praye that Mr. Pendleton may have more than ordinary power what other assistants have for the rectifying & punishing such abuses to be Committed."\*

That Pendleton had already grasped his opportunities and was chiefly responsible for the drawing up of this petition can hardly be doubted. The Court willingly granted the request of the people of Strawberry Bank and made Pendleton an Associate Justice there for one year† re-appointing him in 1652 with Mr. Bellingham and the Judges of the Dover Court to serve until the inhabitants of Strawberry Bank should present some other person who had taken the oath of allegiance to Massachusetts.‡ In the following year the name of the town was changed from Strawberry Bank to Portsmouth upon the petition of Pendleton and several others.§

It was probably with the intention of strengthening the grip of the Bay Colony on this part of the Piscataqua region that at a meeting held at the tavern of George Walton in Portsmouth on the 13th of January, 1652 [1653, new style], the Selectmen of the town, Brian Pendleton, Renald Fernald, John Pickering, Henry Sherburne, and James Johnson, "Men of force and character, and all of them prominent in the early records."|| examined the old Town Book, crossed out what was not approved, and copied into the new book such items as met with their approbation. In the previous summer a number of the malecontents at Portsmouth had attempted to break away from the control of Massachusetts, and while the effort had resulted only in orders for their arrest, yet much dissatisfaction existed, and the voters who belonged to the Church of England steadily opposed the rule of the Puritans.

Hackett suggests in his "Portsmouth Records" that the old Town

Book of Strawberry Bank evidently contained not only land titles which might conflict with the claims of Massachusetts over this region, but also various grants of land not yet laid out, and it was no doubt desirable for the party in power to render these null and void. Some months before this—in April, 1652—the Puritan Selectmen had ordained that all grants previously made should be subject to their authority to confirm or not as they saw fit, and with the crossing out of the old records a summary and convenient way was found to get control over the whole of the outlying land, which they might then parcel out in the interest of their own party and to their personal aggrandizement.

From this time on Brian Pendleton became increasingly active in the affairs of Portsmouth and in the political moves by which Massachusetts extended its authority to the eastward. On the death of Gorges the settlers in his patent wrote his heirs repeatedly, but received no reply. In July, 1649, the inhabitants of Kittery, York, and Wells formed themselves into a body politic and chose Edward Godfrey their Governor. Events in England, however, soon put an end to this combination. With the coming of the Puritans into power there under Cromwell, the rulers of Massachusetts had nothing to fear from royal interference. The charter of the Colony, which had already proved elastic enough to cover much of New Hampshire, was now stretched to include the southern part of Maine. In May, 1652, the Massachusetts government sent out surveyors to determine the latitude of the northern boundary line at a point three miles north of the headwaters of the Merrimac,\* and on the 16th of October, 1652, the surveyors reported that this boundary was three miles north of latitude  $43^{\circ} 40' 12''$ .†

That this procedure was but an empty formality, however, is shown by the next move of the General Court. One week later, without waiting to find the eastern extremity of this boundary on the Maine coast,‡ Simon Bradstreet—afterwards Governor of Massachusetts—Samuel Symonds, Capt. Thomas Wiggin, and Mr. Brian Pendleton were appointed Commissioners to go to the province of Maine, and in the name of the Court require the inhabitants to submit to the government of the Bay Colony.§ The board accordingly assembled at the home of William Everet in Kittery on the 16th of November, 1652, and met the inhabitants of that town, who consented to acknowledge the authority of the Commissioners and the jurisdiction of the Colony they represented. The submission of York followed on the 22nd of the same month. During this expedition Pendleton was made a Justice to hold a County Court at Kittery.||

For a like purpose and to effect what had not already been accomplished, another board of commissioners, composed of Richard Beltingham, the Deputy Governor, Capt. Thomas Wiggin, Major General Daniel Dennison, Edward Rawson, the first secretary of the Massachusetts Bay Company, and "Mr. Briant Pendleton," repaired to Wells in the following year. Under date of 7 June, 1653, they had been empowered by the General Court, "To Summon the Inhabitants, declare our rights and jurisdiction to them, require their subjection, hold Court, determine all cases, Civil and Criminal, according to the Power of our County Courts, nominate and appoint Commissioners, administer Oathes to them and Invest them with such power as you judge meet, swear constables, and such other officers as you deem needful for the preservation of the peace, confirm and settle properties, grant privileges, protections, etc., etc." On July 4th and 5th, Saco and Cape Porpoise yielded allegiance to Massachusetts. As in the preceding year the terms offered the inhabitants were most favorable. No religious test was prescribed as a condition for citizenship; all grants of land were confirmed; the towns were to send representatives to the General Court, and it was especially stipulated that attendance at military training should not be required beyond the limits of the township.\* The submission of these towns seems to have been secured by persuasion and diplomacy and not by menaces backed up by armed force as assumed by some historians from the statements of the deposed Governor, Edward Godfrey.

While these events were taking place in Maine, the political machine in Portsmouth was rapidly becoming efficient. Pendleton had been made a Selectman of the town in 1652, was re-elected in the two following years, and again chosen in each year from 1657 to 1662 inclusive.† At the same time he was Town Treasurer of Portsmouth from 1654 to 1663.‡ Grand Jurymen for one year from the 4th of July, 1659,† and Deputy to the General Court of Massachusetts in 1653, '54, '58, 1660, 1661, and 1663.‡ He was also for several years a Commissioner [Magistrate] of Portsmouth,† and in 1653 a Commissioner for the Isles of Shoals to determine civil actions under £20.§ Ten years later he was made a Commissioner to enforce the English navigation laws at these islands and in the Piscataqua region.|| That Pendleton was well versed in controlling the voters is shown by some old election returns which have come down to us. At a meeting of the inhabitants of Portsmouth and Dover, held on the 12th of May, 1663, for the purpose of electing Associates, Capt. Pendleton received 44 votes, Capt. Waldron, 38; Capt. Pike, 32; Mr. Edward Hilton, 34; Mr. Richard Cutt, 23. At a similar meeting held 3 May, 1664, Pendleton received 34 votes, Waldron, 36; Pike, 33, Cutt, 24, and Hilton, 15. In the next year, however,

he fell behind, receiving but 29 votes against 36 for Waldron, 33 for Richard Cutt, and 35 for Capt. Pike. At this election, John Cutt, who appears in place of Hilton, received 18 votes.\*

During these years Pendleton was equally active in military affairs. On the 17th of May, 1652, he had been chosen commander of the "Train band" at Portsmouth, and although no commission was made out to him until twelve years later, yet as a Deputy to the General Court in 1654 he was called Capt. Pendleton, and in May, 1658, the Court ordered "That the inhabitants of Portsmouth shall attend all military service under the command of Capt. Brian Pendleton."† A regular commission was made out to him finally, as appears in the following record dated 19 October, 1664: "Capt. Brian Pendleton having been legally chosen & approved of to be Capt of the military company of Portsmouth, but not yet having any commission, it is ordered by this Court, that the secretary, immediately after the end of this session, draw up a commission & deliver it to Major General Leverett, & he to take care for the sending of it, so that the peace of the place may be preserved."‡ At this time nearly all the male settlers outside of churchmen, millers and shipwrights were obliged to attend military drill once a month, and many of the towns had block-houses or other safeguards against attack. That Portsmouth was in an unprotected condition, however, is shown in a remonstrance subscribed by Pendleton and Richard Cutt for the inhabitants of the town, complaining of the lack of fortifications there.§ This memorial was dated 3 May, 1653, and on the 2nd of June following the Court seems to have taken notice of it by ordering "That the surveyor generall shall lend two barrells of good powder to Mr. Pendleton for present, to be returned again vppon the tender of the some of thirteene pounds, nineteene shillings and tennpence."|| No further action was taken at this time in regard to setting up fortifications in the place.

### III

While Pendleton was serving as a Magistrate at Portsmouth in 1656 an incipient attack of the witchcraft delusion broke out there. This superstition firmly obsessed our forefathers. It was not an illogical belief with their credulous acceptance of a personal Devil. Granted the existence of Satan, must he not also have his worshippers? The New Englanders believed as their contemporaries elsewhere believed, that human beings could enter into compact with evil spirits, obtain power to suspend the laws of nature, and thus

injure their fellows by processes wholly at variance with those laws. It was also believed that the injury so inflicted would usually show itself in the form of possession, that is to say, by symptoms which in the present day we should recognize as insanity, hysteria or alcoholism, and that the evidence of a person showing these symptoms was to be received as that of any ordinary witness.\*

As usual in such cases, a poor old woman was the chosen victim in Portsmouth in 1656. Before a court composed of Brian Pendleton, Henry Sherburne, and Renald Fernald, the following "evidence" was given by Susannah Trimmings of Little Harbour. "Pascataquo":† "On Lord's Day 30th of March at night going home with Goodwife Barton, she seperated from her at the freshet next her house. On her return between Goodman Evens' and Robert Davis' she heard a rustling in the woods, which she at first thought was occasioned by swine, and presently after, there did appear to her a woman whom she apprehended to be old Goodwife Walford. She asked me where my consort was: I answered I had none. She said, thy consort is at home by this time. Lend me a pound of cotton. I told her I had but two pounds in the house, and I would not spare any to my mother. She said I had better have done it; that my sorrow was great already, and it should be greater—for I was going a great journey but should never come there. She then left me, and I was struck as with a clap of fire on the back, and she vanished toward the water side in my apprehension in the shape of a cat. She had on her head a white linen hood tied under her chin and her waistcoat and petticoat were red, with an old green apron and a black hat upon her head.

Oliver Trimmings, Susannah's husband, testified that on the night of this fearsome encounter, his wife came home in a "bad condition"; "her back was as a flame of fire," she was breathless and could not speak for some time when she said "Lord have mercy upon me, this wicked woman would kill me," etc., etc.

Nicholas Rowe testified that Jane Walford, shortly after she was accused, "Came to the deponent in the evening and put her hand upon his breast so that he could not speak and was in great pain until the next day. By the light of the fire in the next room it appeared to be Goody Walford but she did not speak."

More of this nonsensical rubbish, some of it utterly irrelevant, was deposed by others, and we find that at a Court of Associates held in June, 1656, "Jane Walford being brought to this court upon suspicion of being a witch is to continue bound until the next court to

be responsive." At this time the prosecution against Goody Walford appears to have been dropped. The magistrates either came to their senses or there were no fanatics like Cotton Mather there to stir up a reign of terror such as was visited upon Salem in later years. It is refreshing to note that some time afterwards Jane Walford brought suit for slander against Robert Goutch for saying she was a witch, and received a verdict in the sum of £5 and costs.

While Pendleton was actively engaged in public affairs at Portsmouth, his services were often called upon to settle boundary disputes, and it is likely that he had some knowledge of surveying. In 1653, he was on a committee to settle the bounds between Portsmouth and Dover, and in 1654 he was empowered with John Pickering to arrange the dividing line between Portsmouth and Hampton.\* On the 11th of October, 1655, he was made a commissioner to determine the line between Hampton and Salisbury,† and on the 26th of May, 1658, he was appointed by the Court a commissioner "To pitch and lay out the dividing line between York and Wells."‡ In 1664 he was appointed surveyor of highways throughout the province of Maine, with authority "To order all matters at his discretion for the purpose of making them meet for the public necessities." The marshal of the province was directed to attend him in making his surveys so that all obstructions might be removed and a passable road made for all travellers either on foot or on horseback.

At that time public officials generally received no pay for their services, although they were occasionally "gratified" by allotments of land. In 1657, Pendleton had laid out to Edward Rawson at the direction of the General Court two hundred acres near Dover, as the latter's reward for bringing Maine under the jurisdiction of Massachusetts, and in the next year Pendleton applied for a similar grant himself. Under date of 24 May, 1658, he presented the following petition to the Court:

"To the Honored General Court now  
assembled at Boston of Magistrates  
& Deputies: the Humble petition of  
Brian Pendleton  
Humbly Sheweth

That being twice employed to take in the Esterne parts at Kittery York Wells &c: with the Honored M<sup>r</sup> Bradstreet & others one time: & with the Honored Deputy Governor & others the 2<sup>d</sup> time: A Returne of their aksions was presented to the Gen<sup>l</sup> Court 1653 which the Court acksepted & was pleased to promise to Gratifie with some Land (as appeareth by the Record as they had to other Gentlemen soe Employed formerly: some of which they Gratified with five hundred Acres of Land: wheareby I am Incouraged to moue this

Honored Gen<sup>l</sup> Court to graunt me (on the consideration afores<sup>d</sup>) five hundred Acres of Land on Cocheeka River aboue Dover bounds as neere to the Land layd oute to m<sup>r</sup> Edward Rawson as may bee: to bee Layd out by m<sup>r</sup> Edward Starbocke & Peter Coffin & y<sup>r</sup> petitione<sup>r</sup> shall pray &c

Yo<sup>r</sup> Humble servant to Comand  
Brian Pendleton."\*

The Court acted favorably upon this request and granted Pendleton two hundred acres of land in the place desired.† Two days earlier he had presented them another petition which reads as follows:

"To the Honored Generall Court of Magistrates  
att Boston assembled this present mo<sup>h</sup> 1658.

The Humble Request of Brian Pendleton of Pascattaquak

Sheweth that in the Last month Aprill: it happened that two seamen beinge drawn out of our River in a Canow; the one of the s<sup>d</sup> men beinge Ded with Could or ffrost the other beinge much ffrozen came into our Hand: & beinge made acquainted with it wee tooke what course wee could ffor his good: hut seeinge his nesesity Required better meanes I hired a man & a horse & sent him to hamton wheare the Charge will be greate whether hee Live or Dy—

My Humble Request therefore to this Honored Court is that they will bee pleased to giue such order from this Court that I may haue power to Rayse the s<sup>d</sup> charge ffrom the severall townes on the River (videliset) ffrom portsmouth Douer &: [Kittery] which may be an Incouragment to y<sup>r</sup> servant ffor to put himselfe forward in time to Come in such workes of Charity & Rest at y<sup>r</sup> service at all times in what I may."‡

While the Court granted this petition at once,§ Dover and Kittery opposed having any assessment levied upon them, and the affair dragged along for several years. Pendleton did not let the matter drop, however, and on the 23rd of May, 1661, asked the Court for a decision as to whether Kittery should pay its share of the charges, notwithstanding the fact that in his petition the name of the town was blotted out. The magistrates decided that Kittery should assume one third the expense, but the deputies would not concur in this.¶ Finally on the 29th of May, 1661, they agreed:

"In Ans<sup>r</sup> to the Request of Cap<sup>t</sup> Brian Pendleton The Court Judgeth it meete to order that the seelectmen of Portsmouth & Douer Doe forthwith by an Assessment on the Inhabitan<sup>ts</sup> Collect & Gather

the some of tenn pounds eight shillings & four pence out of each Towne & Deliver the same to the said Brian Pendleton as satisfaction for so much expended on a frozen person y<sup>e</sup> some yeares past came into that River whose charity this Court Judgeth it meete to Encourage & order his Satisfaction as aboue is exprest."\*

Capt. Pendleton had prospered in material ways during these years in Portsmouth. His business as a merchant was profitable and conducted on a large scale as shown by an item in the Suffolk [Mass.] Deeds.† Under this record it appears that on the 15th of March, 1658/9, William Paine of Boston, merchant, gave to his son, John Paine, £1500 in stock "In the hands of Capt Brient Pendleton of piscataqua . . . which was in the way of a copartnership between him and the s<sup>d</sup> Brient Pendleton, and mee, the s<sup>d</sup> William Paine." It is shown in the Portsmouth records that Capt. Pendleton was the town's most liberal supporter of the Rev. Joshua Moody. Besides his business at Portsmouth he had interests in the fisheries at the Isles of Shoals and along the Maine coast. Many people were in his debt and he was frequently obliged to bring suit for what was due him.‡ In 1656-7 he was sufficiently prosperous to subscribe £5 toward building the new Town House in Boston.§ Some time later we find that he engaged in milling, as in 1661 the Selectmen of Portsmouth "Granted liberty to Captaine Pendleton to set up his windmill upon the Fort point, towards the beach [New Castle] because the mill is of such common and public use."

Capt. Pendleton acquired considerable property at Portsmouth and not a little of it was granted him by those in control of the town affairs. On one occasion, 22 January, 1660, at a distribution of lands not already granted, the records show that the Captain was apportioned 350 acres, his son, James Pendleton, 31 acres, and Caleb Pendleton, 19 acres. Richard Cutt, a fellow merchant with Pendleton, and one of those in power, was the only man to receive a larger share, his portion being 410 acres. As Pendleton was on the committee that made this distribution, it would appear that the politicians of his time had nothing to learn from those of the present.

As early as 1655, Brian Pendleton had begun to acquire property in Maine. On the 11th of December in that year he bought of Richard Ball, Long Island at Cape Porpoise and 100 acres on the mainland. On the 15th of March, 1658/9, he purchased of John West, a house and 100 acres in Saco, and on the 13th of August following he bought with Capt. Roger Spencer of Charlestown, the neck of land at the mouth of the Saco river (now called Fletcher's Neck), then known as Winter Harbor, together with Wood and Gihlon's islands. Two years later he acquired Spencer's share in this

property "With all the houses, gardens, orchards, etc. upon the Neck," and in later years added to this estate by numerous other purchases in the adjacent towns until he became the greatest landholder in the Province.\*

#### IV

Upon the restoration of the Stuarts political affairs in Maine again became unsettled. In November, 1660, all those whose territorial rights had been invaded by Massachusetts, Edward Godfrey, Ferdinando Gorges, grandson and namesake of the original patentee, Robert Mason, who had succeeded in a like manner to the proprietary claim over New Hampshire, Edward Rigby, the proprietor of Wells, and several others, lodged a petition with the King, informing him of the intrusion of Massachusetts on their territory, and of the enforcement of an oath of fidelity to that colony, and praying for an inquiry into the matter.

Their petition was referred to a committee of seven, who reported that Godfrey had been illegally dispossessed by the Massachusetts government and that Mason had also been injured in his property. Meanwhile Gorges in May, 1661, authorized four commissioners to act for him. They called together the free-holders of the colony and issued commissions to such persons as were chosen by the people for civil and military offices. A year passed before Massachusetts took steps to put down this counter-revolution. In May, 1662, Denison, Hathorne, and Richard Waldron were appointed Commissioners to restore authority. A conference was held with Gorges' Commissioners, which resulted in a compromise: two representatives of each side were to sit at York as a joint Court for civil and criminal cases.†

The English authorities were not content, however, to let the matter rest there. In 1664 a royal commission was appointed to secure the King's rights over Maine and New Hampshire and to bring the Bay Colony more under the control of the Crown. This body appeared in Boston the year following, but was able to accomplish little with the General Court, which had already developed a spirit of independence. The Commissioners then journeyed to the eastward, where their presence emboldened certain of the malcontents at Portsmouth to present them the following petition:

"July, 1665. Petition of part of the inhabitants of Portsmouth and Strawberry Bank humbly sheweth

That whereas yo<sup>r</sup> petitioners for severall years last past have bin kept under the Gov<sup>r</sup>nm<sup>t</sup> of the Massachusetts by an usurped power . . . under which power five or six of the ritchest men of this parish have ruled swaied, and ordered all offices both civill and military at their pleasures, none of y<sup>r</sup> Hono<sup>rs</sup> peticonrs though Loyall subjects, & some of them well acquainted with the Laws of Eng-

land, durst make any opposition for feare of great fines or long imprisonment and for want of estates could not peticon home to his Ma<sup>tie</sup> for relief, which the contrary party well knoweth, have kept us under hard servitude, and denyed us in our publike meeting the Common prayer Sacram<sup>ts</sup> and decent buriall of the dead contrary to the Laws of England & his Ma<sup>ties</sup> Ire sent by Simon Broadstreet & John Norton in the yeare 1662. And not only so but have also denied us the benefit of freemen, contrary to his Ma<sup>ties</sup> said letter and likewise at the election of officers the aforesaid party or the greatest part of them have always kept themselves in offices for the manageing of the gifts of land & settling them, whereby yo<sup>r</sup> peticoners are not only disabled but also discouraged for continuance in the plantation, & have engrossed the greatest part of the lands within the preeincts & limits of this plantation into theire owne hands and other honest men that have been here a considerable time have no lands at all given them, and some that have had lands given & laid out to them, the said contrary party have desowned the grants and laid it out to others. . . .

The parties we peticon against are

This petition was signed by thirty men besides one Abraham Corbet, who was supposed to have been the ring-leader in the affair. As soon as the Massachusetts authorities learned of this action they despatched commissioners to the Piscataqua towns to inquire into the matter. None dared to enter complaints, and as Corbet could not be found a warrant for him was left in the hands of the constable, directing him to appear before the General Court "As an occasioner of great disturbance, & a nourisher of much vice & wickedness by giving irregular entertejnments of loose persons in his house." When Corbet appeared before the Court, 23 May, 1666, he was fined £20, put under bond to observe the laws, and disabled from holding any offices.<sup>†</sup> As in the case of Dr. Child twenty years before, the despotic Puritan theocracy was still able to suppress any movement which threatened its supremacy.

While the royal commissioners had been able to accomplish little with the shrewdly obstinate rulers of Massachusetts, they met with better success in Maine. Here, in 1665, they set up a provincial government under eleven magistrates, and issued orders that neither the representatives of Gorges nor of Massachusetts should interfere with these officials.<sup>‡</sup> It is an example of Brian Pendleton's ability

in politics that known as he was as a staunch Puritan and an ardent supporter of the Bay Colony, he was nevertheless elected to office under this régime. In 1665 he had removed from Portsmouth and settled upon his property at Winter Harbor, perhaps to be in closer touch with his growing interests in that region. Two years later, on the 21st of March, 1666/7, the people of that town elected him a Burgess to attend the General Court of the province, and on the 12th of April following he was also chosen a justice for small causes.\* Referring to Pendleton's settlement at Winter Harbor, Williamson says in his "History of Maine": "His political and military knowledge, with good natural abilities immediately gave him great weight of character among his new acquaintances," and that they accordingly elected him a Burgess as just noted. In securing this election Capt. Pendleton may have foreseen an opportunity to promote the interests of the Bay Colony which he had served faithfully so many years.

## V

The government in Maine instituted by the Royal Commissioners soon came to an end. Not long after their withdrawal from the province, England became so involved in wars with France and Holland that she could pay no heed to events in the colonies. Early in 1668 the supporters of Massachusetts in Maine seized their opportunity to petition that government to resume its authority over them once more. While this petition does not seem to be in existence, there can be no doubt but that Capt. Pendleton was one of the first signers, if not its instigator. The Massachusetts Court lost no time in appointing commissioners to administer the affairs of Maine. Notice was sent to the inhabitants requiring them to submit to the laws of Massachusetts, and a day fixed for a Court at York at which all necessary officers were to be chosen.† Nicolls, the only one of the Royal Commissioners still in America, met this with a warning that such procedures would be offensive to the King. Paying him no heed, the four representatives of Massachusetts with a guard of twelve horsemen appeared at York in July, 1668, and as before formally constituted Maine as a county of Massachusetts.

Much tumult ensued. The supporters of the royal government also held court at York on the same day, but offered no serious resistance. Under the new government established by the commissioners of Massachusetts, Brian Pendleton was chosen one of the Associates of the county, and was appointed Major of the York regiment with directions to "settle" Black Point, that is, to receive the submission of the inhabitants there.‡ In the following month while acting as an Associate he came into conflict with Major William Phillips, a wealthy resident of Saco, who had been one of the magis-

trates appointed by the King's commissioners and was loath to give up his authority. Pendleton thereupon began taking evidence against him. One witness, Robert Booth, deposed on the 13th of August, 1668:

"This Deponent saith y<sup>t</sup> when major bryan Pendlton gaue order to John Davis to call a meeting for y<sup>e</sup> souldiers to apeare befor major Pendleton y<sup>e</sup> next morning major William Phillips stood vp & demanded by what authorytie John Davis did call y<sup>t</sup> meeting: then major Pendlton answered I gave him Authorytie according to my Commission & y<sup>t</sup> I shall shew when they meete me & further saith not concerning Allso on y<sup>e</sup> first day of august last major Bryon Pendlton writ a note to Publish a towne meeting y<sup>e</sup> next day being sabbath an order was put vp by y<sup>e</sup> meeting house dore by major Pendlton's order requiering y<sup>e</sup> in habitants y<sup>e</sup> second day in y<sup>e</sup> morning to make coyse of a Counstable & other officers Which order being redd by major William Phillips y<sup>t</sup> sabbath day morning; major Pendlton said here is one word wanting that is y<sup>e</sup> place where to meet:

major Phillips aforesaid; answered ther is cuery word too much allre<sup>d</sup> for y<sup>t</sup> is no legall warning: y<sup>t</sup> is none of your office Capt Pendlton you are no legal asosiate: & y<sup>e</sup> said maj pillips tooke away y<sup>t</sup> writing saying he would keep it: this deponent suposed it belonged to him to keep & major Phillips replied it is lyke you may have a copy of it."\*

A number of similar depositions were made by others, one given by a Roger Hill being of most interest. Hill states that on Monday, the 3rd of August, there was contention about the pulling down of the warrant which Pendleton put up to call a town meeting:

"Major Phillips sd before him & severall persons, that he did pull it downe & would keepe it. Maj<sup>r</sup> Pendleton asked him if he would not let him have it. He answered he would not. The other replyd that it would do him no good. His reply was, that he could not tell whether it would or not. Robert Booth Sen: made answer that it did belong unto him, that he might sett it downe in the Towne booke, maj<sup>r</sup> Phillips answered that it may be might let him have a coppie of it. Farther, maj<sup>r</sup> Phillips sd that if there were an hundred warrents, he would pull them all downe if he were not hindered. Maj<sup>r</sup> Pendleton told him that it would be wisdome to sett still as M<sup>r</sup> Hooke† did. To whom he replyed, that it was noething to him what m<sup>r</sup> Hooke did. Some persons haveing formerly given out words, that those who were for the Bay government their necks might stretch for it: This Deponent, having heard of it, he spake of it at this meeting above expressed, in the presence of Maj<sup>r</sup> Phillips, who immediately returned this answer, that it might be so for any thing that he knew. Farther this Deponent saith not. Onely that he heard Maj<sup>r</sup> Phillips

say, That he could Prove that Maj<sup>r</sup> Pendleton was not legally chosen an Associate, for the major part of the Province did not make choice of him.”\*

The other side of the case is presented in a statement of Nathaniel Phillips—Major Phillips’ son—who wrote that when the Massachusetts Commissioners appeared at York on the second Tuesday of July, 1668, with twelve armed men and a retinue of as many more of their friends “With swords most being Captains and men of worth . . . the town of Saco where Major Phillips lived stood unanimously against them onely their new made Major Pembleton who hath beene one of the greatest Instruments in this obstruction of government, being so proud of his office began to ride full speed before he mounted in the saddle, that is to say before he had taken his oath, was very busy in his Actions, but he mett with opposition with Major Phillips . . . upon which the said Pembleton sent to Boston to the Major Generall a great Complaint against Major Phillips that nothing would be done without he was sent far away, the heart of the people was soe led by him.”†

This “Great Complaint” may have referred to the following letter which Pendleton wrote Major General Leverett under date of August 21-25, 1668:—

“Kind Sir

Whereas Maj<sup>r</sup> Phillips wilbe ready (I question not) to excuse himselfe in all that opposition of his, in words or actions as being noe lett to the peoples meeting to chuse officers, the which I leave to yo<sup>r</sup> owne judgement and consideration, of those evidences that already have been sent downe by the Marshall Gen<sup>l</sup> all being said & done in publike. And now since I heare he hath peured some hands, to signifie that the people s<sup>d</sup> they would not act in the Government untill the difference should be reconciled. The w<sup>th</sup> that you may the better understand, please to take notice: That some small tyme, before your Court held in July last at Yorke a warrant was Issued out under the hands of m<sup>r</sup> Joslyn Maj<sup>r</sup> Phillips & m<sup>r</sup> Hooke to require the Towne treat w<sup>th</sup> you at y<sup>t</sup> time: Our people accordingly mett, but I suppose not one halfe of the housholders, at w<sup>th</sup> time some made answer y<sup>t</sup> they would not act as is s<sup>d</sup> above: but those that did speake spake onely for themselves, & not for the Town, neither was it any Towne act, w<sup>th</sup> I affirm as a witness, being there present, & another Testimony, you have here inclosed.

Since my last to you, & that the Marshall Gen: was here I sett up other papers at the meeting house, the Coppies whereof you have inclosed here, endeavoring If I may in a loving & peaceable way obtaine subjection to the Massachusetts Government. What the Issue of it wilbe on Munday next I shall better know. Had the boat stayed till Munday night you should have been acquainted w<sup>th</sup> the successe, however, by the first you may expect to be informed.

On the last Lord's day Maj<sup>r</sup> Phillips being present he made a very large speech after the Evening Sermon of all the occurrences, betweene the Marsh. Gen. & himselfe, as he did affirme. The matter were to tedious to write at large, but the scope I gather up into these 2 heads. (1.) That wheras he has opposed the Massachusetts from y<sup>e</sup> Marshall because he did desert the cause, but would go down to Boston aboute it. (2.) To render mee as odious to the people as he could, & as his great Enemy, in this great trouble of his, more perticularly in sending up a beast at the Marshalls request for the carrying of him along with him to Cap<sup>t</sup> Waldrons w<sup>th</sup> I did not w<sup>th</sup> any disrespect at all to Maj<sup>r</sup> Phillips but w<sup>th</sup> respect unto those whose principle Officer the Marshall is, w<sup>th</sup> I shall alwayes be ready to doe as the Massachusetts shall have occasion to make use of mee. Here is inclosed the deposition of one, that saw Maj<sup>r</sup> Phillips pull down the warrant. If need be you may (as I am informed) have another testimony viz Indigo Potter of Charlestowne who is now in Goodman Cumbeys employ. - - -

This that you have above expressed was intended to have beene sent by Cumbey it being written that very night he went away but I was prevented.

Yesterday being the 21 of this instant (the day appointed for to choose of[ficers] in Scarborough a considerable number of persons were present, viz above 20. [As I] feared so it proved that Maj<sup>r</sup> Phillips ample speech to the people the [day] before his departure, did more harme as in compliance of their spirits to the [Massach]-usetts than any thing he did before to hinder yo<sup>r</sup> proceedings. [There we]re but 7 persons that did adhere unto mee. The rest (viz many of them) [saide] that they would not act, except wee could shew something from his [hand] and them thereunto. Others departed silently away. I doubt that this [will e]ffect others in the severall towns, & provoake them to make some [complaint] in reference to the Court in Sept. next, but I leave it to yo<sup>r</sup> [honors] considerations as not knowing what to advise. As the case stands [nothing is] done among the people. Wee are altogether without any Governm<sup>t</sup> [but what] persons as cannot Govern themselves, will make of it (& doe) you [can judge.] Thus leaving the businesse & your selves, unto the wise, and [powerful h]and of the King of Kings, & Lord of Lords, ever begging that the [bless]ings of the earth, that Prince of perfect peace, would graunt [us that] wee may whilst wee are on earth lead a peaceable & quiet life

When the various depositions taken by Pendleton in regard to

Major Phillips's contumacy were brought to the attention of the County Court held in Boston, 26 August, 1668, Phillips was sentenced to give bond in the sum of £500 "That he would peaceably demean himself toward this government" or else give bond in a like amount that he would appear before the next session of the General Court to answer the charges against him.\* To this sentence the doughty Major paid no heed, although he might have known the fate that awaited those who opposed the encroachments of Massachusetts. "In the Interim," says his son in the account from which we have already quoted, "Major Phillips coming to Boston about his business, not being afraid of his Adversaries, the Governor & Major General appointed him a meeting." No conclusion could be reached, however, and Phillips was accordingly committed to prison. A brief confinement brought him to a less recalcitrant frame of mind and early in September he was released upon giving bond for his future good behavior.\*

It was probably to strengthen Pendleton's hand in dealing with such obstructionists as Phillips, that in October, 1668, the Massachusetts Commissioners appointed him a special magistrate for the County "With magistrattical power out of Court times, to act as any magistrate may doe & keep Courts there with the associates."† On the 23rd of October the General Court confirmed his appointment as Major of the York County regiment, and also made him a Magistrate to keep the County Court.‡

## VI

During the next few years Major Pendleton lived in quiet at Winter Harbor. On the 23rd of October, 1672, he was relieved of military command at his own request and his regiment became the care of Major General Leverett.§ In this year he served as an Associate at Saco, and the General Court of Massachusetts voted that he be paid for capturing and sending down one Capt. Bonython.|| Bonython had been declared an outlaw by the Massachusetts authorities, and had threatened to kill anyone sent to apprehend him.\*\* At a town meeting held in Saco, 10 November, 1672, it was the request of the whole town that "Brian Pendleton take care of the towne Book and supplie in roome of a towne clerck for one hole year following this time except as hindered by the providence of God."†† In 1675 and 1676, he was again an Associate for York County.‡‡

On the 12th of May, 1675, Major Pendleton and several others were granted a tract six miles square for a new plantation above Saco.\* The Indian troubles which had already involved the southern colonies of New England in King Philip's War were now about to break out in Maine, and it does not seem that any start was made to form this new settlement. Late in 1675 hostilities began in the province. In September the savages killed several people in Scarborough and then advanced upon Saco. A friendly Indian gave warning; most of the inhabitants took refuge with Major Pendleton, the others, some fifty in all, with Major Phillips. Shortly afterwards the enemy was seen crossing the river in canoes. Phillips's mills and outbuildings were soon in flames and a heavy musketry fire was opened upon the garrison, during which the Major was slightly wounded in the shoulder. As the English could not be drawn out of doors, the Indians next tried to burn the house. On a pair of old truck wheels they mounted a barricade of slabs and boards, covered this with birch rinds, pitchwood, and other combustible matter, and then pushed this fire-wagon toward the building. The attempt might have been successful had not one of the wheels sunk in some wet ground. In trying to get it out the savages exposed themselves so that a number were shot and the rest put to flight. No other assault was made upon the house, but the Indians continued firing upon it all that night and up to nine o'clock the next morning, when they made off. Major Phillips then retreated to Winter Harbor and took shelter with Major Pendleton, laying aside old differences in the common danger.†

In spite of these outrages it would seem that some of the traders in the province still persisted in supplying the savages with arms, as on the 16th of October, 1675, the General Court empowered Major Pendleton and others to inquire into the complaint against Lieut. Thomas Gardner for still trading with the French and Indians, and directed if he were found guilty "To bring him down to Boston before the Governor and Council."‡ By Christmas the Indians were compelled more by famine than by defeats to propose terms of peace.§ and the settlers enjoyed a respite until the next summer.

During this cessation of hostilities another enemy appeared. In the Spring of 1676 the Lords of Trade and Plantations sent Edward Randolph as an agent to New England to examine and report upon the condition of the colonies, their population, industries, and resources, and the temper and character of their leading men. He was, in short, to collect all the information which the authorities in England needed before they could begin the task of bringing New England under the direct control of the Crown. Narrow minded

and intensely partisan, his dislike of those who thwarted his schemes ripened into personal hatred. His writings do not show any real judgment of the men with whom he dealt. His only test of their merits and powers was their fitness as tools for the work he wished to get from them.\* The general character of his estimates is shown in a report he sent in two months later, in which, listing those "Men that are Enimies to m<sup>r</sup> Gorges intrest, living in the Prouince of Mayne," he first names Major Brian Pendleton and refers to him as "A man of Saco Riuer of Great Estate, & very precise independant [Puritan] beloved only of those of his fraternity, being both an Enemy to the Kings interest & m<sup>r</sup> Gorges Interest, allso a great Ringleader to others to the utmost of his Power."†

Describing other "Enimies to m<sup>r</sup> Gorges" Randolph says, "Capt. Raines of Yorke, m<sup>r</sup> Neale of Casco bay, Arthur Auger of Black Poynt Andrew Browne of Black Poynt ffrancis Littlefield of Wells Henry Sawyer of Yorke Peter Wyar of Yorke—these are men of indifferent Estates & are led by maj<sup>r</sup> Pembleton & of the same independent way understanding little but what he tells them is law or gospel."‡

For Major William Phillips, Randolph naturally has a good word, calling him "A man of good Estate & Conuersation: beloved of all sorts, & one that Suffered imprisonment for standing up for the Kings gouernment untill forced by Bond not to act according to his Commission."‡

In the summer of this year the Indians began a more serious and determined attack upon the settlers. Writing from "Winter Harbor at night, the 13 of August, 1676," Major Pendleton sent the following letter to the "Honored Governor and Counsell for the Matacusets at Boston":

"Honored Governor  
together with the Counsell,

I am sorry my pen must be the messenger of soe greate a Tragedye. On the 11th of this instant wee heard of many killed of our naybors in falmouth or Casco-Bay: and on the 12th instant Mr Joslin sent me a briefe letter written from under the hands of Mr. Burras† the minister. Hee gives an acct of 32 killed and carried away by the Indians: himselfe escaped to an Island, but I hope Black poynt men have fetcht him of by this time. 10 men 6 women and 16 children. Anthony a[n]d Thomas B[r]a[c]ket and Mr Munjoy his sonne onely are named. I had not time to coppye the letter, persons beinge to goe post to Major Walden; but I hope he hath before this sent the originall to you. How soon it will be our portion wee know not. The Lord in mercy fit us for death and direct

the harts and hands to aekt and doe wt. is needful in such a time of distress as this. Thus in haste I commit you to Pvdounce of our Lord God and desire Your prayers also for us. Yours in all humility to sarve in

the Lord,  
Brian Pendleton."\*

The general apprehension of the people of Saco is reflected by an entry made in the Town Book the following day, when at a meeting held "To choose a commissioner to carry a list of the estate of the town in reference to a rate ninefold. B. Pendleton is chosen Commissioner *if trouble do not prevent.*"†

Whether or not Pendleton had any soldiers quartered at his house at this time is a matter of doubt. As early as 1 January 1675-6, Capt. Joshua Scottow, commander of the garrison at Black Point, noted in his journal "There was an order from the honored Gov<sup>r</sup> that ten . . . soldiers should be sent to Major Pendleton but he would not accept of them."‡ Again on the 2nd of October, 1676, Capt. Hathorne reported from Wells that he would have left some men with Major Pendleton at Winter Harbor and also with Mr. Warren but they made objection. The Major contended that he could not subsist long and might as well leave while something was left as to stay until all was spent, and that unless the Colony sent him supplies for a garrison there, he could not hold out.§ Nevertheless, when Pendleton wrote the Governor and Council from Portsmouth in the following month regarding the causes that forced his departure from Winter Harbor, it appears that he did have some soldiers there, although they were a cowardly lot. His letter runs as follows:

"Honored Govenor & Counsell  
Much Honored Gentellmen.

I am willing to gine youre worships a brief naration of matters concerninge my selfe & the state of Winter Harbor==// aboute the 14 of October. 76. in the day time wee heard much shooting at black poynt but could not understand the ocaasion of it but did suppose it had beene onely the people that weare goinge away did it to take theare leave of those that stayd behind: in the afternoone wee saw boates under sayle cominge away thence & w<sup>n</sup> thay came against our poynt of Land thay fired many guns which wee took to bee in farewell to us. at last the hindmost boat Cominge up 3 of Oure yong men took a canoo & went oute to sea to meete that boate & w<sup>n</sup> thay came to them thay told them that black poynt Garison was taken and all the people gon except M<sup>r</sup> Josselen & 2 or 3 old folks hoe would not goe away but stay theare: & theare weare 500: of Indians & 300

of french & 100 Indians at m<sup>r</sup> foxwells house and that if you loue y<sup>r</sup> lives bee gon as soone as you can for thay say thay will be with you to morrow morninge or at night at farthest: wn oure soldiers heard this newes thay weare as mad to make away as euer I saw any men & fell to tomblinge up oure goods to get it aboard & with all plundred vs of many things w<sup>t</sup> thay Could if my bak was turned: oure fishermen alsoe hasted to get away supposinge it noe boote to stay heare against such a multitude of enemyes: w<sup>n</sup> I had got such goods I could a board & my family of women sexs I told oure soldiers if thay would goe & keepe the Garison I would never leave them soe long as I could live: but thay would not heare of it: soe that if I would have stayed alone I mite I should have noe Company: the fishermen had but 14 men & boyes & but 8 seruisable guns.

After wee came to puscutta [Portsmouth] theare came in 2 caches with soldiers vidz Thomas Moore & Siluanos Davis: the Maj<sup>r</sup> Generall sent away Sargent Tippin with soldiers to blak poynt & promised mee if oure men which went by y<sup>m</sup> in a boate of oure owne of Winter Habor with 8 men in it) that if oure men would assist theare company into blak poynt Garison then thay should come back to Winter Harbor & asist oure men: oure men did asist them in & instead of asistinge oure men Tippin did press oure compnie & force them to stay by

Indians hoe I never dealt with onese in all my life nor never wronged in anythings but did hope Squando would become a Christian & did what I could to further it: yet they fired all my houses for dwellinge Corne & Cattle neere 100 bushells Indyan Corne neere 40 bushels of pease more or les besides old Corne Rie & Indian they killed some sheepe some hogges & one Cow

him, soe that our desire in savinge oure goods & for which thay went. was frustrate: & while thay weare stayed theare against theare wills: came the 2 Caches from puscateag with Thomas Moore my old acquaintance hoe promised mee to doe mee all the good lee could & w<sup>n</sup> hee came to Winter Harbor with the Rest went ashore to oure house & killed my team of 4 oxen & Plundered much of my goods which for want of Roome in the vessell I could not cary away: of which goods I cannot giue account at present but shall giue it in vpon oath afterward as now for the oxen, which is heareinclosed: much honored I may say with good Jeremy pittie me pittie me oh my frend for the hand of the Lord hath tuched mee. God hath emptyed me from vessell to vessell the Lord my God bringe mee fourth to leave nothinge behind but dreggs of Corruption that I may yet prays him in the Land of the liueinge hoe is the health of my Countenance & my God: Thus desiringe the Lord to guide you all youre waytie ocations & cravage pardon for my boldness in trobling youre worships Take leave & Rest yours to sarve as in duty am bound

Brian Pendleton.

The deposition to which Pendleton refers was made by John Layton and Robert Booth of Winter Harbor on the 14th of November, 1676, and reads as follows:

"These deponents say y<sup>t</sup> they all of them heard Capt. Tho<sup>s</sup> Moore of Boston (Com<sup>r</sup> of y<sup>e</sup> Rose Ketch y<sup>t</sup> went to y<sup>e</sup> reliefe of y<sup>e</sup> Eastward) say y<sup>t</sup> we had Major Bryan Pendletons foure Oxen about y<sup>e</sup> beginning of this instant mounth of Nouember, & further Jn<sup>o</sup> Layton & Robert Booth say y<sup>t</sup> y<sup>e</sup> said Cap<sup>t</sup> Tho<sup>s</sup>: Moore said y<sup>t</sup> it was free plunder, & further saith not."<sup>\*</sup>

Some time later Major Pendleton evidently petitioned the General Court that he be reimbursed for his losses suffered through Moore's plundering expedition, as on the 1st of June 1677, the Court voted that he be paid £20 for his four oxen, " & for other things mentioned in his petition, that he have liberty to take it where he can finde it."<sup>†</sup>

Pendleton lived at Portsmouth for about a year and a half during which time nearly every settlement in York County was laid in ashes and upward of three hundred Englishmen killed or carried away captives. The Indians, however, were growing tired of the war. On the 9th of March 1677-8, the Governor and Council of Massachusetts wrote Major "Walden" and Major Pendleton:—

"From your selves by several Letters we have received Information of Squando & the other Indians last their Desire further to treat the English of ysse parts for a more firm peace & that Major Shapleigh & C. Champernoon are Desired to advance in that matter as most acceptable to the Indians if themselves or any other persons Judged Sutable by your selves for such an occasion be obtayned to treat them they may: In the name of the Governor & Conneill promise them a Safe Conduct coming & returning hither in way of treaty whether any thing Concluded or no as Mog formerly Had if otherwise they may take the Indians Demands, of which ourselves here may Consider & give Answer. In the Meantime advising as the Spring Cometh on to be upon your watch & guard for your own security—not els but Remaine Srs

your friend & servant

Edw<sup>d</sup> Rawson Secre<sup>t</sup>."<sup>‡</sup>

Referring to this matter Belknap says in his "History of New Hampshire:"§ "In the Spring [1678] Major Shapleigh, Captain Champernoon, and Mr. Fryer of Portsmouth were appointed commissioners to settle a formal treaty of peace with Squando and the other chiefs, which was done at Casco whither they brought the remainder of the captives. It was stipulated in the treaty that the in-

habitants should return to their deserted settlements on condition of paying one peck of corn annually for each family, by way of acknowledgment to the Indians for possession of their lands, and one bushel for Major Pendleton who was a great proprietor. Thus an end was put to a tedious and distressing war which had subsisted three years. The terms of peace were disgraceful but not unjust, considering the former irregular conduct of many of the eastern settlers and the native propriety of the Indians in the soil."

While it has been pointed out since,\* that the authority Belknap cites for these statements cannot be found, and that no writer of the time mentions this treaty—which also fails of note in the Massachusetts archives—yet some peace was evidently concluded with the savages as the settlers returned to their former homes and were not again molested for several years.

## VII

About this time the government of Maine once more came under a new arrangement. In 1677, a committee of the English Privy Council examined all the charters of the New England colonies and denied to Massachusetts the right of jurisdiction over New Hampshire and Maine.† On the 22nd of August in this year, while living in Portsmouth, Brian Pendleton was a petitioner to the King that the government of New Hampshire might remain with Massachusetts.‡ This petition was disregarded, however, and shortly afterward New Hampshire was made a royal province. To forestall any further overturn of its authority the Bay Colony, acting through a Boston merchant, purchased of Gorges's grandson on the 13th of March, 1677/8, all his rights, title, and interest in Maine, and thus became the Lord Proprietor of the Province.§ While this action was a tacit admission on the part of Massachusetts that its earlier claims to this region had no solid basis, yet the stroke was most politic as henceforth the position of the Bay Colony was unassailable as far as Maine was concerned.

On the 4th of February, 1679/80, the General Court empowered the Council to appoint the various officers required by the Gorges patent. Under this arrangement the government of Maine was vested in a President and eight Justices, or Councillors, with Deputies to a provincial assembly. Thomas Danforth was made President and the eight resident justices were Brian Pendleton, Charles Frost, Francis Hooke, John Davis, Joshua Scottow, Samuel Wheelwright, John Wincoll, and Edward Rishworth. The new government was inaugurated at York, 17 March, 1680, at which time Pendleton was made Deputy President, Hooke, treasurer, and Rishworth, secretary

and recorder.\* As Danforth remained at his home in Cambridge Pendleton became the real executive, and also the presiding officer when the Councillors held sessions as Justices of the Supreme Court of Maine.†

On the 30th of June, 1680, Brian Pendleton, acting as Deputy President, held a Court of Pleas at York‡ and shortly afterward headed a memorial to the King from the General Court of the province in which were recited the difficulties of government and the benefits derived under the proprietorship of Massachusetts.§ This memorial was intended as an offset to a petition drawn up by a large number of the inhabitants who were dissatisfied with the subordinate condition of Maine as a province.||

Pendleton's long and active life was now drawing to a close. For nearly fifty years he had engaged in public affairs. He was one of the leaders of the Puritan party in New Hampshire and the chief leader in Maine where from first to last the cause of Massachusetts had no advocate more zealous, no supporter more efficient than he. Largely through his instrumentality the Bay Colony first extended its authority over the eastern settlements and in after years he became to all intents and purposes the Governor of the province there constituted. Few of the early Puritans had a longer public career and none of equal or greater prominence can present a cleaner record.

In the more evil persecutions and questionable transactions of his time Pendleton had no share. He was almost alone in showing mercy to Doctor Child, he ordered no Quakers whipped, no witches were hanged by him, he betrayed no Indians into captivity. The strength of the old Puritans was his—the courageous heart, the unyielding spirit, the religious fervor which did not degenerate into blind fanaticism, the unswerving loyalty to Massachusetts, an allegiance which even made him, in the words of Randolph, "An enemy to the King's interest."

Like all the leading men of his time, this faithful servant of Massachusetts remained in harness until the last. On the 19th of October, 1680, Danforth wrote him at York directing him or Justice John Davis to summon a court to hear a complaint brought by the ubiquitous Edward Randolph against one Nicolls, master of a ketch which had been seized in Maine for violating the acts of trade.\*\* Not long afterward Pendleton died. The exact date of his death has not been found but it can be rather closely approximated as his will—which he made while in Portsmouth in 1677—was offered for probate in the York County court, 23 April 1681.††

Among the founders of Massachusetts, Brian Pendleton must be given no inconsiderable rank. The men with whom he was associated

from time to time, Bradstreet, Bellingham, Dennison, Symonds, Rawson, and Danforth, were the first men of the colony after the day of Winthrop and Endicott, and the guiding spirits of its political destiny. While Pendleton never came into the same prominence as did these better known leaders through their closer connection with the inner circles of the Boston oligarchy, his abilities were scarcely less, and in the Piscataqua region and the district to the eastward, his was the dominating figure. The forefathers of Massachusetts had but a limited field of action, their lives were narrow at best, their political combinations, in which Pendleton shared, may seem of but little consequence to us to-day. Yet in their first reaching out for power, in their struggle against royal interference, there was planted the seed of liberty which generations hence was to develop into a nation's birth.

Brian Pendleton was married when he came to this country but we have not found his wife's family name. Her Christian name was Eleanor, as appears in every deed she signed with her husband from 1648 to 1680. She survived the Major for about eight years as on the 28th of July, 1688, Pendleton Fletcher of Saco petitioned Governor Andros for a confirmation of his (Fletcher's) title to lands received from Brian Pendleton, his grandfather, "Also 100 acres given y<sup>r</sup> petition<sup>r</sup> by his Grandmother, lately deceased and purchased by her husband of one Jn<sup>o</sup> West, lying upon Saco River, on y<sup>e</sup> Southward side."\* This was the land which Brian Pendleton bought of West 15 March 1658 9.†

As far as we have been able to determine, Brian and Eleanor Pendleton were parents of but three children, viz.:—

2. MARY<sup>2</sup> PENDLETON, only known daughter of Major Brian Pendleton, married Rev. Seth Fletcher, probably before 1655. He may have been son of Robert Fletcher of Concord, Mass., who died 3 April, 1677, aged 85 years. As early as 1655 Mr. Fletcher became the minister at Wells, Me., but owing to certain unorthodox views of his, was dismissed in October, 1660. From this time until the outbreak of the Indian war in 1675 he resided in Saco supplying the pulpit except for short intervals from year to year. During the Indian war in Maine he lived for a short time in Salem, Mass., and then went to Southampton, Long Island, where in July, 1676, he succeeded John Harriman as minister. In 1680 Rev. Seth Fletcher removed to Elizabethtown, N. J. Here on the 30th of May, 1680, a contract of marriage was drawn up between him and the widow Mary Pearson (or Pierson). His death occurred in August of the following year, and on the 18th of September (1682), his widow took letters of administration upon his estate (East Jersey Patents, IV, folio 20, 21). His property was appraised at £559, 5s, 8d, and included books to the value of £175. On the 21st of March 1682/3 "Pembleton Fletcher of Wells, Mayne" released to Mary widow of Seth Fletcher, all claims in the estate of his deceased father.

