MONTH BY MONTH.

A Meeting of the Council was held at the Offices of the Association on Saturday, 6 Dec., 1924.

Present: The President (Mr. Merchant), Misses Blake, O'Brien, Rook; Mrs. Clayton; Messrs. Boll, Boutwood, Blaise, Clayton, Fairman, Robertson, Shelton, Smith, Thomas, Wadham, Yelland, Edmonds, Long.

An adjourned meeting of the Council was held at the Offices of the Association on Saturday, 10 Jan., 1925.

Present: The President, Miss O'Brien, Miss Rook, Messrs. Boll, Edmonds, Fairman, Long, Robertson, Shelton, Thomas, Wadham, Yelland.

In attendance at both meetings: The Secretary, The Business Manager.

Universal Congress in 1926. It was reported that a motion of dissent in accordance with the articles of Association had been received from 10 Councillors, with reference to the Resolution passed on this subject at the Council Meeting at Sheffield on 11th Oct., 1924. Letters were read from absent Councillors, and an extensive discussion took place on the situation, the tenor of which the delegate of the Edinburgh Society was asked to communicate to that Society, and the meeting was adjourned pending reply to her report.

At the adjourned meeting a letter was read from the Secretary of the Edinburgh Society in which it was stated that the Society had withdrawn the invitation sent by them to the Centra Komitato for holding in Edinburgh the 1926 Universal Congress. The letter concluded: "My Council at the same time remain of opinion that our action in this matter has been quite regular, and we reserve all our rights as an autonomous group."

The Council then formally rescinded the resolution passed at the Council Meeting held at Sheffield on the 11th October approving the invitation since withdrawn.

Thereupon the following resolution, moved by Mr. Edmonds, seconded by Mr. Shelton, was carried unanimously:—

"That the President be empowered warmly to thank the Edinburgh Society for their letter of the 22nd Dec., and to assure them that no attack on their autonomy has ever been or will be contemplated: to inform them that if their Society as a whole is willing to co-operate in the organisation of a Universal Esperanto Congress for 1926, the B.E.A. will forthwith make official invitation to the Centra Komitato to that end; and the Council further has great pleasure in assuring the Edinburgh Society that every endeavour will be made to secure the largest possible measure of hearty co-operation with their Society in order to secure such full and complete success as will be of the highest service to the Movement."

In my last report appeared certain suggestions against Mr. Warden, conveying the idea of his disloyalty to the new international organisation. It has now been ascertained that these suggestions were based on unverified statements from sources outside the B.E.A., and are wholly without foundation. I much regret that those statements have been repeated in these notes, and am glad to be able to say that I am now quite satisfied that Mr. Warden will loyally support the new organisation.

KRONIKO FAKA.

Commerce. An interesting experiment is being carried on in several countries simultaneously. Business men in each country, after 25 hours' instruction, will be put in touch with students in other countries who have taken a similar course. Results will be noted as to the proficiency attained, and the suitability of Esperanto for commerce.

In London the experiment is under the control of the French Chamber of Commerce. The class is free, and meets at 6.30 on Wednesdays in the B.E.A. office. Prizes are offered to the best students. All engaged in any branch of commerce are eligible, provided they have had no previous instruction. Eighteen have already joined.

Co-operators. The Women's Co-operative Guild issue the English and Esperanto words of *La Patria Internaciona* (Prize Song by Mrs. L. Woodward) at 1d. It will be printed later with music. From Miss Enfield, 29 Winchester Rd., N.W.3.

Education. At the B.E.A. Stall at the Conference of Educational Associations was a good display of literature. Sandwichmen were posted outside the building. An attractive programme was printed, with portraits of the speakers.