As far as we have ever been able to learn, Seth and Mary (Pendleton) Fletcher were the parents of only one child, a son, Pendleton<sup>3</sup> Fletcher. He was old enough to witness a deed made by his uncle James Pendleton on the 13th of June 1681 (York Deeds, III, folio 93). On the 25th of May, 1671, Brian Pendleton executed a trust deed to Joshua Moody and Richard Martin "For the Intyre affection that I beare my Grandson (now my adopted Sun) Pendleton fletcher [I] have granted unto him all my necke of Land on which I now live, as far as the Mill, together with two islands, etc." (York Deeds, II, folio 97.)

Pendleton Fletcher was constable of Saco in 1681, and selectman in 1685. In 1693 he was Lieutenant of a company of soldiers stationed at a strong stone fort built on the river bank at Saco Falls. The Journal of John Pike notes that on the 7th of August, 1697, "Pembleton" Fletcher with his two sons were taken by the Indians, and three soldiers of Saco fort were slain as they were leaving Cow Island. One of the sons was recaptured with the slaughter of three or four of the savages (N. H. Hist. Soc. Col. Vol. III, p 49). Pendleton Fletcher died in captivity, probably at Quebec, about 1698, and his widow administered his estate in 1700.

He married Sarah Hill, daughter of Roger and Sarah (Cross)

Hill and had seven children born before 1690 (Savage). One of his sons, Pendleton,<sup>4</sup> Jr., was captured four times by the Indians. He was a prominent citizen of Biddeford, Me., where he was a Selectman and Deputy to the General Court. He removed later to Arundel, Me., where he died in 1747. He left six sons, John<sup>5</sup>, Joseph, Seth, Brian, Samuel, and Pendleton (3rd). The latter lived on the old homestead at Winter Harbor where he died 17 April, 1807, aged 99 years, 6 months, 8 days.

3. CAPT. JAMES<sup>2</sup> PENDLETON, oldest son of Major Brian<sup>1</sup> Pendleton, was born in England about 1627, or 1628, as indicated by the facts that he was admitted freeman at Watertown, Mass., 10 May, 1648, and that on the 26th of July, 1672, he testified at Portsmouth, N. H., he was forty-four years of age.

On the 21st of Oct. 1650, James Pendleton and Mary, his wife, of Watertown, Mass., sold to George Parkhurst, "Same towne" five or six acres known as "crooked meadow" (Middlesex Co., Mass., Deeds, i, 17). Shortly afterwards he removed to Sudbury, Mass., where he served on a coroner's jury in May, 1654.

On the 22nd of March 1656, he received from his father, Brian Pendleton, a deed of gift to Brian's homestead, and other property, in Sudbury. In this deed Brian refers to James as his "eldest sonne" (Ibid., ii, 30). James retained ownership of this property for thirty-five years, though he did not live in Sudbury more than one or two years after receiving this deed. It is likely, however, that his family made Sudbury their home for some time longer, for although the Portsmouth, N. H., records show that among the landholders there, "Free comers unto [Portsmouth] to the year 1657," James Pendleton was the proprietor of 31 acres of land, that he was chosen a grandjurymen at Portsmouth for the year ensuing the 4th of July, 1659, and was also granted one acre of swamp land there on the Great Island on the 13th of Jany., 1660, yet the births of his first two sons by his second wife are recorded upon the Sudbury records in 1659 and 1661.

On the 10th of June 1661, James Pendleton was chosen constable at Portsmouth (T. R.) and shortly afterwards the grant of swamp land previously made him was located as joining "His own land upon the norwest and to the southwest of Mr. John Cutts and *Caleb Pendleton* butting upon the common on the south, compassing the swamp round and is about two pole upon the common to make up his acre." Another small tract was given him when on the "26 Feby, 1661, Goodman Mussell refusing to let the towne have there owne land he hath fenced near Mr. James Pendleton's house without the trial of a

suite in law although he had formerly agreed thereunto and had an acre of land given him upon the poynt next the Little Harbor which he hath rendered unto the town again, which acre of land is given by the selectmen unto Capt. Pendleton and James Pendleton to make them satisfaction for that they were to have of that which the said Mussell had fenced in against Mr. James Pendleton's House."

At a general town meeting held at Portsmouth the 2nd of March 1662/3, James Pendleton was chosen one of the selectmen and was also elected "to keep the towne Booke." At the same meeting his father had been chosen town treasurer and deputy to the General Assembly, so the Pendletons were well represented in the affairs of Portsmouth at that time. James Pendleton held the office of town clerk until the 6th of March 1664/5, and was re-elected selectman the 1st of March 1663/4, the 8th of March 1666/7, and the 9th of March 1667/8. On the 8th of March 1666/7, he was also elected one of the commissioners to end small causes, and was re-elected to this office the three following years (P. T. R.).

On the 23rd of May, 1660, he was on a committee appointed to select "The Convenientest place for erecting necessary fortification for the welfare and safety of the place" (Mass. Records, Vol. IV, part 2). On the 11th of Sept. 1666, he was "admitted to the freedom of this Commonwealth," and on the 2nd of the next month, he was chosen Captain of the Portsmouth Military Co. 10 Oct. 1666, the Court "allowes and approves of James Pendleton for captaine" (Ibid.).

In Jan'y, 1667, there was "Layd out to Capt. James Pendleton sixtie nine acres of land viz thirtie acres due to Capt. Brian Pendleton, ten acres due to Joseph Pendleton in 32 and 29 acres dividant land, due to said James Pendleton" (P. T. R.). On the 11th of July 1668, James Pendleton "of Portsmouth" sold to John Winsland and Edward Bennett for £50, fifty acres of land in Spruce Creek, in the Township of Kittery, Me. This land had been bought by Brian Pendleton for £30, 14 Sept., 1660 (York Deeds).

The early beginning of the public school system in New Hampshire is shown by the following item from the Portsmouth records: "31 March 1670, the selectmen together with Capt. Pendleton and Mr. Deering have agreed that there shall be a schoole house sett up upon the land above mencioned to be of the Dimensions foll. viz. 40 foot in length 20 foot in breadth, 7 foote between joyns with a double chimney of brick the sides and roof to be double boarded to dwell and keepe school in."

In 1671, Capt. Pendleton assisted Joseph Moss, the town surveyor of Portsmouth for the four days ending Feby. 27, for which he received 12 shillings—no doubt fair pay for that time. A little later we find his name among those of ten men who entered into covenant and formed the first church of Portsmouth with Rev. Joshua Moody, pastor. In this year James began to dispose of the property he had accumulated at Portsmouth and vicinity; with wife Hannah, he sold land and buildings at Portsmouth to Thomas Thatcher on the 19th of

May (Rockingham Co. N. H. Deeds, iii, 104), and on the 6th of July, "James Pendleton of Portsmouth, merchant", sold to William and Benedict Oliver, for £45 "My dwelling house on the Isles of Shoals with half the stage and the flake rooms belonging to it." Brian Pendleton had had considerable business interests at the Isles of Shoals and as his son was associated with him in many of his enterprises, it is not unlikely that James lived at these Islands for a year or two.

Late in 1672 James Pendleton and his wife disposed of three more tracts of land in Portsmouth as shown by the Rockingham County Deeds, but he was still a resident of the town in 1673 when on the 7th of May in that year Walter Neale was appointed "Left [Lieut.] to the foot company under the conduct of James Pendleton (Mass. Records, Vol IV. Part 2, p. 555). During this year he also acted as attorney at Portsmouth for his father "Major Brian Pendleton, Gentleman, of Saco."

Sometime in 1673 or 1674, Capt. Pendleton left Portsmouth to look over a 700 acre tract of land his father had purchased for him of John Paine of Boston, 12 June 1673. This property was situated upon the east side of the lower Pawcatuck river, and later when this stream was made a boundary between Rhode Island and Connecticut, became part of the former colony; at that time, however, as stated in the deed this land was "taken into y<sup>e</sup> town of Stonington, Conn." (Rockingham County Deeds iii, 95.) In view of subsequent events it is fair to assume James had determined to remove from Portsmouth and that during his visit here he made all suitable arrangements for the housing of his family in the new home. Capt. Pendleton's military knowledge made him a valued addition to the little settlement nearby, and on the 9th of March 1674, he was chosen with Mr. Noyes, Capt. Denison, Lieut. Mason and Mr. Sanders, "A committee to appoint the respective garrisons and to endeavor that there be a due respect to the Court order in that regard." (Stonington Town Votes, ii, 15.) These preparations were evidently made in anticipation of King Philip's war, which was then brewing.

In the summer of this year James Pendleton returned to Portsmouth to settle his affairs and to bring his family to the new habitation. On the 12th of August, he sold to John Fabes of the Isles of Shoals, lands on Great Island (New Castle), and Sandy Beach, and a warehouse on Starr Island, Isles of Shoals (Rockingham Co. Deeds, iii, 98). On the 31st of August his father gave him a life interest in the property bought from John Paine, the deed stating that it was to be held in trust for James' children by his second wife (*Ibid.*, iii, 3).<sup>\*</sup> Five days later in a power of attorney given to Nathaniel Fryer he says "Whereas I, James Pendleton, of Portsmouth, Pis-

cattaqua River, Merchant, have formerly mortgaged my now dwelling house . . . situate on y<sup>e</sup> Great Island in piscattaqua River, aforesaid, unto Mr. Tho. Thacher of Boston, minister, for a debt which Mr. Nathaniel Fryer was bound with me for & I have tendered said house & premises unto y<sup>e</sup> use of y<sup>e</sup> said Mr. Thacher to satisfy y<sup>e</sup> sd mortgage had ye been any present to have taken possession thereof, now for as much as I am now removing from home, these are to impower Nathaniel Fryer to be my lawful attorney or any by him impowered of all y<sup>e</sup> particulars specified in y<sup>e</sup> said mortgage whose delivery thereof shall be sufficient in law to all interests and purposes whatsoever as if it were actually done and acted by myself." It would appear from this that James Pendleton had met with some business reverses at Portsmouth, and this may have been his reason for leaving that town. Capt. Pendleton evidently made a quick return trip to Stonington, as on the 10th of September following he was a "partaker" at the ordination of the Rev. James Noyes as pastor of the First Church of Stonington (Church rec.).

On the 28th of April 1675, there was "Layd out to Capt. James pendleton, seven hundred Ackers of Land which he bought of Mr. John Payne . . . Also, layd out unto Captaine James Pendleton to make up the full summe of one thousand Ackers of land Layd out to Mr. John payne and the above Sayd Capt. James pendleton wee say fforty ackers of meadow at the meadow called omegansett." This deed is found in Book 1, p. 195, of the Westerly Land Evidences as it was not entered until the 26th March, 1703 ("by Joseph Pendleton, Towne Clerk") at which date James Pendleton's property had been decided to lie in Westerly, R. I.

On the 27th of Dec. 1675, Capt. Pendleton, Mr. Sanders, Thomas Wheeler and Ephraim Miner were chosen "Lister and Raters" of Stonington (Ston. Town votes, Book 2, p. 20). King Philip's War had broken out in this year and Capt. Pendleton saw active service as on the 17th of April, 1676, at a meeting of the Council of war in Hartford, Conn., it was voted that "Whereas Major Palmes hath had sundry Captives dileved to him and Major Winthrop of Minieroft and those he bought of Capt. Pembleton and Ensign Lettingwell which are now in the hands of the Pequots and Mohcags, besides some others that the Pequots formerly took captive before Capt. Denison went out, which are not otherwise disposed of the Councill orders that they be forthwith delivered to Major Palmes and Major Winthrop upon their demands. . . ." (Col. Rec. of Conn.)

Additional proof of James Pendleton's service in King Philip's War is found in his drawing lot 13 in the Cedar Swamp lots at Voluntown, Ct., assigned by the Connecticut Legislature in 1701 to the soldiers of that colony who served in the conflict. During this war Capt. Pendleton's property at Sudbury, Mass. was damaged to the extent of £60 in the Indian attack upon that place, 21 April 1676. (Bodge's "Soldiers in King Phillip's War.")

As Capt. Pendleton was active in Connecticut and Rhode Island during 1676 it seems more likely that it was his son James<sup>3</sup> Pendle-

ton who witnessed a deed at Wells, Maine, in that year. On the 14th of Nov. 1677, James Pendleton and wife, Hannah, of Stonington, Conn. sold to Brian Pendleton, "his father" of Great Island (New Castle) N. H., land on Great Island (Rockingham Co. [N. H.] Deeds, iii, 131).

On the following 27th of December, Capt. Pendleton, Nehemiah Palmer, Mr. Tobias Sanders, Ephraim Miner, and Capt. Denison, were chosen selectmen of Stonington. On the same day Capt. Pendleton and others were appointed a committee to ascertain the town debt and with Nehemiah Palmer he was engaged to "Seal the eastward end of the meeting house from the pulpit to the main post, that is to say from the girt upwards to the wall plate." Capt. Pendleton was re-elected selectman the 27th Dec. 1677, and the 25th Dec. 1678. He was also moderator of the Town meetings held during 1677 (Stonington Town Votes, ii, 25, 30, 32). Although he had been active in the affairs of the town and in its defense against the Indians, yet the Connecticut Colonial records for May, 1679, state that "Capt. James Pendleton [and others] being presented to the Court in October last for the privilege of freemen are now accepted to that privilege and the commissioners of Stonington are to administer the freemen's oath to them."

On the 17th of Sept. 1679, he took the oath of allegiance to King Charles at Westerly, R. I., and his name appears upon the list of free inhabitants of the town in that year, when he received an allotment of land. On the 27th of Aug. 1680, he was granted several parcels of land amounting to 150 acres upon the Town Commons of Stonington, which he afterwards sold. On the 7th of Nov. 1680, James Pendleton was admitted to the Church at Stonington, Conn. 1 June 1681 he sold to William Vahan (Vaughan) "for 20,000 merchantable redd oake pipe staves," 300 acres of land and three islands at Cape Porpoise, which he had received by his father's will, his mother relinquishing her rights of dower in this property. (York Deeds, iii, folio 93.)

On the 25th Jany. 1688, James Pendleton bought of Nathaniel Lynde 1,000 acres on the sea-coast of Westerly, including Watch Hill. He sold a small part of this land and the rest he willed to his sons, Joseph, Edmund, and Caleb.

During Sir Edmond Andros' governorship of New York and New England from 1686 to 1689, James Pendleton was assigned as a Justice "To keep the peace of our Sovereign Lord, the King, and all his subjects," 28 May, 1686. Shortly afterwards, "Joseph Dudley, William Stoughton, John Wintthrop, Edward Randolph, and Richard Wharton, John Blackwell, Edward Palmes, and Samuel Sewall Esqrs. Elisha Hutchinson, Richard Smith, Francis Brinley and John Saffin. Esqrs. John Fones, Thomas Ward, James Pendleton Gent." were appointed by the President and Council of New England, 18 June 1686, "Commissioners within the Narragansett Country . . . to settle and dispose of the affairs of that Province, and the people thereof" (Mass. Hist. Soc. Col. Fifth Series, Vol. 9).

On the 14th of June 1687, he was a member of the General Quarter Sessions and Court of Common Pleas held at Newport, and a member of the same court when it met at Rochester on the 6th of March in the following year (R. I. Col. Rec.).

On 18 Dec. 1689, 3 Dec. 1690, 1 April 1691, and 8 April 1691, James Pendleton disposed of the property at Sudbury, Mass. which he had held so many years as shown by the Middlesex County, Mass., deeds. He acknowledged these last two deeds at Boston, the 8th of April, 1691.

In 1699 James Pendleton was chosen a Town Councilman of Westerly. During that year a new law was passed by the R. I. Assembly for the choosing of rate makers which created much dissatisfaction, and at Westerly quite a number of the leading men entered their protest against the new regulation. This act called down upon their heads the wrath of the Governor, Samuel Cranston, as will appear by the following interesting document taken from the "Trumbull Papers" published in the collections of the Mass. Hist. Society:

"Warrant to Joseph Crandall to arrest disturbers of the peace.  
To Joseph Crandall, especial constable appointed for this present expedition, Greetings.

Whereas, [complaint] hath been made unto me, Samuel Cranston, Governor of his Majesty's colony of Rhoad Island and Providence, Plantations, etc., by Captain William Champlin and Mr. Joseph Clarke, of Westerly, justices within said colony, that they have met with some obstruction in the town meeting by several persons of said town remonstrating under their hands against the choosing of rate makers, (according to an Assembly's Act at Warwick, Oct. 25, 1699) as will more at large appear under the hands of the said persons, vis: James Pendleton, Joseph Pemberton, George Denison, Joseph Stanton, John Lewis, Daniell Crumb, Jno. Babcock, Joseph Pendleton, Edward Bliuing, Roger Larkin, James Lewis, Israel Lewis and Joseph Babcock, Edward Wilcocks, the which act of theirs doth tend to the subversion of his Majesty's authority, established in this colony under the great seal of England, and is a high contempt against the same. These are, therefore, in the name of his Majesty, William the Third, King of England, Scotland, France, and Ireland, and the dominions and territories thereunto belonging, to apprehend the persons of the aforesaid James Pendleton, Joseph Pemberton, George Denison, Joseph Stanton, Jno. Lewis, Daniel Crumb, Jno. Babcock, Joseph Pendleton, Edward Bliuing, Roger Larkin, James Lewis, Israel Lewis, Joseph Babcock, and Edward Wilcocks, and bring them before me, that they may be proceeded with according to their demerits. And you are hereby authorized and empowered to take sufficient aid and all or any of his Majesty's loving subjects within this colony are hereby required to be aiding and assisting to you in the execution of your said office, if there unto commanded by you, as occasion shall require. Hereof you are not to fail as you'll answer the contrary.

Given under my hand and seal in Newport, this second day of

December, and in the eleventh year of his Majesty's reign over England, etc., Annoq. Domini 1699.

Samuell Cranston.

Vera copia attests Joseph Crandal's Marke, constable constituted for the same.

A true copy, compared with an attested copy by James Noyes."

What the outcome of this matter was we have not been able to learn, as further reference to it has not been found of record, so we do not know whether or not these independent men of Westerly were taken before the terrible Governor and proceeded with according to their demerits.

On the 23rd of Jany., 1700, James Pendleton of Westerly, R. I., sold to Nicholas Morey of Taunton, Mass. for 100 pounds, six hundred acres of land on the west side of the Saco River. (York Deeds.)

At town meetings held in Westerly the 19th March, 1707, and the 23rd May in the same year, Capt. James Pendleton was chosen Moderator and on the 27 June 1709 he was elected first Town Councilman (Westerly rec.). His death occurred in Westerly on the 29 November in this year. Like his father he was active in public affairs until the time of his death, and like his father too, wherever he went he became at once one of the leading citizens.

The will of James<sup>2</sup> Pendleton (see Appendix VIII), names wife, Hannah, sons Joseph, Edmund and Caleb, daughters Ann Brown, Eleanor Pendleton and Dorothy Pendleton, "children by my present wife, Hannah," and daughters Mary and Hannah "had by former wife."

No reference is made by Capt. James Pendleton to his sons, James<sup>3</sup> and Brian<sup>3</sup>, named in his father's will (1677) or to any heirs of these sons, and as no mention of any such has elsewhere appeared, it would seem indisputable that James<sup>3</sup> and Brian<sup>3</sup> died without issue. James<sup>3</sup> had died previous to 1698, but we have nothing to show what became of Brian.<sup>3</sup>

There are several records at Westerly referring to the children of Capt. James<sup>2</sup> by his second wife; one is as follows:

"The Deposition of Mr. Peter Crandall and Mr. Joseph Maxson of Westerly in Rhod Island Government Both of Lawfull age Testifyeth & Sayeth yt We the Deponants Being Nigh Neighbors to Capt. James Pendleton of s'd Westerly We the Deponants Well Knew him & his wife Hannah Pendleton & their Deputed Children. The first Joseph Pendleton by the s'd Hannah the 2nd Was Edmond, the third Was Caleb the next is Ann, the next was Elenor, the next was Dorithy, We the deponants further Sayeth that the above Named Children was the Deputed Children of ye above s'd Capt. James Pendleton & his Wife Hannah as above s'd Which daughters above mentioned was married, Ann to Elezer Brown, Elinor Was Married to Wm. Walker, Dorithy to Nicholas Cottrill and further these Deponants Sayeth Not."

"The above Written Evidences was Taken upon Solemn oath before [word omitted] in the town of Westerly in Kings County of

Rhoad Island This 16th Day of this Instant August in ye Year of ye Year our Lord 1732.

Theodaty Rhoades, Justice of ye Peace,  
John Richmond, Justice of ye Peace.

Entred. Novem. ye 9th 1732.

Pr. Wm. Babcock T. Clerk."

(Westerly Land Evidences Book 5, page 367)

James<sup>2</sup> Pendleton married (1), at Sudbury, Mass., 22 Oct., 1647, Mary Palmer, whose parentage is unknown. She died at Sudbury, 7 Nov., 1655, and he married (2), 29 April, 1656, also at Sudbury, Hannah Goodenow, daughter of Capt. Edmund and Hannah ( ) Goodenow. She was born in that town 28 Nov., 1639, and was living in Westerly, R. I., as late as 1725. Her father was a native of Dunhead, Wiltshire, England (N. E. Hist. Gen. Reg. ix, 357), and was a prominent man in Sudbury which he represented in the General Court for several years. The children of James Pendleton were:

By first wife:

5. James<sup>3</sup>, Jr., b. 5 Nov., 1650, Watertown, Mass. He was mentioned in the will of his grandfather, Major Brian Pendleton, in 1677, but in 1698 his half-brother, Joseph Pendleton, sold to Nicholas Morey, land on the Great Island at Portsmouth, N. H., "one acre of which was given to my brother, James Pendleton." (Rock. Co., N. H., Deeds, ix, 321.) It would appear from this that James<sup>3</sup> d. unm. prior to 1698.
6. Mary, b. prob. about 1653; m. three times.
7. Hannah, b. prob. about 1655; m. John Bush.

By second wife:

8. Brian, b. 23 July, 1659, Sudbury, Mass. While he is mentioned in his grandfather Pendleton's will (1677), no further reference to him has anywhere been found, and as in the case of his half-brother, James<sup>3</sup> Jr., he undoubtedly died without issue and probably unmarried.
9. Joseph, b. 29 Dec., 1661, Sudbury, Mass.; m. (1), Deborah Minor; (2), Patience Potts.
10. Edmund, b. 24 June, 1665, Portsmouth, N. H.; m. Mary —.
11. Ann, b. 12 Nov., 1667, Portsmouth, N. H.; m. Eleazer Brown.
12. Caleb, b. 8 Aug., 1669, Portsmouth, N. H.; m. Elizabeth —.
13. Sarah, bapt. 18 April, 1675, Stonington, Ct.; d. young as no further reference to her appears.
14. Eleanor, bapt. 20 July, 1679, Stonington, Ct.; m. William Walker.
15. Dorothy, bapt. 3 Oct., 1686, Stonington, Ct.; m. Nicholas Cottrell, 3rd.

NOTE: The published vital records of Sudbury, Mass., give us the dates of James Pendleton's marriages, the birth of his second

wife, the births of his sons, Brian and Joseph, and the death of his first wife. The birth of his son, James, Jr., appears upon the records of Watertown, Mass., and the baptisms of his three youngest daughters are given in the records of the First Church of Stonington, Conn. The dates of births of Edmund, Ann, and Caleb are from "An Original Record of Births, &c for the Towns of Portsmouth, Dover, and Hampton, commencing 1643." now in possession of the N. H. Hist. Soc. and published in the Dover, N. H. Hist. Collections, Vol. I, p. 120. As James was a resident of Portsmouth during these years, these three children were undoubtedly born there.

While the date of Ann's birth does not tally with the deposition of Peter Crandall and Joseph Maxson, that of James Pendleton's children by wife Hannah "*The third was Caleb. the next is Ann,*" yet as is often done, they probably gave the sons first and then the daughters, irrespective of their combined order of birth. Although it is true that Ann's gravestone states she was born at Westerly in 1613, and died ac. 60 years, yet this cannot be held to be corroborative of Messrs. Crandall's and Maxson's evidence, as the stone was erected only about twenty-five years ago by one of Ann's descendants, and the date thereon was supplied by Judge Wheeler, the Stonington historian. What his authority was does not appear. Ann's husband does not mention her in his will, dated 1732, and it would seem from this that she had died earlier than Wheeler assumed. We can see no good reason to suppose there were two Anns in James Pendleton's family. If he had had a second one, born at Westerly, he would surely have had her baptized at the Stonington church, nor would he have neglected to have entry made thereof, as he seems to have been particular in these respects.

4. CALEB<sup>2</sup> PENDLETON (*Major Brian*<sup>1</sup>), died prior to 9 Aug., 1677, probably at Westerly, R. I. He married Judith —.

That Brian Pendleton had at least one other son besides Capt. James seems evident from the Middlesex Co. (Mass.) deed already referred to in which Brian refers to James as his "*eldest sonne.*" That Caleb Pendleton was brother to James seems reasonably certain.

In the list of landholders at Portsmouth, N. H., in 1657, Caleb is set down as the owner of 19 acres of land, and his name occurs immediately after those of Brian and James. In 1661 the town allotted an acre of land to Capt. James Pendleton which was bounded on Caleb's property. The following year Caleb was at Boston, and we have no further record of him until in the list of inhabitants at Westerly, R. I., 1679, it is stated that "Lot 41 originally granted to Caleb Pendleton\* is given to George Landfeare" [Lauphere].

It has been suggested that inasmuch as this list was not written until two years after Brian had made his will, in which no son Caleb is mentioned, Caleb may have been a son of that Joseph Pendleton

\* [12] Caleb, son of James<sup>2</sup>, was but ten years of age in this year, and so would hardly have had any grants of land made him.

who was at Portsmouth as early as 1629. (See Appendix II.) It does not appear, however, that the list of 1679 is to be regarded as containing only the names of those who were inhabitants of Westerly in that year, but rather those who had come there up to that time, and in addition to those noted in the first list, 18 May, 1669. The fact that a lot originally given Caleb was awarded to Landfeare bears out this view. Similarly the list of inhabitants of Westerly in 1727 contains the name of Capt. James Pendleton who had been dead nearly twenty years. In this list the name Caleb Pendleton appears twice, first amongst the earlier settlers, and again near the end of the list, the second one probably referring to Caleb<sup>3</sup>, son of James<sup>2</sup>. (Westerly "Town Meetings," Book I, pp. 47-48.)

That Caleb<sup>2</sup> was married and had at least one child is shown by the following:

[16.] "CALEB PENDLETON JUNR. son of Caleb & Judeth Pendleton died 1 Oct. 1662."

(Boston, Mass., Town Rec. pub. Doc. 130, p. 86.)

It is evident that Caleb Pendleton left no direct heirs, as no reference to any such appears in Brian Pendleton's will or in any other records. His name did not die with him, however, as it has appeared regularly among the descendants of Caleb<sup>3</sup> Pendleton, youngest son of Capt. James.

## THIRD GENERATION

6. MARY<sup>3</sup> PENDLETON (*Capt. James<sup>2</sup>, Major Brian<sup>1</sup>*), was born about 1653, probably at Watertown, Mass., and died in 1732, at Taunton, or Dighton, Mass. After her mother's death and her father's remarriage Mary was evidently brought up by her grandparents, Brian and Eleanor Pendleton, as her name appears as a witness to various deeds in York County, Maine, where they lived, and her marriages also occurred there.

She married (1), —,\* William Brettun, or Britton, as the name came to be spelled in later generations. According to the "Britton Ancestry" by Edward E. Britton, William was the son of James and Jane Britton of Charlestown, Mass. Few other facts have been ascertained about him. He was in Maine as early as 1674, when on the 6th of June he witnessed a deed at Saco (York Co. Deeds, ii, folio 174).

Mary<sup>3</sup> married (2), prior to April, 1683, Joseph Cross, son of John Cross of Wells, Maine. He was a soldier from Wells in the Indian War of 1617, and died 18 June, 1684, leaving no children. His will, dated at Wells, 2 March, 1683/4, proved 2 Aug., 1684, names wife Mary as executrix, and makes a bequest to "My wife's soun Willi: Breeden" (York Deeds, Book v, part 1, folio 28).

Mary<sup>3</sup> married (3), prior to 25 May, 1685, Nicholas Morey. He kept a public house at Wells and took an active part in town affairs, holding the office of Selectman for several years. When the settlers were besieged by the Indians on Stage Island he volunteered to go to Portsmouth for aid, remarking that if help did not come they would all be killed or taken prisoners. Securing a canoe he eluded the savages and reached Portsmouth in safety. Here he obtained a sloop, a number of soldiers and a swivel-gun, and upon his return with these reinforcements the Indians were driven off and the settlers rescued. (History of Wells, Maine.)

Nicholas Morey removed to Taunton, Mass., prior to 1692, as he appears as a resident of that town when he bought land there on

\* There are confusing clues as to the date of this marriage. Brian Pendleton's will, dated 9 Aug., 1677, calls Mary, his granddaughter, Mary *Pendleton*. Her son, William Brettun, married in Oct., 1698, and was of sufficient age to convey land 20 Feb., 1699, when he deeded to Nicholas Morey the land left him by Joseph Cross (York Deeds). It would seem from this that Mary was married to Brettun late in 1677 or early in 1678, and yet on the 16th of April, 1680, Mary Pendleton witnessed a deed at Wells, Maine (York Deeds, iii, folio 82). As we have no other Mary Pendleton of this period we cannot understand why she signed her name this way if she was then Brettun's widow.

the 26th of Jany. of that year (Bristol Co. Deeds, x, 147). Here he resumed tavern keeping and was licensed under the Province law about 1700 to keep an Ordinary. Emery's "History of Taunton," published in 1893, says [p. 608], "Nicholas Morey's ordinary was near Morey's bridge. Part of the cellar walls, surrounded by old trees, yet mark the site of this famous ordinary, tavern, and inn, which was kept by the descendants of Nicholas until the memory of those now living." Some of his wife's descendants may have been referred to by this, as the land and probate records of Bristol County indicate that Nicholas Morey had no children,—at least none that survived infancy.

In February, 1698/99, he bought of Joseph Pendleton of Westerly, R. I., two acres of land at Portsmouth, N. H. (Rockingham Co., N. H., Deeds, ix, 32), and on the 7th of September, 1716, at which time he was of Freetown, Mass., he gave a receipt to Caleb Pendleton, executor to Capt. James Pendleton. (Westerly, R. I., C. & P. records.) About 1721 Nicholas removed to Dighton, Mass., where he died early in 1731. On the 27th of March in that year his widow, Mary, was appointed administratrix upon his estate (Bristol Co. Probate records, vii, 144). Inventory of his property, amounting to nearly £6000, was filed three days later. (Ibid., p. 176.) After Mary's death in the following year, "John Smith of London, now residing in Boston, next of kin," was appointed on the 17th of March, 1732/33, administrator upon the estate of his great-uncle Nicholas Morey, late of Dighton, deceased. (Ibid., p. 507.)

The will of Mary Morey, widow of Nicholas Morey, dated at Dighton, Mass., 5 Oct., 1732, and recorded 10 Jany., 1732/33 (Ibid., p. 480), refers to but one child, the son William, who, it states, was then deceased. This will is an unusual document, as besides naming all her grandchildren, it mentions her father, grandfather, and former husband as follows: To James Brettun, her grandson, she willed "One quarter of all my right in lands in Province of New Hampshire . . . in right of my grandfather Brian Pendleton, and in right of my father James Pendleton, and in right of my former husband Joseph Cross by his last will."

#### Mary's child:

- i. William<sup>4</sup> (Brettun), was born probably about 1678 at Wells, Maine. The records of Taunton, Mass., refer to him as "mariner." He was a member of the military company there in 1700 and 1710. His death occurred prior to 17 March, 1725/26, as on that day his widow, Lydia, was appointed administratrix of his estate (Bristol Co. Probate records). He married at Taunton, 26 October, 1698, Lydia Leonard, daughter of James Leonard, 2d, of Taunton. She was born in 1679, and had not remarried up to 16 September, 1752, when she sold land to James Leonard (Bristol Co. Deeds). The children of William<sup>4</sup> and Lydia (Leonard) Brettun, as shown by his mother's will, were (order uncertain):

- i. Mary<sup>5</sup> (Brettun). She was probably one of the oldest children, as her son Brian<sup>6</sup> Hall was b. 9 July, 1727. She is said to have m. John Hall, but if this is correct she evidently had a former husband, Joseph Hall, as on the 14th of February, 1721, Nicholas Morey deeded to Mary Hall, widow of Joseph Hall of Taunton, twenty acres of land in that town, and on the 1st of March, 1726, he deeded to the heirs of Joseph Hall, late of Taunton, deceased, "for love and affection," a "little lot in Dighton." (Bristol Co. Deeds, lix, 190; xlv, 41.)
- ii. William, Jr., b. about 1701; d. 4 December, 1783; m. Patience ——. He testified at Taunton, 19 September, 1753, that he was about fifty-two years of age (Bristol Co. Deeds, xli, 92).
- iii. James, d. 1736. He evidently m. [22] Hannah<sup>4</sup> Pendleton, as noted under our account of her.
- iv. Abiel. He was of Smithfield, R. I., in 1760, when on October 4th he deeded land to his brother Ebenezer of Raynham, Mass. (Bristol Co. Deeds, xlv, 437).
- v. Lydia, m. 14 February, 1733/34, Nicholas Power, or Powers.
- vi. Sarah, m. 8 May, 1735, Thomas White of Taunton.
- vii. Elizabeth, m. 18 January, 1736/37, Timothy Williams.
- viii. Ebenezer, b. 1 June, 1715, Taunton, Mass.; d. 1787 in New Hampshire; m. (1), 20 May, 1735, Tabitha Leonard; (2), 22 February, 1749, at Providence, R. I., Sarah Bullock. He was the father of nineteen children, seventeen of whom became heads of families of their own. In 1771, Ebenezer with all his family except two daughters, removed to Westmoreland, N. H., where he became prominent in civil and religious affairs and an ardent supporter of the cause of the Colonies against the mother country. He was a member of the Continental Congress in 1777 and 1778. Several of his sons served in the Revolutionary War, one of them as Major of a New Hampshire regiment.
- ix. Abigail, m. 13 December, 1736, Joshua Campbell of Norton, Mass.
- x. Pendleton, b. about 1722; d. at Easton, Mass., in 1806, *ae.* 84 years (History of Easton). He was a soldier in the French and Indian War (*Ibid.*), also in the Revolution (Mass. Archives). He m. 22 October, 1747, Hannah Seele.

*NOTE.*—We are indebted to one of Ebenezer Brettun's descendants, Mrs. George F. Hodges, of Rome, N. Y., for the above facts concerning him, as well as for the marriage records of his sisters Lydia, Sarah, Elizabeth, Abigail, and brother, Pendleton.

7. HANNAH<sup>3</sup> PENDLETON (*Capt. James<sup>2</sup>, Major Brian<sup>1</sup>*), was born probably about 1655, and died —.

She married at Sudbury, Mass., 13 January, 1679, John Bush. His parentage is unknown. The John Bush of Cape Porpoise, Maine, of whom Brian Pendleton bought land, died without issue in 1670.

Besides giving the date of Hannah Pendleton's marriage, the Sud-

bury records show that John and Hannah Bush had one child born there:

i. Hannah<sup>4</sup> (Bush), b. 5 November, 1683.

No further record of this family has ever been found, although Hannah was living in 1703, when she was mentioned in her father's will.

The indexes to the deeds, wills and administrations of Middlesex County, Mass., do not contain the name of John Bush.

9. JOSEPH<sup>1</sup> PENDLETON (*Capt. James<sup>2</sup>, Major Brian<sup>1</sup>*), was born at Sudbury, Mass., 29 December, 1661,\* and died at Westerly, R. I., 18 September, 1706. On the 17th of September, 1679, Joseph Pendleton took the oath of allegiance to the colony of Rhode Island at Westerly, on the same day that his father became a citizen there. In 1697 he was constable of the town and was involved with his father in 1699 in the trouble with Gov. Cranston. In 1698, 1699, 1704 and 1705, he was chosen to apportion the rates (assessor of taxes). 2 February, 1698/99, Joseph Pendleton of Faversham, alias Westerly, R. I., deeds to Nicholas "Moorey" two acres of land in Portsmouth, N. H., "One acre of which was given to my brother, James Pendleton" (Rockingham Co., N. H., Deeds, ix, 321). Three days later Joseph gave another deed to Nicholas "Moorey" of Taunton, Mass., for two acres of land lying on the Great Island in Portsmouth, "One acre that was Philip Eussel's in his life time, the other was given to my brother James Pendleton." (*Ibid.*, ii, 55.) These deeds appear to have been for the same property.

On the 24th of May, 1702, Joseph Pendleton was admitted to the First Church of Stonington (Ch. Rec.). 25th of June, 1701, he was elected Town Clerk of Westerly, for one year. He was again elected on the 25th of June, 1702, and re-elected the four years following. In 1703 he was styled Ensign. He was a grand juryman in 1706 (West. Rec.). Joseph's handwriting, which appears in the old town records in these years, is remarkably legible; his penmanship was far in advance of that of the average Town Clerk of those days.

Joseph Pendleton married (1), at Westerly, R. I., 8 July, 1696, Deborah Minor, daughter of Ephraim and Hannah (Avery) Minor.

*Joseph Pendleton Towne Clerk*

She died 8 September, 1697 (West. Rec.). He married (2), at Westerly, 11 December, 1700, Patience Potts, daughter of William 12 August, 1683. Not long after Joseph's death she married (2),

as his second wife, 28 April, 1707, Samuel Rogers. The following 8th of June, Samuel Rogers gave bond to administer estate of Joseph Pendleton, and a draft of 202 acres was laid out to him, "In the behalf of Joshua Pendleton, his son-in-law [step-son], it being part of ye Land held in possession by Capt. James Pendleton, deceased." (W. L. E., ii, 33.)

On the 26th of April, 1731, William and Joseph Pendleton of Westerly gave to Samuel Rogers and his wife Patience, mother to William and Joseph, receipt for all their legacies in the will of their father, Joseph Pendleton. (C. & P. rec., 1719-1731, p. 248.)

Issue of Joseph<sup>3</sup> Pendleton (from Westerly vital records, confirmed by his will—see Appendix VIII):

10. EDMUND<sup>3</sup> PENDLETON (Capt. James<sup>2</sup>, Major Brian<sup>1</sup>), was born at Portsmouth, N. H., 24 June, 1665, and died at Westerly, R. I., in 1750. Edmund<sup>3</sup> Pendleton was taken to Westerly, R. I., with the rest of his father's family when about seven years of age and made that town his home until his death. On the 18th of April, 1674, he was baptized at the First Congregational Church of Stonington, Conn. 28th March 1692, Edmund Pendleton, of Stonington, Abigail Kettle, widow of John Kettle, guardian on behalf of Joseph Kettle, sold a farm in Sudbury, Mass., to Noah Clapp for £50 (Middlesex County, Mass., Deeds, x, 244). The deed next following shows that Joseph Kettle was a grandson to Capt. Edmund Goodenow, and that Joseph's uncle, John Goodenow, acted as attorney for "Kinsman Edmund Pendleton."

On the 23rd of Jany. 1700, an agreement was made between Capt. James Pendleton and Edmund Pendleton on the one part, and Joseph Pendleton on the other part regarding the division of a neck of land on the East side of the Pawcatuck River. This agreement was not recorded until the 9th of April, 1719, and is entered on page 38 of Book 3 of the Westerly Land Evidences. On the 28th of July, 1700, Edmund Pendleton and Mary, his wife, were admitted to membership in the First Church of Stonington (Ch. Rec.). On the 16th April, 1712, Edmund Pendleton of Westerly, sold to Stephen Randall for £58 a farm of about 90 acres "It being part of that land which my honored grandfather major brian pendleton purchised of Mr. paine and is sometime sence fallen to me according to my s<sup>d</sup> grandfathers will" (W. L. E., ii, 104).

On the 10th of March, 1713/14, Edmund Pendleton sold an additional tract of land, about 80 acres, to Stephen Randall for £70. This piece was bounded on the West by the Pawcatuck River, South

by Eleazer Brown's land, East by Caleb Pendleton's land, North "by the land belonging to Joseph Pendleton, deceased, his orphans" (Ibid., ii, 139).

On the 14th of March, 1743/4, Edmund Pendleton, Sr., of Westerly, "in consideration of ye Love Goodwill and fatherly affection which I have & do bear unto my Loving Son, Edmund Pendleton, Junr.", deeds to the latter "two hundredd acres more or less, it being the Northern part of my homestead farm." (Ibid., v, 206.)

On the 30th of April, 1750, inventory of his estate was presented to the town council for probate. It amounted to £1375, 16s., and included wearing apparel, £19, 10s.; two old books, 10s.; wheel, pewter, notes, live-stock, etc. Receipts were given by daughters, Hannah Britton, widow of James Britton of Dighton, Mass., Mary Pendleton, Rebecca, wife of Oliver Steward, and Dorothy, wife of John Jamison. Edmund Pendleton, Jr., acted as administrator of his father's estate. (Westerly C. & P. Rec., iii, 256-7.)

As the Mary Pendleton above mentioned was the daughter of Edmund, Sr., and as his wife, Mary, signed no receipt in the administration of his estate nor any of the deeds we have noted, it may be concluded that these facts, in connection with the small family Edmund<sup>3</sup> had, would indicate that his wife had died prior to 1712.

The descendants of Edmund<sup>3</sup> Pendleton, Sr., are not numerous, as many of them remained unmarried, and of those who did marry few had large families. The marriage of Edmund Pendleton does not appear to be of record, but we have his wife's first name, Mary, from the Stonington Church records, as we have already seen. His children, as shown in the administration on his estate and in the baptismal records of the Stonington Churches were (order uncertain):

24. Rebecca, m. Oliver Steward.

25. Dorothy, d. 1778; m. at Westerly, R. I., 20 Dec. 1748 (as sec. wf.), John Jamison (Jemison), son of William and Sarah (Price) Jamison. According to "The Jamesons in America" [p. 12], his first wife was Abigail Carter by whom he had daughters Abigail, Sarah, Mary, Margaret, and Content, who June, 1756 (New London, Conn., Prob. rec., Liber G, pp. d. inf. John Jamison's will, dated at Stonington, Conn., 25th 221-2), names only "loving wife Dorothy" and the first four daughters above mentioned. It would appear from this that Dorothy had had no ch. or at least none that survived infancy.

"Sept. 1, 1778, Rev. Joseph Fish being appointed executor of will of Dorothy Jamison, dec'd, refused to execute" (Ston-

ington, Conn. Prob. rec., iii. 124). This will does not appear to have been recorded.

26. Daniel. On the 2nd of Nov. 1735, Edmund Pendleton, Daniel Pendleton, "Dorothea" Pendleton, and Rebecca Pendleton owned covenant to the Second Church of Stonington, and were bapt. at Westerly the 23rd of Nov. following, Edmund's name appearing this time as Edmund, Junr. As no reference to this Daniel Pendleton is made in the settlement of his father's estate he evidently died prior to 1750 without leaving a family.

11. ANN<sup>3</sup> PENDLETON (*Capt. James<sup>2</sup>, Major Brian<sup>1</sup>*), was born at Portsmouth, N. H., 12 Nov. 1667, and died prior to 1732, as she is not mentioned in her husband's will of that date. A tradition among her descendants says that she was sixty years old when she died. Ann<sup>3</sup> married at Westerly, R. I., 18th Oct. 1693, Eleazer Brown, son of Thomas and Mary (Newhall) Brown; he was born 4 Aug. 1670, at Lynn, Mass., and died at Stonington, Conn., 30 Nov. 1734.

Eleazer Brown and his wife made their home in Westerly and later in Stonington, in the part of that township which was afterward set off to form North Stonington. In the division of her father's property, Ann received his house as appears in the following agreement of the heirs:

"To all Christian people to whom these presents shall come Know ye that the subscribers hearunto had a tract of land given us by our honored Granfather brian pendleton by an assignment of a deed bearing date 1674 as more att larg may appear by s'd deed s'd land lying & being sittuate in ye towne of Westerly in ye Collony of Rhoad Island & providence plantations in New England & wee ye proprietors of s'd land have joyntly agreed & devided s'd tract of land (Except a parte thearof that Mr. Georg lanfear hath fenet) into seven parts Elizer brown hath ye third lott & ye house that was Capt. Pendletons stands on itt ye bounds thereof is in ye surveigh & ye s'd Elezer brown had s'd lott by a Joynt agreement of the heirs of Capt. James Pendleton & payed certaine sumes of money therefore unto Nicholas Cottrill William walker as was inserted in Capt. James Pendletons will & for a confirmation of s'd lott with all ye housing orchards fencings pausters woods timber & all other priveleges & apurtenances whatsoever belonging to s'd lott or hereafter shall belong thereunto we Edmund Pendleton Caleb Pendleton william walker & Nicholas Cottrill for us and our heires Exeenty administrations & assigns & each of them & every of them have given Granted assured & confirmed ye above s'd lott to ye s'd Elezer brown his heirs Executs administrators & assignes to have & to hold in severallity forever to use poses and enjoy as his owne proper Estate forever hereafter so as not to allter change defecte or make voyed ye above s'd pertition by any right tittle claims or Interest of Edmund Pendleton Caleb Pendleton William Walker Nicholas Cottrill our heirs Executs ad-

ministrators or assignes or either of them or any of them their heirs Executors administrators or assignes forever hereafter sett our hands & seales ye 11th day of April 1711.

After the deaths of Ann and her husband, her surviving children deeded to Edmund and Joseph Pendleton of Westerly, for ten pounds, all their rights in the estate of "our grandfather, James Pendleton, late of Westerly, and of 'Briant' Pendleton." This deed was signed 30 July, 1734, by Jonathan Brown, "Elezer" Brown, Thomas Main and Ann, his wife, Patience Brown, James Pendleton and Abigail, his wife, and Wait Palmer and Mary, his wife (Rockingham Co., N. H. Deeds, xx, 227).

The children of Eleazer and Ann (Pendleton) Brown were:

12. CALEB<sup>3</sup> PENDLETON (*Capt. James<sup>2</sup>, Major Brian<sup>1</sup>*), the youngest son of Capt. James<sup>2</sup> and Hannah (Goodenow) Pendleton, was born at Portsmouth, N. H., 8 Aug. 1669, and died at Westerly, R. I., 19 March 1746. He was a farmer and settled upon his father's land at Westerly. On the 26th of Jany. 1703, his brothers and sisters agreed "They having a gift of land given us by our grandfather Bryan Pendleton to be divided amongst us at our father's death, as per deed bearing date 31 Aug. 1674; and our brother Caleb having built upon said land we mutually agree for ourselves with full consent of father James, that our brother Caleb shall have his part of land (given us by grandfather Brian Pendleton) where he now is." This instrument was signed by Joseph Pendleton, Edmund Pendleton, Eleanor Pendleton, Dorothy Pendleton, Eleazor and Anna Brown, Patience Pendleton and Mary Pendleton (the last two being the wives of Joseph and Edmund respectively), and is recorded in the Westerly Land Evidences.

On the 11th of April 1711, Caleb received a confirmation of this agreement, the deed being signed by Edmund Pendleton, William Walker, Eleazor Brown, Nicholas Cottrell, Anna Brown, "Eliner" Walker, "Dorithy" Cottrell. . . . "We the proprietors of sd tract of land have . . . Devided sd tract of land into Seven Parts except one Part that Mr. George Lamphear Hath fenet." (W. L. E., iii, 135.) On the 3d June, 1733, Caleb Pendleton of Westerly, R. I., signed off to James "Brettan" (Britton) of Bristol [County?], Mass., all his right in the estate of his grandfather, late of Saco, Maine, and of his father, James Pendleton, late of Westerly. This deed was signed by Caleb's wife Elizabeth (Rockingham Co., N. H., Deeds, xx, 228).

At a meeting of the Town Council of Westerly, 7 Oct. 1699, it was ordered that Caleb Pendleton, Constable, "Doe warne Samuel Younglove and his wife, and Thomas Jossling and Mary Randall to departe out of our towne." It is a coincidence that while Caleb

his descendants. This will (dated 1732) names a daughter Hannah, the full list of children coming in the following order: Jonathan, Eleazer, Anna, Mary, Patience, Abigail, Ruth, *Hannah, Daniel*, and James. The son Daniel is not elsewhere referred to in this genealogy, nor is he included in the list of Eleazer's children given in the "History of Stonington." This work also notes the marriage of Eleazer's daughter Hannah to William Wilcox, and states further that he married Elizabeth Brown as his second wife 5 June, 1727. Is it not possible that Eleazer Brown was married twice and by his second wife had a son Daniel and a daughter Hannah, named after her deceased half-sister?

evicted one Mary Randall from Westerly his son, Caleb, Jr., married another one years later. On the 3rd of March, 1707-8, Caleb Pendleton was chosen "pettit juryman for to attend the Corte of Trials to be held for the Collony att the Collony Hous att Newport the last Tusday in this instant month." He was active in town affairs and repeatedly held office between 1698 and 1720, becoming Town Councilman in the latter year. Caleb<sup>3</sup> was admitted to the church at Stonington, 18 Feby., 1693, and was baptized with his two oldest children the following 23rd of July. (Rec. First Cong. Ch., Ston., Ct.) His wife's name was Elizabeth —. We lack record of his marriage but Charles H. Pendleton of Westerly thinks she was a sister of George Lanphere, who had feneed part of James<sup>2</sup> Pendleton's land. Caleb's children, as given in the baptismal records of the Stonington church, and as named in his will [See Appendix VIII], were:

She probably died young as she is not mentioned in her father's will, and in the will of her grandfather, James<sup>2</sup> Pendleton, her sister, Elizabeth, is named as Caleb's *second* daughter, which could not have been so considered if Hannah were living and the ch. were bapt. in the order of their birth as is presumable.
30. Caleb, Jr., bapt. 6 June, 1697; m. Mary Randall.
31. Elizabeth, bapt. 25 June, 1699; m. Jonathan<sup>4</sup> Brown.
32. Brian, bapt. 15 June, 1701; m. Anna Wilcox.
33. Anna (Anne), bapt. 22 Aug., 1703; m. Samuel Babcock.
34. Read, m. John Saunders, Jr.
35. Susannah, m. Stephen Wilcox.

While these children are not recorded upon the Westerly records they were all born in that town without much doubt as their father was a resident there from a very early age until his death. The descendants of Caleb Pendleton are very numerous and many of them have been difficult to trace. He was the ancestor of a restless race of pioneers who, always hungry for new lands, sought out the frontiers of civilization and often made the frontiers themselves.

14. ELEANOR<sup>3</sup> PENDLETON (*Capt. James<sup>2</sup>, Major Brian<sup>1</sup>*), was baptized 20 July, 1679, at the First Church, Stonington, Conn., and died at Westerly, R. I., about 1712. She married William Walker.

Eleanor Pendleton was admitted to the Stonington church, 24th Oct. 1702, and made "public confession" on the 14th of June 1706. (Ch. Rec.)

The date of her marriage is not of record but it must have occurred between the 14th April 1709, when she was named as Eleanor Pendleton in her father's deed of that date, and the 6th of June 1710, when with her husband, William Walker, she signed an agreement

concerning the division of Capt. James Pendleton's farm (W. L. E., ii, 90).

William Walker did not long survive his wife, as on the 13th of April, 1713, the Town Council of Westerly appointed Nicholas Cottrell, Jr., administrator of the estate of William Walker, deceased, and ordered Cottrell to pay to "widow Hannah Pendleton, grandmother of William Walker's only child, Sarah, the sum of £7, 10s. annually until said child was seven years old, provided the grandmother does not refuse to take the child." In this event Cottrell was directed to hire some one else to take care of the child, or else do it himself. It is quite evident from this that Eleanor had died before her husband.\* Their child:

- i. Sarah<sup>4</sup> (Walker), b. about 1710, deeded to Benoni Smith, "her brother," for "Love Goodwill & Affection," 4th Nov., 1730, 120 acres of land in Westerly, "it being the Northernmost part of that farm of Land ye Did formerly belong to Capt. James Pendleton, Deceased." (W. L. E., entered 9 Nov., 1730.) Sarah Walker m. at Westerly, 3 June, 1731, Lieut. William Avery; the compilers of the Avery Genealogy state that she was the second wife of Avery by whom she had ten children and that he was the son of John and Abigail (Chesebrough) Avery.

On the 27th of Dec., 1731, William Avery and Sarah, his wife, of Stonington, Conn., sold to Caleb Pendleton, land in Westerly "that was given to our honored mother Eleanor Pendleton by her father Mr. James Pendleton, both deceased, as will appear under his hand and seal bearing date 14 April 1709." (W. L. E., v 319.)

In 1734, William and Sarah Avery, of New London, Conn., signed off to Joseph Pendleton, of Westerly, R. I., all their right to the estate of their "grandfather" Brian Pendleton late of Saco, Me. (Rockingham Co. N. H. Deeds, xx, 231.)

15. DOROTHY<sup>3</sup> PENDLETON (*Capt. James<sup>2</sup>, Major Brian<sup>1</sup>*) was baptized 3 Oct. 1686, at Stonington, Conn., and died ——. She married in March, 1706, Lieut. Nicholas Cottrell, (3rd). He was born 1658, and died in the summer of 1727; his widow, Dorothy, was appointed to administer his estate, 13 Nov. 1727. He was a prominent citizen of Westerly and was one of the Town Councilmen for several years before his death.

Dorothy Cottrell, wife of Nicholas, was admitted to the First Church at Stonington, 24 July 1709. On the 1st Aug. 1724, she deeded to her brother, Edmund Pendleton, for £12, all her interest "In the estate of her grandfather, Brian Pendleton, late of Saco, Maine, and of her father, James Pendleton, late of Westerly, R.

I." (Rockingham Co., N. H., Deeds, xx, 229.) On the 23d April, 1747, she gave Benoni Smith, executor, a receipt for the legacy made her in the will of her brother, Caleb Pendleton. (Westerly C. & P. Rec., iii, 330.) She was living as late as 7 Aug., 1747, when she released her dower rights in 700 acres land at Westerly sold by her son Nicholas Cottrell to John Chapman for £3000. (W. L. E.) No further reference to her has been found.

He was exec. of the will of Dorothy's cousin, Caleb Pendleton, Jr. On the 28th June 1738, John Randall, Jr. and Dorothy his wife, sold to Nicholas Cottrell (4th) for £50, all their rights in the estate of their father, Nicholas Cottrell (3rd).<sup>\*</sup>
- ii. Amey ("Amie"), bapt. 31 July, 1709; d. 13 July, 1746(?); m. 4 Nov., 1729, Josiah Smith (?).
- iii. Mary, bapt. 19 Aug., 1711; d. at Westerly, R. I., 2 Dec., 1735; m. there, (as his first wife), 16 Dec., 1730, Nathan Randall, half-brother to John Randall, Jr., above.<sup>†</sup>
- iv. Eleanor, ("Elinner"), bapt. 12 June, 1715; m. at Westerly, R. I., (as his second wife), 22 July 1736, her brother-in-law, Nathan Randall. 27 Jany., 1738/9, they sold to Nicholas Cottrell (4th) for £50, all their right in the estate of their father, Nicholas Cottrell (3rd). They were the great grand-parents of Col. Charles B. Randall, of the 114th N. Y. Volunteers, who was killed at the battle of Atlanta, Ga., 22 July 1864. (Randall Gen.)
- v. Nicholas, (4th), bapt. 7 July, 1717; m. at Westerly, R. I., 3 Oct. 1735, Rebecca Randall, sister to Nathan Randall above. They are said to have settled in Worthington, Mass.
- vi. Joseph, bapt. 7 Aug., 1726; m. Mary ——. 16 March, 1746-47, he gave his brother Nicholas acknowledgment that he had received from the latter his full share in their father's estate. 17 Aug. 1750, Joseph Cottrell and Mary, his wife, sold to Samuel Langworthy, land in Hopkinton, R. I. Joseph lived near what is now called Pendleton Hill, Conn. He has many descendants in Mystic, Conn. On the 4th of May, 1773, Amos Crandall of Voluntown was apptd. admr. on estate of Joseph

NOTE: The original entry of the baptism of Dorothy and Amey Cottrell in the Stonington Church records refers to them very plainly as "daughters of Gershom." Commenting on this statement, the "History of Stonington" [p. 326] says, "As no Gershom appears it is supposed they belonged to Nicholas Cottrell." That this conclusion is correct is evinced by the following: (1) Dorothy<sup>3</sup> (Pendleton) Cottrell was admitted to membership in this church exactly one week before these baptisms took place. (2) We have shown from the land records that Nicholas Cottrell, 3rd. did have dau. Dorothy who m. John Randall, Jr. (3) Gershom Cottrell, uncle to Nicholas, d. at No. Kingston, R. I., in 1711, an aged man. No Amey appears in the list of his ch. given in Austin's "Gen. Dict. of R. I." and it seems improbable that he would have had a ch. b. as late as 1709. His son Gershom, d. in inf. (Hist. of Ston.). (4) The appearance of the name Amey among the Randall descendants of Dorothy<sup>3</sup> (Pendleton) Cottrell.

While no Amey appears in the settlement of Nicholas Cottrell's estate, yet this may be accounted for if Wheeler is correct in stating that she m. Josiah Smith and d. 13 July, 1746, i. e., before the estate was fully settled. There were two Amey Cottrells at this period, however, the other marrying Joseph Crumb at Westerly, June, 1734. According to Wheeler, this Amey was the dau. of Samuel and Dorothy (Cottrell) Cottrell. (Hist. Ston., p. 325.)

## FOURTH GENERATION

The Pendletons of this generation lived at Westerly, R. I., until shortly after 1740 when Joshua<sup>4</sup> (Joseph<sup>3</sup>) removed to Guilford, Conn., Edmund<sup>4</sup> (Edmund<sup>3</sup>) to Stratford, Conn., and Brian<sup>4</sup> (Caleb<sup>3</sup>) to Dutchess County, N. Y.

As all the male lines of Pendleton ancestry are identical through Capt. James<sup>2</sup>, Major Brian<sup>1</sup>, we shall omit these two names hereafter in listing the various ancestors and end each line with Joseph,<sup>3</sup> Edmund,<sup>3</sup> and Caleb,<sup>3</sup> respectively.

17. DEBORAH<sup>4</sup> PENDLETON (*Joseph<sup>3</sup>*), was born 29 Aug., 1697, at Westerly, R. I., and was baptized 10 Oct., 1697 (First Ch., Stonington, Conn.). She married at Westerly, R. I., 30 Nov. 1715, Nicholas Frink, born 17 Dec., 1696, son of John, Jr. and Hannah (Prentice) Frink. (Westerly rec. & "History Stonington," p. 376.)

18. (COL.) JOSEPH<sup>4</sup> PENDLETON (*Joseph<sup>3</sup>*), was born at Westerly, R. I., 3 March, 1702; was baptized 24 May, 1702 (Ston. Ch. rec.), and died at Westerly about 1761.

Joseph Pendleton was admitted freeman at Newport, R. I., 4 May 1725, but did not remain there long as in 1727 he was appointed with Caleb Pendleton to lay out a road from the Pawcatuck Bridge (Westerly) to South Kingstown. They made their return for this work to the Westerly Town Council, 26 Dec. 1727.

Joseph Pendleton was Lieutenant in the King's County Troop of Horse from 1732 to 1734 inclusive, and Justice of the Peace at Westerly, R. I., 1736-41. On the 26th of Aug., 1745, he was licensed as an inn-keeper at Westerly and the Town Council frequently met at

his house of entertainment thereafter and issued to Joseph many orders on the Town Treasurer for "Expenses of Council."

From 1738 to 1741 inclusive he was Major of the 3rd Regt. King's County Militia, and became Lieut.-Colonel of the regiment in 1742. In 1750 and 1759, he was elected Deputy to the Assembly from Westerly. (R. I. Civ. & Mil. Appts.)

The Westerly Tax List of 1757 shows that Col. Pendleton was assessed 18s. 10d. in that year. This amount would have been much larger had he not previously been forced to dispose of the greater part of his property on account of a heavy disaster that befell him in 1749. Probably the first of the family to take an interest in shipping, his ventures had been successful and brought him large returns until that year, as is shown by the following record in the Proceedings of the Rhode Island Assembly for June, 1750:

"Whereas Col. Joseph Pendleton, of Westerly, by Petition, represented unto this Assembly, that sometime in the Month of August last, he had a Brigantine loaden with Rum, Molasses, &c., which was a new Vessel, and sailed from Anguilla, bound Home, the Property whereof was entirely his own, and of the value of Eighteen or Twenty Thousand Pounds: That the said Brigantine and Cargo were not insured, and have not been heard of since, and so is supposed to be lost; by which heavy Stroke of Providence, he is rendered unable to pay his just debts at present, without selling some part of his real Estate. And whereas the Petitioner owns a Farm in said Westerly, adjoining to Pawcatuck River, near the mouth thereof: Part whereof it is thought might not only be convenient, but also tend to a publick Advantage, if settled with a Town, it being bounded Westerly, on the navigable part of said River, where there is plenty of Oysters and other Fish to be taken at all Times in the Year, and plenty of stone and Brick, with good Timber, suitable for building Vessels and Houses, near to be had very plenty; with Saw-mills on said River, for the Sawing plank &c. with many other valuable conveniences: Whereupon he prayed this Assembly to grant him a Lottery of about Twenty Six Thousand Pounds; in which Lottery he the Petitioner will put to Sale One Hundred and Twenty four Lots of Land (with two dwelling Houses thereon) part of the aforesaid Farm, adjoining to the aforesaid River, none less than a Quarter of an acre, and some half acres at a certain value put on them by two judicious and disinterested Men, namely, Capt. Isaac Sheffield and Capt. Elias Thompson. The sale of which Lots will enable the Petitioner to pay his just debts &c."

The Assembly accordingly passed a resolution authorizing Col. Pendleton to dispose of his property by a lottery, the scheme for which appears at length upon the records. From this transaction there sprang up the settlement which has been known to the present day by the name of "Lottery Village," although the U. S. Government has recently established a Post-office there under the non-significant name of "Avondale."

In connection with this lottery some items from the "Diary of

Joshua Hempstead" (pub. by the New London County, Conn. Hist. Soc.) are of interest:

"Wednsd. July 1, 1752, fair. in the foren I went to Westerly to Colln. Pendletons and Capt Silas Greenman's with 13 Tickets of Pendleton's Lottery &c. ye 13 Tickets are 9 of ym Blanks & 4 Prizes, 1 is Lott N for which I got a Deed Executed & Recorded to Richd Conkling of [Ston]ington The other 3 are 2. £ 12 & 1 £ 8. all £32 deduction is £3, 4s 0d. & I [gett]ing the Deed 10s. All £3. 14s 0d. Due £28 6s. 0d. I dined at Colln Pendletons . . ." (p. 591).

[Sept.] "Mond. 23d fair. In the foren. I went to Colln Pendleton after Lottery Money yet none." (p. 596.)

[Jany. 1753.] "Wednsd 31 fair & windy N.W. I was att home most of the Day. I sent 4 of Colln. Pendletons Benefit Lottery Tickets 3 £ 32 1 set 80 to Capt. Silas Greenman by Mr. Stilman."

In August, 1752, the report of Col. Pendleton's lottery showed that £783-12 was due the Colony. By a vote in October, 1754, it appears that he gave bond for this amount payable in one year with interest, and then upon payment of one-half he was allowed to retain the balance for another year. (Stiness's "A Century of Lotteries in Rhode Island," pp. 5-7.)

In those days lotteries were not under the ban of the government as at present, nor were they regarded askance by our forefathers; indeed lotteries conducted by churches were not uncommon. Col. Joseph was himself a member of the First Church at Stonington, and in 1742 with other members from Charlestown and Westerly, helped to form another church at Westerly of which he was one of the Council.

A second petition presented by Col. Joseph Pendleton to the Rhode Island Assembly in December, 1750, asking that he be given administration on the estate of his son, Joseph<sup>5</sup>, Jr., shows that he was doubly unfortunate in the loss of his brigantine, as this son had sailed on the missing ship. As this petition relates to Joseph,<sup>5</sup> we have given it in full under our account of him.

Col. Joseph<sup>4</sup> Pendleton's will (see Appendix VIII) was dated at Westerly, R. I., 13 March, 1760, and filed 26 May, 1761. The inventory of his estate amounted to £6392, and included a "silver belted sword" valued at £50, a silver watch at £50, a schooner called the "Industry" lying in the Pawcatuck River, "with Long-Boat and all the utensils unto her belonging," valued at £1600, wearing apparel at £248, etc. (West. C. & P. rec., iii, 654-5.)

Joseph<sup>4</sup> Pendleton married at Newport, R. I., 9 January, 1723/4, Sarah Worden (Trinity Ch. Rec.), whose parentage has not been determined.

19. (COL.) WILLIAM<sup>1</sup> PENDLETON (*Joseph*<sup>3</sup>), was born at Westerly, R. I., 23 March, 1704, was baptized at the First Church of Stonington, Conn., 28 May, 1704, and died at Westerly 23 August, 1786. He was admitted freeman at Westerly, 4 May, 1731, and his long life was spent in that town as one of its most prominent citizens.

In 1742 he was one of the Council of the First Church of Stonington appointed to form a church at Westerly. The records of this church state that on the 8th of April, 1752, "Deacon William Pendleton desired to commune with us which was granted." March 22, 1752, "The Revd Mr. Park being returned from Boston, at the desire of Deacon Pendleton preached from Jeremiah ye 8-2."

In June, 1746, he was appointed a Justice of the Peace at Westerly and served as such for several years thereafter. On the 11th of Nov., 1746, he was directed by the Rhode Island Assembly to repair at cost of colony the government's part of the Pawcatuck Bridge; his appointment refers to him as "Captain." In 1747 he was a Deputy from Westerly to the Assembly and in May of that year was appointed Major in the third regiment of the King's County Militia.

The following year he was re-elected to the Assembly and in June was appointed Lieutenant Colonel of his regiment. He continued as such during 1749 and in 1750 became Colonel of the regiment, an office which he held for ten years. In 1757, during the French and Indian War, he was appointed Muster Master, and in 1758, the Assembly voted to pay Col. Pendleton £71, 4s. for expenses in raising his regiment in 1756 (R. I. Col. Rec.). Among various items in the Westerly records relating to him we find that on "February 8, 1757, Col.<sup>o</sup> Wm. Pendleton Col.<sup>o</sup> of the Regiment of King's County Appeared before this Council & pray allowance of £12 for Numbering the Inhabitants of this town aced. to act of assembly. had an order" (West. C. & P. Rec., iii, 509). It also appears that on the 30th of August, 1762, it was "Voted that Col. Wm. Pendleton have an order to the town treasurer for the sum of £55, 1s. old tenor for his expenses the Last Inferior Court he being Employed in behalf of the town" (West. C. & P. Rec., iv, 13).

Col. Pendleton was one of the wealthiest men in Westerly. The tax list for the town in 1757 shows that he was assessed £2, 12s.—a greater sum than that paid by all the other Pendletons there combined—and the Rhode Island census of 1774 says that he owned a slave. There is also a tradition to the effect that during the Revolu-

tion he fitted out two privateers which were captured by the British. However that may be, it cannot be denied he served his country faithfully in that struggle while acting as President of the Westerly Town Council.

This office Col. Pendleton held continuously from 1762 to 1781, and while the war was in progress, the councillors, besides their usual duties, raised soldiers for the army, furnished them with clothing, and had charge of all matters relating to the local defense.

Col. Pendleton further showed his patriotism by subscribing £40 to the Continental Loan Office in 1779, and £4 more at a later date to help make up the deficiency at Westerly ("Town Meetings," iv. 131, 5). In July, 1780, the Rhode Island Assembly appointed him to receive recruits at Westerly. (R. I. Col. Rec., ix, 126.)\*

Another tradition relating to Col. William Pendleton says that he was a good deal of a sportsman, spending much of his time in hunting, accompanied by a negro slave, "Jack," and two dogs, "Prince" and "Granger." He carried two horns of powder with him, which he considered a day's sport to empty. There is much likelihood that there is more than a grain of truth in this tradition, as the Colonel's great-grandson, Hadlai F. Pendleton, of Norwich, N. Y., who is the authority for this anecdote, as well as many others relating to the early Pendletons, has Col. William's old powder-horns, and we have seen that the Rhode Island Census showed that he was the owner of a slave. We have, however, found no records relating to the dogs.

Col. William Pendleton's will, dated at Westerly, R. I., 18 August, 1785 (See Appendix VIII), was probated 30 October, 1786.

William<sup>4</sup> Pendleton married (1), at Stonington, Conn., 10 March, 1725/6, Lydia Burrows, daughter of John, Jr., and Lydia (Hubbard) Burrows. She was born at Groton, Conn., 19 April, 1703, and died at Westerly, R. I., 18 August, 1750. On the 27th of July, 1752, Col. William Pendleton requested the Town Council of Westerly to appoint him guardian of his children by his former wife, so that he could receive the legacies given said wife by her father, John Burrows, late of Groton, dec. (C. & P. Rec. iii, 323).

William<sup>4</sup> married (2), at Stonington, Conn., 4 April, 1751, (25 April in First Ch. Stonington Rec.), Mrs. Mary Chesebrough, widow of Zebulon Chesebrough, Sr., and daughter of John and Lucia (Stanton) McDowell. ("History of Stonington.")

In 1777, three boats containing seven men each were sent out by Westerly to join Gen. Spencer's attack upon the British at Newport. In passing Point Judith two of the boats were upset and of the fourteen men thrown overboard, eight were drowned. Several of the Pendletons were in this disaster, as shown by the report of the Committee which had been appointed by the R. I. Assembly to secure a list of the personal property lost by the unfortunates. This report (dated 3rd Jany., 1779) states that Isaac Pendleton, "dec." lost "One gun, one knapsack, one new pair of broadcloth breeches with turtleshell buttons; one shirt, one pair of yarn stockings, one linen handkerchief, one felt hat, one pot weighing 22 pounds, one large wooden bowl; all at £11 4s." It would appear from this report that Isaac was among those who lost their lives off Point Judith, and the grandchildren of his brother, Nathan<sup>5</sup>, state that such was the case. Isaac<sup>5</sup> was unmarried.

20. (LIEUT.) JOSHUA<sup>4</sup> PENDLETON (*Joseph*), was born at Westerly, R. I., 22 February, 1705, and died at Guilford, Conn., 29 February, 1760 (T. R.), or 28 February, 1760 (G. S.). His mother and step-father, Samuel Rogers, removed from Westerly to Branford, Conn., about 1725, and it is not unlikely that Joshua went with them, as on the 12th of February, 1727/8, he bought of Abial Eliot for £22 a tract of land in the adjoining town of Guilford (Guilford Deeds, iv, 18). On the 25th of April, 1729, Eliot mortgaged to him an adjacent lot of one quarter acre (*ibid.*, p. 92), and on the 23rd of the following December he sold or mortgaged to Eliot the property he owned in Guilford.

Not long afterward he returned to Westerly, where on the 27th of March, 1732, with his wife Dorothea as a party to the deed, he sold to Stephen Wilcox about 100 acres of land with house, etc., thereon, "It being part of Capt. James Pendleton's farm" (W. L. E., v, 345-6). On the same day he bought of Wilcox for £650 land in Stonington, Conn. (Stonington Deeds, iv, 298).

Joshua does not appear to have settled at Stonington immediately, as in October, 1733, he was admitted freeman at Westerly (T. R.), but he is called "of Stonington" in the deed he and his wife made

to John Richmond of their Stonington property, 15 January, 1734 (Stonington Deeds, iv, 502-3). They went back to Guilford soon after this date, where on the 9th of April, 1736, Joshua bought of Daniel Hubbard for £304, three and three quarters acres of land with house and other buildings thereon (Guilford Deeds, v, 231). On the 17th of April, 1741, he bought an additional tract of land on the "Great Ox Pasture."

After these various movings about, Joshua settled down permanently at Guilford, where he spent the rest of his life except for such time as he was in the Colonial army during King George's War. Like nearly all the men of his day he engaged in farming and stock raising, but to no considerable extent; his will shows that his chief occupation was tanning, with its old time adjunct of making shoes, and that he carried on this business in a large way at Guilford.

Outside of his being one of those chosen to build a wharf at Jones's Bridge in 1744, he does not appear to have taken much active part in the civil affairs of the town, but he was deeply concerned in the military enterprises of the Colony. In February, 1745, the Connecticut Assembly appointed Joshua Pendleton of Guilford "To be Ensign in the Regiment of Foot to be raised and sent from this Government on the expedition against his Majesties enemies at Cape Breton, etc. and orders that he be commissioned accordingly." (Conn. Col. Rec.) This regiment saw active service in the first campaign against Louisburg, and it is reasonable to suppose that Joshua was one of Pepperell's hardy New Englanders who besieged that fortress and effected its capitulation, 17 June, 1745.

After such an adventure as this it was to be expected that Joshua would continue to take an active interest in military affairs, and we accordingly find that in May, 1748, the Assembly appointed him Ensign of the 2nd Company or Train Band in the 7th Regiment of the Colony, and that in May, 1755, he was commissioned Lieutenant in the same Company and Regiment (Conn. Col. Rec.). A reference to his soldier life is made in his will in which he leaves to his son, Increase, "My Artillery and Implements of War." This will, dated 27 February, 1758, proved 4 March, 1760 [See Appendix VIII], names wife, Dorothea, son Increase, and daughter, Deborah Fowler.

Lieut. Joshua<sup>4</sup> Pendleton married Dorothea Ward, daughter of Capt. Andrew and Deborah (Joy) Ward of Killingworth, Conn. (Goodwin's "Genealogical Notes"). She was born 4 January, 1708, and died at Guilford, 5 November, 1763.

21. EDMUND<sup>4</sup> PENDLETON, JR. (*Edmund*<sup>3</sup>), was born probably at Westerly, R. I., and died early in 1789, at Stratford, Conn. He was admitted freeman at Westerly, R. I., 7 June, 1732 ("Town Meetings," Book I, p. 52), and was an inn-keeper there for a number of years, as the Town Council and Probate records show he was licensed annually to sell "strong liquor" between 1744 and 1752.

On the 28th of September, 1747, Edmund Pendleton, Jr., was made bondsman for Lieut. John Garner, "Late of Stonington, now Cohabiting in this town" (C. & P. rec., iii, 126), and in 1750 he was administrator of his father's estate.

On the 25th of March, 1754, it was voted by the Town Council of Westerly, "That the Clerk of this Council Give a Certificate to ye Selectmen of Stratford that We do own Edmund Pendleton his wife and family to be inhabitants of this Town & as Such Will Receive them from that town When required" (C. & P. rec., iii, 398).

Edmund<sup>4</sup> Pendleton probably removed to Stratford shortly after receiving this certificate, and the rest of his life was undoubtedly passed in that town. Both Edmund and his wife were living in 1786, as shown by the will of their son, Solomon (Appendix VIII), which reads: "In consideration of the care and tenderness of my dear parents to me in my infancy I do give and bequeath unto my brother Daniel five hundred pounds sterling the value thereof in landed property. . . . on consideration that my said brother Daniel do support and maintain them in a comfortable manner during their lifetime."

On the 29th of January, 1789, William Pendleton was appointed administrator on Estate of Edmund Pendleton, late of Stratford, deceased (Stratford Conn. Prob. rec., ii, 19). The inventory taken the following day and submitted 3 February, 1789, included only furniture and wearing apparel to the total of £15 13. 9. (Ibid., ii, 20.)

On the 26th May, 1792, administrator's account against estate of Edmund Pendleton was allowed.—£6 10 6 (Ibid., iii, 82).

Edmund<sup>4</sup> Pendleton's marriage evidently did not occur until he was a middle-aged man. Five of his sons took active parts in the Revolutionary war, and the record of their services shows them to have formed an exceedingly patriotic family.

Edmund<sup>4</sup> married at Stonington, Conn., 9 April, 1738, Susannah King (Stonington Ch. rec.).

Issue, first five from Westerly, R. I., records:

65. Edmund<sup>5</sup>, 3rd, b. 8 June, 1738. He was undoubtedly the Edmund Pendleton of Stratford, Conn., who served as a private in Capt. Isaiah Baldwin's mounted company, Col. Andrew Burr's regiment, from Aug. 7th to Aug. 23rd, 1757, at the time of the alarm for the relief of Fort William Henry and

"adjacent vicinity" (Conn. Hist. Soc. Collections, Vol. ix, p. 200; French & Indian War Rolls). While the record does not refer to him as Edmund, *Jr.*, yet his father was nearly sixty years of age at this time and would not have been likely to have undertaken such an expedition.

It is evident that Edmund<sup>5</sup> died unmarried, as the Probate Records at Fairfield, Conn. (1764-1767, p. 137), show that on the 25th of Sept., 1765, William "Pembleton" of Stratford was appointed administrator on the estate of Edmund "Pembleton," late of Stratford, deceased, and gave bond. The accounting was not filed until the 7th of March, 1792, when the administrator submitted his statement showing that the estate in 1765 amounted to £112. 7. 0., and in 1766 expenses to said estate were £1. 19. 0. The balance was divided equally among the heirs, Solomon, Daniel, David, and William Pendleton,— "D." Pendleton signing as executor to Solomon Pendleton, deceased,—who certified over their signatures "that s<sup>d</sup> Pendleton estate is settled as per this Acct. Current" (Ibid., 1787-1792, p. 505).

67. Daniel, b. 20 Feby., 1744; m. Elizabeth —.

68. David, b. 20 Feby., 1747; d. at Weston, Conn., 11 Feby., 1826.

David Pendleton settled at Weston when a young man and lived there the rest of his life except for the period during which he served in the Revolutionary Army. He was a private in Capt. Wheeler's Co., Col. Whiting's Regt. of Conn. Militia, which marched 5th Oct., 1777, to re-enforce Gen. Putnam on the Hudson. This regiment was at Peckskill during October, 1777. On the 1st of April, 1778, David Pendleton enlisted for the war (in the room of David Jackson), in Capt. Smith's Co., 8th Regt. Conn. Line. This regiment formed part of the Continental Army under Washington and saw much hard service. It would seem that David was afterwards transferred to the 2nd Regt. Conn. Line, as his name appears on the size-rolls of Capt. Chapman's Co., that regiment, 1st Feby., 1783 ("Conn. in the Revolution"). From the publication entitled "American State Papers, Claims, Class 9," it appears that "David Pendleton of Connecticut, a Private of the 2d regiment, enlisted April 1, 1778, for the War, was wounded by a musket ball in his thigh and pensioned from May 2, 1792."

David Pendleton is well remembered by his grand-nephew, Edmund Pendleton, of New Haven, Conn., who as a boy often visited the old Revolutionary. Mr. Pendleton states that David was wounded at the battle near Ridgefield, Conn. (26th April, 1777), and that he always maintained a great interest in all matters relating to the War of Independence, collecting quite a library bearing upon that subject.

David<sup>5</sup> never married and that he was a confirmed bachelor is implied in the will of his brother, Solomon Pendleton (1786), which refers to him as ". . . My brother David being a single man and from his disposition not likely to be otherwise . . ." David's own will, dated 6th June, 1820, filed 14th Feby., 1826 [See Appendix VIII], is of much value, as it mentions the brother, James, whose name does not elsewhere appear of record.

69. Solomon, b. 15 Feby., 1751; d. in New York City, 1787, unmarried. Solomon Pendleton lived at Derby, Conn., for a short time, as he sold his land there near the Meeting House Hill to his brother, Daniel, then of Waterbury, on the 12th Dec., 1774 (Derby Land Records, x. 55). He removed to Schenectady, N. Y., shortly afterwards, as upon the outbreak of the Revolutionary War he was commissioned, 20th Oct., 1775, as 2nd Lieut. of the 2nd Co., 2nd Albany County Regt, Schenectady District (N. Y. Calendar of Hist. Mss.). Prior to this he had been an enlisted man in the 1st Regt. Albany Co. Militia ("New York in the Revolution"). On the 7th of Nov., 1775, he was commissioned 2nd Lieut. in the 4th New York regiment, becoming 1st Lieut. in June, 1776, and 1st Lieut. of the 7th Co., 5th N. Y. Regt., 21st Nov., 1776 (Ibid.).

Upon the reorganization of the state soldiery in 1777, Col. Courtland in a letter to the Commissioner of Arrangement, dated 25th Feby., 1777, recommended Solomon Pendleton for a commission as follows: "Give me lieve S<sup>r</sup> to recommend to your Notice Lieut Solomon Pendleton who served in Col<sup>l</sup> Wynkoop's Regt. last year as their is no Vacancy for a first Lieut in my Regt. he may perhaps be placed in some other" (N. Y. Cal. of Hist. Mss.). He was accordingly commissioned 1st Lieut. of the 7th Co., 5th Battalion, [Regt.] New York Continentals in 1777, ranking as the ninth 1st Lieut. in the five regiments raised in New York. In 1776 he had ranked as third 1st Lieut. in the 4th Regt. (Ibid.)

In Oct., 1777, the 5th New York was stationed at Fort Montgomery, and was captured by the British in the disaster that befell the American forces there on the sixth of that month. Lieut. Pendleton remained a prisoner of war for over three years, part of which time he spent in the infamous prisons of New York City. In Vol. 7 of the Penn. Magazine it is stated that Solomon Pendleton was among those on parole at New Utrecht in 1778. His name was still borne upon the roster of his regiment in May, 1779, where it appears marked "Supernumery" ("N. Y. in the Rev."). Lieut. Pendleton was not released from captivity until the 8th of Feby., 1781, when Abraham Skinner, Commissary-General of Prisoners, effected his exchange (Saffell's "Records of the Revolutionary War." p. 322).

Solomon did not return to the army. Immediately upon his

release he went to Philadelphia, Penn., where, as stated in Westcott's "Names of Persons who took the oath of allegiance to the state of Penn. between the years 1777 and 1789," "Solomon Pendleton belonging to the state of New York, with a pass from Justice Van Tassel of Winchester, York state," took the oath on the 20th of Feby., 1781. Not long afterwards he went to Georgia, where, according to his grand-nephew, Edmund Pendleton, of New Haven, Conn., he became a surveyor of Government lands and received large grants for his services. At any rate, Solomon became possessed of considerable property in Chatham and Effingham Counties, that state, during the next few years. These tracts he bequeathed to his friends and brothers at the time of his death in New York City early in 1787. His will, dated 23rd Dec., 1786, filed 3rd Feby., 1787 [see Appendix VIII], shows that his parents were still alive and so establishes the identities of the Edmund Pendleton who died in 1765 and the other one who died in 1789.

An echo of Solomon Pendleton's war experience is found in the very first bequest in this will, which reads: "And whereas I stand indebted to Willimpee Neepsa (?) young woman in the State of New York for which she has my note of hand for forty pounds this currency given about four years ago, this money I had of her when I was a prisoner on Long Island, wherefore my will is that she be paid sixty pounds sterling (money of Georgia) in compensation for her kindness when I was a prisoner and in want of money."

70. James, b. 12 June, 1756, probably at Stratford, Conn.; m. Sarah Lyons.

(?) Isaac, b. ——. An Isaac Pendleton, soldier of the Revolution, is said to have been of Waterbury, Conn., in the History of that city. Daniel<sup>5</sup> enlisted from that place, and the name of "Isaac" has been "handed down" among the descendants of Edmund<sup>4</sup> who have been noteworthy in that practice. None of the descendants, however, can recollect having heard of an Isaac Pendleton belonging to this generation, nor has anything been found of record showing that an Isaac Pendleton should be included among the sons of Edmund<sup>4</sup>.

22. HANNAH<sup>4</sup> PENDLETON (*Edmund*<sup>3</sup>), was baptized 28th July, 1700 (First Ch. Stonington, Conn.), and died in 1751, at Westerly, R. I. She married James Britton, of Dighton, Mass. That he was the James<sup>5</sup> Britton, son of William<sup>4</sup> and Lydia (Leonard) Britton, and grandson of William and [6] Mary<sup>3</sup> (Pendleton) Britton, or Bretton, seems evident from the facts that on the 3rd of June, 1733, he, "James Brettan of Bristol [County]. Mass." was given a deed by Caleb<sup>3</sup> Pendleton to all the latter's rights in the estate of his grandfather, Brian Pendleton, and of his father, James Pendleton (Rockingham Co., N. H. Deeds, xx. 228), and that in the settlement of

his own estate, of which his widow was appointed administratrix, 19th October, 1736, Caleb "Pembleton" was paid £24, William "Brittain" £12, and Ebenezer "Brittain" £7 13s. (Bristol Co., Mass., Prob. Rec., x, 172). William and Ebenezer Britton, as shown in our account of [6.] Mary<sup>3</sup> (Pendleton) Britton-Cross-Morey, were sons of William<sup>4</sup> and Lydia (Leonard) Britton, and as far as the records show no Brittons were living in Dighton or Taunton at this period except the descendants of [6.] Mary<sup>3</sup>.

The will of Hannah<sup>4</sup> (Pendleton) Britton, dated at Westerly, R. I., 25th July, 1751, probated 26th August, 1751 (C. & P. Rec. iii, 270), gave £8 8s. to aunt Anna Jones,\* rest of estate to daughter Hannah: in case Hannah died without issue, estate to go to brother Edmund Pendleton, and sisters Mary, Dorothy, and Rebecca. Oliver Steward was named as executor. The inventory amounted to £715 19s. 10d.

The children of James and Hannah<sup>4</sup> (Pendleton) Britton were (order uncertain):

- i. Mary<sup>5</sup>. "Mary Briton of James, late of Dighton, Mass., d. 23 Dec., 1750" (Westerly rec., ii, 4).
- ii. Hannah. On the 25th March, 1751, "Hannah Briton daughter of James Briton late of Diton in ye County of Bristol, deceased, and Hannah, his wife," chose her mother for guardian (Westerly C. & P. rec., iii, 258). Not long after her mother's death she m. Job Gardner, as on the 24th of Feby., 1752, Job Gardner gave to Oliver Steward as executor of Hannah (Pendleton) Britton's estate, a receipt for £654 15s. 10d., it being, as Gardner says, "My wife's portion or part of said estate, wherefore the said Gardner did acquit and discharge said Steward Executor from said estate."

24. REBECCA<sup>4</sup> PENDLETON (*Edmund<sup>3</sup>*), was born probably at Westerly, R. I.; her date of death is unknown. She married, 20 August, 1741, Oliver Steward (Stewart). (First Church, Stonington, rec.), born 12 February, 1719, son of William and Sarah (Church) Steward ("History of Stonington," p. 603). For some years after their marriage they lived at Westerly, where Oliver bought land of Joshua Rathbun on the 9th day of the 5th month, 1746 (W. L. E., vii, 365). Prior to 1756 they removed to Stonington, as they called themselves of that town in the deed they made to Jonathan Foster of their Westerly property on the 13th of January in that year (*Ibid.*, ix, 205).

What became of this family afterwards is unknown, as none of their names appears later upon the Westerly, Stonington, or New London records. It is possible that they may have removed to Voluntown, Conn., where Oliver received a tract of land by his father's

\* This was evidently a maternal aunt and gives an opportunity to establish the parentage of Mary, wife of Edmund<sup>3</sup> Pendleton, if any will is ever found which mentions daughters Mary Pendleton and Anna Jones.

will—dated 20 October, 1753 (New London Probate rec., Book F, p. 569). The church records of Voluntown, however, do not refer to him. We have accordingly been unable to determine whether or not Oliver and Rebecca had other children besides the following three given in the Westerly records:

- i. Daniel<sup>5</sup> (Steward), b. 23 Feby., 1742/43.
- ii. Sarah, b. 7 March, 1743/44.
- iii. Rebecca, b. 31 Oct., 1746.

That they may have had other children seems not unlikely, and Mr. Edwin Vincent of New York City states he has somewhere come across a record which indicates Oliver and Rebecca had additional children, Oliver, Jr., and Dorothy.

NOTE.—A possible clue to this family may be given in the U. S. Census of 1790, in which the names of Oliver and Daniel Steward appear as residents of Cornwall, Conn., the latter, however, evidently being a minor. The Litchfield District Probate Records do not refer to them.

27. JAMES<sup>4</sup> PENDLETON (*Caleb*), was born about 1689, probably at Westerly, R. I., and died there 9 June, 1753. James Pendleton

*James Pendleton*

was baptized with his father on the 23rd July, 1693, in the First Church at Stonington, Conn. He seems to

have made his home at Westerly all his life, where he engaged in farming. On the 24th of December, 1727, he bought of his cousin, Sarah<sup>4</sup> Walker, for 10s. all her rights that she had in a certain tract of land "That was given to my Hon<sup>rd</sup> Grandfather Capt. James Pendleton deceased, by reason of his services in ye Indian War formerly, which land is in ye township of Voluntown, Conn." (W. L. E.).

On the 19th of November, 1731, James<sup>4</sup> bought of Richard Lanphere, "Eldest son and heir to Mr. George Lanphere, late of Westerly, dec.," part of George Lanphere's homestead farm for £100 (Ibid., v, 347); 18th March, 1742/3, James and his father, Caleb, gave deed to James' son, Thomas Pendleton, of land in Westerly (Ibid., iv, 41). On the 28 January, 1744/5, James Pendleton was given a certificate of residence to the selectmen of Voluntown, Conn. (Westerly C. & P. rec., ii, 400), but we do not know whether he ever went there or not.

James<sup>4</sup> Pendleton married (1), at Westerly, R. I., 12th January, 1709/10, Elizabeth Lanphere (T. R.), daughter of George Lanphere; Pendleton signed an agreement with the other heirs of Lanphere, 25 April, 1727 (C. & P. rec., 1719-1731, p. 136). He married (2), at Westerly, 6th January, 1717/18, Elizabeth Brown, daughter of Thomas, Jr. (T. R.) and Hannah (Collins) Brown.\* She was born

\* Although James<sup>4</sup> Pendleton's marriages and the names of his fathers-in-law are given upon the Westerly Records, yet his second marriage is somehow omitted from Cyrus H. Brown's "Brown Genealogy."

at Stonington, Conn., 9th May, 1694. On the 23rd March, 1735, she owned covenant to the Stonington Church. She survived her husband many years and in her old age the Town Council of West-erly made provision for her support from 1772 to 1776, during part of which time her son Samuel was paid for her maintenance.

James Pendleton's will [See Appendix VIII] confirms the following list of his children, which appears in the Westerly records:

71. James<sup>5</sup>, Jr., b. 21 Nov., 1710; m. Abigail<sup>4</sup> Brown.
72. Obadiah, b. 1st Nov., 1712; m. (1), Mrs. Rachel Hadsall; (2), Mrs. Rebecca Reynolds.
73. Elizabeth, b. 12 April, 1715; m. Joseph Elliot.
74. Christopher (twin with Elizabeth). No further record, save that he was mentioned in his father's will, 1746.

Issue by second wife:

75. Thomas, b. 3 Jan., 1718/19; m. Dorcas Dodge.
76. Samuel, b. 21 Sept., 1720; m. Phebe Hall.
77. Thankful, b. 14 July, 1725; m. Christopher Coats.
78. Read, b. 24 Feby., 1728/29; no record after 1746 when she was named in her father's will.
79. Hannah, b. 3 July, 1731; no record after 1746.
80. Ruth, b. 19 Dec., 1734; m. Elisha Brown.

28. SARAH<sup>4</sup> PENDLETON (*Caleb*<sup>3</sup>), was baptized 23 July, 1693, at Stonington, Conn.; we have no record of her death. She married Seth Lanphere, son of George Lanphere. He probably died about 1726, and she survived him as late as 4 June, 1746, when she gave Benoni Smith a receipt for her legacy in her father's will (West-erly C. & P. rec., iii, 330). In this will her father referred to her as "Being Weak and Low."

While only one of Sarah's children, Elizabeth, appears upon the Westerly vital records, the Council and Probate records of the town contain the names of eight others who were bound out to various people as follows, the first five whose ages are given appearing in the Book for 1719-1731, at pages 163-4, under date of the 30th August, 1725; while Elisha's age appears in the same book at page 224—record made 23 February, 1729/30:

- i. Aaron<sup>5</sup> (Lanphere), (b. 10 May, 1709), "he being now 16 years old on the 10 day of May last," was bound out to William Davis of Westerly to be taught the trade of a cooper.
- ii. Miriam ("Merrium") (b. 10 Oct., 1713), "aged eleven years old ye 10 day of October last," was bound out to Joseph Coats of Stonington.
- iii. Elizabeth, b. 10 Aug., 1715; she was bound out to John Thompson of Stonington, "being now ten years and 20 days old."
- iv. Mary (b. 4 Oct., 1717), "she now being seven years old the fourth day of October last," was bound out to Nehemiah Mason of Stonington. On the 31st of March, 1735, he requested

that the indenture he had on Mary Lanphere be taken up and cancelled (C. & P. rec., ii, 182).

- v. Brian, b. —; at a meeting of the Town Council held 27 Nov., 1730, it was voted "That the Council Clerk shall omit giving indenture to John Saunders of Seth Lanphere's child named Briant until further order" (C. & P. rec., ii, 50). On the 27th of March, 1738, it was voted "That Samuel Thompson of Stonington shall have an indenture of Briant Lanpheare, Doing for the s<sup>d</sup> child as Mrs. John Saunders was to do." (Ibid., p. 261).
- vi. William, b. —; at a meeting of the Town Council, 29 June, 1730, it was voted "That Mr. Briant Pendleton shall have William Lanphear son to Seth and Sary Lanphear bound out to him until he be 21 years old" (C. & P. rec., 1719-1731, p. 228). On the 29th of Aug., 1731, Briant Pendleton was cited to appear at the next Council Meeting to answer the complaints of his Apprentice William *Pendleton* (C. & P. rec., ii, 250). No further reference to this matter appears.
- vii. Ann (b. 4 Aug., 1723), "two years old ye 4th of Aug., 1725," was bound out to Joseph Coats of Stonington. The records of the First Church there show that "Anna, daughter of Seth Lanphere," was bapt. 1 Nov., 1741.
- viii. Isaac, b. —; on the 30th of Dec., 1734, Isaac, son of Seth and Sarah Lanphere, was bound out to Joseph Reed of Norwich, Conn. (C. & P., ii, 174).
- ix. Elisha (b. 25 Feby., 1727), "three years old 25th of Feby., 1729/30," was bound out to Samuel Hinckley, Jr., of Stonington. On the 27th of April, 1730, "Ye child of Sarah Lanpheare and Seth Lanpheare called Elisha Lanpheare" was bound out to Samuel Hinckley (C. & P. rec., 1719-1731, p. 227), and on the following 27th of Nov. he was bound out to Noah Grant of Stonington (C. & P., ii, 50).

**NOTE.**—Austin's "Genealogical Dictionary of Rhode Island" contains the names of six of these children, but does not mention Brian, William, and Isaac.

30. CALEB<sup>4</sup> PENDLETON, JR. (*Caleb*<sup>3</sup>), was baptized 6 June, 1697, at Stonington, Conn. (First Ch. Rec.), and died in 1740, at Colchester, Conn. He was living at Westerly, R. I., as late as the 9th of January, 1736/7, when he witnessed the will of James Babcock of that town. On the 11th of March following, he bought from William and Hannah Douglas, and John and Elizabeth Douglas, a hundred acre farm in Colchester, Conn., for which he paid £800 (Colchester Land Records, v, 1). He removed to Colchester shortly afterwards, and the records of that town show he was admitted a free-man there, 1 April, 1740. His death occurred not long afterwards,

as his will, dated 15 May, 1740, was probated 10 June, 1740 [See Appendix VIII].

Caleb<sup>4</sup>, Jr., was evidently in prosperous circumstances for those days, as the inventory of his estate amounted to over £1600; it included among other items: farm, £1000; three Indian boy servants, all at £55; gun and sword, and notes due from Ichabod Randall, Benoni Smith, James Tilkey, Daniel Tennant and Peter Bulkeley. The Indian boy servants of Caleb's may have been the progenitors of the Indians bearing the name of Pendleton who have turned up in later records.

Caleb<sup>4</sup> Pendleton, Jr., married at Westerly, R. I., 25 October, 1716, Mary Randall, daughter of John and Abigail Randall;\* she was born at Stonington, 16 December, 1698. Less than a year after Caleb's death, she married at Bozrah, Conn., 26 February, 1741, Stephen Stark (Fifth Book, "Early Conn. Marriages"). On the 5th of May, 1741, William Treadway of Colechester, attorney to Stephen Stark, "In right of his wife, Mary Stark, who was the widow of Caleb Pendleton of Colechester, dec.," moved the Probate Court at Hartford that her thirds or dowry of the real estate of the said deceased be set out to her (Hartford Probate Records, xiii, 88).

Caleb<sup>4</sup> Pendleton's first four children were born at Westerly, R. I., and are recorded there on p. 112, Vol. I of Town Meetings, etc. The two youngest are named in Caleb's will and perhaps were born at Colechester, Conn. These children were:

81. Abigail<sup>5</sup>, b. 10 Dec., 1717; m. — Johnson, as shown in Caleb's will. We have no further record of her, save that on the 6th March, 1747, she witnessed at Stonington, Conn., receipt given to Benoni Smith by her brother Benajah. [See Appendix II for an Abigail Pendleton, wife of — Stiles.]
82. Sarah, b. 27 July, 1723. She evidently died unmarried, as on the 14th Aug., 1749, Thomas Main, Jr., and Mary, his wife, daughter of Caleb Pendleton, late of Colechester, dec., acknowledged receipt of the legacy given by Caleb to his daughter, Sarah Pendleton, dec. (Hartford Probate Records, xiii, 113).
83. Mary, b. 2 April, 1727; m. Thomas<sup>5</sup> Main, Jr.
84. Benajah, b. 24 July, 1729; m. Mary Breed.
85. Lydia, b. 1736; m. Elisha Brown.
86. Elizabeth, b. 1740. On the 27th of June, 1758, she gave receipt to Capt. John Randall in full of what she was to receive in

\* Caleb<sup>4</sup> Pendleton named as executor of his will, "*My brother John Randall Junr.*," which is good evidence of his wife's parentage, as none of his sisters married a Randall. The "*History of Stonington*," pp. 246-7, and the "*Randall Genealogy*," p. 18, state, however, that this Mary Randall married Stephen Wilcox, and that the Mary who married Caleb Pendleton, Jr., was her cousin Mary, b. 21 April, 1500, dau. of Matthew and Eleanor Randall. The works referred to appear to have confused the marriages of these two cousins. Additional proof of the real parentage of Caleb's wife is found in a deed given by Brian Pendleton to Capt. John Randall of Stonington, "in behalf of his nephew, Benajah Pendleton," 3 Dec., 1748 (W. L. E., vii., 384).

her father's will (Hartford Probate Rec., xiii, 113). We have no further record of Elizabeth.<sup>5</sup>

31. ELIZABETH<sup>4</sup> PENDLETON (*Caleb*<sup>3</sup>), was baptized 25 June, 1699 (First Ch. Stonington, Conn.). She married Jonathan Brown. In the settlement of Caleb<sup>3</sup> Pendleton's estate, Jonathan Brown gave the executor, Benoni Smith, a receipt for his wife, Elizabeth Brown, who was named in Caleb's will as "my daughter, Elizabeth Brown" (Westerly C. & P. rec., iii, 330). This Jonathan Brown was undoubtedly Elizabeth's first cousin, Jonathan<sup>4</sup>, born 12 July, 1694, son of Eleazer and [11] Ann<sup>3</sup> (Pendleton) Brown, as is indicated by the names of their children and by the fact that they lived upon the land inherited by Ann<sup>3</sup> from her father, James<sup>2</sup> Pendleton.\*

No list of the children of Jonathan and Elizabeth<sup>4</sup> (Pendleton) Brown appears upon the vital records of Westerly, but the land and probate records of the town give us four of their names as follows:

On the 14th of June, 1756, Jonathan Brown and Elizabeth, his wife, conveyed to William "Brumley" [Bromley] land in Westerly (W. L. E., ix, 218). The index to this record reads, "William Brumley from his father Brown." William Bromley had married Elizabeth Brown, 9 November, 1743. The land records show further that Jonathan Brown and his wife, Elizabeth, made deeds of gift to their sons, Eleazer and Ebenezer, on the 28th June, 1744, and the 3rd January, 1764, respectively (Ibid., v, 324 and x, 7). They also deeded five acres to their son, "Bryan," adjoining William Bromley's land, 3rd January, 1764 (Ibid., x, 5), and sold land to William Vincent, 14th June, 1756 (Ibid., x, 218). On the same day "Bryan" Brown and Mehitable, his wife, deeded land to William Vincent.

On the 27th March, 1769, "Mrs. Elizabeth Brown, wife of Jonathan Brown, represented that her husband had sold his farm and is about to move into some distant land and one third the money s<sup>d</sup> land sold for was paid to Benjamin Wilbur by her Request for her support, and she not having security for same requests the town council that they would receive the money from Wilbur for her use and support in her old age" (C. & P. Rec., iv, 123).

Now on the 25th December, 1769, it was voted by the Town Council to pay the Town Treasurer £1. 9 1/4d. for "Briant" Brown's taxes out of the money received from Benjamin Wilbur and belonging to Mrs. Elizabeth Brown (Ibid., iv, 136). Furthermore, on the 16th July, 1762, Ebenezer Brown declared "that in the year 1756 he heard his brother Eleazer say that if he never came back he gave

\* The "Chesebrough Genealogy," p. 305, and "Amos Richardson and His Descendants" state that Jonathan, son of Eleazer and Ann (Pendleton) Brown, m. 5 Oct., 1718, Hannah Richardson, dau. of Samuel and Ann (Chesebrough) Richardson, and that he was b. 12 July, 1692, and d. 14 Jan., 1731-2. The "Brown Genealogy," p. 14, and the "History of Stonington," however, affirm that this Jonathan Brown was son of John and Elizabeth (Miner) Brown, which is more likely correct.

his son Jesse Brown to his brother Bryant Brown to do by as his own son & further saith that his s<sup>d</sup> brother died soon after." Elizabeth Brown also declared she heard her son Eleazer make this statement a little before his death (C. & P. Rec., iv, 13).

Besides these four children Jonathan and Elizabeth were undoubtedly the parents of that Jonathan Brown, entry of whose marriage upon the records of the Second Church of Stonington (now North Stonington) refers to him as "of Westerly." The contemporaneous Jonathan Brown, Jr., of Stonington, son of Jonathan and Hannah (Richardson) Brown, was only ten years old at this time.\*

An item on page 28 of Book III, Westerly "Town Meetings," also indicates that another child should be included in this family, as it states that "Jonathan Hakes and Hannah Brown, daughter to Jonathan Brown of Westerly," were married in 1752.

From the foregoing records we may set down the issue of Jonathan and Elizabeth<sup>4</sup> (Pendleton) Brown in about the following order:

- i. Jonathan<sup>5</sup> (Brown), Jr., m. 30 Sept., 1742, Elizabeth Burroughs. He may also have been the Jonathan Brown who m. at Westerly, 1 March, 1757, Elizabeth Burdick (Westerly Rec.), although this record would be equally applicable to his namesake already referred to, as would also be the following: 29th Dec., 1760, Elizabeth Brown, widow, was apptd. admx. of the estate of Jonathan Brown, Jr., and on the 26th Oct., 1761, she appeared before the Council and presented an account against the estate "for keeping two of the deceased's Orphan Children forty weeks each" (West. C. & P. Rec., iii, 636, 677). Still on the 11th of Oct., 1768, "Elizabeth Brown, widow of Jonathan Brown, late of Westerly, dec.," m. John Moon of Exeter. We do not find that the other Jonathan Brown was ever at Westerly.
- ii. Eleazer, d. probably in the French and Indian War; m. 10 Nov., 1742, Sarah Die [Dye] (Second Ch. Stonington).
- iii. Elizabeth, b. 1724; d. at Westerly, R. I., 15 Sept., 1813, ae. 89 (G. S.); m. 9 Nov., 1743, William Bromley. (First Ch. Ston. Rec.) Their children are given upon the Westerly records and William Bromley's will is also to be found there. They were the parents of that Perry Bromley whose marriage to Dorcas Pendleton was the source of much perplexity. Elizabeth is not referred to in the Brown Genealogy.
- iv. Ebenezer, b. 1725; d. at North Stonington, Conn., 10 May, 1816, ae. 91 (G. S.). He operated a grist mill at Westerly near the east end of the Pawcatuck bridge until about 1799,

\* The "History of Stonington" and Cyrus H. Brown's "Brown Genealogy," p. 14, give two Jonathan Browns, Jr., in the family of Jonathan and Hannah (Richardson) Brown, the first b. 14 Aug., 1721, the second 24 June, 1732. While no date of death is given for the first one he must have died young if another child was given the same name in that family. No further record of this Jonathan, Jr., appears in either work.

when he bought a 76-acre farm in North Stonington, Conn., where he lived the rest of his life. The gravestone beside his, names as his wife, Abigail, who died 12 Sept., 1811, ae. 65 (Brown Gen., p. 533). She was probably his second wife, as there seems no doubt but that he was the Ebenezer Brown who m. at Westerly, 5 Feby., 1756, Anna Wells of Stonington, and had children (recorded upon Westerly Rec.), Caleb, Hannah, Lydia, John, Amy, Sarah, Dorothy and Nathan. On the 25th of Oct., 1790, Capt. Caleb Brown was appointed guardian of Ebenezer Brown and family (West. C. & P. Rec., v, 55). Only one child of Ebenezer's is referred to in the Brown Gen., and this one is called Joshua, b. 1782. He may have been by the second wife.

v. Brian, m. Mehitable —.

vi. Hannah, m. 25 Nov., 1752, Jonathan Hakes.

NOTE.—The Benajah Brown who married Mary Tefft at Westerly, R. I., 25 Jan., 1758, may have been another son of Jonathan and Elizabeth<sup>4</sup> (Pendleton) Brown, although no direct evidence that such was the case appears. Still, Elizabeth's brother, Caleb<sup>4</sup> Pendleton, Jr., named a son Benajah, and the "Brown Genealogy" (p. 534), shows that Ebenezer<sup>5</sup> Brown had a grandson, Benajah P. Brown. Benajah Brown and Mary Tefft are not mentioned in this book, however, nor are Jonathan Hakes and Hannah Brown referred to.

32. BRIAN<sup>4</sup> PENDLETON (*Caleb*<sup>3</sup>), was baptized 15 June, 1701, at the First Church, Stonington, Conn. We have no record of his death and few facts about him appear upon the Westerly records. He lived there and at Stonington until about 1750, when he removed to Dutchess Co., N. Y., thus becoming the first Pendleton to settle west of Connecticut.

On the 18th of October, 1727, he conveyed to James Pendleton three acres of land in Westerly, "Situated on the northwest corner of that land I now live on" (W. L. E., v, 211), and on 6th April, 1730, he sold land to his brother Caleb (*Ibid.*, v, 182).

Brian<sup>4</sup> Pendleton was admitted freeman at Westerly, R. I., 4 May, 1731. On the 29th February, 1747/8, he gave Benoni Smith receipt for legacy left him by his father, Caleb<sup>3</sup> Pendleton. This receipt was witnessed by John Pendleton (Westerly C. & P. Rec., iii, 330).

According to the schedule of Capt. James<sup>2</sup> Pendleton's will, Brian<sup>4</sup> was to receive certain lands at Watch Hill if his brother, Caleb<sup>4</sup>, Jr., died before their father, Caleb<sup>3</sup>. As this event came to pass, Brian<sup>4</sup> fell heir to this property which he disposed of by an interesting deed dated 17 February, 1752 [W. L. E., vii, 388], of which the following is an abstract:

"I, Brian Pendleton, Late of Westerly . . . R. I. . . .  
But now of Batoman's Precinct,\* Dutchess County . . . N. Y.,  
yeoman . . . for . . . £60 paid by Benajah Pendleton of

\* Probably Beekman's Precinct which was formed 16 Dec., 1737. Several towns in this precinct were settled by Rhode Islanders (Smith's "History of Dutchess County, N. Y.").

Stonington . . . Conn. . . . yeoman (son of Caleb Pendleton, late of Colchester Deed.) . . . have given, granted . . . unto Benajah Pendleton . . . released & forever quit claimed . . . a certain Tract or Parcell of Land Lying in the Town of Westerly aforesd, at a place known by ye name of Watch Hill, containing about three hundred acres . . . it being all ye Land which my honored grandfather James Pendleton Late of Westerly Deed. gave in his last will & Testament to his wife during her natural life & after her Decease to my father Caleb Pendleton Late Deed. . . . & in a schedual annexed to sd will ye sd Land was given (after my sd Father's decease) to my above sd Deceased Brother Caleb Pendleton, and that if he should die before my above sd Father Then the sd Land was given to me which both happened that my sd brother Caleb Pendleton did die before our father Caleb leaving ye aforesd Benajah to be his heir."

No record of Brian<sup>4</sup> Pendleton appears as a Grantor or Grantee of land in Dutchess County nor in those counties adjacent, and our search has failed to reveal either his will or an administration of his estate. Without such documents we cannot be sure that our record of his family is complete, as only his first four children appear upon the Westerly records and there is quite a gap in years from these to the two youngest. During this interval the son Abel must have been born, and it is possible that there may have been other children of whom we have no record.

Brian<sup>4</sup> Pendleton married at Stonington, Conn., 11 March, 1725, Anna Wilcox (First Ch. Rec.). She was probably the daughter of William and Dorothy (Palmer) Wilcox, born at Stonington, 14 June, 1700, as is indicated by deed of gift given by William Wilcox of Stonington, to his grandson, John Pendleton of Colchester, on the 2nd December, 1754 (Stonington Deeds).

Issue of Brian and Anna (Wilcox) Pendleton,—first four from Westerly records:

87. John<sup>5</sup>, b. 26 Sept., 1727; m. Jane Frink.
88. Nathan, b. 3 Dec., 1729; no further record of Nathan has been found. It is not unlikely that he was the Nathan Pembleton of Goshen, Orange Co., N. Y., 1775, ancestor of the Pembleton family of that county [See Appendix III.]
89. Anna, b. March, 1731, or 26 March, 1732 (two records); m. John Frink.
90. Caleb, b. 1 Dec., 1734; m. Hannah Closson.
91. Abel, d. 1758, in the French and Indian War. The New London, Conn., Probate records (Book 6, p. 72), show that on the 11th July, 1758, John Pendleton of Groton, with Caleb Pendleton as surety, was apptd. admr. on estate of Abel Pendleton, his brother, late of Stonington, dec. "Aug. 14, 1759, John Pendleton, Adm<sup>r</sup> on the estate of Abiel Pendleton, late of Stonington, Dec<sup>d</sup> app<sup>d</sup> in this Court & Exh<sup>d</sup> and Inventory of all the Estate of s<sup>d</sup> Dec<sup>d</sup> which he could find, viz. £20, 4s, 11d. old Ten<sup>r</sup> rec<sup>d</sup> of the Com<sup>tee</sup> of Warr in Rhode Isl Gov-

ermet, being the Bale<sup>e</sup> due to him s<sup>d</sup> Dec<sup>d</sup> for his Wages as a Soldier ie<sup>e</sup>: sum afore<sup>d</sup> is worth 22/6 Lawful Money. S<sup>d</sup> Administrator also Exh<sup>d</sup> an Acct. of his payment of a Debt due from s<sup>d</sup> dec<sup>d</sup> as also Allowance for his own trouble amounting to the afore<sup>d</sup> sum of Lawful Money. Viz. 22/6 which is allowed and on file" (Ibid., vi, 95). Abel was evidently unmarried.

92. Content, b. 9 May, 1742; m. Daniel Lamb, Jr.

93. Hannah, b. 1744; m. Collins Brown.

33. ANNE<sup>4</sup> PENDLETON (*Caleb*<sup>3</sup>), was baptized 22 August, 1703, at the First Church, Stonington, Conn. She married at Westerly, R. I., 21 May, 1724, Samuel Babcock, son of Capt. James and Elizabeth Babcock. He was born at Westerly, R. I., 15 February, 1697, and died there in 1772. On the 22d July, 1747, Samuel Babcock gave receipt to Benoni Smith for the legacies in the will of his father-in-law, Caleb Pendleton, made "To my wife Anne, son Nathan, daughter Elizabeth, and daughter Anne" (West. C. & P. Rec., iii, 329). His own will, dated 13 March, 1768, names wife Anna, sons Nathan and Samuel, Jr., daughter Thankful Babcock, and grandchildren, Joseph Smith, William Smith, and Joshua Smith (West. C. & P. Rec., iv, 197).

Issue (Babcock), first five from Westerly records:

- i. Nathan<sup>5</sup>, b. 24 Jany., 1726/7. He was a leading citizen of Westerly for many years, representing it in the R. I. Assembly in 1760 and 1761, and serving as Col. of the King's Co. Militia in the latter year. He m. (1), 19 May, 1748, Deborah Stafford; (2), 20 May, 1764, Elizabeth Brown; (3), 26 Aug., 1779, Nancy Lewis; (4), 6 Feby., 1782, Dorcas Babcock. He had issue by each marriage, sixteen ch. in all, and died at Westerly, 24 Jany., 1804.
- ii. Elizabeth, b. 6 May, 1729; d. 12 Nov., 1760; m. 19 Sept., 1754, Nathan<sup>5</sup> Smith, her first cousin,\* son of Benoni and [36] Ruth<sup>4</sup> (Pendleton) Smith.
- iii. Samuel, Jr., b. 16 May, 1731; d. at Westerly, 23 March, 1813; m. 23 Jany., 1755, Mary<sup>5</sup> Smith, his first cousin. They were the parents of twelve ch., two of whom, William and Nathan, were drowned off Pt. Judith, 2 Oct., 1777, in the disaster that befell the expedition Westerly fitted out to join Gen. Spencer on the island of Rhode Island.
- iv. Andrew, b. 12 April, 1733; prob. d. young.

\* The "Babcock Genealogy," pp. 61 and 63, states that Elizabeth, dau. of Samuel and Anne (Pendleton) Babcock, probably m. John Burdick, and that the Elizabeth Babcock who m. the Nathan Smith was the dau. of Daniel and Abigail Babcock. A comparison of the wills of Samuel Babcock, Sr., and Benoni Smith, however, shows that each names grandchildren, Joseph Smith, William Smith, and Joshua Smith, whence it becomes evident at once that the Elizabeth Babcock who m. Nathan Smith was the dau. of Samuel Babcock, Sr., and that her husband was Nathan<sup>5</sup> Smith, her first cousin.

- v. Silas, b. 31 Dec., 1734-5; d. 1760.
- vi. Thankful, b. 1736; m. Caleb Barber, of Richmond, R. I.
- vii. Anne, named in will of her grandfather, Caleb<sup>3</sup> Pendleton (1745); prob. d. young.

34. READ<sup>4</sup> PENDLETON (*Caleb*<sup>3</sup>), born probably at Westerly, R. I., married at Westerly, 31 October, 1728, John Saunders, probably son of John and Silva, or Silena, Saunders, born at Westerly, 13 October 1705, and died there in 1777.

On the 6th of March, 1747, John Saunders, Jr., gave to Benoni Smith receipt for his wife's legacy in her father's will (West. C. & P. Rec., iii, 331).

His own will, dated 19 January, 1777, recorded 25 February, 1777, at Westerly, R. I. (C. & P. Rec., iv, 344), names wife Reed, Sarah Lanphere, sons David, Benjamin, Wait and Joshua, daughter Mary Stillman.

Issue (Saunders), from Westerly Records:

- i. Mary<sup>5</sup>, b. 13 May, 1731; m. 28 Feby., 1750/51, Benjamin Stillman. Mary Stillman, gr. dau. & Benjamin Stillman, her husband, gave receipt to Benoni Smith for her legacy in will of her gr. father, Caleb Pendleton (West. C. & P., iii, 331).
- ii. Elisha, b. 29 May, 1733; not named in his father's will, 1777. He m. at Westerly, 17 May, 1758, Elizabeth Chase.
- iii. David, b. 10 May, 1738; m. 17 March, 1760, Eleanor Smith, prob. his first cousin, Eleanor<sup>5</sup>, dau. of Benoni and [36] Ruth<sup>4</sup> (Pendleton) Smith, mentioned in her father's will as "Daughter Eleanor Saunders."
- iv. Waite, b. 1 June, 1740; m. 16 Dec., 1761, Patience Elderton. He was a soldier in the Revolution, as was also his son, Waite, Jr.
- v. Benjamin, b. 8 Jany., 1742.
- vi. Joshua, b. 28 Oct., 1745.
- vii. Sarah, b. 26 April, 1747; m. 31 Oct., 1771, Nathan Lanphere, Jr.

35. SUSANNAH<sup>4</sup> PENDLETON (*Caleb*<sup>3</sup>), was born probably at Westerly, R. I., and married there, 6 August, 1724, Stephen Wilcox, son of Daniel and Mary (Wordell) Wilcox (Westerly Rec. & "History of Stonington," p. 659).

In the will of his father-in-law, Caleb Pendleton, Stephen Wilcox received "Ye money he Owed me & One Gun that he had."

Issue (Wilcox), first three from "History Stonington," p. 660:

- i. Elizabeth<sup>5</sup>, b. 23 July, 1725, prob. at Stonington, Conn.
- ii. Caleb, b. 8 June, 1727; named in will of his grandfather, Caleb<sup>3</sup> Pendleton.
- iii. Mary, b. 21 Jany., 1729.
- iv. Joshua, named in will of his grandfather, Caleb<sup>3</sup> Pendleton.

36. RUTH<sup>4</sup> PENDLETON (*Caleb*<sup>3</sup>), was born probably at Westerly, R. I., and died there in 1787. She married (1), 28 December, 1726, at Westerly, R. I., Benoni Smith; (2), Benjamin Wilbur.

Benoni Smith was executor of the will of his father-in-law, Caleb<sup>3</sup> Pendleton. He was for many years a Justice of the Peace at Westerly and also a Town Councilman. His own will, dated there 18 November, 1762 (C. & P. Rec., iv, 18), names wife, Ruth, son Nathan, daughters "Elenor" Saunders, Sarah Lanphere, Hannah Chapman, Elizabeth Burdick and Mary Babcock; grandchildren, Joseph Smith, William Smith and Joshua Smith; Mary Barber, wife of John Barber of Hopkinton (relationship not stated), and Caleb Pendleton of Stonington; the document then goes on to say "My will is that wheras I have given bond to the town of Westerly to Indemnify the town from all Cost and Charges concerning the maintaining of a bastard child born of the body of Dorcas Clark, single woman, that *my aforesaid wife and my aforesaid daughters shall equally maintain the aforesaid child so long as it may be chargeable.*" Whether this was a child or grandchild of Benoni does not appear. His wife and son-in-law, Samuel Babcock, Jr., were named as executors. Inventory amounted to £49<sup>2</sup>/<sub>5</sub> 10s.

Ruth's second marriage is not upon record, but her second husband was Benjamin Wilbur, who had also been married before. His will, dated 19 March, 1772 (Westerly C. & P. Rec., iv, 177), gives to "wife, Ruth, the use and improvement of one third part of the money that the land sold for that her former husband, Benoni Smith, Esq. died seized of." On the 2d April, 1772, she gave receipt to Joseph Wilbur, executor to Benjamin Wilbur, for £27 12s. 1d. "in full of what was given me by my former husband, Benoni Smith, and also given to me by my late husband Benjamin Wilbur, dec." (Ibid., p. 194). On the 22nd of April, 1772, she gave receipt for £50 to Joseph Wilbur in lieu of her rights of dower (Ibid., 183).

That Ruth had some difficulty with her step-children in the settlement of this estate is evident from the following: "At a meeting of the Town Council, 25 January, 1773, Mrs. Ruth Wilbur, widow of Benjamin Wilbur, being cited to appear before the Council to answer the complaint of Joseph Wilbur executor to Benjamin Wilbur [that she had concealed some of the personal property of the dec.] appeared and made oath that she had presented all the personal estate of s<sup>d</sup> dec'd to s<sup>d</sup> Executor . . . in order that s<sup>d</sup> Executor might make an Inventory of same" (Ibid., p. 203).

Ruth probably died early in 1787, as on the 19th of March in that year inventory of estate of widow Ruth Wilbur was taken by Joshua and Nathan Pendleton.

Children of Ruth<sup>4</sup> Pendleton by her first husband (from Westerly records):

Caleb Pendleton, which he had made to granddau. Hannah Smith (Westerly C. & P. Rec., iii, 331).

- iii. Nathan, b. 22 Dec., 1731; d. 18 Feby., 1732-3.
- iv. Nathan (2nd), b. 11 Feby., 1734-5; m. 19 Sept., 1754, Elizabeth<sup>5</sup> Babcock.\* [NOTE: The date of death of the first Nathan and the date of birth of the second, are reversed upon the Westerly records.]
- v. Mary, b. 2 Oct., 1737; d. 1 May, 1822; m. 23 Jany., 1755, Samuel<sup>5</sup> Babcock, Jr., son of Samuel and [33] Anne (Pendleton) Babcock.
- vi. Elizabeth, b. 22 May, 1739; m. 19 Feby., 1759, Zacharius Burdick. "Zaccheas" and Elizabeth Burdick had issue, b. at Westerly: 1. *Ruth*, b. 24 June, 1760. 2. *Smith*, b. 3 May, 1762.
- vii. Eleanor, b. 22 June, 1741; m. — Saunders. He was probably her first cousin, David<sup>5</sup> Saunders, son of John, Jr., and [34] Read<sup>4</sup> (Pendleton) Saunders, whose marriage to an Eleanor Smith occurred at Westerly, 17 March, 1760.
- viii. Sarah, b. 11 July, 1745; m. 4 March, 1762, David Lanphere. They had a child, *Benoni Smith* (Lanphere), b. at Westerly, 28 Sept., 1762.
- ix. Joseph, b. 4 April, 1749; d. 5 May, 1749.

\* She was not daughter of Daniel Babcock as stated in the "Babcock Genealogy." See footnote under [33] Anne<sup>4</sup> (Pendleton) Babcock.

## FIFTH GENERATION

37. JOSEPH<sup>5</sup> PENDLETON (*Col. Joseph<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>*), was born at Westerly, R. I., 26 October, 1724.

As far as we know Joseph<sup>5</sup> Pendleton was the first of Brian's many descendants who have been lost at sea. He sailed in his father's ill-fated brigantine which was never heard from after leaving Anquilla in August, 1749. When over a year had passed without bringing any news of the missing ship, arrangements were made to administer his estate and to care for his children.

The Colonial records of Rhode Island show the following:

"Colony of Rhode Island. To the Honable the General Assembly sitting at Providence by adjournment the first Monday in December A.D. 1750. The petition of Joseph Pendleton of Westerly in the county of Kings County, humbly sheweth, that your Petitioner's son, Joseph Pendleton, being a married man with two children, in the month of May A.D. 1749 sailed a voyage to the West Indies Islands, and the last account your Petitioner or any other of his Friends had from him was in August following, sailed Homeward bound; and is in all probability lost at Sea: since which Time, to wit, in the month of October last past, his Wife was taken away by Death, and left the two small children and some considerable personal estate in Money, Stock & Household Goods, and as he left a power of Attorney to his Wife when he went away, she being now dead, no person has any power by Law to dispose of any part of said estate for the advantage of the children, and if it should be left in such condition till the Town Council has any Right by law to grant administration to any person, great part of said Estate might be wasted, and lost to the great Disadvantage of the Children, Wherefore your petitioner humbly prays your Honors would empower the Town Council of Westerly to grant administration to some person to take an Inventory & make disposition of such part of said Estate as may be thought proper, and the money put out for the advantage of the children and your petitioner shall as in Duty bound pray &c

Joseph Pendleton."

"December 7th 1750 To the House of Magrts. Gen. Resolved that this Petition be granted

On the 25th March, 1751, Col. Joseph Pendleton and William Champlin. "the two grandfathers to the s<sup>d</sup> orphans, Joseph & William Pendleton, sons of Joseph Pendleton, Junr., who is supposed to be lost at sea since which time his widow is Dead. ask that inventory be made of estate, the property divided, and each grandfather take administration of half and care of one child" (West. C. & P. Rec., iii, 258).

On the 1st of July, 1751, inventory of his estate was presented, amounting to £1515 10s., and administration given to the two grandfathers (Ibid., pp. 261-3). On the same day Col. Joseph Pendleton as principal, with Benoni Smith and Joseph Champlin, gave bond to the town of Westerly in the sum of £1518 10s., for the proper administration by Col. Joseph of one half the personal property of Joseph Pendleton, Junr., supposed to be dead, and for the bringing up of the eldest of Joseph Junr.'s children, viz., Joseph Pendleton. This bond was not recorded until 7 July, 1769 (Westerly C. & P. Rec., iv, 118).

Joseph<sup>5</sup> Pendleton had married Anna Champlin, daughter of William and Sarah (Thompson) Champlin. She was born at Westerly, R. I., 15 January (or June), 1729, and died there in October, 1750.

Issue, born at Westerly, R. I.:

94. Joseph<sup>6</sup> (4th), b. 17 Jany., 1747; m. three times.

95. William, b. 15 July, 1749; m. Martha Brown.

NOTE.—The entry of the births of these children was not made until after their father's loss at sea, as the record names them as children of Joseph Pendleton, Jr., dec., and Anne, and notes that they were grandchildren of William "Champlain" and Sarah his wife (Westerly Town Meetings Book, 1743-1778, p. 97).

38. PATIENCE<sup>5</sup> PENDLETON (*Col. Joseph<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>*), was born at Westerly, R. I., 13 June, 1726, and died at Leyden, Mass. She married in 1744, Oliver Babcock, Jr., son of Col. Oliver and Susanna (Clarke) Babcock. He was born 16 Sept., 1722, at Westerly, R. I., and died 24 February, 1806, at Leyden, Mass.

Issue (Babcock), born at Hopkinton, R. I. (All of record there save Lucy):

39. LOIS<sup>5</sup> PENDLETON (*Col. Joseph<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>*), was born at Westerly, R. I., 22 August, 1728. She married at Westerly, 7 September, 1746, Benajah Gavitt, born there, 11 November, 1726, died prior to 1781, son of Ezekiel and Hannah (Wileox) Gavitt. Lois was living as late as 1760, when she was mentioned in her father's will. No list of her children has been found of record, and we have been able to obtain the names of only two, with no evidence as to whether she had more or not.

40. SYLVESTER<sup>5</sup> PENDLETON (*Col. Joseph<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>*), was born at Westerly, R. I., 5 August, 1730. The Westerly records show that in 1757, he paid taxes of 2s. 4d. in that town, and that he was made a freeman there, 1 May, 1760. He was evidently a privateersman in the French and Indian War, as the records of the Court of Common Pleas of Washington County (then King's County), R. I. [Book F, p. 307], show that "Sylvester Pendleton of Westerly, mariner, late master of the Privateer Schooner 'Success'" brought action against the owners of said schooner, Thomas Hazard, John Ross, and Henry Wall of Newport, to recover £5000, and judgment for £1800 and costs was given in his favor at the sitting of the Court held in August, 1763.

What became of him subsequently we have not been able to learn. His name does not appear in either the Rhode Island Census of 1774 or the United States Census of 1790, and neither his will nor any administration upon his estate is to be found.

The will of his father, Col. Joseph<sup>4</sup> Pendleton, shows that by [50] Freelo<sup>5</sup>, daughter of Col. William<sup>4</sup> Pendleton, Sylvester<sup>5</sup> had issue:

42. SIMEON<sup>5</sup> PENDLETON (*Col. Joseph<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>*), was born about 1733, at Westerly, R. I., and died there in October, 1819. Simeon

Pendleton was a farmer and lived at Westerly nearly all his life. The Westerly Tax List of

*Simeon Pendleton*

1757 shows that he was assessed two shillings there in that year. On the 21th of February, 1766, the Town Council gave him and his family a certificate of residence to the Selectmen of Stonington, Conn., but it is unlikely that Simeon remained there long, as all his children are recorded at Westerly and no reference appears stating that any of them were born elsewhere.

He was in all probability the Simeon Pendleton who served as private in Capt. Joseph Pendleton's Co., Westerly militia, in 1776, and was appointed Ensign of the 1st Westerly Co., 1st Regt. King's County Militia, in 1777 and 1778, as the other Simeon Pendleton who also lived at Westerly in those years—[221] Simeon<sup>6</sup>—would more likely be the one who was enrolled in the 3rd Westerly Co. in which were also enlisted a brother and other near relatives of that Simeon.

Simeon<sup>5</sup> Pendleton was one of the executors of the will of his father-in-law, Walter Palmer of Stonington (dated 5 October, 1785, proved 3 January, 1786), and received therefrom the house at Westerly that Palmer bought of Simeon's mother. His own will, dated at Westerly, 12 October, 1819, proved 25 October, 1819 (C. & P. Rec., Vol. 2, p. 331), names daughters Mercy, wife of Joseph Lawton; Bathsheba Babcock; Sally, wife of David Pendleton; Lucretia, wife of Lebbeus Pendleton; and son, Ethan Pendleton.

Simeon married at Westerly, R. I., 15 January, 1760 (10 January in Stonington Ch. Rec.), Mary Palmer, daughter of Walter and Mercy (Hinekley) Palmer. She was baptized at Stonington, 21 March, 1742 (Westerly Rec. and "Palmer Groups," p. 162).

The records of Mary Pendleton's marriage and the birth of her daughter, Eunice, are entered at page 102, of Book 3, Westerly "Town Meetings," but whether she had other children or not has never been determined. What became of this family is also unknown,

as our search of the Westerly records failed to discover any further reference to Ezekiel Crandall, and his name does not appear upon the U. S. Censuses of Rhode Island or Connecticut in 1790. The Census of Pittsfield, Mass., in this year, however, shows an Ezekiel Crandall there with a large family, but the Probate records of Berkshire County do not contain any reference to an estate under this name. As Mary (Pendleton) Crandall had a sister who settled in northwestern Massachusetts, it is not beyond the bounds of possibility that this Ezekiel Crandall of Pittsfield may have been originally of Westerly. This point could not be investigated further, however, as the Census of Massachusetts was not brought out until this work was nearly ready for the press.


48. (CAPT.) WILLIAM<sup>5</sup> PENDLETON (*Col. William<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>*), was born at Westerly, R. I., 11 February, 1726<sup>7</sup>, and died at Northport, Maine, 28 August, 1820 (Gravestone).

On the 3rd of March, 1751, he received from his father a deed to land at Westerly; this transfer was not recorded until 26 March, 1760, and is entered on page 354 of Book 9, Westerly Land Evidences. On the 24th of March in that year he transferred this land with "mansion house" to his brother Amos for £2000. William<sup>5</sup> was then of Stonington, Conn., and this deed was also signed by his wife Judith. William Pendleton had been admitted freeman at Westerly, 1 May, 1753 (R. I. Col. Rec., iv, Sup. 43), but subsequently removed to Stonington, where he began buying land 27 June, 1761, making successive purchases until 28 Feby., 1767, when he bought of Joseph Champlin 94 acres for £242. Some of his property was at Long Point. He was elected surveyor of highways at Stonington, 18 December, 1760 ("Town Votes," ii, 218).

Tradition says that William Pendleton owned a schooner and traded to the coast of Maine, and the History of Islesboro [p. 10] says he came there in 1769, taking up 600 acres at the extreme southern end of the Island, upon which he soon settled his family. William sold his last tract of land and his house at Stonington to John Hillard, 11 January, 1769. Previous to this he had sold to William Morgan for £612. 10s., about 85 acres at Long Point, Stonington, 3 March, 1767 (Stonington Deeds).

Islesboro, then known as Long Island, was claimed by Isaac Winslow of Boston, as a part of his wife's inheritance in the "Waldo Patent,"\* and in 1771 William Pendleton secured from him a lease

\* In 1620 King James I. of England granted about all of North America to forty noblemen, knights and gentlemen who were "The Council of Plymouth in Devon, England." This Council surrendered its charter in 1633, but previously made several grants in Maine which held good. One of these grants, known first as the "Muscongus Patent," contained nearly one thousand square miles and included the whole of the present Knox County, except the Fox Islands; Waldo County, except some towns in the western part; some of Penobscot County, and Long Island, which was supposed to be within three miles of the mainland. In course of time this grant came into the possession of General Samuel Waldo—who died in 1759—and has ever since been known as the Waldo Patent (Williamson's "History of Belfast, Me.," p. 36).

of the property upon which he and his sons had settled. This lease reads as follows ("Hist. of Islesboro," pp. 93-4):

"Lease from Isaac Winslow to William Pendleton, 1771."

"This Indenture of Lease, made the twenty-second day of May, one thousand seven hundred and seventy-one, and in the eleventh year of his Majesty's reign, between Isaac Winslow, of Roxbury, in the county of Suffolk, Esq., on the one part, and William Pendleton, of an island in Penobscot bay, in the county of Lincoln and province aforesaid, known by the name of Winslow's Island, or Long Island:

That the said Isaac Winslow, for the consideration hereafter mentioned, hath demised, leased, and farm let, and by these presents doth lease unto said Pendleton a certain tract of land on Winslow's Island aforesaid, where the said Pendleton now resides, containing six hundred and twenty acres more or less, for and during the term of twenty-five years from the date hereof. And the said William Pendleton, for himself, his heirs and assigns, doth hereby covenant and agree with the said Isaac Winslow that he will cut, clear up and keep down yearly, and every year during said term, ten acres of said land, and subdue the same, so that the whole shall be cleared during said term, and shall be brought to good mowing or tillage. That he will make no strip or waste, or cut any wood off any other part of the land than what he subdues in the manner aforesaid. That he will pay all taxes the premises may be subject to during said lease. That he will in every respect manage and improve the said land in an husbandlike manner, and at the expiration of said lease will deliver up the herein-leased premises to the said Winslow, his heirs or assigns, with what buildings there may be thereon, and with all the improvements which shall be made, and under proper fencing. And the said Pendleton also engages that he will reserve such lots of wood in proper places, as may be needful for the use of such farm or farms, as shall be on the premises, and that he (be) careful not to plow the same piece of land too often, and such as he doth plow he will dung, and after proper plowing he will sow the same with grass seed.

And the said Winslow on his part, and for his heirs, executors and assigns, doth hereby covenant and agree with the said Pendleton that he or his heirs or assigns shall quietly possess and enjoy the premises hereby leased during the term of twenty-five years, and that at the expiration thereof, and on his compliance on his part with the covenant hereby entered into, he the said Pendleton, his heirs, etc., shall be entitled to a deed of fifty acres of the land hereby leased, such as shall be equal in quality to the rest, taking into consideration the value of the leased premises as they lay, and which shall be accordingly granted to him and his heirs forever.

In witness whereof we have hereunto interchangeably set our hands and seals, this twentieth day of November, 1771.

Few of the other settlers at Long Island troubled themselves to take out such leases, and the Revolutionary War coming on left them in undisturbed possession of the lands they had taken. In the early days of this conflict some of the islanders occasionally traded with the British, and the Committee of Correspondence chosen at St. George's, 6 June, 1775, wrote William Pendleton on July 17th as follows in regard to his share in this trade ("Hist. of Warren, Me.," p. 170):

"To Capt. William Pendleton.

Sir: We can not think proper for you to contract any trade which we suppose is for the king's troops, which you no by the Congress orders is contrary to our obligations, which we are determined to adhere to.

Per orders of the committee.

J. SHIBLES, Clerk."

That William Pendleton had no Royalist leanings, however, is shown by the fact that on the 3rd of June, 1776, he was chosen at St. George's, Captain of the 7th Co., Col. Mason Wheaton's (4th Lincoln Co.) Regiment of Massachusetts Militia, and was commissioned as such the 3rd of July following (Mass. Soldiers in the Revolution). It is unlikely that he saw active service, as the British held Castine throughout the war, and the few inhabitants of the neighboring islands, irrespective of their patriotism, were forced from their unprotected position to maintain neutrality for the sake of their homes and families.

After the close of the war and the death of Isaac Winslow and his wife, Gen. Henry Knox, whose wife as a granddaughter of Gen. Samuel Waldo had a one fifth share in his patent, bought up the interests of the other heirs in 1793, and thus became sole proprietor of the Waldo Patent outside of what had previously been alienated. As the quit claim deed given Knox by the Waldo heirs could grant only such lands as they were actually in possession of, and as large tracts had been taken up by settlers who came during the Revolution and afterwards, it was necessary to put the grantee in possession by actual entry upon these lands, and by "livery and seizin made by sod and twig." This legal ceremony was gone through with by the attorneys for Knox and the Waldo heirs upon the lots of 497 settlers in Warren, Waldoboro, Thomaston, Islesboro, etc., in the autumn of 1793. When Knox tried to realize upon his speculation, however, he met with stubborn opposition from the settlers who had

taken up these lands by "squatters' rights" and assumed they had perfect title thereto (Eaton's History of Thomaston and Rockland, p. 207).

The Massachusetts Legislature was finally appealed to by both sides to settle this dispute, and on the 9th March, 1797, a commission was appointed to "settle and declare their rights." On the 3rd August, 1799, an agreement was made at the house of Major Philip Ulmer in Duck Trap (Lincolnvile) between Gen. Knox and many of the Islesboro settlers, under which three surveyors were appointed to ascertain if the center of Islesboro was within three miles of the mainland. If not, the settlers agreed to bear the expense of the survey, as Knox could then have no claim to the island, but if otherwise, then "John Harkness (surveyor) shall immediately proceed to the running out of the lots referred to the commissioners, appointed by the Legislature of the Commonwealth." As it was found from this survey that Knox had good title to the island, the settlers secured deeds from him to the lands they occupied. William Pendleton received his deed on the 13th November, 1799, and paid Knox \$258.33 for same (Hancock Co., Me., Deeds, vii, 19).

Some years previous to this William had sold to his son Jonathan for £200 his homestead farm at Islesboro, and on the same day—15 May, 1794—the Ensign Islands for £15 (Hancock Co. Deeds, ii, 448, 449).

Before the settlement with Knox was in sight and while the inhabitants believed Long Island lay more than three miles off shore, they petitioned the General Court under date of 22 October, 1788, to incorporate Long Island and the smaller islands near by into a town to be known as Winchester. The Legislature acted favorably upon this petition, and on the 28th of January, 1789, passed an act incorporating Long Island Plantation and the islands adjacent into a town by the name of Islesboro.\*

A town meeting was called 17 March, 1789, and at the first meeting held the following 6th of April, Capt. William Pendleton was chosen one of the first selectmen of Islesboro. He was re-elected 19 April, 1790, after which term he passed his office over to younger men (History Islesboro, pp. 36-39).

With advancing years the infirmities of age came upon him and he could no longer care for his remaining property. On the 2d April, 1814, he sold to his son Jonathan the remainder of his estate at Islesboro for \$1200 (Hancock Co. Deeds, xxxvi, 178). Jonathan then arranged for the care of his father and step-mother as shown by the bond he received 7th May, 1816, in the sum of \$700 from Nicholas White and Eliza, his wife, of Vinal Haven, as surety that they would give maintenance to "William Pendleton and Priscilla his wife . . . suitable for them in their advanced years" (Han-

\* Although Islesboro was not known as such until this date, and though Maine was not set off from Mass. until 1820, yet to prevent confusion we shall hereafter refer to Long Island, or Islesboro, County of Waldo, District of Maine and State of Mass., as Islesboro, Maine, irrespective of the date.

cock Co. Deeds, xxxvi, 179). Not long after this, however, William removed to Northport and lived with his son Henry until his death, which occurred at the great age of ninety-three years. Tradition says that after his decease his widow returned to Stonington, Conn.

The descendants of William<sup>5</sup> Pendleton are very numerous and are scattered all over the United States, and in foreign countries as well. Originally a sea-faring race, some of them still follow that pursuit, but the great majority to-day seek their fortunes ashore.

No record exists of Capt. Pendleton's first marriage, but as we have seen in the deed he gave his brother Amos in 1760, this wife's first name was Judith, and his granddaughters and other aged descendants who were living in 1887-8 agreed that her surname was Carr.

That William<sup>5</sup> married (2), at Stonington, Conn., 22 September, 1765, Lydia Palmer (First Ch. Rec.), there can be no reasonable doubt. He was living in that town from 1760-1769, as has been shown from the Stonington deeds, and we have record of no other William Pendleton who could have contracted this marriage. Fourteen months after this date of marriage, his daughter Mary was born, while before that time no child had been born to him for five years. Moreover, one of his twin daughters, born after Mary, was named Bridget, a name which had never before appeared in the Pendleton family while common among the Palmers. Several of William's descendants have said he was married three times, although they could name but two of his wives. In 1887, Mrs. Jeremiah Pitcher, then 85 years old, a granddaughter of William by his daughter, Bridget, stated that *her mother was brought up by a step-mother and had a half brother, John*. Since John was born about 1752, he must have been a son of the first wife, Judith (Carr) Pendleton, who was living in 1760, and this gives us the proof that William was married more than twice. It is unfortunate that the Connecticut law did not require the wife's signature to deeds made by her husband, as otherwise the transfers made by William<sup>5</sup> Pendleton between 1765 and 1769 would have shown Lydia's name. The "Palmer Groups" does not refer to this marriage.

William<sup>5</sup> Pendleton married (3), tradition says about 1785, Priscilla Chesebrough, daughter of Amos and Desire (Williams) Chesebrough. She was born 11 June, 1738. (Chesebrough Gen.\*)

No list of William<sup>5</sup> Pendleton's children has been found of record, but the following names and dates are probably accurate, as they have been verified time and again.

Issue by first wife (order uncertain), first five born probably at Westerly, R. I., others at Stonington, Conn.:

49. AMOS<sup>5</sup> PENDLETON (*Col. William<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>*), was born at Westerly, R. I., 21 June, 1728, and died there, 25 November, 1821.



Amos<sup>5</sup> Pendleton, who was one of the longest lived men in the family, spent nearly all his ninety-three years in his native town except for what time he was away at sea. Dennison's "Westerly & Its Witnesses" speaks of him as a master mariner, and he is generally referred to as "Capt." Amos in the Westerly records. Yet in the deed given him by William and Judith Pendleton of Stonington, to a mansion house and land at Westerly, on the 24th of March, 1760, he is called "Blacksmith," and he may have followed this occupation first. For this property Amos paid £2000 (*West. L. E.*, ix, 355).

As befitted a son of Col. William Pendleton he took an active part in the affairs of the town, serving as one of its councilmen from 1784 to 1792, besides holding minor offices. In May, 1765, he was appointed Lieutenant of the First Westerly Co., King's County Regt., and was re-appointed in 1766 (*R. I. Civil & Mil. App'tments*). The Rhode Island Census for 1774 shows that Amos Pendleton was the owner of two slaves in that year.

On the 30th of May, 1774, the Town Council "Voted that Capt. Amos Pendleton have an order on the Town Treasurer for 6/8 for 40 quarts of milk for the sick in the Small Pox" [hospital] (*Westerly C. & P. Rec.*, iv, 241).

In the Supplement to "New York in the Revolution" it is stated that Amos Pendleton was one of the refugees from Long Island to Connecticut. It would not appear, however, that he had removed to Long Island, as all his children born during the Revolutionary War had Westerly as their birth-place. It is more likely that Amos as captain of a vessel, assisted the refugees to leave the island.

On the 18th of September, 1776, he was the sixty-fifth signer of the "Resistance Act" drawn up at Westerly on that day by which the citizens in agreeing to oppose the English in every way,

tested their loyalty to the Continental government. Just what services Amos performed in the Revolution cannot be determined absolutely, owing to the fact that the records do not distinguish between him and his son, Amos, Jr., except once, all other accounts referring merely to "Amos Pendleton." It was probably Amos, Sr., however, who was one of the "Alarm Men" of Westerly, Edward Bliven, Captain, drawn for three months on the 16th of January, 1777, to serve the third month (Westerly "Town Meetings," iii, 160), as these were the older men of the town who did guard duty while the younger ones were away at the war. Again, as most of these men composed a company called the "Reformadors," Amos, Sr., is probably referred to, when at a town meeting held at Elias Thompson's house, 8 January, 1777, it was "Voted, that the Reformadors be called upon to organize a military company," and Amos Pendleton was elected Ensign thereof (*Ibid.*, p. 159). As a member of Capt. Edward Bliven's Westerly Alarm Co., Amos Pendleton received pay for thirty days' service from the 6th of November to the 6th of December, 1777 (R. I. Archives).

The best evidence we have, however, that Amos, Sr., was a member of a military organization in the Revolutionary War appears in the pension application of his son, Zebulon, which states that he (Zebulon) served two months in the summer of 1778 as substitute for his father in Capt. Joshua Pendleton's Westerly Co.

Among those "Who subscribed to the Continental Loan Office, it being the deficiency of the money that was not subscribed in Westerly to supply said Loan Office by an Act of the General Assembly, Sept., 1779," the name of Amos Pendleton appears as the contributor of £13 ("Town Meetings," iv, 5).

The will of Amos Pendleton, dated at Westerly, 6 November, 1819 (Probate Rec., ii, 435), names sons Andrew and Zebulon, children of late son Jonathan, sons Gilbert, Otis and Harris, granddaughters, Thankful Dunbar, Catherine Stanton, Betsy Barns, grandson Charles Pendleton and daughter Nancy Barns.

Many of Amos's sons and grandsons have followed the sea and acquired wealth as successful master mariners and vessel owners. Since the extinction of American commerce his later descendants have made their mark in commercial pursuits.

Amos<sup>5</sup> Pendleton married (1), at Westerly, R. I., 1 February, 1753, Susannah Chesebrough, daughter of Rev. Jeremiah and Susannah (Rossiter) Chesebrough. She was born 5 July, 1732, and died 31 May, 1768 (Westerly Rec. & Chesebrough Gen.). He married (2), in 1768, Anna Foster, daughter of Jonathan and Anna Foster of Watch Hill.\* She was born in 1743, probably at Attleboro, Mass., and died 5 June, 1819, at Watch Hill, aged 76 years.

The will of Jonathan Foster, dated 21 May, 1778, names wife Anna, and daughter, Anna Pendleton (Westerly C. & P. Rec., iv, 437).

\* The "Foster Genealogy" states that Anna Foster, daughter of Jonathan and Anna Foster, married — Pendleton.

50. FREELove<sup>5</sup> PENDLETON (*Col. William<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>*), was born at Westerly, R. I., 30 October, 1731. The will of Col. Joseph<sup>4</sup> Pen-

dleton shows that by her cousin, [40] Sylvester<sup>5</sup> Pendleton, Free-love had a son:

[96] Sylvester<sup>6</sup>, b. 1748; (m. Eunice Cobb).

She afterwards married at Westerly, R. I., 1 Aug., 1751, Capt. Isaac Sheffield (3rd). He d. — 1797. The Probate records of Stonington show that on the 4th August in that year there "Appeared in this Court Isaac Sheffield & refused to take Letters of Administration on the Intestate Estate of his father, Capt. Isaac Sheffield, late of Stonington, dec. This Court hath appointed William Sheffield and Amos Sheffield Administrators on the Intestate Estate of their father, Capt. Isaac Sheffield."

In the division of his property, 20 April, 1799, receipts for £207 11s. 4 1/2d. were given by Reuben and Deborah Chesebrough, Edward and Sarah Hancox, Isaac Sheffield, "eldest son of the dec'd." Samuel and Polly Breed, Zebulon and Free-love Hancox, Zebulon Hancox for children of his first wife, Lydia, and by William Sheffield for the "heirs of James Sheffield, fourth son of deceased" (Stonington Prob. Rec., vi. 228).

51. (LIEUT.) PELEG<sup>5</sup> PENDLETON (*Col. William<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>*), was born at Westerly, R. I., 9 July, 1733, and died 10 July, 1810, at Prospect, now Searsport, Me. [G. S.]. Up to the time Peleg Pendleton was fifty years old he made his home at Westerly, R. I. In 1757 he paid a tax there of 4s. 7d. Early in life he began going to sea, and on the 4th of October, 1762, he bought with James Babcock for £6000, "old tenor" (present value about \$1.25 a pound).

\* Given erroneously in Stonington Vital Records as "Isaac."

the 36-ton schooner, "Dolphin." In this vessel Peleg had a quarter share and Babcock the balance (West. Rec., x, 485).

During the smallpox epidemic in Westerly in 1774, it was voted by the Town Council on the 28th of March of that year, "That

*Peleg Pendleton*

Capt. Peleg Pendleton have an order on the town treasurer for £3. 12s. 8½d. for his services in sending the nurses &

getting the necessaries for the people in the smallpox" [hospital] (C. & P. Rec., iv, 237).

On the first of May, 1775, Peleg was given a deed to 250 acres of land in the township of Frankfort, Hancock County, Province of Maine and state of Massachusetts. Not long afterwards he made a clearing there and left his son, Peleg, Jr., in charge of the property while he returned to Rhode Island for the rest of his family. In the meantime the battle of Bunker Hill and the siege of Boston had shown the colonists that the differences between them and the mother country could only be settled by a prolonged war, and Peleg, believing that his family would be safest in Westerly, decided to remain there until the struggle was ended.

He had early opportunity to show his allegiance to the new government the colonies had formed, subscribing his name as the sixty-fourth signer to the "Test Act" circulated at Westerly in 1776. On the 3rd of June, 1777, he was elected Lieutenant of Capt. James Babcock's Westerly Train of Artillery. Between November 6 and December 6, 1777, he served as a private in Capt. Edward Bliven's detachment from Col. Joseph Noyes' regt. militia (R. I. Military Returns). No further record of him appears at Westerly save that on the 11th of September, 1781, he witnessed the will of his old associate, James Babcock.

Upon the close of the Revolutionary War, Peleg Pendleton with all his family, except the oldest daughter, removed to Maine and settled upon the estate he had bought eight years before. He found that the log-house he had built there then had fallen to pieces, and no trace of his son, Peleg, Jr., was to be found. What became of him has always remained a mystery.

Lieut. Pendleton spent the rest of his life upon this farm. On the 16th of May, 1789, he was a petitioner with his son, William and others, from the plantation of Frankfort, asking that the Massachusetts Legislature incorporate that plantation into a township to be called Knoxburgh. Their names also appear in a later petition, November 20th of the same year, praying for incorporation into a township to be known as Knoxbury. On the 24th of February, 1794, Peleg's property came within the bounds of the township of Prospect, organized on that day, and a still later division, 13 February, 1845, brought it into the present town of Searsport. In the meantime, Maine, which had been a District, or Province of Massa-

chusetts ever since Brian Pendleton's time, was set off as a separate state in 1820, and Hancock County was divided 7 February, 1827, the western portion, in which lay Frankfort, forming part of the new county of Waldo. The reader should keep in mind these various divisions and changes when noting hereafter the birth-places, etc., of Peleg's descendants, for to save repeating these facts so many times we shall generally refer to all these events as having occurred at Searsport, Maine.

Nearly all the sons and grandsons of Peleg Pendleton were master mariners. The sails of their ships have whitened every ocean known to commerce, and the remotest ports of the world have been familiar to them. They were the finest type of that splendid race of sea captains who in the palmy days of American shipping carried our flag to the most distant corners of the earth. Their wives went with them on many of their voyages, and no small number of their children were born at sea or in foreign lands. Their sisters, too, married sea captains and became as good sailors as their husbands or brothers. It is peculiarly fitting that the last of the many Pendletons to command a full-rigged ship should be a descendant of Lieut. Peleg, [1821] Andrew S.<sup>s</sup> Pendleton of East Boston, Mass.

Peleg<sup>s</sup> Pendleton married at Westerly, R. I., 7 September, 1758, Ann Park, daughter of Rev. Joseph and Abigail (Green) Park. She was born at Charlestown, R. I., 28 October, 1739, and died at Prospect, now Searsport, Maine, 20 March, 1817 [G. S.].

52. JOHN<sup>5</sup> PENDLETON (*Col. William<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>*), was born at Westerly, R. I., 22 May, 1731 (Westerly Records), or 22 May, 1735 (record in family Bible). He died at Westerly, 31 March, 1812.

John Pendleton was a farmer, inn-keeper and master mariner. The Rhode Island census of 1774 shows that he was the owner (or employer) of six Indians in that year.

On the 31st of October, 1775, he was appointed (by mistake) Ensign of the 1st Company, Westerly Militia, to which office his brother Ephraim was subsequently appointed (R. I. Col. Rec.).

In 1776 he was enrolled in the Westerly Artillery (R. I. Census), and in 1777 he was one of those upset off Point Judith in the expedition that was fitted out

at Westerly to join Gen. Spencer. The report of the Legislative Committee

which appraised the articles lost in the disaster, shows that John Pendleton parted with gun, bayonet, and knapsack, valued at £6. He was the twenty-ninth signer of the "Test Act," drawn up at Westerly in 1776, to test the loyalty of the inhabitants to the new state of Rhode Island. A John Pendleton, landsman, served on the ship "Oliver Cromwell," Tim Parker, commander, 16 May-2 August, 1779. (Conn. Soldiers in Rev.)\*

On the 13th August, 1780, John Pendleton "from Westerly" owned covenant to the First Congregational Church at Stonington, and was baptized the same day, as "John Pendleton, adult, of Westerly" (Church Records).

On the 8th February, 1781, John Pendleton, son-in-law, and Joseph Latham, grandson, were appointed guardians of Joshua Thompson "Who is delirious and void of reason," and "Said guardians are to see that provision is made for widow of Ephraim Pendleton, deceased" (West. C. & P. Rec., iv, 419). On the 14th February, 1785, Capt. John Pendleton was appointed sole guardian of Joshua Thompson (Ibid.), and on the 13th November, 1789, he was made administrator of Thompson's estate (C. & P. Rec., v). On the 4th January, 1790, John Pendleton as administrator, petitioned the Rhode Island Assembly for power to sell Joshua Thompson's real estate. This petition was signed by the other heirs, Joshua Thompson (Jr.), Joseph Latham, in behalf of Lois Latham, Nathan Gallup, Sabra Pendleton, Simeon West and Nancy West.

According to John<sup>5</sup> Pendleton's descendants, he had become the father of a son previous to his marriage with Sabra Thompson. No reference to this child's mother has been found in the Westerly records, but the name of John Pendleton, Jr., appears there and also in the lists of Rhode Island Revolutionary Soldiers. This son, 151. John<sup>6</sup>, Jr., b. about 1760. m. Mary Noyes.

53. BENJAMIN<sup>5</sup> PENDLETON (*Col. William<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>*), was born at Westerly, R. I., 18 September, 1738, and died there 29 December, 1824. Like many of the early Pendletons at Westerly, he went to sea as a young man, and in time became a master mariner. There are few references to him upon the town records, and we suppose he led the quiet life of the average citizen, participating in the town meetings but not seeking office for himself. In one item that does mention him, however, in 1764, we have a glimpse of one of the gala occasions of the olden time, when it was "Voted that Benjamin Pendleton have liberty to sell Strong Liquor on the Day Mr. George Sheffield Launches his vessel that is now on the Stocks" (West. C. & P. Rec., iv).

The Westerly Tax List of 1757 shows that he was assessed two shillings in that year, although he was then under age. Benjamin Pendleton played an active part in the Revolutionary War, as shown by the following records:

"On the 30th of Aug., 1775, the tender of the British ship of War 'Rose,' Capt. Wallace, pursued a small American craft to the wharf at Stonington. Capt. Benjamin Pendleton was there and with other brave men drove the tender off. The 'Rose' then cannonaded Stonington, wounding one man but killing none" ("Westerly and Its Witnesses"). The "History of Stonington" [p. 38] gives a slightly different version of this affair. Wheeler's account says the British had demanded the surrender of a vessel-load of cattle which had just been landed there, and upon the refusal of this demand the tender of the warship was sent to seize the cattle, but was fired upon and driven off, after which the bombardment took place. This may have been the basis of the tradition related by Hadlai F. Pendleton of Norwich, N. Y., to the effect that a British vessel once pursued Benjamin Pendleton's sloop, and when he took refuge in a small creek, two boat loads of sailors were sent to effect his capture. His crew made off hastily, but Benjamin and his son David, then aged 12 (which would put this incident seven years after the other one), remained aboard, concealing themselves. Benjamin loaded his two muskets nearly to the muzzle, and when the boats were close by, he fired twice upon them, killing and wounding a large

number of the assailants, a bloody repulse to the attempted cutting out expedition.

In 1776, Benjamin Pendleton was enrolled as a private in Capt. Joseph Pendleton's Company of Westerly Militia (R. I. Rec.). On the 18th of September in that year, he was the 68th loyal citizen of Westerly to sign the "Test Act," pledging allegiance to the new State government (Westerly "Town Meetings," iii, 155).

In April 1779 his sloop "Louis," laden with corn, was seized by the authorities at Hartford, Conn., through fear that it was destined for the British, but was released upon evidence being shown that the cargo was for the people of Stonington (Conn. Col. Rec.). On the 14th of October, 1781, he was enlisted as private in Capt. Allin's Company, Col. Christopher Smith's Regiment, and was discharged the next day (R. I. Rev. Rec.). In 1779 he subscribed £14 to the Continental Loan Office to help make up the deficiency of the amount to be raised at Westerly under Act of the General Assembly, September, 1779 (Westerly "Town Meetings," iv, 5).

Benjamin's most notable achievement in the Revolution was the capture of a British privateer, the following account of which is from Denison's "Westerly and Its Witnesses": "During the Revolution, Capt. Joseph Dodge of Westerly owned and commanded a vessel named the 'Lucretia.' In his patriotic zeal, he transformed her into a privateer. Securing a suitable armament and accepting Benjamin Pendleton as Lieut. and Smith Murphy as gunner, he was ready to put to sea, but was taken sick. No time could be lost. Lieut. Pendleton accepted the command and the 'Lucretia' turned her prow to the ocean. Near Block Island she fell in with an English privateer, the 'Huffa,' that had seriously annoyed our coast. The chase closed by an engagement short but decisive. The 'Lucretia' captured the 'Huffa' and brought her into Stonington."

Another undertaking in which Benjamin was engaged appears in the "New York Calendar of Historical Mss." [Vol. 1, p. 645], and is as follows:

"State of New York to Dann Collins. Dr." [1777].

"To going from Sag Harbour to East Hampton with John Minor & Benjamin Pembleton of Connecticut & Abraham Loper, a Soldier in Captain Davis' Company and taking from Coll. Gardner's House 130 Fire Arms Bayonets Catueh Boxes & 3 Silver Headed Swords, and taking from Coll Mulford's 3 Casks of Powder & 2 Boxes of Lead all which we brought to Sag Harbour put on Board a Vessel Loaded at Sea Brook & Delivered to Coll Livingston.

Also my taking at another Time 3 Casks of Powder from the House of Maltby Gilston Esq<sup>r</sup> Southampton & bringing the same to Guilford which Powder is now in my possession——

The descendants of Benjamin<sup>5</sup> Pendleton are quite numerous and are scattered all over the United States. His sons—except the youngest—were master mariners, as were many of his grandsons also. The later generations have followed very diverse occupations.

Benjamin<sup>5</sup> Pendleton married at Westerly, R. I., 9 February, 1763, Lois Burdick, daughter of David and Mary (Thompson) Burdick. She was born at Westerly, 1 April, 1738.

She married at Westerly, 10 December, 1761, her step-brother, Zebulon Chesebrough, Jr., son of Zebulon and Mary (McDowell) Chesebrough. He was born 11 February, 1739/40, and died 22 February, 1827.

55. (CAPT.) JOSHUA<sup>5</sup> PENDLETON (*Col. William<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>*), was born at Westerly, R. I., 6 May, 1744, and died there while on a visit, 9 April, 1824. He married at Westerly, 6 January, 1768, Anna (Nancy) Clarke, daughter of Elisha and Mary (Potter) Clarke. She was born 7 October, 1747, and died 27 June, 1840, at Norwich, Conn.

Joshua Pendleton was a master mariner in early life, and retired from the sea when he was about fifty years of age. Up to that time he made his home at Westerly, R. I., where he was more active in military than in civil affairs. The Rhode Island records show that he was appointed Ensign of the 1st Company Militia at Westerly in August, 1774, re-appointed, June, 1775, commissioned Lieutenant, 31 October, 1775, and 1776, Captain, May, 1777, and received subsequent appointments as Captain up to February, 1780. In Gen. Sullivan's expedition against Newport in August, 1778, Joshua Pendleton served as Captain in Col. Noyes' Regiment, and received payment for "Provisions found" from 25 July to 1 August, 1778.

His name does not appear often in the Council and Probate Records at Westerly, but on the 29th of March, 1784, Capt. Joshua Pendleton and William Babcock, Esq., were appointed to set a value of the rent of Thompson's farm. About 1795 he removed to Norwich, Conn., where he bought a farm on the Bozrah line and lived there the rest of his life. Most of this farm lay in Bozrah, but his house was on the Norwich side of the boundary. The record of his death upon the Norwich records refers to him as "Deacon," a position he held for many years in the First Church of that town. His will, dated at Norwich, 30 December, 1813, filed 5 May, 1824 (Norwich Prob. Rec., xiii, 372; see Appendix VIII), names wife Anna, sons Joshua, William, Elisha C., and Adam; daughters Nancy Rogers, Patty Palmer, Lucy Lathrop, Clarissa Harlowe Adams, Polly Bennett, and Lydia Bennett; grandson, Joseph Pendleton. In the naming of a daughter "Clarissa Harlowe," it would appear that the literature of his day was not unknown to Deacon Joshua.

The descendants of Capt. Joshua Pendleton are more numerous through his daughters than through his sons. Those bearing the name Pendleton have been mostly farmers with a sprinkling of business and professional men. Most of them are now located in Connecticut, New York, and Colorado, with a few in Michigan, California and other states. Several of them have been members of state legislatures.

Joshua Pendleton's gravestone in the old cemetery at Norwichtown, Conn., bears the following inscription:

"In Memory of Dea. Joshua Pendleton who died April 9, 1824, aged 80.

Blessed are the dead  
Which die in the Lord.

Rendered Loyal Service in the Cause of American Independence as Capt. of the First Westerly Co. R. I. State Militia from May, 1776 to the close of the War."

NOTE: The U. S. Pension records show that Anna (Nancy) (Clarke) Pendleton, widow of Capt. Joshua Pendleton, applied for a pension 13 July, 1837, and the memorandum given of her husband's Revolutionary services confirm those we have written above. Her claim was allowed in favor of her surviving children.

56. (LIEUT.) EPHRAIM<sup>5</sup> PENDLETON (*Col. William<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>*), was born at Westerly, R. I., 14 July, 1746, and died there, 2 January, 1780. In October, 1775, he was appointed Ensign of the 1st Westerly Co., King's County Regt., in place of John Pendleton, who had previously been appointed by mistake. Ephraim was re-appointed in January, 1776, and in May, 1777, he was commissioned Lieutenant of this Company. In 1778 he was again commissioned Lieutenant, but his name does not appear subsequently upon the Rhode Island Revolutionary records.

On page 131 of "New York in the Revolution. Supplement," it is stated that Ephraim Pendleton and others, "Who were for the most part captains of various kinds of vessels," assisted in the removal of the refugees from Long Island to Connecticut. Denison's "Westerly and Its Witnesses" says that Ephraim was a master mariner, and that he is buried in the old Pendleton Burying Ground at Westerly.

Ephraim<sup>5</sup> Pendleton married at Westerly, R. I., 17 December, 1767, Sarah Thompson (T. R.). She was the daughter of Joshua

and Sarah (Stanton) Thompson, born 31 Jany., 1748, as shown by the direction given John Pendleton when appointed guardian to Joshua Thompson in 1781 to make provision for the widow of Ephraim Pendleton, late deceased (Westerly C. & P. Rec., iv, 419). She was living at Stonington, Conn., as late as 12 December, 1799, when she gave a receipt to Capt. Samuel Thompson for £12 in full of her rights in the estate of her brother, George Thompson (Ibid., v, 426). No record has ever been found showing that Ephraim's daughters were married, and we do not know whether he has descendants or not. His children, as entered upon the Westerly records at their mother's request in 1799, were as follows:

Record of the sale of this land does not appear. Ten years later he appears as a land owner at Brookfield, Mass., as shown by the Worcester Co. Deeds, and in 1814 he bought three parcels of land in Brookfield and North Brookfield. In 1815 his wife Polly joined with him in a deed to Matthew Wood of land in North Brookfield (Worcester Co. Deeds, Vol. 194, p. 278). In 1826, Polly Pendleton, "single woman," of Brookfield, received mortgage from Joseph Doane, and she was still living there in 1836 when this mortgage was discharged (Ibid., Vol. 249, p. 62). It is rather singular that Polly should be referred to as a single woman if she was Ephraim's widow, as seems likely.

The vital records of Brookfield show that the intentions of marriage of Ephraim Pendleton of Worcester and Polly Blanchard were entered 8 Dec., 1799, and that the marriage intentions of Polly Pendleton and Ebenezer F. Newell of "Reedfield," Me., were recorded there, 18 Feby., 1826. Polly Blanchard was probably the daughter of William and Prudence Blanchard, who was born at Brookfield, 24 Sept., 1778. No children of Ephraim and Polly appear in the Brookfield records. The U. S. Census of the town in 1800 shows he was then living there, aged between 26 and 45, his family consisting of but one female, between 16 and 26. The Census of the town in 1810, shows that he was still under 45, and that his family had not increased. The subsequent Censuses of Brookfield and North Brookfield do not mention him, and it would appear that he had died between 1810 and 1820 without issue. As we have record of no other Ephraim Pendleton at this period there can be no doubt that the above records refer to [179] Ephraim<sup>6</sup>, Jr.

57. LUCY<sup>5</sup> PENDLETON (*Col. William<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>*), was born at West-erly, R. I., 22 April, 1752, and died 27 August, 1839, at Cortland, N. Y. She married 6 May, 1773, at Stonington, Conn., Robert Randall, son of John (3rd), and (second wife) Mrs. Mary (Holmes) [Palmer] Randall. He was born at Stonington, 25 October, 1751, and died at Cortland, N. Y., 3 January, 1833.

Robert Randall with his wife and children removed to Brookfield, N. Y., in 1793. "William Randall, son of Robert, engaged in business here with his brother Roswell, and about 1812 removed to Cortland, N. Y., where they established a large and successful business, and in the course of years became wealthy men. William became interested in banking and was for many years President of the Bank of Ithaca, while Roswell who had a decided fondness for military matters, beginning at the lowest office of the Militia Regiment in Cortland held every office in succession up to the rank of Brigadier General. Gen. Roswell's oldest son, Hon. Henry Stephens Randall, was graduated from Union College in 1830, was admitted to the Bar of the Supreme Court in 1834. Took an active part in politics and was elected by the Democrats Secretary of State, 1851. In after years he was nominated for various other public offices, some of which he declined, but was sent to the Assembly in 1871. Mr. Randall was the author of a number of works on agricultural topics, also of a Biography of Jefferson" (Randall Gen., p. 36).

58. (MAJOR) NATHAN<sup>5</sup> PENDLETON (*Col. William<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>*), was born at Westerly, R. I., 2 April, 1754, and died at Norwich, N. Y., 26 January, 1841. While Nathan Pendleton was interested in farming the greater part of his life, he had some experience of sea-faring during his younger days. His grandson, Hadlai F. Pendleton, of Norwich, N. Y., has in his possession a bill of sale dated 22 March, 1774, from John Pendleton to Nathan Pendleton of one quarter of the sloop "Sea Flower," and an old log book in the same hands shows that Nathan was master of the sloop "Prudence," bound for Penobscot Bay, in 1786.

Nathan Pendleton at one time evidently intended settling in Maine with his brothers William and Peleg, as on the same day that Peleg received a grant of land in Frankfort, 1 May, 1775, Nathan also took up 140 acres in that town. He did not locate there, however, and sold this land to John Park of Charlestown, R. I., for £70, 17 September, 1781 (Hancock County, Me., Deeds, i. 54).

Like all the other sons of Col. William Pendleton, Nathan<sup>5</sup> bore an active share in the defense of their part of Rhode Island during the Revolution. At a meeting of the Governor and Council of Safety of Connecticut on the 15th of November, 1776, it was voted to approve of an order "Drawn by his Honor the Governor, 11 November, 1776, on Messrs. Elderkin and Wales in favor of Mr. Nathan Pendleton, for 50 lbs. of powder at 5s. 4d. per pound" (Conn. State Records, i. 58).

The Rhode Island Census of 1776 shows that Nathan Pendleton was enrolled in the Westerly Artillery. His grandson, Hadlai F. Pendleton, states that he enjoyed a considerable reputation as a marksman with cannon, and that upon one occasion he fired a couple of long distance shots at an English man-of-war which had anchored off Stonington, cut her colors, with one shot and killed one of her young officers with the other. The body was brought ashore and buried that evening under a flag of truce. Pendleton often wished in after years that his aim had not been so unerring.

On the 18th of September, 1776, he was the sixty-sixth signer of the "Test Act" at Westerly, drawn up on that day by those who wished to ratify their allegiance to the new government. In July, 1780, he was appointed Ensign of the 1st Westerly Company, 1st Battalion, King's County Regt., an office to which he was re-appointed each year until 1785 (R. I. Rec.).

Nathan continued to live at Westerly for quite a number of years after the Revolution. On the 16th of May, 1792, he was commissioned Captain of the 1st Westerly Company, and on the 12th of May, 1794, Second Major of the Senior Class of the Washington County Militia. These commissions are now in the possession of Mr. Hadlai F. Pendleton. Not long after this date Nathan removed to the neighborhood of what is now called Clark's Mills, North Stonington, but then included within the bounds of Stonington, Conn. He took an active interest in the affairs of the town and represented it in the Legislature at each session from 1802 to 1807 (Hist. of

Stonington). On the 7th of February, 1809, he sold his farm of 156 acres in North Stonington to Thomas Langworthy for \$3000 (No. Stonington deeds), and not long afterwards removed with several of his children to Norwich, N. Y., where the rest of his life was spent. His farm there was about three miles below the village, and was crossed by the Chenango river; his house was upon the east bank. At the time of his death the following obituary was published in a Norwich newspaper:

*"Died*—In this town on the 26th inst., Capt. Nathan Pendleton, aged 86 years, 9 months and twenty-four days. Capt. Pendleton was a native of N. England and a soldier of the Revolution. During the arduous struggle which resulted in establishing our independence, he was among those who devoted themselves to the righteous cause and perilled life and fortune in defence of American liberty. He was for many years a respected and useful member of the Legislature of Connecticut, in which state he is still held in grateful remembrance for the fidelity with which he discharged his duties. After his removal to this state he enjoyed for many years the undiminished confidence of the people to an extent with which but few have the happiness of enjoying. He retired from office in his advanced age in accordance with his own wishes and regretted by the people."

In the descendants of Nathan<sup>5</sup> Pendleton, we have a remarkable list of brainy men and women,—many of them college-bred—clergymen, bankers, legislators, members of the bench and bar, educators, officers of the militia and of the regular army, and other government officials. They have been throughout a race of leaders, not followers, among whom has been cherished the memory and traditions of their ancestors, who in turn may well be proud of such posterity.

Nathan<sup>5</sup> Pendleton married (1), at Westerly, R. I., 22 January, 1775, Amelia Babcock, daughter of Col. James and Sarah (Stanton) Babcock. She was born at Westerly, R. I., 4 November, 1756, and died at Norwich, N. Y., 27 September, 1814. Col. James Babcock's will, dated at Westerly in 1781, refers to his daughter Amelia Pendleton, and names Nathan Pendleton as his executor (Westerly C. & P. Rec.).

Nathan married (2), also at Westerly, R. I., 20 October, 1816, Mrs. Rhoda (Babcock) Gavitt, widow of George Gavitt, and daughter of Isaac and Mary (Worden) Babcock. She was born at Westerly, 21 August, 1764, and died at Norwich, N. Y., 20 December, 1852.

NOTE.—The U. S. Pension Bureau shows that Nathan Pendleton of Norwich, N. Y., applied for a pension 17 Oct., 1832, on account of his services in the Revolution, but the claim was not granted, owing to the lack of his discharge papers. The record gives his date and place of birth, date and place of death, date of death of his widow, Rhoda, and the names of his surviving children. In his claim for pension he states that he served in General Spencer's expedition in 1777.

60. KETURAH<sup>5</sup> PENDLETON (*Col. William*<sup>4</sup>, *Joseph*<sup>3</sup>), was born at Westerly, R. I., 25 January, 1761, and died there, 15 May, 1819 [G. S.]. She married at Westerly, 16 March, 1788, as his second wife, Sylvester<sup>9</sup> Gavitt, "son of Benajah, dec" (Westerly Rec.), and [39] Lois<sup>5</sup> (Pendleton) Gavitt. He was born about 1755 and died 1 May, 1829, aged 74 [G. S.]. He was a Town Treasurer of Westerly, also a Deputy to the General Assembly. His first wife was Sarah Babcock, who died 16 June, 1787.

63. DEBORAH<sup>5</sup> PENDLETON (*Lieut. Joshua*<sup>4</sup>, *Joseph*<sup>3</sup>), was born

about 1734 at Stonington, Conn.; was baptized there 10 March, 1733/34 (Second Ch. Rec.), and died 15 August, 1825, aged 90 years, at Guilford, Conn. She married at Guilford, 29 November, 1752, Noah Fowler, b. 1733, d. 15 November, 1815, son of Abraham, Jr., and Elizabeth (Hubbard) Fowler. He was a Captain in the Revolutionary War and later a Colonel of Militia.

64. INCREASE<sup>5</sup> PENDLETON (*Lieut. Joshua<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>*), was born probably at Guilford, Conn. (no date), and died 8 July (or August), 1815, at Cornwall, Conn. In October, 1772. Increase Pendleton of Guilford was commissioned Ensign in the Second Company, or Train Band, 7th Regt. Connecticut Militia, and in 1776 he served as Ensign of Capt. Daniel Hand's Co., Col. Talcott's Regt.. Guilford men, raised "For service in the New York Expedition" (Conn. Records).

Increase Pendleton took an active part in the affairs of his native town and was a selectman of Guilford from 1785 to 1790 inclusive, and also town treasurer (Guilford Town records). Like his father he carried on the business of a tanner and a maker of boots and shoes.

On the 29th of October, 1792, he sold to John Burgis for £225 his home lot in Guilford and another tract of land in East Creek (Guilford Deeds, xiv, 117), and on the 3rd of December following, he sold the rest of his property in Guilford to William Miller for £50 (*Ibid.*, xvi, 144). Shortly afterwards he removed to Cornwall, Conn., with his sons, Joshua and William, where he bought a farm

and passed the rest of his life. Gold in his "History of Cornwall" [pp. 196-7] says of him: "Major (Jesse) Buel remained in the Hollow till 1792, when he sold his farm to Increase Pendleton of Guilford, Conn. . . . Mr. Increase Pendleton . . . was well advanced in life when he came here, and at my remembrance of him his wife had died and he was an old man living in the family of his son, William Pendleton. He retained the ownership of the farm while he lived, his sons, William and Joshua, cultivating allotted portions of it. He was a large, overgrown, sluggish man, who would occasionally walk up and down the road with staff in hand and was very apt to be out when the crops were divided between himself and his sons. His daughter Julia, afterwards the wife of Uri Merwin, lived with him and appeared to care for him with all proper attention. His sons, William and Joshua, were active, stirring men who raised large families. Joshua removed to the West many years ago, but William remained here during his life."

On the 28th of January, 1811, Increase<sup>5</sup> bought of Moses Lyman, Jr., and Erastus Lyman of Goshen, Conn., for \$200, fifty acres of land in township 2, in a tract known as the Triangle, in Lisle, Broome County, New York, "in lot 57 in said town" (Broome Co., N. Y., Deeds, xiii, 148). This tract of land was bequeathed by the will of Increase Pendleton [See Appendix VIII] to the children of his son Joshua. In this document he also made bequests to his sons William and Joshua, and daughters Phebe Yale and Julia Merwin.

Increase<sup>5</sup> Pendleton married at Guilford, Conn., 25 Dec., 1764, Phebe Kingman (Guilford Rec.). She died in May, 1797.

Increase Pendleton's old homestead at Cornwall is now occupied by his great-grandson, Mr. Burritt Eber<sup>8</sup> Yale.

66. WILLIAM<sup>5</sup> PENDLETON (*Edmund*<sup>4</sup>, *Edmund*<sup>3</sup>), was born at Westerly, R. I., 3 February, 1740, and died in 1796, at Stratford, Conn. At an early age he was taken by his parents to Stratford, Conn., where he made his home the rest of his life. His descendants say that he was a carpenter and builder. In 1765 he was administrator of the estate of his brother, Edmund<sup>5</sup>, Jr., and in 1789 administrator of his father's estate, as we have already seen.

In 1766 William Pendleton "per Edmund Pendleton" was one of those who petitioned the King of England in regard to lands supposed to be in the western part of New Hampshire. Grants to these lands had been made them by the Governor of New Hampshire, when it was found that the tracts were claimed by the Province of New York (New Hampshire State Papers). It does not appear, however, that William<sup>5</sup> or his father ever lived in that part of the country.

During the Revolutionary War, William<sup>5</sup> Pendleton was a member of Capt. James Booth's Mounted Company of Stratford, 4th Regt. Connecticut Militia, and served as 3rd Corporal on the expedition to New Haven and Fairfield, to repel the invasion of the British under Gen. Tryon, 5th July, 1779. He was discharged at Greenfield Hill on the evening of July 8th, making four days' pay and fifty-two miles of horse travel (from original Roll in possession of the Bridgeport, Conn., Hist. Soc.).

William Pendleton's will, dated 26th February, 1796, and probated on the 6th of June in that year (Stratford, Conn., Prob. Rec., iii, 310), names wife, Eunice, sons David and Isaac, and daughters, Abigail, Elizabeth, and Mary. The inventory of his estate, besides house and land, included "One four feet mahogany table, one round full leaf maple table, six fiddle-back chairs, one Dutch wheel, two old pillions, one old case of drawers, one old square table, one old great wheel, one clock reel and pair of swifts, one old copper tea kettle, one Brass Warming Pan, four Brass Candle Sticks, etc."

William<sup>5</sup> married (1), Abigail Readfield, daughter of Capt. Richard Readfield of Killingworth, Conn. She was born 21 September, 1743, and died 25 December, 1779. He married (2), Eunice Burroughs, daughter of Stephen, 2d, and Elizabeth (Brown) Burroughs of Bridgeport, Conn. She was born 30 April, 1761, and died 18 May, 1820, aged 59 (Stratfield Ch. Rec.). Her will, dated 1 May, 1820 (Stratford Prob. Rec., vii, 18), names son, Eli, "Called and known by the name of Eli Pendleton," daughter Abigail, wife of Loudy "Layfield," and daughter Elizabeth Pendleton.

NOTE.—William<sup>5</sup> Pendleton's marriages, the parentage of his wives, and the births and baptisms of his children, appear in Orcutt's "History of Stratford, Conn.," pp. 338, 528, and 1167, which we have confirmed. He may

possibly have had another son, as the U. S. Census of Stratford in 1790 states that he then had in his family *three* males under sixteen years of age.

67. (CAPT.) DANIEL<sup>5</sup> PENDLETON (*Edmund<sup>4</sup>, Edmund<sup>3</sup>*), was born at Westerly, R. I., 20 February, 1744. The land records of Derby, Conn., show that Daniel was a resident of Waterbury as early as 1774, as on the 12th of December in that year he is called "of Waterbury" in the deed given him by his brother, Solomon, to land in Derby (Derby Land Rec., x, 55). Daniel sold this property to Gershom Beardsley of Stratford, 12 January, 1775 (*Ibid.*, x, 58). Two years after the outbreak of the Revolution he enlisted for three years in Munson's Co., 8th Regt. Conn. Line, 20 May, 1777, but was exchanged for John Fontine, 1 August, 1777. On the 26th of that month he was commissioned a Captain in Col. Baldwin's Regiment of Artificers, his appointment as such giving his residence as Waterbury. This regiment was authorized by Act of Congress in 1777 and acted as a pioneer and construction corps under the direction of the Quartermaster General. It was attached to the Continental Army and was engaged at Brandywine, Germantown, Monmouth and other fields.

When Gen. Greene assumed command of the Southern Department in 1780, he urgently requested that Capt. Pendleton's Company of Artificers "Wholly raised in Connecticut" be sent to him. The Company marched as directed and was the only body of men from that state to serve south of Virginia during the war. It remained there until the disbandment of the troops in 1783, by which time it had become much reduced. Capt. Pendleton's name appears on the last roll of the Company in September, 1782, at which time he is reported as on furlough (Conn. in the Revolution). His name is given among the list of officers entitled to half pay for life for serving to the end of the war, according to an Act of Congress passed 21 October, 1780 (Saffel's "Records of the Revolutionary War," p. 430).

After peace had come, Capt. Daniel settled in New York City, and the Manhattan directory for 1786 shows that he was a merchant there at 67 Water Street. His name does not appear in later issues of this directory, and it is likely that he removed to Georgia about this period to take possession of the lands given him by the will of his brother, Solomon, who had died in New York in 1785. During his residence in this state he seems to have been engaged in a war with the Indians, as Mr. D. N. Wilkes, an aged resident of Reidsville, Ga., says he has been told that Pendleton's Creek in South-eastern Georgia "Was named after old Capt. Daniel Pendleton. He was a Captain of a Company in the Indian War and they had a fight with the Indians on [what is now] Pendleton's Creek, and that is how it was named." Outside of one or two unimportant land records in which Capt. Pendleton sold property in Glynn County, etc., as executor of his brother Solomon's will, we have been unable to obtain any other information bearing upon his life in this state. His death occurred at Savannah early in 1800, as he made his will there

on the 26th of February in that year, and it was probated on the 4th of March following—only one week later. This testament [see Appendix VIII] names but one heir, a son, Daniel, Jr., then a minor, over whom Capt. Pendleton directed that Edward White should act as guardian.

The surname of Daniel Pendleton's wife is unknown; her first name was Elizabeth, as the Waterbury records note the birth of Gideon Davis, son of Daniel and *Elizabeth* "Pembleton" (Vol. i, p. 99). The will of Solomon Pendleton refers to Daniel as having a large and growing family, but if he had children besides those whose names we have found, they must have died young. As far as has been determined his children were as follows:

210. Gideon Davis<sup>6</sup>, b. 27 Jany., 1772. Waterbury, Conn.; no further record; probably died young.
211. Montgomery (?). d. of smallpox between March 26 and May 19, 1777, at Westbury, Conn. This may have been Gideon Davis. The "History of Waterbury, Conn." (Vol. I. p. 437), indicates doubt of the correctness of this name, referring to the child as "Young Montgomery (?) Pendleton." It is noteworthy that Daniel enlisted in the army immediately after the death of this child.
212. Edmund. His place here is shown by the will of Lieut. [69] Solomon<sup>5</sup> Pendleton, who, dying in New York in 1787, where his brother Capt. Daniel was then living, made a bequest to "My nephew Edmund Pendleton . . . in consideration of the attention paid me during my illness." No further record of this Edmund has been found.
213. Daniel, Jr. He appears to have been the sole survivor of his father's family, but we have so far been unable to ascertain what became of him. Letters sent to all the Probate Courts and Registries of Deeds in eastern Georgia generally were unanswered, and the only reference to him we could find was a deed in Savannah in 1812, when Daniel Pendleton, "power White," sold land to George Scott. It would appear from this that he was still a minor, and if so, he could not have been born earlier than 1792. The U. S. Census of Savannah in 1820 does not mention him. Edward White died in 1814, but his will makes no reference to his ward, Daniel Pendleton, Jr.

70. JAMES<sup>5</sup> PENDLETON (*Edmund*<sup>4</sup>, *Edmund*<sup>3</sup>), was born 12 June, 1756, probably at Stratford, Conn., where his father had settled in 1754. While his name has not been found upon the Stratford records, nor any mention of him in the settlement of his father's estate, yet his connection here is shown by the will of [68] David<sup>5</sup> (*Edmund*<sup>4</sup>, *Edmund*<sup>3</sup>), which refers to "My brother, James Pendleton." The Ms. of his son, James<sup>6</sup>, Jr., gives the missing date of birth, and states further, "My father died in the Revolutionary War, 12 December, 1778." His name has not yet appeared, however, in the lists of Connecticut soldiers so far collected.

As stated by his son, James<sup>5</sup> Pendleton married Sarah Lyons, daughter of Grashom [Gershom ?] Lyons, of Fairfield, Conn. She was born 15 February, 1761, and married (2), John Merritt. They removed to Saratoga County, N. Y.

71. JAMES<sup>8</sup> PENDLETON, JR. (*James<sup>4</sup>, Caleb<sup>3</sup>*), was born 21 November, 1710, at Westerly, R. I., and died there in 1792. He removed to Stonington, Conn., shortly after the birth of his first child, and bought land there of Benajah Billings for £155 on the 14th of May, 1742. He continued to live in that town until 1753, when on the 6th of July of that year he sold his property to his half-brother, Thomas Pendleton, for £1200 and returned to Westerly. In 1757, he paid a tax there of 7s. 10d. The Rhode Island Census of 1774 shows him as a resident of that town with a family consisting of *three* males over 16 and one female over 16—evidently his wife. His son Simeon and himself would account for two of these males, but the third one is unknown—his son, Ichabod, being deceased, and James, 3rd, having a family of his own—unless his grandson, Joseph<sup>7</sup> Pendleton, born 1754, survived till then and was brought up in James' family. On the 6th of December, 1791, James Pendleton of Westerly was drawn as a grand juror (Westerly "Town Meetings," iv, 119).

The will of James<sup>5</sup> Pendleton, dated at Westerly, R. I., 10 October, 1792 (C. & P. Rec., v, 218), names wife, Abigail; sons, Simeon and James; daughters, Desire, wife of Stephen Niles, and Hannah, wife of David Wilbur. Inventory was taken 12 January, 1793, and amounted to £19 4s. 9d.

James<sup>5</sup> Pendleton married at Stonington, Conn., 22 March, 1731, Abigail<sup>4</sup> Brown. That she was the daughter Abigail<sup>4</sup>, born 3 February, 1712, of Eleazer and [11] Ann<sup>3</sup> (Pendleton) Brown, is shown by the signatures of James Pendleton and his wife, Abigail, appearing in the deed given 30 July, 1734, by the heirs of Ann<sup>3</sup> (Pendleton) Brown, to Joseph and Edmund Pendleton, of all their rights in the estate of Capt. James<sup>2</sup> and Major Brian<sup>1</sup> Pendleton (Rockingham Co., N. H., Deeds, xx, 227).

72. OBADIAH<sup>5</sup> PENDLETON (*James<sup>4</sup>, Caleb<sup>3</sup>*), was born 1 November, 1712, Westerly, R. I., and died there, 1 October, 1793.

Obadiah Pendleton married (1), at Westerly, 4 June, 1736, Rachel Hadsall.\* She was the widow of Joseph Hadsall to whom she had been married 10 November, 1715, and so was considerably older than her second husband. Her father was William Crumb, whose will, dated 6 July, 1741, names daughter, Rachel Pendleton (Westerly C. & P. Rec., iii, 70).

By her first husband, Joseph Hadsall,† she had had seven children, the youngest of whom was born in 1727. Hadsall died in this year, as on the 25 September, 1727, the Town Council ordered an inventory taken upon his estate (C. & P., 1719-1737, p. 125), and appointed his widow, Rachel, administratrix, 13 November, 1727 (Ibid., p. 256, new no.). On the 29th of March, 1742, Rachel Pendleton, "the former widow of Joseph Hadsall," appeared before the Council and presented account of her administration of Hadsall's estate before she married Pendleton. It was "Voted that the sd Rachel Pendleton be allowed £78 9. 8 for her keeping two of her sd decd husband's children, twelve years and six months, viz one seven years and the other five years and six months while she was Hadsall's widow" (C. & P., ii, 359). It would appear from this that her children by Hadsall had all been disposed of before she married Pendleton, and the record which we are leading up to would be perfectly clear were it not for the fact that on the 29th of June, 1730, the Town Council accepted William Crum bondsman for the support of a bastard child called Joe (?), son of the widow Rachel Hadsall (C. & P., 1719-1730, p. 228). Accordingly when at a meeting of the Town Council, 31 October, 1743, it was "Voted that the clerk of this Council shall give a certificate to the Selectmen to the Town of Voluntown that we own and acknowledge Obediah Pendleton and his wife and two children to be inhabitants of this town and will receive them as such at any time" (C. & P., ii, 383), we cannot feel positive that both these children were his. That Obadiah did have more than one child of his own, however, is more clearly indicated by a certificate given him at Westerly, 29 October, 1753, for himself, *wife and family* upon his removal to Stonington (C. & P. Rec., iii, 381). His wife Rachel was living as late as 3 January, 1751½, when she joined with her husband in a deed to Wm. Wilbur of land in Westerly (W. L. E., vii, 372).

Obadiah's name has not been found upon the records of Voluntown, Conn., and it is likely his stay there was not of long duration. We have just seen that he was again a resident of Westerly in 1753. He does not seem to have remained long in Stonington either, as in 1754 while a resident of that town, he bought land in Westerly of Daniel and Mehitabel Bowen (W. L. E., ix, 59). Obadiah probably spent the rest of his life in his native place, although his name does not appear in the Rhode Island Census for 1774 nor in the U. S. Census for 1790.

No further record of him shows until the 26th January, 1789, when the Westerly Town Council voted "That Obediah Pendleton by his wife appeared before this Council and offered to take the poor woman sent to this town from New London and keep her as comfortable as she can for six shillings per week" (C. & P. Rec., v, 36). During the following year the Council ordered various sums of money to be paid to Obadiah for taking care of this "poor woman," whose name appears as Elizabeth Champlin.

A second marriage of Obadiah is indicated by the above, and that he married (2), Mrs. Rebecca Reynolds of Hopkinton, is shown by the following: "26 Aug., 1793, Voted that all persons are hereby forbid harboring of one Nancy Rennolds, daughter of Rebecca Pendleton wife of Obediah Pendleton upon Suffering the Penalty of the Law . . . except she shall produce a Certificate from the town where she Properly belongs . . ." (Westerly C. & P. Rec., v, 245). Again, at the examination of Esther "Rennolds" before the Town Council, 1 April, 1796, "Mrs. Rebecca Pendleton mother to sd Esther stated that her daughter Esther was born in Hopkinton at the then dwelling house of Nathan Porter. That she Rebecca became a resident of Hopkinton by indenture and lived there ten years after" (Ibid., p. 365). It would seem that Rebecca was considerably younger than Obadiah, and they may have been the parents of that unidentified Rebecca Pendleton the bare entry of whose birth appears at p. 40 of Vol. 4, Westerly records. This entry was made 5 December, 1793, only two months after Obadiah's death, but the parents of this child are not mentioned.

Through advancing years Obadiah eventually became incapable of maintaining himself. On the 28th of November, 1791, the Town Council voted "Mr. Obediah Pendleton Be allowed by this Town the Sum of one half Bushel of Corn Per Week toward his Support Being unable to Support himself" (C. & P., v, 142). A few weeks later the Council appointed Joseph Pendleton "to go to Mr. Obediah Pendleton and see what was necessary for him" (Ibid., p. 148). 27 February, 1792, articles were "found" for him to the value of £2 3s., and Joshua Vose agreed to take care of him for 3/ per week (Ibid., p. 151). Various payments to Joshua Vose were ordered by the Council under this arrangement up to the 28th of October, 1793, when it was "Voted that Joshua Vose be paid out of the town treasury the sum of £17 for board & other funeral charges when Mr. Obediah Pendleton Deed & 6/6 for his board until the first day of October when he deceased."

No record of Obadiah's children has been found, but it seems reasonable to suppose that he had at least two by his first wife. One of them was probably the Elizabeth Pendleton who married George Lewis at Exeter, R. I., 12 January, 1757. We have no other Elizabeth of record at this period who could have been the one to marry Lewis, save Elizabeth<sup>5</sup> (*Caleb*<sup>4</sup>, *Caleb*<sup>3</sup>), and she was unmarried in June, 1758, when she gave receipt to John Randall, Jr., for legacy in her father's will. It is noteworthy that Elizabeth (Pendleton)

Lewis named one of her sons Obadiah, while her own name may have been derived from Obadiah's mother, Elizabeth Lanphere. It is unfortunate we have only circumstantial and no direct evidence to connect Elizabeth (Pendleton) Lewis with Obadiah<sup>5</sup> Pendleton. As to any other child he may have had by wife Rachel we have no clue whatever. We are accordingly obliged to give Obadiah's issue, by first wife, as:

73. ELIZABETH<sup>5</sup> PENDLETON (*James<sup>4</sup>, Caleb<sup>3</sup>*), was born at Westerly, R. I., 12 April, 1715. She married at Stonington, Conn., 26 June, 1739, Joseph Elliot (Second Ch. Rec.).

Issue (Elliot), probably incomplete, baptisms from records of

First Church, Stonington:

- iv. Desire, bapt. 8 June, 1746. The record of her baptism refers to her as Desire "Eliot," daughter of Joseph and Elizabeth "of the West Parish."

We have been unable to obtain further record of this family. No reference to them appears upon the land or probate records of New London, Groton, or Stonington.

NOTE.—Among the entries of baptisms at the Stonington Second Church there appears the following: "Zebulon, son of Elizabeth Pendleton, was baptized 17 Oct., 1736." We cannot be certain whether this refers to Elizabeth<sup>5</sup> above or to her step-mother, Elizabeth (Brown) Pendleton, although no reference to such a child has ever been found in her father's family. The baptismal records of this church also show that a Joseph "Eliot" was admitted to the church, June 16, 1742, and that an infant named Hopestill Eliot was baptized the same day. While these items may refer to the Joseph Elliot that married Elizabeth Pendleton and to another of their children, the necessary proof is lacking.

75. THOMAS<sup>5</sup> PENDLETON (*James<sup>4</sup>, Caleb<sup>3</sup>*), was born at Westerly, R. I., 3 January, 1718/19, and died about 1809, probably at Deer Island, N. B., while on a visit to his sons.

On the 18th of March, 1742/3, "Caleb Pendleton, grandfather, & James Pendleton, father," deeded to Thomas Pendleton, husbandman of Westerly, about 300 acres of land in that town (W. L. E., iv, 44). He was admitted freeman at Westerly, R. I., 1 May, 1744, and with "Darkis" Pendleton witnessed receipt given to Benoni Smith by Jonathan Brown, 6 March, 1747, for the legacy the latter's wife received in the will of Caleb<sup>3</sup> Pendleton (Westerly C. & P. Rec., iii, 330).

In 1753, Thomas Pendleton acted as executor of his father's will, and on the 6th of July in that year he sold his property in Westerly, and on the same day bought from his half-brother, James<sup>5</sup> Pendleton, Jr., land in Stonington, Conn., for £1200. This property he

sold to John Randall, Jr., for £888, 28th January, 1756, and on the same day bought of Thomas Noyes, Jr., for £900, land at Pawcatuck. His deed disposing of this property has not so far been found, as the early Stonington deeds are indexed only for Grantees.

Tradition says that Thomas Pendleton was a whalerman, and that on one of his voyages to Greenland he put in at Castine, where, excited by the beauty of the Penobscot Bay region, he determined to settle. In the probating of Col. Joseph<sup>4</sup> Pendleton's estate, 1761, he received £101, which may have been due him as the master of one of the Colonel's vessels. At any rate, he removed to what is now Islesboro, Me.,\* a few years before the Revolution, and when he had established himself there, he brought his entire family to the island, with the exception of his son, Nathaniel, who followed later.

It has been claimed that the son, Samuel, was at Islesboro before his father, but there does not seem to be any way of proving which was the first settler. The statements in the "History of Islesboro" upon this point are very conflicting, as on page 9 it says, "Without doubt, Samuel Pendleton came here with Shubael Williams of Stonington, Conn., in September, 1764, and settled on the east side." On the next page, however, it states that Thomas Pendleton came in 1775, with sons Samuel, Gideon, etc., while on page 249, it is affirmed that Thomas Pendleton came to the island in 1766, and took up 900 acres, and that his whole family soon followed and settled upon his land. The records of the Court of Common Pleas for Washington County, R. I. (Book H., pp. 48, 79, 269), however, show that Thomas Pendleton, "mariner," was engaged in various law-suits in Rhode Island from August, 1769, to August, 1771, and that his residence in the former year was at Stonington, and in 1770 and 1771, at Westerly. These facts would indicate that Thomas did not locate at Islesboro as early as has been generally supposed. He may of course have taken up land there before this as a preliminary toward making a settlement, but the actual date of his leaving the old home of the family must have been later than August, 1771.

At the first town meeting held at Islesboro, 6 April, 1789, Capt. Thomas Pendleton was elected surveyor of highways. He took an active interest in town affairs and his name often occurs in the early records. On the 14th of August, 1789, Thomas and his wife received from their son, Stephen Pendleton, a release of "The land they now live on, rent free" (Hancock Co., Me., Deeds, v, 513).

The descendants of Thomas Pendleton are exceedingly numerous and have been scattered all over the United States and Canada. They have been mostly interested in farming, shipping, and lumbering, in which latter pursuits some of the more enterprising have accumulated wealth. Of his six sons, Samuel was the only one to remain at Islesboro; Joshua and Nathaniel removed to Northport, Me., while the other three settled at Deer Island, N. B.

Thomas<sup>5</sup> Pendleton married at Block Island, R. I., 21 October, 1743, Doreas Dodge (Block Is. Rec.), daughter of Nathaniel and

Margaret (Pullin) Dodge (T. R. Woodward's "Dodge Gen.," p. 13). She was born there, 11 February, 1722. The "History of Islesboro" [p. 249] says that Dorcas was daughter of Tristram Dodge,—probably an error, as the Block Island records have no Dorcas, daughter of a Tristram Dodge, at this period, while Dorcas, daughter of Nathaniel and Margaret Dodge, had brothers *Nathaniel*, *Mark*, and *Gideon*, and sister, *Mary*. All these names occurring among Thomas Pendleton's children as well as that of Margaret, is pretty good evidence as to his wife's parentage. The Block Island records show the marriage of Nathaniel Dodge and Margaret Pullin, 3 March, 1706; the "Dodge Genealogy" calls her Margaret "Pulling," while Arnold in his "Vital Records of Rhode Island," refers to her as Margaret "Hulling."

No record has been found of Thomas Pendleton's children, but the following list supplied by his various descendants is probably complete; the first six in all likelihood were born at Westerly, R. I., the others at Stonington, Conn.

76. SAMUEL<sup>5</sup> PENDLETON (*James<sup>4</sup>, Caleb<sup>3</sup>*), was born 21 September, 1720, at Westerly, R. I., and died there in 1792. The Council and Probate records of Westerly have the following item concerning Samuel<sup>5</sup>: "At a meeting of the Town Council, 27 March, 1749,

*some and before*

voted, that the clerk of this Council shall give a certificate to the Selectmen of the town of Colchester, Ct., that this

town will accept of Samuel Pendleton and his wife and three children to be inhabitants of this town, and will receive them as such from said town when legally requested thereto." It is likely that the three children mentioned here were Mary, Esther, and Martha, who are named in Samuel's will, but whose names are not given in the list of his children that appears in the Westerly records.

Samuel's name has not been found upon the Colchester records, and it is evident that he did not remain there long,—if indeed he ever went there,—as in 1757 he paid taxes at Westerly amounting to 2s. 9d. On the 18th of November, 1754, he had bought of Thomas

Edwards of Westerly, 15 acres and 38 rods of land in that town, bounded partly on land of James Hall and Benoni Smith (W. L. E., ix, 242). From Nathaniel Crandall of New London he secured for £500, 11 1/2 acres at Westerly, 27 February, 1760 (Ibid., p. 351).

The Rhode Island Census of 1774 notes two Samuel Pendletons as heads of families at Westerly, one of which names must be an error, as the only other Samuel Pendleton of this period had removed to Maine about 1771. Neither of these families, however, quite corresponds with that of Samuel<sup>5</sup> in that year. (See Appendix IX.)

On the 15th of April, 1775, he was appointed with Joseph Crandall, 3rd, executor of the will of their father-in-law, James Hall, upon the refusal of the executors named in the will to act as such (West. C. & P. Rec., iv, 255).

16 January, 1777, Samuel Pendleton served as private in Capt. Edward Bliven's Westerly Alarm Co. (Westerly Town Rec.). On the 18th of September, 1776, a paper was circulated at Westerly for the signatures of those who intended to support the Revolutionary cause, and Samuel Pendleton was the first of the 218 patriots to affix his name to this "Test Act."

Samuel Pendleton's will, dated 8 September, 1790, proved 31 December, 1792 [see Appendix VIII], names wife, Phebe; sons, Stephen and Gideon; daughters, Esther Eldredge, Rebecca Sims, Anna Pendleton, Harriet Crumb, Mary Hardy, and Martha Bromley. Receipts were given 27 May, 1799, by Rebecca Sims, William Sims, Anna Sims, Samuel Sims, Harriet Crumb, Simeon Crumb, and Esther Eldredge (C. & P. Rec., Book I. following Book VI, p. 49).

Samuel<sup>5</sup> Pendleton married at Westerly, R. I. 13 February, 1744/45, Phebe Hall, daughter of James Hall. James Hall in his will, dated at Westerly, 27 March, 1775, names wife, Honor (C. & P. Rec., iv, 255). Phebe (Hall) Pendleton died in 1799.

Elliott's Regt. raised for three years, as shown by the list of balances reported due, Oct., 1785 (Mss., R. I. Hist. Soc.). On the 11th of June, 1778, he was enlisted by the town of Westerly for nine months' service for state of R. I., and as a matross in Col. Elliott's Regt. of Artillery, Capt. E. Adam's Co., he received pay from 1 July to 1 Sept., 1778, and from 1 Oct. to 1 November, 1778 (R. I. Military Returns).

4 May, 1795, Stephen Pendleton and Anna, his wife, sold to Simeon Crumb all their rights in the estate of their grandfather, James Hall (W. L. E., xii, 1). "4 July, 1808, Dan-

iel Miner, 3rd, and Saxton Miner, of North Stonington, Conn., recover judgment on Stephen Pendleton of said town, for \$12.26 to debt, and \$2.01 costs" (Joshua Babcock's Court Record, p. 96).

Stephen's marriage is not of record, nor have any references to him been found upon the Stonington and North Stonington records. His name is not included in the U. S. Census of Westerly or Stonington in 1790, but in 1800 it appears in the Stonington Census, his family consisting only of one female over forty-five years old. His name is not given in the 1810 Census of these towns, and it is likely that he removed to Deruyter, N. Y., just prior to that year. The U. S. Pension records show that on the 19th of June, 1821, Stephen Pendleton of Deruyter, N. Y., aged 63 years, applied for a pension as a Revolutionary soldier, giving his services as we have noted above with the addition of one year and three months in Col. William Richmond's Regt. from Nov., 1775, and one year in Capt. Thomas Cole's Company, Col. Christopher Greene's Regt., from Dec., 1779. His claim, which was allowed by the Government, mentioned wife Anna, then 64 years old, but gave no further family data. We have found no reference to Stephen<sup>6</sup> in the accounts of the town of Deruyter given in the histories of Madison Co., N. Y., and what became of him afterwards is unknown. It would seem from the Census and Pension records that he had no children, or at least, none that survived infancy. His name does not appear in the Probate Records of Madison County.

239. Gideon, b. 15 May, 1759; m. Anne Rose.

240. Anna, b. 18 March, 1760; m. at Westerly, 8 Feby., 1794 (as his sec. wf.), Samuel Sims, son of William and Jerusha (Lanphere) Sims. His first wife was [100] Deborah<sup>6</sup> Pendleton, by whom he had six ch. We have no rec., however, that he had issue by his second wife. Anna survived her husband, and received a pension as the widow of a Revolutionary soldier. He died at Westerly, 2 Feby., 1831 (Westerly Prob. Rec., Book 3, p. 188). An item in the Westerly C. & P. Rec., vi, 249, dated 30 Oct., 1809, shows that Anna was then deranged.

241. Harriet, b. 4 Feby., 1762; m. Simeon Crumb.

242. Lucy, b. 27 May, 1766. She d. at Westerly in 1791, prob. unm., as on the 3rd of March of that year Samuel Pendleton was apptd. admr. on the estate of Lucy Pendleton, late of Westerly, dec. (C. & P. Rec.). Her mother's will, however, names "My grandson, Elias Babcock, son of my daughter, Lucy, deceased." No reference to this ch. appears in the "Babcock Gen." On the 28th of Dec., 1801, Elias P. Babcock gave a receipt for his legacy in his grandmother's will

and had a guardianship over him removed (Probate Rec., Book 1, p. 48).

77. **THANKFUL PENDLETON** (*James<sup>4</sup>, Caleb<sup>3</sup>*), was born at Westerly, R. I., 14 July, 1725. She married at Stonington, Conn., 14 April, 1748,\* Christopher Coats, probably the son of Caleb and Mary (Keys) Coats, who was born there 13 September, 1720, and baptized 29 December, 1723.†

80. **RUTH<sup>5</sup> PENDLETON** (*James<sup>4</sup>, Caleb<sup>3</sup>*), was born at Westerly, R. I., 19 December, 1734. She married at Westerly, 30 December, 1762, Elisha Brown (T. R.). He was probably the Elisha Brown who married her cousin, [85] Lydia<sup>5</sup> Pendleton, in 1758, as it would seem unlikely for two different men of the same name to have contracted these marriages. If we assume this to be the case, the Lydia Brown who was baptized in the Goshen church of Lebanon, Conn., and the Elisha Brown who was baptized there, 15 January, 1764, may have been Ruth's children, although we have nothing to show but that they might have been Lydia's. If these baptisms refer to adults, we should be at a loss to know what became of Ruth. The town records of Lebanon throw no light on this matter, and accordingly we must regard it as problematical.

83. **MARY<sup>5</sup> PENDLETON** (*Caleb<sup>4</sup>, Caleb<sup>3</sup>*), was born at Westerly, R. I., 2 April, 1727, and was baptized at the house of John Randall, Stonington, 12 October, 1741, aged 14, "dangerously sick" (First Ch. Rec.). She married at Stonington, Conn., 3 February, 1741/2, Thomas<sup>5</sup> Main, Jr. (Second Ch. Rec.), a second cousin, son of Deacon Thomas and (first wife) Ann<sup>4</sup> (Brown) Main, and grandson of Eleazer and [11] Ann<sup>3</sup> (Pendleton) Brown. He was born at Stonington, 12 February, 1721, and died about 1771. Thomas Main, Sr., had a second wife, Elizabeth,‡ whom he names in his will (1771), but his first wife was living in 1724 when she signed with

her husband a deed given by the heirs of Ann<sup>3</sup> (Pendleton) Brown, and so was the mother of Thomas, Jr.

14 August, 1749, "We Thomas Main, Jr., of Stonington, and Mary Main his wife, a daughter of Caleb Pendleton late of Colchester, dec'd, have received of Capt. John Randall, exec. to the last will of the sd. Caleb Pendleton, 1/3 part of the Household Stuff mentioned in the inventory of the estate of the s<sup>d</sup> Caleb Pendleton and also £30 money which is in full of the legacy given to the s<sup>d</sup> Mary in s<sup>d</sup> will" (Hartford, Conn., Prob. Rec., xiii, 113).

The will of Thomas Main, Jr., "of Stonington, yeoman," dated 23 April, 1770, proved 17 November, 1771 (Stonington Prob. Rec., i, 315), names wife, Mary; sons, Benajah, William, Thomas; daughters, Mary Main, Prudence Benjamin, Abigail Eccleston, Sarah Foster, and Lucy Main. Son Thomas and wife Mary, executors.

84. BENAJAH<sup>5</sup> PENDLETON (*Caleb<sup>4</sup>, Caleb<sup>3</sup>*), was born at Westerly, R. I., 24 July, 1729, and died at Ticonderoga, N. Y., 15 August, 1815. After his father's death at Colchester, Conn., in 1741, and his mother's remarriage, Benajah was brought up by his uncle, Capt. John Randall of Stonington, Conn. In 1745 he was left forty shillings by the will of his grandfather, Caleb<sup>3</sup> Pendleton. 10 October, 1750, Benajah gave receipt to his uncle Randall for £235 in full of what was due him from his father's will (Hartford, Conn., Prob. Rec., xiii, 113), and on the 25th of October, 1751, he sold his father's farm in Colchester to Peter Bulkeley of that town for £4000 "in Bills of Credit" (Colchester Deeds, vi, 128). In the following year he received from his uncle, Brian<sup>4</sup> Pendleton, a deed of land at Westerly, abstract of which transfer has already been given. (See page 72.)

On the 16th of October, 1752, Benajah Pendleton bought of Humphrey Avery land in Stonington for £5000. His name appears frequently thereafter upon the Stonington deeds up to 1763, at which time his residence is given as Lebanon, Conn. He seems to have lived at Norwich, Conn., for a brief interval in 1765, as on the 22d of January in that year he bought a house and a small tract of land there "On the town street," and sold this property the following 30th of March (Norwich Deeds). The Land Records of Lebanon

show he lived in that part of the town known as the "Goshen Society" up to about 1779, when as a resident of Colchester he recovered judgment against Nathan Stark of Lebanon on the 29th of March (Vol. xiii, p. 52).

Sometime prior to 1790 he removed to Vermont, but as his name does not appear in the Colchester deeds nor in those of any town in the Green Mountain State as far as we have searched, we cannot determine the exact date of his removal there. A tradition among the descendants of his daughter, Jerusha, says that he was paymaster of a Vermont regiment during the Revolution, but we do not think this is entitled to much weight. His name is not given in the fragmentary lists of the Revolutionary soldiers of that state. The first record we have of him there is in the U. S. Census of 1790, which shows him at Pownal, Bennington County, with only three females in his family. From this time until his death, twenty-five years later, we have no positive record of him, although it is fairly certain that he removed from Pownal to the Champlain Lake region.

Benajah's marriage and the birth of his first child are recorded at Stonington, Conn., but of his other children no record has come to light, and as his will, if he ever made one, has never been found, we cannot be altogether certain that the list we have of his children is entirely complete, although we believe we have the names of all but one of those who reared families of their own. The first clue to the descendants of Benajah Pendleton was found in the "Douglas Genealogy," and Dr. Cyrus H. Pendleton of Hebron, Conn., worked out much that we have relating to them.

Benajah<sup>5</sup> Pendleton married at Stonington, Conn., 15 May, 1750, Mary Breed. The "History of Stonington" says she was the daughter of John and Mary (Prentice) Breed, and it is worthy of note that Benajah had a grandson named Prentice Pendleton.

85. LYDIA PENDLETON (*Caleb*<sup>4</sup>, *Caleb*<sup>3</sup>), was born about 1736, and died probably about 1759, at Colechester, Conn. On the 17th of December, 1754, Ichabod Randall, guardian to Lydia Pendleton, gave receipt to Capt. John Randall of Stonington, for £26 8s., "old tenor," "in full of what said Randall was to pay Lydia Pendleton

when she comes of age" (Hartford District Prob. Rec., xiii, 113). The town records of Colchester, Conn., show that Lydia Pendleton married Elisha Brown, 12 April, 1758, and had issue (Brown):

Lydia must have died soon afterward, if her husband was the Elisha Brown who married her cousin. [80] Ruth<sup>5</sup> Pendleton, in 1762, as seems likely.

87. (REV.) JOHN<sup>5</sup> PENDLETON (*Brian<sup>4</sup>, Caleb<sup>3</sup>*), was born at West-erly, R. I., 26 September, 1727, and died at Springfield, Mass., 1 January, 1788 (G. S.). He settled at Colchester, Conn., prior to 1754, as on December 2d of that year William Wilcox of Stonington, "For love and good will I have for my grandson, John Pendleton of Colchester," quit-claimed to him land in Stonington (Ston. deeds).

He sold the property he had acquired at Colchester to Mary Fitch, 15 September, 1757 (Colchester deeds), and on the 18th of April in the same year bought of Jabez Huntington, of Norwich, two acres of land in Groton near the Preston line (Groton deeds). He added to this property by successive purchases up to 1761, when on the 1st of June he bought of Nathan Allyn a tract of land with dwelling house, near Hurlburt's Ferry. This property he sold to his brother-in-law, Daniel Lamb, Jr., in the following year, and in 1768 he bought two lots at Gale's Ferry. This property he did not dispose of until 9 January, 1778, when he sold it to John Brown, Jr., of Hopkinton, for £15. This deed shows that John Pendleton was then of Richmond, R. I. (Groton deeds, viii, 209).

During his residence in Groton John Pendleton was evidently preparing to enter the ministry, as at a meeting of the First General Baptist Church at Richmond, R. I., 26 December, 1770, it was voted to take him on trial as their elder. The record refers to him as being of North Kingstown, R. I., at that time. He accepted this call to the Richmond church, and proving satisfactory was ordained 11 February, 1771, as its first regular pastor. At this time the church had 213 lay members, and during the first year of his pastorate the society built its house of worship. Knight, in his "History of the Churches in Rhode Island" (published in 1827), says of Elder Pendleton: "He was a man of talents and an eloquent and powerful preacher, but ambitious and of an irritable temper, which occasioned much grief in his church and difficulty in the yearly meeting." It is not unlikely, as indicated by the church records, that the attempts of certain members of the North Kingston church to induce Elder Pendleton to come to them were productive of much of this discord. To attain this object they went to great lengths, even bringing charges against the elder in the General Conference. These charges were disproved and Elder Pendleton received a recommendation from his church as he was accustomed to travel preaching the Gospel.

On the 27th of May, 1772, he bought of Nathaniel Pulman for

£60 about 25 acres of land with buildings thereon, which lay just north of the meeting-house lot (Richmond Deeds, iii, 37-38). This property he sold to Benedict Kinyon for 300 Spanish dollars, 7 September, 1781 (*Ibid.*, iii, 270). It is probable his labors with the Richmond church ended about this time, although the church records contain no evidence as to the exact date, and the next minister was not called until the 7th of June, 1788, six months after Rev. John Pendleton's death. In 1783 we find he performed a marriage at South Kingstown, R. I.

On the 23rd of June, 1784, he bought of Daniel Lamb of Springfield, Mass., about 100 acres of land with dwelling house in Springfield for £150. John Pendleton was at West Greenwich, R. I., at this date (Hampden Co., Mass., Deeds, xxiv, 94). Not long after this he removed to Springfield and took the watch-care of a society made up in Springfield, West Springfield, and South Hadley, preaching alternately in each town (Mss. of his nephew Caleb Pendleton, Jr.). The last reference to him before his death appears under date of 28 September, 1787, when he sold to John "Cinklear" [St. Clair], of Windsor, Conn., ten acres of his Springfield land (Hampden Co. Deeds, xxviii, 719). His death occurred suddenly, as he was found dead in the road near his house (Caleb Pendleton, Jr., Mss.). He is buried beside his brother and sisters in the cemetery at South Hadley Falls, Mass.

The various deeds given by Rev. John Pendleton show that his wife's Christian name was Jane and the descendants of his brother Caleb state she was Jane Frink, daughter of Luther Frink. His marriage has not appeared upon record in any of the towns in which he lived, nor has any list of his children come to light. He left a will, as stated in a deed of his son Jeremiah, but it does not appear to have been recorded. The Rhode Island Census of Richmond in 1774 shows that besides himself and wife, his family consisted of one male and one female over 16, and two females under 16, and the land records at Springfield, Mass., and Exeter, R. I., give us three of their names.

59. ANNA<sup>5</sup> PENDLETON (*Brian<sup>4</sup>, Caleb<sup>3</sup>*), was born at Westerly, R. I., 26 March, 1731-2, and died near Springfield, Mass., 26 May, 1813. She is buried with many others of the family in the cemetery at South Hadley Falls, Mass. Her gravestone states she was 83 years old at time of death. Anna<sup>5</sup> married at Stonington, Conn., 22 November, 1750, John Frink (Sec. Ch. Rec.), son of Benjamin and Tacy (Burdick) Frink. He was born at Stonington, 2 October,

1732, and died November, 1823. About 1760, he removed with his family to Springfield, Mass. The records of that state show that "John Frink of Springfield" was a soldier in the Revolution, serving in the Continental Army from 1777 to 1780. This may have been John, Jr. Jesse Pendleton was appointed administrator on estate of John Frink of Springfield, "Who died in November last," January, 1824 (Hampden Co., Mass., Prob. Rec., Docket 4521).

90. CALEB<sup>5</sup> PENDLETON (*Brian*<sup>4</sup>, *Caleb*<sup>3</sup>), was born at Westerly, R. I., 1 December, 1734, and died in Chicopee Parish, Springfield, Mass., 29 March, 1826. He was a farmer and made his home at Stonington, Conn., until 1764, when he removed to the part of Westerly, R. I., known as the Lottery Village. His name appears in the Westerly Census of 1774, and his family there given tallies exactly with our record. In 1776 he was enrolled in the First Co. Westerly Militia, and on the 9th of June in the following year he sold his property in Westerly to James Chesebrough (W. L. E., x, 520). His son, Caleb<sup>6</sup> Pendleton, Jr., says in his autobiography, "In the year 1777, in June, my father moved from Westerly by water to Springfield on the east side of Connecticut river in the State of Massachusetts, at the North Parish, called Chicopee." This account differs very materially from the one given in "Old Springfield" [p. 301], under an article referring to Caleb's son, Jesse<sup>6</sup>, which reads as follows: "During the Revolutionary War his father [i. e. Caleb<sup>5</sup>] and his uncle [Rev. John ?] while in the Colonial service left their wives and children at home. In 1781 when the British fleet under Benedict Arnold were ravaging the coast and came to New London, a shot fired from one of their ships passed through

the pantry, breaking all the dishes. The women thought it best to remove from so exposed a situation; therefore they spent the rest of the time at Coventry, R. I., until the return of their husbands. After the close of the war his brother, Rev. John Pendleton, and other members of the family having preceded him, Mr. Pendleton with three other families all related, removed to the vicinity of Willimansett (Chicopee). Jesse, then a young lad, went most of the way on foot beside his father, the oxteam carrying his mother and other members of the family with their household goods. In 1803 the family removed to the highlands of Willimansett."

In view of the fact that Caleb sold his property in Westerly in the same month and year as his son Caleb, Jr., says he removed to Springfield, and that the marriage intentions of his daughter Sylvia were entered there 21 March, 1782, while his brother John did not settle there until 1783-4, as already shown, we should consider the son's account as being more nearly accurate. It is true that Caleb<sup>5</sup> did not purchase land in Springfield until the 26th of October, 1785, when he bought for £6 "Four acres of land with a dwelling house thereon, where the said Caleb Pendleton now lives" (Hampden Co., Mass., Deeds, xxv, 445), but he may have lived there several years prior to that date, taking up land on lease.

Caleb<sup>5</sup> Pendleton married Hannah Closson, evidently the daughter of Nathan and Alice (Hart) Closson, who was born 5 November, 1738, at Tiverton, R. I. Her date of birth as given in the Tiverton records tallies exactly with the date given in her son Caleb's family Bible. Hannah, widow of Caleb, died 13 October, 1832, Chicopee Parish, Springfield, Mass.

92. CONTENT<sup>5</sup> PENDLETON (*Brian<sup>4</sup>, Caleb<sup>3</sup>*), was born 9 May, 1742, probably at Westerly, R. I., and died 6 September, 1798, at South Hadley, Mass. (G. S.). She married as his first wife, 26th March, 1758, Daniel Lamb, Jr., son of Daniel Lamb of Groton, Conn. He was born at Groton in 1735, and died at South Hadley, Mass., 27 December, 1819, aged 82 (G. S.).

Daniel Lamb, Jr., was a farmer and removed to South Hadley about 1763, where he became the owner of much property. His second wife was Cynthia Lanphere, who died 7 March, 1835, aged 60 (G. S.). The will of Daniel Lamb of South Hadley, dated 12 March, 1814, proved 7 March, 1820 (Hampshire Co., Mass., Prob.

Rec., xxxiv, 359), names wife, "Cinthia," sons, Daniel, Ezekiel, Aroswell, Pendleton; daughters, Roxilina Chapin, and Polly Wells.

Issue (Lamb), first two born at Groton, Conn., others at South Hadley, Mass.:

93. HANNAH<sup>5</sup> PENDLETON (*Brian*<sup>4</sup>, *Caleb*<sup>3</sup>), was born about 1744, and died 26 January, 1828 (G. S.), at, or near, Springfield, Mass. She married 16 March, 1766, Collins Brown (Records Second Church, Stonington, Conn.). The Stonington vital records [Book 3, p. 6], show that Collins, son of Thomas Brown, was born there 13 June, 1743, and that Thomas Brown married Deborah Holdredge 27 April, 1737 (Ibid., p. 86). This Thomas Brown was evidently Thomas, 4th, born 15 April, 1717, whose mother, according to the Brown Genealogy [p. 13], and the History of Stonington [p. 260], was also named Deborah Holdredge, her marriage to Thomas Brown, 3rd, having occurred 4 October, 1715. No reference to the marriage of Thomas, 4th, nor to Collins Brown, appears in the Brown Genealogy. Collins Brown and his wife were living at Pawcatuck, Stonington, as late as 1777, as shown by deeds upon the town records.

\* Ezekiel Lamb also had four children that died young. Nancy m. J. A. E. Lamoureux.

They probably removed to Springfield, Mass., not long after this date, following her brother, Caleb, and her sisters, Anna and Content, who had already settled there. Their gravestones are in the old cemetery at South Hadley Falls, and the inscription on that of Collins states that he died 26 February, 1822, *aged* 86, which if we have identified him correctly would be eight years out of the way.

Collins Brown left no will that was ever recorded, nor has any administration upon his estate been found. No list of his children has come to light either, but their names as far as we have been able to determine were as follows:

## SIXTH GENERATION

94. (MAJOR) JOSEPH<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*Joseph<sup>5</sup>, Col. Joseph<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>*), was born at Westerly, R. I., 17 January, 1747, and died there, 9 July, 1822. Upon the death of his father at sea in 1749,

Col. Joseph<sup>4</sup> Pendleton, who gave bond to the Town Council of Westerly, 1 July, 1751 (recorded 7 July, 1769, C. & P. Rec., iv. 11), as administrator of one half of the estate of Joseph<sup>5</sup> Pendleton and as guardian of young Joseph<sup>6</sup>. After his grandfather's death, Joseph<sup>6</sup> chose as guardian, 27 August, 1764, Robert Potter, who, however, refused to accept the trust (C. & P. Rec., iv. 59).

That Joseph<sup>6</sup> Pendleton was dissatisfied with the administration of his father's estate and brought suit against the Town Council in its capacity as a court of probate is shown by the Council voting on the 25 December, 1769, to pay George Stillman £47 9s. 8d. "For his time, expenses, Horse-ride, in defending the suit Joseph Pendleton brought against the Town Council that settled the estate of Joseph Pendleton Junr. dec." (C. & P. Rec., iv. 136).

In May, 1770, Joseph<sup>6</sup> Pendleton was appointed Ensign of the First Westerly Co., King's County Regiment, and in August, 1774, he became Lieutenant of the Company. The Rhode Island Census for this year shows that he owned a slave. Upon the outbreak of the Revolutionary War, he was one of those appointed by the Rhode Island Assembly in 1775 to raise not more than twenty men for the "army of observation," and to command those so raised under the direction of his superior officers at a salary of six shillings per day (Colonial Records R. I.). In June of this year he was re-appointed Lieutenant of the First Westerly Company, and became its Captain in the following October. On the 26th of August, 1777, Capt. Joseph Pendleton was engaged as a recruiting officer in Westerly "To enlist soldiers for the Continental Service," and on the 30th January, 1778, he was appointed "To collect the stockings that are still deficient to clothe the soldiers."

In August, 1778, he commanded a company in "Sullivan's Expedition," Col. J. Noyes' Regiment, and in May, 1779, he became Major of the First Regiment, King's County Militia, an office to which he was re-appointed by the Assembly in February, 1780, and in May, 1781.

In civil affairs Major Pendleton was equally active. He was a Justice at Westerly for over thirty years, and officiated at many weddings there; in those days in New England marriage was regarded more as a civil than a religious contract, and the clergy had not then assumed its well-nigh absolute control of this office as at present. He was also one of the Town Councilmen of Westerly from 1789 to 1794; both before and after this period the board frequently met at his house, which he had been licensed to conduct as a tavern. Just as was the case with his grandfather, Col. Joseph<sup>t</sup> Pendleton, Major Joseph had many orders on the Town Treasurer for "Expense of Council" at these sessions, and it would seem that the arduous labors of the village fathers were not altogether unrelieved by some of the good things of life.

That the Major was rather set in his religious views is indicated by an item in the records of the "Hill Church" at Westerly. At a meeting held on the 1<sup>st</sup> of March, 1813, the church took up the case of the "back-sliding" sister, Nancy Pendleton, Major Joseph's wife. "Brother Kenyon made return he had conversed with her but found her in no mind to go with us, as she had come into an agreement with her husband that if he would not go to meeting with the Elder Brown's church she would not come to meeting with us." It would appear from this that the trust idea is not altogether a latter-day development, as here was a clear case of a combination in restraint of religion.

Joseph<sup>6</sup> Pendleton's will, dated at Westerly, R. I., 26 May, 1822, and recorded on page 16 of the second volume, second series of Council and Probate records, names sons, Abel, Joseph, Benjamin, Gurdon, William and Elliot; daughters, Nancy, wife of Tim Chapman; Demaris, wife of Israel Wightman; Eunice, wife of Oliver Rhodes; Alice, wife of Joshua Pendleton; Polly, wife of Case Chapman, Martha, wife of Greenman Edwards; Fanny, wife of Elias Cottrell; Betsey, wife of Russell Cottrell; and Lucy Ann, wife of David Pendleton.

Major Joseph<sup>6</sup> Pendleton married (1), at Westerly, R. I., 19 January, 1766, Demaris Crandall, daughter of James and Demaris (Kenyon) Crandall. She was born 8 September, 1749, and died —. After her death he married a second wife, and while her name is not of record, evidence that such a marriage took place is found in the records of births of his twelve youngest children, who are given as children of Joseph Pendleton and *third wife* Nancy ("Town Meetings," iii, 101). By his second marriage Major Pendleton had one daughter, Eunice, and one of her children has stated that Eunice's maternal grandfather was George Babcock of Westerly. The Babcock Genealogy, however, has no record of any Eunice Pendleton, granddaughter of a George Babcock, at this period. A Eunice Babcock, born 3 October, 1744, is noted of whom no further record is given. Her father was Simeon Babcock. Major Joseph's daughter Eunice left to her children linen marked with the initial "B."

Joseph<sup>6</sup> married (3), at Westerly, R. I., 23 March, 1777, Nancy Crandall, a cousin of his first wife, and daughter of Benjamin and Alice (Kenyon) Crandall. She was born 4 May, 1761.

95. WILLIAM<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*Joseph<sup>5</sup>, Col. Joseph<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>*), was born at Westerly, R. I., 15 July, 1749, and died at Watervliet, N. Y., 6 January, 1822. His father was lost at sea in 1749, and on the 27th August, 1764, the orphan first chose Joshua Thompson as his guardian, and later, on the 25th February, 1765, chose William Champlin, his grandfather (Westerly C. & P. Rec., iv, 59, 70). That he was the William Pendleton who settled at Newport, R. I., is shown by a mortgage deed given in 1780 by William Champlin of Westerly, grandfather to William Pendleton of Newport, R. I. (W. L. E.).

In 1776 he was appointed Ensign of the 2nd Newport Co., Henry Wiles, Captain, but left the island when that city was taken by the British in that year. Some time later he lived at Middletown, R. I., where he sold land, 19 January, 1790, to Daniel Lyman, and the rest of his property to George Edward and Elisha Smith, on the 4th of January, 1791 (Middletown Deeds). The U. S. Census of 1790 shows him at Newport, R. I. He owned a slave in that year.

Shortly afterward it would appear that he removed to Hudson, and then to Watervliet, N. Y., as on the 11th May, 1793, William

Pendleton, husbandman of Hudson, N. Y., bought of Wilson Jacobs, mariner, and wife Mercy Jacobs of Troy, N. Y., for £700, 217 acres in the West District of the Manor of Rensselaerwyck (now Watervliet, N. Y.), about a half mile west of the Hudson river (Albany Co., N. Y., Deeds, xiii, 254). The rest of his life was spent upon this farm. His daughters who had already married settled near by, while the younger ones made his household a very attractive place for the young folk of the neighborhood.

The Albany Gazette of Friday, 11 January, 1822, now on file at the State Library in Albany, publishes the following obituary: "Died: On the 6th inst., at his residence in the town of Watervliet, one mile west of Troy, Mr. William Pendleton, in the 74th year of his age. He was a patriot in the Revolutionary War, and with others made his escape from Rhode Island under the fire of the British ships. He was a kind and affectionate husband and father, and has left a widow and several children to mourn his loss. He was a sincere friend, an obliging neighbor and benevolent to the poor. He died in the hope of a glorious resurrection, through the mediation of the Saviour Jesus Christ."

William Pendleton's will, dated 5 January, 1822, probated 2 February, 1822, appears at length on pp. 341-2 of Vol. V of Wills, Albany Co., N. Y. Surrogate records, and names wife, Martha; daughters, Mary Dyer, Martha Frink, Prudence, Ruth and Lydia Ann Pendleton; a married daughter, Nancy; a son, William, then unmarried; grandchildren, William, Joseph, John and Fidelia Dyer; William Frink, son of Martha; and Nancy, daughter of Nancy; an Isaac Frink and a William Clements are also mentioned, and while their relationship is not stated, they appear to have been grandsons. Mrs. Thomas Barber, of Albany, N. Y., granddaughter to William, has stated that he had eleven daughters, but a comparison of his will with the Rhode Island Census of his family in 1774, and with the United States Censuses of 1790 and 1800 indicates but eight. The 1774 Census may show that he had a son in that year, but if this was the case such child must have died in infancy, as no record of it has ever been found.

William Pendleton married at Newport, R. I., in June, 1770, Martha Brown, daughter of John and Ruth Brown (Newport Rec.). She and her daughter Martha were baptized in the First Sabbatarian Church of Newport, 16 November, 1773. She died at Watervliet, N. Y., late in 1825, as on the 29th of November of that year her daughter Ruth was appointed administratrix of her estate (Albany Co., N. Y., Surrogate Rec.; Adm. v. 57).

All but the last four of William's children were born probably at Newport, R. I., although they are not of record there.

William Pendleton Clements is said to have married twice and had issue, Eben, John, and Marietta, who m. a Fryer, of Crooked Lake, N. Y. Just as we go to press there comes a statement from a grandson of Phebe (Pendleton) Frink to the effect that she was married twice, her second husband being a Clements, by whom she had four children. This would throw doubt upon our supposition that there was another daughter here, unless we accept the statement of Mrs. Barber, daughter of Nancy Pendleton, that two of her Pendleton aunts married Clements.

96. SYLVESTER<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*Sylvester<sup>5</sup>, Col. Joseph<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>*), was born about 1749, probably at Westerly, R. I., and died 30 July, 1788, at Stonington, Conn. He was a master mariner and made his home at Stonington, Conn. On the 14th October, 1776, he joined in a memorial from Stonington to the Connecticut General Assembly for arms and protection against the British. Sylvester Pendleton was buried in the Robinson Burying Ground at Stonington, and his gravestone states that he died "In the 40th year of his age." He may have been the S. Pendleton, doctor in Conn. Militia who served under Gen. Spencer at Rhode Island, 1776-7, and in 1778 (Conn. Revolutionary records).

Sylvester<sup>6</sup> Pendleton married at Stonington, 11 April, 1773, Eunice Cobb (First Ch. Rec.), daughter of Henry, 3rd, and Mary (Babcock) Cobb. She was born 3 August, 1748 (Babcock Gen., p. 50), and was living at Stonington, not re-married, as late as 1800, as her name appears in the U. S. Census of that year.

William Pendleton," distinguishing him from the other grandson, Sylvester Pendleton, to whom the Colonel refers as "My grandson . . . son of Sylvester Pendleton and born of his wife," is proved by Sylvester's own will, dated 25 June, 1788, and recorded at Page 129, of Book 5, Stonington Prob. record, which besides naming wife Eunice and children as given above, appoints as executor, "*My brother, William Sheffield*,"—i. e., William<sup>6</sup> Sheffield, son of Isaac and [50] Freelope<sup>5</sup> (Pendleton) Sheffield, who was born 1 Feby. 1757.

99. CATHERINE<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*Sylvester<sup>5</sup>, Col. Joseph<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>5</sup>*), was born at Westerly, R. I., 13 March, 1757, and died at Brookfield, N. Y., 4 September, 1824. She married as first wife, at Hopkinton, R. I., 5 December, 1776, Rev. Henry Clarke (Hop. Rec.), son of Rev. Joshua and Hannah (Cottrell) Clarke. He was born 2 December, 1756, at Westerly, R. I., and died 22 March, 1831, at Brookfield, N. Y. His second wife was Mrs. Lydia (Stillman) Burdick, whom he married 26 June, 1825.

His second wife was [240] Anna<sup>6</sup> Pendleton, daughter of [76] Samuel<sup>5</sup>.

101. SARAH<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*Sylvester<sup>5</sup>, Col. Joseph<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>*), was born at Westerly, R. I., 26 May, 1760. She married at Hopkinton, R. I., 24 April, 1779, Willett Clarke (Hop. Rec.), son of Rev. Joshua and Hannah (Cottrell) Clarke. He was born 20 October, 1759. No record of their children has come to light, but some of them settled in Niagara Co., N. Y., where they gave the name "Pendleton" to the town in which they located. Among the Clarkes who appear upon the Probate records of that county, the following three were probably children of Willett and Sarah (Pendleton) Clarke:

She married (1), at Westerly, R. I., 18 September, 1777,\* Enoch Crandall, son of James and Demaris (Kenyon) Crandall. This marriage appears in the Westerly records as "Enoch Crandall, son of James, and Marcy Pendleton, of Simeon." She was probably Crandall's second wife, as the Westerly records show that an Enoch Crandall married Hannah Crandall, 24 March, 1773. Enoch died at Hopkinton, R. I., 25 May, 1811 (G. S.). Mercy married (2), Joseph Lawton, as shown by her father's will, dated in 1819.

112. ETHAN<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*Simeon*<sup>5</sup>, *Col. Joseph*<sup>4</sup>, *Joseph*<sup>3</sup>), was born at Westerly, R. I., 3 April, 1777, and died at Norfolk, Conn., 20 September, 1860. Shortly after his first marriage he removed to Brookfield, N. Y., where he lived about nine years. After his wife's death he returned to his native place in January, 1809, remaining there some five or six years, and then removing to Norfolk, Conn. Here he leased a farm which he bought two years later for \$8550. It contained 500 acres and he added to it by successive purchases until he owned not less than 1000 acres, keeping from forty to sixty head of cattle, besides young stock, sheep, etc. Though rather small of stature, Ethan Pendleton was noted for the amount of work he could accomplish. Besides the farm he ran a saw mill and shop, where in addition to sawing lumber, he cut out from black oak timber great quantities of "clock plates," as they were called, in which were placed the works of the wooden clocks of that time. Until 1850 he lived in the old house on his farm, and then built the fine large residence which still stands, and in which his sons Frederick and Russell lived for a time.

Ethan Pendleton had four grandsons who served in the Civil War,

and three of them were killed in battle. In his number of marriages he holds the record in the Pendleton family.

He married (1), at Stonington, Conn., 1795, Ruth Taylor, daughter of Sanford and Ruth (Gardner) Taylor, of Stonington. She died 3 July, 1807.

He married (2), at Stonington, 16 March, 1809, Esther Hinckley, daughter of Abel and Sarah (Hobart) Hinckley. She was born at Stonington, 25 November, 1777, and died at Norfolk, Conn., 17 September, 1820.

He married (3) at Winchester, Conn., April, 1825, Lucinda Hungerford, daughter of Reuben and Olive (Gaylord) Hungerford. She was born 30 December, 1794, and died at Norfolk, 29 June, 1829.

115. JOB<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*Capt. William<sup>5</sup>, Col. William<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>*), was born about 1746, probably at Westerly, R. I., and died 25 Jany., 1794, aged 47, at Islesboro, Me. (G. S.). He went to Maine with

\* New Marlboro town records call him "Elnathen."

his father in 1769, and settled upon an island now known as "Billy Job's Island," near Long Island, and included in the town of Islesboro. When the controversy with Gen. Knox arose over the actual ownership of the lands he laid claim to in Maine, Job<sup>6</sup> Pendleton sent the following petition to the Massachusetts General Court:

"Little Long Island, 29th March, 1789.

Gentlemen—I, the subscriber, am possessed of an island laying in Penobscot Bay known by the name of Little Long Island, containing 204 acres (likewise an Island joining by a bar at low water containing 13 acres) Which Island I settled in the year 1769 together with Mr. James Matthews and Mr. Shubael Williams. On the 9th day of Nov. 1769 I purchased James Matthew's third part, likewise on the 23rd day of Sept. 1772, I purchased Mr. Shubael William's third part, which I have their deeds to show. The above written are facts that I can clearly prove, and whereas, Gentlemen, your having power to settle and do justice to the individuals in this remote part of the state, I humbly pray that you will inform me how I may still be in quiet possession of my lands, and humbly submit myself to your direction and the Laws of this commonwealth.

I am Gentlemen your most Obedient—and most Humble Servant,  
Job Pendleton."\*

At a Town Meeting held at Islesboro, 14 Jany., 1793, Capt. Job Pendleton and Capt. Godfrey Trim were chosen to appoint a place to build a meeting-house (Hist. Islesboro, p. 41). On the 22nd of August, 1793, Joseph Crary, of Frankfort, Me., sold to "Job Pendleton, gentleman, of Islesboro," for £60, 100 acres of land at Cape Jellison, adjoining Capt. Peleg Pendleton (Hancock Co., Me., Deeds, iii, 109). Job's widow sold this property to the Rev. Joseph Kidder for \$533.34 on the 14th of March, 1796 (Ibid., iii, 520). Nine days later she bought from Daniel Decrow, and Ambah, his wife, land at Ducktrap [Lincolnvillle], and settled there with her children (Ibid., vi, 121).

The will of Job Pendleton, dated 27 December, 1793, proved 17 April, 1794 (Hancock Co. Prob. Rec., i, 38), calls himself "Mariner"; mentions wife (without naming her); her children, Lucy, "Joanna" [Jane], Peleg, "And the one she is now pregnant with"; first wife's children, Sarah, Lydia, Priscilla, Dorothy, William, Amos, Job, and Joseph, who was then deceased as his chest and clothes were given to Amos. The inventory of Job's estate amounted to £1053, 1s. 2d., and included one quarter part of the schooner "William." Job Pendleton died on his own island and is buried in the old cemetery at the lower end of Long Island (Islesboro).

He married (1), at Stonington, Conn., 1 October, 1768, Sarah Crandall (First Ch. Rec.). She died at Islesboro about 1786, and he married (2), Lydia Deerow. Some say she was "the widow

116. LYDIA<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*Capt. William<sup>5</sup>, Col. William<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>*), married at Stonington, Conn., 24 January, 1765, Jared Crandall (First Ch. Rec.). It was believed among the descendants of Capt. William Pendleton that Jared Crandall and his wife removed to Ohio, but the following records show that they did not settle much over one hundred miles from Stonington: 6 February, 1784, Jared Crandall of Bernardston, Mass., sold to his father, Nathaniel Crandall, of Stonington, a tract of land in his native town (Stonington Deeds, x, 458). On the 6th of March, 1795, Jared Crandall, of Leyden, Mass., and Paul Crandall, of Stonington, Conn., were appointed administrators on the estate of Nathaniel Crandall, late of Stonington, deceased (Stonington Prob. Rec., v, 459), and on the 19th of March following, Jared and Paul, sons of Nathaniel Crandall, sold to James Rhodes, land in Pawcatuck (Stonington), which they had bought of David and Lucy Brand, and Nathaniel and Lois Minor, and also land they had bought of the heirs of the Primas family (Stonington Deeds, xiii, 222).

The will of Jared Crandall, dated at Leyden, Mass., 3 March, 1829, filed 13 October, 1829 (Franklin County Prob. Rec.), names wife, Lydia; oldest son, *Nathaniel*; second son, *William*; third son, *John*; only daughter, *Lydia Day*; fourth son, *Luke*. The latter was living at Leyden as late as 1857 (County Deeds), and had a wife, Climenä, who signed a deed with him 27 July, 1826 (*Ibid.*).

Jared Crandall was a selectman of Bernardston in 1782; he resided in that part of the town which was afterwards set off to form Leyden (History of Bernardston). We have not been able to determine what became of his descendants.

117. JONATHAN<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*Capt. William<sup>5</sup>, Col. William<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>*), was born at Westerly, R. I., 15 November, 1752, and died at Islesboro, Me., 14 October, 1841. He was one of the original settlers of Orrington, Me., in 1771, where he was assessed a tax of £1, 1s. 7d. on the 1st of June, 1776. In 1783 he sold his property and removed to Islesboro (Bangor, Me., Hist. Mag.). It is likely that Jonathan did not take his family to Orrington until 1781, as one of his granddaughters says: "He came from Bristol, Maine, in a large canoe with his wife and two children and all of his effects with him; went up the river and stopped at Fort Point over night; went to Orrington the next day; stayed there two years, then came down to the island" [Islesboro]. It will be noted that in 1781, Jonathan had two children living out of the five that had been born to him up to that date.

Jonathan Pendleton was appointed Ensign to do military duty in Islesboro, and in 1794 bought of his father some islands he had taken up at the southwestern entrance of Gilkey's Harbor, and called from him the "Ensign Islands." On this same day, 15 May, 1794, he received deed to his father's homestead at Islesboro (Hancock Co., Me., Deeds, ii, 448-9).

In 1797-8, he was a signer with other settlers of Lincolnville, Northport, etc., of an agreement with Gen. Knox relating to the lands they had taken possession of in those towns. In 1814 he arranged for the support of his father and his stepmother in their old age.

Jonathan<sup>6</sup> Pendleton married (1), at Warren, Me., 2 July, 1773, Jane McIntyre, daughter of John McIntyre of Warren. She was born about 1754, and died 25 February, 1802, aged 47 years. He married (2), 11 July, 1802, Lucinda Hatch of Camden, Me. She was born about 1763, and died 17 February, 1852, aged 88.

118. (CAPT.) JOHN<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*Capt. William<sup>5</sup>, Col. William<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>*), died at Camden, Me., 13 October, 1845, aged 93 (?) (G. S.). This date if correct would seem to make John a twin with his brother Jonathan, who was born 15 November, 1752. We think John was more likely born about 1754. He settled at Islesboro, Me., with the rest of his father's family about 1769. During the Revolutionary War he served as a marine on the ship "Gen. Putnam," Capt. Daniel Waters, in the unfortunate Penobscot Bay Expedition. He was engaged 13 July, 1779, and was discharged 7 September, 1779 (Mass. Archives). Upon the organization of Islesboro in 1789 he was elected its first town treasurer, and in 1794 held the office of Selectman. On the 3rd of January, 1800, he was chosen moderator of the Town Meeting, and elected to be one on a committee to correspond with the other towns in the county in opposition to Hampden being made the county seat (Bangor Hist. Mag., iii, 140).

On the 19th of July, 1802, he bought of William McGlathery of Camden two lots of land in that town with mills and other buildings thereon (Knox Co. Deeds, v, 310). He removed to Camden shortly afterwards and operated a saw and grist mill there until 26 December, 1820, when the property was destroyed by fire. On the 30th of January, 1809, he was one of the Camden petitioners to the Massachusetts Legislature praying that that Assembly use its influence in removing the Embargo Act. When the contentions with England culminated in war in 1812, John Pendleton was chosen Captain of a veteran company organized in Camden in 1813, comprising men between 45 and 60 years of age.

He married (1), Margaret Young. She died 21 September, 1784, aged 39. He married (2), 26 December, 1785, Elizabeth Rogers, daughter of Adam and Lydia (Rogers) Rogers. She was born 30 November, 1763, and died 24 September, 1813. Some time afterward he married as his third wife Mrs. Jane (Young) Henderson, a sister of his first wife. She died 12 August, 1832, and he married (4), in 1836, Mrs. Sarah (Decker) Clough. She died 30 May, 1858. No record of John<sup>6</sup> Pendleton's children has come to light, and the dates of births of the first three, furnished by their descendants, are very conflicting.

119. OLIVER<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*Capt. William<sup>5</sup>, Col. William<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>*), was born in 1756, probably at Westerly, R. I., and died at Hope, Me., 2 December, 1843, aged 87 years (G. S.). He was taken to Maine not long after his father's removal there in 1769, and when he grew to manhood took up a tract of land at Dark Harbor where the Islesboro Inn now stands. Henry Knox of Philadelphia, who claimed ownership of all this region, gave Oliver a deed to this property 13 November, 1799, and on the same day deeded him land at Northport which Oliver afterwards deeded to his son, William, 12 February, 1801 (Hancock Co., Me., Deeds, vii, 21, 20; viii. 86). He was probably the Oliver Pendleton who was appointed Captain to command a galley in the U. S. Navy in 1799, at the time when war with France seemed inevitable, as we know he was a master mariner, and of the contemporaneous Oliver Pendleton, [103. Oliver<sup>6</sup>, (*Sylvester<sup>5</sup>, Col. Joseph<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>*)], we have no knowledge whatsoever.

On the 29th of June, 1809, Oliver Pendleton and Sally, his wife, of Islesboro, sold their Dark Harbor property to Amos Pendleton for \$1500 (Hancock Co. Deeds, xxv, 249), and on the 15th March, 1811, he bought land in Hope, Me., of Micah Hobbs for \$700 (Lincoln Co., Me., Deeds, ix, 454). Not long afterwards he removed to Hope, where his son, William, soon followed and settled near by. Upon his retirement from the sea, Capt. Pendleton lived upon this farm the rest of his life.

Oliver<sup>6</sup> Pendleton married Sally Young. She was born about 1758, and died 15 April, 1840, aged 82 years.

120. HENRY<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*Capt. William<sup>5</sup>, Col. William<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>*), was born about 1760 (as he is said to have been two years older than his wife), probably at Stonington, Conn. He died at Northport, Me., 4 July, 1841. He was taken to Islesboro, Me., at an early age, and when he grew to manhood settled upon a lot north of his father's. He was elected tythingman of Islesboro upon its incorporation in 1789, and held other offices afterwards (Hist. Isles., pp. 240, 39). In 1795, he bought 100 acres of his brother, Jonathan (Ibid., p. 240). The "Gazetteer of Maine" [p. 401] says Henry Pendleton was one of the first settlers of Northport, which was incorporated 13 February, 1796. On the 28 October, 1799, he bought land there of Henry Knox for \$96.60 (Hancock Co. Deeds, vi, 682); he was then of Northport, as stated in this deed.

Henry<sup>6</sup> Pendleton married about 1781, Rebecca Alden, daughter of David and Elizabeth (Thorndike) Alden. She was born at Cape Elizabeth, Me., 19 Sept., 1762, and died at Northport, Me., 5 March, 1864, aged nearly 102 years. Joseph Williamson, the Maine Historian, in a letter to her son, Amos Pendleton, in 1870, stated that Rebecca Alden was in the fourth generation from John<sup>1</sup> and Priscilla (Mullins) Alden of the "Mayflower," through David<sup>2</sup>, Benjamin<sup>3</sup>, David<sup>4</sup>, and that her father was born at Duxbury, Mass. 14 February, 1717, and settled at Cape Elizabeth, Me., in 1750.\*

Henry and Rebecca Pendleton had thirteen children in all, five of whom died in infancy; while we lack the names of these latter, we have noted where they probably appeared in the order of births.

I., 22 January, 1788, Isaiah Wilcox, Jr. (West. Rec.), son of Rev. Isaiah and Sarah (Lewis) Wilcox.

123. JUDITH<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*Capt. William<sup>5</sup>, Col. William<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>*), was probably born on the 15th of November, 1769, at Stonington, Conn. She died there in 1799. The Stonington records [Book 4, p. 47] give the following: "Isleboughron [Islesboro], Sept. 3, 1792. This certifies that James Sheffield and Juda Pendleton was married by me according to the law of Massachusetts. Signed by me, Samuel Ely." That this James Sheffield was her first cousin, James<sup>6</sup>, son of Capt. Isaac and [50] Freelove<sup>5</sup> (Pendleton) Sheffield, and not James<sup>6</sup>, son of Thomas and [46] Wealthian<sup>5</sup> (Pendleton) Sheffield, is shown by the following: At a Court of Probate held at Stonington, 21 January, 1799, Judith Sheffield was appointed administratrix of the intestate estate of Capt. James Sheffield, late of Stonington, deceased, and guardian of her three minor children, James, Lydia, and Maria Sheffield. 25 February, 1799, William Sheffield was appointed administrator on the estates of James and of Judith Sheffield, and

guardian of James, Lydia, and Maria Sheffield. 30 April, 1800, the inventory of the estate of Mr. James Sheffield included, "*The balance due from Capt. William Sheffield, administrator on the estate of Capt. Isaac Sheffield, dec., being the amount that he had not rendered as his part of sd decd Estate.*"

125. AMOS<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON, JR. (*Amos<sup>5</sup>, Col. William<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>*), was born at Westerly, R. I., 5 Nov., 1754, and died there about 1783. In the Westerly Census of 1776 the name of Amos Pendleton, Jr., appears among those who were enrolled in the Artillery. He was probably the Amos Pendleton whose name is given in the report of the Legislative Committee, 3 January, 1779, which appraised certain articles lost off Point Judith in the expedition sent out from Westerly to join Gen. Spencer on the island of Rhode Island, as his father was almost too old to have undertaken such an adventure. [See account under (128) Zebulon<sup>6</sup>]. Amos Pendleton, Jr., was a master mariner; on the 25th of December, 1782, he sailed from Stonington on a voyage to the West Indies and was never heard from afterwards.

He married at Stonington, Conn., 24 February, 1782 (First Ch. Rec.), Catherine Davis, daughter of John, Jr., and Catherine (Tallmage) Davis (Hist. Stonington, pp. 328-9). She was born at East Hampton, L. I., 5 April, 1758, and died at Stonington (Pawcatuck), Conn., 18 July, 1831.

126. ANDREW<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*Amos*<sup>5</sup>, *Col. William*<sup>4</sup>, *Joseph*<sup>3</sup>), was born at Westerly, R. I., 7 July, 1756, and died at Stonington, Conn., 5 May, 1834. He was a mariner and farmer. In the Revolutionary War he served as private in Capt. Edward Bliven's Co., a detachment from Col. Joseph Noyes' Regiment of Militia, doing duty from 6 November to 6 December, 1777, and received pay for 30 days. Later on he was a corporal in the same company (R. I. Archives). The Census of 1776 shows that he was enrolled in the Artillery. Andrew Pendleton (or Pemberton) was Sergeant in Samuel Champlin's guard stationed at Westerly, ordered on duty from 11 February, 1778, to 12 March, 1778. On the 10th August, 1781, he witnessed the will of Jonathan Foster, Jr.

Andrew<sup>6</sup> Pendleton married at Stonington, Conn., 1 April, 1782 (First Ch. Rec.), Abigail Palmer, daughter of Moses and Prudence (Turner) Palmer. She was born 2 March, 1757, and died 25 December, 1822, at Stonington, Conn.

128. ZEBULON<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*Amos<sup>5</sup>, Col. William<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>*), was born at Westerly, R. I., 27 May, 1760, and died at Moravia, N. Y., 13 June, 1836. In October, 1777, the town of Westerly fitted out three whaleboats to carry seven men each to the island of Rhode Island, where they were to join Gen. Spencer's Expedition in his attempt to drive the British from Newport. In rounding Point Judith two of the boats were upset by the heavy sea, and eight men drowned, including Isaac Pendleton, Zebulon's uncle. Among the six rescued were Zebulon, Amos, and John Pendleton. The Rhode Island Assembly appointed a committee to appraise the articles lost in this disaster, and from their report of 3 January, 1779, it appears that Zebulon and Amos Pendleton lost together two guns with bayonets, two knapsacks, one good surtout coat, one close bodied coat, one pair broadcloth breeches, two good shirts, two pairs of yarn stockings, one thick pair of breeches, three shoes, one silver shoe-buckle, one pair of silver knee buckles; all at £29, 12s.

The Rhode Island Revolutionary records show that Zebulon also served as private in Capt. Edward Bliven's Co., a detachment from Col. Joseph Noyes' regiment of militia, doing duty from 6 November, to 6 December, 1777, for which he received pay for 30 days. Later on he served as private in Capt. Thompson's Co., Col. Stanton's regiment, from 20 December to 9 March. His application for

a pension, which he dated at Sempronius, N. Y., 14 September, 1832, states that he also served in an artillery company from June, 1775, to June, 1776, and in Joshua Pendleton's Co. late in 1776.

During a number of years in the Revolution New Shoreham (Block Island) was in the possession of the British, and the Rhode Island Assembly passed an act in August, 1779, forbidding under extreme penalties any Rhode Islander from going there. For some reason Zebulon had occasion to visit that place, and thus brought himself into trouble with the authorities. The records of the Assembly for November, 1782, read as follows: "And whereas Zebulon Pendleton stands committed to gaol for the offence of going upon New Shoreham;—It is further voted and resolved, that upon the said Zebulon Pendleton's paying into the hands of the sheriff of the County of Washington, to and for the use of this state the sum of £15 in gold or silver or bills emitted by this state funded upon real estate, being the sum he is fined, and the cost of prosecution in silver money, and giving bonds with ample security for his good behavior for twelve months to be approved by the aforesaid Robert Potter\*, he also be discharged from gaol." It would appear from the foregoing that the laws in those days were very rigorously administered when no discrimination was made between one who fought for his country and one who sought to aid the enemy.

The United States Census of 1790 shows that Zebulon was living in Hopkinton, R. I., in that year. It is possible that he had lived at Groton, Conn., for a while before this, as the land records there show he owned property in the town between 1784 and 1790. On the 12th January, 1791, Zebulon Pendleton and Thankful his wife sold to Nathan Barber, Jr., all their property in Hopkinton (Hopkinton Deeds), and not long afterwards removed with their children to Argyle, Washington County, N. Y. Zebulon lived at Argyle until some time between 1800 and 1810, when he located at Greenwich in the same county. Some years later he removed to Cayuga County, N. Y., with his sons Charles and Frederick. His name does not appear on the records of either Washington or Cayuga County, so it would seem that he was not a land owner in New York. It is supposed that Zebulon Pendleton was engaged in the manufacture of woolen goods.

No public or private record of Zebulon's children has so far come to light. The first clew to them was found in the "Folsom Family," where the record of his daughter Susan is given, and through her grandchildren information was obtained that led to the finding of Zebulon's other descendants. The 1790 Census shows that besides his wife, Zebulon's family consisted of one male and two females under 16. The 1800 Census shows him at Argyle, N. Y., with three males under 16, one between 10 and 16, and two females between 16 and 26 in his family. His name is given in this census as Zebulon "Pimbleton." In 1810, the census shows him at Greenwich, N. Y.,

his family, besides his wife, consisting of two males and one female between 10 and 16. A comparison of these records indicates that Zebulon was the father of five sons and three daughters.

Zebulon<sup>6</sup> Pendleton was married at Hopkinton, R. I., by Elder John Pendleton, 15 October, 1780, to Thankful Wells, of Richmond, daughter of Joseph and Mercy (Lillibridge) Wells of Hopkinton (Hopk. Rec.). She was born there, 23 March, 1761, and died 24 April, 1829, at Owasco, Cayuga Co., N. Y. It of interest to note that every name we are certain of among Zebulon's children was taken either from his wife's family or his own.

143. THOMAS<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*Lieut. Peleg<sup>5</sup>, Col. William<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>*), was born at Westerly, R. I., 4 June, 1767, and died at Prospect, Me., 18 January, 1801 (G. S.). With the rest of his father's sons he removed to Maine at the close of the Revolutionary War. For a time he lived upon an island near Searsport, as shown by the following deed: 29 Aug., 1794, Thomas Pendleton, William Griffin, Nathan Griffin, William Staples, Alexander Young, Jotham Staples, all of Brigadier Island, "Being all the inhabitants of s<sup>d</sup> Island except Benj. Carver," sold to Henry Knox, of Philadelphia, Pa., for 10 shillings each, "the s<sup>d</sup> Brigadier Island" (Hancock Co., Me., Deeds, iii, 44). Thomas Pendleton was a master mariner and vessel owner.

The "History of Islesboro, Me." [p. 109], states that he was part owner of the schooner "Thomas" of 125 tons, built in 1795. He was then of Prospect, Me. He married 8 January, 1795, Lucinda Carver.

In 1791 he bought of Langworthy Lanphere about 100 acres of land at Cape Jellison (Hancock Co. Deeds, i, 526). He also owned Spruce Island at one time, and sold it to John Gilkey of Islesboro for \$225,—9 June, 1808 (*Ibid.*, xxv, 33).

William<sup>6</sup> Pendleton followed the sea in his younger days and later in life cultivated a farm in Prospect, Me. His death was noted in the Providence, R. I., "Gazette."

145. JOSEPH<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*Lieut. Peleg<sup>5</sup>, Col. William<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>*), twin to William<sup>6</sup>, born 17 June, 1769, at Westerly, R. I., died 21 August, 1858, Islesboro, Me. In common with the other sons of Lieut. Peleg Pendleton, he was a master mariner, but did not make his home at Prospect (Searsport) with the rest of the family. He settled at Islesboro, possibly because his wife was a native of that town. Fourteen months after his marriage he bought of Thomas Pendleton, Jr., for \$700 about 100 acres of land at Saunder's Harbor, Islesboro (Hancock Co. Deeds, iii, 494-5). The deed refers to him as Capt. Joseph Pendleton of Prospect. This property remained

in the family more than ninety years, when it was sold to the Islesboro Land and Improvement Co.

Joseph Pendleton was Town Clerk of Islesboro from 1801 to 1807, and Constable in 1814. The "History of Islesboro" says of him [p. 262]: "He was a prominent man in the town for many years; a man of remarkable energy and industry, and a gentleman of the old school." Crosby's "Obituaries," published in 1859, notes the death of Capt. Joseph Pendleton of Islesboro, Maine, on the 21st of September, 1858, at the age of 89 years. It states further that "He was a native of Stonington, Conn., and served in the Revolution as a powder boy, receiving wounds the scars of which he carried to his grave." It is possible that Joseph served in his father's artillery company, although he was only fourteen years old when the war ended.

He was an officer of militia in the War of 1812,—elected Captain, 4 May, 1813, in the 2nd Regiment Infantry, 1st Brigade, 10th Division, Massachusetts Militia, and commissioned the following 11th June (Adj. Gen. Mass. Rec.). He received pay for service at Belfast, Me., from September 2-21, 1814. At some period during this war, while making a voyage in his schooner "Belfast," he was captured by the British and kept prisoner near Halifax for a time.

As noted under [52] John<sup>5</sup>, the only records that have so far come to light indicating the paternity of this John<sup>6</sup> Pendleton are found in the Rhode Island records of Revolutionary soldiers, which state that John Pendleton, *Junr.*, of Westerly, served as a private in Capt. Edward Bliven's Co., a detachment from Col. Joseph Noyes' Regiment, doing duty from 6 November-6 December, 1777, and at page 5 of Book IV, Westerly "Town Meetings," which show that John Pendleton, *Junr.*, subscribed £5 to the Continental Loan Office to make up the deficiency at Westerly. He may also have been the John Pendleton who was upset off Point Judith in the expedition sent out from Westerly to join Gen. Spenceer on Rhode Island, as well as the one who served as landsman from 16 May to 2nd of August, 1779, on the ship "Oliver Cromwell," Timothy Parker, commander (Conn. Hist. Soc. Collections).

Like so many of the other early Pendletons, John, Jr., followed the sea and became a master mariner. He died intestate and Adam States was appointed administrator, 3 July, 1787, upon the widow's refusal to act (Ston. Prob. Rec., v, 60). John Pendleton, Jr., married at Stonington, Conn., 5 February, 1784, Mary Noyes (First Ch. Rec.), daughter of James and Margaret (Woodburn) Noyes. She was born 26 April, 1761, and died 15 November, 1788. She married (2), as his second wife, Adam States, by whom she had one child.

153. GEORGE<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*John*<sup>5</sup>, *Col. William*<sup>4</sup>, *Joseph*<sup>3</sup>), was born at Westerly, R. I., 24 July, 1768, and died at Warren, Bradford Co., Pa., 3 April, 1814. In early life he followed the sea and became a successful master mariner. During his residence at Norwich, Conn., he engaged in business as a merchant and outfitter of vessels, and is also said to have been interested in ship-building. The outbreak of the War of 1812 stripped him of most of the means he had accumulated, and he decided to start life anew. Exchanging his property in Norwich for a tract of land in South Warren, Pa., he removed with his entire family to that place, then a wilderness, in December, 1812. Here he made a clearing and built a log house, but was not spared long to continue his activities in the new home. In the second spring after his arrival he was stricken with the fever that so often appears in new settlements; his son, John, also fell a victim to the same disease, and father and son died within a few hours of each other. The father's last moments were harassed by the thought that he "had brought his family into the wilds of a new country to starve." Although his children endured many hardships after his death, until such time as they were able to provide for themselves, yet they did not come to actual want, the widow and the oldest son, George, Jr., proving equal to the task of maintaining the family, with the assistance of a big-hearted neighbor, Benjamin Buffington.

176. ADAM<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*Capt. Joshua<sup>5</sup>, Col. William<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>*), was born at Westerly, R. I., 4 December, 1786, and died at Bozrah, Conn., 12 April, 1858. He was a farmer and spent the greater part of his life upon the property his father formerly owned in Bozrah and Norwich, Conn. During the War of 1812, he served as private under Capt. Joshua Maples, Jr., at New London, from 1-16 June, 1813, and 9-23 August, 1814 (Conn. Militia, War of 1812). His son, Dr. Cyrus H. Pendleton, says of him: "He was a plain farmer, with only a meagre, common school education. He was of a light complexion, with blue eyes, thin in flesh, somewhat lame, talked little, was seldom away from home, and worked steadily as long as he was able."

Adam<sup>6</sup> Pendleton married, 13 April, 1815, Hannah Marsh, daughter of James and Polly (Bennett) Marsh; she was born at Plainfield, Conn., 30 November, 1794, and died at Hebron, Conn., 25 March, 1872. Within two years of her birth her father and grandfather with their families removed to Brookfield, N. Y., where her brothers and sisters were born. Later her father removed to Ohio and settled where the city of Sandusky now stands. His wife died soon afterwards, and his own death following within a year or two, their five young sons and three daughters were left to the protection of the other settlers.

When Hull surrendered Detroit to the British in 1812, the cannonading was heard at Sandusky, and much apprehension was felt there over the outcome. A few days later scores of canoes were sighted on the lake, coming from the direction of Detroit, and upon their nearer approach it was noticed that many of those paddling wore Indian blankets. It was immediately concluded that the British and Indians were about to make a descent upon the settlement, and the people in panic fled to the woods, as they were few in number and entirely unprotected. Here they remained in hiding some three

days, unsheltered during a cold rain storm, not daring to build a fire through fear its light would reveal their hiding place. At the end of this time it was learned that their flight had been unnecessary, as the occupants of the canoes were paroled American prisoners from Detroit. The settlers then returned to their homes, removed their belongings to a safer place and abandoned the settlement, which the Indians soon afterward destroyed.

Hannah Marsh then found places for her brothers in different families, and with her two sisters, the youngest of her father's children, she started on the long and dangerous journey to Brookfield, N. Y. It was winter, and there were no public conveyances, but in spite of many difficulties and hardships she made this journey, stage by stage, relayed by friendly travelers bound eastward for greater or less distances, and who were willing to provide her conveyance. In this way the nineteen-year-old girl and her two young charges finally arrived at Brookfield, N. Y. Here they remained for a time, and then started on another long journey to the home of their grandmother Bennett in Lisbon, Conn., where they also arrived safely. Hannah had not lived with her grandmother long before she became acquainted with Adam Pendleton, and their marriage soon followed. Until 1839 they lived in Capt. Joshua<sup>5</sup> Pendleton's old home, which stood in Norwich, but in that year this house was torn down and they built a new dwelling across the line in Bozrah, where they spent the rest of their lives.

184. NATHANIEL MINOR<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*Lieut. Ephraim*<sup>5</sup>, *Col. William*<sup>4</sup>, *Joseph*<sup>3</sup>), was born 5 May, 1777, at Westerly, R. I., and died 8 November, 1848, at Stonington, Conn. (G. S.). Nathaniel M. Pendleton was a merchant tailor at Stonington for many years. During the War of 1812 he served as private under William Potter at New London from the 20th to the 26th of June, 1813, and under Horatio G. Lewis from the 17th of July to the 11th of August in the same year. He was one of the defenders of Stonington in the British attack upon that place, Aug. 9-10, 1814, and during their bombardment his house was one of those most severely damaged. In this action he was a member of the 8th Co., 30th Conn. Regt. Militia. He also served at Stonington under William Potter from the 20th to the 27th of August, 1814 (Conn. Historical Society Col., War of 1812).

Beside his gravestone in the Robinson Burying Ground at Ston-

ington there stands another one inscribed "In memory of Mrs. Hannah, wife of Nathaniel M. Pendleton, who died 4 Oct., 1828, aged 47 years." Her family name is unknown, as no record of their marriage has been found. Neither have records of the births of any children to them yet come to light, and whether or not they had any is a matter of uncertainty. The aged residents of Stonington whom we have questioned upon this point, while remembering Nathaniel very well, cannot recollect that he had any family of his own, and the following items from the U. S. Census records are not conclusive either way: In 1800 the Census for Stonington shows that Nathaniel had in his family a male child between 10 and 16 years old, a female between 16 and 26—probably his wife—and one over 45—perhaps his mother. This male child could not have been his if the Census report is correct, as it was born prior to 1790, at which time Nathaniel was under thirteen years of age. In 1810, a male child between 10 and 16 appears, also a female under 10, besides one between 26 and 45. If this male child was his, it is strange that it does not appear in the preceding Census, unless born just after that enumeration had been made. If such were the case, the 1810 Census must have occurred at a later period in the year than the one in 1800. In 1820 he is still credited with a male child between 10 and 16, which could hardly have been his, none appearing under 10 in the former Census. There were also counted in his family in this year a male between 16 and 26, a female between 26 and 45, and one over 45. His name does not occur in the 1830 Census.

From the foregoing records it is possible that Nathaniel<sup>6</sup> had a daughter who died young. Had the 1800 Census given the age of the male child then in his family as under 10, a son might also have been indicated in view of the data that follow, but as neither his will nor any administration of his estate appears upon the Stonington Probate records, such conjectures cannot be confirmed.

188. (GEN.) NATHAN<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*Major Nathan<sup>5</sup>, Col. William<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>*), was born at Westerly, R. I., 1 June, 1779, and died at Pendleton Hill, No. Stonington, Conn., 15 October, 1827. He did not remove to New York state with the rest of his father's family, but remained at Stonington, settling upon the high plateau in the northern part of the town, from which distant glimpses of Long Island Sound can be obtained on clear days. Here he occupied himself in farming and also carried on the business of a merchant. This part of Stonington became known in time as "Pendleton Hill," a name by which it has ever since been called, and in 1808 was set off to form the town of North Stonington. Like all the Pendletons of his line before him, Nathan<sup>6</sup> was actively interested in public affairs, and represented the new community in the Connecticut Legislature from 1810 to 1826. Quite naturally, too, and as was almost to be expected, he became an officer in the State Militia while still a young man, and when the War of 1812 broke out he had risen to the rank of Major in the State Artillery. The Connecticut records show that he held this office while serving under Lt. Col. William Randall at New London from 27 June to the 2nd July, 1813, and at Stonington from the 9th to the 27th of August, 1814. He was accordingly among the defenders of that place during the British attack on the 9th and 10th of that month. In this action his son, Nathan Sands, served as a "waiter" in his regiment. After the war Nathan<sup>6</sup> continued to hold office in the militia, and while his name does not appear again in the records of the Adj.-General's office, yet the commissions given him,—the originals of which are now in the possession of Mr. Charles H. Pendleton of Westerly, R. I.—show

You are therefore to take said *Brigade* into your *Care and Charge*, as then *Brigadier-General* and carefully and diligently to discharge that *Care and Trust* in ordering and commanding them, both *Officers and Soldiers*, in *Army*, according to the *Rules and Discipline of War*; helping them in good *Order and Government*, and commanding them to obey you as their *Brigadier-General* — for the *Service of this State*; and they are commanded to obey you accordingly; and you are to conduct and lead forth this said *Brigade* or *such Part of them* as you shall, from *Time to Time*, receive *Orders* from me, or from the *Governors of this State* for the *time being*, to encounter, repel, pursue and destroy, by force of *Arms*, and by all fitting *Ways and Means*, all the *Enemies of this State*, who shall, at any *Time* hereafter, in a *hostile manner*, attempt or enterprise the *Invasion, Detachment or Abnegance of this State*; and you are to observe and obey such *Orders and Instructions* as from *Time to Time* you shall receive from me, or other your *superior Officers*, pursuant to the *Trust* hereby reposed in you, and the *Laws of this State*.

Given under my Hand, and the public Seal of the State, at New Haven, this 28th Day of May, in the year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and twenty five.

207. ABIGAIL<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*William*<sup>5</sup>, *Edmund*<sup>4</sup>, *Edmund*<sup>3</sup>), was baptized in April, 1793, at Stratford, Conn. She married Loudy LaField. Her husband was a master mariner, as were their four sons who grew to manhood. The two daughters who married settled in Alabama.

214. JAMES<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON, JR. (*James*<sup>5</sup>, *Edmund*<sup>4</sup>, *Edmund*<sup>3</sup>), was born at Weston, Conn., 3 Feby., 1777, and died at Amity, N. Y., 6 May, 1871. In an old account-book which was in the possession of his grandson, the late James W. Pendleton, of Scio, N. Y., as recently as 1902, James<sup>6</sup> wrote: "I, James Pendleton, was born in Weston, town and County of Fairfield and State of Connecticut, in the month of February, the third day, in the year 1777. My father, James Pendleton, was born the twelfth of June in the year 1756 and died in the Revolutionary War the twelfth of December in the year 1778—formerly from Stratford. My mother was born the fifteenth of February in the year 1761, being the daughter of Grashom [Gershon ?] Lyons who lived in the state aforesaid; her name was Sarah. After my father died my mother married another man named John Merritt, who lived in parts where I was born till March in the year 1790, then removed to Milton, town and County of Saratoga and State of New York, where I lived with them till October in the year 1792, and then I went down to see my old friends and returned again in a short time. In January in the year 1795 I set out with my parents for the place before mentioned and returned again in a short time and stayed with them untill April in 1795; then I went to work for myself. November, 1795. I went down to my old Native place where I stayed till January 1796. On the 19 of October in the year 1796 I was married to Sally Turney who was born on the 25th day of February, 1780."

The Land Records of Saratoga County [Book B, p. 177] show that James Pendleton bought land in Milton of William Smith, Jr., 15 June, 1798, and that he appears several other times as Grantee and Grantor up to 1835. He was a large hop-grower at Milton, removing late in life to Amity, Allegany Co., N. Y. His wife died 3 May, 1868.

215. ICHABOD<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*James*<sup>5</sup>, *James*<sup>4</sup>, *Caleb*<sup>3</sup>), born 9 May, 1732, at Westerly, R. I., died there in 1754. He married at Stonington, Conn., 15 December, 1751, Esther Ayer (Sec. Ch. Rec.), daughter of Joseph and Elizabeth (Herrick) Ayer. She was born 30 March, 1731, and died in 1774.

On the 22nd of January, 1754, Ichabod Pendleton and Esther, his wife, of Westerly, sold to John "Guile," of Preston, for £20, land in Preston that was laid out to John Guild, deceased (Preston Land Rec.). Ichabod died not long afterwards, as on the 27th of May in that year inventory was taken upon his estate (Westerly C. & P. Rec., iii, 404). On the 25th of December, 1758, his widow made a report of the Town Council which allowed her £351 for maintaining his child, Joseph, 234 weeks; "Said child was two years old when his father, Ichabod, died" (Ibid., p. 550). The towns of Westerly and Stonington became involved in a law-suit over the support of this child, as appears in the following:

On the 1st of January, 1759, a meeting of the Town Council of Westerly was called by William Davis, overseer of the poor, on account of a "Trancient Child Named Joseph Pendleton, Son to Ichabod Pendleton, Late Deceased: Who is Left on this Town and is now Chargeable. . . . James Pendleton and Abigail Pendleton being sworn in Council Declare, Vizt. That the father & mother of the Trancient Child Were both Inhabitants of Stonington & Were married together in Stonington & Lived Together there & the sd Child was born in Stonington: Where they Lived With sd Child about a year: & from thence they Came to Westerly & Lived there about a year: & then Ichabod Pendleton the father of sd Child Died: & after his Death his Widow, the Mother of sd Child: Went back into Stonington & Carried sd Child with her & Lived there with sd Child: & sometime past Came into Westerly again with sd Child & has thrown the sd Child upon this Town & is Gone off & Left him." Upon this testimony from the orphan's grandparents it was voted that the child's only legal residence was Stonington, and that it be "forthwith conveyed there" (Ibid., p. 554).

On the 29th of January following, on account of this child having been sent back from Stonington, the Town Council appointed a committee "To treat with a committee from Stonington in regard to the legal residence of this Child." The committee did not seem to come

to any agreement, however, as on the 25th of February, 1760, the Westerly Council voted that William Davis "Draw out of the town treasury the Sum of Sixty pounds for the carrying on the case of an Impotent Boy called Joseph Pendleton, which is now in the Law between Stonington & this town" (Ibid., p. 589).

An item in the Stonington "Town Votes" [Book II, p. 221], under date of 22 June, 1761, shows that Westerly finally agreed to be responsible for him; and on the 6th of July following James Pendleton gave bond to the town to support Joseph (W. L. E., ix, 540). Further references to this unfortunate child have not been found.

At a Court of Probate held at Stonington, 3 May, 1774, James Pendleton, of Westerly, was appointed administrator on estate of Esther Pendleton, late of Stonington, deceased. The inventory of her property was reported 26 May, 1774, and amounted to £9 1s. 4d.; it included besides wearing apparel and household goods, a relic of her brief married life in the shape of "one old Go Cart."

Of Ichabod's child:

653. Joseph<sup>7</sup>, b. 1752, Stonington, Conn., no certain record has been found later than the one in 1761 already mentioned. He is not referred to in the will of his grandfather, James<sup>5</sup> Pendleton (1792), nor was he made the admr. of his mother's estate. Yet in the R. I. Census of 1774 there appears in the family of James<sup>5</sup> Pendleton a male over 16, who could not have been a son and who may have been this Joseph<sup>7</sup>, if a relative at all. The Westerly Census of 1790 is a still greater source of speculation. Not only is Major Joseph<sup>6</sup> Pendleton enumerated therein, his name prefixed by his military title, but another Joseph Pendleton is also given, the latter's name appearing significantly enough just before those of James<sup>6</sup> (3rd), and Simeon<sup>6</sup> Pendleton, uncles of Ichabod's son Joseph, and amongst those of other men whom we know lived in this northern part of Westerly, at some distance from Major Joseph.

Now it is reasonable to suppose that these names appear in the order in which they were taken by the enumerators in going from house to house, and if so the juxtaposition of this second Joseph's name with those of James and Simeon's is an indication that Major Joseph's family was not counted twice. Again, the reports upon these two families are not alike, as Joseph's consisted of one male over 16, two under 16, and eight females, while the Major's family was made up of *two* males over 16, *one* under that age, *seven* females, and three other persons.

While it would seem impossible for two reports upon the same family to differ so widely as these, yet the most careful search of the Council, Probate, and Land records at Westerly has failed to give us the least bit of corroborative evidence that Joseph Pendleton, son of Ichabod, is the Joseph

Pendleton of this Census record. If such were the case, as seems not unlikely, he was not a land-holder at Westerly, and must have removed from there to parts unknown prior to 1800, as his name is not given in the Census of the town taken in that year. Our correspondence has failed to locate any family that could be traced back to him.

216. DESIRE<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*James<sup>5</sup>, James<sup>4</sup>, Caleb<sup>3</sup>*), born 27 February, 1738/39, Stonington, Conn.; married at Westerly, R. I., 9 January, 1755, Stephen Niles (T. R.). No record of her children has so far come to light. The late Hosford B. Niles of New York City in a letter to Charles H. Pendleton of Westerly, 1894, stated that soon after 1788 a Stephen Niles of Rhode Island, who had been a Captain in the Revolution, settled at Alburgh, Vt. He had children, Nathan, Paul, Sands, Prudie, Eunice, and Desire. We lack evidence, however, to state that these were children of Desire (Pendleton) Niles, although such may have been the case.

218. JAMES PENDLETON (3rd) (*James<sup>5</sup>, James<sup>4</sup>, Caleb<sup>3</sup>*), was born 8 May, 1744, at Stonington, Conn. In 1776, he was enrolled as private in the 3rd Co. Westerly Militia, Capt. Stillman (R. I. Arch.). The record refers to him as James Pendleton, Jr., as he would be called after the death of his grandfather, James<sup>4</sup> Pendleton, in 1753. In 1777 he was a private in Capt. John Gavitt's Co., Col. Noyes' Regt. (Ibid.).

On the 23rd of March, 1785, James<sup>6</sup> Pendleton bought of his brother, Simeon, land in Westerly bounded on land of William Hiscox and Clarke Stillman (W. L. E., xi, 242). 20 September, 1792, James Pendleton, Jr., and Elizabeth, his wife, sold to Clarke Stillman for £39 10s. 2 3/4d., land in Westerly bounded on lands of Perry Bromley, David Hiscox, and Simeon Pendleton, 2nd,—so called to distinguish him from Simeon<sup>5</sup>, son of Col. Joseph<sup>4</sup> Pendleton (Ibid., p. 654). 27th March, 1793, James Pendleton and Elizabeth, his wife, sold land in Westerly to Simeon Pendleton "Son to James" (Ibid., p. 706).

In his father's will (1792) James<sup>6</sup> received a bequest of only \$1 because he had previously had his share. Late in this year, or early in 1793, he removed with his family to Groton, Conn., where on the 24th of September, 1792, "James Pembleton of Westerly" bought of Thomas Roach for £29 ten acres of land (Groton Deeds, xi, 241). This property he sold to Joseph Morgan for £25, 9th March, 1796, and on the 20th of January, 1797, James "Pembleton" and Josiah Hewlett, Jr., bought of John Widger a small house in Groton on land owned by Latham and Elisha Avery (Groton Deeds).

The marriage of James<sup>6</sup> Pendleton has not been found upon record, nor has any list of his children come to light. As shown by the deeds we have noted, his wife's first name was Elizabeth, but we have been unable to determine her parentage. As to his children, the Rhode Island Census of 1774 shows that he was at that time the head of a

family consisting of one male and two females under 16, besides the usual male and female over that age. The U. S. Census of Westerly in 1790, increases his family to a total of two males over 16, one under 16, and six females, and the Census of 1800 finds him at Groton, his family now consisting of one male under 10, one between 16 and 26, one over 45; three females under 10, two between 10 and 16, and one over 45. A comparison of these records indicates that he had had at least three sons and eight daughters. The unknown Desire Pendleton who was sent to the Westerly smallpox hospital with Clarke and some twenty other Stillmans in 1793 (C. & P. Rec., v. 231-2), was probably his daughter, as James<sup>6</sup> had a sister named Desire, and was a neighbor to Clarke Stillman as we have seen. What ultimately became of this family is uncertain, although it seems likely that James<sup>6</sup> was the James Pendleton of Rhode Island or Connecticut who was the ancestor of the Pemberton family of Luzerne Co., Pa., for some account of which see Appendix III. All we can say definitely of the children of James<sup>6</sup>, 3rd, and Elizabeth (—) Pendleton is that they had, according to the Census records:

219. HANNAH<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*James<sup>5</sup>, James<sup>4</sup>, Caleb<sup>3</sup>*), was born 22 May, 1747, at Stonington, Conn. She married at Westerly, R. I., 27 April, 1765, David Wilbur, son of Samuel and Elizabeth (Carr) Wilbur. He was born 31 July, 1740.

221. SIMEON<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*James<sup>5</sup>, James<sup>4</sup>, Caleb<sup>3</sup>*), was born at Westerly, R. I., 8 June, 1756, and died at New Berlin, N. Y., 20 June, 1822. In 1776 he was enrolled in Capt. Stillman's 3rd Co.,

Westerly Militia, in which company were his brother, James<sup>6</sup>, and several other near relatives. He may also have been the "Simon" Pendleton, "landsman," who served on the ship "Oliver Cromwell" from 16 May to 2nd August, 1779 (Conn. Arch.). In 1777 he was a private in Capt. John Gavitt's Co., Col. Noyes' Regt. (R. I. Arch.).

In 1789 and 1793 Simeon Pendleton and Tabitha, his wife, sold land in Westerly to Perry Bromley (W. L. E., xi, 468, 707), and in 1797 and 1798 they sold to James Rhodes land in Westerly and also their homestead farm (Ibid., xii, 164, 133). Simeon and his entire family were living at Westerly in 1800, as reported in the U. S. Census of that year, but none of them appears there ten years later. His older sons had probably removed to New Berlin, N. Y., in the meanwhile, and it is said that Simeon's death there occurred while on a visit to them. His name does not appear as a Grantee or Grantor on the Chenango County records. He was buried in the village cemetery of New Berlin and his gravestone there is in excellent condition. His descendants have been mostly farmers and frontiersmen, and have been difficult to trace.

The will of Simeon Pendleton, dated at New Berlin, 18 December, 1822, proved 24 January, 1833 (Chenango Co., N. Y., Surrogate Rec., Book B, p. 29), runs as follows: "I give and bequeath unto my children, that is to say, my sons, Simeon Pendleton, Jr., David Pendleton, Eliphalet Pendleton, Eli Pendleton, and James Pendleton, and to my daughters, Dorcas, widow and relict of Thomas Ross, deceased, 'Soviah,' wife of Benjamin Sisson, Lydia, wife of Jedediah Austin, and Lucy Pendleton, all my property and estate, share and share alike." The son, Simeon, Jr., was appointed executor.

Simeon<sup>6</sup> Pendleton married, either at Westerly, R. I., or Stonington, Conn., 19 March, 1775, Tabitha Niles. Entry of this marriage appears both upon the Westerly records and those of the First Church of Stonington. Tabitha Niles may have been daughter of Sands and Elizabeth (Cottrell) Niles, who were married at Westerly, 4 September, 1745. She died at Westerly, 21 February, 1842, aged 84 years [G. S.].

On page 163 of Book 3, Westerly "Town Meeting" Records, there appears a list of seven of the "Children of Simeon, son of James, and Tabitha, his wife," the dates being as follows:

662. Lucy, m. [276] Elliot<sup>7</sup> (or Ellet) Pendleton.

Under date of the 25th of February, 1805, the Council and Probate records of Westerly [Book VI, p. 98] show that Simeon<sup>6</sup> Pendleton was involved in an affair of such a nature as to furnish his wife grounds for divorce. She did not condone her husband's offense, but proceeded to take legal action against him. The records of the Supreme Court of Washington Co., R. I. [Book D, pp. 323-4], state that on the fourth Monday of April, 1806, Dorcas Pendleton petitioned for a divorce from her husband, Simeon Pendleton, 2nd,\* stating that she married him 17 March, 1775, and that she had always respected the vows and contract of marriage, but that he had no ways regarded them. On considering the evidence she offered, and upon the failure of her husband to contest the suit, her petition was granted at the sitting of the Court held in the following October.

On page 223 of Book IV, Westerly "Town Meetings," there appears the following entry: "This may certify [to] all whom it may concern that Mr. Perry Brumbley and Miss Dorcas Pendleton both of Westerly, made their personal appearance before me on the 4th of March 1807, and after producing a Lawfull Bill of Divorcement and witness that they were lawfully Published were lawfully joined Together in marriage by me the Subscriber.

Saml Bliven, Justice."

This Perry Bromley was a second cousin to Simeon<sup>6</sup> Pendleton, being the son of William and Elizabeth<sup>5</sup> (Brown) Bromley, and grandson of Jonathan<sup>4</sup> and [31] Elizabeth<sup>4</sup> (Pendleton) Brown, and was born at Westerly, 12 November, 1758, and died there, 13 December, 1849. He does not appear to have been married before, and evidently brought up Simeon's two youngest children as his own, his will, dated 18 March, 1842, proved 7 January, 1850 (Westerly Prob. Rec., iv, 565), referring to Lydia, wife of William Burdick; to Lydia's daughter, Susan E. *Austin*, then under 18 years of age; to Lucy, wife of Eliot Pendleton, and to her children, William Perry *Bromley*, Sands Niles Pendleton, and Joseph Henry Pendleton. In this will Perry Bromley does not refer to Lydia and Lucy as his children.

222. ELIZABETH<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*Obadiah<sup>5</sup>, James<sup>4</sup>, Caleb<sup>3</sup>?*), married at Exeter. R. I. 12 January, 1757. George Lewis. While this is the only pedigree we have that lacks direct confirmation, yet as we have noted in our account of [72] Obadiah<sup>5</sup>, the circumstantial evidence is such as to indicate that this Elizabeth was his daughter, and we have shown she could not have been a child of any other Pendleton if of legitimate birth.

\* So called to distinguish him from [42] Simeon<sup>5</sup> (Col. Joseph<sup>4</sup>), who also lived at Westerly.

The will of George Lewis, dated at Exeter, 17 January, 1787, names wife Elizabeth, sons George, Obediah, Asa, and Rowland; daughters Abigail Lewis and Mary Lewis (Exeter Prob. Rec.).

NOTE: Mr. Carl A. Lewis, of New Haven, Conn., who has given much study to the Lewis family, states that this George Lewis was son of George and Sarah Lewis and that he was born at Richmond, R. I., 30 March, 1735.

224. SAMUEL<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*Thomas<sup>5</sup>, James<sup>4</sup>, Caleb<sup>3</sup>*), was born about 1745 at Westerly, R. I., and died in 1826, at Islesboro, Me. 8 He was one of the early settlers of Islesboro, but the exact date of his locating there is a matter of some doubt. While the history of that town [p. 9] says that he came there with Shubael Williams in September, 1764,—at which time Samuel was but eighteen or nineteen years old—and while his descendants say his daughter Dorcas was the first white child born on the island, which would set his arrival there in 1766-67, yet the records of the Court of Common Pleas for Washington County, R. I. [Book H, p. 79], show that in February, 1770, Samuel Pendleton, mariner, of *Westerly*, was a co-defendant with his father in a suit brought against them by Thomas Wright of New Shoreham. It would seem from this that the claims advanced for Samuel Pendleton as a "First Settler" at Islesboro do not have a very solid basis unless it is to be assumed that he went there prior to 1770 to take up the land he occupied later.

At a town meeting held at Islesboro, 9 June, 1789, it was voted that Samuel Pendleton and John Gilkey lay out the town roads. In 1791 he helped form the first church at Islesboro, and at a town meeting 1 May, 1792, he was chosen on a committee "To fix a place where to set up a meeting-house." Samuel was a Deacon of this church and in the absence of the minister often supplied the pulpit himself.

The will of Samuel Pendleton, dated 9 November, 1822, proved 2 April, 1828 (Hancock Co., Me., Prob. Rec., xiii, 78), names wife Bathsheba, sons Samuel, Simon and Joshua; daughters Dorcas Nichols, Lydia Dodge, Bathsheba Richardson, Prudence George; grandchildren Elisha, Abigail, and Sarah Pendleton, children of deceased son Dodge. Samuel's descendants are very numerous at Islesboro, and the men have generally led a sea-faring life, in which some of them have greatly prospered.

Samuel<sup>6</sup> Pendleton married Bathsheba Dodge, who died July, 1828. The "History of Islesboro" says she was the daughter of John Dodge, but she was more likely Samuel's first cousin, Bathsheba

Dodge, born at Block Island, R. I., 13 May, 1750, daughter of Mark and Lydia (Rathbone) Dodge. Mark Dodge was brother to Dorcas Dodge. Samuel Pendleton's mother, and besides Bathsheba, had children Simon, Joshua, Dorcas, and Niobe. These names with those of Mark and Lydia appearing among Samuel Pendleton's children, furnish good evidence as to his wife's parentage.

NOTE: Among the various spellings collected under the name Pendleton that appear in the published records of Massachusetts soldiers and sailors who served in the Revolutionary War, one Samuel "Penderton" is given, master of the brigantine *Satisfaction*, a privateer. On the 1st of April, 1778, a petition signed by Thos. Prince on behalf of Job Prince, and others, of Boston, was presented the Council asking that Nathaniel Thayer be commissioned as commander of said vessel and a commission was given Thayer the same day. We have no evidence that this was our Samuel<sup>6</sup> Pendleton.

225. NATHANIEL<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*Thomas*<sup>5</sup>, *James*<sup>4</sup>, *Caleb*<sup>3</sup>), was born at Westerly R. I., 22 January, 1747. According to the "History of Islesboro" [p. 7], he took up 100 acres there in 1774. It does not appear, however, that he settled there immediately, as he must have been the Nathaniel Pendleton who served as Ensign in Col. Parson's 10th Continental Regt. of Connecticut in 1776. This regiment was at the siege of Boston and took part in the battles of Long Island and White Plains (Conn. Arch.). His term of office expired 31 December, 1776. One of Nathaniel's great-granddaughters, the late Mrs. M. A. Farmer, of East Corinth, Me., stated that there was a tradition in her family to the effect that Nathaniel<sup>6</sup> was a soldier of the Revolution, and that during his absence from home his wife and little children underwent many hardships, an only cow being their chief means of support.

We do not know in what year Nathaniel Pendleton removed to Islesboro. His name does not appear there definitely until the U. S. Census of 1790, which credits him with a family then consisting of one male under 16 and ten females including his wife. The Hancock County, Maine, Deeds contain a number of records relating to him. In 1793 he bought land at Little Harbor bounded on land of Jonathan Pendleton and Thomas Brazier (iii, 191). Not long afterwards he removed to Northport, Me., as on 1 January, 1795, Nathaniel Pendleton and Cynthia, his wife, of "Ducktrap," sold to William Pendleton for £180, a small island containing 106 acres near 700 Acre Island (iii, 177). Nathaniel and Cynthia made other sales and purchases up to 23 March, 1808, when they sold land in Northport to Mark Dodge of Islesboro (xxii, 470). Among their other grantees were William Drinkwater and Nathaniel Pendleton, Jr.

Nathaniel, Sr., was drowned in crossing the bay to 700 Acre Island; his body was washed ashore on the beach of Lincolnville and buried on the island. He left no will and no administration of his estate is of record, and direct written evidences of his marriages and of his children are also missing. His first wife, whom he probably married at Westerly, R. I., is said to have been Cynthia West. This is confirmed by the deeds we have quoted and by the will of "Survior" West, dated at Westerly, 22 February, 1775, proved 27 March, 1775 (C. & P. Rec., iv, 254), which gives to "Daughter Cinthia Pendleton, a black and white coverlid in addition to what I have already given her." It would appear that Cynthia's father was James West, as on the 25th of January, 1773, the Westerly Town Council voted, "If the town of Charlestown is willing that the widow West may have her child that is now impotent and lame carried to Charlestown to the house that Dr. Newman now lives in, certificate will be granted to receive her and her child at any time when required without cost to Charlestown." On the same day it was voted "That Samuel Young have an order to the town treasurer for 10 Spanish dollars for keeping a poor boy that is very lame and impotent, five weeks tomorrow, being the son of James West, late of Westerly, dec." (Westerly C. & P. Rec., iv, 203). The Rhode Island Census for Westerly in 1774 shows that Zurviah West was the only widow of that name then in the town. She named two sons, Adam and Ammi (Amherst), in her will, but no children of James and Zurviah West appear upon the vital records of Westerly.

Nathaniel's second marriage probably occurred at Northport, Me., about 1810, but as the early town records there were destroyed by fire, the exact date cannot be determined. His great-nephew, Joseph M. Stuart of Deer Island, N. B., states that Nathaniel's second wife was Sally Bradford, and the Probate Records of Hancock County, Me. [Vol. IV, p. 314], show that in the administration of the estate of William Bradford of Northport, a warrant to set out the widow's dower to *Sarah Pendleton* was given 7 December, 1810, and that the Decree of her acceptance was recorded 29 March, 1811. Nathaniel's grandson, the late John M. Pendleton, of Newburyport, Mass., said

that his grandmother was a Sweetland, and that he thought her first name was Sally. This may have been the maiden name of William Bradford's widow, but we cannot prove it, no Sweetlands appearing upon the Probate records of Waldo County nor on the early records of Hancock County.

As already noted, the United States Census of Islesboro in 1790 shows that besides himself and wife, Nathaniel then had one male under 16 and nine females in his family. If these were all his children and we have the correct dates of his oldest daughters' marriages, it would appear that he had two more children than we have record of, but we do not think such was the case. In 1800 the Census shows him at Northport with his family consisting of one male between 16 and 26 and one female between 10 and 16, besides himself and wife. This Census also states that Nathaniel had emigrated from Connecticut. He does not appear at Northport in the 1810 Census, but the one for 1820 finds him there again, his family now including two males and one female under 10. It is evident from these Census records and from the Hancock County Deeds that all but one of Nathaniel's daughters were by his first wife.

226. MARGARET<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*Thomas<sup>5</sup>, James<sup>4</sup>, Caleb<sup>3</sup>*), born at Westerly, R. I., probably about 1748; married at Westerly, 7 June, 1767, Sylvester Cottrell (T. R.—also given in First Ch. Stonington Rec.). In February, 1769, Sylvester Cottrell of Stonington and

Nathaniel Pendleton of Westerly brought suit against John Dodge, Gilbert Fanning, and Hezekiah Minor of Stonington for trespass (Washington Co., R. I., Court of Common Pleas, Book G, p. 770), and in August, 1769, he was a co-defendant with his father-in-law, Thomas Pendleton, in a similar suit brought against them by Thomas Greenman (*Ibid.*, Book H, p. 48). Not long afterwards they removed to Islesboro, Me., where Sylvester Cottrell's name appears as one of the first settlers, owning lot 27. His name is the first one to occur as a Grantor in the Hancock County Deeds,—1 July, 1790. The "History of Islesboro" [p. 190] says that Sylvester and his wife removed to New Brunswick in their old age and died there.

227. THOMAS<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON, JR. (*Thomas*<sup>5</sup>, *James*<sup>4</sup>, *Caleb*<sup>3</sup>), was born probably about 1750, at Westerly, R. I., and died in New Brunswick. He is said to have settled at Islesboro, Me., about 1770. He was a town officer there in 1790 (*Hist. of Isles.*, p. 250). 22 March, 1793, he bought 100 ares of land at Saunder's Harbor of Benjamin Thomas for £12 (*Hanock Co., Me., Deeds*, ii, 178), and on the following 17th of May he sold lot 15 at Islesboro to Stephen Sherman for 160 cords of wood (*Ibid.*, ii, 178). On the 12th of January, 1796, Thomas, Jr., and Sarah, his wife, of Islesboro, sold their land at Saunder's Harbor to Capt. Joseph Pendleton of Prospect for \$700.00 (*Ibid.*, iii, 494-5).

Not long afterwards he removed with his family to New Brunswick, taking possession of a small island in Passamaquoddy Bay,—later known as Pendleton Island,—close to Deer Island where his brothers Gideon and Stephen had already settled. The descendants of Thomas<sup>6</sup>, Jr., are still very numerous in this region where they have been mainly interested in the fisheries and in farming. Those through Thomas<sup>7</sup>, 3rd, are mostly scattered through the western states and have been difficult to trace.

228. GIDEON<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*Thomas<sup>5</sup>, James<sup>4</sup>, Caleb<sup>3</sup>*), was born at Westerly, R. I., 11 December, 1751, and died at Deer Island, N. B., April, 1847. He was among the early settlers of Islesboro, Me., and lived there until he was between forty and fifty years old. He was a master mariner and was the first man from Islesboro to command a vessel sailing to the West Indies. On the return from one of his voyages he brought home two pounds of tea, a great luxury at that time, and as he neglected to declare the goods he came into collision with the U. S. Customs Collector at Castine (Hist. of Isles., p. 251). Tradition says that the government's action in this matter seemed so petty to Capt. Pendleton that he decided to remove to New Brunswick, where his brother Stephen had already settled. However that may be, Gideon and his wife, Matilda, sold Lot 7 with dwelling house thereon to John Pendleton, 4 May, 1791 (Hancock Co. Deeds, i. 219); some years afterwards he removed with his family to Deer Island, where the rest of his long life was spent. His descendants are very numerous and furnished more soldiers to the Union army in the Civil War than those of any other Pendleton of his generation. He left no will.

By Eunice Getchell, he had several children, but we are uncertain if we have all their names. He married later, Matilda Gilkey, daughter of John and Sylvina (Thomas) Gilkey. She died February, 1855. John Gilkey's will, dated 25 September, 1816 (Hancock Co., Me., Prob. Rec., vi, 430), refers to daughter, Matilda Pendleton.

230. JOSHUA<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*Thomas<sup>5</sup>, James<sup>4</sup>, Caleb<sup>3</sup>*), was born about 2 June, 1755, probably at Stonington, Conn., and died 1 February, 1844, at Belfast, or Northport, Me. He settled at Islesboro, Me., with the rest of his father's family about 1771. In 1789 he was a town officer there, and continued to make Islesboro his home until he was about fifty years old. The Hancock County Deeds show that Joshua Pendleton sold land there to Rathburn Dodge in 1804 and to Samuel Pendleton in 1810. He removed to Northport, Me., about this latter year, and it is likely that it was here that his house was plundered by the British during the War of 1812, although the tradition says that event happened in the Revolution. No record of Joshua's marriages and children has come to light, but in 1844 a petition of the heirs of Joshua Pendleton, "Late of Northport, dec. who died on or about the 1st of Feby.," praying that Benjamin A. Pendleton of Lincolnville be appointed administrator was signed by Thomas Pendleton, Lewis Elwell, Lydia Warren, Stephen Warren, Thankful Flanders, James Flanders, Sally Elwell, Joshua Pendleton, Luther Pendleton, Joseph Pendleton, Abigail Robbins, and Benjamin A. Pendleton (Waldo Co., Me., Prob. Rec.). These records also show that his widow was named Catherine.

Joshua<sup>6</sup> Pendleton married (1), or (2), — — —, who died suddenly without issue. He married (2), or (1), Nancy Nutter, whose parentage we have not determined. He married (3), Sally Ames, daughter of Rev. Thomas and Rebecca (Harnie) Ames (Hist. of Isles., p. 167). She evidently died prior to 1820, as the United States Census of Northport does not refer to her as a member of Joshua's family in that year.

Joshua married (4), Catherine Patten, who survived him.

231. MARY<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*Thomas<sup>5</sup>, James<sup>4</sup>, Caleb<sup>3</sup>*), born about 1758, Stonington, Conn.; died 25 July, 1847, Islesboro, Me. She married at Islesboro, 2 October, 1774, Joseph Boardman. He was born at Boston, Mass., 12 August, 1753, and died at Islesboro, 28 November, 1831. This marriage is said to have been the first that occurred on the island.

233. STEPHEN<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*Thomas<sup>5</sup>, James<sup>4</sup>, Caleb<sup>3</sup>*), was born

at Stonington, Conn., 9 February, 1763, and died at Lubec, Me., 29 May, 1845. He was only about eight years old when his father removed to Long Island, now Islesboro, Maine. He attained his growth rapidly, and when twelve years of age was as large as the average sized man, and when sixteen stood six feet tall and was big in proportion. In this year the British took possession of Castine, and young Stephen visiting that town in company with one or two of his brothers, attracted the attention of some of the English officers, always on the lookout for likely young recruits. The rest was simple enough: Stephen suddenly found the "Queen's Shilling" in his pocket and was forthwith impressed into the British navy. It was probably during this service that he became involved in an unfortunate affair at Waldoboro, as related in Eaton's "Annals of Warren, Me." [p. 196]. In 1780 a party of the British in one of their marauding expeditions along the Maine coast took Stephen with them as guide to the home of a Mr. Soule, a wealthy man of Waldoboro. They set Stephen to guard Soule, as he did not care to help plunder the house. According to Stephen's own account of what followed, as soon as the party had left them alone Soule attacked him with a knife and in self-defense he fired at Soule, killing him instantly. The shot aroused the neighborhood and the marauders took hasty flight, making their escape to Castine through the woods back of the mountains.

After the war Stephen Pendleton served for about two years in the party that ran the boundary line between Maine and New Brunswick, under the direction of his former commander in the Navy. He took up some land in the Province and then returned to his old home in Islesboro, where he married and lived some years. On the 14th of August, 1789, he released to his parents the land they lived on, rent free (Hancock Co. Deeds, v. 513). About 1793 he removed to New Brunswick and took possession of his land there, which lay on the north side of Deer Island. Soon afterwards he acquired Jameson's Island near by, where he lived until 1811.

He sold this property in 1812 and returned to Islesboro, where he became a much respected man. He bought a small farm of his brother Joshua, and also followed the sea, commanding the sloop "Rose" (Hist. Isles., p. 109). He took much interest in religious affairs, and loaned money to the town to help build the first meeting house (Ibid., p. 66). Sometime between 1816 and 1820 he removed to Northport and bought a farm near his brother Joshua, who had already settled there. He remained in Northport about ten years, and then as his wife had died and his children had married he removed to Eastport, Me. Late in life he married a second time and spent his last days at Lubec.

Stephen<sup>6</sup> Pendleton married (1), at Islesboro, Me., 25 September, 1786, Prudence Dodge, daughter of Simon and Prudence (Rose) Dodge. She was born at Block Island, R. I., 23 May, 1769, and died at Northport, Me., about 1820. Prudence Dodge was probably Stephen's first cousin, as her father and his mother appear to have been brother and sister.

Stephen married (2), at Eastport, Me., 16 April, 1827, Martha Sherwood (T. R.).

235. ESTHER<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*Samuel<sup>5</sup>, James<sup>4</sup>, Caleb<sup>3</sup>*), married (1), at Westerly, R. I., 20 November, 1774, Peter Eldredge (Eldridge), of Newport (T. R.). She married (2), also at Westerly, as his second wife, 29 September, 1800, Stephen Gavitt, Jr.

Her first husband died about 1792, as on the 27th of August in that year it was voted by the Town Council of Westerly "That Esther Eldredge, widow of Mr. Peter Eldredge, be allowed the sum of £41 10s. lawful money out of the estate of the sd Peter Eldredge late of Westerly, dec." (C. & P. Rec., v. 98). Esther was living as late as 26 August, 1816, when Ephraim Gavitt was appointed administrator on estate of Stephen Gavitt, dec. (Westerly Probate Rec., ii. 164). Besides Esther he left but one other heir, his son, Stephen, who was born 5 February, 1790, by his first wife, Mary Lewis.

236. MARTHA<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*Samuel<sup>5</sup>, James<sup>4</sup>, Caleb<sup>3</sup>*), married Jabez Bromley, as shown by her mother's will. We have no record of their children. On the 15th of November, 1797, "Jabish Brumley" of Stonington, Conn., obtained judgment against William Phillips for \$4.60 debt, and \$2.50 costs (Joshua Babcock's Court Record). An Ezra Bromley, born about 1784, of New Lebanon, N. Y., married Susan Griffin and had a large family, amongst them a son, Jabez, and a daughter, Martha. He may have been a son of Jabez and Martha<sup>6</sup> (Pendleton) Bromley, but his parentage has not been determined.

237. REBECCA<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*Samuel<sup>5</sup>, James<sup>4</sup>, Caleb<sup>3</sup>*), born 2 September, 1755, Westerly, R. I.; died there, 15 February, 1844. She married (1), Maxson Chase, son of Joshua and Mary (Maxson) Chase. He was born 9 May, 1752, and was lost at sea. She married (2), at Westerly, 20 November, 1777, William Sims, Jr., a soldier in the Revolution, son of William and Jerusha (Lanphere) Sims. He was born 13 August, 1756, and died at Westerly, 2 February, 1834. Rebecea's second marriage is entered on the town records as "William Sims, of William, dec. and Rebecca Chase, widow, daughter of Samuel Pendleton." Her will, dated 14 February, 1836, mentions son, Maxson Chase, as her only heir. The witnesses to this instrument swore that she was a Revolutionary pensioner and died on the date above given (Westerly Probate Rec., Book 4, p. 373).

239. GIDEON<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*Samuel<sup>5</sup>, James<sup>4</sup>, Caleb<sup>3</sup>*), was born at Westerly, R. I., 15 May, 1750, and died at Dighton, Mass., 17 December, 1809. (G. S.) The Rhode Island Census of 1776 shows that Gideon Pendleton was enrolled as private in Capt. Stillman's 3rd Westerly Co. early in that year. On the 25th of December, 1776, he became a private in Col. John Topham's Regiment, which was raised for three years, as shown by the list of balancees reported due by Legislative committee in October, 1785. On the 20th of March, 1779, he was appointed Corporal in Christopher Dyer's Co., Col. Topham's Regt., and was in the Battalion of Rhode Island forces in the Continental service from November 7, 1779, to March 13, 1780 (R. I. Archives).

Immediately after his services in the Revolutionary War, Gideon Pendleton went to Dighton, Mass., where he secured employment in the shipbuilding yard of Thomas Rose, and a few months later married the shipbuilder's daughter, Anne Rose. This marriage seems to have been a source of astonishment to the natives of Dighton, as a

grandniece of Mrs. Gideon Pendleton told the writer that they "Thought it so strange that Annie should marry a foreigner."\*

Gideon Pendleton made his home at Dighton the rest of his life. He followed the ship-carpenter's occupation for awhile, and then began going to sea, finally becoming a master mariner in the coasting trade. On the 16th of February, 1793, he bought of Nathan and Mary Ide for £85 about one acre of land and dwelling house in Dighton lying on the northerly side of road near Briggs' Ferry (Bristol Co., Mass., Deeds, lxxiii, 416). During his early years of residence in Massachusetts he kept in close touch with his Rhode Island kindred. In 1792 he acted as executor of his father's will, and on the 29th of February, 1796, he received from his brother-in-law, Simeon Crumb, a quitclaim deed to fourteen acres of land in Westerly, the deed referring to him as "Gideon Pendleton, yeoman, of Westerly, but now residing in Diton in the state of Mass." (W. L. E., xii, 53).

Some nine years before his death Capt. Pendleton met with reverses and was stripped of much of his property, as shown by the records of the Common Pleas Court at Taunton in September, 1800. Gideon Pendleton, his wife, and several of their children are buried in the "Rose Cemetery," an unfrequented spot situated in the southern limits of Taunton, Mass., on a slight elevation of ground between the river and the Fall River Railroad; the stones that mark their last resting places were erected by his son, Hiram, about 1860.

Gideon<sup>6</sup> Pendleton married at Dighton, Mass., 1 August, 1780, Anne Rose (T. R.), daughter of Thomas and Prudence (Blake) Rose. She was born at Dighton, 22 July, 1754, and died there, 5 May, 1827 (G. S.).

He received pay for service at New Bedford from 27 Sept. to 18 Oct., 1814 (Archives, Mass. Adj. Gen.).

243. MARY<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*Benajah<sup>5</sup>, Caleb<sup>4</sup>, Caleb<sup>3</sup>*), born 11 August, 1752, at Stonington, Conn.; married William Frink. He died about 1831, aged 80 years, or in 1829, as stated in the "History of Susquehanna Co., Pa." William Frink was a native of Connecticut, and while he evidently belonged to the Frink family of Stonington, his parentage has not yet been determined. On the 27th of April, 1779, he bought of Benajah Pendleton, of Colchester, land in Lebanon, Conn., for £80 (Lebanon Deeds, xiii, 127). He continued to live in Lebanon until about 1800, when he removed to Auburn, Pa.; the County history above referred to [p. 401] states he was one of the first settlers there and made that town his home until he died.

246. HUBBARD<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*Benajah*<sup>5</sup>, *Caleb*<sup>4</sup>, *Caleb*<sup>3</sup>), is variously reported to have died at Whitehall, N. Y., in 1853, aged 103, or in July, 1856, aged 94, or 96. He removed with the rest of his father's family to Vermont, where his children by his first wife appear to have been born. His son, the late Chauncey McD. Pendleton, stated he had a land warrant given Hubbard for his services in the War of 1812, in which he was a volunteer from the town of Georgia, Vt. He removed afterwards to the west side of Lake Champlain, and became a captain of passenger boats plying between Albany and New York. He is also said to have been sheriff of Saratoga County, N. Y., for a time.

Hubbard<sup>6</sup> Pendleton enjoys with [688] Thomas<sup>7</sup> (3rd), the distinction of being the father of twenty children, these two men having the record Pendleton families. He left no will that was recorded, nor does his name appear as a land holder in the New York counties in which he lived. The town records of some of the places in which he resided in Vermont are equally silent in regard to him, and what facts we have about his family were gathered from his children and grandchildren, principally by Dr. Cyrus H. Pendleton.

251. ANNA<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*Rev. John<sup>5</sup>, Brian<sup>4</sup>, Caleb<sup>3</sup>*), born about 1750; married William Kenyon (Kinyon). On the 17th of August, 1792, William Kinyon, and Anna, his wife, of Argyle, Washington Co., N. Y., quitclaimed to Daniel Lamb of South Hadley, Mass., all their rights in the farm that Rev. John Pendleton bought of said Lamb (Hampden Co., Mass., Deeds, xxxi, 709-710). No record of their children has been found, nor any trace of their descendants, some of whom are believed to be living in Washington County. The United States Census of Argyle, N. Y., in 1790, shows a William Kinyon living there in that year, his family, besides himself and wife, consisting of two males over 16, four males under 16, and two females. There also appears a William Kinyon, Jr., in this Census, with one male under 16 in his family. William "Kynion" (probably William, Jr.), is given in the 1800 Census, with family consisting of two boys and five girls.

It would appear from these Census records that William and Anna<sup>6</sup> (Pendleton) Kenyon had issue—provided neither of them had been previously married:

252. JEREMIAH<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*Rev. John<sup>5</sup>, Brian<sup>4</sup>, Caleb<sup>3</sup>*), was born prior to 1755. His relationship to Rev. John<sup>5</sup> is established by the Exeter, R. I., Land Records [Vol. 4, p. 247], which show that Jeremiah Pendleton mortgaged to Caleb Pendleton of Springfield,

Mass., 8 November, 1794, three certain tracts of land in Exeter, on condition that Jeremiah, or *his son, John Pendleton*, shall convey to Caleb or his heirs, the fee of a certain tract of land in Springfield, descended by will from *John Pendleton of Springfield to his grandson, John Pendleton of Exeter*, when the latter arrives at the age of 21. The Exeter records show further that Jesse Pendleton,—Caleb's son,—acknowledged payment of this mortgage, 26 October, 1804, and the Hampden Co., Mass., Deeds [Vol. xl, pp. 92-94], record that on the 8th of September, 1804, John Pendleton, of Exeter, made over to Jeremiah Pendleton, of that town, all his rights in the land in Springfield willed him by his grandfather, and that Jeremiah then deeded the title of this land to Nathan and Jesse Pendleton, of Springfield,—sons of Caleb Pendleton,—thus fulfilling the conditions of the agreement entered into ten years before.

Jeremiah Pendleton was enrolled as of Richmond in the Rhode Island Census of able-bodied men taken in 1776, but we have no record of any service he may have performed in the Revolution. He first appears at Exeter, R. I., in 1788, when as an inhabitant of that town he bought a small tract of land there of John and Sarah Sweet on the 28th of January in that year (Exeter Deeds, iii, 145). His name occurs quite often thereafter on the Exeter records, his wife's name appearing as Susannah in all the deeds in which he was the grantor.

Jeremiah Pendleton continued to attend his father's former church in Richmond, and was one of its members in 1792; his name also appears as such in the later lists made 10 September, 1810, and in 1814 (Ch. Rec.). In the military affairs of his town he took an active part, and was appointed Lieutenant of the 2nd Exeter Co. in June, 1792, to which office he was re-appointed the two succeeding years. He closed out his final holdings in Exeter on the 3rd of April, 1812, his wife, Susannah, joining with him in a quitclaim deed to Clarke Tillinghast of their house and land (Exeter Deeds, vi, 102). Jeremiah acknowledged this deed at West Greenwich, but his name does not appear upon the records of that town, and what became of him afterwards is unknown; as shown by the Richmond Church records, however, he was still living somewhere in that vicinity two years later.

The will of George Sweet, dated at Exeter, 12 Feby., 1790, and filed 2 February, 1796 (Exeter Prob. Rec., vi, 46-7), names wife Ruth, daughter Susannah "Pembleton," and others, and the vital records of the town show that Susannah, daughter of George and Ruth Sweet, was born there, 17 May, 1745. Moreover, Jeremiah bought some of his land at Exeter of George and Ruth Sweet, so there can be no doubt of his wife's maiden name and parentage.

As to his children, however, more uncertainty exists outside of the son, John, already mentioned. The United States Census for Exeter in 1790 shows that Jeremiah's family then consisted of one male under 16 and two females besides himself and wife, while in 1800 the Census shows he had one male between 16 and 26, and one fe-

male of the same age. His own age is given as "over 45" in this year. If his wife had not been previously married it would appear that Jeremiah and Susannah (Sweet) Pendleton had issue:

766. Daughter, either dec. or married in 1800. She may have been the "Sarah Pendleton, Jere Perce's wife," who is named as a member of the First Baptist Church of Richmond, R. I., 17 Sept., 1810. Search of the town records of Richmond and Exeter failed to give any light on this matter.

253. RACHEL<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*Rev. John<sup>5</sup>, Brian<sup>4</sup>, Caleb<sup>3</sup>*), married Jabez Sweet, son of George and Ruth Sweet. He was born at Exeter, R. I., 9 Oct., 1751. On the 22nd of August, 1792, Rachel Sweet and Jabez Sweet, her husband, of Exeter, R. I., granted to Caleb Pendleton of Springfield, Mass., all their interest "In a certain tract of land lying in Springfield and is the land that formerly belonged to our honored father, John Pendleton, late of Springfield, deceased" (Hampden Co., Mass., Deeds, xxxi, 168).

Jabez Sweet is mentioned in the will of George Sweet, which we have already referred to in our account of [252] Jeremiah<sup>6</sup> Pendleton, and on the 1st of February, 1796, Jabez was appointed administrator of the estate of his mother, Ruth Sweet, and of his father, George Sweet (Exeter Probate Rec., vi, 51, 45). In the settlement of this estate Jeremiah Pendleton purchased the interests of the other heirs, one of the grants made him being from Jabez Sweet and Rachel, his wife, 1st February, 1797 (Exeter Deeds, iv, 435).

On the 9th of March, 1798, Jabez Sweet sold to James Congdon for \$1350, 150 acres in Exeter with house, saw-mill and other buildings thereon. What became of him afterwards is unknown, although the names of Jabez Sweet and Rachel Sweet appear as members of the First Baptist Church of Richmond, R. I., as late as 17 September, 1810. These names also appear in the list of members of this church in 1770, and if they refer to the Jabez who married Rachel Pendleton, would indicate that he entered matrimony at a very early age. No record of their children has yet been found.

254. CALEB<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON, JR. (*Caleb<sup>5</sup>, Brian<sup>4</sup>, Caleb<sup>3</sup>*), was born at Stonington, Conn., 19 March, 1760, and died at Westfield, Mass., 20 December, 1836 (or 19 December, according to Gravestone in Chicopee Street Cemetery). Caleb Pendleton, Jr., was enrolled in the 1st Co. of Militia at Westerly, R. I., in 1776, as shown by the state census taken in that year. In 1777 he went to Springfield, Mass., with the rest of his father's family, and began teaching school, an occupation he followed for many years. According to his autobiography—now in the possession of his granddaughter, Mrs. Charlotte M. Bailey, of Lansing, Mich., and included in two manuscript volumes with his

other writings, accounts of travel, verse, Fourth of July orations, etc.,—he first taught at So. Hadley, Mass., in 1777, after which he successively had charge of schools for various lengths of time in Granby and So. Hadley, Mass., Granby, Conn., Leydon, Mass., Stephentown, N. Y., West Springfield, Mass., Halifax, Vt., Ludlow, and Springfield, Mass.

On the 18th of September, 1802, he bought of Consider "Bement," of Hamilton, N. Y., the latter's interest in the estate of Jonathan "Bement," late of Springfield, deceased (Hampden Co., Mass., Deeds). The "Chapin Genealogy" states that Caleb Pendleton "Who was a good reader" (i.e., speaker), joined the First Congregational Church at Chicopee in 1804, and often conducted the services in the absence of the regular pastor. He was well fitted to lead the worship, as his writings show him to have been a deeply religious man.

Beginning with 1814 he was employed for several years in copying deeds in the Register's office at Springfield, and hundreds of pages of these records there to-day bear witness to his fine penmanship. In his old age he abandoned his former activities and made his home with his son, Israel, at Westfield.

Caleb<sup>6</sup> Pendleton, Jr., married at Springfield, Mass., 25 September, 1797, Asenath Beament, daughter of Jonathan and Lois (Sikes) Beament. She was born 25 February, 1774, and died at Westfield, 27 May, 1838.

259. JESSE<sup>6</sup> PENDLETON (*Caleb<sup>5</sup>, Brian<sup>4</sup>, Caleb<sup>3</sup>*), was born at Westerly, R. I., 8 July, 1771, and died at Willimansett, Mass., 9 January, 1837. He lived at Westerly, R. I., until his parents re-



moved to Springfield, Mass., settling first in the northern part of the town in the district

known as the "Chicopee Parish," and later on the highlands of Willimansett. Here he spent nearly all the rest of his life except for such time as he was away from home when engaged in the public service. He was a prosperous farmer and stock-raiser and active in town affairs.

The work entitled "Old Springfield" says of him: "Mr. Jesse Pendleton was a much respected citizen of a pleasing and courteous manner; he easily took the lead in the affairs of the town from 'Old Chicopee.'" He was a selectman of the town of Springfield from 1821-1824, and a Representative to the Massachusetts General Court from 1828-1830. His great-granddaughter, Mrs. Peter Arrington, of Warrenton, N. C., has in her possession a letter written by Jesse Pendleton to his wife while he was a member of the Legislature. It is dated at the Lion Tavern in Boston, and gives careful direc-

tions for the management of his property during his absence; he also notes receiving an invitation to dine with Lieut. Governor Winthrop.

Upon his retirement from public life Mr. Pendleton returned to his farm and continued to enjoy the esteem and confidence of the people of Springfield. He served as one of the early directors of the Springfield Mutual Fire Insurance Co., from 5 October, 1829, to 14 October, 1830.

Jesse<sup>6</sup> Pendleton married at Springfield, Mass., 22 February, 1798, Sabrina Chapin, daughter of Capt. Phineas and Sabrina (Wright) Chapin. She was born 13 June, 1779, and died 30 September, 1848 (Chicopee Rec.). Sabrina Chapin was a descendant of Dea. Samuel Chapin, one of the founders of Springfield, and is remembered as a woman of much dignity and great strength of character.

## SEVENTH GENERATION

With this generation a still wider distribution of the Pendleton family takes place, many branches settling in Ohio, and some pushing on still further into the West. Our records hereafter will bear much fewer references to original sources, the data coming largely through correspondence, confirmed mostly by the town records when the births, marriages and deaths occurred in Massachusetts, Rhode Island, and Connecticut. Nearly all of the different lines through Col. William<sup>4</sup> Pendleton and Edmund<sup>3</sup> Pendleton have representatives still living in this generation, and through them it was a comparatively simple matter to link the present with the past.

He lived at Westerly until shortly after the birth of his fourth child, when he removed to Richmond, Mass., and sometime later to Westville, Conn. From 1838 to 1840 he lived at Homer, N. Y., with his son William, and the Cortland County Deeds show that they owned a farm in that town. Upon disposing of this property they returned to Westville, where Joseph died, 14 January, 1856.

on at Stonington and at Mystic, Conn., until 1835, when he removed to New Hartford, N. Y. On the 19th of December in the following year he bought a farm in Rome, N. Y., where he lived until 1844, when he removed to Vernon, in the same state. Two years later he joined the great tide of emigration setting westward, and located at Bloomingdale, Ill., where he remained until his death on the 12th of March, 1877.

From 1819 to 1821 he was in partnership with this brother in a general store at Lebanon, Conn., and upon the dissolution of the firm he removed to Norwich, Conn., where he entered the livery business and also ran a small hotel. During his residence here he was a member of the Common Council of the city, and also served as Street Commissioner.

About 1858 he removed to Franklin, Conn., where he bought a large farm and spent the rest of his life. His obituary notice which appeared in the Franklin correspondence of a Norwich newspaper says of him: "Colonel\* Gurdon Pendleton, who died last Saturday, at the age of 86, was one of our well-known and most respected citizens. . . . He was a genial, whole-souled man, who will be pleasantly remembered by a large circle of acquaintances."

We have no record of his death. Elliot, or Ellet Pendleton, as he is sometimes called in various records, was occupied in farming, and spent nearly all his life in Westerly. He married (no date) [662] Lucy<sup>7</sup> Pendle-

ton, daughter of [221] Simeon<sup>6</sup> and Tabitha (Niles) Pendleton. As already stated under our account of her father, her parents were divorced, and her mother subsequently married Perry Bromley, by whom Lucy and her sister Lydia were brought up. They consequently became known as Lucy and Lydia Bromley, and none of their descendants was aware that this surname was not their own.

Warrington on board the frigate "Constellation," and while in this service took an active part in the reception to LaFayette when the Marquis visited this country in 1825. Returning to Camden he purchased the prospective interests of his brothers and sisters in their father's property, and engaged in the general mercantile business, in milling and in other pursuits. The Camden homestead, a substantial and commodious dwelling overlooking the bay, was erected in 1803, and stood for more than one hundred years, when it was destroyed by fire. The family estate included much of the most valuable business and finest residential portion of the town.

Mr. Pendleton took much interest in politics, and as a delegate to the Harrisburg Convention which nominated Gen. Harrison for the presidency, proposed a resolution that the term of office of the president be extended to a period of six years, and that he be ineligible to re-election. The resolution was defeated, but from that time the proposition has continued to grow in favor.

In 1850 Mr. Pendleton went to California, and was appointed by President Fillmore Appraiser of Customs at San Francisco. In 1853 he returned to Maine and removed his family to Gorham, in order that they might receive the superior educational advantages afforded by the famous Academy and Seminary in that place. He then went back to San Francisco, remaining there until the summer of 1856. The rest of his life was spent in Maine and in Iowa, where he had some business interests. He was a man of conspicuous integrity of character, of broad views and sympathies, a fine type of the gentleman of the old school. He died at the residence of his son, Edward Waldo Pendleton, in Detroit, Mich., 27 August, 1875.



Y., went South when a young man and took up the study of medicine at New Orleans, La. His nephew, William S. Pendleton, of Brooklyn, has several letters written by Joseph to his father, Zebulon, and in one of them, dated at New Orleans, 23 July, 1823, he states that he is in successful practice about thirty miles distant from that city, and has come to town to repay loans made him by a Major General Ripley and by the Governor of the state, who had advanced sums for his education. He also states that he intends coming to New York in the following year to complete his studies, and that his brother Zebulon, then in Alexandria, will come with him, and settle with him later in some town in the Southern States or in the West Indies.

Joseph and his brother located at Gainesville, Miss., not long afterward, and the United States Census of that state in 1830 shows they were living in Lawrence County, Joseph having in his family besides a female between 20 and 30 and one under 5, several males of various ages who were undoubtedly children of his sister, Susan, some of whom he brought up. In this year he owned three slaves. Ten years later his family consisted of only the two females, their ages corresponding with the lapse of years. These census records confirm the statements of the descendants of [373] Susan<sup>7</sup> (Pendleton) Folsom that Dr. Joseph Pendleton was married and had one child, a daughter. They say further that this daughter married, died insane, and left one son, who was adopted by his grandfather, Joseph<sup>7</sup> Pendleton, and took his name. He is supposed to have died in Texas not many years ago, leaving a family, but we have been unable to locate them. All we can say of Dr. Joseph's family, then, is that he married — —, and had issue:

William Greenman pays him the following tribute: 'I was closely associated with Capt. Gilbert Pendleton, Jr., for more than five years of sea life, and I never heard him utter a profane or unnecessary word. He was a model man,—not exacting, but expected every man to do his duty.' Others call him one of the best of captains to the men under him. He constantly looked after their welfare, and there was never a complaint from those under his charge."

417. BENJAMIN FRANKLIN<sup>7</sup> PENDLETON (*Harris<sup>6</sup>, Amos<sup>5</sup>, Col. William<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>*), was born at Stonington, Conn., 3 Sept., 1823, and died there, 18 Feby., 1909. An obituary notice published the same day in the *Westerly [R. I.] "Sun,"* says of him:

"Captain B. Frank Pendleton, the last of the old sea captains who made Stonington famous in its old whaling days, died this morning shortly after 10 o'clock, at his home on Elm Street in the borough of Stonington. There are no others of the whaling ship captains to survive him, death taking him to-day at the age of 86 years. His health had enabled him to be about until two days ago, when he was taken with an illness, from which he was unable to rally.

"For many years he followed the sea, making his first voyage in the brig "*Henry*," of which Gurdon Pendleton, his brother, was the captain. He afterward sailed in the brig "*Eugene*" and the ship "*Mercury*." He had charge of the ship "*Contest*" in the merchant service, and made his last voyage in the bark "*Acquidnac*," built in Mystic in 1866, to Rio Janeiro.

"From 1872 to 1890 he was keeper of the light on Stonington point, and since that time he has not been engaged in any occupation.

"Captain Pendleton, in his younger days, was one of the most popular of the seafaring captains, and, when the industry was at its height, his vessel was always sought as a desirable one to ship on. He retained the characteristics, which made him so popular with his men, until the last. He was always known as a man of jovial disposition, and was respected and held in high esteem by all those who knew him."

He finally closed out his mercantile interests and became president of the Marine Bank of Bangor. While attending to his duties here, he suffered his first attack of apoplexy. This was supposed to have been brought on by a fall in a dry-dock at Philadelphia, where he had gone a year before to superintend the repairs upon one of his tugs. The attacks becoming more frequent caused his removal to the hospital in Augusta, where his death occurred three months after his admission. He was a man much beloved, genial, hospitable, upright in all his dealings and highly respected by all who knew him. "Since 1873 Capt. Pendleton has been President of the Searsport Savings Bank. When the Searsport National Bank was organized, Capt. Pendleton was elected to the office of President, the two banks being managed together.

"He is also a Director of the Merchants' Insurance Company of Bangor and of the Maine Belting Company of Philadelphia, and a member of the firm of C. O. Sawyer & Company, stoves and hardware. He has held various town offices and was a member of the Governor's Council from 1879-1881."

and other ships. He was also engaged in shipbuilding between 1870 and 1881 at various places in Maine. In 1881 he retired from the sea and in 1885 established himself in the ship brokerage business in New York, and with B. F. Carver and Wilfred V. Nichols, formed the firm of Pendleton, Carver & Nichols, from which he retired in 1900. During the sessions of 1885 and 1886, Capt. Pendleton represented Stockton Springs and Searsport in the Maine Legislature.

"The last years of his life were spent upon the old family homestead at Cape Jellison in Searsport; this property he improved by remodelling the old buildings and erecting new ones. He was a sincere, honest gentleman, perfectly square in all his dealings, a good friend to all. He had no respect for shams; he was a good judge of men and knew in whom to have confidence. In politics he was a staunch Republican and during the Presidential campaign of 1884 was invariably taken for the Hon. James G. Blaine, for whom he would pass as Blaine's better-looking twin."—[Belfast, Me., "Republican Journal," August 6 and August 20, 1903.]

His noble gift to the Rhode Island School of Design of his matchless collection will enroll his name for all time as one of those who have given great aid to his fellow countrymen who wish to study and gather about them the best expressions of English artists in furniture and pottery. I never knew a collector more keen or exacting than Mr. Pendleton. The integrity of an art object he considered along with its artistic worth and beauty.

"Last month I spent an afternoon with Mr. Pendleton. . . . He then gave me the facts of his deed of gift of his entire collection to the School of Design, and also exhibited the architect's drawings for the dignified structure provided by certain citizens of Providence for the installation of the gift. 'And now,' he said, 'I am ready to go.' He talked with absolute composure of his approaching death. I never witnessed such fortitude before."

In a second letter that appeared in the "Journal," Mr. Luke Vincent Lockwood, the well known historian of Colonial furniture in America, added the following tribute: "I know of nobody who has had a better influence in the field of art than has he, and he can truly be called the father of art as applied to furniture in this country. There is hardly a collector here who has not received help and inspiration from Mr. Pendleton."

These expressions of appreciation have a worth and significance as evidence of the importance of the collection

passed into the custody of the Rhode Island School of Design, and as corroborating the belief held by all who knew Mr. Pendleton that "he had formed his unique collection with an unswerving and singular love of art and a genuine desire to make his acquisitions a means of public enjoyment and instruction."

He prepared for college at Phillips Academy, Andover, Mass., and was graduated from Amherst with the class of 1856. He then took up the study of medicine at the Cleveland Medical College, receiving his M. D. degree from that institution in 1860. In April, 1864, he located at Hebron, Conn., where he has since led the quiet but arduous life of the country doctor, his practice extending eight or ten miles in different directions, and necessitating long drives, sometimes in weather so severe that no one but a physician would venture out of doors. Yet for over forty years he has visited his sick without thought of hardship or sacrifice, and in all that time has very seldom, if ever, turned back when called.

Dr. Pendleton is greatly beloved by his townspeople, and has held various offices in their gift. During nearly all of the last thirty years he has been, as now, a member of the board of school visitors, and continuously since 1883, chairman of the financial committee of the First Congregational Ecclesiastical Society, of which church he has been a member since 1864. Although a Democrat in politics and living in a community strongly Republican, he was elected to the Connecticut Legislature in 1907, where he was a member of the Committee on Education. On the seventy-fifth anniversary of his birth, Dr. Pendleton planned to hold a reception at the Town House of Hebron, as he thought it would not be out of the way to take some notice of the occasion, particularly as it was near the close of his active practice as a physician. Somewhat to his surprise, however, the affair was taken out of his hands, and became a reception for him, at which he received many substantial tokens of the affection and esteem in which he is held.

Dr. Pendleton is a born genealogist. As a young man at college he traced back his ancestry to Major Brian Pendleton, and began gathering data upon other lines, which he has continued off and on ever since. Without hesitation he gave freely of his collections for the benefit of this work, and his many letters as well as his personal friendship have been an invaluable source of help and encouragement. We are largely indebted to him for our data concerning the descendants of his grandfather, Capt. Joshua<sup>5</sup> Pendleton, for those of [84] Benajah<sup>5</sup> Pendleton, besides many families in other lines, particularly those springing from [153] George<sup>6</sup> Pendleton and [701] James Gilkey<sup>7</sup> Pendleton.

During the last few years Dr. Pendleton has turned over most of his practice to his son, and now busies himself with the care of his farm and with such recreations as would be natural to a man who has been a student all his life.

558. ENOCH BURROWS<sup>7</sup> PENDLETON (*Gen. Nathan*<sup>6</sup>, *Major Nathan*<sup>5</sup>, *Col. William*<sup>4</sup>, *Joseph*<sup>3</sup>), was born at Pendleton Hill, Conn., 5 September, 1808, and died at Westerly, R. I., 11 November, 1875. He began his business career at a very early age, becoming a clerk in his father's store at Pendleton Hill when only eleven years old, and continuing as such until the death of Gen. Nathan Pendleton in 1827. As Enoch was then the oldest son living at home, the management of the business, as well as the care of his mother and of his younger brothers and sisters, fell upon his shoulders, and he proved himself well equal to the task.

In 1844 he removed to Brooklyn, N. Y., where he went into the grocery business with his brother-in-law, John A. Morgan, and after a residence there of about three years he located at Westerly, R. I., establishing himself in the same business with his brother, James M. Pendleton, as partner, under the firm name of Pendleton Bros. In 1854 the younger brother retired to become cashier of the Niantic Bank of Westerly and [411] James F. Pendleton was then taken into partnership, and the business continued under the title of E. B. Pendleton & Co. until 1861.

Mr. Pendleton took an active part in town affairs, and in 1856 was elected to the Rhode Island State Senate, and re-elected in 1857. In 1856 he was also a delegate to the first Republican National Convention which, held at Philadelphia, nominated Fremont for the Presidency. Four years later this new party was successful at the polls, and Mr. Pendleton's activities in its interests were rewarded

by President Lincoln appointing him Postmaster at Westerly in 1861. The firm of E. B. Pendleton & Co. was then dissolved, and he devoted himself exclusively to the duties of his new position, in which he proved himself so efficient that he was kept in office until his death—fourteen years after his first appointment. During this period Mr. Pendleton was a Town Councilman of Westerly, and from 1862-1867 was also United States Assistant Assessor. A man of unusual mental endowments himself, he transmitted to his children in a remarkable degree, powers of clear reasoning and keen perception, and was able in addition to give them all the educational advantages they desired. Active and enterprising, strictly upright in all his dealings, he died respected and esteemed by all who knew him.

Here he was offered the principalship of one of the best schools, but finding the winters of central New York too severe for his health, he decided to settle in a milder climate, and accordingly removed to Carthage, Mo.

Mr. Pendleton had always been active in church work, and after a period of teaching, his new friends in Carthage called him to the ministry of the Baptist Church in that town. These new duties were very agreeable to him, and in them he met with notable success. Some years later he became connected with the Pierce City Baptist College, and after a few more years was offered the chair of language in McGee College, College Mound, Mo. Mr. Pendleton accepted the offer and taught at this college for some time, but desiring to give his children still better educational advantages, he

finally removed to Lawrence, Kan., where his two youngest daughters entered the State University. For some years after their graduation the family lived at Lawrence, removing early in 1907 to Kansas City, Mo., where they now make their home.

Y., 3 April, 1832, and died at Sioux City, Iowa, 17 July, 1896. He prepared for college at Oxford Academy, Oxford, N. Y., and after a short period of school teaching in New Jersey, entered Union College in the fall of 1851. Here he took high rank in all his studies, and was graduated in June, 1854, as valedictorian in a class of eighty.

The next few years were spent in the study of law in the offices of Henry R. Mygott, Esq., of Oxford, and of Judge Comstock at Syracuse, N. Y., both eminent jurists in their time. Upon his admission to the bar of New York, Mr. Pendleton located at Cleveland,

O., for a short time, and then, in 1858, removed to Sioux City, Iowa.

From that time until his death he was closely identified with the history of the city. During the Indian troubles in the West while the Civil War was in progress, he served in the militia that protected the frontiers, and was slightly wounded during a night attack at Correctionville, Iowa. In 1861 he was elected to the Iowa Legislature, and in 1862 he became District Judge of the Fourth Judicial District, composed of over twenty counties. After one term of four years he resumed the practice of law, where he proved himself the most eloquent and successful jury pleader in that part of the state. An obituary notice published in the Sioux City "Times" of 18 July, 1896, says of him: "Brilliant in his literary attainments. learned in his profession, he was an able and powerful advocate of any cause he espoused. He may be better said to be the founder and father of the Republican party in northwestern Iowa than any other man." He was a delegate to the Convention that nominated Gen. U. S. Grant for his second term as President, and served there as chairman of the committee on credentials. He was also one of the presidential electors in this campaign, and held many other positions of trust and honor afterwards.

At the age of sixteen he was taken by his father to Ohio, and in this new country he became skilled as a woodsman, both with the axe and the rifle. As an offhand shot there were few his equal, and with the broad-axe he was an expert, many of the houses now standing in Stow owing their frames to the work of his hands. He also learned the stone-cutter's trade, and did considerable work of this kind in Kent, Akron and other places. On the farm his strength and endurance were remarkable, and the envy of his associates. In 1849 the "gold fever" took him to California. The journey was made overland and was long and tedious. The little party of four was obliged to abandon its worn out horses and complete the journey on foot, each carrying on his back the stores that were most needed. Mr. Pendleton's skill with the rifle was largely depended upon to supply them with food.

Almost immediately upon arrival at their claim he was stricken with fever, and for some months hovered between life and death, but at last he rallied and was able to return East, impoverished in pocket, broken in health, ill and discouraged. Home and friends, however, brought him back to hope and strength, and it was not long before he was himself again, once more applying himself to the farm. In 1856 the old homestead at Stow was sold and he removed to Mantua, Ohio, where he lived about eight years, and then bought a farm at Woodbridge, Mich., upon which the rest of his life was spent.

It would appear that Simeon<sup>7</sup> lived in Rhode Island and Connecticut until after the close of this war, when he removed to New Berlin, Chenango County, N. Y.

Thomas<sup>7</sup> Pendleton, 3rd, shares with [246] Hubbard<sup>6</sup> Pendleton the distinction of having the largest families recorded in this genealogy. Some say he had twenty-two children; his will mentions seventeen, and we have the names of three others who died young. His descendants are very numerous, widely scattered, and have been difficult to trace.

Not long afterwards he again visited nearly all the large cities in the United States, except those in the extreme west, soliciting funds for the erection of a statue of his friend, Vice President Thomas A. Hendricks, who died so soon after taking office in 1885. Mr. Pendleton was successful in this mission, but nearly lost his life in a Hartford hotel disaster. During his latter years he was an adjuster for the Phenix Fire Insurance Co.

From early boyhood, true to the instincts of his ancestors, he manifested an irresistible fondness for the ocean, fostered perhaps by the charming scenery of Camden harbor and Penobscot Bay. The ship yards, which were then supplying many of the famous "Clipper Ships," and the holiday launchings were successful rivals to the drowsy school room. At the age of fifteen his parents reluctantly consented to his going as a cabin boy to the West Indies. A narrow escape from wreck on this first voyage seemed only to increase his determination to be a sailor and after a year of successful trial, it was decided that he should be fitted for a sea-faring life. He then pursued a two years' course in navigation at the Academy at Yarmouth. With this equipment and experience he became an efficient officer of the merchant marine, making many long voyages, and sailing round the world four times before the outbreak of the Civil War.

At the first call for volunteers in '61 he entered the navy as an ensign, was promoted to acting master and for a time had command of the "Lenapee." He took part in many engagements and was wounded three times. In an heroic effort to rescue the crew of a launch that had been swamped in beaching a blockade runner, he was taken prisoner by the Confederate cavalry and was confined for nine months at Macon, at Charleston, (under fire of the Union gunboats), and in Libby Prison. The privations of these imprisonments undermined his naturally robust constitution and he died on the ninth day of June, 1866, only a short time after his return home.

He was named for Commodore Lewis Warrington, with whom his father, when a young man, was associated as secretary on board the frigate *Constellation*. In 1854 the family left their Camden home and removed to Gorham, Maine, for the purpose of better educational advantages. Young Lewis entered the academy for boys. One of his school mates writes of him,—“He was always popular with his fellow pupils for he was fearless, modest, ever genial, bright, and one of the most unselfish boys I ever knew.” At the age of seventeen he began the study of medicine in the office of Dr. Nahum P. Monroe, at Belfast.

In 1862 Dr. Monroe was appointed surgeon of the Twentieth Maine Regiment and Lewis accompanied him as hospital steward. At Antietam and Fredericksburg he won the high commendation of officers and men for his bravery in caring for the wounded under fire. After a severe illness caused by exposure, he was honorably discharged, 2 April, 1863. He was graduated from the Albany Medical College in 1865. Although the youngest in a class of fifty, he received one of the two honors voted by the class. He immediately began his profession in Belfast and after fifteen years of successful practice removed to Portland. In addition to his large general practice he was appointed upon the surgical staff of the Maine General Hospital. For fifteen years he was surgeon to the Maine Central Railroad and for many years taught Physiology in the Portland School for Medical Instruction. He was one of the most active promoters of the Maine Eye and Ear Infirmary and served as president of the Maine Medical Association.

The same qualities that distinguished him as a boy gave him prominence in his professional career. His medical associates prized not only his counsel but his companionship. His activity was unceasing and to facilitate surgical operations he became ambidexterous. His contributions to medical literature were characterized by a fellow physician as “strong, brilliant, well matured, and full of that deep, far-seeing and well rounded judgment that made his opinion on surgical matters respected and valued.” Dr. Pendleton was an authority on geology and pre-historic matters and accumulated one of the best collections of geological specimens and Indian relics in the State. About the year 1896 his health, which had not been robust since his army life, became undermined and although benefited by trips to Europe and Jamaica and winters in Florida, an insidious disease could not be thrown off and he died suddenly at Palm Beach, Florida, 13 January, 1898.

William*<sup>4</sup>, *Joseph*<sup>3</sup>), was born at Sandy Point, Me., 24 September, 1835. He received his early education in the district schools of Maine and at Bucksport Academy, and after some experience in teaching at Southwest Harbor, Mt. Desert, he entered Wesleyan University at Middletown, Conn., from which institution he was graduated in 1860 with the degree of A. M.

In the following August he became an instructor at the Wilbraham (Mass.) Academy, where he continued his theological studies. On the 7th of April, 1861, he was ordained Deacon at the New England Conference of the Methodist Church held at Boston. The outbreak of the Civil War, however, engrossed his attention for a time, and he raised a company for the service, but was unable to pass the muster examination.

In December, 1862, he became principal of the Cineinnatus (N. Y.) Academy, and in the following years held pastorates at Marcellus and Camillus, N. Y. On the 9th of April, 1865, he was ordained Elder at the Oneida Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church held at Skaneateles, N. Y., and then became pastor of a church at Oneida, N. Y. Here he remained until December, 1867, when he accepted a call to the Acting Presidency of the Upper Iowa University—now Morningside College, Fayette, Iowa.

After a year as professor of mathematics at Lawrence University, Appleton, Wis., he was called back to Upper Iowa University in 1869 as President of that institution. From 1870 to 1881, he held pastorates successively at Janesville and Whitewater, Wis. (where he founded the Whitewater Collegiate Institute), Milwaukee and Manitowac, Wis., Fargo, N. D., and Faribault, Minn. During this period he was also Indian Agent at Lemhi, Idaho, his oldest son holding a position on the agency at the same time.

In 1882 he became Presiding Elder of the Mankato (Minn.) District, and of the Winona (Minn.) District in 1883, and served there as such for five years. Later he held pastorates over the Franklin Avenue, Merriam Park and Forest Heights M. E. Churches in Minneapolis. His death occurred in that city, 2 March, 1896. "As a preacher he was fervent and spiritual. He was intensely sympathetic, and the pathos of his utterance was often melting and powerful. His life was filled with devoted labors, and was a blessing to all who knew him."

1336. BENJAMIN FRANKLIN<sup>8</sup> PENDLETON (*Frederick<sup>7</sup>, Benjamin<sup>6</sup>, Benjamin<sup>5</sup>, Col. William<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>*), was born at Canisteo, N. Y., 13 March, 1818, and died at St. George, Utah, 17 Nov., 1881. At the time of his decease the following obituary was published in a Salt Lake City newspaper:

"Benjamin F. Pendleton, whose sudden death we announced on Saturday morning, as having occurred at St. George the day previous, has been a life-long pioneer, in one place or another. He was born in New York in 1818, and when twenty-three or twenty-four, hearing of Illinois, which was just then opening up, he started for that state. He settled in a town named Peru, on the Illinois river and helped build up that place. From there he went to Pike County, and there joined the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, a faithful member of which he continued up to the time of his sudden demise. From Pike County he went to Hancock County, following the blacksmithing trade. He was with the Mormons when driven from that county, and he accompanied them as they were gradually forced westward, and reached Council Bluffs in 1846. He remained at the last named place until 1848, when he came here, one year after the arrival of the pioneers. He at once took up his abode in the Ninth ward, and helped to build up this city. In 1856 he accompanied the party that went to Salmon river and established Fort Lemhi. Returning to Salt Lake he remained for a few years, and then was called to go south to build up a settlement at St. George, which had not then been located. He assisted in breaking the first soil in that section, and has been a constant resident there ever since, rendering valuable assistance in building up that now prosperous locality.

"Mr. Pendleton was a most useful man among pioneers. His father, Frederick Pendleton, was a pioneer of New York, and helped to cut away the timber from that now leading state in the union. His sons, Benjamin and Andrew, there became used to pioneer life, knew its requirements and were prepared for its emergencies. Benjamin was a first class blacksmith. In early days, when it was next to impossible to import tools, he manufactured farming implements, and they were used all through the territory. He made flour mills, saw mills, molasses mills, the first cotton jenny made in Dixie,\* and

\* St. George is still called the Dixie of Utah as cotton was grown there by the early settlers.

not a few of the original mills are yet running, and bear the marks of the handiwork of Benjamin F. Pendleton. The only amusements he cared for were hunting and fishing, and it was while enjoying one of these that he met with his unexpected death."

"Andrew J. Pendleton, one of Utah's oldest and best respected citizens, died yesterday afternoon at 1:10 o'clock, after an illness of only a few days, resulting from a slight concussion of the brain.

"Last Thursday as he was leading his pet mare into the barn,

she suddenly backed and threw him against the wall, giving him a severe shaking up and an apparently slight bruise on the back of the head. Nothing was thought of the matter until Friday morning, when he lapsed into unconsciousness, from which he never returned.

"Andrew J. Pendleton was born at Steuben, New York, March 19, 1830, and with his brother, Benjamin, joined the Church, participating in the early scenes of Church history and drivings.

"When the final move was made to come to Utah, the deceased was one of those called to remain at Council Bluffs to stand guard. The following year, 1848, he came to Utah and settled on the same block that the home is now on, corner of Fifth East and Sixth South.

"In the early Utah days, Mr. Pendleton was recognized as one of the 'minute men' in every sense of the word. He was an Indian fighter and engaged in many of the battles waged against the red marauders.

"Soon after his arrival, Mr. Pendleton, with others, went over to California with the gold excitement. On his return, he was called by the Church to go out to Carson City, Nev., and assist in colonizing.

"He returned to Utah at the time of the Johnston's army excitement, and with others, journeyed south to American Fork. Upon his return he engaged in blacksmithing, being the first in the city.

"Mr. Pendleton has held many positions of trust; was elected to the city council in 1890, and was among the best councilmen the city has ever had. He also held a position of land and water commissioner as its first appointee. Indeed, he was largely responsible for its organization and present existence."

Not only did he give freely from his collections to aid the present compiler, but furnished besides most

Mr. Wetmore succeeded in clinging to some wreckage, drifted down the river, and was rescued the following morning when about opposite Memphis.

In September, 1841, he removed to Hancock County, Ohio, where his brother Joel had settled, and located in Union township. During the following winter he taught school at Union Center, and then took up carpentry and building, in which he was occupied until April, 1851. In this month he started for California with four other men, who like himself were no longer able to resist the "gold fever." They left New York for Panama on the ship "Nathan Hale," which was wrecked on the reefs at Turk's Island. They managed to get ashore, however, and eventually reached the Isthmus, which they crossed on foot. Mr. Pendleton did not stay long in California, returning late in 1851 by way of Nicaragua.

In February, 1852, he settled on a tract of land two miles south of McComb, Ohio, where he made his home the rest of his life, engaging in farming and in building. On the 16th of August, 1862, he was commissioned First Lieutenant of Co. G, 118th Regt., Ohio Volunteer Infantry, and saw active service with his regiment in Kentucky until he resigned, 19 April, 1863. His two oldest sons served in the same company with him, and three of his nephews were in the regiment. Upon his return from the field he was made Colonel of the Second Home Guard Regt. of Hancock County, but did no other service except to practice the drills required. In person he stood nearly six feet tall, averaging in weight two hundred pounds, made up of bone and muscle. He was long regarded as the strongest man in the county.

1823. CHARLES BABBITT<sup>8</sup> PENDLETON (*Samuel<sup>7</sup>, Gideon<sup>6</sup>, Samuel<sup>5</sup>, James<sup>4</sup>, Caleb<sup>3</sup>*), was born at Dighton, Mass., 24 April, 1816, and died at Brooklyn, N. Y., 25 December, 1882. He began making voyages to sea at a very early age, and in time became master of the packet ship "Lucy Thompson," belonging to the "Black Star" line, and plying between New York and Liverpool, England. He commanded this vessel fourteen years, until 1862, when he abandoned the sea and entered into business as a partner in the firm of John W. Mason & Co., importers and commission merchants at No. 43 Broadway, New York City, continuing in this occupation until the day of his death.

It was while in command of the "Lucy Thompson" that public attention was first called to Capt. Pendleton by his rescue of some one hundred of the passengers of the ill-fated steamship "San Francisco," and especially by the manner in which he extended his aid. The "San Francisco" was a new vessel, a side-wheeler, and regarded as one of the finest steamers of her time. She started from New York on her first voyage, 21 December, 1853, having on board nearly six hundred souls, five hundred of whom belonged to the 3rd Regt., U. S. Artillery, bound for California. When only three days out a terrible storm was encountered, the masts were carried away, and over one hundred people swept overboard. The engines then broke down, the steamer became unmanageable and sprang a leak. For five days the storm raged, during which time other passengers were lost, and others died of exposure. On December 29th the bark "Kilby," of Boston, was spoken and took off 108 of the survivors; two days later the ship "Three Bells" took off another lot, and on January 2nd the ship "Antarctic" saved the remainder.

The "Kilby" when she took the passengers from the "San Francisco" was herself in distress. She had been out 48 days, was short of provisions, and had but one cask of water left to serve out to her own crew and the strangers. For fifteen days she drove along, meeting no other ship as her captain had hoped, but encountering furious hurricanes, which split her sails and all but dismantled her. For ten days a handful of parched corn was the only ration allowed each passenger. Starvation was at hand and hope of deliverance was fled.

In the meantime, Capt. Pendleton, in the "Lucy Thompson," was battling his way toward New York. Blown far out of his course by

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the tremendous gales, he had had neither rest nor sleep for three days and nights, until at last worn out, he told his mate he would lie down on the transom for a little while, and directed that if he fell asleep he was to be called at eight bells—midnight, when he would see about changing the course. He was called as ordered, but was so exhausted that he did not awaken until two hours later, when, as he was about to reprimand the mate for disobedience, the moon broke through a rift of cloud and discovered near by a vessel in distress. Capt. Pendleton hove to, although a terrific gale was blowing and the sea running dangerously high, and sent a boat to the stranger, which proved to be the "Kilby."

Upon learning the condition of those on board, he at once offered to take one hundred of the luckless passengers of the "San Francisco" on his own ship, and although it was a matter of great difficulty and danger to transfer them in the heavy sea, while many were so weak they could not help themselves in the least, yet the work was successfully accomplished. Capt. Pendleton then sent provisions to the "Kilby," and put part of his crew aboard her, after which the two vessels separated, the "Kilby" making for Boston, and the "Lucy Thompson" for New York.

This port was reached a few days later, and Capt. Pendleton with Capt. Creighton of the ship "Three Bells," Capt. Stouffer of the "Antarctic," and Capt. Lowe of the bark "Kilby," were the heroes of the hour. The merchants of New York contributed over \$6,000 for a testimonial to be given the three officers, and Capt. Pendleton was presented with a handsome service of plate valued at over \$2,000. This was inscribed: "Presented by the merchants and citizens of New York to Capt. C. B. Pendleton of the ship 'Lucy Thompson,' as a testimonial of their appreciation of his humane and gallant efforts in assisting to save the passengers and crew of the steamship 'San Francisco,' after the terrific gale of the 24th of December, 1853." The citizens of Boston also sent to Capt. Pendleton a handsome silver pitcher, and from Philadelphia came a purse of \$250. This money he invested in a picture descriptive of the rescue of the passengers, painted by Walters, a marine artist of Liverpool.

So terrible were the circumstances attending the loss of the "San Francisco," and so stirring were the rescues of the surviving passengers, participated in successively by the "Kilby," the "Three Bells," the "Antarctic," and the "Lucy Thompson," that the events made a profound impression throughout the country, and woven together were described by the poet Whitman in the lines:

"I understand the large hearts of heroes,  
The courage of present times and all times;  
How the skipper saw the crowded and rudderless wreck of the  
steamship, and Death chasing it up and down the storm;  
How he knuckled tight, and gave not back one inch, and was  
faithful of days and faithful of nights,

And chalk'd in large letters on a board, *Be of good cheer, we will not desert you:*  
 How he follow'd with them, and tack'd with them—and would not give it up;  
 How he saved the drifting company at last:  
 How the lank, loose-gown'd women look'd when boated from the side of their prepared graves;  
 How the silent, old-faced infants, and the lifted sick, and the sharp-lipp'd, unshaved men:  
 All this I swallow—it tastes good—I like it well—it becomes mine;  
 I am the man—I suffered—I was there." \*

Capt. Pendleton was a deeply religious man, who saw in the singular chances that led him to the disabled "Kilby" the manifest and guiding hand of Providence. His humanity and high ideal of duty were shown on another occasion, no less trying, when an epidemic of cholera broke out among the steerage passengers on his ship. Although he had his wife and children aboard, he visited the sick continually, giving them such delicacies as his own table afforded, and bringing them such cheer as he could. So virulent was the disease, however, that nearly two hundred died, but not one body was committed to the deep by day or by night without a prayer from that Christian sailor and noble man.

GEORGE SAMUEL<sup>8</sup> PENDLETON (*Samuel*<sup>7</sup>, *Gideon*<sup>6</sup>, *Samuel*<sup>5</sup>, *James*<sup>4</sup>, *Caleb*<sup>3</sup>), was born at Taunton (or Dighton), Mass., 8 November, 1824. As a young man he worked at carpentry for a time and then began making voyages to sea with his brother Charles. In 1853, while second mate of the ship "Lucy Thompson," of which his brother was captain, he took an active part in the rescue of the passengers of the steamer "San Francisco," and shared in the honors paid the officers engaged in this affair, upon their arrival in New York. George S. Pendleton received for himself a silver medal engraved on one side with a picture of the rescue and on the other with the inscription "Presented to George S. Pendleton, second mate, attached to the American ship Lucy Thompson, by the merchants and citizens of New York as a testimonial of their sense of his humane and courageous conduct in assisting to rescue the passengers, officers and crew of the steamer San Francisco in their perilous exposure on the ocean after the destructive gale of the 24 December, 1853."

Not long after this event he rose to be a master mariner himself

and was placed in command of the ship "Excelsior," which like the "Lucy Thompson," belonged to the Black Star line and plied between New York and Liverpool. His subsequent life was not devoid of incident as on one occasion he put down an incipient mutiny among his crew, and at another time brought his ship into New York under jury masts, every stick having been blown out of her in a tremendous gale. On one voyage Capt. Pendleton was seventy days crossing the Atlantic because of furious storms and head winds, and on another, during the Civil War, he was pursued by a Confederate cruiser, but escaped capture as the enemy bore off to seek another prize that had come into sight.

In 1871 Capt. Pendleton decided to give up a sea faring life and go into business with his son George in Taunton. He left New York for Liverpool on what he said would be his last voyage, November 17, in that year, and neither he nor his ship, the "Excelsior," was ever heard from again. She is supposed to have foundered in a heavy storm that occurred about a week after his departure. Capt. Pendleton was a strict disciplinarian, as was necessary for one to be in order to handle the kind of crews that shipped between New York and Liverpool, but he was nevertheless, a pleasant and kindly man who left a wide circle of friends to mourn his loss.
